AERIAL AMERICA: FROM SEA TO SHINING SEA. Aerial Photo. Serv., 1977. 55 p.
\$1.75 paper. Grades 7-12

Splendid array of color photographs of all 50 states' outstanding sites and landmarks: bridges, forts, mountains, parks, cities, buildings; arranged in order states were admitted to Union, text contains brief, but flattering discussion of states' historic backgrounds, brief description of photographs, notes capital cities; approximately five pictures per state; special recognition of Kitty Hawk where "roots of AERIAL AMERICA are planted"; includes alphabetical index of states and photographs, map of U.S.; hours of entertaining, educational browsing for those with love of American heritage; questionable durability

Agonito, Rosemary. HISTORY OF IDEAS ON WOMAN: A SOURCE BOOK. Putnam, 1977.
414 p. \$12.95. Grades 10-12

Primary sources trace history of ideas on women in Western Civilization-- from Genesis account of creation to U.N. Declaration of Women's Rights; selections, each of which is preceded by short introduction, include such thinkers as Plato, Francis Bacon, Mary Wollstonecraft, Freud, Nietzsche, de Beauvoir, Friedan, Marcuse; biographical notes included; sophisticated nature of material limits book's use; distinct possibilities for independent study under teacher supervision

Agostinelli, Maria. ON WINGS OF LOVE: THE UNITED NATIONS DECLARATION OF THE RIGHTS OF THE CHILD. Collins Pubs., 1979. unpag. \$6.95. Grades K-3

Aesthetically beautiful interpretation of the ten principles regarding children's rights adopted by United Nations in 1950; double-page, richly colored illustrations feature white dove as prevailing symbol of harmony, mercy; boldly printed text simplifies the formal list of principles cited at end; guaranteed to capture, stir young reader's attention, imagination (Fayetteville City)

Albert, Burton, Jr. MORE CODES FOR KIDS. Whitman, 1979. 32 p. \$4.13.
Grades 4-7

Gallery of hidden messages and codes abound in this collection which is complete with keys to unraveling mystery notes, directions for sending one's own code using array of combinations of letters, numbers, words, special devices; great variety in format: illustrations, methods for writing in code, humor, mystery; sure to challenge the detective-minded youngster for hours

Allen, George N. RI. Prentice, 1978. 251 p. \$7.95. Grades 10-12

Poignant narrative tells true story of Ken Armstrong, U.S. Army medic who unrelentingly works for his family's adoption of Ri, eight-year-old Vietnam orphan; demanding to be read from introduction to conclusion, text gives haunting picture of war, orphans, bureaucratic rules, military, romance; colored with enough barracks' language to lend credibility; proof that all boundaries are crossed by love, understanding; for mature young adults; preview before purchase (Lincoln County)

Ancona, George. GROWING OLDER. Dutton, 1978. unpag. \$7.95. Grades 7-12

Sensitive handling of aging obtained from tape recordings with multi-ethnic, elderly people; touching photography captures zest for life, experiences written across faces of these people; recounts, in varying degrees of depth, autobiographical glimpses of family life, childhood and adult memories, comments on growing old; useful for photography students, research for U.S. History students (Goldsboro City)

Appignanesi, Richard. LENIN FOR BEGINNERS. Rev. ed. Pantheon, 1978. 172 p.
\$2.95 paper. Grades 10-12

Clever guide to Russian Revolution, arranged chronologically from Reform of 1861 to Lenin's death in 1924; behind bizarre black-and-white pictures, cartoons lurk Hegel and dialectical materialism, socialism, the Mensheviks; entertaining, historically accurate, easy-to-read source for advanced students, teachers of government, philosophy; short bibliography provided (Wake County)

Armstrong, Louise. HOW TO TURN UP INTO DOWN INTO UP: A CHILD'S GUIDE TO INFLATION, DEPRESSION, AND ECONOMIC RECOVERY. Harcourt, 1978. unp. \$4.95.
\$1.95 paper. Grades 4-6

Craftily uses child's lemonade stand to discuss such terms as "price hike," "wage hikes," "wage-price spiral," "inflation," "small business failures"; answers may be simplified, but the idea is to help students understand terms they hear; excellent cause-and-effect examples; gray cartoon drawings tinted with lemon yellow, elucidate text; effective discussion starter (Caldwell County)

Asher, Maxine. ANCIENT ENERGY: KEY TO THE UNIVERSE. Harper, 1979. 181 p.
\$8.95. Grades 10-12

Fascinating, first-person account of "ancient" energy present in the world; this energy source--believed existing in such places as Stonehenge, Great Pyramid, fabled Atlantis--has been basis for much study, research throughout the ages; Edgar Cayce called it "universal knowledge which has only to be tapped"; author discusses work of many researchers, including Dr. Rhinè of Duke University, and cites specific personal sensations, hypothesis regarding her experiences; appended reference information includes glossary, guide to archaeological sites, foods increasing energy flow, learning activities, extensive bibliography (Person County, Lexington City)

