## ABSTRACT

Data on 1980-81 enrollments in U.S. four-year and two-year higher education institutions are presented and interpreted. Data from 1,818 four-year institutions in the United States, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Territories indicated a total enrollment for fall 1980 of over 7 million, of which over 5 million were full-time and slightly over 2 million were part-time. Women students comprised 49.9 percent of the population in the four-year schools. Data from 1,083 two-year colleges and proprietary schools indicated a total enrollment for fall 1980 of slightly over 4 million, of which approximately 1.5 million were full-time and about 2.5 million were part-time. Women students comprised 53.5 percent of the population in the two-year schools. Enrollments in four-year institutions increased by 3.6 percent, and full-time enrollments also increased by 3.6 percent. Almost one-fourth of the students enrolled in four-year institutions attend a school or college that is part of a statewide system. Additional findings include the following: unitary systems registered a 6.1 percent increase in full-time enrollments; public complex universities' full-time enrollments increased by 2.4 percent; private-complex universities' full-time enrollments increased by 2.6 percent; multipurpose institutions' full-time enrollments increased by 4 percent; public two-year institutions' enrollments increased by 7.8 percent; independent private two-year colleges, church affiliated, and proprietary schools' combined enrollments increased by 5.7 percent; junior colleges' enrollment increased by 8 percent; community colleges' enrollment increased by 7.8 percent; full-time entering freshmen enrollments increased; collegiate enrollment of veterans and related student groups declined by 11.3 percent; and graduate school enrollments increased by 2.5 percent. 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## COLLEGIATE ENROLLMENTS IN THE U.S., 1980-81

The 61st annual report on collegiate enrollments in 4-year institutions in the United States was based on data received from 1,818 colleges and universities in the U.S., Puerto Rico, and U.S. Territories. The grand total enrollment for fall 1980 was 7,252,646 of which 5,175,469 were full-time and 2,077,177 were part-time. Women students comprised 49.9% of the population.

The 9th annual report on student enrollments in the American 2-year institutions was based on data supplied by 1,083 schools and colleges. The grand total enrollment for these institutions for fall 1980 was 4,064,270 with 1,586,913 full-time and 2,477,357 part-time enrollees (actually 10 additional reports were received, with incomplete data that indicated the enrollment of another 71,089 students). Women students comprised 53.5% of the population in the 2-year schools.

The collegiate enrollment studies were begun in 1919 and continued for 40 years by the late Dr. Raymond Walters, long-time president of the University of Cincinnati. In 1960, Dr. Garland G. Parker of Cincinnati assumed the authorship and continued the studies through fall 1978. The report on American 2-year institutions was initiated by Parker in 1972. In 1979, due to the approaching retirement of Dr. Parker, the responsibility for the studies was assumed by J. Ernest Mickler, assistant vice-president for Planning and Operations at The University of Alabama.

Formerly published in *Intellect* and its predecessor *School and Society*, The American College Testing Program has published the studies as ACT Special Reports since 1975. The joint effort of the author, The University of Alabama, and The American College Testing Program is made in the interest of providing useful and timely information for American higher education.

Requirements cannot be imposed for the submission of data, however, 92% of the 4-year institutions and 90% of the 2-year institutions reported in 1980. Unique to the study series is the procedure for calculating percentages of change. All percentages of change are based on comparable data, that is, an institution must have filed enrollment reports for both fall 1980 and fall 1979 to have been included in the calculation of percentages of change. All reports received for any given year are reported, but the changes are calculated as noted above. This procedure is used to provide more accurate information and takes into account the fact that universal reporting does not occur. It also excludes changes that could occur due to the opening or closing of institutions.

Considerable effort has been given to avoid error in calculations and presentation of data; however, the author assumes no responsibility for the data which may have been submitted incorrectly. The American College Testing Program and The University of

Alabama assume no responsibility for the data, interpretations, and conclusions in the studies. As indicated previously, the studies are made as a public service.

In previous years, the enrollment studies have been published in separate volumes. In 1980, however, it was decided to print one volume that contains both studies. The 4-year study and tables are presented first. An overall summary and conclusions will be presented following the 2-year narrative.

### Enrollments in 4-Year Institutions

Grand total enrollments increase by 3.6%. For the second consecutive year, enrollments in the 4-year colleges and universities in the United States have grown. In fact, until 1976, an enrollment decline had not occurred in 25 years. A slight decline of .3% was reported also in fall 1978. Though last year's increase was small (.5%), it occurred at the time when the potential student pool declined. The 1980 growth rate is even more significant because of its magnitude and the further decline in the traditional college age population.

The 3.6% increase was calculated on the basis of reports from 1,599 institutions that reported enrollments in fall 1979 and again in fall 1980. Total enrollments and percentage changes by category as defined on page 13 were as follows. 210 unitary systems 1,762,144, +3.6%, 166 public complex universities, 2,003,448, +3.8%, 77 private complex universities 737,234, +3.6%, 296 multipurpose colleges and universities, 1,469,446, +3.0%, 693 arts and sciences colleges, 935,508, +3.3%, 45 music, fine arts, and applied arts institutions, 30,059, +6.0%; 66 independent law, medicine, and allied health schools 59,999, +3.1%; 83 technological, business, and related schools, 194,798, +7.0%; 62 Bible colleges, 25,597, +1.9%, and 120 theological schools, 34,413, -2.5%.

Percentages of increase were surprisingly uniform in seven of the 10 categories of institutions. Two categories exceeded the grand total increase rather substantially and one declined. Theological schools was the only category in which enrollment declines occurred in fall 1980. This category enrolls far less than 1% of the 4 year students, thus, the decrease has little impact on the total enrollment gains.

Full-time enrollments also up 3.6%. Only two categories of institutions had declines in full-time enrollments in the fall of 1980, and these were slight (.6% and 1.0%). The increases ranged from 2.1% to 6.1%. For the second consecutive year, the unitary systems showed the greatest gains in full-time enrollments. Again and for several years, full-time students made up 71% of the population in the 4-year colleges and universities. Details of enrollments by category are given in the following sections. Listings by institutions within categories are presented in Tables 1-4 through 10-4.

Unitary systems register a 6.1% increase in full-time enrollments. Almost one fourth of the students enrolled in 4-year institutions attend a school or college that is part of a statewide system. By definition, these systems include all higher education campuses that are controlled by statewide boards and administered by an executive officer with statewide system responsibilities.

