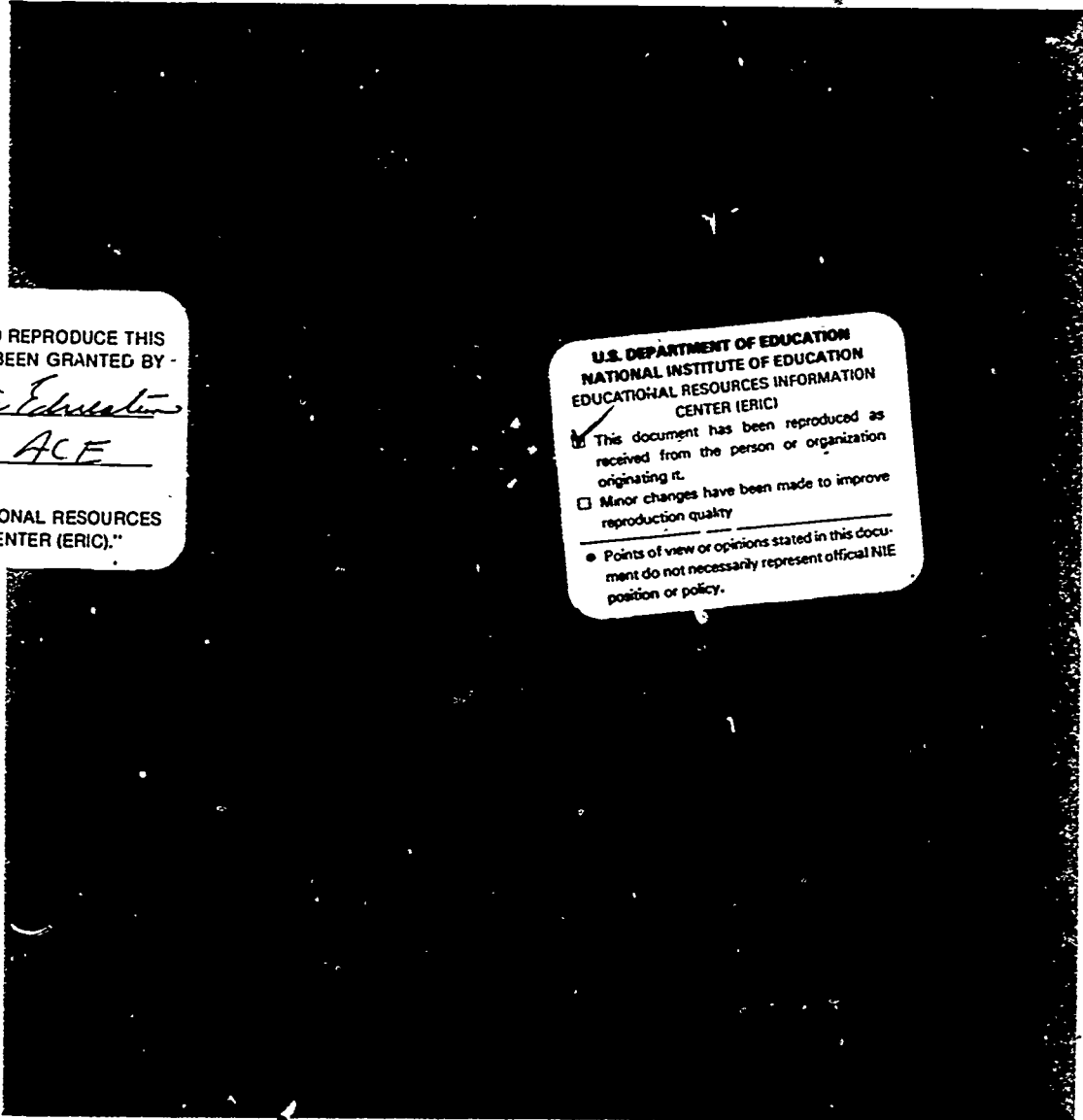
ABSTRACT

Information is presented on the total number of faculty in four of the major humanities disciplines, on their gender and racial/ethnic composition, and on their level of education and tenure status. The following four core disciplines were assessed: English, history, modern languages, and philosophy. Of the 693 originally surveyed institutions of the Higher Education Panel, usable responses were received from 562 institutions. Data from responding institutions were statistically adjusted to represent the eligible national population of 2,447 universities, four-year colleges, and two-year colleges. Among the findings are the following: as of fall 1979, more than 2,400 institutions had approximately 58,600 full-time humanities faculty teaching the four humanities areas; English accounted for 30 percent of all humanities departments and 48 percent of all humanities faculty, and philosophy accounted for 21 percent of all departments and 10 percent of all faculty; 72 percent of the 58,600 full-time humanities faculty are tenured, and 12 percent are outside the tenure system; tenure rates among full-time humanities faculty are 79 percent for nonminority men, 71 percent for minority men, 59 percent for nonminority women, and 61 percent for minority women; nearly two-thirds of all full-time humanities faculty had earned a Ph.D. in a humanities field; philosophy had the highest percentage of doctorate holders, followed by history, modern languages, and English; of all faculty teaching in 1979-80 in the four humanities fields, 3,700 were newly appointed that year; nearly three-fifths were appointments in English departments. 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Highlights

Population

- o As of fall 1979, more than 2,400 institutions had approximately 58,600 full-time humanities faculty teaching English, history, modern languages, and philosophy.
- o Fifty-four percent of these institutions are in the public sector; 47 percent are four-year colleges, 46 percent are two-year colleges, and 7 percent are universities.
- o Of the 8,100 departments identified, 30 percent were English departments, 28 percent were history departments, and 21 percent each were philosophy and modern language departments.

Humanities Faculty

- o Public four-year colleges employed 25 percent of all full-time humanities faculty, private four-year colleges employed 23 percent, public two-year colleges 22 percent, public universities 20 percent, private universities 8 percent, and private two-year colleges 2 percent.
- o English accounted for 30 percent of all humanities departments and 48 percent of all humanities faculty; philosophy accounted for 21 percent of all departments and 10 percent of all faculty.
- o Of the full-time humanities faculty represented by this survey, 38,500 (65 percent) are nonminority men; 15,100 (26 percent) are nonminority women, 2,900 (5 percent) are minority men, and 2,100 (4 percent) are minority women.
- o The proportion of women teaching is larger at two-year colleges (38 percent) than at either four-year colleges (29 percent) or universities (22 percent).
- o The proportion of minority faculty is larger at two-year colleges (11 percent) than at either four-year colleges (9 percent) or universities (6 percent).

Tenure Status and Rank

- o Seventy-two percent of the 58,600 full-time humanities faculty are tenured, and 12 percent are outside the tenure system.
- o Three-fourths of humanities faculty at public institutions hold tenure, compared with two-thirds at private institutions.
- o Tenure rates among full-time humanities faculty are 79 percent for nonminority men, 71 percent for minority men, 59 percent for nonminority women, and 61 percent for minority women.

- o History has the highest proportion of tenured faculty (80 percent), followed by modern languages (73 percent), philosophy (71 percent), and English (69 percent).
- o Nonminority men account for 66 percent of all humanities faculty but 84 percent of philosophy faculty and 80 percent of history faculty; minority men and minority women account for 9 percent of all humanities faculty but 16 percent of modern languages faculty.
- o The tenured professoriate (i.e., professors, associate professors, and other tenured faculty) is composed of 71 percent nonminority men, 21 percent nonminority women, 5 percent minority men, and 3 percent minority women.
- o Forty-three percent of nonminority men are tenured full professors, compared with 32 percent of minority men, 25 percent of nonminority women, and 20 percent of minority women.

