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

*Higher Education Act Title VIII

ABSTRACT

Data are presented on awards made under authority of the Higher Education Act, Title VIII, for cooperative education programs from 1972-77. Legislative highlights of the occupantive education program and specific information about eligibility requirements and application and award procedures are provided. Maps show first through fourth year grantees, and tables provide information on applications and federal support, grant awards for the administration of programs, training grants, and research grants. Information is provided on type, number, and amount of awards. Grantees and brief program descriptions are presented for cooperative education research and training programs for fiscal year 1977. An alphabetical listing by state and institution within states for program administration grants is provided. (SW)

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FOREWORD

This Award Booklet, presented for the use of those interested in Cooperative Education, lists all awards made under the authority of H.E.A., Title VIII, as amended.

Cooperative Education is so called because it is dependent upon the cooperation of employer and educator in combining to provide, first, a superior total educational program for students. It also provides a means by which students earn money to help pay the costs of attending college. The essential ingredient is that the work program is integrated with formal academic study to become a superior total learning program.

Under Title VIII, of the Higher Education Act, funds are authorized to be granted, to institutions of higher education for the planning, establishment, expansion, or carrying out by such institutions of programs of cooperative education that alternate periods of academic study with periods of related public or private employment that will not only afford students the opportunity to earn through employment funds required toward continuing and completing their education but will, so far as practicable, give them work experience related to their academic or occupational objective. Two hundred and Seventy-six grants were awarded this year for these purposes. Funds are also authorized for the training of persons involved in the administration of cooperative education programs, for projects demonstrating or exploring the feastbility or value of innovative methods of cooperative education, or...for research into methods of improving, developing, or promoting the use of cooperative education programs in institutions of higher education.

Cooperative education is a social invention which is now having its day. It is an innovative way of preparing youth to work in the world in which they will live. It is supported by the Administration, the Congress, the Office of Education and by distinguished educators as a propitious weld of academic and real world learning.

To those who have experienced it first hand, the advantages of cooperative education have been proven and the feared disadvantages dispelled. Persuasive evidence exists that cooperative education is good for the students, good for the college, good for the employer, and good for the larger society. Because support for cooperative education is today a matter of approved public policy and its merits well-founded, we are pleased to provide this information about the Federal program.

LEGISLATIVE HIGHLIGHTS OF THE COOPERATIVE EDUCATION PROGRAM

National support for exoperative education came in February, 1967, when President Lyndon Johnson recommended to The Congress a change in the College Work-Study Program which would "for the first time permit us to support Cooperative Education Projects."

Earlier, however, Title III of the Higher Education Act of 1965, included, and still includes, cooperative education as one of the options for developing institutions with Title III grants. Comparatively little use was made of this authorization, however; since the developing institutions had more pressing needs for other expenditures to improve their academic programs and facilities.

On October 1, 1968, Congress amended both the Higher Education Act of 1965 and the Vocational Education Act of 1963. Under the VEA, funds are allocated to the States to support cooperative vocational education for part-time students, principally in the high schools. The amended Higher Education Act authorized funds to enable the Commissioner of Education to make grants to

"Institutions of higher education for the planning, establishment, expansion, or carrying out by such institutions of programs of cooperative education that alternate periods of full-time academic study with periods of full-time public or private employment that will not only afford students the opportunity to earn through employment funds required toward continuing and completing their education but will, so far as practicable, give them work experience related to their academic or occupational objective."

A second section of part D of Title IV authorized funds via grants or contracts to institutions of higher education or to other non-profit organizations for the

"training of persons in the planning, establishment, administration, or coordination of programs of cooperative education, or for research into methods of improving, developing, or promoting the use of cooperative education programs in institutions of higher education.

This section of Title IV-D was amended in 1972 to include "projects demonstrating or exploring the feasibility or value of innovative methods of cooperative education."

The 1976 Amendments (Public Law 94-482) made several significant changes in the program. First, the words "full-time" were removed, thus permitting Federal support for parallel programs for part-time students. In addition, the period of eligibility for Federal support was increased from three to five years, and the maximum amount which may be awarded to a single institution for administrative costs was increased



from three to five years, and the maximum amount which may be awarded to a single institution for administrative costs was increased from \$75,000 to \$175,000. Finally, Congress approved priority funding criteria for programs showing a high receptivity for the placement of students in appropriate jobs, and for institutional commitment to support the program after the termination of Federal assistance.

