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ABSTRACT

This partially annotated bibliography lists 391 bibliographies, resource lists, and literature reviews on women. The entries, published in the late 1960s and throughout the 1970s, are classified alphabetically by author into 30 categories including a general category, anthropology and sociology, art and music, child care, criminal justice, economics, education, history, law, lesbians, marriage and the family, minority and ethnic women, philosophy, politics, professors, rape, religion, sex roles and sex differences, women and development, and the women's movement. The majority of entries were developed by noncommercial sources: fewer than 50 items are the products of commercial publishers. An author index, title index, and addresses of publishers are included. ## How to Use This Book

There should be little problem in finding the desired entries. Author and title indexes have been provided for users looking up a known source; others will be guided by subject arrangement and cross-references. The following points should clear up any confusions.

- Citations follow standard form in most cases. For brevity, if a work has a corporate author/publisher, the organization name is listed only once—as author—and the publisher statement is omitted. Thus, in these cases, the date follows directly after the place. For example:

Business and Professional Women's Foundation. *Sex Role Concepts*. Washington, 1973.

- Place statements have also been kept brief; only the city is listed (not the state), since publishers' full addresses are given at the end of the book.

- Earlier editions of a bibliography or works on which the compilation is based are given at the end of the annotation in parentheses.

- Prices were not included because they change too frequently, so readers are advised to check the price before ordering. A stamped, self-addressed envelope will speed the reply.

- For ERIC publications, order numbers are included in parentheses at the end of each entry, and should be used for prompt service.

- The order addresses for publishers are listed in a separate section at the end of this publication. If there is no publisher included in the citation, the address will be listed under the name of the author.

# Introduction

*New Feminist Scholarship* began in 1974 as an independent study project while I was a library school student. Although none of the standard works and sources I was learning about were able to provide much information about women, I knew from my experience in the women's movement and from women's studies courses that there were such materials available. Yet I found not even a suggestion that a large "underground" of bibliography in women's studies existed. I felt it was important to compile all these valuable but obscure sources in order to give support to the growing array of research and researchers in women's studies, as well as to alert the established library world to the existence of this work.

## THE GROWTH OF WOMEN'S STUDIES

During the past five years, women's studies has developed tremendously in size and sophistication. Many statistics can be cited to gauge growth in size. Women's studies programs have increased from 112 in 1974 to 301 in 1979.<sup>1</sup> While there were two academic journals devoted to women in 1974, now there are at least five major quarterlies.<sup>2</sup> Research and publications are impossible to count, but the size of this biblio-bibliography provides at least a representative measure—the more bibliographies there are, the more publications there must be. In 1974, *New Feminist Scholarship* included 73 bibliographies, it now includes 391. If one assumes that each bibliography represents an average number of one hundred books, the extent of the growth begins to emerge.

Sophistication is more difficult to document, but here, too, we have some signposts with which to measure the gains. We have seen increased autonomy and legitimacy of women's studies programs, partly through the granting of degrees. There are now 106 institutions where one may pursue a degree in women's studies (80 offer the B.A.; 21 the M.A.; and 5 the Ph.D. or equivalent).<sup>3</sup> The formation of formal associations is another measure of maturity. In addition to many local and state affiliations, there are now two national organizations of prime importance: the National Women's Studies

Association founded in 1977 and the Women's Information Services Network founded in 1975.<sup>4</sup> Finally, for what it's worth, women's educational concerns also have received the stamp of approval from the federal government. The Women's Educational Equity Act appropriated \$30 million over three years for grants to projects and activities nationwide, a large portion of which was earmarked for the establishment of a national communications network.<sup>5</sup>

As women's studies in all its facets has grown and matured, it has received more attention and acceptance from the "establishment": colleges and universities, publishers, scholars, reviewers. But this is where the real work remains to be done. Integration into the mainstream is not easy on any front, because it is at this point that the dominant group must change. Curriculums, reviewing principles, research priorities, editorial direction must all be overhauled to incorporate feminist ideas.

Bibliographies in women's studies parallel the general trends in the field. There are more bibliographies now than there were in 1974 and, on the whole, they are better. But the majority of bibliographies compiled here still come from informal and noncommercial sources. Less than 50 of the 391 total are the products of commercial publishers. Albert Krichmar's *The Women's Rights Movement in the U.S.* (#346)<sup>\*</sup> was one of the first commercially produced bibliographies; it was published by Scarecrow Press in 1972. Recently, both G.K. Hall and Garland have begun to produce a number of fine bibliographies on women. But changing the library and publishing establishment is a slow process. The current sources of resource tools—individual researchers, women's studies programs, women's organizations and associations, and noncommercial presses—will continue to be the major sources for some time.

#### SURVEY: BIBLIOGRAPHIES OF BIBLIOGRAPHIES

The first attempt to list available bibliographies on women was made by KNOW press in June of 1971. The *List of Bibliographies on Women and Feminism* (#005) was a free, four-page annotated listing

of forty-three bibliographies in the following areas: General, Legal and Economic Problems, Employment, Education, Miscellaneous, and Feminist Movement. Ten of the bibliographies from that list have survived and are included in this publication. Most of the remaining entries were mimeographed, stapled sheets available from their compilers—teachers, for the most part, who have long since left the address provided, not to mention run out of copies.

The next efforts were made in 1973—a busy year for bibliographers. The Women's History Research Center published its *Bibliographies on Women Indexed by Topic* (#006) in May of that year. It ran to eight pages and had 188 entries arranged into eighteen topical areas. Approximately thirty of the entries from that compilation will be found here in their original or updated form. Though there were more of them, the bibliographies in this listing were similar in scope and size to the ones in the KNOW list.

The second bibliography of bibliographies produced in 1973 came from Canada. Compiled by Margrit Eichler, *An Annotated Selected Bibliography of Bibliographies on Women* (#002) was published by the Association of Universities and Colleges in Ottawa. It was seventeen pages long and listed more than forty bibliographies. In 1976, Eichler produced a second, revised edition of this compilation (#003), published by KNOW. It was expanded to ninety entries and included all major recent bibliographies. She included only those bibliographies which were readily accessible (i.e., not unpublished, mimeographed lists) and of an acceptable size (fifteen pages or more). Where there were two or more bibliographies on one subject, the more comprehensive one was chosen.

The last bibliography of bibliographies that appeared in 1973 was a masters thesis done by Marsha Koelliker at the School of Library Science, Kent State University (#004). Koelliker gathered together 272 citations to "bibliographies on women published since January 1967 and before December 1972, either separately or within other publications." Of the total, only thirty-three were published separately, the other 259 were published as parts of monographs, anthologies, or journal articles, with articles counting for fifty-five percent.

Finally, the Winter 1977 issue of *Signs* included a review essay on the bibliography of women's studies by Pat Ballou (#001). Ballou discusses approximately sixty bibliographies in the essay section and lists an additional sixty-two. This compilation is the most comprehen-

sive of the bibliographies in this survey and the most interesting to use because of the essay format. Indeed, her article makes fascinating reading for bibliographers of women's studies, as well as feminist scholars, students, editors, and publishers. It is highly recommended.

Pat Ballou makes the following observation in her opening paragraphs: "These bibliographic tools have reflected the materials they listed. As the writings themselves have changed from predominantly action-oriented movement literature to more disciplined academic research, the bibliographies have developed correspondingly from the valiant but often hastily executed products of enthusiastic volunteers to more skillfully edited works." Clearly, the same reflection is true of the bibliography of bibliographies. It would be extremely difficult to produce a solid, scholarly guide to bibliographic sources if there were no solid, scholarly bibliographies to list. The one always reflects the other. And so the biblio-bibliography has grown from the mimeographed, stapled give-away of 1973 to the major review essay in a scholarly journal of 1977 to the publication of *New Feminist Scholarship* in 1979.

## SCOPE

*New Feminist Scholarship* includes 391 bibliographies, resource lists, and literature reviews on women that were published separately or that appeared as periodical articles. It does not pretend to be comprehensive. Indeed, bibliographers of women's studies wrote as early as 1973 that "there is no possibility of compiling a complete list of bibliographies written about women."<sup>6</sup> On the other hand, this is not a selective list; that is, I did not attempt to choose the best or biggest in each field. Rather, I listed as many bibliographies as I could find, within certain limits.

Only materials published in English are included—though that does not mean only those of U.S. origin. Out of print sources are listed and are so indicated. They are included for two reasons: one is that they are available in many libraries and remain useful; second is that I wanted this compilation to show the scope and quantity of bibliographic work done in women's studies, to provide an historical perspective.

I have not included general, brief reading lists of basic feminist

works, usually give-aways, which have been produced in great numbers by public libraries, women's organizations, local NOW chapters, etc. Their scope is too narrow—they list the same books again and again—and their number is legion. Neither have I included the many excellent lists of nonsexist books for children and young adults. For one thing, I consider them to be outside the scope of this more research-oriented compilation; and again, they are too numerous and frequently too ephemeral to make the compiling worth the effort.

Another category excluded from this compilation is the literary bibliography of individual women writers. While this type of compilation would have fit the general scope requirements, including them would have swelled the literature section beyond proportion. The fact is, there are enough such publications that they deserve a source guide of their own. Finally, I have not included bibliographies that appeared as part of monographs or anthologies.

#### ARRANGEMENT AND ANNOTATIONS

The citations have been arranged by subject into thirty sections. I have made the headings as straightforward as possible, so that overall, there should be little difficulty in finding the needed items. As I worked, I let the material guide me, creating new sections as they were needed, using five entries as the cut-off point. Each section begins with an explanatory headnote defining the subject and its scope.

There were, of course, a number of problems in categorizing by subject. An overall concern was how to classify the many bibliographies published in Canada. Margrit Eichler's fascinating article on the interplay between feminist research in Canada and feminist research in the United States (#069) convinced me to disperse them throughout according to their subjects, making this a bibliography of U.S. and Canadian bibliographies.

Then there were some individual problems. The only volume on prostitution, for example, seemed to fit nowhere. Ultimately, I put it in with the other professions, rather than in the more usual criminal justice section, as an expression of feminist sentiment on the "criminal" nature of the endeavor. The one bibliography on sports did not seem to warrant its own category; however, since it's an important issue for women, I included it in the health section.

Of the total 391 entries, 215 are annotated, or fifty-two percent. My original intention was to annotate every entry. As I worked, I had to modify my plans. This was due partly to time and partly to availability. In order to speed things, I made yet another decision in that seemingly endless chain of arbitrary choices the bibliographer is faced with: I decided to stop annotating periodical articles. This also was necessary because I continually had problems locating the particular titles or issues. I preferred to concentrate my energies in locating the more substantial, separately-published compilations.

### METHODOLOGY

I did not use a conventional methodology for this project because I felt it would not do the field proper justice. The subject under inspection is large and diverse; it does not readily lend itself to methodical searching of indexes, reference guides, abstracts, and so forth. Because most of the bibliographies in women's studies are not produced by mainstream publishers, they are not picked up by standard reference sources and not cataloged by libraries. They have something of a "fugitive" quality about them. They have to be searched for—and hard—but not in the traditional ways.

Nevertheless, there are several sources I have searched thoroughly: *Women Studies Abstracts*, *The Bibliographic Index*, and Besterman's *World Bibliography of Bibliographies*. The undeniably best source of bibliographies in women's studies, however, is other bibliographies; therefore, I have relied chiefly on my sister bibliographers. Once started on this project, I could have continued forever just following up on the leads from each new source as I found it. This is what makes a project such as this one so interesting. Instead of spending hours tediously copying citations from indexes (though there is some of that), one's time is spent searching library catalogs and special collections, writing endless letters for review copies and citation checks, making phone calls, tracking down details, and always poring over new bibliographies.

Finally, there was the problem of when to quit. A deadline from the publisher obviously gives one a bottom line, but the compiling has to stop early enough to allow for writing the introduction, preparing the index, typing the manuscript, etc. The matter of the missed or

unannotated citation must ultimately be accepted as part of the bibliographer's trauma. As Paula Backscheider noted in her introduction to a bibliography of literary criticism (#192): "We know, however, that for every item we found in *The Bath Weekly Chronicle* or the *Wales Western Mail*, we may have overlooked another in *PMLA*. Such is the bibliographer's nightmare." Nightmare indeed. I accept the spectre of incompleteness and would appreciate hearing of those omissions detected by others as well as of new bibliographies as they appear. J.W.

## General

With sixty-two entries, the General section is the largest and most diverse one. Bibliographies listed here include sources on a wide range of topics. Some of them are research oriented, others are intended for the activist. They include out-of-print compilations from the early part of the century, major efforts on microfilm, and selected lists of as few as four pages. There are bibliographies of periodicals, periodical articles, and government documents as well as of books. There were enough general bibliographies based on the collections of college or university libraries to warrant a separate listing. Compiled by a librarian, faculty member, or student, this type of bibliography is intended first to be a research aid for the local population. Ultimately, however, it is also of interest to those outside the home campus. It can serve as a model for other bibliographers interested in preparing such aids for their own students; it may also be of use to the researcher as well as to acquisitions and interlibrary loan librarians at other campuses.