Highest Degree

- o Nearly two-thirds of all full-time humanities faculty had earned a Ph.D. in a humanities field: 87 percent of faculty at universities, 72 percent of faculty at four-year colleges, and 20 percent of faculty at two-year colleges.
- o Philosophy had the highest percentage of doctorate holders (78 percent), followed by history (75 percent), modern languages (70 percent), and English (53 percent).
- o At all institutions, 7 of every 10 nonminority men held a Ph.D., as did 6 of every 10 minority men, 5 of every 10 nonminority women, and 4 of every 10 minority women.

New Appointments

- o Of all faculty teaching in 1979-80 in the four humanities fields under study, 3,700 (6 percent) were newly appointed that year; nearly three-fifths were appointments in English departments.
- o In 1979-80, 43 percent of the new appointments in the public sector were in the tenure track, compared with 50 percent in the private sector.
- o For 1980-81, 3,200 new appointments were estimated--13 percent fewer than 1979-80.

Overview

A primary purpose of this survey was to fill a critical need for basic information about full-time humanities faculty at America's colleges and universities, a segment of the higher education community on which very little aggregate data exists. The people who are the humanities teachers in our higher education institutions are the backbone of liberal education; it is from the disciplines they represent that contemporary higher education has evolved.

Obviously, some studies exist which provide useful information on humanities faculty. For example, the biennial survey of the Ph.D. population by the National Academy of Science's Commission on Human Resources describes the patterns of employment and mobility for a sample of doctorate recipients, including a representative proportion of those in the humanities. Not all humanities faculty, however, are Ph.D.'s and this is especially true for a number of those who began their careers in earlier decades. A second partial source is the Higher Education General Information Survey (HEGIS), by which the National Center for Education Statistics collects data on all faculty by gender and rank although not by discipline.

The current Higher Education Panel survey provides, for the first time, information on total number of faculty in four of the major humanities disciplines, on their gender and racial/ethnic composition, and on their level of education and tenure status. The study was also designed to provide a limited amount of information on short-term demand for humanities faculty in those disciplines where the greatest numbers find employment. Because the information had to be solicited at the departmental level, the data-gathering was restricted to full-time humanities faculty and to four of the core disciplines--English, history, modern languages, and philosophy. It is expected that subsequent studies will augment these data.

The survey was initiated by the National Endowment for the Humanities through its Evaluation and Assessment Studies Branch, which is responsible for monitoring the health and vitality of institutional and human resources in the humanities. The study,

it is hoped, will provide the agency, colleges, universities, researchers, and other interested parties with more and better information about a key humanities resource, full-time faculty.

Methods Summary

The Higher Education Panel is a continuing survey research program created in 1971 by the American Council on Education to conduct specialized surveys on topics of current policy interest to the higher education community and to government agencies.

The Panel is a stratified sample of 760 colleges and universities drawn from the population of more than 3,000 institutions listed in the National Center for Education Statistics' (NCES) Education Directory. All institutions in the population are grouped according to the Panel's stratification design, which is based on three factors: institution type (whether a school is a university, four-year college, or two-year college), control or governance (whether it is public or private), and size, by full-time-equivalent enrollment. For any given survey, either the entire Panel or an appropriate subgroup is used.

The questionnaire (see Appendix A) was mailed on May 16, 1980, to all Panel institutions except independent medical schools, religious or Bible colleges, and certain other specialized institutions, such as engineering and business colleges. Respondents were asked to report selected characteristics of humanities faculty members as of fall 1979, who were teaching full time in English and American literature, history, modern languages, and philosophy. These characteristics were sex, minority status, rank, tenure status, and highest degree earned in the humanities.

Of the 693 Panel institutions originally surveyed, 20 had none of the four humanities fields requested and were therefore dropped from the sample. After mail and telephone follow-ups were completed, usable responses were received from 562 institutions, for an overall response rate of 84 percent.

Data from responding institutions were statistically adjusted to represent the eligible national population of 2,447 universities, four-year colleges, and two-year colleges.

The departmental structure of institutions in the Panel was assumed to be similar to the departmental structure of all institutions in the population. For the first stage of weighting procedure, responding Panel institutions were adjusted for departmental nonresponse; then the entire Panel was adjusted for institutional nonresponse. Finally, institutional weights were applied to bring the Panel up to the national population.

Appendix B contains technical notes such as the stratification design, a comparison of respondents and nonrespondents, and a discussion of the reliability of the survey estimates.

Findings

The data contained in this report represent humanities faculty at just over 2,400 institutions, more than half of which are publicly controlled.

As shown in Table A, the population is almost evenly split between four-year (47 percent) and two-year colleges (46 percent), with universities comprising the remaining 7 percent.

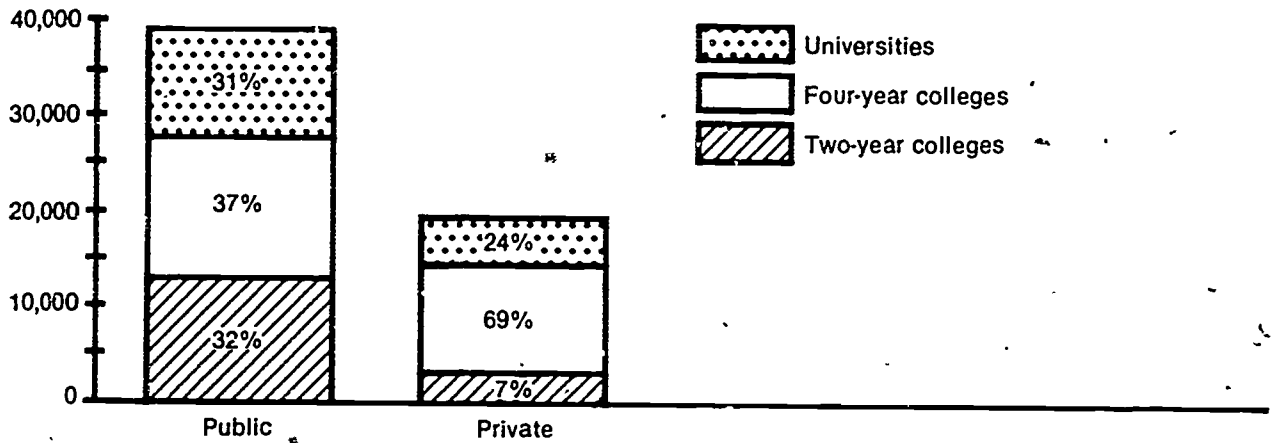
Thirty percent of the nearly 8,100 departments¹ identified were English departments, which represented the largest share. Twenty-one percent were modern language departments, which represented the smallest share (Table B).

¹For convenience, we will use the term *departments*. An institution may offer courses in a specific humanities field, such as philosophy, without having a formally organized philosophy department. For the purposes of this survey, however, that institution is considered to have a philosophy department.

Humanities Faculty

In fall 1979, roughly 58,600 full-time faculty members were teaching English, history, modern languages, and philosophy. Twice as many were teaching in public as in private institutions. As shown in Figure 1, humanities faculty in the public sector were the most highly concentrated in four-year colleges (37 percent); the rest were fairly evenly distributed between universities and two-year colleges. In the private sector, in contrast, 7 of every 10 faculty members were teaching at four-year colleges; 24 percent were in universities, and 7 percent in two-year colleges.

As noted above, the humanities discipline with the largest number of departments was English. That discipline also represented the largest percentage (48 percent) of the humanities faculty counted in this study (see Table C).

Philosophy accounted for one-fifth of the departments--the smallest percentage--and only one-tenth of the faculty.

Institutional Setting and Department

Figure 2 depicts the concentration of humanities faculty by discipline in public and in private institutions. As noted earlier, public institutions employed more than twice as many faculty as private institutions--39,400 compared with 19,200. Just over half of the faculty in the public sector were teaching English, and nearly one-fourth were teaching history; 18 percent, modern languages; and 8 percent, philosophy. The rank ordering of fields by faculty was the same in the private sector, but the differences among them were not as great.

