ABSTRACT

This pamphlet is designed to provide information concerning high school completion programs available to spouses of Army service members. Opportunities and eligibility requirements are defined for those who desire to earn a high school diploma through the Adult Public School Diploma Program, a state equivalency certificate through the General Educational Development (GED) High School Equivalency Program, or a diploma through the External High School Diploma Program (nontraditional). (Spouses who have completed high school and are interested in postsecondary educational opportunities are allowed to participate in programs at Army Education Centers on a space available tasis.) Appendix A gives a table of the adult high school completion programs available by state and United States territories. Appendix B lists institutions which offer external high school diploma programs (correspondence courses). (CSS)

- 1. Purpose. The purpose of this pamphlet is to provide information concerning high school completion programs available to spouses of Army servicemembers.
- 2. General. a. The Army is concerned with the professional development of its service personnel and provides avenues of education opportunities under the guidance outlined in AR 621-5.
- b. Education Service Officers will authorize the services of the Army Education Center counselors on a space-available, no-cost basis to assist spouses of service personnel who desire to earn a high school diploma through the Adult Public School Diploma Program, a State equivalency certificate through the GED High School Equivalency Program, or a diploma through the External High School Diploma Program (nontraditional).
- c. Spouses of service personnel interested in their educational development may take advantage of the post-secondary educational opportunities offered at Army Education Centers on a space available basis.
- d. Spouses who have completed high school and are interested in post-secondary educational opportunities should investigate the several types of financial assistance available through the Office of Education. For more information write to the US Department of Health. Education and Welfare, Office of Education. Washington. DC 20202.
- 3. Eligibility for Participation in the Program.

  a. Spouses of service personnel may participate on a space-available basis in the Army. High School Completion Program.
- b. Spouses of service personnel who meet the eligibility requirements as appropriate of the State or US territory in which they are duly registered, see appendix A.

### 4. Adult High School Diploma Program. «a. CONUS.

- (1) The States or local public education systems within the States provide high school completion programs for adults who desire to complete requirements for a high school diploma or its equivalent. This is done in most States with a minimum charge to dependent spouses, regardless of their status as residents.
- (2) Information concerning availability and requirements of adult high school education programs, related costs, and other appropriate information as authorized by State and US ferritory is at appendix A.

- (3) Spouses should be advised that each State and possibly each local school system may make special graduation requirements. All costs related to tuition and high school completion will be borne by the spouse.
- (4) Army Education Centers providing onpost high school classes through the Army Continuing Education Systems (ACES) may arrange for spouses to attend classes on a space-available basis. If this is not possible, the individual will be referred to the local public schools which provide these services (app. A).

#### b. Overseas.

- (1) Education Service Officers contract with accredited institutions that are authorized to award high school diplomas.
- (2) Counseling and information service should be made available as it is in the United States.
- (3) Education Service officers may authorize spouses of service personnel to attend. On a space avalable basis, high school classes, take tests, and receive diplomas from the contracted educational institution providing the servicing contract costs are based on cost-per-class and nor cost-per-pupil. If the contract specifies cost-per-pupil, the spouse will be permitted to attend but must pay the tuition and all related costs associated with high school completion from the contracted educational institution. In either event, the spouse may receive the high school diploma from the contracted educational institution upon meeting its graduation requirements.
- (4) Spouses may find it impossible to attend high school classes taught by a contracted institution. In this event the counselor should advise the individuals of other options available: GED High School Equivalency Tests, and/or External High School Diploma Programs (nontraditional).
- 5. GED High School Equivalency Tests
  a. Spouses who elect to obtain a high school equivalency certificate from their home state may do so by taking the GED test series providing they feel adequately prepared for testing. The counselor will consult the Test Control Officer for the necessary applications.

#### b. Overseas:

(1) Spouses desiring to take the GED tests may do so only at Oversea Army Education Centers authorized to provide civilian testing for the GED Equivalency Tests. Information succepting such GED "civilian" test sites may be obtained at all Army Education Centers.

- (2) Education Service Officers at Army Education Centers authorized to proctor civilian tests will assure spouses appropriate assistance.
- (3) If application forms for oversea GED Testing are not available at the local Army Education Center they may be ordered directly from:

- c. Information concerning requirements for issuance of credentials, minimum age for testing, requirements for retesting, method of applying for official transcripts, fees, etc., are outlined in *The GED Testing Program Policies & Centers*. This booklet is at all Army Education Centers.
- d. All costs associated with testing, fees, transcripts, etc., are to be paid by the individuals.
- 6. External High School Diploma Program (Nontraditional). a. Spouses who may not be able to complete the requirements for a high school diploma through the traditional method of earning

credit through classroom attendance may elect to participate in an External Diploma Program.

- b. There are a number of private and public accredited institutions which provide external high school diploma programs. These programs are nontraditional in that they will generally accept credit earned by some or all of the following methods:
- (1) Correspondence courses earned from accredited institutions.
  - (2) Independent study.
  - (3) Credit by examination.
  - (4) Life work experience.
  - (5) GED Testing.
- (6) Where applicable, military service schools and on the job training.
- c (A partial list of accredited institutions offering external high school diplomas is at appendix B. These schools should be contacted for further information.
- d. Funds for these programs cannot be provided by the Army and costs must be paid by the dependent spouse.

#### APPENDIX A

## ADULT HIGH SCHOOL COMPLETION PROGRAMS AVAILABLE BY STATE AND US TERRITORIES

Information Regarding Public Sponsored Adult Education Programs

The following questionnaire was recently sent, by the Department of the Army, to each of the Chief State School Office, in each of the 50 States and territories:

The Department of the Army is committed to the education of the entire Army family. As a service to Army personnel assigned to duty within your State, the Department of the Army provides information concerning the completion of high school by dependent spouses. No Department of the Army funds are available for this purpose. Answers to the following questions are needed so the current and accurate information can be provided:

1. Does your State or territory provide formal type instruction for adults to meet the requirements for completing high school with a diploma or certificate?

- 2. Is it necessary to be a legal resident of your State or territory to participate?
- 3. Does living on Federal property such as a US Army post exclude participation in the program?
- 4. Is there any cost or charge for dependent spouses attending these classes?
- 5. Are there requirements as to age, such as a minimum age requirements, to participate?
- 6. If adult high school completion programs are offered within your State or territory, could you advise us as to how I could obtain a list of their locations?

Responses keyed to the foregoing six questions are shown at table A-1.
