Series of activities designed to supplement language arts programs: topics include creative writing, public speaking, dramatics, informational writing, language skills, spelling, parts of speech; activities can be used with individuals and small or large groups; most activities should appeal to elementary-age child; good resource for any elementary language arts teacher; efficient packaging—activities on cards organized in a recipe—type box

#### BOOKS

Adoff, Arnold, comp. & ed. CELEBRATIONS: A NEW ANTHOLOGY OF BLACK AMERICAN POETRY. Follett, 1977. 285 p. \$7.98. Grades 7-12

Over 200 poems by contemporary black American writers celebrating their lives, ancestry, loves, adversities, blackness, all joyous and proud; poems extol African history, black American community, personal identity, music, heroes; includes well known and lesser known—e.g., Nikki Giovanni, Gwendolyn Brooks, Langston Hughes, Mari Evans, Robert Hayden, Sam Cornish, Joyce Carol Thomas; fierce pride and rededication distinguish eulogies to civil rights heroes like King, Rap Brown, Bobby Seale; although by blacks about blacks, feelings explored are universal; badly needs explanatory notes for classroom users (seldom identifies people, places, events treated in poems); biographical notes help some; useful supplement to black literature programs

Adoff, Arnold. UNDER THE EARLY MORNING TREES: POEMS. Dutton, 1978. unp. \$7.50. Grades 6-12

The poet's words and the artist's delicate brush take us on a nature walk in very early morning; few have the gift to see trees, fields, flowers, insects, animals, with the sensitivity revealed in these soft black and gray brush drawings and simple poetry..."Brown spiders are hanging from their webs between the branches of forsythia and elm..."; a gently moving experience to re-create one's spirit; one jarring detail: word arrangement on some pages seems artificial and distracts

Barbary, James. PURITAN AND CAVALIER: THE ENGLISH CIVIL WAR. Described on Social Studies Advisory List

Barrol, Grady. THE LITTLE BOOK OF ANAGRAMS. Harvey House, 1978. unp. \$3.49. Grades 5-6

Clever anagrams (a few are nonsensical) that might motivate young readers to try their own; possible springboard for a challenging, fun, enrichment activity; numerous black-and-white drawings liven up each page; some older students would enjoy this collection, but juvenile book cover is drawback

Bernstein, Theodore M., et al. DQS, DON'TS AND MAYBES OF ENGLISH USAGE. Quadrangle, 1977. 250 p. \$12.50. Grades 7-12

What a boon for all who prize correct English usage and Bernstein as their sage-an alphabetical listing of some 500 words selected from his syndicated column; a ready reference to discover that convince, not persuade, is the correct word, that the seniors are eager for graduation, not anxious (though some are also anxious about it), that a person's appearance is probably not really raunchy,

and many more; clarifies such problem areas as subject-verb agreement, adverb placement and usage, apostrophes, jargon, outdated lingo (quoting an editorial in THE CHAPEL HILL NEWSPAPER), clichés, and—the South will rise again!—the use of "y'all" as plural only; Bernstein does opt for some rule changes that make sense to him (but might pain purists) such as "it's me" (now commonly used even by educated people who reject "it's I" as "too prissy") and dropping the pronoun whom except in one instance (almost six pages are devoted to this discussion); Bernstein's humor abounds on every page, making enjoyable as well as informative reading; a must on every bookshelf, joining Bernstein's THE CAREFUL WRITER

Brewton, Sara and John E., and John Brewton Blackburn, sels. OF QUARKS, QUASARS, AND OTHER QUIRKS: QUIZZICAL POEMS FOR THE SUPERSONIC AGE. Crowell, 1977. 114 p. \$6.95. Grades 7-12

Poems benignly ridiculing modern society's scientific progress by Updike, Nash, Merriam, Ciardi, others, who spoof sonic booms, computers, television, and such products of the "Supersonic Age"; large, easily read print; cartoon drawings illustrate several selections; index of titles, authors, and first lines provides easy reference; for libraries interested in supplementing their collection of contemporary works

Brooks, Charles, ed. BEST EDITORIAL CARTOONS OF THE YEAR. 1977 edition. Described on Social Studies Advisory List

Bryan, Ashley, sel. I GREET THE DAWN: POEMS BY PAUL LAURENCE DUNBAR. Atheneum, 1978. 170 p. \$7.95. Grades 9-12

Captures with sensitivity the lyrical, openly sentamental poetry of Paul Laurence Dunbar, whose talents (beyond poems of dialect) include capturing universal emotions through standard English verse; useful introductory biography of Dunbar and index of titles and first lines of poems; organization of poems by theme emphasizes Dunbar's versatility in subject areas and occasional poems of dialect demonstrate his adroitness in style; large print, attractive sketches, and accessible style and theme should make book attractive to poetry lovers of any age

Diot, Alain. BETTER, BEST, BESTEST. Quist, 1977. unp. \$1.95 paper. Grades K-3

Unusual little paperback poetry book splashed with richly colored illustrations of the exaggerated boasts of 10 different children; each child outdoes the last in describing something his or her father owns that is bigger and more fantastic than anyone else's; Joel Naprstek's fanciful pictures show Donna's father's house so tall "the moon dances right on our roof" and Peter's father's long, red car complete with a TV set and a tennis court; should inspire student poetry and artwork; multiracial illustrations; tender conclusion puts everyone's boast in perspective

Doty, Roy. PINOCCHIO WAS NOSEY: GRANDSON OF PUNS, GAGS, QUIPS AND RIDDLES. Doubleday, 1977. unp. \$495. Grades 4-6

Strictly browsing material and "book bait" for displaying prominently to entice book-haters; new and different puns, gags, quips, and riddles in format similar to a comic book; illustrations fill and sometimes clutter pages; for older elementary school student, younger junior high groups; purchase only if like materials are not available (Robeson County)

Driz, Ovsei. Translated by Joachim Neugroschel. THE BOY AND THE TREE. Prentice, 1978. 31 p. \$6.95. Grades K-4

Charming poems, thoughtful and humorous, to capture imagination of young /children and perhaps challenge them to create their own beauty; wonderful watercolor illustrations--colorful, whimsical, delightful; poems translated from the Russian translation of the original Yiddish

Dugan, Michael, comp. STUFF AND NONSENSE. Collins+World, 1977. 79 p. \$5.95. Grades K-6

Collection of nonsense verse from Australian writers (including young children) that should delight young readers; titles and topics include "The Curly-Wigs," "Dumbly Humpty," "The Elephant's Trunk," "The Long-nosed Smelter"; amusing (line drawings of monster characters accompany each poem; useful read-aloud or independent reading