011. Cardinale, Susan. *Special Issues of Serials about Women, 1965-1975*. Monticello: Council of Planning Librarians, 1976. 41 pp. This bibliography provides a much needed reference to the myriad special issues of periodicals that have been published about women. Issues containing a special section of two or more articles are included, as are those devoted to topics "intimately linked with women's roles," such as rape or abortion. However, issues devoted to topics which were considered to be of equal concern to men and women, such as child care or divorce, are not included. There will undoubtedly be some disagreement with the editor's judgment on whether a topic concerns women exclusively or not, but in any case, the coverage is broad with more than three hundred issues included. The citations are arranged alphabetically by journal title, and most of them are annotated.
012. Cisler, Lucinda. *Women: A Bibliography*. 6th ed. New York, 1970. 36pp. This partially-annotated bibliography is one of the first women's bibliographies to appear and has been the personal project of Lucinda Cisler through six editions. It is classified into fourteen subject sections, including: Historical Studies; the Law and Politics; Economics, Work and Child Care; Reproduction and Its Control; Women and Socialism. A periodical list is also included. Notations indicate editions in paperback and those worthy of special attention. Much historical material is listed and much that is new.
013. Daniels, Arlene Kaplan. *A Survey of Research Concerns on Women's Issues*. Washington: Association of American Colleges, Project on the Status and Education of Women, 1975. 43pp. Out of print. A comprehensive review of central areas of research relating to women.
014. Davis, Lenwood G. *The Woman in American Society: A Selected Bibliography*. 2d ed. Monticello: Council of Planning Librarians, 1975. 99pp. The second edition of Davis's bibliography appeared only one year after the first. The introduction has



remained virtually unchanged though the compilation has tripled in size. The sections which carry over, General Reference Works, Biography and Autobiography, Books and Periodicals, each are longer by from about fifteen (General Reference) to sixty (Biography and Autobiography) percent. There are four new sections: Selected Women's Organizations, Women College Presidents, Women's Bureau Publications from 1918 to 1971, and Government Documents. None of these additions is explained in the introduction, in fact, the only change mentioned there is the subdivision of the Biography and Autobiography section by race to make locating books on black women easier. The lack of a subject index will cause some problems in using certain sections. (Original edition: Davis, Lenwood G. *The Woman in American Society: A Selected Bibliography*. Monticello: Council of Planning Librarians, 1974. 33pp.)

- 015 Ehrlich, Carol. *The Conditions of Feminist Research*. Baltimore: Research Group One, 1976. 20pp. This pamphlet reviews and attempts to define what "feminist" research is and should be. It does not include a comprehensive review of the literature, but discusses twenty articles the author feels are important or representative.
- 016 ———. "Woman Book Industry." *American Journal of Sociology* 78:1030-1044, January, 1973. Carol Ehrlich reviews seventeen books in the women's studies area published in 1971 and 1972.
- 017 Galloway, Sue. "Women." *Wilson Library Bulletin* 47:150-152. October 1972. A highly selective and annotated list of the publications of the women's movement. The selection represents a good cross-section of the best of the different kinds of publications available. Several sources for comprehensive lists of the periodicals are indicated. The annotations are evaluative.
- 018 Haber, Barbara. *Women in America: A Guide to Books, 1963-1975*. Boston: G.K. Hall, 1978. Haber's *Guide* is an important new addition to the literature. Taking 1963, the publication date of *The Feminist Mystique* as her starting point, she annotates nearly five hundred volumes of current feminist writing up to

1975. In each of the eighteen subject sections, the first several books are annotated at length, followed by a longer list of briefly annotated selections. Each section also has a short introduction. The compilation can stand alone as a core collection for a women's studies library, and it should prove useful to a wide range of users.

- 019 Halligan, John T. *Women: A Bibliography of Periodical Articles*. Sacramento, 1973. 17pp. Out of print. Halligan's bibliography is a list of more than three hundred articles on women from approximately seventy periodicals published between January 1, and December 31, 1972. The periodicals indexed cover a wide spectrum, but are primarily general literature. The bibliography is in nine subject sections.
- 020 Harrison, Cynthia Ellen. *Women's Movement Media: A Source Guide*. New York: R. R. Bowker, 1975. 269pp. This is not just a bibliography, but a guide to sources of information of various sorts. It includes approximately 550 descriptions of organizations arranged by function, type, or main interest of group, and what materials they supply. There are five categories: material producers, material collectors, service organizations, government agencies, special interest groups. There are geographic, title, group name, and subject indexes.
- 021 Hughes, Marija Matich. *The Sexual Barrier: Legal, Medical, Economic and Social Aspects of Sex Discrimination*. Washington: Hughes Press, 1977. 843pp. Marija Hughes has stopped publishing supplements to her original (1970) bibliography and has given us instead this mammoth one-volume compilation of more than eight thousand citations. It covers the literature in English from 1960 to 1975 in seventeen broad subject sections, from aging to economic status to legal status to sex roles. Even though each of these chapters is sub- and sub-subdivided topically, the sheer size of the compilation makes the lack of a subject index problematic. Nevertheless, *The Sexual Barrier* is certain to become a standard source in many libraries. (Original edition: Hughes, Marija Matich. *The Sexual Barrier: Legal and Economic Aspects of Employment*. San Francisco, 1970. 35pp. Supplements, 1971 and 1972.)

- 022 Joyce, Lynda. *Annotated Bibliography of Women in Rural America; with a Review of the Literature about Women in Rural America, Bibliography of Women in Rural Areas Worldwide, and Resource Material*. University Park, Pennsylvania State University, Agricultural Experiment Station, Department of Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology, 1976. 62pp. This volume has several components. It begins with a review essay which discusses the literature in the annotated bibliography and presents the pertinent statistical information on the status of the rural woman. The annotated bibliography is a comprehensive compilation of works published on the American rural woman in the twentieth century; it is a straight alphabetical list by author. The same citations are rearranged (minus annotations) by chronology in another section to show trends over time. Then follows a bibliography on rural women outside the United States; it is not comprehensive. The "Bibliographic Addendum" lists works which Joyce was unable to locate and therefore could not annotate, as well as those which are on related issues such as farm life in general or nonrural women. There are two final sections: one of bibliographies, the other of relevant periodicals, historical and current. For the purposes of this project, rural was defined as all open country and places with populations of less than 2,500. Thus, it includes both farm and small town residents. Joyce's bibliography provides invaluable reference for those researching what is essentially a vanishing species: the rural woman.
- 023 King, Judith D. *Women's Studies Sourcebook: A Comprehensive, Classified Bibliography of Books*. Allendale: Grand Valley State Colleges Library, 1976. 68pp. This large format pamphlet includes nearly thirty-one thousand citations. It is divided into fifty-one subject sections. There is an author/title index.

- 027 Mazur, Carol and Sheila Pepper. *Women in Canada 1965 to 1975: A Bibliography*. 2d ed. Hamilton: McMaster University Library Press, 1976. 174pp. The second edition of this bibliography is approximately three times the size of the first and covers an additional three years. It is devoted exclusively to materials on Canadian women, such that general works which might relate to Canadian women as much as any others are not included, nor are international studies which include Canadian women among others. The 1,973 citations are arranged under nearly three hundred subject headings, resulting in something closer to an index than to a chapter arrangement. Moore's bibliography is an attempt to list all of the collection's works on women, most of them from the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. The approximately six hundred entries are arranged into ten subject sections: art, economics, education, history, law and political science, literature, medicine, philosophy and religion, psychology, sociology and anthropology.

The introduction discusses some of the major issues of the women's movement, gives statistics, and stresses the responsibility of librarians to provide materials for women.

Each one follows the same format which includes "Topic Scope," a brief paragraph outlining the major points and themes of the subject; a selected listing of books including the appropriate classification numbers and subject headings to check; listings of articles, bibliographies, indexes, and abstracts. There are author, title, and subject indexes. A nice format for undergraduate and beginning researchers.

- 054 Freeman, Leah. *The Changing Role of Women: A Selected Bibliography*. 3d ed. Sacramento: California State University Library, 1977. 190pp. Freeman compiled the first edition of this bibliography in 1971. It was revised very shortly after, and the second edition appeared in 1972. The third edition is substantially different; for example, it is more than three times as long. It does not represent the complete collection of the Sacramento library, but is rather a selected list through which Freeman has tried to "provide a bibliographic tool enabling students to trace the history and ideas of the women's movement, to bring into focus a vast collage of facts." The citations are organized into twelve subject categories, such as education, employment, women's movement, and history, and one section of reference materials. The final twelve pages list selected subject headings in the California State University Library card catalog.

Krichmar also has included an especially detailed chapter on minority women to help the researcher in a difficult area. There are approximately four hundred citations in this pamphlet.

DeKalb: Northern Illinois University Library, 1974. 15pp. This bibliography varies from the others in this section in two ways: first, it includes periodical articles and second, it does not reflect the library's holdings on women overall. Rather, it concentrates in three areas: education, employment, and the status of women. These three areas constitute about eighty percent of the whole; the rest is devoted to reference sources.
- 062 Pasting, Maureen et al. *Women's Studies Resources*. Omaha: University of Nebraska Library, 1975. 43pp. Out of print. This bibliography can be duplicated from the one available copy in the reference collection at the University of Nebraska, Omaha.
- 063 Pettingill, Ann H. and Jean D. Barnett. *Women: A Bibliography of Books and Other Materials*. 3d ed. Los Angeles: California State University, J.F.K. Memorial Library, 1976. 41pp. Pettingill and Barnett have organized their bibliography into thirty-nine subject categories with sections on periodicals and sound recordings as well. The more than eight hundred citations represent only a selection of materials from the J.F.K. Library and not a comprehensive listing. There is an author index.
- 064 Portis, Juanita W. *Women: An Annotated Bibliography Based on the Holdings of California State College, Dominguez Hills*. Dominguez Hills: California State College, Library, 1974. 75pp. This bibliography is arranged by subject into twelve categories

- from art to suffrage, the largest of which (thirty pages) is "History and Condition." The citations are annotated, though not by the editor; the descriptions come from book reviews or from the book's introduction. At the end of each subject section is an annotated listing of microforms.
- 065 Rothstein, Pauline Marcus. *Women: A Selected Bibliography of Books*. New York: Herbert Lehman College Library, 1973. 29pp. Out of print. Unlike most of the bibliographies in this section, this one is annotated. It lists monographs only and has no reference/research guide. The major sections are: General, Feminism Today, History, Sociology/Anthropology, Psychology, Economic and Legal Status, and Biography.
- 066 Salzer, Elizabeth M. *A Selected Bibliography of Books on Women in the Libraries of the State University of New York at Albany*. Albany: State University of New York Libraries, 1972. 222pp. Out of print. This is a simple listing in subject arrangement of the books about women in the SUNY Albany library. Omitted are books about women in sports, medical books on gynecology and obstetrics, literary works by women unless related to women, and biographies of individual women. Library of Congress classification notations are given. There is a corporate author/title index and a personal author/editor index.

However, it also reflects the collection of the Sarah Lawrence College Library. The periodicals list is a fairly extensive one; not every title was for or by women, but a brief annotation explains the reason for its inclusion.

## Anthropology and Sociology

Anthropology and sociology have been combined because each has too few entries to warrant its own section. The number of entries, however, does not always correspond directly to level of activity. There is a major bibliographic source in anthropology—Jacobs's *Women in Perspective*. As for sociology, much of the research does not appear in this section, but in the topical area to which the research is tied; sociological methods can be used to study anything and everything—rape, crime, family patterns, etc. This is especially true of the Sex Roles/Sex Differences section.

## Art and Music

Three of the six bibliographies in this section concern art, women artists, and art history; two encompass women musicians; one deals with women and film. Both of the music bibliographies include biographical information as well.

