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ABSTRACT

HALLOWEEN

BACKGROUND

At the end of October, Americans celebrate a day that has special traditions for children. It's called Halloween, and everyone has a lot of fun.

DIALOG 1A

It is October 25th. Manuel and his son Chepo are talking about Halloween, which is on October 31st.

Chepo: Dad, can I go trick-or-treating on Halloween? All my friends are going trick-or-treating.

Manuel: What's trick-or-treating?

Chepo: It's something children do after dark on Halloween. They put on costumes, so they look like ghosts, witches, or other strange things.

Manuel: What do they do?

Chepo: They go to people's houses and knock on the door. When someone opens the door, they say, "Trick-or-treat." The people who open the door usually give them a treat, such as candy or cookies.

Manuel: What if they don't give them a treat?

Chepo: Then the children sometimes play a trick. They may put soap on the windows, or throw an egg at the house.

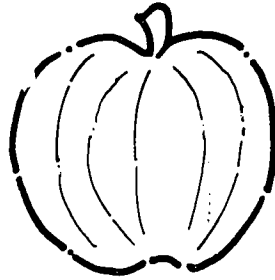

READING

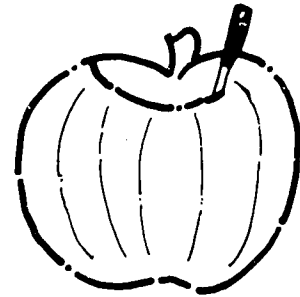

To make a jack-o'-lantern you will need a pumpkin, a sharp knife, a spoon, and a candle.

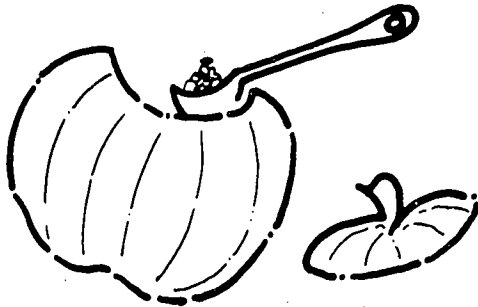
1. Buy a pumpkin.



2. Cut around the top of the pumpkin with a sharp knife.



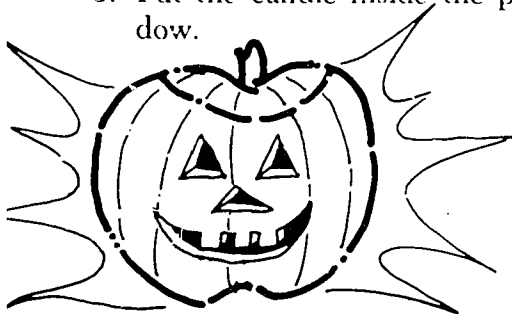
3. Take off the top. Scoop out the inside of the pumpkin with a spoon.



4. Draw a face on the pumpkin. Most people use triangles. Cut out the triangles with a knife.



5. Put the candle inside the pumpkin. At night, light the candle. Put it in a window.

The Pilgrims also wanted to say "Thank you" because the seeds that they had planted had grown, and now they had enough food.

Manuel: What did they eat?

Alicia: They ate fruit, vegetables, turkey, and pumpkin pies.

Manuel: Oh, is that why Americans eat turkey and pumpkin pie on Thanksgiving Day?

Alicia: Yes, turkey and pumpkin pie are part of the traditional Thanksgiving dinner.

- 1 9-inch pie crust (you can make it, but it is easier to buy one in the grocery store)
 - 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ cups of canned pumpkin
 - 1 $\frac{1}{3}$ cups of sweetened condensed milk
 - 1 egg
 - $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon (tsp.) salt
 - $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. cinnamon
 - $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. nutmeg
 - $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. ginger
 - 1 cup of hot water
1. Heat your oven to 375 degrees
 2. Beat all the ingredients together
 3. Pour into the pie crust
 4. Bake 50 to 55 minutes

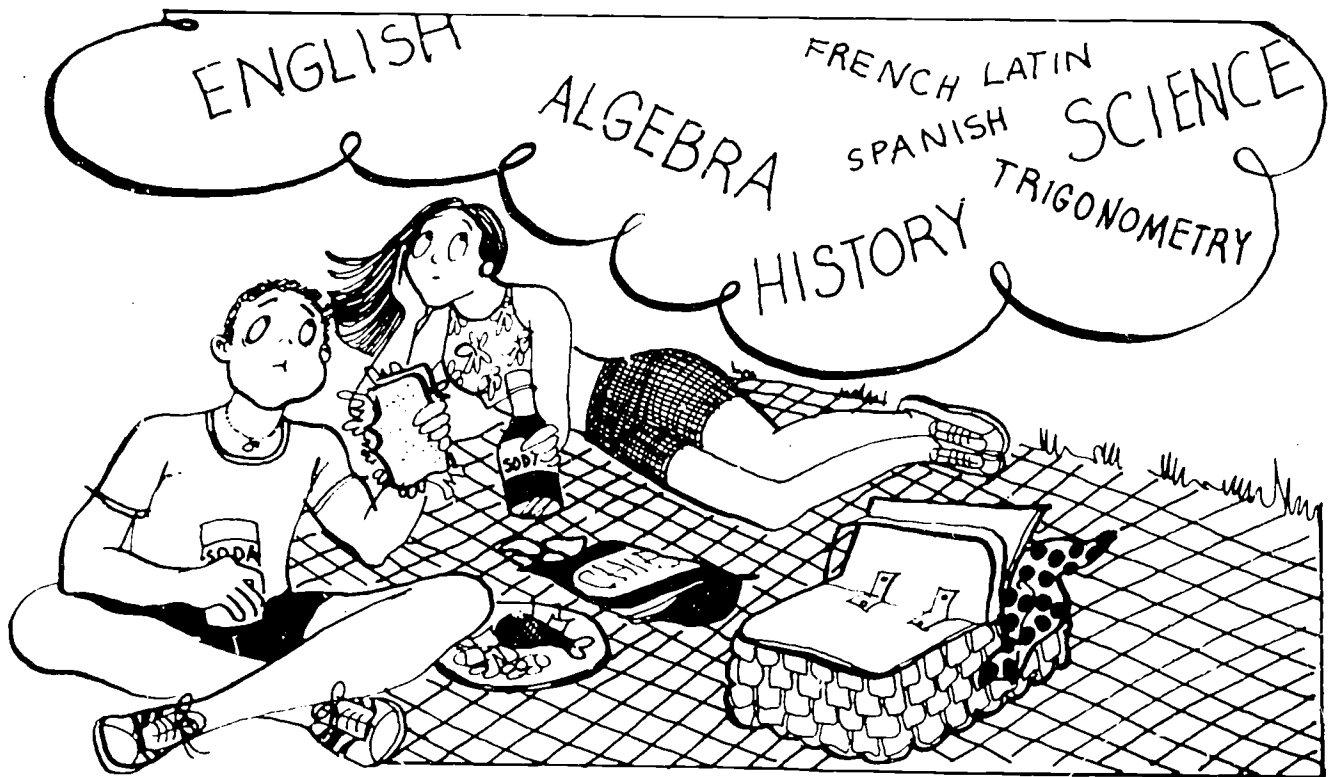