Asimov, Isaac. ANIMALS OF THE BIBLE. Doubleday, 1978. unp. \$7.90. Grades 3-6

Delightful work which studies animals of the Bible; gives origin of various species, their utilization, interpretation in Bible; elegantly illustrated in shades of rust and gray; pictorial cover, brief paragraphs, lucid, informative style make this a worthwhile addition to any elementary school library (Fayetteville City)

Bailey, F. Lee, with John Greenya. CLEARED FOR THE APPROACH: F. LEE BAILEY IN DEFENSE OF FLYING. Prentice, 1977. 211 p. \$9.95. Grades 9-12

Using fatal TWA crash at Dulles airport in 1974 as point of departure, Bailey presents arguments for defense of aviation as an industry, vocation, avocation; first part of book deals with facts surrounding accident; second part deals with an individual's love of flying; fair treatment given to failings and accomplishments of government, industry, individuals

Bales, Carol Ann. TALES OF THE ELDERS: A MEMORY BOOK OF MEN AND WOMEN WHO CAME TO AMERICA AS IMMIGRANTS, 1900-1930. Follett, 1977. 160 p. \$6.99.
Grades 7-12

Collection of twelve memoirs, stemming from Great Migration of 1900-30; each story, while being complete and unique, is also universal in its connection to mankind through similar deep-lying hopes, fears; immigrants from Russia and Ukraine, Germany, Japan, Poland, Mexico, Netherlands, Italy, Scotland, Greece, Sweden, Ireland tell stories full of absorbing human-interest anecdotes; arresting vignettes, interesting glimpses of determined people making daily living a great success; illustrated with revealing black-and-white photographs of individual narrators; splendid for history, sociology, folklore enthusiasts

Barker, Albert. FROM SETTLEMENT TO CITY. Messner, 1978. 64 p. \$6.97.
Grades 4-6

Traces development of an American settlement into a city from pioneer days to present; includes inventions and their results on settlement's growth, problems resulting from growth, future aid for cities; also discusses supplies needed for pioneer families on trail, use of Montgomery Ward Catalogues for reading in school, emigrants, statehood, formation of city government, typhoid epidemic; black-and-white photographs, sketches provide interesting complement to text; indexed (Caldwell County)

Barnouw, Erik. THE SPONSER: NOTES ON A MODERN POTENTATE. Oxford U. Pr., 1978. 220 p. \$10. Grades 10-12

Described on Fall 1978 Media Education Advisory List

Bartel, Pauline. BIORHYTHM: DISCOVERING YOUR NATURAL UPS AND DOWNS. Watts, 1978. 77 p. \$4.90. Grades 10-12

Effectively presents biorhythm theory as system which determines "good" and "bad" days for human beings; provides validating statistics in mental, physical, emotional areas; much inductive reasoning contained in written and charted information; text is not always aided by the numerous full pages of diagrams; could be helpful to mature student interested in biorhythms (Lincoln County)

Barth, Edna. SHAMROCKS, HARPS, AND SHILLELAGHS: THE STORY OF ST. PATRICK'S DAY SYMBOLS. Seabury, 1977. 96 p. \$7.95. Grades 4-6

Examines legends, symbols, traditions, customs associated with St. Patrick's Day from early times to present; alludes to leprechauns, "sprig of shillelagh," wearing of green, Irish shamrock and gives detailed information about life of St. Patrick himself; two-colored line drawings in green and black appear on almost every page; bibliography of St. Patrick's Day stories, index conclude the book (Caldwell County)

Baskir, Lawrence M., and William A. Strauss. CHANCE AND CIRCUMSTANCE: THE DRAFT, THE WAR, AND THE VIETNAM GENERATION. Vintage, 1978. 312 p. \$4.95 paper. Grades 10-12

Cogent examination of military draft system during one of America's most devastating wars--Vietnam; tracks reasons why many Americans were able to evade or "dodge" the draft successfully; concise, provocative monograph contains wide range of controversial issues, social implications; extensive notes on each chapter, lengthy bibliography grouped by content of entries, detailed index; for sophisticated students with keen interest in U.S. History, contemporary America (Fayetteville City)

Behrens, June, and Pauline Brower. LIGHTHOUSE FAMILY. Childrens, 1979. 31 p. \$5.95. Grades 2-5

Interesting, readable portrayal--using numerous, clearly delineated color photographs--of a real family of lighthouse keepers; text, made up of cleanly constructed sentences, tells story in concise terms; large print, attractive format, color cover sure to attract peruser's attention (Cumberland County)

