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ABSTRACT

This bibliography contains publications which provide information that will help meet the needs of special individuals with unique characteristics. The bibliography is divided into thirteen sections. Each section is identified by specific population and contains a listing of both generic resources and those specific to each individual special population. Special populations included are (1) American Indians, (2) Asian Americans, (3) bilinguals and those with limited English proficiency, (4) black Americans, (5) disadvantaged, (6) exceptional children, (7) gifted and talented, (8) handicapped, (9) Hispanics, (10) the incarcerated, (11) migrants, (12) older Americans, and (13) single parents. 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INTRODUCTION