San Jose: San Jose State University, Library, 1974. 22pp. Crowe has searched *Art Index*, *Women Studies Abstracts*, and *Social Science and Humanities Index* from 1929 (the first year of *Art Index*) to 1974 for articles on women artists. She has arranged the citations into two parts: one for general articles or articles on particular artists, the other for reviews of group exhibitions by women artists. The bibliography includes more than four hundred citations. Available in limited supply to educational institutions only.
- 076 Hixon, Don L. and Don Hennessee. *Women in Music: A Biobibliography*. Metuchen: Scarecrow Press, 1975. 347pp. *Women in Music* can be used in two ways. First, it is an index to biographical information on women found in nearly fifty major music reference works. Second, because each entry includes place and date of birth and fields of musical activity or specialization, it serves as a quick reference biographical dictionary in itself. Only "classical" musicians have been included. The volume ends with a classified index by field or activity. There are seventy different classifications from accompanists to musicologists to voice teachers.
- 077 Kowalski, Rosemary Ribich. *Women and Film: A Bibliography*. Metuchen: Scarecrow Press, 1976. 278pp. *Women and Film* contains more than two thousand citations to works in four areas: actors, filmmakers, images of women in film, and film writers/critics. The volume is divided into sections on each of these topics which are in turn subdivided, where appropriate, into historical and reference works, catalogs, and specific works. Many of the citations are to general film materials which contain information on, but are not exclusively about, women. In some cases, the an-

notations point out what pertinent material a general work does have, and/or how to locate it. The usefulness of this approach can be debated either way: on the one hand, it's a bit misleading for the researcher who's already been through the standard sources and is looking for books specifically on women. On the other hand, it's helpful to know which of the more general or standard works would be most useful. Each user must decide for him or herself. There is a fairly extensive subject/name index.

A discography section lists recordings of women's music available as of September 1977. A final section suggests possible research topics.

## Child Care

Child care has long been—and will continue to be—an important issue for women. It is good to know that several excellent guides to the research are available.

An extensive and valuable resource.

## Collection Guides

An important new source for researchers is Hinding's forthcoming national guide to manuscript collections on women.

Pittsburgh: Entropy Limited, 1975. 16pp. Four broad areas are examined in this survey: women's legal status, the criminal law, what happens to the female offender, and the law on prostitution and rape. The introduction is substantial and describes the literature in some detail. Most of the sixteen pages are devoted to an annotated bibliography of twenty-six citations.
- 101 Rosenzweig, Marianne and Annette M. Brodsky. *The Psychology of the Female Offender: A Research Bibliography*. University: University of Alabama, Center for Correctional Psychology, 1976. 45pp. This bibliography was compiled in response to two problems: the general lack of literature on the female offender

and the typical, but incorrect, assumption that what is written about the male offender is also true of his female counterpart. Rosenzweig and Brodsky have brought together works from the correctional, psychological, and sociological literature in order to give as full a picture of the research as possible. No attempt was made to be comprehensive, rather, the editors selected materials for quality and uniqueness. Only works published between 1950 and 1975 were considered. The major portion of the bibliography is divided into sections on the juvenile and the adult offender; each of these is divided into two subcategories: theories, research and treatment. Each subsection is introduced with an informative, brief overview of the major issues and works. A shorter section lists one title each for the crimes women most frequently commit: murder, prostitution, shoplifting, and infanticide; this section also cites articles on women alcoholics and drug addicts. Listings of bibliographies and dissertations conclude the compilation. This interdisciplinary bibliography is an invaluable resource for any researcher concerned with the female offender.

Honolulu: University of Hawaii, Graduate School of Library Studies, 1973. 20pp. Sturgeon originally became interested in this topic as the result of publicity about the case of a local woman. Thus, her perspective is more feminist and "progressive" than a disinterested bibliographer's might be. In the introduction, she summarizes some of the key issues surrounding women criminals: the kinds of crimes they commit and why, the discrimination they face, the lack of services. Many of the works cited are from the "alternative press." Organization of the bibliography is by format; it includes sections on dissertations, government documents, and nonprint media as well as the usual books and journal articles. Some of the annotations are not original; sources have been cited in these cases. No materials dated before 1965 are included.

in the second section. Each of these chapters is subdivided by form of material: books, articles, dissertations. Only literature published in the United States from 1965 to 1975 is included. An appendix lists programs funded by the Department of Labor and the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration.

More than half of the works cited are journal articles.

## Drugs and Alcohol

The woman alcoholic or drug abuser has long been invisible— isolated in the home, shielded by family and friends. Now that is beginning to change, and a new literature is developing which focuses on her unique problems. The citations listed here were pulled out of the Health section because they were numerous enough to form their own category.

The literature cited is almost exclusively reports of research studies of various

sorts—psychological, physiological, sociological. Each entry is annotated, describing the research in some detail. The 181 citations are categorized into four major chapters: General, Women and Narcotics, Women and Psychotherapeutic Drug Use, Women and Alcohol; each of these is subdivided. There is an author index.

## Economics

The Economics section has developed largely during the five years since New Feminist Scholarship was originally compiled. The bibliographies listed here are focused primarily on the status of women in the American economy and, to a lesser extent, the rest of the Western world. Those bibliographies concerned with women's status and role in the economy of developing countries were numerous enough to form a separate section.

Both the original bibliography and the supplement are classified by subject divisions: Historical Perspective, Female Labor Supply, Earnings, Occupations, Unemployment, Attitudes of and toward Working Women, The Law, Home Production and Child Care, and Studies on the Role of Women. Two final sections complete the bibliography: Bibliographies and Review Articles, Late Arrivals. The Occupations section is further subdivided into more than a dozen categories. The bibliography is comprehensive for research on women's economic roles, but some related areas have been omitted entirely. These include discrimination in education, statistics, and sex differences in occupational choice. Together, the bibliography and its supplement total approximately six hundred citations. The literature review, which is thirty-two pages in length, has not been revised.

## Education

The field of women's education has seen a great deal of activity since 1970: two pieces of major legislation were passed—Title IX and the Women's Educational Equity Act (WEEA); women's studies has blossomed into a full-fledged disciplinary area; women are beginning to enter the male bastions of law and medical school; for the first time, there are more women undergraduates than men. One-third of the bibliographies listed here concern women and higher education. Another third encompass the general area of careers, vocational education, and the relationship of schooling to work as that affects women. Continuing education and equal educational opportunity are each represented by several compilations.

It covers the full range of issues in women's health care: Gynecological Self-Help; Sterilization Abuse; Questions and Answers on Menopause; Synthetic Estrogens, DES, and Cancer; Women and Psychotherapy; and includes a brief introductory essay on each. A final section lists recommended feminist periodicals and films. There is a directory of women's health organizations. This bibliography is a must.

Dollen concentrates on the moral and philosophical side of the abortion issue and leaves the medical literature out. There is a subject and source index.

Most of the medical literature cited is



recent—since 1970—while the history and government documents sections include sources from the turn of the century forward. Each section is divided into English and foreign language segments, with the foreign language half considerably the larger in many instances. Each of the major divisions has a brief introduction describing the scope and content of the literature. An excellent source.

# History

Nearly half the bibliographies in this section concentrate on American women's history; remaining entries have a focus on European history from Antiquity through the twentieth century. Three bibliographies are concerned with women's role in the two world wars, and there are two entries on women in revolution—Cuban and Russian.

The bibliography itself is in four parts: Methods and Theory in Women's History; Earlier Scholarship; Contemporary Scholarship (document collections, books, and journals); and Guides to Further Resources. Each entry is carefully annotated. There is an author index.
- 153 The Common Women Collective. *Women in U.S. History: An Annotated Bibliography*. Cambridge, 1976. 114p. *Women in U.S. History* is a useful, though uneven, bibliography. Some of the subject categorizing seems a bit quirky, but that will always be the case and those oddities that do exist are covered by cross-references. There is also some unevenness in the depth of coverage. For example, the temperance section has only six entries, all of which are biographies of only two women: Frances Willard and Carry Nation. This, despite the quantity of scholarship in the field. Contrast that with the section on nineteenth and twentieth century sexuality, a relatively new field. Its thirty-eight entries comprise a very high proportion of the total work available. The bibliography is divided into twenty-four short sections by form of work, topic, or period and is cross-referenced such that the lack of an index is not problematical. The annotations are informative and evaluative. Criteria used in evaluating the works include feminist perspective, social and

economic class consciousness, inclusion of traditionally omitted groups, writing style, documentation, and availability. Each of these criteria is discussed and explained in the introduction. Entries which are particularly suited to high school readers are marked with an asterisk.

It has ten major divisions, with titles such as Women in Earliest Settlements, The Status and Rights of Colonial Women, Woman's Domain—The Home, and Colonial Women in the Productive Life of the Communities. Each of these is subdivided by topic or

geography through several levels. For example, Woman's Domain—the Home is subdivided as follows: 2. Women as Wives in the Colonial Home; A. Marriages; a. Courtship and Early Marriage. Abbreviated citations are listed under each of the syllabus divisions; full bibliographic information for the more than one thousand works is found in the bibliography section, a straight alphabetical listing. A third section is designed to aid the researcher of individual women. Each entry in this section lists the name, home, birth/death dates, husband's name, and significant contribution of "104 Outstanding Colonial Women." This compilation does not suffer from the usual class and nationalist bias that defines "colonial" as English and free. A clear effort has been made to include information on the Spanish settlements of the Southwest, women of every nationality and religious group, and those who came in bondage as well as in freedom. The only serious flaw of this volume is that it has not been updated since 1962.

Bronxville: Sarah Lawrence College, Women's Studies Program, 1978. 79pp. Gerda Lerner tells us in her introduction that this third edition of her bibliography will be the last, since the volume of new material would make any future compilation book-length. She takes an interdisciplinary approach, arranging the bibliography into fourteen subject chapters from Historiography to Sexuality, Family History to Women and Art. The single largest section, History of American Women, is twenty-one pages long (about one-fourth of the whole) and is divided into eleven subcategories. In all, there are more than one thousand citations making this one of the most comprehensive sources for the history of American women. (Original edition: Lerner, Gerda. *Women's Studies: History of Women in America*. Bronxville: Sarah Lawrence College, Women's Studies Program, 1972. 41pp.)

The dates were chosen because they mark, roughly, a time often ignored in Victorian women's history—the era between Wolstonecraft and Mill when women were *most* regarded as nonpersons. The bibliography section is in two parts: the first, a checklist of British women's periodicals; the second, a checklist of articles on women in British periodicals. Libraries with most complete holdings are included in the first list. In addition to this bibliographic work, there is a series of essays on the different images of women found in the periodicals listed: The Ladies, Milkhands and Maids, Domestic Economists, The Redundant, The Magdalens, The Emancipated, and The Lords of Creation. An invaluable reference for anyone doing work in the period.

## Law

The Equal Rights Amendment is a major legal issue which connects the two waves of the women's movement: it was born out of the first wave and is being pursued by the second. There are bibliographies on the ERA from both periods in this section, though the latter compilation is comprehensive enough to supersede the former. Other, general bibliographies on women's legal status complete the section.

Westport: Greenwood Press, 1976. 367pp. This is a comprehensive work (almost six thousand entries) citing nearly every word written about the ERA since its inception in 1921. The volume is organized into chapters by form of media since the "overlapping of subjects make a topical arrangement haphazard at best." The major sections are Congressional Publications; Other Government Documents; Books and Dissertations; Pamphlets; Brochures and Papers; Periodical Material (legal and academic journals, newsletters, and newspapers). There is a separate section under "Periodical Material" for *Equal Rights* (1923-1954), the organ of the National Woman's Party, which gives the most detailed history of the ERA for that period. It is arranged chronologically as are the newspaper sections. Overall, the volume includes three types of material: "reportage, which serves an historical function; argumentation, which defines the controversy; and analysis of the specifically legal effects of the amendment." The introduction provides a good brief history of the ERA as well as an overview of the major issues.

## Lesbians

Three of the four bibliographies listed here primarily are guides to lesbian themes in literature; they do not include research or other, general nonfiction. Taken together, they provide comprehensive access to the genre. A Gay Bibliography from the American Library Association's Gay Task Force is the one bibliography restricted to nonfiction.

183 American Library Association, SRRT Task Force on Gay Liberation. *A Gay Bibliography*. 5th ed. Philadelphia, 1975. 8pp. *Supplement*, 1976. 2pp. The SRRT (Social Responsibilities Round Table) Gay Task Force, formed in 1970, was the first such caucus of a professional association to form. The Task Force has been involved in many activities since then, only one of which is the compilation and distribution of this bibliography. The 250 entries are organized according to format and are not annotated. The bibliography is exclusively nonfiction, listing only those works which present a positive view of homosexuality, have some historical value, or help the reader to understand the gay experience. A sixth edition will be available in the summer of 1979.

