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ABSTRACT

This manual, a supplement to the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) kit "Education for Citizenship: a Bicentennial Survey" (ED 135 705), provides question-by-question results for the national sample of 13- and 17-year-old students tested. After presenting a brief summary of the background, the introduction describes the purpose of the citizenship assessment kit, which was to measure student achievement in citizenship and social studies. Chapter two reviews requirements for replicating the NAEP assessment model so that valid data comparisons can be made. The third chapter explains how to read the NAEP survey results, the exact meanings of the column headings in the tables, and the possible percentage of error. The final chapter suggests an approach for studying and analyzing assessment scores. The appendix consists of four question-by-question tables, showing the percent correct and standard errors for all 13-year-olds, all 17-year-olds, 13-year-olds in the eighth grade, and 17-year-olds in the eleventh grade. The students are further differentiated according to geographic region, sex, race (black or white), level of parental education, and size and type of community. This supplement contains no summary level results since they can be found in ED 135 705. (CK)

NATIONAL ASSESSMENT OF EDUCATIONAL PROGRESS

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CHAPTER I
INTRODUCTION

During the 1975-76 school year, the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) conducted an assessment in citizenship and social studies. This manual provides assessment results for a portion of that assessment and supplements the NAEP assessment kit -- Education For Citizenship: A Bicentennial Survey.

Results are provided in the Appendix for each question that appears in the bicentennial citizenship booklet. No summary level results are included. Readers who want to review summary level results for the four bicentennial citizenship themes (Political Attitudes, Political Education, Political Knowledge and Social Attitudes) should refer to Report No. 07-CS-01, Education For Citizenship: A Bicentennial Survey.

Districts and schools that conducted an assessment using the materials provided in the assessment kit can use this manual to compare the results of their students to a national sample of students assessed by NAEP. If no local assessment was conducted, the findings in this manual may still be of general interest to school administrators, testing and curriculum staffs, teachers and students.

A brief summary of the background and purpose for the development of the citizenship assessment kit is provided below:

National Assessment assessed student achievement in citizenship and social studies during the 1975-76 school year.

While several different assessment booklets were administered,

one booklet contained a number of questions dealing with constitutional rights, the structure and functions of governments, participation in democratic civic improvement and election procedures and attitudes. Because the booklet contained several questions that would be of special interest during the bicentennial and national election year, it became known as the "Bicentennial Citizenship Survey." While this booklet did not represent a full-scale citizenship assessment, it was felt that the types of questions included could be of special interest to anyone involved in citizenship education.

In late August 1976 NAEF's National Assessment announced a new service to districts and schools that participated in NAEF's 1975-76 assessment — a citizenship assessment kit which included the equal assessment booklet used by NAEF for the bicentennial citizenship survey; a cassette tape to use in administering the booklet; and, a user manual containing procedures for conducting a district-wide or school-level assessment. Each assessment kit also contained several Question and Answer brochures to assist school personnel in deciding if they should administer the citizenship survey. The assessment kits were made available to districts and schools upon request and were distributed in early October 1976.

The citizenship assessment kit concept is a pilot effort intended to assist districts and schools to better utilize NAEF.

materials for assessing student achievement levels and for making data comparisons. Because the National Assessment project does not administer a "test" in the traditional sense, use of NAEP's assessment materials (objectives and items) usually requires that the district or school reconstruct and custom-build its own test from a large collection of NAEP items. This process often demands a considerable amount of time and effort. If the assessment kit concept is successful in terms of utility to districts and schools, NAEP will consider developing similar assessment kits in other learning areas.

CHAPTER 2

A QUICK REVIEW BEFORE COMPARING YOUR ~~RESULTS~~ TO NAEP RESULTS

The User Manual in the assessment kit ~~describes~~ the requirements for replicating the NAEP assessment model so that valid data comparisons can be made. These procedures are very important to follow if comparisons of your students' performance levels are going to be made to the NAEP results shown in this manual. In particular, Chapter 11 in the User Manual ("Analyzing and Comparing Your Results to NAEP") should be reviewed very carefully prior to making any data comparisons. The highlights of Chapter 11 are summarized below:

- Each survey question stands alone and is reported separately. NAEP does not report the percentage of students who answered correctly, say, 50% or 75% or 90% of the questions, nor does NAEP report an overall correct score for the survey booklet.
- Students assessed by NAEP do not receive an individual score.
- For each survey question, the NAEP data answer the question, "What percentage of the nation's students know or can do this?"
- Whether you conduct an age-level assessment (all 13-and/or 17-year-olds regardless of grade) or a grade-level assessment (8th and/or 11th grade) you can compare your students' results to the NAEP results. However, keep in

mind that if you conduct a grade-level assessment you will need to tabulate your results for only those students who are 13- and/or 17-years-old before making comparisons to the NAEP 8th and/or 11th grade results.