Berenstain, Michael. THE LIGHTHOUSE BOOK. McKay, 1979. unpag. \$6.95. Grades 3-6

Intriguingly depicts crudest source of light for ships in ancient times, a bonfire, to the stark, self-sufficient modern lighthouses; appraises through succinct text, extraordinary pen-and-ink illustrations the historical significance of lighthouses, including Pharos of Egypt, Eddystone lights of England;

cutaways reveal interior uses of lighthouses; copyright page contains sketches of North American lighthouses, including Cape Hatteras and Cape Lookout (Goldsboro City)

Berenstain, Michael. THE SHIP BOOK. McKay, 1978. unp. \$6.95. Grades 3-6

Presents history of ships in simple text; contains information on dug-out canoe, Egyptian reed boats, Greek and Roman ships, Viking ships, Columbus's ships, the Spanish Armada, Arab dhow, Chinese junk, whaling ships; concentrates on the U.S.S. *Constitution* with two-page cutaway, explanation of below-deck quarters, work of crew; mentions use of sailing ships in present U.S. Coast Guard; detailed black-and-white illustrations, with several cutaways on every page; introduction to history of ships should delight young readers (Caldwell County)

Berger, Michael L. THE PUBLIC EDUCATION SYSTEM. Watts, 1977. 108 p. \$5.90. Grades 8-12

Unbiased presentation of public schools' development from infancy to the present complicated institution involving everyone in society; since school is now necessary for more and more people, it is often being affected by individuals and government--sometimes benefiting, sometimes clouding situations; accompanying cartoons are occasionally ambiguous in implication; instructional supplement for study of where schools began, where they may be going; bibliography, index provide easy reference (Lincoln County)

Berry, James R. KIDS ON THE RUN: THE STORIES OF SEVEN TEEN-AGE RUNAWAYS. Four Winds, 1978. 105 p. \$5.95. Grades 7-12

Plight of teenage runaways, told through personal accounts, reveals reasons for leaving home, living conditions of runaways; problems runaways must face include hunger, cold, rain, hitchhiking, loneliness, no decent place to sleep; materials gathered from runaways themselves contains excellent brief statements about the runaway problem, available help; narratives are highlighted in boldface type, with author's comments in regular print; valuable, authoritative coverage; Introduction contains background information of this study, while Epilogue suggests places, organizations runaways can contact (Wilkes County)

Biko, Steve. Edited by Millard Arnold. BLACK CONSCIOUSNESS IN SOUTH AFRICA. Vintage, 1978. 360 p. \$5.95 paper. Grades 10-12

Day-to-day transcript of Steve Biko's cross-examination during trial of nine South African Nationalists in 1976; provides student with historically rich information, inside view of personalities and situations, insight into Black Nationalist movement; lengthy introduction gives background of Steve Biko, Black Consciousness Movement, events leading to trial; excellent appendix contains comments, report on Biko's death; worthwhile purchase (Fayetteville City)

Biko, Steve. I WRITE WHAT I LIKE. A Selection of His Writings Edited With A Personal Memoir by Aelred Stubbs, C. R. Harper, 1978. 216 p. \$8.95. Grades 10-12

Introduces the reader to Steve Biko, known as the father of Black Nationalism in South Africa; collection of speeches, interviews, essays, correspondence, trial transcripts reflects numerous Black Nationalist themes; historical and personal perspective are established in final memoir by Aelred Stubbs, an Episcopal priest and personal friend (Fayetteville City)

Blumberg, Rhoda. UFO. Watts, 1977. 63 p. \$4.47. Grades 5-7

Factual report of UFO's, including definition, discussion of false and true UFO reportings; provides logical explanations for many sightings; offers brief history of UFO reportings; numerous black-and-white pictures will stimulate, encourage readers; viable introduction to in-depth study or for cursory consideration of this subject

Bowe, Frank. HANDICAPPING AMERICA: BARRIERS TO DISABLED PEOPLE. Harper, 1978. 254 p. \$9.95. Grades 10-12

Interesting, readable attempt to examine American attitudes about disabled people; clear text, citing numerous examples, reveals obstacles handicapped individuals face from "general" population; appendices include list of organizations for disabled, available government programs, chapter notes, considerable number of sources, detailed index; for reference, sociology classes (Fayetteville City)

Brin, Ruth F. CONTRIBUTIONS OF WOMEN: SOCIAL REFORM. Dillon, 1977. 160 p. \$6.95. Grades 7-12

Lucid biographies of six American women (Harriet Tubman, Frances Willard, Jane Addams, Florence Kelley, Margaret Sanger, Eleanor Roosevelt), brief portraits of ten others who have made contributions to social reform; clearly relates lives, accomplishments of these women to events, trends of their eras and discusses long-range effects of their works; black-and-white photographs enhance absorbing subject matter; list of selected readings appended; for enrichment, reference