There were 1,224,227 full-time students enrolled on the 201 campuses of the unitary systems. The 6.1% growth rate for the year represents a headcount increase of approximately 100,000 students in the fall term. Full-time enrollment is the mode in this category, with almost 70% of the unitary system students registered with full class loads. Enrollments in the unitary systems are reported in Table 1-4.

**Public complex universities increase full-time enrollments — up 2.4%.** In 166 universities, the total full-time enrollment for fall 1980 was 1,466,231 students or about 73% of the student population at these institutions. The 2.4% increase represents a headcount gain of approximately 44,000 students, which was double the headcount gain of 1979. The public complex universities also reported substantial increases in part-time enrollments. For several years, there have been fluctuations in enrollments in this category of institutions. There seems to be no pattern, except one of variation. Parker (1979) suggested several factors impinging on the public complex universities that would likely cause fluctuations in enrollment. They included the impact of the economy, inflation, legislative mandates, increased competition for students, student preferences, and others. Actually, these factors more or less impinge on all of higher education, but their impact may be more critical on the large institutions. Table 2-4 presents enrollments in public complex universities.

**Private-complex universities increase full-time enrollments — up 2.6%.** For a fifth consecutive year, the private complex universities have shown increases in full-time student enrollments. There were 516,858 full-time students enrolled in the 77 reporting institutions in the fall of 1980. This year's increase was at virtually the same rate as the public complex universities, though the growth pattern of private universities is far more stable. Perhaps this reflects the prestige of the institutions, their dedication to active recruitment, and the influence of loyal alumni. Enrollment tabulations for private-complex universities are presented in Table 3-4.

**Multipurpose institutions full-time enrollments rose by 4%.** Following 2 years of declines in full-time enrollments, the multipurpose institutions grew substantially in 1980. There were 990,749 full-time students enrolled on 296 campuses in this category. Just over two-thirds of the population are full-time students in the multipurpose category. With a grand total increase of 3.0% increase as reported above, there had to be a decline in part-time students on the multipurpose campuses. The decline was in part-time men students, a situation that occurred also in the unitary systems where enrollment of part-time men declined by 4.6%.

The multipurpose institutions, by definition, are those colleges and universities that offer graduate work but have only one or two doctoral programs. Typically, these were state colleges and teachers colleges that became regional universities during the sixties. With a grand total growth rate almost equal to the rate of increase in the country, these institutions appear to be competing effectively for students. As regional institutions, their attractiveness to students may increase because of their proximity to the students' homes. The size of these institutions makes it possible for them to give more attention to

individual student needs. Also, faculty members at the multipurpose institutions typically, are recognized for their abilities to teach, and less emphasis is placed on research and service. Table 4-4 lists enrollments in the multipurpose institutions for fall 1980.

Arts and sciences colleges continue to grow — up 2.1%. Increasing from a .4% gain in 1978 to a 2.0% gain in 1979, the arts and sciences colleges grew at an even greater rate in 1980. The 693 reporting institutions had a full-time enrollment of 715,166 students. As in 1979, approximately 77% of the students in the colleges of arts and sciences were full time. Also as in 1979, the enrollment gains were produced primarily by substantial increases in the enrollment of women students.

The liberal arts colleges have a long history of successful competition for students. Their admissions professionals have formulated effective recruitment plans and have implemented them well. Thus, these institutions continue to grow at about the same rate as all of higher education. Even in the era of science and technology of the sixties, the liberal arts colleges retained their prominence in higher education. The recent core curriculum movement attests to the viability of the liberal arts tradition. Furthermore, the ability to learn and the ability to interact intelligently with people may be of more value in an era of rapidly changing technologies than the acquisition of prescribed techniques or processes that will become obsolete quite rapidly.

The listing of enrollments in the arts and sciences colleges can be found in Table 5-4.

Music, fine arts, and applied arts schools report substantial gains — up 4.5%. The increase in fall 1980 continues a pattern of growth that extends over several years. The rate of increase was the third largest in the 10 categories for the year, but it was not a record for the category itself. In 1976, the growth rate was 6.5%.

There were 24,435 full-time students enrolled in the 45 institutions reporting for the year. Over 81% of the students reported by these specialized institutions were enrolled full time. This enrollment pattern has remained essentially the same over the years and more or less reflects the nature of the demanding instructional programs offered. Table 6-4 lists the enrollments in the music, fine arts, and applied arts institutions.

Independent law, medicine, and allied health full-time enrollments were down .6% from 1979. Following several years of substantial growth, the independent law, medicine, and allied health institutional enrollments began to level off in 1977. In 1978, the growth rate was only 7%. In the three previous years, it had averaged over 10%. The gain in fall 1979 was 2.5%, but this was due primarily to part-time enrollees. In the current year (1980), the decline in full-time enrollments in the independent law, medicine, and allied health institutions was the first decline experienced in recent times. There was, however, a growth rate of over 25% in part-time students that produced the grand total growth rate of 3.1% cited previously. The movement of women students into this category of institutions, cited last year (Mickler, 1980), continued in the fall of 1980. Apparently the deliberate attempts to attract women students have been successful. Conversely, the



demands for professionals trained by institutions in this category have leveled off or perhaps have begun to decline. Recent predictions indicate a surplus of physicians within the next decade. Fiscal constraints, not excluding the problem of inflation, have resulted in the imposition of enrollment quotas and the curtailment of capital expenditures in some instances. Consequently, declines in enrollment are not only anticipated, they are expected. Enrollments by institution are presented in Table 7-4. A comprehensive survey of medical enrollments is presented in a later section of this report.

**Independent technological, business, and related schools report increases — up 5.9%.** For at least five years the independent technological and business schools have experienced increases in enrollment of full-time students. Though the almost 6% increase for 1980 was not the largest in the past five years, it is a substantial gain when compared with the three most recent years. There were 83 institutions that reported a combined total of 145,073 full-time students enrolled for fall 1980, which represents almost 75% of the student population. Seven of every 10 students are men on the campuses of the independent technological and business schools.

Enrollment patterns in the category are not consistent in spite of the increases noted above. It is recognized that a number of variables come to bear on enrollments; however, there must be a direct relationship with the economy that is more pronounced in these schools than in some of the others. Table 8-4 lists institutions with enrollments for 1980.