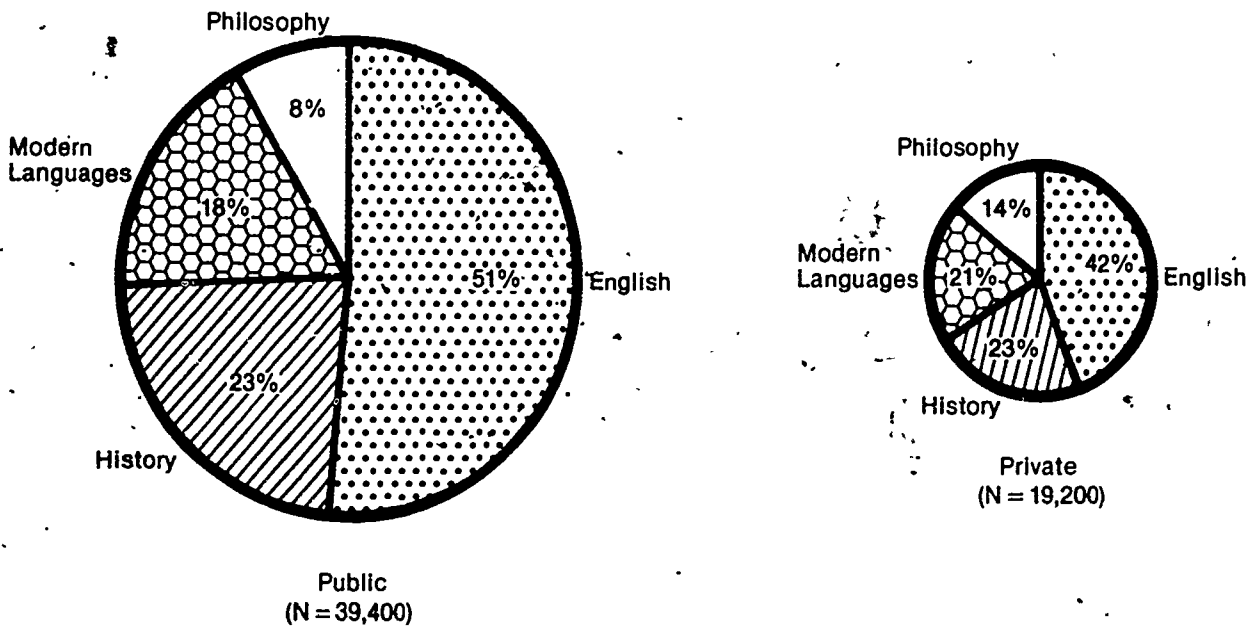
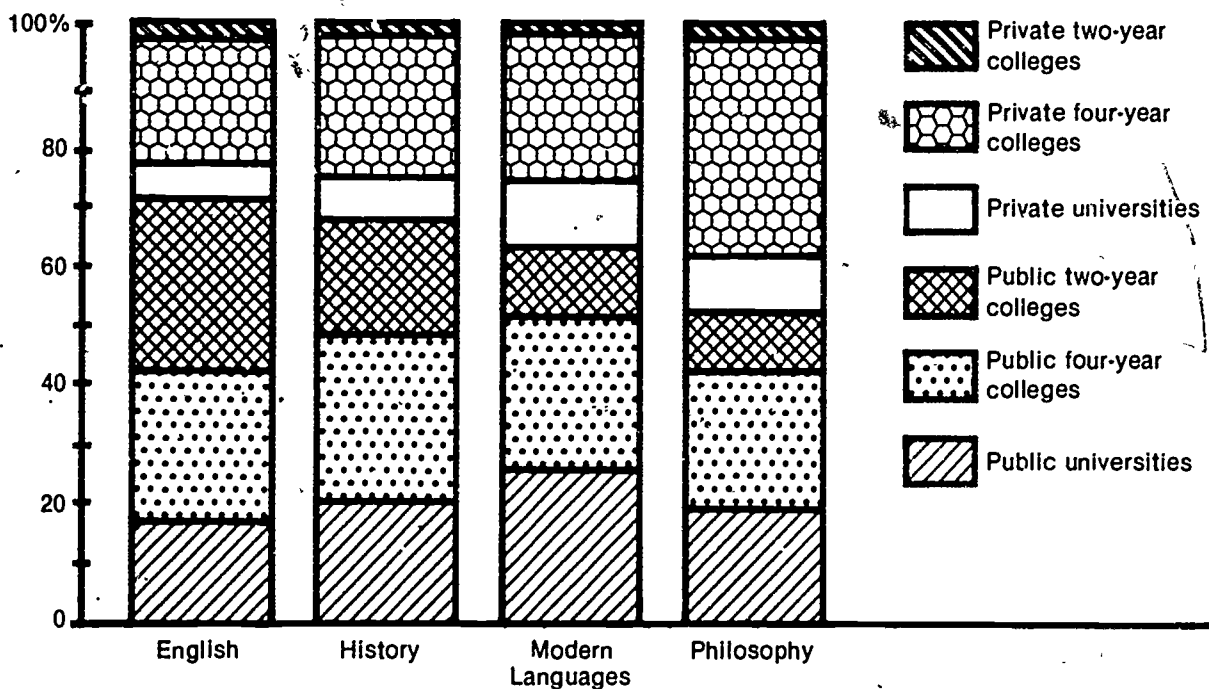


Fig. 3. Institutional Distribution of Humanities Faculty, by Field

A different perspective of humanities faculty concentration is provided by Figure 3. The largest proportion of English faculty held appointments in public two-year colleges (29 percent), whereas the largest proportion of history faculty held appointments in public four-year colleges (28 percent). Public universities were the most frequent employers of modern language faculty (26 percent), and private four-year colleges the most frequent employers of philosophy faculty (33 percent).

Gender and Minority Status

Of the 58,600 full-time faculty members in the four humanities disciplines covered in the survey, about three of every ten are women and one of every ten is a minority group member. Table D shows the distribution of faculty by gender and minority status:

Figure 4 shows the distribution of humanities faculty by gender and minority status among public and private universities, four-year colleges, and two-year colleges. At the university level, public institutions have more than two-and-one-half

Fig. 2. Field Distribution of Humanities Faculty

times more faculty members than private. The proportions of each gender and minority grouping, however, are about the same at both kinds of universities. Nonminority men make up almost three-quarters of the university faculties; nonminority women, about 20 percent, minority men about 5 percent, and minority women, 2 percent.

The four-year colleges account for almost half of the humanities faculty in the fields covered by the survey. At these colleges, two-thirds of the faculty are nonminority men and about one fourth are nonminority women. Minority faculty account for the remaining 10 percent (6 percent men and 4 percent women).

At the two-year colleges, faculty men outnumber faculty women (62 percent vs. 38 percent). Nevertheless, the proportion of women teaching is greater at two-year colleges than at either four-year colleges or universities. The minority faculty proportion is also larger at two-year institutions--11 percent, compared with 6 percent at universities and 8 percent at four-year colleges.

The national estimates indicate that at private two-year colleges humanities faculty total less than 1,400 members, of which half are nonminority men, 44 percent are nonminority women, 4 percent are minority men, and 1 percent minority women. It should be noted, however, that the survey's estimates for humanities faculty at private two-year colleges should be used with caution--their small number (2 percent of the total humanities faculty), their low representation in the Panel, and their relatively low response rate combined to require a large weight to produce the national estimate.