184 Damon, Gene, Jan Watson, and Robin Jordan. *The Lesbian in Literature: A Bibliography*. 2d ed. Reno: The Ladder, 1975. 96pp. The size of this bibliography/pamphlet is deceptive; it looks small, but packs an incredible amount of information into its ninety-six pages. The bibliography consists almost totally of English language fiction (including novels, short stories, poetry, drama and fictionalized biography), though recent (post 1967) unprejudiced nonfiction is also included. The cut-off date is copyright 1974. Each entry is rated on two scales: primacy of lesbian character/plot and quality of lesbian material. A third symbol, "T," denotes literature that is essentially trash. However, in keeping with the changing consciousness of and about lesbians, most T-rated books (three thousand!) have been deleted from this second edition. Title changes, literary form, and binding are also indicated. Invaluable for any and all readers/researchers of lesbian literature. - 185 *A Gay Bibliography: Eight Bibliographies on Lesbian and Male Homosexuality*. New York: Arno Press, 1975. This compilation is one volume of a reprint series on homosexuality. Eight pioneering bibliographies of lesbian and male homosexual literature published between 1958 and 1966 have been rescued from obscurity and bound together in a form libraries can easily procure. The eight are: *Astra's Tower: Special Leaflet #2 and #3* by Marion Bradley Zimmer; *Checklist 1960, Checklist Supplement 1961, and 1962* by Marion Bradley Zimmer and Gene Damon; *The Lesbian in Literature: A Bibliography* by Gene Damon and Lee Stuart; *The Homosexual in Literature: A Chronological Bibliography Circa 700 B. C.-1958* by Noel I. Garde; and *Homosexuality: Selected Abstracts and Bibliography* by William Parker.
- 186 Kuda, Marie J. *Women Loving Women: A Select and Annotated Bibliography of Women Loving Women in Literature*. Chicago: Womanpress, 1975. 28pp. This bibliography was first published by Lavender Press in 1974; for its second printing, the identical text was published by Womanpress in 1975. The works cited are limited to English language fiction, poetry, biography and autobiography. An effort was made to include works which "show lesbianism as a valid, positive and alternative lifestyle," as well as prototypical works—the first of any genre that was eventually widely copied (student/teacher, governesses, prison or army milieu, etc.). The annotations are informative and well-written.

## Life Cycles

One hears a great deal today about "women in transition." While this section focuses on transition issues, "Life Cycles" seemed to be a more descriptive title. Older women have been active for several years now working against the double discrimination of age and sex, and a substantial body of literature has been produced in the process. There are separate bibliographies on two key issues of concern to older women: widowhood and menopause. At the other end of the age spectrum, the resources are scarce. Efforts to apply the thinking and lessons of feminism to the special problems of adolescent girls and young women is still relatively new, but this is a fast developing program area. While there is only one bibliography listed here, a more substantial literature will undoubtedly follow.

St. Paul: University of Minnesota, Center for Youth Development and Research, 1975. 204pp. Out of print. This bibliography is the result of a thorough literature search of writings since 1964 on seventeen aspects of the adolescent girl's life, including education, family, friends, and sexuality. The compilation also includes the bibliography from Gisela Konopka's book *Young Girls: A Portrait of Adolescence*, which is a section unto itself and is organized differently from the rest of the bibliography. The other chapters are arranged according to the source indexed: *American Book Publishing Record*, *Crime and Delinquency Abstracts*, ERIC, Medline, *Psychological Abstracts* and Helen Astin's *Women's Higher and Continuing Education*. There are two final sections, one on dissertations and the other miscellaneous.

an ever-increasing volume of information requests. It is a selective compilation of works on women in the "post-parental" period, published between 1970 and 1975. Both scholarly and general works are included. There are subject sections on women re-entering the job/education market, role changes, financial difficulties, sexuality, medical/physical developments, and widowhood, and one of biographies. *Age Is Becoming* provides access to the literature of an emerging field and should prove useful to a wide variety of collections.

# Literature

Despite the fact that literature was one of the first fields to be influenced by women's studies, the bibliographies have been slow to appear—most of them since 1974. An early attempt (1971) was made by women in the Modern Language Association, but it was not maintained. The bibliography of women writers first produced in 1973 by the Sense and Sensibility Collective, (now the Women and Literature Collective) has received fairly wide distribution; it has been the major source on literature by women. Several compilations on literary criticism—feminist and otherwise—have appeared in recent years. *Women and Literature*, the quarterly journal, is now providing an ongoing bibliography in a special edition of the fall issue each year. There is one bibliography of drama by women.

- 192 Backscheider, Paula R., Felicity Nussbaum, and Philip B. Anderson. *An Annotated Bibliography of Twentieth-Century Critical Studies of Women and Literature, 1660-1800*. New York: Garland, 1977. 287pp. This bibliography actually covers a somewhat broader field than the title suggests. It includes "critical and scholarly books and articles published between 1900 and 1975" on women—not just literary women, though they are undoubtedly featured. The compilers had researchers of the Restoration and the eighteenth century in mind as well as the women's studies researcher. The first major section of the volume is devoted to general studies of the period, including literary criticism, social history, biography, and art history. The second section is restricted to works on literature and is divided by genre. It also includes information on six major male novelists (Cleland, Defoe, Fielding, Richardson, Smollett, Sterne), listing critical studies of their female characters and works describing their influence on and relationships to women and women writers. The final and largest section (approximately two-thirds of the more than 1,500 entries) lists various works of sixty-five women writers of the period, from Mary Astell to Ann Yearsley. There is an index to Restoration and eighteenth-century women, and an index to authors.

- 193 Batchelder, Eleanor. *Plays by Women: A Bibliography*. New York: Womanbooks, 1977. 41pp. This was the only drama bibliography I could locate, and it fills an important gap. A rough count indicates the inclusion of approximately 150 playwrights who are listed alphabetically, followed by a chronological roster of plays. Plays appearing in anthologies receive an abbreviated entry, with full information in the anthologies section at the back. Each anthology entry gives the complete contents. For the most part, authors are twentieth-century American playwrights. This small pamphlet contains a gold-mine of information and should be a very welcome addition.
- 194 Boos, Florence. "1974 Bibliography of Women in British and American Literature: 1660-1900." *Women and Literature* 3(2):33-64, Fall 1975. This is the first of an annual bibliography indexing nearly two hundred scholarly journals. It lists all articles about British and American women writers from 1660 to 1900. The bibliography is arranged by a unique decimal system in which the period and country of origin are denoted by the number to the left of the decimal and the form of the writing by the number to the right.

"1975 Bibliography of Literature in English by and about Women, 600-1960." *Women and Literature* issued as a supplement to vol. 4, no. 2, Fall 1976. 148pp. The second annual issue of this bibliography is considerably different from the first. The number of journals indexed doubled, from about two hundred to approximately four hundred. Both the chronological and geographical coverage were increased; the chronological in two directions (backward to 600 and forward to 1960) and the geographical from just British and American writers to those of all English-speaking countries. These changes produced a dramatic increase in size, and the bibliography had to be issued as a separate supplement. The basic organization of the bibliography remains unchanged.

volume follows the same format and scope of the second. Because of the enormity of the task and the dependence on volunteer efforts, the 1976 index was not mailed to subscribers until February of 1978. The National Endowment for the Humanities has provided a grant for the bibliography in order to ease some of these problems and assure its continuation.

A final, general section lists works that are not confined to one author or character. The bibliography covers the period from January 1970 through spring 1975. There is an index of critics and editors.
- 202 Nower, Joyce. *Selected Bibliography of Women Writers*. San Diego, 1970. 17pp. (Order from Center for Women's Studies and Services). Nower lists the works of selected women writers of twenty-five countries from Argentina to Uruguay. There is a heading for each country, with the authors listed alphabetically under each except in the case of the United States where there is further subdivision by racial or ethnic group. The citations are

not to specific editions of the authors' works, but rather include only title and date of original publication.

San Jose: San Jose State University Library, 1974. 16pp. This bibliography lists more than 250 citations to books and articles on women writers including novelists, poets, playwrights, journalists. It lists works on the woman writer in general, not on specific authors. Available in limited supply to educational institutions only.
- 204 ———. *Women in Literature*. San Jose: San Jose State University Library, 1974. 28pp. This bibliography lists more than four hundred citations to books and articles on the image of women in literature. Available in limited supply to educational institutions only.
- 205 Rosenfelt, Deborah Silverton. *Strong Women: An Annotated Bibliography of Literature for the High School Classroom*. Old Westbury: The Feminist Press, 1976. 56pp. This attractive pamphlet lists more than one hundred annotated citations to works by women writers. The title says the literature cited is for the high school classroom, but the introduction reveals the editor's assumption that "high school readers will enjoy many of the same works that have moved older audiences." Thus, the bibliography will be of equal use to the college teacher or student. The compilation is divided into sections by form (anthologies, autobiography and biography, drama, novels, short stories, poetry) and has a topical index.
- 206 Schwartz, Narda Lacey. *Articles on Women Writers 1960-1975, A Bibliography*. Santa Barbara: ABC-Clio, 1977. 236pp. Narda Schwartz has compiled an extensive bibliography of articles, both popular and scholarly, on more than six hundred women writers from the English-speaking world. She searched twenty-one bibliographies and literature indexes as well as *Dissertation Abstracts*. Included is any woman writer—and writer is defined broadly to include diarists, essayists, and letter writers, as well as the usual novelists and poets—about whom at least one article appeared between 1960 and 1975. The time frame was chosen to give a record of the changing attitudes about women writers



occasioned by the emergence and growth of the women's movement. The bibliography is arranged dictionary-style, from Hannah Adams to Charlotte Zolotow. Each entry gives the author's name and pseudonym, birth and death dates, and country where most of the writing was done. The author entries have three subdivisions: Bibliography (collections of critical studies); General Works (biographical, thematic, and comparative studies); and Individual Works (the author's primary literature listed by title and followed by the articles on each). This is a fine source which should be of use to a large audience.

The material is arranged into ten chapters: biography; criticism on specific groups; specific topics (genre); literary history; contemporary assessments (contemporaries of the critic, that is, not of the 1970s); feminine sensibility; the problems of women writers; discriminatory treatment of women writers ("Phallic Criticism"); feminist criticism; and miscellaneous. Her introduction provides a brief, interesting overview of the major themes, problems, and assumptions in current and past thinking about women writers. Her conclusions: *Plus ça change, plus c'est la même chose*.
- 210 Women and Literature Collective. *Women and Literature: An Annotated Bibliography of Women Writers*. 3d ed. Cambridge, 1976. 212pp. Both the collective and the bibliography have changed and grown over the years and through three editions. The third edition is greatly expanded and has been partially revised. While all annotations from the previous editions were

read and reconsidered; they were not all rewritten; thus, there is substantial variety in style and outlook from entry to entry. The more than eight hundred citations are arranged by country and subdivided by chronology. Most of the volume (more than half) is devoted to American and British writers, however, sixteen other countries, continents, or geographical areas are also covered. Listings for major authors include biographical sketches. Not every work of every author is listed; there are inevitable gaps, none of them serious. There is a section for anthologies and one for literary criticism, and a special effort was made to include the publications of the women's presses. There are author and subject indexes. (Original edition: Sense and Sensibility Collective. *Women and Literature: An Annotated Bibliography of Women Writers*. Cambridge, 1973. 58pp.)

## Marriage and the Family

New research has made significant changes in the study of Marriage and the Family, which until recently has been the traditional discipline for the study of women. The home no longer enjoys its reputation as a haven of domestic tranquility; it has been exposed as a place of domestic violence. Research on violent husbands and battered women—some of it problematic from a feminist point of view—is enjoying something of a vogue right now. There are three bibliographies on battered women. The general area of marriage and the family is dominated by the comprehensive efforts of the University of Minnesota in its International Bibliography of Research. Divorce is also included in this section, with two listings.

San Diego: Current Bibliography Series, 1978. 57pp. Compiled primarily for the general public, this bibliography would be of interest as well to the researcher, student, or social work practitioner. It cites a wide range of materials, running the gamut from research studies published in scholarly journals to newspaper articles to "how-to" manuals produced by women's shelters. The citations are organized into sections by format: Books and pamphlets, periodical articles, newspaper articles, newsbank (a newspaper indexing service), government publications, films. The last section is a brief listing of agencies in the United States, Canada, and England from which written material is available; it is not a comprehensive list. The annotations are informative and well-written.

St. Paul: University of Minnesota, Family Social Science, 1977. 638pp. This bibliography began in 1967 in an attempt to list every research item in the interdisciplinary area of marriage and the family published since 1900. "Research" was defined broadly to include any work that reports on empirical data. Thus, it is easier to list what was not included: unpublished theses, proscriptive works, studies of the individual in which the focus is not family behavior, population studies which do not relate findings to the family, textbooks, popular works, legal treatises. The literature search resulted in 12,850 citations to books, journal articles, and miscellaneous papers in the first edition. The bibliography was computer-generated and consists of five parts: KWIC (Key-Word-In-Context) Index, Subject index, Complete Reference List, Author Index, and Periodicals List. The regular subject index was included in addition to the KWIC index for the convenience of those unfamiliar with KWIC indexing. Citations were listed alphabetically; foreign titles were translated. The introduction concludes with a literature review describing the trends in research over the years. *Volume II* follows the same format as the first edition. It lists 12,870 citations to research on the family, including titles for the 1900-1964 period which were missed. The third volume represents a change in scope; instead of listing all research published, it is essentially an index to nearly five hundred journals in the interdisciplinary area of marriage and the family. It lists 2,413 citations to articles published in English. *Volume IV* follows the format of *Volume III*, and indexes approximately 750 journals. The editors intend the bibliography to become an annual index, but have not yet been successful.
- 216 Israel, Stanley. *A Bibliography on Divorce*. New York: Bloch Publishing, 1974. 300pp. Israel's bibliography has sections on

three major aspects of divorce: legal, religious, and sociological. Each entry gives the publisher's address and the complete table of contents of the book in addition to the usual citation information and annotation. Though it is not so explained in the introduction, the annotations do not appear to have been written by Stanley Israel, but rather to be jacket copy or some essentially promotional writing supplied by the publisher. The value of this type of listing is certainly questionable. Approximately 150 books are annotated in this way, comprising the bulk of the book. Additional titles for which full listings could not be provided are cited briefly at the end.