**Bible colleges report increased enrollments of full-time students — up 1.8%.** Bible colleges reversed a trend of decline in full-time students in 1979 and reinforced that reversal in 1980. In 1979 the growth rate was .4% or only about one fifth of the rate of increase reported above. There were 62 Bible colleges reporting in 1980 with 21,674 full-time students. Full-time enrollments are the mode in the Bible schools, with almost 85% of the population full time. The ratio of men to women students is about 3 to 2 and has remained at that level for several years. Typically, the Bible colleges are small with an average enrollment of about 400 students. A good number of the institutions are fundamentalist in origin, but the general nature of the curriculum is liberal arts with considerable emphasis upon Biblical studies. Enrollment data by institution are presented in Table 9-4.

**Theological schools decline for a second consecutive year, full-time enrollments down 1.0%.** The 120 schools that reported in 1980 enrolled 22,151 students full time. Had the enrollment gain of full-time women students not been substantial (+9.2%), the decline would have been much greater. Full-time enrollments of men fell by over 3%. Obviously there are more men than women enrolled in the theological schools, though the ratio has changed some in recent years. In 1980, 77% of the population was men; however, in 1979, it was 78%.

By definition, the theological schools are public or private institutions whose primary purpose is to give theological training in post-baccalaureate professional or graduate programs for religious professionals and lay workers. Whether or not a second year of

decline, particularly of men, heralds a decline in church activities and programs remains to be seen. Considerable dissension among major denominational groups and the intrusion of religious groups into the political scene may have had an adverse effect upon the movement of college graduates into these institutions. Institutional listings for the theological schools are given in Table 10-4.

Part-time student enrollments grow — up 3.5%. Reversing the decline of 2.8% in 1979, part-time enrollments grew at approximately the same rate as full-time enrollments. The 1,818 4-year institutions reported 2,077,177 part-time students in 1980, which comprised approximately 29% of the 4-year college population reported. A wide variation in growth rate of part-time men and part-time women students occurred, part-time men increased by 1.1% while part-time women increased by 5.5%. Within the context of the total college population, this difference is large. Actual headcount differences amount to about a 53,000 increase of part-time women, compared with an increase of slightly more than 9,000 part-time men. The conjecture made previously (Mickler 1980) that the availability of corporate educational programs may be the reason for disparate growth of part-time men and women students. The total part-time enrollments and percentages of change within the 10 categories of institutions are as follows. 210 unitary state systems 537,917, -1.5, 166 public complex universities 538,217, +8.1%, 77 private complex universities 220,376, +5.9%, 296 multipurpose institutions 478,697, +.8%, 693 arts and sciences colleges 220,342, +7.4%, 45 music, fine arts, and applied arts schools 5,624, +12.7%, 66 independent law, medicine, and allied health schools 10,094, +26.2%, 83 independent technological, business, and related schools 49,725, +10.7%, 62 Bible colleges 3,923, +2.7%; 120 theological schools 12,262, -5.4%.

Full-time entering freshmen enrollments increase. Prior to 1979, Parker reported comparative enrollments based upon classified freshmen counts. The term "classified freshman" was defined loosely as any student who had not earned as many as 30 semester hours or 45 quarter hours. In 1979 the present author reported on entering full-time freshmen because of the apparent confusion over the term "classified freshmen." Despite the expectation of receiving better data, there may remain some reporting discrepancies in the section on freshman enrollments. To further complicate matters, a printing omission on the face of the data collection form for 1980 resulted in the reporting of both full-time and part-time freshmen despite the definition printed on the back of the data form that specified full time only.

Table 11-4 presents the details of freshmen enrollments as reported by the institutions under the condition stated above.

Enrollments of women students continue a pattern of growth — up 4.6% in 1980. Increasing numbers of women students on college and university campuses in fall 1980 narrowed the very slight difference in the ratio of men to women students. The 3,621,739 women students enrolled in the 1,818 reporting institutions comprised 49.94% of the student population in those schools. Over the previous five years, the percentages of women students on 4-year campuses have been as follows. 1975-76, 45.4%, 1976-77,

46.3%, 1977-78, 47.5%, 1978-79, 48.7, 1979-80, 49.3%. The enrollment of men students increased in fall 1980 by 2.5% in comparable institutions based on a grand total of 3,630,907 enrollees.

Full-time women student enrollments increased 4.3% in fall 1980 — a full 1% increase over 1979. There were 2,479,030 full-time women and 2,696,439 full-time men in the 4-year institutions. The increase in men students was 3.0% in 1980, which was considerably above the slight increase of .3% in 1979. In view of the percentages reported above, it can be expected that the proportion of full-time women students to full-time men students continues to shift toward an equal distribution. In 1980, 47.9% of the full-time student population was women. Last year, women made up 47.5%, in 1978, the proportion was 46.8%, in 1977, 45.9%, and in 1976, 44.7%. Full-time enrollments by sex are reported in Tables 1-4 through 10-4. Percentages of change in full-time enrollments of men and women students respectively by categories of institutions were as follows: Unitary, +2.8% and +4.4%, public-complex, 3.0% and 4.8%, private-complex, +2.1% and +5.5%, multipurpose, +1.6% and +4.2%, arts and sciences, +1.7% and +4.6%; music; fine arts, and applied arts, +3.6% and +8.3%, law, medicine, and allied health, +4% and +9.4%, technological, business, and related, +7.1% and +6.8%, Bible, +2.2% and +1.6%; and theological, -3.5% and +1.0%.

The enrollment of part-time women students grew in fall 1980 by 5.5%. In 1979 there was a decline of almost 1%. Over 2 million students enrolled part time in the 4-year institutions. There were 1,142,709 women and 934,468 men part-time students. The enrollment of part-time men changed direction in 1980 as well. Instead of a near 5% loss in 1979, the growth for 1980 was 1.1%. Part-time women have exceeded part-time men for several years, and the disparity continues to grow viz. 50.2% in 76-77, 51.3% in 1977-78, 53% in 78-79, 53.8% in 1979-80, and 55% in 1980-81.