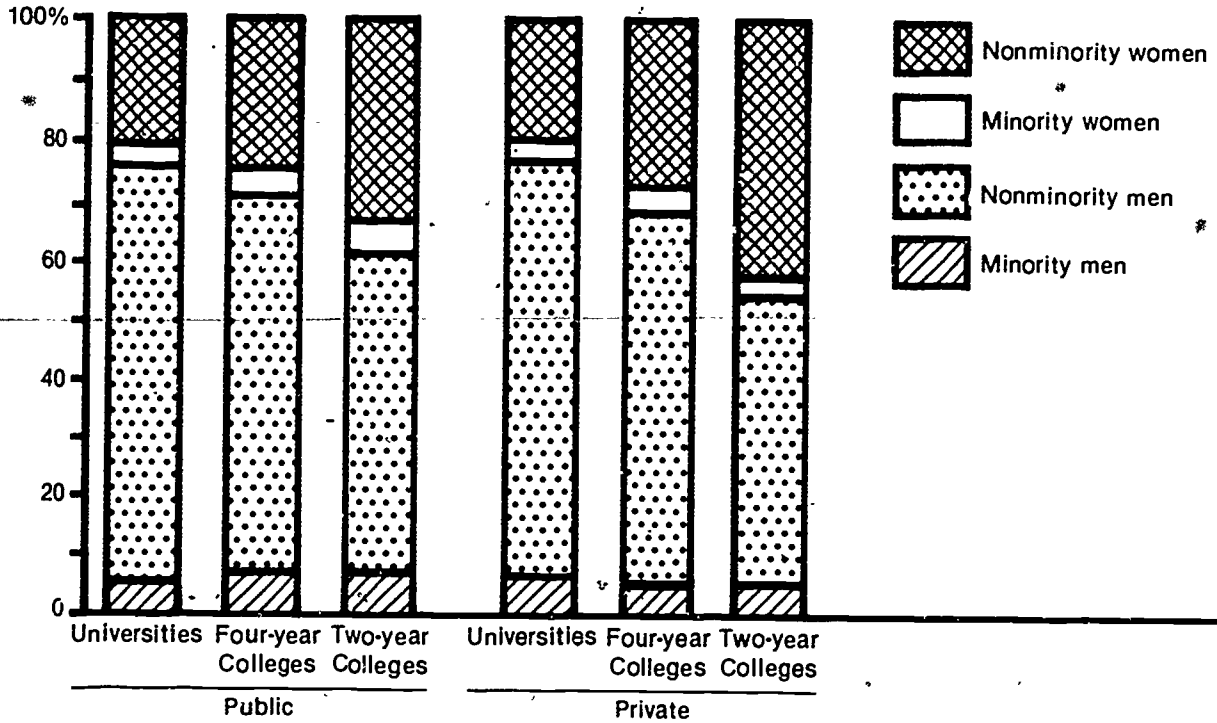
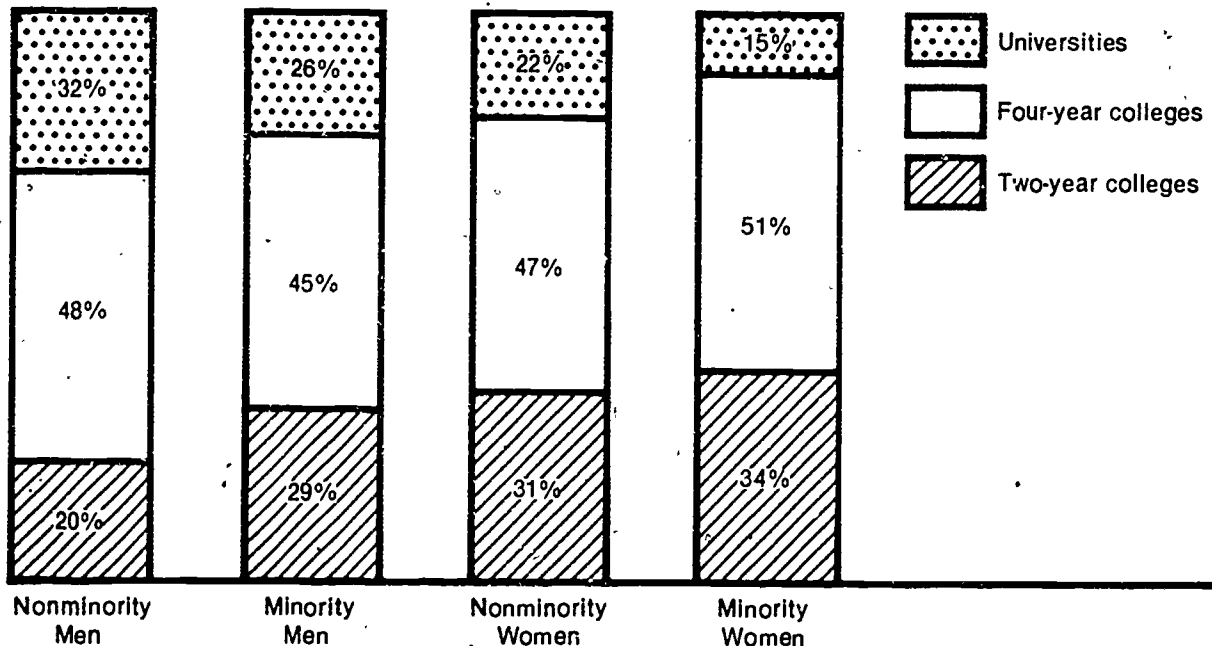


Fig. 5. Institutional Distribution of Humanities Faculty, by Gender and Minority Status

Figure 5 shows how each of the faculty categories is distributed among universities, four-year colleges, and two-year colleges. Of the 15,000 nonminority faculty women in the four humanities fields, 22 percent teach at the university level, 47 percent at four-year colleges, and 31 percent at two-year colleges.

Figure 5 also shows that minority women have proportionately fewer of their number at universities (15 percent) and correspondingly greater representation at two-year colleges (34 percent) than do any of the other faculty categories. Nonminority men, for example, have twice as large a proportion of their number teaching in university settings as do minority women.

Fig. 4. Gender and Minority Status of Humanities Faculty, by Institutional Category

The differences in faculty representation in different settings are more closely related to gender than to minority status. The proportion of both minority and non-minority men teaching at the university level is greater than for either minority or nonminority women. The converse holds at two-year colleges, which account for about 31 percent of the teaching assignments of women and 21 percent of those for men.

It is apparent that if each gender is considered separately, those classified as minority persons are proportionately underrepresented in university settings and overrepresented at the two-year colleges.

Tenure Status

Overall, 72 percent of the humanities faculty are tenured, with an additional 16 percent in the tenure track and awaiting tenure. Thus, only about one in eight faculty members holds a position outside the tenure system.

Table E shows the distribution of tenure status among humanities faculty at public and private institutions. The proportion already tenured is consistently higher at public institutions: three of every four faculty members are tenured, compared with two of every three at private institutions. An additional 14 percent of faculty are awaiting tenure at public institutions, compared with 20 percent at private institutions. About the same proportions of faculty at both public and private universities and four-year colleges are outside the tenure system (8 to 10 percent). At two-year colleges, greater proportions of the faculty are outside the tenure track (15 percent

at public institutions, and 64 percent at private institutions).

Figure 6 shows how tenure status is distributed among the faculty classified by gender and minority status. This array again demonstrates that greater proportions of men have achieved tenure than women, although the proportion of nonminority men with tenure is greater than that of minority men (79 percent vs. 70 percent).

In comparison, substantially lower proportions of the women faculty are already tenured (about three-fifths each of minority and nonminority women). This contrast is tempered by the somewhat greater proportion of women who are in the tenure track awaiting tenure (22 percent of women vs. 14 percent of men). Nevertheless, the data also show that proportionately more women than men have faculty positions that are completely outside the tenure track (19 vs. 9 percent).