Bulger, William T., and Frank O. Ranger. THE GREAT AMERICAN QUIZ BOOK. Pagurian Press, 1977. (Available from Dutton.) 189 p. \$8.95. \$3.95 paper. Grades 5-12

Provides trivia and tidbits of American history; answers such questions as, "Which president's wife smoked a corn cob pipe?", "When is Election Day?"; witty introduction sketches historical myths, penetrates unrealistic reverence for past presidents; loosely organized into topics of presidential quizzes, nicknames, vice presidents, events and places, miscellaneous trivia quizzes; question-answer style will appeal to readers (Goldsboro City)

Cate, Curtis. THE IDES OF AUGUST: THE BERLIN WALL CRISIS, 1961. Evans, 1978. 534 p. \$15. Grades 10-12

Highly readable account of the "Berlin Crisis" from construction of Berlin Wall to ultimate challenge of Cuban Missile Crisis; enlivened by personal accounts of struggles and tragedies; specific footnotes for reference, glossary of German terms; few pages of black-and-white news photographs (Wake County)

Catton, Bruce, and William B. Catton. THE BOLD AND MAGNIFICENT DREAM: AMERICA'S FOUNDING YEARS, 1492-1815. Doubleday, 1978. 495 p. \$12.50. Grades 11-12

Well-written, carefully documented history of United States from its European discovery in 1492 to conclusion of War of 1812 in 1815; chronological format presents engrossing analysis of effects of European customs and beliefs on America's character development, origins of political theories; useful bibliography of sources for further consultation (Wake County)

CHARLIE BROWN'S THIRD SUPER BOOK OF QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS, ABOUT ALL KINDS OF BOATS AND PLANES, CARS AND TRAINS AND OTHER THINGS THAT MOVE. Random, 1978. 151 p. \$6.99. Grades 4-7

Charlie Brown answers questions about travel on land, sea, and in the air in this third of the SUPER BOOK OF QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS series; lavishly illustrated, using bold questions and answers that combine color photographs, short descriptive answers, Peanuts cartoons which add a touch of humor to each page; questions cover topics from the simple, "What is a balloon?" to somewhat more complex ideas, "How can cargo ships load and unload?"

Chester, Michael. LET'S GO TO FIGHT A FOREST FIRE. Putnam, 1978. 47 p. \$4.29. Grades 3-5

Steve, one of a group of young campers, spots and reports a forest fire; there follows an accurate account of Forestry Service's firefighting techniques, adequately covering effective use of chemicals, various vehicles; dangers and destruction are emphasized; large print, black-and-white drawings will stimulate interest; included are discussion questions, glossary; excellent for use with third grade firefighting unit, fourth and fifth grade social studies groups (Caldwell County)

Cohen, Daniel. CEREMONIAL MAGIC. Four Winds, 1979. 152 p. \$7.95. Grades 9-12

Historical account of various practitioners of high or ceremonial magic, defined as magic of the educated, which is different from black magic; several stories tell of how magicians came to no good through actions of the Church, the Devil, or their patrons; useful as a resource for research on esoteric magic; index; illustrated by black-and-white drawings which include a nude female "spirit"

Cohen, Daniel. CREATURES FROM UFO'S. Dodd, 1978. 122 p. \$5.95. Grades 4-8

Easy-to-read book centers on encounters with unidentified flying objects, related occurrences; descriptive text is supplemented by photographs and illustrations, some of which are amateurish; popularity of UFO topic will probably make this book a well-received addition to collections (Fayetteville City)

Cohen, Daniel. MISSING! STORIES OF STRANGE DISAPPEARANCES. Dodd, 1979. 111 p. \$5.95. Grades 6-9

Six unsolved mysteries about real people who have disappeared: Judge Crater, Michael Rockefeller, fossils of the Peking Man, the crew of the *MARY CELESTE*, several others; author offers possible explanations; low-level vocabulary, interesting subject matter will attract mystery buffs; photographs are sprinkled throughout as page fillers (Goldsboro City)

Cohen, Daniel. MYSTERIES OF THE WORLD. Doubleday, 1979. 127 p. \$8.90. Grades 9-12

Casual, yet entertaining examination of ten lesser known mysteries of the world, such as levitation, werewolves, doppelganger theory; informal style establishes light tone, but references to writers and scientists afford this thin book with large print a degree of sophistication; black-and-white reproductions, photographs, drawings are appropriate illustrations, but are not discussed in text; thorough index, selected bibliography for each chapter will be helpful for quick reference, other available sources