Edmonds, I. G. THE MYSTERIES OF TROY. Described on Social Studies Advisory List

Gardner, John. THE LIFE AND TIMES OF CHAUCER. Vintage, 1977. 328 p. \$3.95 paper. Grades 10-12

Highly readable history of life and times of Chaucer by an authority on medieval period; Gardner's excellent introduction and lengthy footnotes are bonuses; some fine tips on pronouncing Chaucer's Middle English also appended; writing is fluid, vivid, erudite, but not dry or strictly factual; Gardner's love for and knowledge of his subject and his ability to give long-ago events a sense of immediacy are compelling; drawbacks are cheap paperback binding, cheap quality of print and paper; for honors classes in English and for reference purposes generally

Goeller, Carl. WRITING TO COMMUNICATE. NAL, 1974. 142 p. \$1.50 paper. Grades 11-12

Extremely good, commonsense tips on writing letters, memos, reports; speeches;
lists do's and dont's and gives pertinent examples; directed to businessmen
and women but could serve as instructional text for teachers of writing; no

writing assignments suggested; practical, down to earth—the kind of informal, coach—to—team approach that might very well hook older working students turned off by textbooks; excellent optional school selection

Greenfield, Eloise. HONEY, I LOVE AND OTHER LOVE POEMS. Crowell, 1978. unp. \$4.79. Grades 2-5

A 1972 publication which delighted young readers with its 16 brief poems, vital and touching, on familiar childhood topics; 1978 edition is enhanced by Leo and Diane Dillon's soft, warm brown and black drawings, impressionistic and eloquent in themselves; variety of poems examining feelings continue to make book a useful stimulus for class and group discussions; good addition to any library; illustrations particularly relevant for blacks

Hall, Donald. REMEMBERING POETS: REMINISCENCES AND OPINIONS. Described on Biography Advisory List

Hall, Donald. RIDDLE RAT. Warne, 1977, unp. \$5.95. Grades K-3

Fun story for young children in rhythmical language and humorous riddles; as Riddle Rat seeks to make a niche for himself in family of 19 brothers and sisters, he finds that his riddles are not only funny but also value when one of his riddles saves them from disaster; Riddle Rat's a terative language makes good read-aloud material; humorous illustrations

- Helfman, Elizabeth. APPLES, APPLES, APPLES. Described on Social Studies Advisory List
- Hill, Helen, et al., sels. STRAIGHT ON TILL MORNING: POEMS OF THE IMAGINARY WORLD. Crowell, 1977. 150 p. \$8.95. Grades 6-12

Familiar and not so familiar selections, some from first-rate poets such as Carl Sandburg, Robert Frost, Langston Hughes, Emily Dickinson, Vachel Lindsay, Robert Graves, John Ciardi, all set in world of the imagination; wide variety of styles and subjects expresses imaginary thoughts about self and one's own world, other people, other worlds--something for everyone, according to taste and understanding; pencil drawings illustrate several poems, some in whimsical style as in "Knoxville, Tennessee" and "The Beast," some realistically as in "Green Candles" and "My Sister Jane"; brief biography of each author, three indexes--poets, titles, first lines

- Hopkins, Lee Bennett, sel. A-HAUNTING WE WILL GO: GHOSTLY STORIES AND POEMS. Whitman, 1977. 128 p. \$5.06. Grades 3-6
- Thirteen lighthearted stories divided into three categories, each group introduced by a poem; first group tells about contemporary ghosts who have modern problems and hangups (a ghost who can't moan will surely suffer rejection); the next stories relate eerie happenings possibly stemming from ordinary causes—Freddy's orchard ghost is really a fallow deer on holiday from the zoo; the last are familiar, old-fashioned ghost stories; attractive black—and—gray illustrations, humorous, some cartoon—like; delightful cover; fairly large print with generous margins
- Hopkins, Lee Bennett, sel. BEAT THE DRUM: INDEPENDENCE DAY HAS COME, Harcourt, 1977. 32 p. \$4.75. Grades K-4

Diversified collection of poetry about Independence Day that's easy, fun to read and share with small groups of students; includes poems by Carl Sandburg, Lois Lenski, Stephen Vincent Benét, Shel Silverstein; Tomie de Paola's eyecatching red, white, and blue illustrations are appropriately patriotic and shower like firecrackers and Roman candles over the verse

Hopkins, Lee Bennett, sel. MONSTERS, GHOULIES AND CREEPY CREATURES: FANTASTIC STORIES AND POEMS. Whitman, 1977. 128 p. \$5.44. Grades K-6

A cobbler's youngest son slays a dragon with laughter and a sword, a queen magically is turned into a rosebush, a kadurpnick decides to fill a deep canyon with foam rubber by selling plicktechny nuts; delightful stories with much child appeal; excellent pen-and-ink illustrations; zany phrases, catchy repetition will interest problem readers; poems can be adapted for choral readings

Hopkins, Lee Bennett, sel. TO LOOK AT ANY THING. Harcourt, 1978. 64 p. \$6.95. Grades 6-12

Exquisite black-and-white photographs by John Earl of wondrous shapes and forms in trees, driftwood, ice, and flowers that resemble people and animals, the spirit of each expressed in short poems by Robert Frost, Emily Dickinson, Langston Hughes, Carl Sandburg, Walt Whitman, others; truly a work of art to capture the imagination of children and adults who have ever seen a face in a cloud or a profile in a tree trunk; index of titles and authors

Hovey, Tamara. A MIND OF HER OWN: A LIFE OF THE WRITER GEORGE SAND. Described on Biography Advisory List

Howard, Philip. NEW WORLDS FOR OLD. Oxford U. Pr., 1977. 127 p. \$8.95. Grades 10-12

What's wrong with the way Americans use "hopefully"? How did "gay" lose its mirth? What is "charisma"? How about "camp," "ethnic," "scenario," "interface," "chauvinism," other "in" words used and abused by journalists, TV commentators, bureaucrats, Pentagon strategists, the movie industry, protest groups, and consequently everyday Britons and Americans? THE LONDON TIMES's eminent Philip Howard wittily surveys misused, vogue, and cliché words; will delight linguists, English teachers, and those who would save the language from fatal pollution; every high school library can benefit from a copy

Hughes, Ted. MOON-WHALES AND OTHER MOON POEMS. Viking, 1976. 86 p. \$7.95. Grades 9-12