Enacted October 12, 1976, the HEA amendments, Public Law 94-482, expanded the authorization of Federal support for Cooperative Education. Formerly Part D of Title IV of the HEA, cooperative education now is authorized by Title Vill of the Act. This action removes Co-op from the context of student financial assistance (Title IV) and places it in a separate title. The Act, as amended, is on pages 75 and 76 of this Award Book-

Prior to the amendment of the Act, the chairman of the House Committee on Education reported: "Few of the programs carried on under present law aroused quite the degree of support in the Committee that was and is enjoyed by the Cooperative Education program, currently authorized by Part D of Title IV. A number of witnesses appeared in the hearings and spoke enthusiastically about the theory and practice of Cooperative Education. The Committee responded in a similar vein...increasing its authorization, modernizing the language, and finally taking it out of Title IV and giving it the designation and status vacated by the appeal of Title VIII." (House Report No. 94-1086, May 4, 1976)

COOPERATIVE, EDUCATION PROGRAM

Federal Agency: U.S. Office of Education, Bureau of Higher and Continuing Education

Authorization: Higher Education Act of 1965, Title VIII, Public Law 89-329, as amended by P.L. 90-575, Oct. 16, 1968; 92-318, June 23, 1972, and P.L. 94-482, October 12, 1976.

Objectives: To provide Federal support for cooperative education programs including the planning, establishment, expansion, or carrying out of such programs in institutions of higher education; Cooperative Education Programs are those which alternate periods of academic study and public or private employment.

Types of Assistance: Project Grants to institutions of higher education, or combinations thereof, for administrative support; grants to or contracts with institutions of higher education or non-profit organizations for training, research or demonstration projects.

Uses and Use Restrictions: Grants may be used for the planning, establishment, expansion, or carrying out by the funded institutions of programs of cooperative education that alternate periods of academic study and public or private employment; for the training of such program administrators; for research directed toward the promotion of improved programs of cooperative education; and for projects demonstrating or exploring the feasibility or value of innovative methods of cooperative education. Salaries and administrative expenses are payable from these funds. No money appropriated under this program may be used for payment of compensation to students for employment by employers.

Eligibility Requirements: Accredited institutions of higher education, or non-profit organizations - Sec. 803 only:

Applicant Eligibility: Institutions of higher education except "those great institutions where cooperative education is already central to the curriculum." Senate Bill, August 27, 1976.

Beneficiary Eligibility: Same as Applicant eligibility.

Credentials: Applicant must have complied with Federal Civil rights legislation including Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendment of 1972, and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973; and it must meet the definition of an institution of higher education given in Section 1201 of H.E.A. of 1965, as amended. (Except for non-profit agencies)

Application and Award Process: (see below)

Preapplication Coordination: None

Application Procedure: Submit completed application according to the established criteria and instructions to the U.S. Office of Education, Application control Center, 400 Maryland Avenue, S.W., Washington, D.C. 20202, Attention: 13.510.

Award Procedure: Proposals and applications are evaluated by outside consultants, experts in fields of education, and the OE Division staff. The Grants and Procurement Management Division, Office of Management, issues final Notification of Grant Awards.

Announcement published annually in Federal Register; stated on Application Instruction Booklet (usually late Fall).

Range of I

oval/Disapproval Time: Approximately 6 months.

Renewals: Same as for new request. (Resubmit proposal).

Assistance Considerations:

Length and Time Phasing of Assistance:

Up to but not exceeding 12 months. Federal aid not to exceed 5 Annual Grants. The maximum grant an institution of higher education can receive in a single fiscal year for the Administration of program (Planning, implementing, strengthening and expansion) is \$175,000 to any one such institution and the amount equal to \$125,000 times the number of institutions participating in the consortium; however, no such restriction applies to training, research or demonstration project. Recipients of administration grants must expend not less than was expended in the prior year for their cooperative education efforts.


Post Assistance Requirement: None.

Reports: A progress report and a fiscal report are to be submitted annually, 90 days after the termination of each grant period.

Subject to a Federal audit anytime during the term of the grant and within a period of 5 years after the termination of Federal support. Audits:


Records: Must be retained for 5 years after the end of the fiscal year during which the expenditures were made or until the grantee is notified that the records are no longer needed.