- The percentage of students answering a question correctly (p-value) is determined by dividing the number of students responding correctly by the total number of students responding and then multiplying by 100.
- Theme results (cluster of questions) are reported by age-level only (all 13-year-olds and all 17-year-olds) and are contained in the NAEP Report No. 07-CS-01.
- In addition to reporting national results, NAEP also reports by several subgroups, i.e. geographic region, sex, race, level of parental education and size and type of community.
- Your p-values minus the NAEP p-values will give you the difference in performance levels between your students and the national sample.

CHAPTER 3

HOW TO READ THE NAEP SURVEY RESULTS

The NAEP results for the citizenship survey are presented in Tables 1 through 4 in the Appendix. Tables 1 and 2 show the results for each question for all 13-year-olds and all 17-year-olds respectively. If you conducted an age-level assessment you should refer to these tables. In addition to the national results, data also are shown by region of the country, sex, race, level of parental education and size and type of community.

Table 3 shows the results for each question for 13-year-olds in the 8th grade and Table 4 shows the results for 17-year-olds in the 11th grade. If you conducted a grade-level assessment and tabulated your results for 13- and/or 17-year-olds, you should refer to these tables, which show results for the nation, region of the country and sex.

When comparing your student results to the NAEP results, be sure to use the appropriate table. For each question, the percent of students responding correctly (p-values) are presented in the first row of data. The second row of data for each question are the NAEP standard errors (se) which are expressed as percentage points.

The legend below explains the column headings in the tables:

Question/Correct Response

The booklet question number is followed by the correct response choice. In those instances where a question has more than one correct or acceptable response, data are


provided for each response choice and for the total percent correct. Note that percents may not add to the total percent due to rounding error.

Nation

Includes all students in the NAEP national sample.

Region

Results are provided separately for four geographic regions: Southeast (SE), West (W), Central (C) and Northeast (NE). A listing of states by region is shown in the User Manual in Appendix E.



Sex

Results are presented separately for males and females.

Race

Currently, results are reported separately for blacks and whites.

Parental Education

The four parental education categories are defined by the highest level of education attained by either of a student's parents.

NHS -- No High School

SHS -- Some High School

GHS -- Graduated High School

PHS -- Post High School (college, adult education courses of any kind or vocational training).

Size and Type of Community

Community types are defined both by the size of the community and by the type of employment of the majority of people in the community.

LM -- Low Metro (Low-socioeconomic Disadvantaged Urban).

Areas in or around cities with a population greater than 200,000 where a high proportion of the residents are on welfare or are not regularly employed.

ER -- Extreme Rural. Areas with a population under 10,000 where most of the residents are farmers or farm workers.

SP -- Small Places. Communities with a population of less

MC -- Medium City. Cities with populations between
25,000 and 200,000.

MBC -- Main Big City. Communities within the city
limits of a city with a population over
200,000 and not included in the high or
low metro groups.

UF -- Urban Fringe. Communities within the metropolitan
area of a city with a population greater than
200,000, outside the city limits and not in the
high or low metro groups.

HM -- High Metro (High-socioeconomic Affluent Urban).
Areas in or around cities with a population greater
than 200,000 where a high proportion of the resi-
dents are in professional or managerial positions.

An Example

Survey question 1 is shown below. The steps which follow illustrate how to read the data tables.

1. Which one of the following is NOT a constitutional right of American citizens?
- The right to freedom of speech
 - The right to practice the religion of one's choice
 - The right to determine who can purchase and live in the house next door
 - The right to a fair trial when accused of a crime
 - I don't know.

- This question was administered by NAEP to both 13- and 17-year-olds and appears on page 4 of the survey booklets.
- Assume that you are interested in looking at the NAEP results for all 13-year-olds. These would be found in Table 1 in the Appendix: "Percent Correct and Standard Errors For All 13-Year-Olds."
- The table lists "Question 1" and the correct response choice which is, "The right to determine who can purchase and live in the house next door."
- The results for the nation show that 86.4% of all 13-year-olds

- Results are next shown for several subgroups. Looking under the Region columns, 13-year-olds in the central region (C) of the country scored the highest with 91.5% selecting the correct response. Thus, the central region scored slightly above the national level of 86.4%.
- The results by Sex show there was virtually no difference between 13-year-old males (86.5%) and females (86.4%).
- The results by Race show that 77.4% of the 13-year-old black students responded correctly and that 89.0% of the white students responded correctly.
- The Parental Education columns show that those 13-year-old students who had at least one parent that had some post high school education (PHS) scored the highest with 94.4%.
- Under the Size and Type of Community columns, those students from High Metro areas (HM) scored the highest (96.2%) and are about 10% above the national average of 86.4%.
- Directly under each row showing percent correct are the NAEP standard errors (se). National Assessment uses a national probability sample to estimate the percentage of students in a given group who could successfully complete a given question. Thus, when we say that "86.4% of the 13-year-olds gave a correct response to question 1," we mean that 86.4% is an estimate of

have answered correctly. As in any survey work, the percentage estimates are subject to sampling error because observations are made only on a sample, not on the entire population.