Enrollments by geographic regions again show considerable change. Table 13-4 presents a geographic distribution of all students enrolled in comparably reporting institutions in fall 1980. The grand total enrollment in the 1,599 comparably reporting institutions was 6,620,586. In the previous year, the same 1,599 institutions enrolled 6,392,318 students. The previously reported rate of growth was 3.6%. Enrollments by regions with percentages of change were as follows. New England, 394,350, +7.0; Middle Atlantic, 1,279,560, +3.4%, East North Central, 1,251,759, +3.1%, West North Central, 626,433, +7.6%, South Atlantic, 947,880, 1.9%, East South Central, 460,939, +2.6%; West South Central, 633,675, +3.6%, Mountain, 370,181, +4.7%; Pacific, 598,024, +1.5%; and Commonwealth and Territories, 57,785, +5.1%. There was growth in every region in fall 1980. Those that grew most last year grew again at about the same level; however, the New England Region and the West North Central Region growth rates almost doubled the overall growth rate in the country.

The state of New York continues to have, by far, the largest number of students in the 4-year colleges and universities. California is a distant second, followed by Ohio and Texas. Five other states, Illinois, Indiana, Massachusetts, Michigan, and Pennsylvania

reported enrollments of over 200,000 students each. These 9 states enrolled almost 48% of the 4-year students in the country.

Collegiate enrollment of veterans and related student groups continue to decline — down 11.3%. As expected with elapsed time, there were fewer veterans and others receiving veterans benefits enrolled in colleges and universities in the fall of 1980. Major decreases in enrollments have occurred over the past several years with a 33.3% decline in 1976-77, a 19.1% decline in 1977-78, 18.5% in 1978-79, and 17.1% in 1979-80. The trend continued in 1980 but decelerated rather substantially. The headcount decline in 1979-80 was approximately 136,000, but in 1980-81 there were less than 75,000 fewer persons who received benefits through the educational programs of the Veterans Administration.

The detailed information that follows was provided on behalf of the Veterans Administration by Donald R. Foxvog, Director for Magazines and Special Projects and Michael Facine, Chief of Statistical Review and Analysis Division in the VA Controller's Office.

Under Chapter 31, U.S. Code (former Public Law 894, Korean Vocational Rehabilitation, and Public Law 87-815, Peacetime Vocational Rehabilitation), 12,613 veterans were in college as of November 30, 1980. Chapter 34 benefits, which provide college level readjustment training under Public Laws 89-358 and 90-77, covered 432,736 veterans and 17,586 service personnel—a total of 450,292 in training—or a decrease of 11.3% since the end of November 1979. The downward trend in veteran enrollments over the last several years has been caused largely by the loss of GI Bill eligibility by large numbers of post-Korean veterans who had attained their ten-year delimiting date. Under the Chapter 32—Post-Vietnam Era Veterans' Educational Assistance—Program (VEAP), 1,322 veterans were using their benefits in college. Orphans, spouses, and widow(er)s of service personnel or veterans receiving educational benefits for college-level training under Chapter 35 number 55,793, a decrease of 2.4%. The total college level enrollment of all veterans and service personnel was 464,227, a decrease of 10.8%. The count of all veterans, service personnel, spouses, widow(er)s, and sons and daughters at the college level was 520,020, a decrease of 9.9%. Veterans enrolled in on-the-farm, on-the-job, and flight training programs, and in other noncollegiate degree programs, totaled 133,861. The grand total of veterans only for all laws and levels was 565,331. This figure represents a decrease of 11.5% from the 1979 total of 639,095.

It is not correct to assume that all of the students formerly covered by GI bill benefits failed to enroll only because of the expiration of their coverage during the past several school years. Some students completed their academic training, and others chose to terminate or interrupt their training prior to having arrived at their 10-year delimiting date. The Veterans Administration reported, however, that the educational community should be aware of the decline in student assistance provided by the VA because of the phasing out of the current GI bill education program. On November 23, 1977, a new Public Law 95-202 was enacted. It raised educational benefits for veterans by 6.6% and provided other benefits for the veterans and their enrolling institutions. The 65%

participation rate of veterans noted in 1978 under the present GI bill is far higher than the 43% rate under the Korean Conflict GI bill and the 50% rate under the World War II GI bill. Although veteran enrollments will continue to decline, the improved benefits provided by PL 95-202 has slowed the decline somewhat.

Full-time equivalent (FTE) grew by 3.6% in 1980. The calculation of full-time equivalent enrollments has been estimated in the study series by adding one third of the headcount of part-time students to the full-time student headcount. This procedure gives a reasonable approximation of the measure of instructional effort that is tied in most instances to the process of funding. In the 1,818 4-year institutions reporting in 1979, the FTE of the grand total of enrollments was 5,860,937. By the 10 institutional categories, the FTE comparable totals and percentages were: unitary, 1,335,011, +5.1%; public complex, 1,554,948, +3.0%; private complex, 498,282, +3.0%; multipurpose, 1,029,113, +3.5%; arts and sciences, 706,660, +2.6%; music, fine arts, and applied arts 22,466, +5.1%; law, medicine, and allied health, 31,982, +8%; technological, business, and related, 151,534, +6.3%; Bible, 19,879, +1.8%; and theological, 21,331, -1.7%.

Contrary to fall 1979, the part-time student enrollments served to increase the FTE in 1980. Part-time enrollments increased by 3.5% (as reported earlier); and full-time enrollments increased by 3.6%. As mentioned in the 1979 study (Mickler, 1980), part-time enrollments will not overcome the predicted declines in the enrollment of the traditional college age student, unless there is a rather dramatic shift in enrollment patterns.

Graduate school enrollments increase — by 2.5%. The graduate enrollment counts reflect students pursuing advanced study in numerous academic disciplines. First professional enrollments are not included but are reported in separate categories under law, medicine, and theology. There were 978 institutions that reported graduate enrollments in 1980 with a grand total of 1,088,955 students. Comparable data were received from 757 institutions to produce the enrollment gain of 2.5% noted above. The 1980 rate of gain was slightly less than the 1979 rate. There have been wide fluctuations, however, in previous years. For example, in 1976-77 there was a decline of 5.4%; in 1977-78 an increase of 3.6% was registered; in 1978-79 a decline of 3.1% occurred. A more detailed examination reveals that there were 547,793 men and 541,162 women students reported in 1980 for a gain of .4% and 4.6% respectively. In 1980, women accounted for 49.7% of the graduate population, reflecting the continuation of a trend shown by the following: in 1976-77, women students comprised 45% of the graduate population; in 1977-78, 46.6%; in 1978-79, 47.2%, and in 1979-80, 48.7%. Both full-time men and women registered gains in 1980 of .8% and 4.3% respectively. For several prior years, full-time men graduate enrollments declined, however, the growth of full-time women has been consistent. Part-time enrollments in graduate schools in 1980 also showed gains of .1% for men and 4.8% for women. Women continued to dominate the part-time enrollment category with 54.2% of the population. This proportion has increased over the past several years as follows: 1976-77, 49.2%; 1977-78, 50.9%; 1978-79, 51.9%; 1979-80, 53%.