Rank

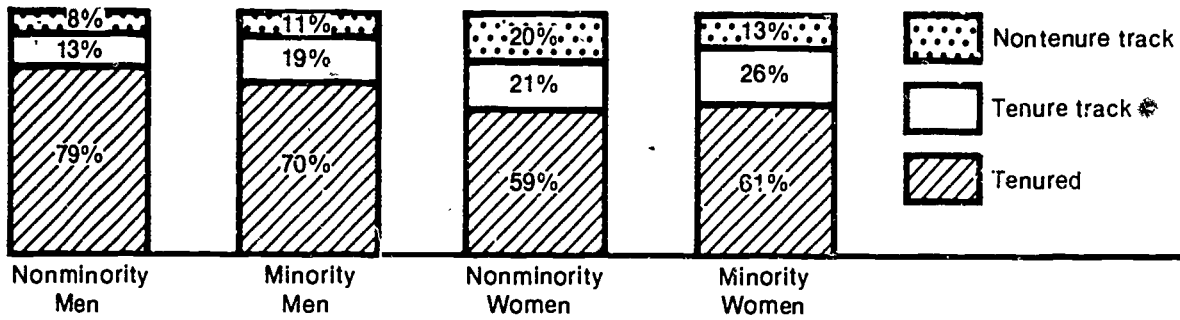


Fig. 7. Rank of Tenured Humanities Faculty, by Gender and Minority Status

Detailed views of the ranks held by the tenured segments of the professoriate (i.e., professors, associate professors, and other tenured faculty) are shown in Table F and Figure 7.

As Table F indicates, the total tenured professoriate is primarily nonminority men (71 percent) and nonminority women (21 percent), with minority men at 5 percent and minority women 3 percent of the total. Note that the rank of full professor is even more completely dominated by nonminority men (81 percent).

Fig. 6. Tenure Status of Humanities Faculty, by Gender and Minority Status

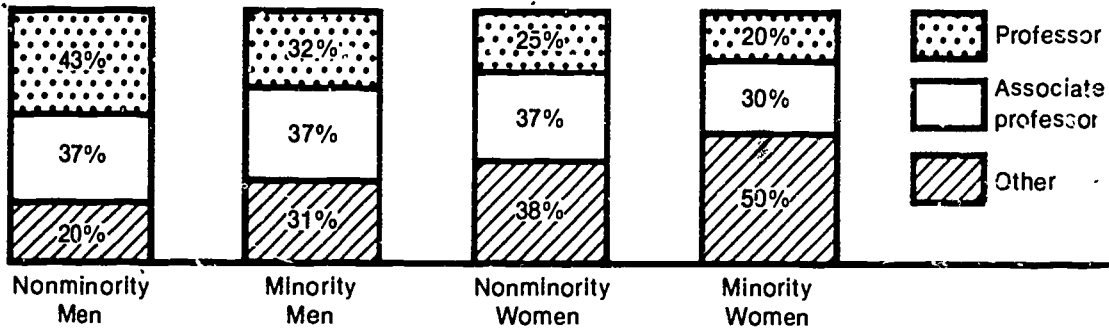
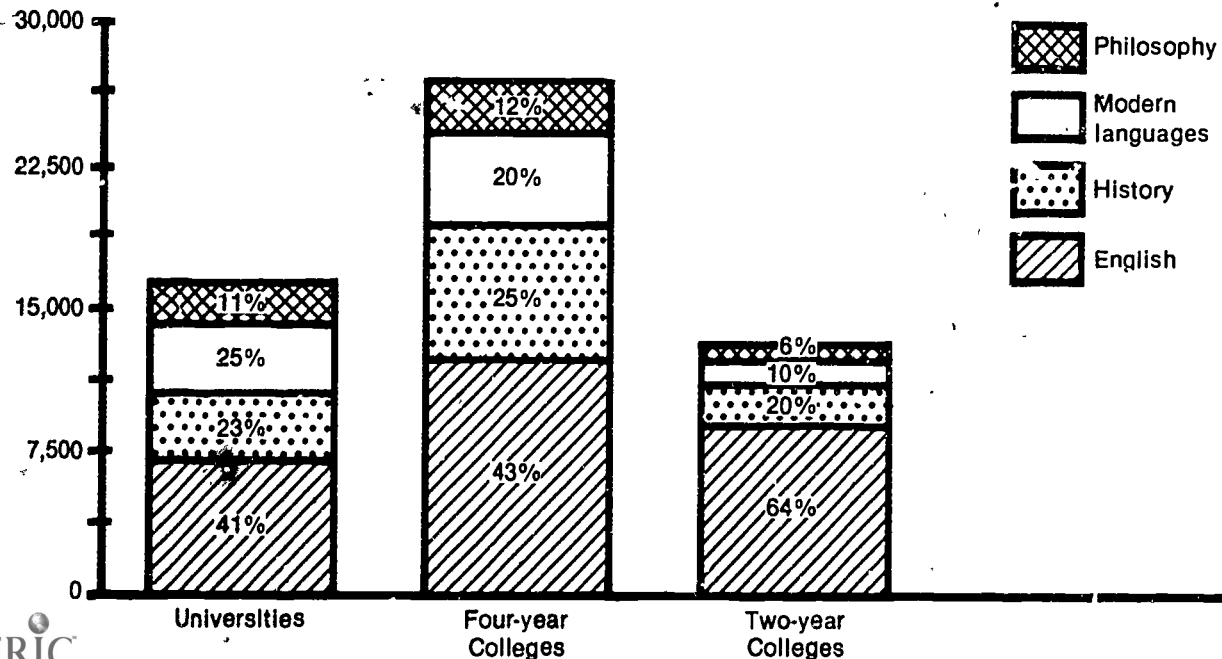


Fig. 8. Field Distribution of Humanities Faculty by Institutional Category



From another perspective, Figure 7 shows how each of the gender and minority status categories is distributed among the ranks. More than two-fifths of all tenured nonminority men hold a full professorship, compared with 32 percent of the minority men, 25 percent of the nonminority women, and 20 percent of the minority women. Note too the roughly converse proportions in the "other" tenured ranks. Minority women form the greatest proportion of tenured faculty who are neither professors nor associate professors. Much of this may be a reflection of their overrepresentation at two-year colleges, which are more likely to have no ranks at all.

Major Humanities Departments

As noted earlier, the largest share of the humanities faculty teach in English departments (28,000), followed by history (13,500), modern languages (11,000), and philosophy (5,900). Figure 8 shows that, proportionately, the universities and four-year colleges are similar in their allocations of faculty to the four disciplines. At the two-year colleges, however, almost two-thirds of the humanities faculty teach English, one-fifth teach history, one-tenth are in modern languages, and the remaining 6 percent are in philosophy.

The distribution of faculty by minority status and gender among the four disciplines is shown in Figure 9. Nonminority men are especially dominant in philosophy (84 percent) and history (80 percent). In modern languages, both minority men and minority women have a somewhat higher than average representation (10 percent and 6 percent, respectively), perhaps due to the inclusion of Spanish-speaking groups in the minority classification.