Cohen, Daniel. REAL GHOSTS. Dodd, 1977. 125 p. \$5.95. Grades 3-5

Collection of ghost stories taken from files of British Society for Psychical Research; some occurrences examined in text have proved to be mistakes or fakes, but some are still unsolved; while low vocabulary level, high-interest content, large print will make this selection popular in grades 3-5, it may prove useful for reluctant readers in higher grades; illustrated with black-and-white drawings, photographs; index included (Caldwell County)

Cohen, Daniel. YOUNG GHOSTS. Dutton, 1978. 90 p. \$7.95. Grades 6-9

Assortment of ghost stories about youthful spooks who haunt their former surroundings in England and America; author discusses possible sources of stories, speculates on their validity; highly readable short accounts will appeal to most readers; some stories speak of slit throats, murders, brutal beatings; illustrated with black-and-white photographs, drawings; contains bibliography of additional readings; indexed

Collier, Zena. SEVEN FOR THE PEOPLE: PUBLIC INTEREST GROUPS AT WORK. Messner, 1979. 191 p. \$7.79. Grades 6-9

Brief description of seven interest groups giving reasons for their inception and current focuses; groups included are ACLU, Common Cause, Urban League, League of Women Voters, NOW, Sierra Club, and Ralph Nader; unbiased presentation stresses ideals of "American way"; suggests ways that public and private sectors are affected by these groups; intriguing, informative, easily read supplement to understanding democracy (Lincoln County)

Comins, Jeremy. CHINESE AND JAPANESE CRAFTS AND THEIR CULTURAL BACKGROUNDS. Described on Cultural Arts Advisory List

Cottle, Thomas J. PRIVATE LIVES AND PUBLIC ACCOUNTS. New Viewpoints, 1977. 189 p. \$4.95 paper. Grades 10-12

Unique exploration of private attitudes presented in accounts of regular conversations carried on for several years with widely divergent individuals; this record of human behavior and thought is expressed in words of poor, affluent, Bostonian, British, old, young subjects; final chapter examines pitfalls of sociological studies; unusual, interesting approach for students of sociology or psychology (Goldsboro City)

Cox, John. OVERKILL: WEAPONS OF THE NUCLEAR AGE. Crowell, 1977. 208 p. \$7.89. Grades 11-12

\$8.95. Grades 10-12

Traditional survey of events which led to World War II; emphasis is solely political, European--with only a cursory look at Japan, Asia and no mention of intellectual malaise that haunted German middle classes or of life in 1920's-30's; includes coverage of major events, personalities of pre-World War II Europe in direct style; only two black-and-white pictures, a few maps; full bibliography, suggested readings, detailed index provide easy reference (Wake County)

Morgenstern, Steve, ed. INSIDE THE TV BUSINESS. Sterling, 1979. 223 p.
\$14.95. Grades 11-12

Series of interviews in which television executives describe several facets of the business side of commercial television; production costs, viewership, ratings, profits, syndication and scheduling are a few topics mentioned; though frank and timely, book has major disadvantage of being about current shows, so will probably go out of date very quickly (Cumberland County)

Thorough coverage of the life of Abraham Lincoln, emphasizing 16th president's courage, perseverance, compassion; sensitive, articulate narration by Barry Sullivan accompanies vivid dioramas, mock-ups which follow Lincoln's life-- his birth in Kentucky, his youth in Indiana, the start of his law and political career in Illinois, his presidency, his stand on Reconstruction in South, his assassination; postcard-like format contains only two scenes of live action; suitable for studies of famous Americans, presidents, heroes, U.S. History

BANANAS: GOLD FROM THE TROPICS. Centron, 1979. 16mm. 9 min. sd. guide color \$150. Grades 5-10

Brief, informational film on the production of bananas; opening with a statement about the popularity of bananas, discussion then moves to banana planting, pest control, harvesting, processing, and shipping; useful supplement to studies of Latin America, world geography

BRAZIL: SOUTH AMERICA'S GIANT. BFA, 1979. 16mm. 18 min. sd. guide color \$310. Grades 7-12

An up-to-date scrutiny of Brazil from Portuguese colonization to vastly successful multiracial society of today; focuses on country's geographic, economic, social diversity; pinpoints importance of such cities as Manaus, Salvador which contrast to tourist appeal to Rio de Janeiro, futuristic new capital, Brasilia; fast moving, high-quality script; while emphasizing positive aspects of Brazil, film also touches on negative aspects, such as overly populated "shanty areas"; vibrant color (Goldsboro City, Fayetteville City, Lincoln County)

CHINA: AN EMERGING GIANT. Natl. Geog., 1978. 16mm. 25 min. sd. guide color \$350. Grades 7-12