Vivid, haunting moon poems that evoke a profusion of feelings—fear, adventure, longing—through their dreamlike imagery; metaphors are often in ancient Anglo-Saxon kenning form ("moon—oak," "moon—thirst," "moon—mirror," "moon—cloud"), with the moon symbolizing challenge and adventure much as the "whale—road" did for earlier sailors; Hughes's bleached moonscape and great dark infinity of space are beautifully caught in metaphor; excellent collection of short poems for students studying <a href="Beowulf">Beowulf</a>, to see how a modern poet expresses the same primitive pull of disturbing forces in a style echoing the ancient epic; for creative writing classes, <a href="English classes">English classes</a> generally

James, Elizabeth, and Carol Barkin. HOW TO KEEP A SECRET: WRITING AND TELKING IN CODE. Lothrop, 1978. 56 p. \$5.49. Grades 4-7

Comprehensive description of word codes, including pig Latin, Morse code, and many alphabet and number shift codes; language and concepts somewhat advanced for intended age group; some explanations are unclear (see pp. 36-37 Secret Coding Devices); excellent enrichment activity; red-and-black illustrations of both boys and girls; uses many examples

Jarrell, Randall. A BAT IS BORN: FROM THE BAT-POET. Doubleday, 1978. unp. \$6.90. Grades K-4

Randall Jarrell's short poem about the flight of a mother bat and her newborn infant, "naked and blind and pale," clinging to its mother's furry underside, is beautifully interpreted in close-up detail by artist, John Schoenherr; illustrations in bold black, deep blue, and white on double-page spreads convey a mysterious night quality as the two bats, drawn in accurate pen-and-ink detail, soar and swoop, find food and drink, "their single shadow printed on the moon or fluttering across the stars"; excellent to share with groups; large, dark print; fine supplement to science lessons, animal studies

Johnson, Eric W. OUR WORLD INTO WORDS. Bantam, 1977. 211 p. \$1.95 paper. Grades 8-12

Gallery of well-selected, black-and-white photographs for stimulating thinking and writing; concise, idea-packed contents on feelings, our mechanized society, sex equality, science fiction, other timely topics; individual and group writing activities outlined; good, probing questions suggest writing topics for each photo; photographs have strong, narrative quality; weak binding, but hardback cover would make cost prohibitive; a creative writing approach which integrates social studies, cultural arts, guidance, humanities in general

Keller, Charles, comp. LAUGHING: A HISTORICAL SELECTION OF AMERICAN HUMOR. Prentice, 1977. 299 p. \$8.95. Grades 6-12

Anthology of American humor ranging from Ben Franklin, Washington Irving, Mark Twain, and O. Henry to Marx Brothers, Abbott and Costello, Burns and Allen, Joseph Heller, and S. J. Perelman; students of Americana may be better able to get at the elusive quality of what is "American" by way of humor that is characteristically American; comparison necessary (with non-examples) in a study in literature of humor per se (ASU)

Kherdian, David. COUNTRY, CAT CITY, CAT. Four Winds, 1978. unp. \$5.95. Grades 1-3

Nice poems with two settings, one in the countryside, the other urban; fresh imagery features a cat and other animals doing pleasant, everyday things—a seagull floats over a barge "pulling a piece of the city out to sea," winter sparrows "ice-skate on the bird bath again"; lovely black—and—white woodcuts by Caldecott winner, Nonny Hogrogian; small format; for teacher—led, small—group reading and discussion

Kherdian, David, comp. THE DOG WRITES ON THE WINDOW WITH HIS NOSE AND OTHER POEMS. Four Winds, 1977. 31 p. \$5.95. Grades 2-5

Most attractive features of this diminutive book of poetry are the book's size and Nonny Hogrogian's beautiful watercolors; poems are succinct, enjoyable, many of them of haiku brevity and compressed imagery; many poems by Kherdian, some by well-known poets; consider for well-stocked primary collections; small, framed watercolors in soft-hued colors will enthrall children

Korty, Carol. SILLY SOUP: TEN ZANY PLAYS WITH SONGS AND IDEAS FOR MAKING THEM YOUR OWN. Scribners, 1977. 148 p. \$7.95. Grades 2-6

Collections of plays based on "noodlehead" tales embodied in numerous folk traditions; each play has zany characters working out wacky solutions to common problems; includes songs, valuable information about theater terms, creating comic characters, improvising, production notes on scenery, props, and costumes; excellent material for elementary language arts program, for children's own enjoyment, or for presentation to an audience; good bibliography included

Levine, Caroline Anne. KNOCKOUT KNOCK KNOCKS. Dutton, 1978. unp. \$6.95. Grades 2-5

Large-print, easy collection of knock-knock jokes suitable for young children; Giulio Maestro's droll black-and-white illustrations clarify meanings and are the big "plus" of the book; appealing to upper elementary children who would be motivated to read not only by the humor but also by the large pictures and few words

Lisca, Peter. JOHN STEINBECK: NATURE AND MYTH. Crowell, 1978. 245 p. \$7.89. Grades 10-12

A 25-page, encyclopedia-style summary of Steinbeck's life, followed by book-by-book discussion of Steinbeck's writing; critical commentary covers structure, voice, biological metaphors, the use of hermit figures, religion, literary allusions, advances and decline in craft, and handling of social commentary in fiction; good, easy-to-use reference book for students doing in-depth study of Steinbeck; not for afternoons on the back porch; selected bibliography; index

Lofts, Nora. DOMESTIC LIFE IN ENGLAND. Described on Social Studies Advisory List

Lyfick, Warren, comp. THE LITTLE BOOK OF LIMERICKS. Harvey House, 1978. unp. \$3.49. Grades 4-7

Collection of short limericks by Edward Lear, Lewis Carroll, Rudyard Kipling, others, in small format with appealing black-and-white drawings on every page; humor is too subtle for youngest children; limericks provide excellent tool for vocabulary development; many pictures of different animals, but people are all white

Maher, Romona. ALICE YAZZIE'S YEAR. Coward, 1977. unp. \$7.95. Grades 3-6

Collections of poems in month-to-month "diary" of Alice Yazzie, contemporary
Navajo girl--her trip to Disneyland, her pet coyote, the blending of Indian
and white cultures today; sepia drawings capture mood; useful also in social
studies

Mathews, Mitford M. AMERICAN WORDS. Collins+World, 1976. 266 p. \$6.95. Grades 6-12

Dictionary-like entries of 200 unusual words and phrases coined in America as the need arose to identify unfamiliar animals, new inventions, unusual circumstances, such as "boll weevil," "popcorn," "grandfather's clock," "Indian summer"; discussion of origin and development of languages can stimulate interest in history of languages and vocabulary building; index, author's note, and limited illustrations; clear print, attractive book; useful for teacher to motivate language interest and for independent student reference

Mead, Robert Douglas, sel. & ed. COLONIAL AMERICAN LITERATURE FROM WILDERNESS TO INDEPENDENCE: AN ANTHOLOGY. NAL, 1976. 216 p. \$1.95 paper. Grades 10-12

