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ABSTRACT

The annual report on graduate education programs funded under Title IX of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended, Part E, submitted by the Secretary of Education to the Congress, is presented. Because of the transition to the new Department of Education before the 1980 report was due, it was decided to update the 1979 report and submit a consolidated report for fiscal years 1978 to 1980. This combined report on graduate education includes specific data on the Public Service Program, Domestic Mining and Mineral and Mineral Fuel Conservation Programs, the Legal Assistance for the Disadvantaged Program, and the Graduate and Professional Opportunities Program. Data are also included in the special programs provided for female and minority graduate students. Findings from data in the files of the Title IX programs on the following information are summarized: levels of funding, number of institutions, students receiving awards for academic years 1978-79 through 1980-81, and institutionally reported program outcomes for 1976-77. Appendices include a summary paper entitled "Major Concerns Confronting Graduate and Professional Education" and a report on Title IX awards for fiscal years 1976 through 1980 based on program files. 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- o Legal Training for the Disadvantaged Program - Participants are graduating from law school and passing the bar on the first attempt at a rate which compares favorably to national norms.
- o Special Programs for Minorities and Females - A survey of postsecondary institutions which award post baccalaureate degrees indicates that 46 percent had at least one formal program specifically designed for female and minority graduates in Spring, 1978. Programs included special admissions, financial aid assistance, and academic assistance.

We hope the findings of this report prove useful in your work with Title IX programs.

Introduction

Part E of Title IX of the Higher Education Act requires an annual report on the operations and achievements of the programs funded under this Title. The first annual report was submitted to Congress for Fiscal Year 1977. Excessive delays in the clearance process have delayed the delivery of subsequent reports to the present time. Consequently, this report has been prepared for the Fiscal Years 1978 through 1980.

The report is based on readily available data, therefore it is descriptive, rather than output oriented. A continuing reduction in Planning and Evaluation funds over the past fiscal years restricted the ability of the then Office of Education (USOE) and now the Department of Education to more fully comply with the legislative requirements of Section 971A of Title IX.

The report for FY 1977 listed a number of critical problems facing graduate education in the view of the graduate deans and administrators who wrote papers for the then Office of Education in the Summer of 1977. ^{1/} Among these were:

- o Access to graduate education by currently underrepresented groups including minorities and women.
- o Funding of graduate education--both institutional funding and individual student support.
- o Supply of graduate students and employment opportunities for graduates.
- o Clarification of the purpose of graduate education.

^{1/} A detailed review of these issues is included in Appendix A.

At the present time, it seems fair to say that these problems still exist, although some have been partially addressed with the funding of the Graduate and Professional Opportunities Program.

In 1978, to better understand services provided to certain segments of the graduate education community, the then Office of Evaluation and Dissemination of the U.S. Office of Education funded a survey entitled "Special Programs for Female and Minority Graduate Students." A summary of the findings of that study is included in this document.

The main body of the report is divided into two sections. The first section summarizes the findings from data in the files of the Title IX programs. Program data includes levels of funding, number of institutions, students receiving awards for academic years 1978-79 through 1980-81, and institutionally reported program outcomes for 1976-77. The second section provides summary data on the number and kinds of special formal programs provided for female and minority graduate students.

In addition, two appendices are included which contain more detailed information for each of the two major sections. The attachments are a summary paper entitled "Major Concerns Confronting Graduate and Professional Education" (Appendix A) and a report on Title IX awards for Fiscal Years 1976 through 1980 based on program files (Appendix B).

Current Status of HEA Title IX Programs

Limited availability of evaluation funds and the recency of Title IX programs allows for only a limited assessment of program effectiveness. The programs in public service and domestic mining were initiated in the 1975-76 academic year and, because many of these programs require several years to complete, only fragmentary data on graduate and employment rates are available in the program files. The Graduate and Professional Opportunities Program is

even more recent. The Legal Assistance Program for the Disadvantaged through the Council on Legal Education Opportunities (CLEO), however, has provided assistance to disadvantaged students studying law since 1968. Information on the operation and outcomes of the CLEO program is thus available for a longer time period. The Council has conducted periodic surveys and the results of those studies are presented in this report, although some analysis is based only upon data from those participants responding to CLEO surveys rather than on the entire student population (e.g., number of students passing the bar examination).

Data on the total dollar awards made in institutional fellowship grants and the number of institutions and students receiving awards under Title IX from 1975-80 are given in Exhibits 1 and 2. These data and additional information on the Title IX program were collected from the U.S. Office of Education's Title IX files. A report on these data is presented in Appendix B.

Highlights from the various reports are discussed below by program

1. Public Service Programs

The number of public service institutional grants increased from 58 in 1975-76 to 80 in 1976-77 to 86 in 1977-78 and decreased in 1978-79 to 74, to 29 in 1979-80 and down to 10 in 1980-81. The number of fellowships for the same academic years were 264, 344, 312, 332, 431, and 342 respectively. During the same period funding for institutional grants decreased from \$2.3 million to \$6,395,000 while funding for fellowship awards increased from \$1.7 million to \$3.5 million.