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

TITLE VIII—COOPERATIVE EDUCATION

APPROPRIATIONS AUTHORIZED

Sec. 801. (a) There are authorized to be appropriated—

(1) for the fiscal year ending June 30,81976, and the period beginning July 1, 1976, and ending September 30, 1976, \$13,000,000:

(2) for the fiscal year 1977, \$15,000,000;
 (3) for the fiscal year 1978, \$20,000,000;

for the fiscal year 1979, \$25,000,000; and

for each of the fiscal years 1980, 1981, and 1982, \$25,000,0002 to enable the Commissioner to make grants pursuant to section 802 to institutions of higher education, or to combinations of such institutions, for the planning, establishment, expansion, or carrying out by such institutions or combinations of programs of cooperative education. Such programs shall provide alternating periods of academic study and of public or private employments the latter affording students not only the opportunity to earn the funds necessary for continuing and completing their education but, so far as practicable, giving them work experience related to their academic or occupational objectives.

(b) There are further authorized to be appropriated—

(1) \$1,000,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1976, and the period beginning July 1, 1976, and ending September 30, 1976:

\$1,500,000 for the fiscal year 1977;

(3) \$2,500,000 for the fiscal year 1978; and

(4) \$3,000,000 for each of the fiscal years 1978, 1979, 1980, 1981, and 1982,

to enable the Commissioner to make training, demonstration, or research grants or contracts pursuant to section 802.

(c) Appropriations under this title shall not be available for the payment of compensation of students. for employment by employers under arrangements pursuant to this part. 20 USC 1133

GRANTS FOR PROGRAMS OF COOPERATIVE EDUCATION

Sec. 802. (a) From the sums appropriated pursuant to subsection (a) of section 801, and for the purposes set forth therein, the Commissioner is authorized to make grants to institutions of higher education that have applied therefor in accordance with subsection (b) of this section, in amounts not in excess of \$175,000 to any one such institution for any fiscal year, and to combinitions of such institutions (that have so applied) in amounts not to exceed an amount equal to the product of \$125,000 times the number of institutions participating in such combination, for any fiscal year:

(b) Each application for a grant authorized by subsection (a) of this section shall be filed with

the Commissioner at such time or times as he may prescribe and shall—

(1) set forth programs or activities for which a grant is authorized under this section?

(2) specify the portion or portions of such programs or activities which will be performed by a nonprofit organization or institution other than the applicant and the compensation to be paid for such performance:

(3) provide that the applicant will expend during such fiscal year for the purpose of such program or activity not less than was expended for such purpose during the previous fiscal year;

(4) provide that the applicant shall make such reports and keep such records as are essential to insure that the applicant's programs or activities are conducted in accordance with the provisions of this part:

(5) provide for such fiscal control and fund accounting procedures as may be necessary to assure proper disbursement of, and accounting for, Federal funds paid to the applicant under this part; and

(6) include such other information as is essential to carry out the provisions of this part. (c) No Institution of higher education may receive, individually or as a participant in a combination

of such institutions, grants under this section for more than five fiscal years. No such institution or combination thereof may receive—

(1) a grant in excess of 100 per centum of the total administrative cost for the first of such fiscal years:

(2) a grant in excess of 90 per centum of such cost for the second of such years;

3) a grant in excess of 80 per centum of such cost for the third of such years;

(4) a grant in excess of 60 per centum of such cost for the fourth of such years: or

(5) a grant in excess of 30 per centum of such cost for the fifth of such years.

Any provision of law of the contrary notwithstanding, the Commissioner shall not walve the provisions of this subsection.

(d) In approving applications under this section, the Commissioner shall give special consideration to applications from institutions of higher education for programs which show the greatest promise of success because of—

(1) the extent to which programs in the academic discipline with respect to which the application

is made have had a favorable reception by employers,

(2) the commitment of the institution of higher education to cooperative education as demonstrated by the plans which such institution had made to continue the program after the termination of Federal 20 USC 1133a. financial assistance, and

(3) such other factors as are consistent with the purposes of this section.

GRANTS AND CONTRACTS FOR TRAINING AND RESEARCH

Sec. 803. From the sums appropriated our mant to subsection (b) of section 801, the commissioner is authorized, for the training of persons in the planning, establishment, administration, or coordination of programs of cooperative education, for projects demonstrating or exploring the feasibility or value of innovative methods of cooperative education, for research into methods of improving developing, or promoting the use of cooperative education programs in institutions of higher education, to-

(1) make grants to or contracts with institutions of higher education, or combinations of such

institutions, and

(2) make grants to or contracts with other public or private nonprofit agencies to or organizations, when such grants or contracts will make a especially significant contribution to attaining the objectives 20 USC 1133b. of this section.