Her attitude to divorce is solidly feminist and is expressed in the introduction and annotations. The bibliography is arranged by subject into eleven major sections; appendixes list resource organizations and divorce laws state by state. There are author and subject indexes.

Milwaukee: University of Wisconsin, School of Social Welfare, Midwest Parent-Child Welfare Resource Center, 1977. 25pp. This bibliography combines the two major types of literature available on battered women: the professionally-oriented sociological or psychological research studies and the activist-oriented writings of feminists who are trying to provide solutions. The bibliography is arranged by format into five sections: monographs, articles, newsletters, guidebooks, and media. In each section, the annotated entries are followed by a list of citations the editor was not able to review.

## Minority and Ethnic Women

This section is dominated by nine bibliographies on black women. This is probably largely due to the emergence of Black Studies as the first of the ethnic studies areas to develop. There are three bibliographies on Spanish-speaking women and one on Native American women. No bibliographies on Asian-American women were found. Of the white ethnic groups, only bibliographies on Jewish women were located.

Hall, 1975. 159pp. Davis's bibliography includes approximately seven hundred citations to books, articles, pamphlets, and government documents on the American black woman. The citations are arranged by format, with only the books and articles sections annotated. In addition to the chapters of actual bibliography, there are listings of relevant library collections; organizations, black women newspaper editors/publishers and elected officials, and population statistics.
- 224 ———. *Black Women in the Cities, 1872-1973; A Bibliography of Published Works on the Life and Achievements of Black Women in Cities in the United States*. 2d ed. Monticello: Council of Planning Librarians, 1975. 75pp. The second edition

of this bibliography is approximately fifty percent longer than the first. In the main bibliography section, it includes more than five hundred citations to books, articles, pamphlets, reports, and government documents on the urban black woman. In addition, there are sections on general reference works, selected black journals, libraries with special collections on black history, journals on urban affairs, related Council bibliographies, black women's national organizations and black women elected officials. Several of these sections also appear in Davis's 1975 bibliography, *The Black Woman in American Society* (#223), so there is some duplication. The bibliography is arranged by format, which may cause difficulties as there is no subject index. Arrangement by broad subjects such as housing, unemployment, divorce, welfare, or education might have been more useful. The materials range widely and cover urban problems generally as much as they do the urban black woman. Davis's bibliography is a starting point for the sociologist, urban planner, or historian. The citations are listed alphabetically and numbered; an index provides subject access. A second section lists periodicals. The bibliography is illustrated with a number of excellent photographs.

Metuchen: Scarecrow Press, 1973. 141pp. More than 1,200 works by American black women, including print and nonprint media, are listed in this bibliography. The comprehensive listing is subdivided by subject; in addition, there are sections on selected individual bibliography, a section on "Other Arts" for black women in the graphic arts and music, audio-visual aids and periodicals, and black publishing houses. There is a name index and there are selected portraits throughout.

Citations in this bibliography are arranged by format (books, articles, papers, fiction) and subject (Israel, history/sociology, holocaust and resistance, Jewish religion and law, America). ## Philosophy

Perhaps a better title for this section would be, "Written by a Professional Philosopher," since nearly every issue raised by the women's movement is a philosophical issue, and nearly every other section includes bibliographies with some philosophical writings. It is, of course, the one place to find compilations of philosophical works only.

## Politics

The eleven bibliographies in this section cover an array of topics: women's voting patterns and influence, women in appointive and elective office, women's role in party politics, women in government employment, and women's volunteer political activity. Stanwick and Li's The Political Participation of Women is the most comprehensive of the sources listed.

The material is organized into sections by form, including dissertations, unpublished works, and research in progress. "How-to" literature on recruiting, training, and keeping volunteers has not been included. There is an author index.
- 242 Fitch, Nancy E. *Women in Politics: The United States and Abroad, A Select Bibliography*. Washington: U.S. Library of Congress, Congressional Research Service, Governments Division, 1976. Fitch's bibliography is divided into two large sections: General Works and Biographical Works. Each of these is subdivided into American, Black American, and Foreign, as well as by format. There are approximately 150 annotated citations, about one-third of them newspaper articles.

The review has three main parts: The Contemporary Situation, Gender Roles and Women's Political Movements in Historical Perspective, and Origins of Gender Roles. More than two hundred research studies are discussed.

Monticello: Council of Planning Librarians, 1973. 80pp. Levenson's bibliography comes out of an interest in the long history of women's participation—or attempted participation—in government and politics since the nineteenth century. She presents more than one thousand citations, primarily to works published since 1940, but including major books and articles predating that. The bibliography is divided into four major sections: Bibliographies and Indexes; Women in Government (including the armed forces, foreign service, and judicial work); Women in Politics (including the suffrage movement and the woman voter); and Women in Government and Politics in Other Countries.
- 246 Levitt, Morris. *Women's Role in American Politics*. Monticello: Council of Planning Librarians, 1973. 25pp. Morris Levitt has studied the political attitudes and behavior of American women, with particular regard for the effect of education and employment on their level of participation. In a brief introduction, he discusses the results of a 1965 to 1968 survey of voters, extrapolating and analyzing the data on women. Based on this essay, it becomes clear that by "political participation" he means voting behavior primarily—not women in appointive or elective office. The bibliography includes scholarly books and articles, mostly from the late 1950s to early 1970s; a few earlier works are cited. Levitt has included works on voting behavior generally and on the status of women, in addition to those on women's political activities.
- 247 Sapiro, Virginia. *A Guide to Published Works on Women and Politics II*. 2d ed. Ann Arbor: University of Michigan, Institute for Social Research, Center for Political Studies, 1975. 81pp. The

title of Sapiro's bibliography is something of a misnomer, since her work includes a wealth of material on women's status and history, on sex roles and the women's movement, as well as on women and politics. The broad areas covered are: The Political Realm; Cross-National Studies; Sociological, Psychological, and Economic Perspectives; The Women's Movement; Black Women and Feminism; and Historical Studies. Each of these areas comprises a section of the bibliography, and each is subdivided topically. A final section lists a miscellany of items, including anthologies and bibliographies. Each section and subsection begins with a brief overview pointing out the subjects and merits of various works listed. The bibliography is limited to books and articles in English. Most of the material has been published recently.

- 248 Stanwick, Kathy and Christine Li. *The Political Participation of Women in the United States: A Selected Bibliography, 1950-1976*. Metuchen: Scarecrow Press, 1977. 160pp. This bibliography was prepared at the Center for the American Woman and Politics (CAWP), Rutgers University (of which Stanwick and Li are staff) and supersedes the CAWP publication, *Women and American Politics*, published in 1974. It extends the coverage of that compilation backward to 1950 (from 1965) and forward to 1976 (from 1974). The type of material cited remains the same; it includes much that is unpublished and hard to find, as well as research in progress. The subject scope is broad, including women in appointive or elective office, women's role in party politics, voting behavior, political socialization, women's lobbying and volunteer political activity, women's participation in social movements, and histories of women's political activity. The more than 1,500 citations are arranged by format: bibliographies, directories, periodicals, books, etc. A biographical index will help the researcher trace the lives of individual women; the lack of a subject index will cause the general user some problem. Finally, many of the works listed are housed at the CAWP collection, and inquiries are invited. (Original edition: Chrisman, Sara B. *Woman and American Politics: A Selected Bibliography, 1965-1974*. Monticello: Council of Planning Librarians, 1974. 29pp. The purpose of this bibliography is to "bring together references to articles, books, and documents which discuss and illuminate the role and rights of women in politics and government in Canada," including the campaign for woman suffrage. The bibliography includes 245 citations arranged alphabetically and followed by a subject index. In addition, there are listings of women's magazines and newspapers, and of government bodies concerned with the status of Canadian women. This is one of the better Canadian sources since it includes Canadian material almost exclusively.

A bibliographical essay listing and discussing books and articles that contain information on the socialization of women and girls as well as the role of women in the national government, political parties, and pressure groups.

## Professions

These bibliographies on women in various professions were pulled out of the Work section because they were numerous enough (there are twenty-two of them) to stand on their own. Several of them are not concerned with women in specific professions, but rather the more general "management" or "executive" category. The professions represented include librarianship, medicine, police work, architecture, geography, journalism, engineering, the sciences—a varied and interesting cross-section. As explained in the introduction, this section also includes one bibliography on prostitution.

Thus, because of the various definitions of prostitution (many of which are described in the introduction), works on "almost any aspect of extramarital sexual activity" are cited. Evidently, the subject has been a popular one—the volume includes just under 6,500 citations. Organization is either by form (including area studies, biography, and fiction) or subject (including history, legal and police regulations, sociology, and war). There are twenty chapters in all, Medicine and Public Health being the largest. The bibliography was compiled with the aid of a computer, which accounts for the unpleasant style of type. Typesetting would have made a more attractive, easier to read book, but the efficiency of the computer undoubtedly outweighed those considerations.
- 253 Business and Professional Women's Foundation. *Women Executives: A Selected Annotated Bibliography*. Washington, 1970. 26pp. This bibliography covers periodical articles for the most part, but also includes books, pamphlets, reports and theses. The materials themselves range from the popular and general to the scholarly; they have been published within the past ten to fifteen

years on the whole, though a few earlier pieces are included. The citations are divided into chapters by type of material. The annotations are not evaluative, and all the materials listed are available in the Foundation library.

Metuchen: Scarecrow Press, 1977. 1,124pp. *Women in Medicine* is undoubtedly the major reference work on women in the medical profession. Based heavily on the Women in Medicine Collection at the Medical College of Pennsylvania (formerly the Women's Medical College), it includes more than four thousand annotated entries. The bibliography is arranged into fourteen subject chapters (history, biography, recruitment, missionary activity, wartime activity, etc.), each of which is subdivided by geography. Materials included range from the eighteenth century (the earliest dated entry is a 1750 German pamphlet) through 1975, and more than ninety percent are in English. The titles of foreign language works have been translated into English. Appendixes list directories of women physicians and special collections on women in medicine. There are author, subject, and personal name indexes totalling more than one hundred pages. Certainly, any researches into the history and status of women in medicine will have to begin here.

Monticello: Council of Planning Librarians, 1976. 15pp. Davis's bibliography is arranged by form into five sections: articles, books, pamphlets, government documents, theses and dissertations. There is no introduction to explain the bibliography's scope or purpose, but a quick survey indicates the inclusion of twentieth-century materials in English. The earliest item listed is a book dated 1909, and in the articles section especially, there are a great many works from the early part of the century through the twenties.

This entry is the one exception to the "separately-published bibliography rule" which guides the compilation of this volume. I have made an exception in this case for two reasons: the nearness of the topic to my librarian's heart and the size and scope of the bibliography. *The Role of Women in Librarianship* is not in print as of this writing; however, the bibliography section has been completed and is three hundred manuscript pages. It would appear that the bibliography will dwarf the anthology and not vice versa.

There is a listing of organizations and associations of women architects and a listing of statistical sources. Each item is carefully annotated.

- of Planning Librarians, 1976. 18pp. Loyd's bibliography lists materials of two types: works on the woman geographer, her status and participation; and geographical studies on women. The pamphlet is divided into these two sections, both of which contain a miscellany of materials—films, conferences, articles, organizations, and research in progress. Everything listed is very recent, most of it from 1970.

The sections are Background; The Professional Woman; Major Books (those dealing specifically with the woman engineer); The Status of Women Engineers; Numbers, Trends; Recruitment: The Chronic Problem; Education and Training; On the Job: Performance, Opportunity, Satisfaction; Role Models—Success Stories; and Government Documents. There are two nonbibliographic sections listing major conferences and relevant organizations. Items of particular interest and those with vague titles have been annotated briefly.

Austin: University of Texas, School of Social Work, Center for Social Work Research, 1977. 64pp. Work on this bibliography began in 1975 in preparation for a conference, "Women in Management," sponsored by the University of Texas that spring. Collection of these materials continued in an effort to develop a special library on the managerial woman. The bibliography includes selected books, journal articles, and unpublished papers of recent vintage. The more

than six hundred citations fall into seven issue areas with a chapter for each: women in the work force generally, the legal issues, internal (psychological) factors, personal/work roles and conflicts, women as leaders, organizational barriers to women's participation, and strategies for change. Each of these chapters has a brief introduction describing the major issues and setting them in historical context. The best source I have found in the area.