The institutional grants awarded to programs in public service were used primarily in the following areas: faculty improvement (hiring or training of staff, research support, payment of membership in professional associations, etc.); program expansion (developing new courses, evaluation of existing

curriculum, developing internships); and strengthening graduate and professional school administration (recruitment of students, provision of career guidance/placement services, etc.). Less often, awards were used to provide for the acquisition of instructional equipment, expansion of library facilities and the development of cooperative arrangements among graduate and professional schools. Comments contained in the program files concerning the public service fellowships identified the following program outcomes: (1) the financial support allowed full-time study; (2) the program attracted interest in the department; (3) special services were provided to fellows; and (4) services could also be provided to non-Fellows.

Other findings concerning the Public Service programs using 1976-77 program information indicate that:

- o Of those Fellows no longer in the program slightly more than 87 percent had obtained positions in public services.
- o Fifty-seven percent of the fellowship recipients were men.
- o One percent of the Fellows were engaged in Ph.D.- level study.
- o More than half (59 percent) of the public service Fellows served internships while in the program; 13 percent of the Fellows were involved in research. No information was available for the remaining 28 percent.

These data and further findings on the Public Service programs along with a listing of awards for 1978-79, 1979-80 and 1980-81 can be found in Appendix B.

2. Domestic Mining and Mineral and Mineral Fuel Conservation Programs

The number of fellowships supported under this program increased from 181 in 1975-76 to 375 in 1976-77, to 500 in 1977-78 and also in 1978-79, and then

decreased to 464 in 1979-80. Concurrently, the funding for this program increased from \$1.5 million to \$4.5 million.

For the Domestic Mining and Mineral and Mineral Fuel Conservation fellowships, the program files reveal similar comments by institutions. They cited a major effect of this program is that it fosters greater interest in the students in pursuing careers in this field and thereby increases enrollments at their institutions. Many institutions felt the program was helpful in providing trained manpower to develop the State's natural resources. Other effects of the program noted in the files include: the financial support enabled students to pursue full-time study; expansion and further development of the programs was possible; and special services, such as securing visiting lecturers or allowing travel to professional conferences, were provided.

The program files also reveal the following findings concerning the domestic mining Fellows:

- o For the academic year 1976-77, 323 fellowships were awarded. By the end of that year, incomplete data indicate that 45 of the fellowship recipients had earned the M.S. degree and 6 had earned the Ph.D. A total of 45 fellowship recipients were employed in a related field.
- o Approximately 92 percent of the Fellows were men.
- o Seventy-eight percent of the fellowship recipients were involved in research and approximately 22 percent participated in practica.

3. Legal Assistance Program for the Disadvantaged (CLEO)

Title IX also provides support for disadvantaged students studying law. During the last four academic years, the number of fellowships awarded remained fairly stable: 532 in 1976-77, 538 in 1977-78, 553 in 1978-79, and 545 in 1979-80. Funds were used for summer institutes and program administration. For each of the last four years, \$1,000,000 was expended under this program. The Council on Legal Education Opportunity (CLEO) is responsible for administering two interrelated programs: (1) summer institutes to provide disadvantaged students with the necessary skills for successful legal study; and (2) allocation of living stipends to disadvantaged students who complete the summer institute and enroll in law school. The first is supported by a grant from the Division of Student Services and Veterans Programs under Title IV of the Higher Education Act. The second is funded under Title IX.

Data from the program files and the most recent technical report ^{2/} indicate that CLEO students who complete the summer institute are, for the most part, gaining admission to and graduating from law schools and passing the bar. Data on the progress of students from program entry to bar performance are available for those students who participated in the CLEO program between 1968 and 1972. A summary of those figures shows the following:

- o Of those CLEO participants successfully completing the summer institute, 97 percent entered law school.
- o Of those CLEO participants entering law school, it is estimated that 70 percent graduated by the end of 1979.

- o Of those CLEO participants graduating from law school, of the data on 616 who are known to have attempted the bar, 540 or 87% were successful, a rate which compares favorably with the national norm for those years of 74 percent.

A 1977 CLEO report concludes that many graduates are returning to serve as lawyers in the disadvantaged areas from which they came. It also suggested that the success of this program upholds the hypothesis that, with financial and academic help, disadvantaged students can overcome societal handicaps. Currently the Council on Legal Opportunity is conducting a study to update these data. Preliminary findings are included in Appendix B.

The sex and ethnic breakdowns of those students in the program in 1979 were as follows:

- o Approximately 52 percent are men.
- o Blacks comprise approximately 52.1 percent of the students presently participating in CLEO. Other minorities represented are Chicanos: 28.2 percent; Puerto Ricans: 9.4 percent; Asian Americans: 2.3 percent; Caucasians: approximately 2.8 percent; American Indians: 1.4 percent. The remaining 3.8 percent are of other ethnic backgrounds.

In conclusion, the three programs currently supported under Title IX appear, on the basis of preliminary data, to have been successful in their attempts to recruit students and to enhance their program offerings in order to provide graduates with the skill training necessary to secure employment in relevant fields. Further information on the CLEO program may be found in Appendix B.