Tenure Status

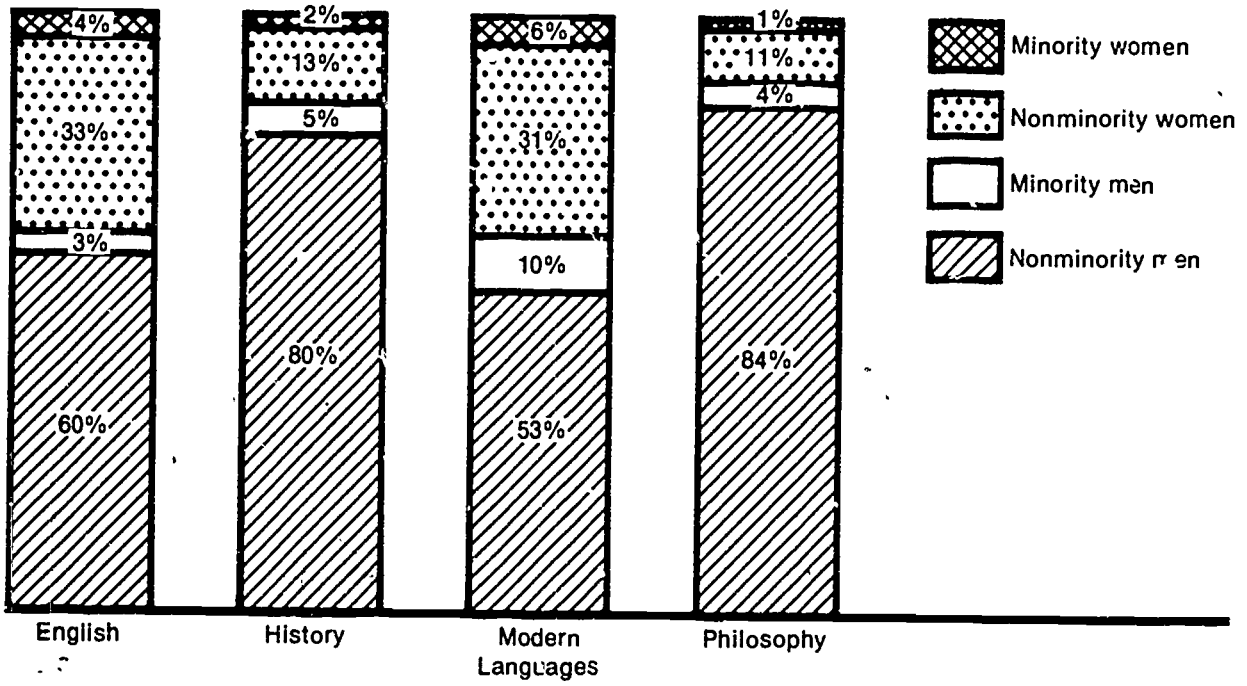
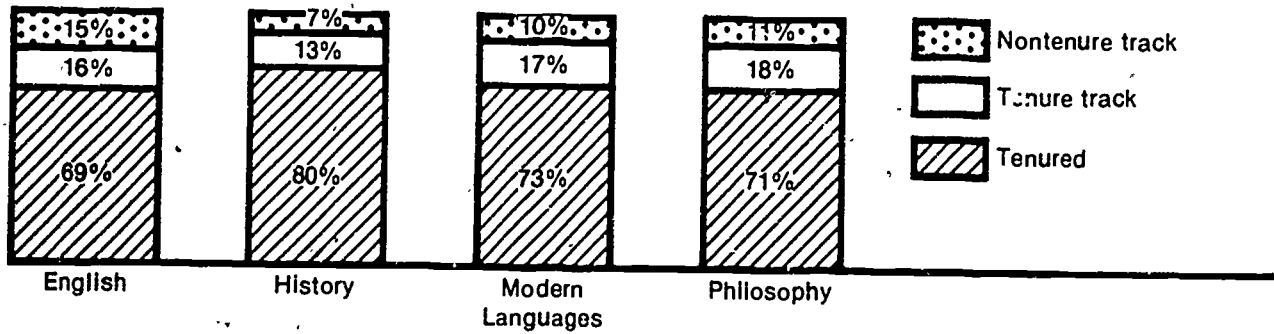


Fig. 10. Tenure Status of Humanities Faculty, by Field

The preponderant majority of faculty in each of the four humanities fields has already achieved tenure. As shown in Figure 10, the history faculty has the highest proportion of tenured faculty (80 percent); the modern languages, philosophy, and English faculties show somewhat lower tenure rates, ranging from 69 percent to 73

Fig. 9. Gender and Minority Status of Humanities Faculty, by Field

percent. Most other faculty are in the tenure track, awaiting tenure. Among the disciplines, this group ranges from 13 percent of the history faculty to 18 percent of the philosophy faculty.

Figure 11 presents a second view of these same data, showing differences by gender and minority status. Again, nonminority men in each of the four humanities disciplines have greater proportions of their number tenured (75 percent or more) than any other faculty group. For both minority men and women, the modern languages offer the highest tenure rates (78 percent for the men and 70 percent for the women).

The tenure rates for nonminority women in each of the four disciplines are consistently lower than for all the faculty men. Comparing the tenure rates of minority and nonminority women yields a mixed result, with the rates for minority women higher than those for nonminority women in English and modern languages and lower in history and philosophy.

Rank

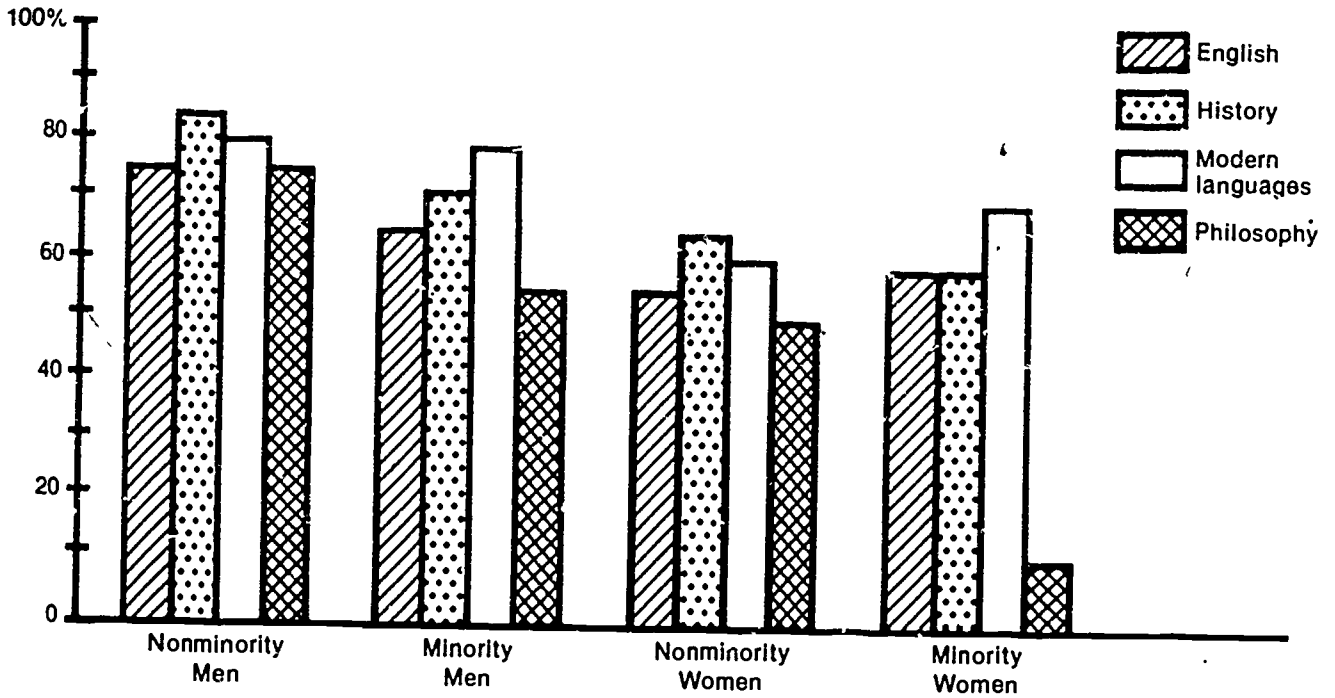
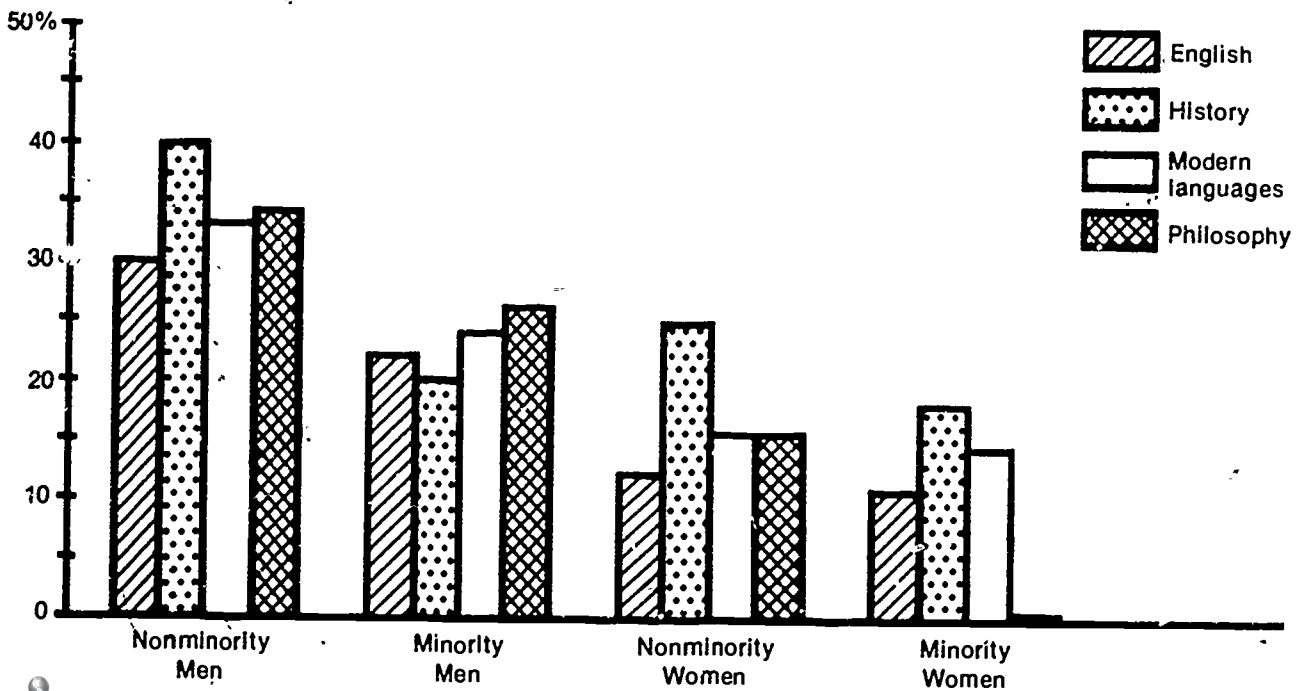


