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ABSTRACT

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THE VIEW FROM AN INSIDE CLOSET: ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1977-1978

An institute is not the worst vantage point from which to observe the many changes that have taken place in higher education over the past 15 years. There has been safety in being removed from the intensity and stress of certain happenings, and there has been ample opportunity to witness events that have been interesting and significant. In many respects, the distance has been optimal -- close enough to observe, and yet not close enough to be mistaken for one of wthe participants.

In its brief history the Institute of Higher Education has known its ups and downs, its good days and bad -- but there has always been a generous crack in the door to things that really mattered. When the Institute was first established in 1964, it was part of a larger response in a period of incredible growth. Many of the staff's early efforts dealt with an initial charge to help recruit and develop faculty for the public and private colleges in the State of Georgia. Those efforts were joined with no anticipation that "a critical faculty shortage" would be met before the close of the decade. If, in the beginning it was all recruitment and no development, there is irony in the fact that faculty development efforts have been much better received in a period of "glutted job-markets" than in a period of rapid expansion.

The series of shock waves that came with student dissent and faculty discontent -- and the financial crisis that has set the tone for much of the 1970s -- did not provide "the living laboratory" it might have. The crack in the door was quite narrow for a period of several years, but the door was never shut completely. Institutional research, the second of the Institute's initial charges, was difficult to reconcile with a doctoral program in higher education, and the function was relinquished in 1970 without sighs or tears.

In fulfilling its third initial charge, "cooperative endeavors" with other educational institutions and agencies, the Institute has had its moments of popularity and high demand. At one stage it obviously became overly committed to the "developing institutions" funded under Title III of the Higher Education Act of 1965. At other times there have been trivial chores and misapplications. But by and large, the Institute has continued to work well and happily with two-year and four-year colleges in its "vicinity" and it has enjoyed a truly fine cooperative relationship with many other educational agencies concerned with the development and continued improvement of higher education in the state and region.

Most of higher education is still in the process of assimilating or accommodating the changes of the past 15 years. The growing pains of the 1960s can still be felt in occasional jabs or shooting sensations. The traumas of student protest can still be found in decisions or choices

that were made in the heated haste of confrontations. And the vestiges of financial setbacks may be with us for years to come.

But sifting through the morass of problems and issues confronting higher education, there are many flecks of optimism to be found in the midst of pessimistic projections and dismal forecasts of future trends and developments. Not the least of these is the distinct possibility that higher education is once again concerned with educational matters; that once again, it is permissable, even popular, to talk about teaching and learning — to think about teaching and learning in an intellectual or cultural sense.

There is presently a concern for the common knowledge that should be part of every college student's heritage -- and widespread interest in what students study and learn in four years of a college education. There is better recognition that learning and development are complementary processes -- and that both can take place in or out of the classroom. There is a healthy concern with adult development and learning that recognizes those "over thirty" as growing, changing, maturing individuals. But most surprising of all, there is a possibility that teaching itself may be "coming out of the closet." If it can be admitted that teaching is the reason that most faculty members are hired -- and the basis for classes, courses, schedules, and credit -- the grounds for optimism may swell again.

THE PROFESSIONAL STAFF

The Institute staff in 1977-1978 was actively engaged in a variety of activities and functions related to service, instruction, and research. The year was a particularly busy one, and demands for staff services were unusually high.

For at least one staff member, it was "the year of the committee" and for others it was a year of "rush and hurry."

The staff consisted of four full-time professionals and two part-time colleagues. Dr. Joseph Hammock, professor of psychology and former vice chancellor for academic development in the University System of Georgia, joined the staff on a one-third basis. Dr. Tom Dyer, who had been a full-time staff member for the previous two years, requested a reduction in his workload to study law. HISTORY OF HIGHER EDUCATION IN GEORGIA (THOMAS G. RYER)

This Institute project involves the research and writing of a comprehensive book-length history of higher education in Georgia, the first such study for any Southern state. Research has been conducted in numerous archives throughout Georgia, the Southeast and in Washington, D.C. in an effort to understand and explain within broad historical contexts the complexities of the evolution of the state's public and private institutions of higher learning. The study draws upon a variety of primary sources including a number of important individual manuscript collections and institutional

records as well as such conventional sources as newspapers, magazines and ephemeral literature.