4. Graduate and Professional Opportunities Program (GPOP)

Until enactment of the GPOP provision, Title IX support directly targeted for underrepresented students was awarded only in law (the CLEO program). This

program was enacted to better meet the need of underrepresented groups by improving access to graduate education through funding for these students in other academic areas. The Graduate and Professional Opportunities Program is authorized under Parts A and B of Title IX of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended. More specifically, the purpose of this program is to support the identification, recruitment, admission, and preparation of larger numbers of underrepresented group members pursuing graduate and professional study.

This program directly responds to the underrepresentation of women and minorities in graduate and professional education. Previous to the enactment of this program, Federal support to improve access was concentrated on the undergraduate level or was restricted to specific areas of graduate study (such as law, medicine, or engineering). The Graduate and Professional Opportunities Program, however, broadened this support to assist underrepresented students in a variety of graduate and professional disciplines.

This program authorizes the award of both fellowships and institutional grants. Students who plan teaching careers in college and universities or who plan careers in other professional fields of importance to the national interest are eligible for fellowships. Career fields in the first year's awards (1978-79) ranged from engineering and the medical health sciences to law and architecture. That year, 55 percent of the fellowship recipients were female, 45 percent were black, 17 percent Hispanic, 8 percent Asian American and 4 percent Native American. For academic year 1979-80, 58 percent of fellowship recipients were female, 52.6 percent were black, 14.3 percent Hispanic, 5.4 percent Asian American and 3.6 percent Native American. For tables on program awards and recipients, including 1980-81 awards, see Appendix B.

In addition to the fellowship awards, 26 colleges and universities in 1978-79, 49 in 1979-80, and 31 in 1980-81 also received institutional grants to help recruit students and provide special programs for them. The 1980-81 grant awards ranged from \$3,996 to \$18,360.

Institutional grants and fellowship awards in the program are allocated on the basis of several criteria, including the need to provide an equitable distribution of graduate and professional programs across the nation, the ability to maintain or improve the advanced training of persons previously underrepresented in higher education, and the ability to supply skilled manpower in areas of State, regional or national priority.

Higher Education Panel Survey

The American Council on Education, with the input and support of the National Science Foundation, the U.S. Office of Education, and the National Institute of Health, conducted a panel survey in the spring of 1978 to obtain some information on special formal programs offered to minorities and women at the graduate level. The survey instrument was sent to a stratified sample of 343 postsecondary institutions which offer a professional degree, a doctoral degree or some other degree beyond the Master's and which are part of a panel of institutions representative of the 3,000 institutions in the Education Directory.

A 91 percent response rate was achieved. Weighted results of the survey indicate that 46 percent of the 600 institutions which award a professional or doctoral degree or some degree beyond the Master's have had at least one formal program specially designed to aid female or minority graduate students. Minorities were more apt than women to be the target of special efforts. Forty-three percent of the institutions had at least one special program for minority graduate students. Twenty-two percent had a special program for women.

The survey indicates that special recruitment and admission efforts were made at 39 percent of the institutions, special financial aid programs were run by 35 percent, and special academic assistance was given at 24 percent. Public institutions were more apt than private ones--to offer special programs. Sixty percent of public institutions do so versus 26 percent of private institutions. Schools of law and medicine were more apt to offer one or more of the special programs for both women and minorities.

The figures presented here must be viewed with caution. Institutions were asked to count "formal" programs only. Furthermore, at the time of the survey, the nation was awaiting the Supreme Court's decision on the Bakke case and institutions may have been unusually reluctant to identify programs as favoring minorities or one sex. It would not be surprising if the figures presented here constitute a lower bound.

The preceding pages have presented condensed information on the four graduate programs funded in recent years under Title IX of the Higher Education Act and have alluded to some of the critical issues currently facing graduate education. The attached appendices A and B expand on these issues and provide additional information on the programs.

GRADUATE AND PROFESSIONAL OPPORTUNITIES PROGRAM

The Department of Education administers the Graduate and Professional Opportunities Program (GPOP). GPOP supports fellowship awards under Title IX, Part B of the Higher Education Act.

- Purpose GPOP is designed to assist members of traditionally underrepresented groups, particularly minorities and women, to prepare for academic and other professional careers.
- Field Fellowships are awarded for graduate study in academic fields leading to a doctoral degree and for professional study in fields which consider the master's degree as the credential for professional careers.
- Stipend Successful Fellows are remitted institutional tuition and mandatory fees and receive a stipend of \$4,500 for a 12-month year payable at the monthly rate of \$375 for any period the Fellows are enrolled in the program.
- Eligibility Applicants must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents and must meet the admission requirements of the institutions to which they apply.
- Further Information Application materials and information on institutional requirements should be obtained from the sponsoring institutions. A list of the fellowship awards for Fiscal Year 1980 is attached.

PUBLIC SERVICE FELLOWSHIPS

The Department of Education administers a program of Public Service Fellowships, authorized by Title IX, Part C of the Higher Education Act.

