ABSTRACT

This publication lists a comprehensive collection of over 900 documents and resources that deal with a range of issues concerned specifically with the prevention of school violence and vandalism, and more generally with education, youth, and juvenile justice. The kinds of resources listed include research studies, works designed for education or training purposes, program descriptions, government reports, journal articles, and program evaluations. Materials are categorized both by subject area and type of resource. All materials are first categorized under nine main subject categories, then each main category is further subdivided into from three to nine subcategories. Finally, each kind of material is also identified by the type of resource: (1) published materials; (2) informal sources of information (such as university research projects, federal and state programs, school programs); (3) bibliographies; (4) literature searches; and (5) films, tapes, and audiovisual materials. 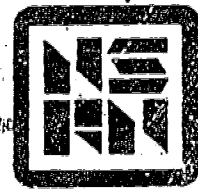

## THE NSRN COMPENDIUM LISTING

### What It Is

The National School Resource Network Compendium is a comprehensive collection of over 900 documents and resources which deal with a range of issues concerned specifically with the prevention of school violence and vandalism, and more generally with education, youth, and juvenile justice. The kinds of resources in the Compendium include research studies, works designed for education on training purposes, program descriptions, government reports, journal articles, and program evaluations.

### How You Can Use This Listing of Compendium Materials

Materials contained in the NSRN Compendium are categorized both by subject area and type of resource. All materials are first categorized under nine main subject categories, I-IX. (See following pages for subject categories.) Each main category is further subdivided into sub-categories, 1-9. Finally, each kind of material is also identified by the type of resource, A-E.

### Type of Resource

- A. Published materials on school disruption, crime and violence (research studies, and work designed primarily for educational or training purposes).
- B. Informal sources of information (university research projects, federal and state programs, school programs).
- C. Bibliographies on related topics.
- D. Literature searches (from NCJRS, ERIC, and other reference services).
- E. Films, tapes, and audiovisual materials.

A starting point in using this list is to find the appropriate main category and sub-category under which you think your sources would be located. Turn to those pages in the Compendium listing. Then, check under all letters (A-E) for sources.

### Example

For example, the listing I.A.5 represents:

Subject Category: I. School Violence and Vandalism  
Type of Resource: A. Published materials  
Sub-category: 5. Drug problems

The listing I.B.5 would represent the same categories, except an informal source of information.