The actual headcount increase in the comparably reporting schools amount to approximately 25,000 students for fall 1980. It is anticipated that graduate enrollments will continue to increase. There are certain fields that likely will decline and for various reasons. For example, graduate enrollments in engineering continue to decline because of the lucrative salaries being offered to engineering students graduating with the bachelor's degree. Conversely, graduate education has declined because of the poor salaries for beginning teachers. Taken as a whole, however, graduate schools can expect growth to continue because of the demands for more sophisticated personnel to staff modern business, industry, and human services programs.

**Law school enrollments continue to increase — up by 1.6%.** The results obtained from fall 1980 enrollment reports closely parallel those of the previous year. Last year there was a small decrease in the number of men students, a fairly sizeable increase in women students, and a modest overall increase. Further, the ratio of men to women students shifted by about 2%.

The rapid increases in law school enrollments of the early 1970s probably will not occur again. Though the demands of undergraduate students for legal education continue to run high, the job opportunities for attorneys may have stabilized or perhaps have begun to decline. The slowdown in enrollments that began in 1976-77 with an annual increase of only .1%, was followed in 1977-78 by a gain of .8%; the gain in 1978-79 was 1.5%; in 1979-80 it was 1.4% and in 1980-81 it was 1.6%. Such growth is minimal in comparison with that occurring in the years 1971-75.

There were 174 law schools and colleges that reported enrollments for fall 1980. The total enrollments were 109,653 students, with 33.6% women. Analysis of data submitted by 135 comparably reporting institutions revealed a decline in men students of 1.9%, an increase of 9.2% of women students, and the total increase reported above. Last year and for several years previously, there were declines of men students. In 1979-80, the loss was 1.9%; -1.3 in 1978-79; -2.1% in 1977-78; -3.5% in 1976-77; -.9% in 1975-76. Conversely, the 36,841 women students produced a 7.3% increase in 1979-80. Previously there were increases of 7.3% in 1979-80; +1% in 1978-79; +9.4% in 1977-78; +12.4% in 1976-77; and 22.1% in 1975-76. Unquestionably, women have moved with vigor into a profession once largely confined to men.

**Medical school enrollments increase 2.4%.** Despite growing concerns over a surplus of physicians, medical enrollments continued to grow in 1980. There were 147 schools reporting a total enrollment of 72,635 students, of whom 18,590 or about 26% were women. The enrollment of men in medical schools grew by .7%, whereas the enrollment of women increased 8.1%. Substantial increases in women students in medical schools have occurred over the past several years. For example, in 1979-80 women student enrollments increased by 8%; in 1978-79 the increase was 4.7%; and in 1977-78 the increase was 10.9%. Unquestionably women continue to move into higher education and into the field of medicine specifically.

The same imponderables suggested previously (Mickler 1980): of financial support, legislation requiring medical services, changes in the medical services delivery system, medical research, technology and others make predictions about continued growth in medical education tentative to say the least. The demand for physicians continues to be high in parts of the country, and the need for medical services will surely grow with population growth. Yet the conservative fiscal mood in the country is bound to limit the growth of medical education to some extent.

**The big 35.** As was the case in 1979, the 1980 enrollment data resulted in changes in the ranking and the composition of the 35 largest institutions. It should be clearly understood that the reporting documents were not verified and that all institutions did not report. Also, several branch campuses of some of the institutions did not file reports. Under the enumerated constraints, however, the rankings represent the relative positions of the largest 4-year institutions in the U.S. in fall 1980. Table 12-4 presents rankings based on total enrollments and on full-time enrollments.

## DEFINITIONS USED IN THIS ACT SPECIAL REPORT

**Student and Teaching Staff Definitions**

The **full-time student** devotes substantially all working or study time to the college curriculum. This is interpreted generally to mean 12 collegiate credit hours presumably 75% of a normal load or more, but may be less for graduate students. The **part-time student** normally takes collegiate credit courses in the late afternoons, on weekends, in the evening, frequently in the day, or by extension, and enrolls for fewer than 12 credits, or less than 75% of a normal load.

**First-time freshmen (full-time)** are presumed to be only those entering freshman full-time students who have not previously attended any college, inclusive of students enrolled in the fall term who attended college for the first time in the summer of 1978 as well as students who entered with college credits earned before graduation from high school.

**Classified freshmen (full-time)** are presumed to be full-time freshman students. This includes the first-time freshmen, as defined above, as well as any students who transferred from another institution at the first-year or freshman undergraduate level and any other first-year freshman undergraduate students.

Unless otherwise designated, it is presumed that all collegiate credit-hour students at all levels (undergraduate, graduate, and professional) are counted in the appropriate categories.

**Two-year college students** are those enrolled in collegiate-level credit-hour courses in 2-year (certificate or associate degree level) colleges administered by the institutions completing the reports.

**Full-time equivalent enrollment.** Full-time equivalent enrollments are not cited by institution, but totals are computed by categories of schools. This provides information broadly indicative of significant trends and developments in higher education above and beyond those revealed by headcount tabulations. The **adjusted headcount method**, whereby full-time equivalent enrollment is interpreted to equal the headcount of full-time students plus one-third the headcount of part-time students, is used.

The **full-time teaching staff** is composed only of those persons who hold the rank of instructor or its equivalent, and those of higher rank, in full-time employment, who give at least half their time to instruction. The **total teaching staff** includes both full-time and part-time teaching staff not on leave, including lecturers, fellows, teaching assistants, research assistants (if they teach), and others who teach. Cooperating teachers in public or private schools who supervise student teachers for colleges and universities are not covered in this study.



Institutions surveyed in this report are universities, 4-year colleges, upper-division colleges, other baccalaureate degree-granting schools, graduate, professional, and theological schools, and junior or 2-year colleges administered by the above-defined schools that have regional association, professional organization, and/or state agency recognition, approval, or accreditation.

### **Institutional Classification Definitions**

**Unitary state college and university systems**—multi-campus college or university systems administered centrally by a statewide board of directors or trustees and a statewide president or chancellor.