The particular sample used in the citizenship survey is one of a large number of all possible samples of the same size that could have been selected using the same sample design. Percentages obtained from each of the possible samples would differ from each other, and the standard error of these percentages, if it were known, would provide a measure of the sampling variability among all possible samples. In this manual, standard errors (se) are estimated for each question and are shown directly under each percent correct figure.

The standard error of a sample statistic can be used to construct a confidence interval for the estimated percentage. For example, the standard error (se) for the nation for question 1 is 1.1 percent. The interval from one standard error below to one standard error above the sample percent correct value would include the average of all possible sample values in about 68% of the samples. An interval computed in this manner is called a 68%-confidence interval to indicate how confident we are that the interval contains the average overall possible sample values. Thus, for question 1, we are 68% confident that the interval of 86.4% plus and minus the standard error of 1.1% contains the average overall possible sample values, e.g. 86.4%

- If a higher level of confidence is desired, the NAEP results can be viewed in terms of two standard errors which will raise the confidence level from 68% to 95%. Using the same example as above, the interval from two standard errors below to two standard errors above the sample percent correct value would include the average of all possible sample values in about 95% of the samples. An interval computed in this manner is called a 95%-confidence interval. Thus, we are 95% confident that the interval of 86.4% plus and minus two standard errors contains the average overall possible sample values, e.g. $86.4\% \pm 2.2\%$ or, 84.2% to 88.6%.

CHAPTER 4

WHAT DO THE FINDINGS SHOW?

Perhaps the most important task of any assessment effort is to draw conclusions from the survey results that have implications for school administrators, curriculum specialists and classroom instructors.

The basic question of "What do the findings show?" is not an easy question to answer.

The suggested approach shown below may be helpful as you study your results and NAEP's results.

First, examine your results question-by-question.

- How well did your students do?
- Did they perform above or below your expectations?
- If they performed below your expectations, was it because the survey question was measuring some aspect of citizenship education that is not being taught?
- Is student performance low enough to cause concern?
- On those questions where student performance was higher than your expectations, can you pinpoint the reasons?
- On how many questions did the students perform above your expectations? Below your expectations?
- How would the results be viewed by school administrators? By curriculum specialists? By classroom teachers? By students? By parents? By the school board?
- Overall, are you satisfied with the results?

Second, search for patterns by plotting your expectancy scores and the actual student results for each survey question on a graph.

- View the graph looking for "extreme" student scores -- both highs and lows. Do they seem to cluster around certain types of questions?
- View the graph looking for major gaps between your expectancy scores and actual student scores. Do the major gaps tend to cluster around certain types of questions? Are the gaps large enough to cause concern? What might be some reasons for the major gaps?

Third, compare your expectancy scores and your students' actual scores with the NAEP results. (You may want to plot the NAEP results also on your graph).

- How well did your students do in comparison to other students in the nation? On how many questions did they score higher? Lower?
- If your students scored above the national results, do you feel they should have scored higher than they actually did? For what reasons?
- Did your males and females generally score the same as the national sample? For example, if the NAEP results show males and females scoring at the same level, why did your females outperform your males or vice-versa?
- Are you satisfied with your results in relation to how other groups of students scored in the nation?

Fourth, if you tabulated your results separately by building, classroom, sex, race, etc. view the results in terms of "score patterns."

- Did you expect school A to score higher than school B? If so, for what reasons? How much spread did you expect to see?
- Why might there be such large differences between your male and female scores? They may have scored in the same rank order as the NAEP data (boys higher than girls) but the spread in your scores is 20% while the NAEP results only show a spread of 3%.

The list of questions could and should be continued. In many respects, studying and analyzing assessment scores requires a bit of detective work. Look for clues or bits of evidence that will help to substantiate and explain the results. Low scores are not necessarily a reflection on staff or students -- they may result from assessing students on materials that are not included in a school's program. Likewise, high scores do not necessarily reflect a high quality program if the students have been exposed to the materials outside the school rather than through classroom instruction.

Do your results suggest any imbalance in what is being taught? Are some areas of citizenship being overstressed while other areas are not covered at all? Should any changes or redirection of emphasis be instituted?

The purpose of most assessment programs is to get a reading on what students know and can do. Some assessors have described the assessment process as a giant snapshot of what our youth know at a particular point in time. Very rarely do assessment results show directly any cause and effect relationships as to why students scored as they did. Very often, however, assessment results do isolate and identify problem areas that deserve further investigation. Further, assessment results can often be used to describe the severity of any existing problem.

In conclusion keep in mind that the bicentennial citizenship

citizenship. Your booklet only contains some 30 questions and was not intended to be a full-scale citizenship assessment. However, we hope it enabled you to obtain a truer picture of your students' performance in relation to your expectations and to the performance levels of other students across the nation.