- Purpose The Public Service Program is designed to attract and prepare graduate students for leadership and management careers in all levels of government and in non-profit community service organizations.
- Program Fellowships are awarded on a competitive basis to colleges and universities that have graduate or professional programs leading to a master's or more advanced degree in public service.
- Stipend Successful Fellows are remitted tuition and required fees and receive a stipend of \$4,500 for a 12-month year prorated at \$375 per month for any period less than 12 months that the Fellows are enrolled in the program.
- Eligibility Applicants must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents and must meet the admission requirements of the institutions to which they apply.
- Further Information Application materials and information on institutional requirements should be obtained from the sponsoring institutions. A list of the fellowship awards for fiscal year 1980 is attached.

As Table I indicates, 1,241 of the first eight classes of CLEO students have now graduated from law school of the 1,810 who enrolled, representing a 69% success rate. Of the three remaining classes, 1976-1978, 574 students are presently in law school of the 605 who enrolled, i.e., 95% are successfully negotiating the law school curriculum.

Having completed the initial phase of the data retrieval project, CLEO has on hand bar performance data pertaining to 616 Program participants. As Table I demonstrates, 540 CLEO Fellows have passed the bar and been admitted to practice. This figure reflects an 87% success ratio for known bar performance, an evidently outstanding achievement. The data retrieval project's secondary phase is currently underway. It is anticipated that additional bar performance data will soon be available.

Finally, and most importantly, is the CLEO Fellows' employment data. Because the central purpose of CLEO has been to provide historically excluded groups with access to sectors of governmental decision-making and the means of peaceful dispute resolution through the legal system, the CLEO Fellows employment data provides additional insight into the overall worth and achievement of the Program. While the following data on CLEO Fellows' employment achievement is by no means complete for 1979, it is nonetheless a significant overview with respect to job dispersal and diversity. Additional information regarding CLEO Fellows' current employment data should be forthcoming soon at the conclusion of the secondary phase of the Program's on-going data retrieval project.

As the available data indicates, CLEO Fellows are presently engaged in a broad spectrum of legal and law-related activities: judgeships; law teaching; directorships of Legal Services Projects; or otherwise representing their community in the political, economic and social arenas of American society.

When one considers that the program consciously services students that the objective predictors showed to be high risk candidates, the CLEO Fellows' academic and post-law school performance successes assume even greater significance.

THE CLEO REAUTHORIZATION PROPOSAL

The proposal for CLEO reauthorization under Title IX of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended, is focused upon the need for an increase in the number of students served under the Program, as well as an increase in the amount of the stipend awarded through the CLEO fellowship. While no specific figures regarding program size or fellowship amount are suggested herein, the CLEO Council has approached these issues from the standpoint of increasing the size of the program from 200 students per year up to twice that number as is permissible under the present legislation.

Major Concerns Confronting Graduate and Professional Education

As part of the Fiscal Year 1977 annual evaluation of Title IX programs, a series of conferences was held in order, among other things, to identify the major concerns of graduate education at the present time and for the foreseeable future. The participants in these conferences were representatives of a stratified random sample of 32 graduate schools located throughout the United States. Part of the impetus for these conferences was the feeling that a statement of the perceived issues in graduate education would provide a useful context in which to understand and evaluate the efforts of Title IX. The views emerging from these conferences constitute a valuable source of information and are of considerable use in assessing the actual and potential role of Title IX.

The views presented here should not be considered as necessarily those of the Department of Education. They are, however, a summary of critical concerns identified by a number of persons concerned with graduate and professional education in the United States.

Overview

During the past 30 years, graduate education in the United States has grown from a relatively modest endeavor aimed primarily toward the training of teachers into a diverse and complex enterprise involving approximately 700,000 students with a variety of objectives. During this time, the bulk of the support provided by the Federal Government has been in the form of fellowships, research and teaching assistantships, and research grants.

Changes in national priorities have brought about changes in Federal support of graduate education. This support has shifted from defense and technological development following World War II to civil rights, health care, and economic improvement beginning in the 1960's. The social legislation of the 1960's opened up new opportunities for minorities, including access to higher education, which has emerged as one of the primary concerns of the Federal Government. ~~Other~~ concerns, particularly among graduate deans, include the maintenance of excellence, the implications of the reduction in the growth of the graduate enterprise, employment, credentialism, and the status of the humanities.

A. Access to Graduate Education

Access to graduate education, particularly for underrepresented groups, such as minorities and women, is perhaps the most critical issue currently facing graduate education.

1. Minority Access

Substantial increases in minority admissions to graduate and professional schools began around 1968. These increases paralleled the introduction of various forms of more flexible administration procedures and enrichment programs. Nevertheless, minorities still do not participate in graduate education in proportion to their numbers in society.

Various reasons have been given for the underrepresentation of minorities in graduate education. One is the small number of qualified applicants available. Another is that fewer Federal fellowships are at present being awarded. Also, a growing number of minority students are opting for

professional training since the labor demand and financial awards are greater than for graduate degree recipients. Another problem is the relatively high attrition rate for minorities in graduate studies, brought about perhaps by financial hardship, lack of preparation for advanced study and outside obligations. One of the few exceptions is the field of education in which 59% of all Black Ph.D. recipients received their degrees.