Articulate narration, unobtrusive oriental music provide background for this vivid display of Chinese people's perseverance, industriousness, sense of teamwork; highly stimulating presentation centers on gradually emerging industrial base of China's economy; logical, coherent progression from primary importance of agriculture to 20th century demands for industrial productivity; one weakness is concentration on exemplary kinetic achievements; alludes to government's involvement in Chinese people's lives, work, but there is little here to raise questions, generate critical evaluations of political, social, economic policies; illuminating, reproducible teacher's guide

CHINA'S CHANGING FACE. Natl. Geog., 1978. 16mm. 25 min. sd. guide color \$350. Grades 7-12

Briefly describes history of China to Revolution, endeavors to show how country is striving to change, meet needs of its nearly one billion people; pinpoints problems which result from China's lack of technology, its reliance on human energy to achieve goals; continuous action, clear narration, typical high-quality National Geographic cinematography increase usability of this informative look at China; lacks critical analysis of China's manner of reaching its goals, but teacher could direct this kind of questioning; accompanying teacher's guide contains synopsis, background information, suggested activities

CITIES: ELIE WIESEL'S JERUSALEM. Learning Corp., 1978. 16mm. 50 min. sd. guide color \$595. Grades 9-12

Wiesel's personal tribute to "the city of peace" emphasizes theme that visitors to magnificent Jerusalem, destroyed and rebuilt 17 times, become its pilgrims and its messengers; examination of such historic and contemporary points of interest as the Wailing Wall, Holy Sepulchre, Old and New Jerusalem underscore the spiritual attachment which divergent sects hold for this city of faith; frequent use of Hebrew words, accentuation of Jewish tie to Jerusalem may limit audience appeal; but perhaps this emphasis could partially explain the continuation of Arab-Israeli War; splendid, impressive production

CITIES: GEORGE PLIMPTON'S NEW YORK. Learning Corp., 1978. 16mm. 50 min. sd. guide color \$595. Grades 10-12

George Plimpton, native New Yorker, defends New York City as an exciting place to live--where even "the extraordinary is commonplace"; in conversational tone Plimpton emphasizes the city's diversity with interesting segment on Ellis Island (processing center for millions of America's immigrants), with shots of parades and street fairs, and visits to Harlem, theater district, Stock Exchange; valuable for examining role of cities in development of modern man, for study of American lifestyles and attendant stresses; breathtaking aerial photography complements informative narrative and sea of New York faces

CITIES: PETER USTINOV'S LENINGRAD. Learning Corp., 1978. 16mm. 50 min. sd. guide color \$595. Grades 10-12

Getting past Russian censors almost guarantees blandness, but Peter Ustinov's dry wit makes this an enjoyable educational film; Leningrad, gorgeous, majestic city filled with magnificent buildings, is rich in history, tradition; language barriers and fear of government reprisal prevent communication with people, but Ustinov makes literary, historical references to Dostoevsky, Pushkin, Lenin, Hitler's invasion, meticulous reconstruction of church buildings and czarist palaces, while he strolls past exemplary architecture and discusses elegant surroundings; a truly beautiful experience, this film could be used for world cultures, social studies, architectural/design/art classes

CITIES: R. D. LAING'S GLASGOW. Learning Corp., 1978. 16mm. 50 min. sd. guide color \$595. Grades 10-12

Bold documentary narrated by R. D. Laing--poet, philosopher, native of Glasgow--who effectively reveals characteristics, history of the people and the city; film observes hardy Scots in taverns, at the university, at a football match, in an amusement park, in industry; inspects both opulence and squalor of the city; atmosphere of film and Glasgow is gloomy, interspersed with people who are robust, intelligent, impassioned; valuable for study of Scots, influential peoples in the development of America

COFFEE PRODUCTION IN LATIN AMERICA (Revised). Centron, 1979. 16mm. 9 min. sd. guide color \$150. Grades 3-8

General examination of the mechanics of planting, growing, processing coffee; follows coffee production from the planting of seed, transplanting and shading young trees, picking and processing of beans, to the transporting of the beans to shipping area; most of film appears to center on Brazil; basic informational supplement to courses dealing with Latin America, world geography; guide sheet contains synopsis, pre- and post-film suggestions

CONSUMER EDUCATION: BUDGETING (Revised). BFA, 1979. 16mm. 12 min. sd. guide color \$205. Grades 9-12

Realistic portrayal of three female high school graduates who find themselves in financial dilemma because of their unlimited credit purchases on limited incomes; lesson in money management from one girl's father centers on determining budget based on projected expenditures for food, housing, travel, furnishings, gifts, savings; concise explanations executed by capable actors satisfy film's objectives; guide includes synopsis, discussion questions useful for social studies, home economics classes