Writing selections covering two centuries from first English settlements to Declaration of Independence; begins with American Indian myths of the creation, ends with Jefferson's own account of writing Declaration of Independence; myths are from relatively recent collections; most material is from primary sources; contains work not generally found in texts; explanatory notes place pieces in historical context; excellent adjunct to American literature study

Moers, Ellen. LITERARY WOMEN. Doubleday, 1977. 496 p. \$3.95 paper. Grades 10-12 Described on September 1977 Reduction of Sex Bias Advisory List

All kinds of poems on sports themes, from boxing to jump rope; graceful, witty, catchy, every one of these 38 poems is delightful; outstanding black-and-white photos match the mood of fun and exhilaration; both girls and boys can relate to book; marvelous companion to poetry units, especially when encouraging student efforts

Morrison, Theodore, sel., trans., & ed. THE PORTABLE CHAUCER. Rev. ed. Viking, 1975. 61 p. \$4.50 paper. Grades 11-12

Introduction to Chaucer and his time, explanatory notes on translations, and THE CANTERBURY TALES and TROILUS AND CRESSIDA in their entirety, with some selections and shorter poems also included; presented in contemporary English, not Chaucerian

Morse, Grant W. CONCISE GUIDE TO LIBRARY RESEARCH. Described on Media Education Advisory List

Moynahan, Julian, sel. THE PORTABLE THOMAS HARDY. Penguin, 1977. 758 p. \$4.95 paper. Grade 12

Worthwhile reference source on Hardy which includes complete text of THE MAYOR OF CASTERBRIDGE, over 100 poems, a long and useful introduction, sound criticism, a chronology of Hardy's life, a selected bibliography, and works by Hardy representing several genres of literature; relatively small print but margins are even, selections well organized; best suited for advanced student doing independent research or teacher needing supplementary material on Hardy; no index, but table of contents provides complete listing of works by categories

Mulkerne, Donald J. D., and Gilbert Kahn. THE TERM PAPER: STEP BY STEP. Rev. ed. Anchor, 1977. 90 p. \$1.95 paper. Grades 10-12

Well-organized material on writing term papers, with steps clearly laid out and information in accessible list form; covers gamut from selecting topic; using library, preparing bibliography, taking notes, and outlining, to actual writing, footnoting, and typing; good checklist helps students assess paper; handy, compact, ready reference for students in the throes of term papers

Nicholls, Peter, ed. SCIENCE FICTION AT LARGE: A COLLECTION OF ESSAYS, BY VARIOUS HANDS, ABOUT THE INTERFACE BETWEEN SCIENCE FICTION AND REALITY. Harper, 1976. 224 p. \$8.95. Grades 10-12

Renowned writers analyze science fiction for devoted fans deep into it and well versed in the topic; first delivered as a series of lectures in London, the ll essays probe science fiction's role in literature, deficiencies of sci-ft as an art form (Ursula Le Guin: the need to "find more room in the spaceship for Mrs. Brown"--believable humankind), the link between science fiction and genuine science and between science fiction and pseudo-science; extremely, stimulating, fresh, original, scholarly; suitable reference source for advanced addicts of sci-fi and teachers of mini-courses or units on the genre

Anthology of poems by Americans about America, arranged thematically in six categories—Columbus, Indians, settlers, regions, history, idea of America—by poets of different times and ideologies; includes Robert Frost, Stephen Vincent Benét, Emily Dickinson, Emerson, Philip Freneau, Ferlinghetti, Adrienne Rich, John Perryman, Langston Hughes, Longfellow, others; reader's sense of chronology could have been strengthened if dates had accompanied author's name after each poem; includes author index (with birthdate) and index of first lines; introduction is brief and adds little to the well-chosen collection

Prelutsky, Jack. THE SNOPP ON THE SIDEWALK AND OTHER POEMS. Greenwillow, 1977. unp. \$5.21. Grades K-5

Nonsense rhymes about make-believe creatures—the "wozzit" in the closet, the "snopp" on the walk, the "lurpp" on the loose, the "frummick and frelly" who eat jingleberry jelly on their pinkadoodle pie; droll, toothy creatures with lumpy contures and goofy grins peer out from full-page drawings in gray, black, and white; primary and elementary children will love the expert rhyme and rhythm of these wacky verses

Prelutsky, Jack. THE QUEEN OF EENE. Greenwillow, 1978. 32 p. \$6.95. Grades 2-5 Collection of humorous and nonsensical verse for young readers, illustrated with detailed drawings; most describe zany characters like the Queen of Eene ("such a goose...brushed her teeth with onion juice"), Uncle Bungle, and Curious Clyde, and use plays on words, inverted word order, rhyme, and alliteration for their funny effect; some of the words will expand young children's vocabulary, but the simple rhyming patterns make the poems just fun to read aloud

Rosenbloom, Joseph. DOCTOR KNOCK-KNOCK'S OFFICIAL KNOCK-KNOCK DICTIONARY. Sterling, 1976. 128 p. \$3.99. Grades 2-6

Extensive collection of knock-knock jokes, alphabetically arranged; black-and-white line drawings; indexed by subject and hidden names

Saccio, Peter. SHAKESPEARE'S ENGLISH KINGS: HISTORY, CHRONICLE, AND DRAMA. Oxford U. Pr., 1977. 268 p. \$13.95. \$2.95 paper. Grades 10-12

Excellent historical background on Shakespeare's 10 dramas of English history in easy-reading text for general readers and play-goers; clarifies internecine intrigues of the Wars of the Roses and untangles the Tudor dynasty for modern readers; good explanation of ranks of the nobility and helpful genealogical and chronological charts; examines Shakespeare's deviations from his historical sources in dramatic interpretation of characters and events; important purchase for all high school libraries

Sanderlin, George. MARK TWAIN: AS OTHERS SAW HIM. Coward, 1978. 173 p. \$5.89. Grades 7-12

Easy-to-read biography/literary criticism of Mark Twain, distinguished by a large collection of comments in the last half of the book reflecting world-wide opinion of the writer; biographical information is strengthened by a lively, current quality stemming from use of many direct quotations; latter half of text is excerpts from Twain's books, stories, letters, and writer's notebook; published criticism of Twain concluding text is extensive, representing American literary critics, statesmen, Presidents, foreign critics, other literary figures, friends, foes, anonymous Americans; both bad and indifferent views of Twain are recorded, as well as praise; black-and-white photos; highly useful resource for American literature classes

Schiller, Andrew, and William A. Jenkins. IN OTHER WORDS: A JUNIOR THESAURUS.
Scott, 1977. 448 p. \$5.67. exercise book \$1.17. answer key \$1.38. Grades 4-7