**Public universities of complex organization**—public institutions of complex organization that offer baccalaureate degrees in many disciplines and graduate programs through the doctoral level in three or more fields.

**Private universities of complex organization**—private institutions of complex organization that offer baccalaureate degrees in many disciplines and graduate programs through the doctoral level in three or more fields.

**Multipurpose colleges and universities**—public and private colleges and universities that have multipurpose educational functions but do not offer graduate work through the doctoral level in more than two fields.

**Independent colleges of arts and sciences (liberal arts)**—independent public and private colleges whose primary function is to offer baccalaureate programs in the arts and sciences.

**Music, fine arts, and applied arts schools**—public or private schools that offer baccalaureate and/or graduate training in music, fine arts, or applied arts as their primary educational function.

**Independent law, medicine, and allied health schools**—public or private institutions whose primary function is to offer specialized training at the baccalaureate and/or professional or graduate levels.

**Independent technological, business administration, and related schools**—public or private institutions whose primary function is to offer specialized training at the baccalaureate and/or graduate levels.

**Bible schools and colleges**—private institutions whose primary function is to offer baccalaureate programs in biblical studies.

**Theological schools and schools for lay workers**—public or private schools whose primary purpose is to give theological training in postbaccalaureate professional or graduate programs to religious professionals and lay workers.

Elsewhere in this report, these classifications may be abbreviated as follows: unitary systems, public-complex, private-complex, multipurpose, arts and sciences; music, fine arts, and applied arts, law, medicine, and allied health, technological and business; Bible; and theological schools. As circumstances change, shifts from one category to another may be necessary. Institutional representatives are invited to consult with the author when reclassification appears to be in order.

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In the tables, "S.C." or "S.U.," i.e., "State College" or "State University," is an institutional name which indicates public status. Where the designation is not made clear by the name, a "pub" entry follows the name of the school. Other listed units are private schools. The "M" or "W" designation indicates either a men's or women's college, all others are coeducational. "Coord" institutions are ones that have separate colleges for men and women.

### Enrollments in 2-Year Institutions

**Grand total enrollments increase — up by 7.7%.** The growth in enrollments in the American 2-year institutions was even more vigorous in the fall of 1980 than in 1979 when it was 3.9%. Percentages of change for several other of the previous years are as follows: 1978, -1.7%; 1977, +2.7%; and 1976, +4%. In the comparably reporting institutions, the percentage change represents a headcount increase of well over 200,000 students.

In 1980, there was growth in all reporting categories of students — full-time men, full-time women, part-time men, and part-time women with part-time women showing the greatest increase. The rather dramatic increases in enrollments for 1980 may reflect an extension of the premise stated in the previous year's report that the status of the economy probably had a pronounced influence upon the growth in enrollments for the year. It was further pointed out that the 2-year institutions generally enjoy the advantages of proximity, low tuition, easy access, and general flexibility, all of which can serve to attract potential students in times of economic uncertainty. The availability of student financial aid probably attracted many students who otherwise would have entered the job market.

**Full-time enrollments gain over the previous year — up 6.7%.** The reversal, in 1979, of a three year pattern of decline was accentuated by the increase in full-time enrollments in fall 1980. The 1,083 institutions reported 1,586,913 full-time students with a 6.7% increase in comparably reporting schools. Parker (1979) reported declines of 5.7% in 1978, and 3.5% in both 1976 and 1977. For the three years 1978 through 1980, full-time students have accounted for 38% of the population in the 2-year colleges. For several years before, beginning in 1977, full-time students composed a larger percentage of the 2-year enrollments. In 1977 the percentage was 41.6%, in 1976 it was 44.9, and in 1975 it was 45.6. As in 1979, there was growth in both full-time and part-time students in the 2-year institutions, and consequently the ratio remained unchanged. In spite of a majority of part-time students, the 2-year colleges depend on full-time enrollments for their continued existence. Approximately two-thirds of the credit hours produced by these institutions are generated by full-time students.

**Part-time enrollments increase by 8.4%.** Following two years of very limited increases, part-time enrollments grew substantially in the fall of 1980. The 1,083 institutions reported 2,477,357 part-time enrollees for the largest increase since 1975. The percentages of change over the past several years are as follows: 1979, +1.5%; 1978, +1%; 1977, +6.2%; 1976, +3.7%; 1975, +14.1%; 1974, +17.7%; and 1973, 20.6%. Though the 1980 percent of increase did not approach the magnitude of the increases in the early seventies, it reflected a headcount gain of approximately 150,000 students.

In 1979, the writer (Mickler, 1980) speculated that the growth of full-time students and the very limited increases in part-time students (actually there was a 2.5% decline in part-time men that was offset by minimal growth of women students) suggested the

impact of the economy and of the availability of financial aid to full-time students. With fairly substantial growth in all four reporting categories in 1980, that conjecture appears to lose considerable credibility. Some institutions, however, have begun to award financial aid to less than full-time students.

In keeping with the precedent set by Parker, the series has analyzed the enrollment data provided by the institutions from several vantage points. The first treatment of data examines enrollments in certain defined categories that are based upon type of control. These are public institutions, church affiliated institutions, independent, and proprietary institutions that offer 2-year collegiate level instructional programs. A second group of categories is based upon a programmatic index and includes the following: technical and/or vocational schools, junior colleges, community colleges, multipurpose units, and university branch college campuses or centers. Each of these categories, along with breakdowns by sex, geographic location, and estimated full-time equivalency will be examined in detail in the following sections.

**Public 2-year institutions register impressive gains — up 7.8%.** The 1979 growth rate of 3.7%, established by 730 reporting institutions, was surpassed in 1980 by over 4% for a headcount gain in excess 200,000 students from 808 reporting institutions. Parker (1979) reported for fall 1978 a decline of 1.8% in the same category of schools and colleges. He suggested at that time that the 2-year institutions were likely beginning to feel some competition from the 4-year colleges.

A grand total of 3,832,821 students were reported as enrolled by the public 2-year colleges in the country. Of these, there were 2,404,179 enrolled part time and 1,428,642 full time with percentages of gain of 6.7% and 8.5%, respectively. The enrollment profile of the public institutions with regard to men—women, part-time—full-time students roughly approximates that of all 2-year institutions. That, however, is not too difficult to understand, since the public institutions enroll approximately 95% of the 2-year college students. Enrollments by institution in the public category are presented in Table 1-2.