DRINKING DRIVER - WHAT COULD YOU DO? Centron, 1977. 16mm. 13 min. sd. guide color \$210. Grades 8-12

High school friends drink too much while picnicking and espouse familiar myths which narrator discounts--e.g., black coffee does not counter effects of alcohol; of three potentially disastrous driving situations which develop, only one apparently occurs; open ending directs discussion toward ways each potential victim could have protected himself; contemporary setting and characters; no accident actually shown; good color photography, but dialogue requires close attention

EARLY CIVILIZATIONS. BFA, 1979. 16mm. 20 min. sd. guide color \$350. Grades 7-12

Informative film covering development of ancient Western civilizations of Mesopotamia, Egypt, India, China, Italy, Greece; traces beginnings of each civilization, recounting when, where, how they started, similarities and differences, mutual influences; actual cave drawings, scale models of civilizations' villages, stone carvings, sculptures, actual relics depict story of these early Westerners; strong, clear narration; for review or as supplement to study of ancient world history

GRASSLANDS OF THE WORLD. Described on Science Advisory List

THE GROWTH OF AMERICA'S WEST: THE AMERICAN COWBOY! BFA, 1979. 16mm. 16 min. sd. guide color \$275. Grades 6-9

Authentic representation of cowboy's life in America's West; views cowboy's cattle-herding responsibility, such influences on raising cattle as increased number of farmers, growth of railways; acting in some scenes is poor, but men are real cowboys, not actors; shoot-out scene resembles any cowboy movie, but narrative offers informative facts about real cowboy's life; for American history studies of early West

THE GROWTH OF AMERICA'S WEST: THE MOUNTAIN MEN. BFA, 1979. 16mm. 16 min. sd. guide color \$270. Grades 6-9

Narrated story, using live actors, of the men who explored and opened West between 1820 and 1840; describes events that led to the movement of trappers into Rocky Mountain region and explains skills important to their survival; once the demand for furs diminished, these men became important to the growth and development of the West for other reasons; excellent supplement to U.S. History program in this high-quality film; accompanying guide contains synopsis, pre- and post-viewing activities, discussion questions, vocabulary

ISRAEL: HISTORY, LAND AND PEOPLE. BFA, 1978. 16mm. 18 min. sd. guide color \$295. Grades 7-12

Timely quality production tracing history of Jewish people from time of God's promise to Abraham to establishment of state of Israel in 1948; film lauds the industry, ingenuity of Jewish people who were able to turn desert into rich farmland and industrialize in thirty years; discusses Israeli lifestyle, religion, internal problems facing them, such as border conflicts with Palestinians, equal rights for minority groups in Israel, especially Arabs; film ends with a clip of Begin and Sadat in negotiations; superb photography, lively background music; informative overview of resourceful people; usual film guide in can

IT'S GRITS. Stanley Woodward, 1978. 16mm 44 min. sd. b&w \$425. Grades 7-12

Forty-four minutes seems like a long time to talk about grits, but this fun film offers more than methods of preparing and eating grits--it is a table-spoon of Southern living; cross section of people from South Carolina, who talk about history, origin, virtues of grits, presents a slice of America's Southern culture; endorers of grits run the gamut from two-year-old black child to octogenarian "Southern Colonel"; Craig Claiborne, food editor for *NEW YORK TIMES*, prepares his favorite grits recipe; you will laugh, shake your head in disbelief, love IT'S GRITS; useful in American culture, social studies, home economics courses

JESSE JACKSON AND CAROLYN SHELTON: PUSHING FOR EXCELLENCE. BFA, 1978. 16mm 16 min. sd. guide color \$275. Grades 6-12

Open-ended discussion of realistic rental problem; young couple, after renting apartment and agreeing to pay maintenance costs, decides to deduct expensive plumbing and stove repair bills from rent; lawsuit, court case result; practical problems confronted include rights of tenants, landlord's obligations, services of Legal Aid Society, court procedures; also clarifies such legal concepts as eviction, warranties, legal aid, rental contract, warranty of habitation; film can guide contains synopsis, objectives, discussion questions; useful for courses in economics, government, American problems, urban studies, law-related studies

MARKETING THE MYTH. Phoenix, 1977. 16mm 25 min. sd. color \$350. Grades 6-12

Two-part presentation showing impact of native Americans on development of United States; Part I emphasizes political, social, cultural influences by discussing prehistoric culture of Anasazis, Hohokams, Adenas, Hopewells; Part II traces native Americans' influences on nation's destiny from Jamestown colony to present, underscoring contributions in agriculture, language, conservation, medical technology, inventions, transportation, art, business; lengthy, but excellent documentary applicable to American history, culture courses

POLAR REGIONS: HUNTERS AND HERDERS. BFA, 1978. 16mm 17 min. sd. guide color \$280. Grades 5-8