Fig. 12. Percentage of Humanities Faculty in Each Field Who are Full Professors, by Gender and Minority Status

It follows that the pattern of dominance by men shown for tenure rates would be accentuated in examining the distribution of full professorships among the faculty categories and humanities disciplines. As shown in Figure 12, this pattern is confirmed. Indeed, the proportion of nonminority men with full professorships is substantially higher than for all the other faculty categories in each of the four disciplines surveyed. Overall, about 34 percent of nonminority faculty men have attained full professorships, followed by 23 percent of the minority men, 15 percent of the nonminority women and 12 percent of the minority women. Among the disciplines, the single exception to this ordering is in history. There, the proportion of nonminority women with professorships is slightly higher than that of minority men.

Highest Degree Earned

Almost two-thirds (64 percent) of all full-time faculty identified in this survey had earned a doctorate degree in a humanities field. This rate varied, however,

Fig. 11. Percentage of Humanities Faculty in Each Field Who are Tenured, by Gender and Minority Status

by gender and minority status of the faculty members, by discipline, and by institutional type.

Institutional Setting and Department

As shown in Table G, universities had the largest proportion of doctorate-level humanities faculty (87 percent), followed by four-year colleges (72 percent).

Consistent with findings from an earlier HEP survey, two-year colleges appointed significantly fewer faculty holding doctorate degrees (20 percent).² Nine out of every ten faculty members at private universities had a Ph.D., compared with two of every ten faculty members at private two-year colleges. As indicated previously, the data on degrees earned reflect similarities more by type of institution than by control. That is, the differences between private and public institutions are not as great as the differences between universities, four-year colleges, and two-year colleges.

Overall, proportionately fewer English faculty members held a Ph.D.:

Figure 13 shows how these percentages by discipline vary according to the category of institution. History and philosophy faculty had the highest percentages of doctorate holders--at least 95 percent each in the universities and over 80 percent each in four-year colleges. In the two-year colleges, the proportions of Ph.D. faculty were substantially lower.

Gender and Minority Status

At all institutions, nonminority men had the highest proportion of doctorate-holders in the humanities--71 percent. Six of every 10 minority men held a Ph.D., as did 5 of every 10 nonminority women and 4 of every 10 minority women.

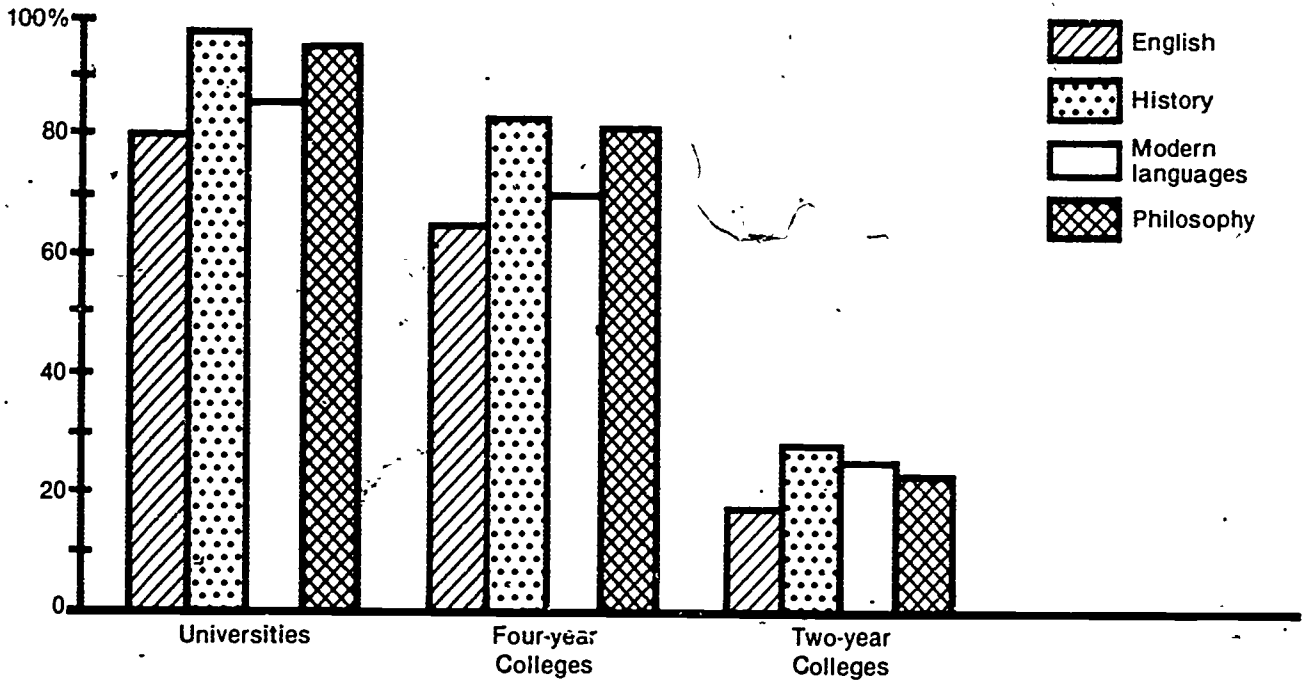


Fig. 14. Percentage of Humanities Faculty with a Ph.D., by Gender, Minority Status, and Institutional Category

Figure 14 demonstrates how these percentages varied at different types of institutions. In nearly all settings, however, proportionately more men than women, and proportionately more nonminorities than minorities, had a Ph.D. degree.