**Church affiliated college enrollments grow by 5.1%.** For the third year, church affiliated colleges report increases in their enrollments. In 1978, the increase was 1.2% (Parker 1979); in 1979, 3.2% (Mickler 1980). The 76 reporting institutions enrolled 28,552 full-time students and 7,570 part-time students for a grand total enrollment of 36,122. Percentage increases over the previous year from comparably reporting institutions were 2.7%, 15.4%, and 5.1%, respectively. Basically, the church affiliated institutions have enjoyed steady growth for a decade, though there were slight declines of .7% in both 1976 and 1977. These colleges enroll 80% of their students full time, and more than 60% are women. Practically all of these institutions are co-educational, though a few are exclusively for women or for men.

There is a striking similarity in the enrollment patterns of the church affiliated colleges and the proprietary institutions. In both instances approximately 80% of the students are enrolled full time. Even in the independent 2-year institutions there are considerably

more full-time than part-time students. Thus, the public 2-year institutions are those that typically serve the part-time student clientele.

In the church related 2-year colleges, the full-time enrollment tendency probably reflects the curricular pattern found in those schools. Typically their programs of study are of the liberal arts and they are articulated as transfer institutions. Many are fundamentalist in doctrine and can be expected to fall into a more conservative stance with regard to student enrollments. The enrollments of church affiliated colleges and schools are listed in Table 2-2.

Independent private 2-year colleges continue to grow — up by 5.6%. The fall 1980 growth rate was somewhat less than the 7.5% increase registered by the independent colleges the previous year. The 99 reporting institutions enrolled a grand total of 127,200 students with 75,481 enrolled full time and 51,719 enrolled part time. Gains in the sub-categories were 7.4% and 3.3% respectively.

For several years, with a notable exception in 1978 (-2.1%), independent colleges have experienced substantial growth. Though the 1980 increase was not as great as that of 1979, it was probably of greater significance because the greatest growth occurred in the full-time student categories with a 4% increase in men and 9.8% increase in women. Parker (1979) expressed grave concern over the loss that occurred in 1978 in full-time students at the independent colleges. That fear was negated to a large degree by the 1980 data.

As is the case with all private institutions, the independent 2-year colleges must work diligently to attract students in an era of declining population and emphasis on career oriented educational programs. Yet, many of these institutions are well established, prestigious colleges with traditional roles and a permanent place in higher education. Consequently, reputation will carry them far. Enrollments for the independent schools and colleges are given in Table 3-2.

Enrollments in proprietary schools increase by 6.9%. A rather substantial increase in the number of reporting proprietary schools occurred in 1980. From 61 schools in 1979 to 100 in 1980 represents a 64% increase. Despite the increase, this category of institutions is far from being inclusive of the hundreds and perhaps thousands of proprietary schools in the country.

For a proprietary school to be eligible for inclusion in the series, it must offer 2-year collegiate-level certificate or associate degree programs. Also, regional or professional accreditation must have been attained. These conditions limit considerably the number of institutions from the proprietary sector of post-secondary education. The limitations, however, result in the collection of data from a group of institutions quite similar to those in the other categories in role, scope, and function.

The 100 proprietary 2-year colleges and schools that reported in 1980 enrolled 68,127 students. Of these, 54,238 were full time, and only 13,889 were part time. As pointed

out earlier, the proprietary schools traditionally enroll a vastly larger portion of their students in the full-time category. The percentages of change in the enrollment of full-time and part-time students were +8.0% and -1.1% respectively. Comparable data were available from 42 of the proprietary schools. Though this represents a substantial increase over recent preceding years, the volume is definitely limited. Thus, extreme caution should be taken in the interpretation of these data. Generalizations about all proprietary educational institutions should not be based on this report. It is interesting to notice, however, that the grand-total growth rate of this category of institutions was at about the same level as the other 2-year institutions. Table 4-2 lists the enrollments in the 2-year proprietary schools and colleges.

**Non-public institutions gain by 5.7%.** The combination of church affiliated, independent, and proprietary schools and colleges provides another perspective from which to view enrollments in the American 2-year institutions. The 275 non-public institutions enrolled a grand total of 231,449 in fall 1980 or about 6% of the 2-year student population. There were 158,271 full-time and 73,178 part-time students, showing gains of 6.4% and 4.3% respectively. In contrast, the public 2-year schools and colleges showed grand total increases of 7.8%, full-time student growth of 6.7%, and part-time growth of 8.5%. In 1980, the public institutions increased at a slightly higher rate than did the non-public in all categories. The previous fall (1979) the situation was reversed with the non-public institutions registering the greatest percentage gains.

It should be remembered that 1% in the public category represents about 40,000 students, and 1% in non-public represents only about 2,300 students. Also, that percentages of change are based on matched pairs of data - enrollment reports submitted by institutions for the current and the previous years.

As indicated previously, the data from 2-year schools and colleges were to be analyzed from a programmatic vantage point following the analysis based upon type of control. The next several sections examine in detail the enrollments in technical and/or vocational schools, junior colleges, community colleges, multipurpose units and branch college campuses without regard to type of control. All junior colleges, for example, are grouped together whether they are public, church-affiliated, independent, or proprietary. Likewise, community college enrollments are summarized without regard to the source of control. The branch college campus category somewhat contradicts the notion of lack of reference to control. Yet, the branch college campuses cannot be placed in one of the other categories without contradicting the programmatic concept. Incidentally, the 2-year institutions indicate in their annual enrollment reports the category that best describes their curricular orientation.

**Technical and/or vocational schools and colleges show substantial gains - up 8.3%.** In 1980, reports were received from 54 more institutions in this category than in the previous year. The 233 technical schools and colleges reported a grand-total enrollment of 329,116 students. There were 186,236 full-time and 142,880 part-time students with gains of 14.6% and 1.7% respectively. Compared with the growth experienced by the



technical schools in 1979, the pattern was reversed. Full-time growth in 1979 was minimal (+1.9%), and part-time was substantial (+15.1%).

The growth rate of 8.3% in 1980 continues a pattern that goes back several years. The grand total increase in 1979 was 8.0%; in 1978, it was 2.6%; and in 1977, it was 6.7% (Parker, 1979), (Mickler, 1980). During the time frame, the grand total increases have come largely as a result of large increases in the numbers of women students enrolled. The 1978 study showed an increase of almost 12% in part-time women students, and the 1979 data showed nearly 22% gain in the same category. Even though the 1980 reports did not show great gains in part-time enrollments, women outpaced men substantially and the 15.4% growth of full-time women students is the largest increase in any sub-category in the 1980 report. Also, full-time men students increased at the rate of 14.0% in 1980. The technical and/or vocational schools and colleges showed the greatest rate of increase in full-time students of all the categories of institutions.