Magnificent photography of polar regions--snow, sun, midnight sun, Eskimo customs; film depicts Eskimos as happy, resourceful, creative in daily living and family relationships; contrasts, compares Eskimos' stable life-style and Laplanders' nomadic style, but emphasizes ability of both groups to exist in peace, mutual respect; film also underscores influence of modern technology on customs, lifestyle of inhabitants of Polar Regions; clear, succinct narration; film study guide with synopsis, objectives pre- and post-viewing activities, vocabulary

PROMISES. Ramsgate, 1978. 16mm 21 min. sd. guide color \$325. Grades 10-12

Examines advertising, its effect on the viewing audience; actor Stacy Kéach narrates this excellent film which critically evaluates advertising's techniques, tricks; increases viewer awareness of manipulation by television medium

RAILROADS AND WESTWARD EXPANSION, 1865-1900. BFA, 1978. 16mm 16 min. sd. guide color \$265. Grades 8-11

Motivated by desire for money and land being offered by government, Central Pacific and Union Pacific Railroad companies raced to complete trans-continental railroad; in 1869 the rails were joined at Promontory Summit, Utah; stresses importance of railroad in unifying states, territories of the nation; includes many slide-type frames, some difficult to see because of shadows; reliable treatment of historical event, but mediocre production; second purchase recommendation

RAINBOWLAND. Learning Corp., 1978. 16mm 14 min. sd. guide color \$230. Grades 4-8

Animated presentation of various countries' lifestyles, as seen by Phil Harmonica, disillusioned American harmonica player; Phil's visits to Blue, Pink, Purple, Gray countries result in his re-dedication to Rainbowland (America); bias viewpoint contains overriding desire to gain patriotism; articulate, effective narration, while the vagueness of photography extends film's usefulness; teacher previewing to establish desired intended purpose is necessary (Lincoln County)

SANTA FE TRAIL. BFA, 1978. 16mm 16 min. sd. guide color \$275. Grades 5-12

Beautiful photography, good use of maps, excellent narration impart solid geographical, historical information; easy conversational tone, graphic descriptions; appropriate musical background, lively tempo hold interest, capture excitement and flavor of Santa Fe Trail; action-packed; challenging pre- and post-viewing activities

TAXES: WHY WE HAVE THEM. BFA, 1978. 16mm 14 min. sd. guide color \$230. Grades 9-12

Young tax revolter, searching for totally free life, wanders into a ghost town and locks horns with feisty woman who has survived her town's demise; she describes what different taxes--federal, state, and local--did for her town and what life in town was like before people refused to pay taxes; discussion admits excesses, abuses of tax system, but emphasis is on services made possible by tax revenue; raises a timely question in response to Proposition 13: "What services can people do without?"; informative film; good acting and believable story combine instruction, humor; beautiful photography; sketchy guide provides synopsis, objectives, pre- and post-viewing questions, activities, vocabulary

TECHNOLOGY AND VALUES: THE ENERGY CONNECTION. Described on Science Advisory List

THE U.S. IS: RESOURCES. BFA, 1979. 16mm 14 min. sd. guide color \$230.
Grades 7-12

Examination of United States' abundant use of its natural resources; views each resource--soil, water, minerals, others--and gives examples of derivative products, uses; quotes approximate amount of resource material used in day, year, selected amount of time; presented objectively, humorously; fails to stress need for conservation, although idea is implied; silly examples, outlandish comparisons will hold students' interest

VIOLENT YOUTH: THE UNMET CHALLENGE. Harper, 1977. 16mm 23 min. sd. guide. color \$370. Grades 11-12

Accurately portrays dilemma of the "system" in rehabilitating violent juvenile offenders; interviews three youths convicted of homicide and armed robbery who discuss their experiences; also interviews police officers, prison officials, and a judge who comment on treatment of the three and express views on recidivism and rehabilitation; accurately describes some elements contributing to violent tendencies of some youth; fails to deal with prevention or any details regarding treatment of such persons--rather, it shows the difficulty of the present situation; useful with teacher groups, parents, social workers, students in courses dealing with crime and delinquency (Wake County)

WHY WE CONSERVE ENERGY: THE WITCH OF THE GREAT BLACK POOL. Learning Corp., 1978. 16mm 12 min. sd. guide color \$185. Grades 1-4

Accurate animated film on how energy is wasted; in the village, Scatterbods use all kinds of machines--kitty-feeding machines, back-scratching machines, others; but when witch cuts off black soup supply, Scatterbods must do without less important machines; mentions use of sun, winds, water as energy sources; well-done narrative, suitable for reaching very young, on an important topic; made by fascinating new color technique using multicolored outlines to depict scenes