## Psychology

The psychology section is substantial, with a number of excellent sources. However, there is nothing comprehensive that is recent. Sherman's book-length review essay was published in 1971, Walstedt's *The Psychology of Women* in 1972, and the American Psychological Association's *A Topical Bibliography* in 1974. The most recent entry is Vaughter's review essay in the Autumn 1976 issue of *Signs*. While this is an excellent source for current research, it is not comprehensive. The *Signs* review essays will continue to be an important resource in this area.

It covers a broad range of topics, from history to feminism to anthropology, and is not, strictly speaking, concerned only with female psychology. Certain major books and articles have been annotated; some of the books chapter by chapter. The section titles are: Historical Perspectives; Contemporary Women's Movement; Biological Basis for Sex Differences; Critique of Research and Theory on Sex Differences; Cross-Cultural Perspectives; Psychological Development; Research on Cognitive Differences and Achievement; Sexuality and Reproduction; Psychological Problems of Women; and Aging.

Boston: Womanspace: Feminist Therapy Collective, 1976. 19pp. Approximately half of this mimeographed bibliography is a straight alphabetical listing of citations. Then follow two brief subject sections: Women and Alcoholism, Lesbians and Mental Health.

- 278 Javonovich, Joann et al. *Women and Psychology*. Cambridge: Cambridge-Goddard Graduate School for Social Change, 1972. 36pp. Out of print. This selected, annotated bibliography is an outgrowth of the Psychology and Woman Seminar of the Feminist Studies Program at the Cambridge-Goddard Graduate School. Originally compiled in 1972, it was reprinted, but not revised, by the New-England Free Press. Each section of the bibliography is preceded by an introduction describing how and why the particular materials were selected. The compilers approach the material with a feminist point of view. The sections include: Philosophy of Science, Methodology and Statistical Uses, History of Psychology, Sex Differences, Sex Role Development and Socialization of Children, Individual Psychology and Personality Theory, Individual Development and Group Dynamics, The Small Group in the Development of Political Organization. Citations are listed alphabetically by author.

- 280 Sherman, Julia Ann. *On the Psychology of Women: A Survey of Empirical Studies*. Springfield: Charles C. The research falls into eleven major areas (there is a chapter on each): Biology of Sex Differences, Psychology of Sex-Differences, Freudian Theory of Feminine Development, Female Oedipus Complex, Moral and Sex Role Development, Adolescence, Cyclic Changes, Female Sexuality, Pregnancy, Motherhood, and The Later Years.

- 282 Walstedt, Joyce Jennings. *The Psychology of Women: A Partially Annotated Bibliography*. Pittsburgh: KNOW, 1972. 76pp. Part I of this bibliography is arranged according to the stages in women's lives: Infancy and Childhood, Adolescence, Young Adulthood, Middle and Old Age. Part II has six thematic subcategories: Cross Cultural; General Source Material; Primate Studies; Minority Group Status, Discrimination; Psychoanalytic Theories, Mental Health; and Sexuality and Physiology. It should be clear from this list of categories that the bibliography covers a wide range of materials, though the majority of the citations are to research articles in academic journals. The bibliography is not meant to be exhaustive, except in the case of journal articles published since 1970. Walstedt searched all the major psychological journals from 1970 for relevant entries and annotated all of them. All post-1970 materials are marked with an asterisk, and those considered to be of special interest are also marked. The annotations are "neutral" and descriptive. In cases where Walstedt had a strong opinion, she has given it in a separate paragraph labelled "Comments." Both the annotations and the comments are incisive and very helpful. The only drawback to this bibliography is its age.

## Rape

Rape has been a crucial topic in feminist literature since the publication of Susan Griffin's "Rape: The All-American Crime" (*Ramparts*, Vol. 10, No. 3) in 1971. More recently, it has been taken seriously as a research area by criminologists and psychologists, and several bibliographies of scholarly writing have appeared.

The introduction points out the shift in the tone of the material pre- and post-women's movement. The subject categories include Sociology, Victim, Offender, Law, Medical and Police Investigation. There is an author index.
- 286 Kemmer, Elizabeth Jane. *Rape and Rape-Related Issues: An Annotated Bibliography*. New York: Garland, 1977, 174pp. This slim volume contains 348 citations to rape literature in English from 1965 to 1976. The annotations are detailed and helpful. There is a list of the 150 periodicals cited and a good subject index; the citations themselves are not arranged by subject, but listed alphabetically by main entry. However, it is always upsetting to see the publisher skimp on the production (the body of the book is typed, not typeset) of such a worthwhile book.

St. Louis, 1977. 93pp. *The Rape Bibliography* covers scholarly writing on four aspects of rape: legal, medical, psychological, and sociological. Each of these sections is divided into "Bibliography," which cites works written before



1970, and "Abstracts," which cites and annotates works written after 1970. A final section, "Popular Press," covers all nonscholarly work on the four aspects published after 1970. The recent acceptance of rape as a legitimate and crucial problem for our society is evidenced by the ratio of post- to pre-1970 works. Out of a total 443 citations, 169—or about forty percent—are in the post-1970 period. This bibliography is an excellent resource for researchers tackling this disturbing issue.

## Reference Sources

This is one of the sections which did not exist in the original compilation, but has developed rapidly since 1974. The concept of reference service on women's issues has followed in the footsteps of women's studies research; it is now of concern to many librarians. In fact, most of these bibliographies were compiled by college and university librarians who developed their specialty in response to their campus's women's studies program.

Eichler and Whaley list and discuss reference works and bibliographies on women in Canada and the United States, including those published over the preceding ten years as well as a few that are still forthcoming. Their essay is arranged into sections by form: reference books, bibliographies, and other library resources (mostly indexes and abstracts), with a final section on the as yet unpublished works.
- 290 Hoffman, Ruth H. *Women: A Basic Guide to Research*. Bowling Green: Bowling Green State University Libraries, 1978. 25pp. Hoffman's research guide is typical of its type, giving a basic introduction to the card catalog, appropriate subject headings, general and specialized reference sources. It includes as well, a list of local women's programs and services.
- 291 Lynn, Naomi B., Ann B. Matasar, and Marie Barovic Rosenberg. *Research Guide in Women's Studies*. Morristown: General Learning Press, 1974. 194pp. This is a college-level introduction to social science research, reference work, and writing of women's studies research papers. Many college or university libraries have put out similar guides for their own students.
- 292 Mátér, Carolyn, Rae Rohfeld, and Laverne Zell. *Research Guide to Women's Issues*. Cleveland: Cleveland State University, Institute of Urban Affairs, Clearinghouse for Research on Women and Employment, 1976. 37pp. Out of print. *Research Guide to Women's Issues* is much like the other guides in this

section. In addition to describing basic research procedures and reference sources, it also provides a series of suggestions for research needed in three major areas: education, conditions of employment, and implementation of equal employment opportunities. The final section is a reprint of "Research and Support Strategies for Women's Higher Education," a paper prepared by the Project on the Status and Education of Women.

- 293 McKee, Kathleen Burke. *Women's Studies: A Guide to Reference Sources*. Storrs: The University of Connecticut Library, 1977. 112pp. This attractive paperback includes 364 citations to specialized and general reference sources in the University of Connecticut Library. Arranged by type of publication, the compilation covers guides; library catalogs; handbooks; directories; statistical sources; indexes, abstracts, and bibliographies. Subdivisions by form and/or subject are provided where necessary; the indexes, abstracts, and bibliographies section, for example, is broken down into more than twenty subject areas. A final section, compiled by Joanne V. Akeroyd, lists feminist serials found in the library's Alternative Press Collection. The holdings as of January 1977 are given for each title, along with a description of the type of periodical and its usual contents. There are subject, author, and title indexes. This is an excellent guide to reference sources in women's studies and should be useful to a wide audience beyond the University of Connecticut.
- 294 Papazian, Barbara and Ernestine Shead. *Finding Materials by and about Women in the Michigan State University Libraries*. East Lansing: Michigan State University Libraries, 1977. 21pp. The M.S.U. Libraries have a "How to Find" series, of which this manual is a part. It is basically a guide to library research, it lists a variety of reference sources. The sections are delineated by the type of information sought: Finding Books, Finding Newspaper and Periodical Articles, Finding Biographical Information, etc.
- 295 Schlachter, Gail and Donna Belli. *The Changing Role of Women in America: A Selected Annotated Bibliography of Reference Sources*. Monticello: Council of Planning Librarians, 1975. 36pp. Schlachter and Belli have divided their guide to reference

works into two parts: Information Sources, which includes directories, encyclopedias, biographical dictionaries, and so forth; and Citation Sources, which actually means bibliographies. This compilation is less extensive than the McKee guide (#293); it lists only sources which are devoted exclusively to women and not the more general ones which may have sections on women. Foreign language materials and minor or obscure items are not included. Each entry is carefully annotated; the annotations are descriptive rather than evaluative. There are author and title indexes. In general, a good source.

- 296 ———. *Minorities and Women: A Guide to Reference Literature in the Social Sciences*. Los Angeles: Reference Service Press, 1977. 349pp. Schlachter and Belli's *Guide* is somewhat outside the scope of this compilation in that it is not devoted exclusively to works on women. I have included it, nevertheless, for two reasons: one, it contains substantial material on women (approximately 130 citations) and two, because the sources on minority women are few, the works on minorities in general might provide a useful lead. The volume is divided into two parts: Information Sources, subdivided by form (fact books, biographical sources, document sources, directories, statistical sources); and Citation Sources, subdivided by type of person (Minorities, American Indians, Asian Americans, Black Americans, Spanish Americans, Women). Materials were considered for inclusion if written in English, recently published (or classics), commercially available, and on at least a high school level. Every item is annotated, and there are author, title, and subject indexes. The resemblance between this work and their *The Changing Role of Women* will be noted.

- 297 Seckelson-Simpson, Linda. *With Reference to Women: An Annotated Bibliography of Reference Materials on Women in the Northwestern University Library*. Evanston: Northwestern University Library, 1975. 55pp. *With Reference to Women* lists general and specialized reference sources in five subject areas. The 157 entries are carefully annotated in some detail. In addition to the straight bibliography sections, there are lists of women's organizations and special library collections on women. An excellent resource.

- 298 Woodsworth, Anne and Jane Clark. *Women: A Guide to Bibliographic Sources*. 2d ed. Toronto: University of Toronto, John P. Robarts Research Library, 1974. 26pp. This bibliography of reference sources was compiled by Anne Woodsworth; it first appeared in 1972, with an addenda in 1973. The revision was done by Jane Clark and essentially combines the first edition and its addenda into one. The only revision is the interfiling of the two parts, there are no substantial additions (a total increase of three citations), nor have the basic outline or annotations changed. The *Guide* has five major sections: The Card Catalogues, Sources in the Reference Room, The Government Publications Section, Women's Periodicals, and Sources Outside the University. The bulk of the compilation (fifteen out of twenty-six pages) is the reference room section, which is broken down into subcategories for bibliographies, biographical dictionaries, course syllabi, directories and encyclopedias, and indexes and abstracts. The annotations are brief but informative. There is an author/title index. Although this *Guide* is now a bit dated, it is still useful, especially for Canadian sources. (Original edition: Woodsworth, Anne. *Women: A Guide to Bibliographic Sources in the University of Toronto Library*. Toronto: University of Toronto, Library, 1972. 7pp. *Addenda*. 1973. 14pp.)
- 299 Wright, Maureen. *Women's Studies: A Student's Guide to Reference Sources*. ERIC, 1975, 12pp. (ED 117 747). Wright divides her bibliography into four main sections: Directories, Encyclopedias, Biographical Sources, and Bibliographies. The bibliography section is subdivided by topic and comprises half of the publication. Each entry is carefully annotated. This is a good all-around source, but is especially useful for reference material on Canadian women.

# Religion

The bibliographies in this section represent the variety of contemporary issues concerning women and religion: the status of women in the church, feminist interpretations of theology, the ordination of women.

- 300 Bass, Dorothy. *American Women in Church and Society, 1607-1920: A Bibliography*. New York: Auburn Theological Seminary, 1973. 37pp. The title of this bibliography is perhaps a bit misleading as it includes material on women in a wide variety of topics in addition to women and the church. There is, however, one lengthy section devoted to the church as well as one on sects and utopias. There are numerous works in other sections that are written by ministers or that concern the way Christianity has affected women. The partially-annotated citations are arranged into chapters broadly by subject, they then are further subdivided.