An adapted thesaurus of over 300 words, plus more than 2,000 synonyms, related words, and antonyms, designed for middle grades; averages one word per page with illustrative sentences, synonyms, antonyms, definitions; specific use and connotation of each synonym explained; indexed; attractive format, much color, good graphics and photos; excellent introduction thoroughly explains purpose of thesaurus and related terminology; of limited value unless special exercise book is used with thesaurus (exercise book listed in catalogue was unavailable for examination)

Scholes, Robert, and Eric S. Rabkin. SCIENCE FICTION: HISTORY, SCIENCE, VISION. Oxford U. Pr., 1977. 258 p. \$12.95. \$2.95 paper. Grades 11-12

Traces in considerable detail the growth of science fiction as a form of literature, concentrating on historical beginnings, scientific foundations, and literary forms and themes; provides overview of science fiction movement as well as technical study of related scientific principles, in-depth critical treatment of major writers and novels, and adequate discussion of science fiction and the media; includes excellent annotated bibliographies grouped by subject areas; detailed index; best for advanced student for enrichment or reference; valuable for teacher as reference aid; binding is poor; print is small and crowded

Schulman, L. M., ed. AUTUMN LIGHT: ILLUMINATIONS OF AGE. Crowell, 1978. 200 p. \$8.95. Grades 10-12

Fine collection of 10 short stories by well-known writers exploring some aspect of age or growing old; Carson McCullers' "The Sojourner" is a lovely evocation of sadness and solitude in its account of a 38-year-old jetsetter who unexpectedly runs into his ex-wife and a resurgence of emotions linked to an earlier time; other stories by Capote, Hemingway ("A Clean, Well-Lighted Place"), Vonnegut, Nabokov, Rhys, Stafford, Calisher, and Angell are equally sensitive to fears and preoccupations of men and women narrowed down by life and time; excellent enrichment for literature classes studying the short story or examining themes of age, loneliness, helplessness

Grades 7-12 What's gained in attractive format and pictures is lost in very small print; nevertheless, a beautiful publication of Stevenson's classic tale of pirate fortune, fully illustrated with detailed drawings of 18th-century nautical instruments, firearms, fish and marine animals, flags, coins, maps, and charts; also illustrates the layout and cross section of the HISPANIOLA, gives roster of the crew, secret rules of Buccaneers, map of Treasure Island; nautical glossary concludes text
- Stewig, John Warren. SENDING MESSAGES. Houghton, 1978. 64 p. \$6.95. Grades 3-5 One- to three-sentence descriptions illustrated with full-page drawings or black-and-white photographs of the many ways people communicate; 28 examples include dance, mime, musical notes, sign language, hoboes' drawings, referees' gestures, airport ground crewmen's signals, specialized symbols used in architecture, mechanical drawing, and many languages; useful in a communication unit or writing center to expand children's concept of communication

  Unusual dance entry in black-and-white photos of ballet version of MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM; photos appear in story sequence; brief story line and quotations from play; pleasant introduction to Shakespeare; interesting as Shakespeare, as ballet, or as photography; probably best for teaching Shakespeare
- Thornley, Wilson R. SHORT STORY WRITING. Bantam, 1976. 179 p. \$1.25 paper. Grades 11-12

Written by a high school English teacher, this excellent step-by-step guide to writing a short story gives specific directions on reporting a scene, developing dramatic character, and handling the story's beginning, middle, and end; within these broad categories are covered point of view, use of dialogue, mood, theme, transition, other essentials; fully explained, and illustrated with numerous excerpts from published short stories, all of them apt and interesting; also includes three short stories analyzed by author, with text of each model printed in one column and author's running analysis printed in adjacent column; concludes with five additional stories for students to analyze according to author's guide; illustrations from all the best short story writers; outstanding handbook for strong writers doing independent study and for teacher use; as detailed and all-inclusive as any teacher could wish

Wilder, Thornton. THE ALCESTIAD, OR, A LIFE IN THE SUN: A PLAY IN THREE ACTS. WITH A SATYR PLAY, THE DRUNKEN SISTERS. Harper, 1977. 129 p. \$8.95. Grades 10-12

Dramatic interpretation of ancient legend of Alcestis, who says, "There is only one misery and that is ignorance"; Wilder shows her efforts to find purpose in life, to discover which of the three herdsmen is Apollo, to give her life willingly for her husband Admetus, and finally to understand and accept life; ends as did ancient Greek plays with a comic, bumbling Satyr play; outstanding dramatic interpretation; fine supplement to senior high mythology units; good example of the continuing life of the ancient legends; play adheres strictly to form of classical Greek drama, yet is simple, direct, and moving; themes concerned with life's meaning, the role of love, happiness, and death are as freshly stated, as simply examined, as they were in OUR TOWN (Alexander County)

Zinsser, William. ON WRITING WELL: AN INFORMAL GUIDE TO WRITING NONFICTION. Harper, 1976. 151 p. \$6.95. Grades 9-12

Excellent guide to writing nonfiction in practical advice, great good humor, delightful style; author obviously cares about craft, worries about the language; quotations from H. L. Mencken, Hunter Thompson, Joan Didion, LIFE, and equally varied others; well-chosen passages demonstrate specific advice; includes sections on writing about travel, science, sports; interesting and instructive

Adams, Anne H., et al. MAINSTREAMING LANGUAGE ARTS AND SOCIAL STUDIES: SPECIAL IDEAS AND ACTIVITIES FOR THE WHOLE CLASS. Goodyear, 1977. 107 p. \$9.50 paper.

Thirty-six weeks of material aimed at K-6 teachers and structured around lengthy series of concisely worded activities of the one-a-day variety; text equally divided between activities for language arts and those for social studies; although the word "mainstreaming" is often used to refer to exceptional children, the text provides activities for all student levels; ideas are quite broad and general, not broken down to teach concepts but rather to "cover" them; many suggestions depend almost solely on class discussion; compiled by North Carolina educators; illustrated

Fader, Daniel, et al. THE NEW HOOKED ON BOOKS. Rev. ed. Putnam, 1976. 321 p. \$8.95.

Updated version of Fader's inspiring and practical guide for teaching reading; includes new 1000-title, topical booklist for young readers and an expanded section on writing; describes hooked-on-books programs in other school settings

Furness, Edna L. SPELLING FOR THE MILLIONS. New and enl. ed. Nelson, 1977. 253 p. \$7.95.