2. Women in Graduate Education

Like minorities, women are not represented in proportion to their percentage of the population and have a higher attrition rate than white males. They also gravitate to only a few graduate areas, such as education.

The causes of women's underrepresentation in various fields of graduate study appear to differ from the causes of minority underrepresentation. Most reasons, such as inadequate preparation to enter many fields, seem to be rooted in social sexism.

During the past years, the proportion of women receiving graduate degrees has been increasing: in 1970 women earned only 13.7 percent of all Ph.D.'s, while in 1976 they earned 24.9 percent of the doctorates. ^{1/}

B. Maintenance of Excellence in Graduate Education

Recent reductions in Federal support, particularly in basic research and fellowships, have forced many universities to reduce their programs, faculty, and enrollment sizes. 2/ Of particular concern to the universities is the decline of support for basic research, which is felt to be essential to graduate education. Some institutions have been forced either to cut back on graduate programs or compete with private research institutions. Also, due to the high costs of research, universities have already had difficulty in maintaining their research libraries, laboratories, and equipment, including computer facilities.

C. Reduction in Growth of Graduate Education

In the early 1970's, many universities experienced a leveling or decline in graduate enrollments. This was at least in part due to the reduction in the demand for new Ph.D.'s, the decrease in financial support for graduate students, and the decline of the job market for Ph.D.'s in many areas. 3/

Because of the reduction in fellowships, research and training assistantships, and research grants, some universities have had to draw upon their endowment principal. Also, the reduction in the number of teaching assistants has forced some institutions to reduce the research time for full-time faculty and to assign them to teach undergraduate courses that had previously been taught by graduate students.

Due to the decline of graduate enrollments and funding levels, there are fewer opportunities in academic employment for current and future graduates. These cutbacks have already caused the reduction or elimination of graduate programs by many universities. The shift in Federal funding from basic to applied research has begun to affect graduate programs, since applied research projects often require the outside hiring of specifically trained personnel instead of graduate students.

D. Employment of Graduates

As is well known, Ph.D.'s in many fields find considerable difficulty in securing employment commensurate with their training. The planning for enrollments in and support of graduate education on the basis of employment projections has been a hazardous undertaking. Due to the long-term training needed for the Ph.D., policy decisions based on the immediate state of the labor market may actually contribute to shortages of doctorates in subsequent years rather than alleviate them. Employment problems contribute to the problem of stagnation and malaise in the graduate enterprise.

E. Credentialism

The concern with credentialism is that increasing numbers of individuals are entering graduate programs on a part-time basis to receive credentials in order to secure higher paying or more interesting jobs. This results in a change in the traditional view of the Ph.D. degree as a research and scholarship diploma.

F. Humanities

The problems of the humanities appear to revolve around the issue of inadequate funding and employment. Recent cutbacks have caused shortages of staff and resources necessary for delivery of basic skills, particularly at the undergraduate level. Some feel that this has had a direct impact on the quality of education at the elementary and secondary levels, as manifested by the reduction in reading and writing skills of students entering higher education.

APPENDIX B

Title IX Awards for
Fiscal Years 1976 through 1980

Public Service Programs

The overall goal of this program is to expand and improve the training of persons for the public service. Two types of awards are made on a competitive basis: institutional and fellowship. The purpose of institutional grants is to strengthen and improve programs in the field of public service. Fellowship awards are made to qualified graduate students to assist them in obtaining advanced training for public service careers.

Data from the files indicate that the majority of institutions receiving Public Service awards offer the Master in Public Administration degree. The most frequent objective of the graduate programs is preparation for work at the local and State level; this was the case for 49 percent of the programs. Other programs (20 percent) emphasize training at the Federal level, training for already working public administrators (22 percent), or specialized training at urban or rural levels. One half of the programs are two years in length and the majority require or offer practical work internships.

The following pages offer more detailed information from the program files on the Public Service awards for 1976-77 as well as a list of awards for academic years 1978-79 and 1979-80.

Public Service Awards, 1976-77 (FY 1976)

In 1976-77, the U.S. Office of Education continued to support the Education for the Public Service Program as authorized under Title IX, Parts A and C, of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended. The objectives of this grant program are two-fold:

1. To establish, strengthen, and improve programs designed to prepare graduate and professional students for public service.
2. To attract highly qualified students and support the graduate or professional study of persons planning to pursue a career in public service.

These objectives were met by awarding institutional grants and fellowships for the support of graduate students to approved public service programs at institutions of higher education.

The following section summarizes the program files for the 1976-77 academic year and is based on information drawn from the proposals, correspondence, and reports submitted to USOE by institutions receiving these grants. Some of the data on institutions presented here will be incomplete (and the numbers reported may therefore be lower than is actually the case) because much of this information was not required of the institutions.

Public Service Programs in 1976-77

Public Service programs were funded in 36 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands, with institutional grants and fellowships amounting to \$4 million at 92 institutions. One hundred forty-eight institutions submitted requests for \$7.5 million in institutional grants and 132 institutions requested 949 fellowships, amounting to \$5.8 million. Of the institutions awarded grants by this program, three-quarters (68 or 74%) were public institutions.