Cincinnati, 1973. 29pp. Farians's self-published bibliography is arranged first by form of material (books, articles, bibliographies, films, packets, reports, newsletters, special periodical issues) and then chronologically. The largest section by far is the compilation of articles. There is also a brief listing of women's religious and church organizations.
- 305 Fischer, Clare B. and Rochelle Gatlin. *Woman: A Theological Perspective: Bibliography and Addendum*. Berkeley: Graduate

Theological Union, Office of Women's Affairs, 1975. 47pp. Like Dorothy Bass's compilation (#300), *Woman: A Theological Perspective* includes a broad spectrum of material which ranges beyond works specifically on women and religious concerns. Fischer and Gatlin explain in their introduction that they have assumed an "elastic interpretation of what theological inquiry is about." They do not, however, specifically explain *how* the additional works have been selected beyond noting the interdisciplinary nature of women's studies, and need to understand the general history and status of women, and the parameters of feminist thinking. The bibliography is divided into nine sections: Bibliography and Resources; Women and—Scripture, History, Theology, Society, Psychology, Socialization, Art; and Women in Comparative Perspective. These are further subdivided, sometimes by form (books, articles), sometimes by subject. The compilation is eclectic and interesting, undoubtedly reflecting the concerns and interests of the editors. It is also quite substantial, approaching one thousand citations.

306 Kendall, Patricia A. *Women and the Priesthood: A Selected and Annotated Bibliography*. Philadelphia: Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania, 1976. 57pp. This bibliography was prepared as part of the work of the Committee to Promote the Cause of and to Plan for the Ordination of Women, appointed by the Diocese in 1974. Since the Committee's approach to the problem of the ordination of women was one of advocacy, so are the works cited in the bibliography. The primary objective was to compile materials providing "sound theological reasons for the ordination of women." The bibliography was designed for a lay audience, thus some interesting but difficult sources were not cited. The annotations are substantial; in the case of anthologies, each individual article is annotated.

## Sex Roles and Sex Differences

The degree to which the differences exhibited by men and women are due to nature—or to learned, sex-typed behavior—is now the object of much study: This section includes a number of bibliographies on sex-role research in general, the most comprehensive of which is Astin's Sex Roles: A Research Bibliography. Other bibliographies provide access to the literature on sex-stereotyped images in the media, sex differences in language, and sex differences in reading achievement.

- 312 Astin, Helen et al. *Sex Roles: A Research Bibliography*. Washington: National Institute of Mental Health, 1975. 362pp. This compilation is a substantial one (450 entries); probably the major bibliography of sex-role research. An initial search of the literature was made to determine a general framework of the research and to facilitate development of categories. Then, the categories were "filled in" with selections, giving an overview of the entire field. That is, the different areas of research were "highlighted" by an entry or two instead of being covered exhaustively. The studies cited range from 1960 to 1972, and the emphasis is on literature with an empirical basis. Thus, only a few feminist works are included. The bibliography is divided into five categories: sex differences; the origin of sex differences and development of sex roles; the manifestation of sex roles in various settings (family, work, school); overviews of the status of the sexes; and general reviews and theory on the process of socialization. Because these categories are broad and the research is often very specific and technical, a detailed subject index is included and should be used. The annotations are substantial and descriptive, generally running to two or three paragraphs. In addition to the subject index, subject descriptors printed in bold face are included with each citation. Overall, an indispensable volume.
- 313 Friedman, Leslie J. *Sex Role Stereotyping in the Mass Media: An Annotated Bibliography*. New York: Garland, 1977. 324pp. Friedman's bibliography covers all aspects of the communications media and is divided into sections by form:

mass media, advertising, broadcast, film, print, and popular culture (comics, science fiction, pornography). There are also sections on the media image of minority women and of men, on children's media, and on the impact of all this media on occupational choice. Works cited cover a broad range, from scholarly research studies to content analysis to feminist tracts to opinion polls. The annotations are incisive and very helpful. The introduction gives a good, brief overview of the problems of media stereotyping. There are author and subject indexes. An excellent reference tool for anyone doing research in the field.

- 314 Henley, Nancy and Barrie Thorne, *She Said/He Said: An Annotated Bibliography of Sex Differences in Language, Speech, and Nonverbal Communication*. Pittsburgh: KNOW, 1975. 311pp. This is a bibliography that has had a pre-publication life. Compilation began in 1972, and various informal editions circulated before this paper edition was published. It is divided into nine chapters: Comprehensive Sources; Vocabulary and Syntax; Phonology; Conversational Patterns; Women's and Men's Languages, Dialects; Multilingual Situations; Language and Acquisition; Verbal Ability; and Nonverbal Aspects of Communication. The annotations are thorough—many run to nearly a page in length. A final section lists women's organizations that are concerned with language issues. There is an author index.

publications cited in this bibliography are the result of that research. The citations are organized into seven sections according to form (papers, symposia, articles) and are listed chronologically within each section.

- 319 Sheridan, Marcia. *Sex Differences and Reading: An Annotated Bibliography*. Newark: International Reading Association, 1976. 40pp. Marcia Sheridan has reviewed the fairly substantial research on reading and reading achievement, using sex as a variable. Most of this literature has been published since the mid- to late sixties; only a dozen or so of the more than 150 titles predate 1960. Sheridan has grouped the citations according to the overall concern or topic of the research. This produces nine major sections, in addition to the general one on sex differences in reading; they are: Sex Differences Based on Reading Methods, Materials and Sex Differences, Sex of Teacher, Separate Sex Classes, Differences in Treatment of Boys and Girls, Sex Differences in Interest and Attitude, Sex Differences in Achievement, Cognitive and Psychological Sex Differences, Development of Sex Role. Each citation has an annotation that briefly summarizes the research.
- 320 Spiegel, Jeanne. *Sex Role Concepts: How Women and Men See Themselves and Each Other; A Selected Annotated Bibliography*. Washington: Business and Professional Women's Foundation, 1969. 31pp. This bibliography covers books, pamphlets, reports, theses, articles, and microfilm, all of which are available in the Foundation library. The citations are organized by type of material into chapters, and then listed alphabetically by author. The annotations are nonevaluative. The material included is limited to that published in the last fifteen years; it covers a wide spectrum—from the popular to the scholarly.
- 321 Tresemer, David. *Research on Fear of Success: Full Annotated Bibliography*. Washington: American Psychological Association, 1975. 179pp. In 1968, psychologist Matina Horner conducted a pioneering study on women's attitudes toward success out of which the "fear of success" construct was born. Since then, a great variety of research has been based on this construct. Tresemer has pulled together 186 citations to 155 studies which

followed Horner's, fully describing each one. The annotations provide information on the number and type of subjects used, details of measurement techniques employed, and full results of the study. Papers collected in the course of compiling the bibliography have been donated to the Sophia Smith Library at Smith College where they form the "Fear of Success Collection."

## Third-World Countries

This section focuses on three Third-World areas: Africa, India, and Latin America. Although many of the bibliographies in this section were not available for review, one can assume that the concentration on these particular geographical areas stems from the same research concerns seen in the Women and Development section—the crucial role of women in national economic development.

Hall, 1977. 696pp. This excellent bibliography attempts to be comprehensive and, by the size of it, appears to have succeeded. Geographically, it includes only the Spanish-speaking countries of Latin America. The earliest publications listed date from the seventeenth century, and there is nothing published after 1974. All material is in Spanish or English. There are fourteen major subject sections, with a geographical breakdown under each for Spanish America generally, Middle America, South America, and the Caribbean. There is a limited listing of Ph.D. and M.A. theses in the area. Scope notes begin each section and there are subject and author indexes.
- 333 Valdes, Nelson, P. "A Bibliography on Cuban Women in the Twentieth Century." *Cuban Studies Newsletter* 4(2):1-31, June 1974. "A Bibliography on Cuban Women" has two major parts: one on women in the prerevolutionary period (1900-1958) and the other on the revolution and after (1959-1973). The second section is about three times the size of the first. Each of the two parts has topical subcategories covering such areas as labor and production; social structure, family life, sex, politics, etc; the same categories were used for both parts to facilitate comparison. The literature deals primarily with the "socio-political-economic aspects" of women's lives in Cuba. About one-third of the 568 entries are briefly annotated, usually not more than a sentence.

## Women and Development

As the research into women's position in and contribution to society has grown, it has become cross-national in scope, and recently, women in world development has been the focus of much study. Women are now seen as a potential resource whose active participation in the labor force could tip the balance in the direction of prosperity for many developing economies. Bibliographies on population studies are listed here, because research into fertility and population is usually related to the economic status and labor force participation of women.

334 American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Services, Technical Assistance Information Clearinghouse. *Women: A Bibliography, 1975-6*. New York, 1976. 30pp. The Council frequently issues an updated bibliography of TAICH holdings on women. The materials are mostly on women and development, many of them are government and United Nations publications. Entries are briefly annotated.

336 Buvinic, Myra. *Women and World Development: An Annotated Bibliography*. Washington: Overseas Development Council, 1976. 162pp. Buvinic's bibliography is a companion volume to *Women and World Development*, edited by Irene Tinker and Michele Bo Bramsen, a summary of the proceedings of a 1975 seminar on women and development sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Science. Buvinic focuses on works concerning "the effects of socio-economic development and cultural change on women and on women's reactions to these changes." The bibliography has two stated objectives: first, to disseminate the information more widely since many of the studies listed are unpublished and second, to provide an overall view of the status of research. An introductory critical review discusses various areas of research and makes suggestions for the direction of future study. There are nine broad subject divisions.

each of which is divided geographically (multi-regional, Latin America and Caribbean, North Africa and Middle East, sub-Saharan Africa, Asia and Pacific, Europe and North America). Each citation is carefully annotated. An appendix lists other related bibliographies and special issues of periodicals on women and development. There is an author index.

The 287 annotated entries are classified by subject into ten chapters; each of these is subdivided by geographical area (multi-regional, Asia and the Pacific, Latin America and the Caribbean, Middle East and North Africa, sub-Saharan Africa). Extensive cross-referencing should provide all the additional subject access a user needs. In an introductory essay, Rihani summarizes the crucial concerns in planning for development "as if women mattered"; she also provides a survey of the findings and recommendations of the works listed in each section. This is a fine publication which should find many grateful users.

economic development published between 1940 and 1972. The bibliography is arranged by form of material into two sections: books/monographs and periodical articles.

- 341 United Nations, Food and Agricultural Organization. *Women and Family in Rural Development: Annotated Bibliography*. New York, 1977. 56pp. This is a computer-generated index of FAO documents published between 1966 and 1976.

## Women's Movement

Both the first and second wave of the women's movement are represented in this section's bibliographies. Six large volumes have been published since 1972, and one is encouraged both by the quantity and the range of feminist writing.

342 Franklin, Margaret Ladd. *The Case for Woman Suffrage: A Bibliography*. New York: National College Equal Suffrage League, 1913. 315pp. Reprint. Washington: Zenger Publishing, 1976. *The Case for Woman Suffrage* is the only bibliography I've found that comes close to being a "first wave" counterpart of the recent bibliographies in women's studies. Like many of the bibliographies here, it came from a strong social movement and was compiled with the college student in mind. The citations are arranged first by form (books, Congressional reports, leaflets, plays, periodical articles, contemporary suffrage periodicals) and then chronologically. The books section opens with a citation to Plato's *Republic*; it then jumps to the sixteenth century, covering the period from 1532 to 1911. There are a number of citations to pre-Wollstonecraft works. The Congressional documents section covers the period from 1874 to 1912, and the articles section from 1839 to 1912. Franklin has not defined her field narrowly and covers much more than the "case for woman suffrage," including a wide range of works on the need for women's economic, legal, and social equality. Most of the entries are annotated, some at length, and for the most part in a very engaging style. Franklin is not afraid to criticize and lets you know just what she thinks. The bibliography is available in a reprint edition and is an invaluable source.

343 Grimstad, Kirsten and Susan Rennie. *The New Woman's Survival Catalog*. New York: Coward, McCann and Geoghegan, 1973. 223pp. Out of print. This "Whole Earth Catalog" of the women's movement is not, strictly speaking, a bibliography. It warrants inclusion here, however, not only for the very substantial bibliographic function it does serve, but also as a movement "classic." The organization is somewhat disorderly, the coverage and text a bit uneven, but then so is the movement it catalogs.

344 ———. *The New Woman's Survival Sourcebook*. New York: Alfred A. Knopf, 1975. 245pp. A slightly different title and new publisher do not disguise what is the sequel to the *Catalog* listed above. While this volume is better organized and more thorough, it too reflects the diverse and ever-changing nature of the women's movement.