Comprehensive study of spelling—what it is, why it's important, its psychological aspects, methodology, spelling demons, much more; carefully researched book and excellent tool for teachers, parents, better high school students; discusses sight, sound, and structuring methods of spelling; chapters on dictionary, phonemes and graphemes, structuring, and "demons" contain exercises which can be adapted or used as guides for teacher—made student activities; appendix contains answers to exercises, chapter notes, and additional "demons"; indexed; bibliography; glossary

Kaplan, Sandra Nina, et al. THE BIG BOOK OF WRITING GAMES AND ACTIVITIES: HANDS-ON MATERIAL READY TO USE IN THE CLASSROOM. Goodyear, 1975. 78 p. \$15.95 paper.

Collection of ready-to-use, punch-out games, task cards, and worksheets for teaching different writing skills: letters, reports, journals, technical writing, advertising; colorful, creative ideas on large, laminated cardboard, perforated for easy detachment, as well as black-and-white drawings and instructions on regular paper weight; useful in developing a writing center, individual activities, or tasks for small groups; especially valuable for the busy teacher who needs props for a writing center; oversized format

Kimzey, Ardis. TO DEFEND A FORM: THE ROMANCE OF ADMINISTRATION AND TEACHING IN A POETRY-IN-THE-SCHOOLS PROGRAM. Teachers & Writers, 1977. 211 p. \$4 paper.

Discusses North Carolina's Poetry-in-the-Schools Program of early 1970's in firsthand information on poets' experiences; both student poetry and professional poetry interspersed throughout; valuable section detailing the program's administration includes evaluation forms, requirements of poets, schedules, form letters; exhaustive bibliography lists books on teaching poetry and creative writing, other poetry-in-the-school programs, more; useful for K-12 teachers and schools interested in the idea; the recounting of Kimzey's own reactions to changes demanded in her personal life by her poet-in-residence status rambles a little tediously and irrelevantly, though the enthusiasm is unquestionable; although text would have profited by "pruning back," it does share shortcuts and pitfalls of the program with those interested

Nilsen, Alleen Pace, et al. SEXISM AND LANGUAGE. N.C.T.E., 1977. 203 p. \$5.95 paper.

A book devoted to "female and male stereotypes as they are codified in American English"; explores sexist language in concise, well-organized chapters on sexism in the language of literature, legislatures, courts, dictionaries, textbooks, children's books, and teaching materials; provides etymologies and histories of "male" and "female" words and demonstrates how language perpetuates sexual inequality for women and men; many, many specific examples strengthen the argument; includes bibliography and guidelines for nonsexist use of language; not shrill or chiding or badtempered, but rational and solid; all teachers should read this one

Shaughnessy, Mina P. ERRORS AND EXPECTATIONS: A GUIDE FOR THE TEACHER OF BASIC WRITING. Oxford U. Pr., 1977. 311 p. \$8.

Written initially for college instruction on basic writing, text offers insights and techniques applicable to secondary school instruction; explores causes of writing errors grouped by punctuation, syntax, spelling, vocabulary; suggests teaching sequences to overcome errors; sensitive guide to understanding students' weaknesses and helping them overcome composition problems; thought provoking; annotated bibliography; index

Swenson, William G. GREAT THEMES IN DRAMA: A PRACTICAL TEACHING GUIDE. Bantam, 1976. 89 p. \$1.25 paper.

Detailed outline for a mini-course or short, elective course on thematic or generic approaches to tragic and comedic drama; contains a course outline, notes on teaching drama, basic source materials, student activities, and notes on AGAMEMNON, GHOSTS, THE CRUCIBLE, FROGS, CYRANO DE BERGERAC; compact yet inclusive; excellent and inexpensive resource for senior high English teachers who are tracing Aristotelian influences on modern drama; good, clear examination of concepts of the tragic hero, tragic flaw, catharsis, dramatic irony, etc., as interpreted by Miller, Ibsen, Rostand

Thompson, Richard A. TREASURY OF TEACHING ACTIVITIES FOR ELEMENTARY LANGUAGE ARTS. Parker, 1975. 263 p. \$10.95.

First-purchase priority for language arts programs in elementary schools; an idea book for teachers which includes comprehensive language arts activities in over 300 skill-developing games, puzzles, riddles, etc., all concisely presented in easy-reference format; organized into major skill areas: spelling, oral communication, handwriting, composition, vocabulary, creative dramatics, reading, word attack, comprehension skills, and readiness; format of each activity enables easy access to information; illustrations provided when necessary; concise format is ideal for the busy teacher; most activities require minimum preparation time; excellent resource—should cut hours off teacher preparation time

Highly useful alphabetized reference to Shakespeare, his life, plays, memorable performances, famous Shakespearean actors and actresses, films, literary criticism, and more concise entries provide enough information for high school student without overwhelming him; over 150 black-and-white photos and drawings; ideal source book, easily carried--not a forbidding tome on the Bard

Gamble, Teri Kwal, and Michael Gamble. ORAL INTERPRETATION: THE MEETING OF SELF AND LITERATURE. NTC, 1976. 309 p. guide \$9.25 paper. Grades 10-12

Excellent anthology of short, well-chosen selections from world literature in supplementary text focusing on oral interpretation: yoice, gestures, ensemble interpretation, music--performing and "experiencing" the literature; many genres and formats represented in brief excerpts zeroing in on their sensory or descriptive quality, dramatic power, tone, persona, etc., always with the view of how students can best interpret them in recital and performance; excellent section entitled "Performing Literature for Children" is welcome addition to high school anthologies; strong emphasis on personal and group involvement; selections are first-rate: Twain, Shaw, Hemingway, Anouilh, Baldwin, Lincoln, Hawthorne, Shakespeare, Yevtushenko, cummings, many good moderns as well as the classical; outstanding photographs and drawings; well-bound paperback; teacher's guide is only mediocre, but text directions to students are excellent

Hopkins, Mary Frances, and Beverly Whitaker, comps. Edited by Bernard Brommel. CONTEMPORARY SPEECH: A COMPREHENSIVE APPROACH TO COMMUNICATION. NTC, 1976. 316 p. guide \$11. Grades 8-12

Relates speech to total communication process, isolating eight areas ranging from the individual as communicator to the mass media; overviews of each chapter, glossary; well organized and visually attractive; additional activities provided for enrichment; reading level is not difficult (perhaps superficial for advanced students), but some literary selections are difficult (e.g., Faulkner, Whitman, O'Neill); complete teacher's manual; text treats chapter on the media lightly and omits any discussion of linguistics, making level of use hard to pinpoint; no index; examine before purchase

Norman, Jack. STORIES TO TEACH AND DELIGHT. Described on Reading Advisory List

Reddick, DeWitt C. THE MASS MEDIA AND THE SCHOOL NEWSPAPER. Wadsworth, 1976. 440 p. guide \$12.95. Grades 9-12