The majority of the institutions (52 or 57%) granted the M.P.A. degree, and six more were in the process of developing that degree. Seventeen institutions reported a doctorate program, i.e., Ph.D., D.P.A. or D.U.A. (see Table 1). Many of the programs (35) were interdepartmental or interdisciplinary, and a number of schools reported cooperative arrangements with other graduate schools, departments, and institutions that offered joint degree programs, shared resources, or speciality training.

The programs focused on preparing persons for all levels of public service. Many emphasized local and state government (45) and provided training to already working public administrators (20) (see Table 2). Much concern was expressed about improving public management within the States, and training was emphasized in the specific areas of urban management (15) and rural management (5). A number of institutions offered specialized degree programs of state-wide importance, such as Coastal Zone Management at the University of West Florida, American Indian Administration at the University of Arizona, and Natural Resources Management at Colorado State University. While 27 institutions offered a generalist curriculum, a number emphasized service at the Federal level (18) and international level (2).

The institutions are generally increasing public service degree requirements, with a decrease in the number of one-year degree programs (17, or 18%), and corresponding increase in 1.5-year programs (25, or 27%) (see Table 3). One-half of the programs (46) are now two-year; this increase may be attributed to an increase in the number of schools requiring three-month to nine-month internship experiences before graduation. In 1975-76, only 48 programs reported this practical work experience, while this year 62 institutions reported either required (39) or optional (26) internships.

A list of grantee institutions and the amount awarded to each is provided in Table 8.

Institutional Grants

Institutional grants totalling \$2 million were awarded to 80 institutions in amounts ranging from \$8,000 to \$50,000.

The institutions used the funds in a variety of ways (see Table 4), expending them in the five areas authorized by Federal regulations: (1) faculty improvement; (2) expansion of programs; (3) strengthening graduate and professional school administration; (4) acquisition of instructional equipment and materials; and (5) development or carrying out of cooperative arrangements among graduate and professional schools.

The most common means of faculty improvement was the hiring of new faculty (41), a figure that might have been higher but for the late award of grants that year (September 1). A large number of schools (25) hired Adjunct Professors, or brought in guest practitioners and lecturers, because there had been too little

time for faculty recruitment. Eleven institutions expanded the size of their faculty by hiring graduate assistants. Many of the schools used the grant to support on-going or summer research by faculty and students (16). Others expended the funds for faculty training such as workshops (14) and paying the expenses of attendance at professional association conferences (8).

The grant funds have permitted many schools to significantly expand their public service programs, and the grants were credited with helping establish independent departments in 8 institutions during the year. While 35 grantees were able to add new courses to the curriculum, many institutions (35) emphasized the benefits of expanding and developing a strong internship program. Public service education was made more widely available, as 16 institutions reported developing an off-campus thrust by offering classes at night or to non-campus areas.

Institutional administration was strengthened by hiring staff and providing for faculty time to offer better career guidance and placement to students (21). While several institutions hired more staff to simply improve the administrative structure (13), many specifically used the funds to recruit students (12) and monitor the progress of graduates (3).

Fellowship Grants

Seventy-three institutions were awarded fellowship grants worth \$2 million to support 250 new and 105 continuing fellowships. The fellowship program was changed in two ways that responded to criticism from the previous year. Most of the 1975-76 Fellows who had not yet completed their program were given continued

funding and thus received some security throughout the length of the degree program. Also, the fellowships for those completing their degree or vacating their fellowships could then be transferred to another deserving student for the remainder of the year. Thus, 377 students were fellowship recipients instead of the planned 355.

In requesting fellowship funds, many institutions stressed the need to offer financial support for full-time graduate students (18). These institutions argued that such support would attract students otherwise unable to afford public service training (see Table 5). A number of grantees planned to use the funds to attract underrepresented women and/or minorities (13). Other institutions felt that the fellowships gave status to the program and would attract higher quality students (14). Some emphasized the internship experience that could be funded by the fellowships (8).

The majority (57 percent) of the 1976-77 Fellows were male. All but two of the Fellows were pursuing Master's degrees. Most of the Fellows participated in internships (361), while 26 were involved in research. This data may be misleading, since most students had thesis or major paper requirements that would involve research as well as practical experiences.

Table 7 describes the status of the Fellows at the end of the grant year. It shows that 128 Fellows completed the degree programs in 1976-77 and 162 were continuing as students in 1977-78. Of the 33 vacated fellowships, many were mid-year graduates, while others left for employment and personal reasons. Almost all vacated fellowships were filled with replacements. Of the 1976-77 Fellows, 141 secured employment in a public-service-related position. Some

Fellows also found employment in unrelated areas (22), usually with profit-making organizations, while 47 were either still seeking employment or were continuing their education elsewhere.

