MAJOR FUNCTION(S) The Fund was established to encourage reform and improvement of postsecondary education through grants and contracts with public and private postsecondary institutions. The awards are made through a rigorous competition to promising, locally-designed improvement projects. External evaluation indicates most projects have continued locally without further Federal support and also have stimulated improvements elsewhere in the nation.

NETWORK MEMBERS Current projects are described in Resources for Change (see below). Each project serves as the center for further dissemination and assistance.

TARGET AUDIENCE The projects are quite varied and each is relevant to a somewhat different audience. Evaluation indicates that most projects, in a variety of ways, could be useful to other institutions.

DESCRIPTION Fund projects pursue a number of goals, including the improvement of services for previously underserved groups; better professional education for minorities and women; more active forms of learning, curricular development, improved management at the institutional and system levels; more effective utilization of effective educational practices. Most projects involve the revamping