Thorough, comprehensive manual for teaching students to use mass media and to produce school newspapers; covers history, headline writing, makeup, setting ad rates, typography, the school vs. a news community; practical and detailed; textbook format; teacher's guide includes aids, field trips, assignments

SPELLING. Rev. ed. Cambridge Bk., 1976. \$2.48 paper. answer key \$.98. Grades 9-12

Basic spelling text which deals with numerous errors made by poor spellers ("believe," "neighbors," "priest"); good chapters on forming plurals, homophones (complete list), abbreviations, possessives and contractions, capitals, list of spelling demons; diagnostic tests provided at beginning of some chapters, mastery tests at end of book; however, practice material in chapters needs supplementing from another source when used with remedial students, though not necessarily when used with average or above classes; format is difficult to use (rules are not sufficiently set off from exercises, causing some confusion); strong content

Very "upbeat" contents, replete with pictures, cartoons, collages, etc., designed to stimulate oral language; PEOPLE MIRRORS helps students explore individual identity (self-concept, friends, enemies, rivals, labels); TIMESCOPE explores time--past, present, future, memory, defying time, biological clocks, time travel; both books are components of a larger program designed to spur interest in language arts; nearly all visual appeal—little in the way of reading selections in the two books; teacher's guides offer instructional ideas; group participation stressed, with activities grouped under observing, discussing, listening, reading, imagining, representing (oral and written), special language study, and inquiry; no emphasis on formal rules of language usage, either oral or written; a great deal of teacher authority needed to provide structure to the program

Grizzard, Mabel Youree, and Annie L. McDonald. LANGUAGE EXERGISES SERIES. Steck, 1977, 1978. each \$1.74 paper. Grades 5-12

Good workbook series with plenty of exercises and clear, nontechnical instructions, easily followed; exercises in lower-level books cover such skills as abbreviation, capitalization, letter form, verb usage, forming plurals; higher-level books treat more formal grammar with usage exercises continued; PURPLE BOOK would insult older students (childish drawings and examples), but SILVER BOOK and others thereafter would serve well for reinforcement with those who for whatever reason never grasped basics of grammar but are not genuinely "remedial,"

Each volume develops a theme based on American culture through selected stories, poetry, book excerpts, plays, from Emerson and Benjamin Franklin to Nora Ephron and Joyce Carol Oates; more contemporary authors here than in many anthologies, but classical writers also represented; sections concluding each book comment on the works, give ideas to help student writers—e.g., sit in public lobby and write what you see, write a poem about some small thing unaccountably important to you; teacher's guide with vocabulary, discussion topics, activities, critical commentary; very good black—and—white photos, some by famous photographers (North Carolina native, Burk Uzzle); excellent presentation in selection, commentary, format, suggested activities

Motivates uninterested secondary students to improve skills of reading, comprehension, writing, vocabulary, through entertaining activities that incorporate classified ads, interview with S.W.A.T. police, sports statistics, science fiction, cartoons, word puzzles, other; activities concentrate on reading comprehension and creative and expository writing; attractive workbooks and graphics—e.g., text for story about a scarred hand appears within large outline of a hand, narrative about trip in California features a draw-the-route map of California with all spots visited identified on map; best used at teacher's discretion as supplemental sourcebooks for students with various interests and needs in reading

Text/workbook containing 39 lessons with numerous hints and tricks for reinforcing basic spelling rules; designed to help students headed for secretarial positions improve spelling quickly but useful for any student with spelling difficulties; units cover adding affixes, troublesome word endings, commonly misspelled words, and plurals, possessives, and contractions; supplemented with activities on distinguishing between homonyms and building vocabulary; contains frequent cumulative review exercises and final general review; appendices list 365 commonly misspelled words, correct spelling list of all words in book, occupational vocabulary lists (advertising, fashion, banking, real estate, etc.), list of states, capitals, and largest cities in U.S., and answers to exercises and reviews; occasional cartoon illustrations cleverly illustrate memory devices; useful for most students with spelling difficulties, especially those headed into office occupations

Levy, Wilbert J. PARAGRAPH POWER. AMSCO, 1977. 158 p. \$2.75 paper. Grades 7-12 Programmed workbook guiding students from simple three-sentence groupings to coherent, detailed, varied paragraphs; provides samples, ruled lines for students' own writing; perforated pages, notebook punched; routine, not particularly imaginative exercises but sequence of skills is logical, presents paragraph-developing methods; remedial tool for senior high English students who failed to master mechanics of paragraph development

Riese, Alan W., and Herbert J. LaSalle. ALL ABOUT THE DICTIONARY. Amsco, 1976. 98 p. \$2.15 paper. Grades 5-12

Numerous exercises to aid in developing dictionary skills, such as alphabetizing, using guide words, locating words without knowing correct spelling, dividing words into syllables, pronunciation, determining word use, finding meanings; alerts\*students to variations in dictionary formats; simple approach, clear instructions; most exercises practical for remedial use; designed for group use, but adaptable for individual work; provides pre-tests and post-tests as diagnostic and evaluative instruments

Roberts, Clyde. WORD ATTACK: A WAY TO BETTER READING. Rev. ed. Harcourt, 1978.

Hardback workbook designed to improve reading skills through vocabulary study; utilizes various methods to help students recognize and comprehend printed words—contextual clues, listening exercises toward learning vowel—consonant combinations, practice in syllabication and recognizing roots, prefixes, suffixes, using new words—one a day—in writing assignments; chapters state objectives and offer post—tests; one chapter reviews dictionary skills; teacher's guide (which must be requested specifically) contains step—by—step instructions for first nine days but no answer key; also suggests parallel reading/vocabulary activities; good print but few illustrations; a no-frills, strictly work—oriented approach for students serious about improving reading ability

Workbook providing extensive practice for students desiring to improve poor handwriting without constant teacher supervision; similarly formed letters grouped together (tall loop letters, letters with rounded backs, capital letters, etc.), numerous examples of proper formation given, along with considerable space for student duplication of individual letters, words, and sentences; correct letter size and formation encouraged through use of "imaginary lines" (light blue guidelines drawn on pages throughout book); directions explain what details students should note when forming letters; much more attention given to cursive writing, though printing is included

Trocki, Phillip K. SPELL IT OUT: READING/SPELLING WORKSHOP. Learning Trends, 1978.