Institutions awarded Public Service monies were not required to submit a narrative final report. Nevertheless, from other documents submitted by the institutions, it is possible to identify several positive aspects which some institutions perceive in the program. The most frequently mentioned positive aspect of the program was that it provided financial support and made possible full-time study. In addition, it made possible special services for the Fellows, including attendance at professional association conferences. Fellowship money attracted interest in the department. A number of institutions applauded the Public Service fellowship's emphasis on a practical internship experience and were appreciative of the program change permitting replacement of vacated Fellows.

The primary negative aspect of the program was the lateness of the grant awards which were made on September 1, 1976. As in the Domestic Mining program, optimal use could not be made of funds. There was no time to recruit students who were not already planning to attend and no time to recruit already committed faculty. As a result, \$67,000 (1.7 percent of the total appropriated funds) of obligated funds were not spent. However, 1976 was an unusual year. Program regulations were not forwarded until July 9, 1976 to Congress where they experienced delays in clearances while members of Congress attended nomination conventions.

Domestic Mining and Mineral and Mineral
Fuel Conservation Fellowships, 1976-77

Fellowship awards authorized by this program are intended to assist needy graduate students of exceptional ability to pursue an advanced degree in domestic mining and mineral and mineral fuel conservation including oil, gas, coal, oil shale and uranium.

The following summary, obtained from existing files, presents some fragmentary information on the Fellows. The Fellows are predominantly male (92%). Nearly three fourths (73 percent) of them are pursuing a Master's degree. Slightly more than three fourths (78 percent) are engaged in research. Of those who were known to have graduated by 1977, more than 88 percent had obtained employment in a field in which they had obtained graduate training.

The following pages offer additional detailed information from the program file on Domestic Mining fellowship awards for 1976-77 as well as lists of awards for academic years 1978-79 and 1979-80.

Domestic Mining and Mineral and Mineral Fuel
Conservation Fellowships, 1976-77 (FY 1976)

In 1976-77, the program continued to support advanced study in domestic mining and mineral and mineral fuel conservation, as authorized under Title IX, Part D of the amended Higher Education Act of 1965. The awards were intended to assist full-time graduate students of exceptional ability and demonstrated financial need to pursue an advanced degree in domestic mining and mineral and mineral fuel conservation, including oil, gas, coal, oil shale, and uranium. The purpose of the program was to encourage individuals to develop and improve methods of discovering, extracting, recovering, and conserving minerals and mineral fuels.

This section summarizes information found in the proposals, fellow nomination forms, and correspondence submitted to the USOE from institutions awarded fellowship grants. Much of the information presented here was not requested from the grantees, and therefore may not be complete. Information was unavailable on 87 Fellows (21%) due to the absence of final reports from six institutions. Information regarding the employment of Fellows was gleaned from the proposals of following years, and the figures are probably low. No final Director's Reports were available.

A list of grantee institutions, the number of fellowships, and amount of awards are provided in Table 15.

Fellowship Awards

Domestic Mining and Mineral and Mineral Fuel Conservation Fellowships, worth \$3 million, were awarded to 48 institutions in 34 States. The awards supported the studies of 416 Fellows, including 41 who replaced graduating or vacating Fellows. Thirty-eight of the grantees were public institutions and ten were private. The funds were used for stipends, institutional allowances, dependent allowances and travel (travel funds have since been discontinued).

In requesting the fellowships, many of the institutions emphasized the need to train highly qualified students who would in future years remain in the State to develop State resources (see Table 11). Eighteen of the institutions stressed the need to offer fellowships to attract more students to these sometimes lengthy graduate programs, and retain them until the completion of their studies. Others addressed the need to offer financial support to needy students who would otherwise leave the graduate programs out of economic necessity. Several institutions described the highly technical nature of the programs and the expensive equipment such programs required. The institutions stressed how increased enrollments resulting from the fellowship would increase the overall program's cost effectiveness.

Characteristics of 323 Fellows are presented in Table 12. They show that the Fellows are a predominantly male group of students (92%). Three-quarters of the Fellows were pursuing a Master's degree, while at least 45 doctoral students were supported. The majority of the students were involved in research, while 22% had practical field experience.

Table 14 illustrates the many disciplines covered by the program, as well as the number of Fellows in each degree area. The majority (62%) of the Fellows were in engineering curriculums, and geology was the most studied science area (55 Fellows).

By the end of the year, 51 of the Fellows had graduated, with 45 receiving the Master's degree and 6 the Ph.D. (see Table 10). Most of the Fellows continued their studies the following year, since most of these degrees were multi-year programs. While there were 49 fellowships vacated, most of the positions were replaced with alternates (41). From the available information, it appears that at least 45 of the Fellows had secured employment in related fields. A report assembled in 1978 by the program management staff gives more complete figures. Nine institutions, enrolling slightly fewer than half of the Fellows, indicated that over 90% of those who had graduated or vacated fellowships had secured employment in the mining and mineral industries.

Comments of Some Grantees on the Program

Many of the comments by institutions about the fellowships focused on the importance of encouraging more students to enter the fields funded under this program (see Table 11). Projections for employment in these fields indicate that demand will double in the following five years, while a survey of mining engineers alone shows that more than 50% received their degrees before 1955. These and many other fields will be short of experienced, top-level engineers and scientists as more reach retirement age.