345 Krichmar, Albert. *The Women's Movement in the Seventies: An International English-Language Bibliography*. Metuchen: Scarecrow Press, 1977. 875pp. At first glance, the most noticeable aspect of this bibliography is its sheer size: 875 pages, nearly ten thousand citations, two and one-half inches thick, and weighing nearly three pounds. Enough to make the most stalwart bibliographer's head swim. Inside, however, the volume is organized so as to be quite comprehensible and easy to use. It is arranged geographically into nine major sections: International, Africa, Asia, Australia and Oceania, Europe, Latin America, Mid East, North America—Canada, North America—United States. Each of these primary continent divisions is subdivided two ways: by subject and by geographical area (country, state, or province). The subject divisions, which are uniform throughout, are: General, Cultural and Literary, Legal and Political, Psychological, Religious and Philosophical, Scientific and Technical, Sociological and Anthropological Studies. Works listed include Ph.D. dissertations, books, pamphlets, research reports, periodical articles, and government documents published between 1970 and 1975. They are English-language publications on the status of women in society with the emphasis "on change, attempted change, and continuing problems confronting women in the countries in which they live." Approximately seventy-five percent of the volume is devoted to the section on the United States, though not by design. The next largest section by country is the United Kingdom, with only six percent of the total; the drop is fairly dramatic. A little more than five thousand of the entries are annotated, or about sixty percent overall. This percentage is not uniform, however, with a greater proportion of the U.S. materials annotated. A final major section lists just over two hundred reference works. There is a complete author index and a substantial subject index of nearly one hundred pages.

- 346 ———. *The Women's Rights Movement in the U.S., 1848-1970*. Metuchen: Scarecrow Press, 1972. 436pp. This is more than just a bibliography, it is a handbook for anyone beginning serious study of the history of women's rights. Bringing together much important literature published between 1848 (the date of the first women's rights convention) and 1970, the bibliography includes books, articles, dissertations, pamphlets, and government publications. Relevant manuscript collections and movement periodicals both are listed with indexes. The volume is partially annotated.
- 347 Rowbotham, Sheila. *Women's Liberation and Revolution*. London: Falling Wall Press, 1973. 24pp. This bibliography was compiled as part of the research for Rowbotham's book *Women: Resistance and Revolution*. It includes books, pamphlets, and articles which explore the relationship between feminism and revolutionary politics. It is organized by subject and includes materials published up to February 1972.

Sun Press, the publisher, is the publications division of International Socialists and so the bibliography shows a small, but noticeable bias. A more annoying problem is the occasional incomplete citation. Other miscellaneous typing errors, incorrect dates, and so on, leave one questioning the bibliography's reliability.

## Work

The participation of women in the labor force and the discrimination against them as workers have been key issues in the women's movement—and the subject of many a volume as evidenced by the size of this section. With thirty-nine entries, it is second only to the general section. There are bibliographies here on a number of specific topics concerning the woman at work: part-time employment, equal pay for equal work, working mothers, night work, nontraditional occupations, the minimum wage. Several bibliographies cover the literature on legal matters relating to employment: equal employment opportunity, discrimination, affirmative action. Also included in this section are bibliographies on women who work but are not paid—homemakers and volunteers.

This bibliography is selective, including material of major importance published on working women in the United States through 1973. It is designed with researchers and serious students in mind. Subheads are: General, Historical Development, Education and Training, Working Women, Occupations, Special Groups, Public Policy, and Bibliographies. There are four indexes: author, subject, title, and KWIC (Key-Word-In-Context).

- 357 Catalyst. *InSight Bibliography Series*. Catalyst, a research and publishing organization concerned with women's employment, has produced a series of brief (the longest is six pages) bibliographies on a wide range of issues surrounding the working woman. Currently, there are approximately forty bibliographies available, with titles such as *Absenteeism and Turnover of Women Workers*, *Child-Care Deductions*, *Alternative Work Patterns*, and *Women in Academia* (or one of several other careers). Most of the current set was compiled in 1975, but an update is in progress as of this writing. This series is an excellent source of information on new trends and issues in the employment of women. Write for a publications/price list.
- 358 Center for Women Policy Studies. *Resource Listing: Wage-Earning Women*. Washington, n.d. 8pp. Out of print. This brief listing is in five sections: General, Blue Collar Workers, Statistics, Unions, and Vocational Education.
- 359 Elkin, Anna. *The Emerging Role of Mature Women: Basic Background Data in Employment and Continuing Education*. New York: Federation Employment and Guidance Service, 1976. 20pp. Elkin's bibliography includes "relevant, free and inexpensive" materials on the mature woman, women's education, and women's employment for the period 1969-1975. It is a straight alphabetical listing with no subject index, which makes it a bit difficult to use. Nevertheless, the annotations are helpful and a wide variety of material is covered.
- 360 Felmley, Jenrose. *Working Women: Homemakers and Volunteers: An Annotated Selected Bibliography*. Washington: Business and Professional Women's Foundation, 1975. 25pp. The introduction to this bibliography is a review essay on the literature. There are eighty-two entries listed alphabetically by main entry.
- 361 Feminist Theory Collective. *American Women: Our Lives and Labor, An Annotated Bibliography of Women and Work in the U.S., 1900-1975*. Eugene: Amazon Reality, 1976. 36pp. This bibliography comes, as many do, from a feminist study group

anxious to share the results of its work. The majority of works listed are on women and work in the twentieth century, but there are two short sections on general historical works and the nineteenth century. The bibliography is selective; criteria for inclusion were readability, availability, inclusion of minority women. Material on housework as work was sought, as were personal accounts and fiction. There is a general emphasis throughout on women in social movements and union organizing. The annotations are quite good.

- 362 Foreman, Jo Ann T. *Women: A Selected Annotated Bibliography on Their Equal Opportunity and Employment*. Baton Rouge: Louisiana State University, College of Business Administration, Division of Research, 1973. 20 pp. Foreman has divided her bibliography into two parts: an annotated listing of twenty citations to books and articles and a listing of approximately 175 additional citations (the first twenty repeat) which are not annotated. The second section is divided into subcategories by form: books, articles, government documents, and miscellaneous (mostly unpublished) papers. There is no introduction, so we have no explanation of how or why the twenty citations were chosen for annotation. Most of the materials listed are fairly recent—concentrating in the 1960s and 70s—though the books section includes some works published in the early part of the century and the 1890s. The subject coverage is broad, including overviews of women's labor force participation and status, analysis of and remedies for employment discrimination, and women in business and management.

For instance, the first and largest chronological category, Colonial Period to 1890, has only twenty-nine citations, while the smallest of the other sections, 1915 to 1930, has sixty-nine citations for the fifteen year period. *Women and Employment* is perhaps better described as an extensive list of sources on women and work in the twentieth century (nearly 475 entries out of the total 550).
- 369 Moore, Louise. *Occupations for Girls and Women: Selected References, July 1943-June 1948*. Washington: U.S. Department of Labor, Women's Bureau, 1942. Out of print.
- 370 Moser, Collette and Deborah Johnson. *Rural Women Workers in the Twentieth Century: An Annotated Bibliography*. East Lansing: Michigan State University, College of Agriculture and Natural Resources, Department of Agricultural Economics, 1973. 63pp. This bibliography includes all formats of material (books, articles, etc.), with some pieces dating back to the nineteenth century. The authors have defined "rural" to include both farm and nonfarm work, household and manual labor. Different sections cover women's preparation for work, the qualitative and quantitative aspects of their labor force participation, their problems in working, farm and women's organizations, and international trends.
- 371 Nicolas, Suzanne. *Bibliography on Women Workers 1861-1965*. Geneva: International Labour Office, Central Library and



- Documentation Branch, 1970. 252pp. Most of the nearly 1,800 works cited in this bibliography are either government documents or publications of the International Labour Office itself. The volume is divided into eleven broad subject sections. It includes many foreign language works. There are subject, geographical, and author indexes that were computer-generated.
- 372 Pinto, Patrick R. and Jeanne O. Buchmeier. *Problems and Issues in the Employment of Minority, Disadvantaged and Female Groups: An Annotated Bibliography*. ERIC, 1973. 62pp. (ED 083 339). This bibliography lists selected materials published from July 2, 1965—the effective date of Title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act—to 1972. It includes books, articles, reports, and government documents.
- 373 Samuels, Victoria. *Nowhere to Be Found, A Literature Review and Annotated Bibliography on White Working Class Women*. New York: Institute on Pluralism and Group Identity, 1975. 29 pp. While it is only a beginning, Samuels's literature review is both interesting and helpful. She points to the paucity of material on the working-class woman and offers some explanations. Her underlying theme is the lack of communication and understanding between the women's movement and working-class women. She blames the stereotyped media image of each—and both groups' willingness to believe in it. She discusses only eight works in the literature review and annotates in depth an additional twenty-nine in the bibliography section. Nevertheless, this is a valuable compilation.
- 374 Schroeder, Paul E. *Women in the World of Work: A Bibliography of ERIC Documents*. ERIC, 1973. 29pp. (ED 083 479).
- 375 Soltow, Martha J. and Mary K. Wery. *American Women and the Labor Movement, 1825-1974*. Metuchen: Scarecrow Press, 1976. 247pp. This revised edition of Soltow's bibliography brings the inclusive dates up to 1974—the original edition covered the period up to 1935. It is selective, annotated, and includes books, articles, pamphlets, and U.S. government documents. The section on women in unions has been expanded, a section on the Coalition of Labor Union Women added. Materials on employ-

ment discrimination and protective legislation receive less emphasis as they are covered in other bibliographies. An appendix lists archival sources on women and labor. There is a cross-reference, a subject, and an author index. (Original edition: Soltow, Martha J. 376 Spiegel, Jeanne. *Working Mothers: A Selected Annotated Bibliography*. Washington: Business and Professional Women's Foundation, 1968. 24pp. The materials covered are those about and of interest to working mothers published within the last ten to fifteen years. Books, pamphlets, reports, periodical articles, microfilm, and tape recordings are included. The citations are arranged into chapters by type of material and then listed alphabetically by author. Everything listed is available in the Foundation library. Annotations are descriptive.

377 U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Office of Education, Bureau of Occupational and Adult Education. *Women in Non-Traditional Occupations—A Bibliography*. Washington, 1976. 189pp. Because there is no detailed, widely-accepted definition of which occupations are traditional or non-traditional for women, a working definition was developed for the preparation of this bibliography. The percentage of women in the labor force in 1970—the cut-off publication date for inclusion of materials—was established from government statistics. This figure, thirty-eight percent, was then used as a base, so that any field less than thirty-eight percent female was regarded as nontraditional. The materials collected using these guidelines were organized into three categories: Overview, Women in the Skilled Trades, and Women in Professional Occupations. The third section is by far the largest. The annotations are descriptive only. There are author, title, and subject indexes.

378 U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics. *Where to Find BLS Statistics on Women*. Washington, 1978. This slim pamphlet is an excellent guide that takes one by the hand through the maze of government publications on working women. There are statistical areas covered in four sections: Labor

Force Status, Employment and Unemployment; Earnings and Hours of Work; Education; Membership in Labor Organizations. The information is organized into four columns for easy access: Characteristics of Data Desired, Where Published, Frequency of Publication, and Most Recent Issue. Complete ordering information is given in a section at the back. For anyone who needs access to government statistics, this is a lifesaver.

379 U.S. Department of Labor, Women's Bureau. *Bibliography on Night Work for Women*. Washington, 1946. 39pp. Out of print. The bibliography covers reports from government agencies, research agencies, academic institutions, personnel officers, and psychologists, primarily from the years 1936 to 1946. The selections are annotated, and the annotations are quite long, including tables. The citations are arranged by country—United States, Great Britain, and Australia—and subdivided into government and private sources under each. There is a final section on international publications.

380 ———. *Employment of Older Women: An Annotated Bibliography*. Washington, 1954. 89pp. Out of print. Included in this bibliography are articles, books, and conference papers dealing with hiring practices, psychological barriers, and work performance in the employment of older women. The annotations, which are quite long and detailed, are listed alphabetically by author and are numbered; access is through the subject index.

Washington, 1972. 15pp. Compiled to help those drafting affirmative action plans find statistics to back up their cases, this bibliography indicates whether or not each publication includes data based on sex, race, educational attainment, labor force participation, occupation, and industry. Publications are listed by the following subjects: population, education, civic labor force and unemployment, occupation and industry, and labor force

reserve. Also indicated is whether or not data relates to United States, region, state, or Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area (metropolitan areas of more than fifty thousand population).

This bibliography is international in scope and includes articles, government reports, court decisions, and industry and union bulletins. There are occasional annotations. The bibliography has been divided into chapters which include: Bibliographies; U.S., General; U.S., States Which Have Adopted Minimum Wage Laws; U.S., Other States; Canada.

Only cases involving federal law have been included, and only those articles published between 1969 and 1975. The bibliography is arranged by case, rather than title or author, with all citations to relevant articles listed under each. The major points and arguments of each case are given, which makes the bibliography very useful to the uninitiated legal researcher. Part II was never published.

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