CASEY AT THE BAT. 16mm., 7 min. sd. guide color \$135. AIMS x, 1976. Grades 4-9

Animated color drawings accompany reading of E. L. Thayer's "Casey at the Bat"; useful to promote poetry appreciation with reluctant readers and to teach some literary concepts—figurative language, narrative poetry; same concept might be taught with less expensive material; for comprehensive media collections seeking enrichment titles

COMMUNICATION ROADBLOCKS. 16mm. 15 min. sd. guide color \$220. BFA, 1977. Grades 9-12

Describes three major communication roadblocks through humorous vignettes depicting everyday dilemmas: 1) imprecisely defining our terms, 2) failing to recognize our biases, 3) failing to distinguish fact from opinion; film demonstrates how these problems affect human behavior and suggests some solutions good instructional material to help students detect and resolve such obstacles in their own language and writing; suggestions for follow-up discussion inside film case

COUP DE GRACE. 16mm. 19 min. sd. guide color \$295. Barr, 1978. Grades 11-12

Superb production value and excellent photography highlight this adaptation of Ambrose Bierce short story; authentic Civil War setting and costumes enhance story of search for missing soldier on battlefield littered with bodies; early part of film is rather theatrical, perhaps due to brilliance of the color photography; as the film progresses, the horror of the war dead seems more realistic; climax is both brutal and horrifying, depicting hogs eating a corpse, the shooting of a horse, the mercy killing of a wounded friend; although the film perhaps should have been shot in black and white, the acting is average and the first third drags a bit; undoubtedly it will be compared to the earlier French production of "An Occurrence at Owl Creek Bridge," which it doesn't quite live up to; still, an exceptionally powerful interpretation of a fascinating story useful in many subject areas

HER ONE TRUE LOVE. 16mm. 24 min. sd. guide color \$390. Learning Corp., 1977. Grade 12

Adapted from Maxim Gorkey's short story of two middle-aged, desperately lonely people who live in same boarding house, where their lives eventually cross; almost perfectly acted--the process of lonely, reserved personalities learning to reach out and interact by creating a fantasy mutually supportive of their fragile egos is beautifully portrayed; too sophisticated for some senior high students unless careful preparation precedes viewing; for advanced students (Wake County)

MARK TWAIN: WHEN I WAS A BOY. 16mm. 25 min. sd. guide color \$350. Natl. Geog., 1977. Grades 8-12

Dramatized episodes from autobiographical accounts of Mark, Twain's boyhood in colorful descriptions of boyish mischief and pleasure—slipping snakes into ladies' sewing baskets, selecting, icing, and cutting watermelon, encountering river rogues who inspired the Duke and the King; especially evocative scenes of river, steamboats, skill and quickness essential to a steamboat captain; the immortal Mr. Bixby well characterized as he trains

green young cub pilot, Twain; narration is readings of Twain's own words; voices of Twain and Huck Finn not so vigorous or animated as Hal Holbrook has spoiled us into expecting; wonderful color; excellent teacher's guide; greatest strength is film's capture of river's magic, graceful steamboats, rugged crews

THE MONKEY'S PAW. 16mm. 19 min. sd. guide color \$280. BFA, 1978. Grades 9-12

Dramatizes classic story of monkey's paw and tragic events befalling the family who invoke its mysterious powers; well-written adaptation, excellent acting; superb use of color, sound, camera establishes mood of mystery and foreboding; study guide provides challenging discussion on drama and film techniques; suggested activities encourage students to read other horror stories and to probe their psychological impact

PERSUADING THE PUBLIC. Described on Social Studies Advisory List.

RANSOM OF RED CHIEF. 16mm. 27 min. sd. guide color \$395. AIMS, 1978. Grades 4-9

Delightful film adaptation of O. Henry's famous tale of two bumbling con men who kidnap a small boy and end up paying the boy's father to take the kid off their hands; funny episodes, excellent acting, authentic 1920's sets and music; superior production in all respects; "Red Chief's" eyes glint with menace—all casting is good

THE RAVEN. 16mm. 11 min. sd. color \$160. Texture, 1976. Grades 7-12

Fine reading of Poe's classic against background of exquisitely rendered engravings especially executed for the poem by Gustave Doré; red, blue, and green washes fade and flare over engravings which dissolve into each other; vibrant, unusually clear reading and enunciation of each phrase of this immensely readable poem; haunting background music

THE UGLY LITTLE BOY. 16mm. 26 min. sd. guide color \$390. Learning Corp., 1977. Grades 7-12

Adaptation of the ever versatile Isaac Asimov's science fiction story about little Neanderthal boy recruited by time machine from 40,000 years ago so that dispassionate scientists can experiment on him; events climax when the "subject's" nurse, deliberately chosen for her record of efficiency and emotional detachment, responds humanly to the ape-boy's anxious dependence on her; authentic setting, superior acting; raises thought-provoking questions on scientific inquiry versus human sensibilities; for already complete film collections requiring enrichment titles

WORD WISE: ANTONYMS. 16mm. 12 min. sd. guide color \$175. BFA, 1977. Grades 2-5

Antonyms presented via animal talk during scenic safari in search of Mr. Updown; antonyms are superimposed on scenes of animals "talking" in antonyms; colorful, entertaining reinforcement for pupils who understand antonyms, but not all concepts are clearly defined (e.g., <u>dull</u> and <u>sharp</u> swords); antonyms include <u>push-pull</u>, <u>thin-fat</u>, <u>crooked-straight</u>, <u>first-last</u>,

coming-going, begin-end; concept might be too advanced for K-2 and plot too ludicrous for middle grades; review before purchase; less expensive material might be as effective; synopsis and follow-up activities in film case

WORD WISE: HOMOGRAPHS. 16mm. 11 min. sd. guide color \$170. BFA, 1977.

Humorous drama designed to teach that look-alike words derive their meaning from contextual use; Australian setting provides background for "homograph attack"--confusion resulting when people don't know that words spelled and pronounced the same can have different meanings; ludicrous situations depict semantic chaos--a lock of hair used for a door lock, bark of a tree mistaken for a dog's bark; suggested follow-up activities inside film case

WORD WISE: SYNONYMS. 16mm. 13 min. sd. guide color \$185. BFA, 1977. Grades 3-6

Useful reinforcement for pupils who understand synonyms in an adventurous approach to vocabulary; as Colonel Daring searches for Lord and Lady Synonym in European and Oriental countries, he uses synonyms for everyday words—

vanished/disappeared, walk/stroll, sure/positive, wait/remain, spinning/twirling; colorful scenes from foreign countries correlate nicely with social studies; review before purchase; less expensive material could be as effective; synopsis and follow-up activities in film case

Pierrot, dreaming that he is the first Earthling born on Mars, "tours" Earth from a flying saucer's vantage point and looks with longing eyes at oceans, cities, children at play; text in both French and English; grammar and vocabulary are fairly sophisticated, though story is for younger children;