Rank

On the whole, humanities faculty with tenure were more likely to hold a Ph.D., as were faculty in the higher ranks (i.e., professor and associate professor).

As can be seen in Table H, very little difference exists in Ph.D. rates among full and associate professors (tenured) at the university level--97 percent vs. 95 percent. That difference grows wider at the four-year college level--93 percent vs. 78 percent--and still wider at the two-year college level--40 percent vs. 19 percent. Of the other tenured faculty, far fewer held Ph.D.s: about 59 percent at universities, about 36 percent at four-year colleges, and about 14 percent at two-year colleges.

Fig. 13. Percentage of Humanities Faculty in Each Field with a Ph.D., by Institutional Category

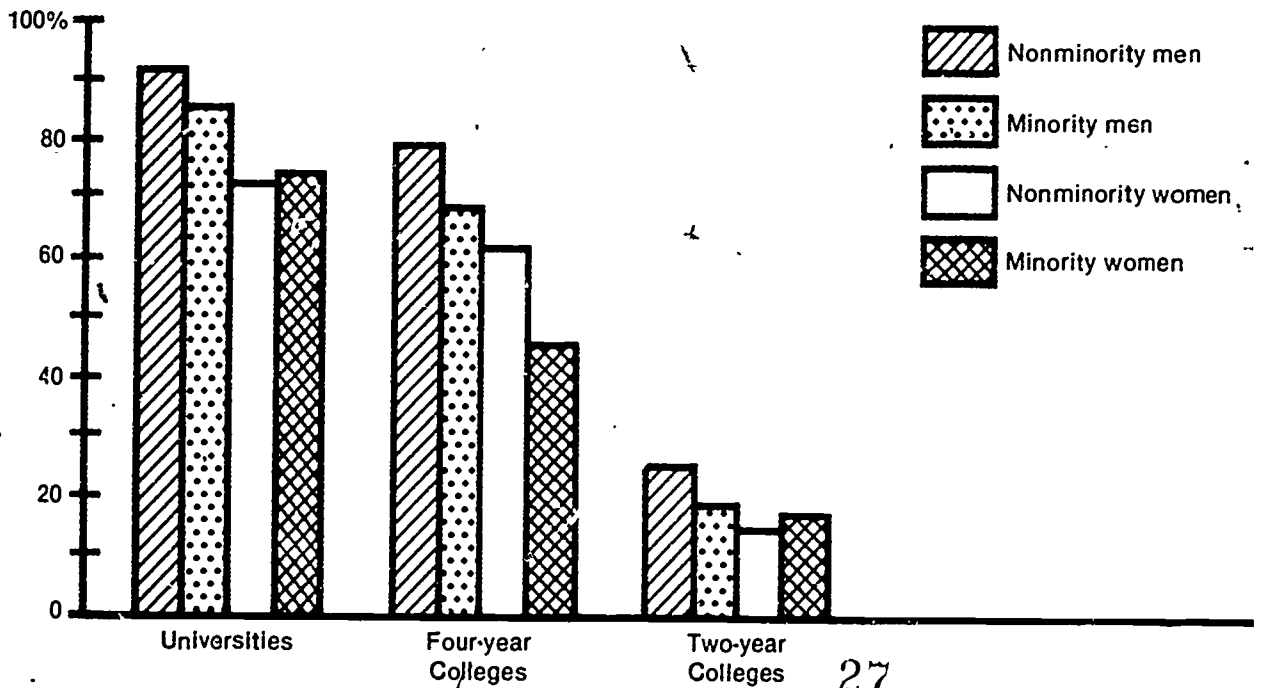

To put the number of new faculty appointments into perspective, it is helpful to look at the number of new doctorate recipients in recent years. The National Center for Education Statistics³ estimates that in 1978-79, approximately 4,500 earned doctorate degrees were awarded in all humanities fields; approximately 4,600 were awarded in 1979-80, and about 4,700 in 1980-81.⁴

A report by the National Academy of Sciences (referenced in footnote 4) revealed that colleges and universities appear to employ a smaller proportion of the humanities Ph.D.s than in the past. In 1979, institutions of higher education employed 84 percent of persons who had received the humanities doctorate between 1936 and 1978, whereas they employed only 79 percent of persons who had received the doctorate between 1973 and 1978.

Although the HEP questionnaire item and the NAS/NRC data are not strictly comparable, they both provide evidence of the relatively declining employment position of humanities faculty.

The National Research Council of the National Academy of Sciences Science, Engineering, and Humanities Doctorates in the United States: 1979 Profile, 1980, estimates that, as of 1979, there were 71,200 doctorate-holders in the humanities in the United States, 64,800 of whom were in the labor force. Of the 64,800:

- 1,900 were employed part-time but were seeking full-time employment;
- 1,400 were unemployed and seeking employment.

A more interesting figure is that, of the 63,400 employed humanities doctorates in 1979 (full-time, part-time, and postdoctoral appointees), almost one of every five were employed in a *nonhumanities* field.

Summary

The results of this survey have shown that there are more than 58,000 full-time faculty in the four largest humanities disciplines: English, history, modern languages, and philosophy. Two-thirds have appointments in public institutions, and nearly half teach English.

Women comprise only 3 of every 10 faculty members, and minorities only 1 of every 10. These two groups--women and minorities--tend to be overrepresented at two-year colleges and underrepresented at universities. Women, more so than minorities, are less likely to hold tenure, and both groups are more likely to be in non-tenure-track positions. On the other hand, relatively fewer of their number hold a doctorate degree in the humanities.

New faculty appointments numbered about 3,700 of the total in 1979-80, but only 3,200 were expected for the next year. About half of the new appointees will be tenured or in tenure-track positions.



APPENDIX B: Technical Notes

Weighting

Data from the responding Panel institutions were statistically adjusted to represent the national population of institutions that had full-time humanities faculty. The stratification design for weighting follows:

It was assumed that the departmental structures of Panel institutions are similar to the departmental structures of population institutions. For the first stage of the weighting procedure, responding Panel institutions were adjusted for departmental non-response; second, the Panel was adjusted for institutional nonresponse; third, institutional weights were applied to bring the Panel up to the national population.

Comparison of Respondents and Nonrespondents

Table B-2 compares survey respondents and nonrespondents against several variables. Higher-than-average response rates were recorded for universities (94 percent) and institutions with moderate undergraduate enrollments of between 6,000-10,000 students (90 percent). Two-year colleges, particularly in the private sector, had lower-than-average response rates (71 percent of private two-year colleges, 76 percent of public two-year colleges).

Reliability of Survey Estimates

Since the statistics presented in this report are based on a sample, they will differ somewhat from the figures which would have been obtained if a complete census had been taken using the same survey instrument, instructions, and procedures. As in any survey, the results are also subject to reporting and processing errors and errors due to nonresponse. To the extent possible, these types of errors were kept to a minimum by methods built into the survey procedures.

The standard error is primarily a measure of sampling variability; that is, the variations that might occur by chance because only a sample of the institutions is surveyed. The chances are about 68 out of 100 that an estimate from the sample would differ from a complete census by less than the standard error. The chances are about 90 out of 100 that the difference would be less than 1.65 times the standard error; about 95 out of 100 that it would be less than 1.96 times the standard error; and about 99 out of 100 that it would be less than 2.5 times as large. Thus, knowing the standard error permits us to specify a range within which we can have a stated confidence that a given estimate would lie if a complete census, rather than a sample survey, had been conducted. As an example, please refer to the estimated number of full-time faculty in English departments in all institutions--28,076. The standard error of the estimate is 661 which, when multiplied by 1.65 yields 1,091, or the half-length of the 90 percent confidence interval. Thus, chances are about 90 out of 100 that a complete census would show the number of full-time English faculty in all institutions to be more than 26,986 and less than 29,167.