Many of the schools credited the fellowships for providing the financial support necessary to retain high-quality students in an academic research setting. Upon receiving undergraduate degrees, these students are in high

demand, so there must be some financial incentive for them to delay employment for a higher level of training. Several of the institutions felt that the fellowships attracted interest in their schools from those superior students who would otherwise go to larger and better funded programs.

There were only a few negative comments about the program, and several were made by institutions complaining of an insufficient number of fellowships. These schools felt that more students were needed to make the program more effective. An equal number of complaints were received about the lateness of the grant notifications. This lateness precluded recruitment. While the nomination process had identified the recipients by mid-summer, when schools were given definite notice in early September many of the original nominees had found other types of funding or decided on employment.

Administrative files indicate that target dates for the promulgation of the final regulations were not met, and the regulations were not forwarded to Congress until July 9, 1976. No swift action was taken there because of nominating conventions, adjournments, and a 45-day transmittal wait which pushed back the institution notification date until early September.

The lateness of funding precluded the optimum use of the funds to achieve the objectives of the law. Fellowships for the most part were given to already enrolled students who presumably would have found support if these fellowships had not become available. Recruitment of women and others not intending to obtain graduate training simply did not occur. Finally, 37 institutions were unable to spend \$157,000 of obligated funds.

Legal Assistance for the Disadvantaged Program

Department of Education funds are granted directly to the Council on Legal Education Opportunity (CLEO) to administer the Legal Assistance for the Disadvantaged Program. The purpose of this program is to recruit disadvantaged persons and assist them in obtaining a legal education. Recruited students attend a summer institute to increase their skills for law school. They are partially supported for three years in law school by an annual \$1,000 fellowship. In addition, the law schools waive tuition and fees normally charged students.

Recent data on the CLEO program are summarized in the following tables. They indicate that 95 percent of the students who successfully completed the summer institute entered law school. Of those students who could have graduated by now, nearly 70 percent have done so. About 22 percent of the participants have withdrawn from the program. The ethnic background of current program participants is presented in Table 18. It indicates that nearly 55 percent of the participants are Black.

The following tables offer a summary of data on students assisted by the Legal Assistance for Disadvantaged Program since its inception as well as a table showing the ethnic composition of the current participants. In addition, a list of the institutions currently participating in the program is included.

As Table I indicates, 1,241 of the first eight classes of CLEO students have now graduated from law school of the 1,810 who enrolled, representing a 69% success rate. Of the three remaining classes, 1976-1978, 574 students are presently in law school of the 605 who enrolled, i.e., 95% are successfully negotiating the law school curriculum.

Having completed the initial phase of the data retrieval project, CLEO has on hand bar performance data pertaining to 616 Program participants. As Table I demonstrates, 540 CLEO Fellows have passed the bar and been admitted to practice. This figure reflects an 87% success ratio for known bar performance, an evidently outstanding achievement. The data retrieval project's secondary phase is currently underway. It is anticipated that additional bar performance data will soon be available.

Finally, and most importantly, is the CLEO Fellows' employment data. Because the central purpose of CLEO has been to provide historically excluded groups with access to sectors of governmental decision-making and the means of peaceful dispute resolution through the legal system, the CLEO Fellows employment data provides additional insight into the overall worth and achievement of the Program. While the following data on CLEO Fellows' employment achievement is by no means complete for 1979, it is nonetheless a significant overview with respect to job dispersal and diversity. Additional information regarding CLEO Fellows' current employment data should be forthcoming soon at the conclusion of the secondary phase of the Program's on-going data retrieval project.

As the available data indicates, CLEO Fellows are presently engaged in a broad spectrum of legal and law-related activities: judgeships; law teaching; directorships of Legal Services Projects; or otherwise representing their community in the political, economic and social arenas of American society.

When one considers that the Program consciously services students that the objective predictors showed to be high risk candidates, the CLEO Fellows' academic and post-law school performance successes assume even greater significance.

THE CLEO REAUTHORIZATION PROPOSAL

The Proposal for CLEO reauthorization under Title IX of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended, is focused upon the need for an increase in the number of students served under the Program, as well as an increase in the amount of the stipend awarded through the CLEO fellowship. While no specific figures regarding Program size or fellowship amount are suggested herein, the CLEO Council has approached these issues from the standpoint of increasing the size of the Program from 200 students per year up to twice that number as is permissible under the present legislation.

Graduate and Professional Opportunities Program

The overall goal of this program is to provide needed opportunities for qualified students, particularly minorities and women, who are underrepresented in the professions and many graduate fields, to receive the education necessary for entering the highest level of professions, industries, government and colleges. Institutional grants are made to institutions of higher education to strengthen and improve graduate and professional programs leading to advanced degrees (other than medical degrees). Fellowships help qualified students to finance advanced training for careers in professional fields and fields where the doctorate is a requirement.

Awards under this program have been made for the two academic years 1978-79 and 1979-80. Table 21 provides a description of the fellowship recipients. It shows that 58 percent of the recipients are female and more than half (53 percent) are black.