All of these data and interpretations give further credence to the speculation of this writer in the 1979 report. The data suggest, "the inclination of students to pursue educational endeavors that will result in career placements."

It is recognized that thousands of students are enrolled in vocational and technical programs in the community colleges, junior colleges, and multipurpose institutions, and, as a consequence, the generalization must be tempered with that reality. It probably would be well to request from the 2-year institutions data that showed numbers of students enrolled in transfer programs and those in technical programs. That added dimension would probably make the study unmanageable at the present time.

**Junior colleges report a gain of 8%.** The junior college category primarily includes institutions of the liberal arts tradition, many of which are exclusively for men or for women. Most of the institutions are private, and generally they are articulated with 4-year institutions so their students can transfer readily into baccalaureate programs.

The 274 reporting junior colleges enrolled 492,061 students, of which about 49% were full time. Though there were gains reported in 1979, these were surpassed by those of 1980. Full-time enrollments grew by 5.2%, and part-time enrollments grew by 10.8% based on data from 221 comparable institutions. There were 239,386 students enrolled full time and 252,675 enrolled part time. By contrast, in 1980 the baccalaureate arts and sciences colleges registered a grand total gain in 1980 of 3.3%. Actually, if represented by a line graph, the pattern would be different primarily by degree in the 2-year and 4-year colleges — all sub-categories showed increases, part-time enrollment increases exceeded those of full time, and women student categories, both full time and part time, were larger than those of men. One other similarity should be pointed out; the grand total enrollment gains of the liberal arts colleges both 2-year and 4-year were quite similar to the gains indicated for all institutions in each of the respective studies (grand total 4-year, +3.6%; A&S 4-year, +3.3%; grand total 2-year, +7.7%; Junior Colleges 2-year, +8.0%). It appears that the liberal arts tradition promulgated by private institutions continues to be

viable in an era in which considerable publicity is given to professional, career, and vocational/technical educational programs.

**Community Colleges grow by 7.8%.** The 528 community colleges enrolled 77% of the students reported in the 1980 2-year enrollment study. These so-called general purpose institutions have long dominated 2-year collegiate education. They were developed to meet local needs for vocational and technical educational experiences and to provide an adequate background in the arts and sciences for the acquisition of advanced knowledge. Most all of these institutions have transfer programs articulated with 4-year institutions in addition to terminal programs in technical and paraprofessional fields. Their growth has somewhat paralleled the growth of the American public schools, though having occurred in a later era.

The grand total enrollment in the community colleges for fall 1980 was 3,118,380 students with 1,100,073 full time for a gain of 5.9% and 2,018,307 part time for a gain of 8.9%. Last year's (1979) growth rate of part-time students in the community colleges was unusually low (.7%) and could not be explained. The part-time growth rate for 1980 is by far more typical of the enrollment pattern in the community colleges. Part-time students outnumber full-time students by 2 to 1 in the community colleges.

**Multipurpose colleges and university branch colleges/campuses/centers register gains — up by 5.5% and 1.5% respectively.** Eleven multipurpose institutions filed useable reports in fall 1980. The grand total enrollment was 63,939 students with 24,513 full time and a percentage of increase of 9.1 and 39,426 part-time students with a gain of 3.6%. After a sizeable decline of 5.8% in 1978, the multipurpose 2-year colleges have grown for two years consecutively. Though these institutions are designated as separate and apart from the community colleges, their enrollment profiles are quite similar. It is likely that their instructional programs are similar in nature as well. Both categories of colleges have terminal programs in technical fields, as well as transfer programs in the arts and sciences.

There were 37 institutions administered as a part of a 4-year university or college that reported 60,774 students enrolled in fall 1980. Of these students, 36,705 were full time and 24,069 were part time. The percentages of change were +7.8 for full-time and -4.1 for part-time students. Typically, the branch college campuses have more full-time students than part time, as is the case with their parent institutions, however, a loss in part-time students was a bit unusual. As mentioned previously, this may reflect financial aid policies for giving preference to full-time students in the awarding of aid. Some of the branch campuses are technically oriented, but most offer transfer programs designed to complement the main campuses.

**First-time entering freshmen.** As indicated previously in the 4-year study, a printing omission on the face of the data collection form resulted in some confusion about the reporting of freshman students. The intent was to collect enrollment data on full-time freshmen only; however, many schools reported both part-time and full-time freshmen. An attempt was made to verify the data and correct the obvious error. Though many

reporting officers did this, many did not. Consequently, percentages of change are not reported. There is evidence that growth did occur in the freshman class of 1980, but the author would prefer not to report questionable information. Freshman enrollments, as reported by institutions, are indicated in Table 5-2.

Women students continue to enroll in the 2-year colleges at a higher rate than men — 53.5% in fall 1980. In 1977-78, women student enrollments in the American 2-year institutions exceeded 50% of the population for the first time and was recorded by Parker (1978) at 51.5%. Since that time, the majority of women students in the 2-year schools and colleges has increased steadily. The high mark of 53.5% for 1980 was brought about by an increase in women students of 8.6% for the year. Men students showed a substantial increase of 6.7% for 1980, especially when compared with a 1% gain in 1979 and a 4.7% loss the previous year. In the 1,083 2-year schools and colleges, there were 2,178,903 women and 1,890,367 men students enrolled.

In all control categories of the 2-year colleges, women students outnumbered men. The percentages of women were as follows: public, 53.3; church affiliated, 60.0; independent, 57.0; and proprietary, 55.8. The percentages of change of men and women students in the fall term of 1980 were: public, +6.8 and +8.8; church affiliated, +1.2 and +8.1; independent, +5.1 and +5.9; and proprietary, +7.1 and +6.7.

Women students outnumbered men in all but one of the programmatic categories — technical schools. There the percentage of women students was 47.7 as compared with 52.3 for men. Percentages of women students in the other programmatic categories were as follows: community colleges, 53.6; junior colleges, 56.5; multipurpose, 53.7; and branch college campuses, 56.2. The percentages of change by category for men and women students were: community colleges, +6.8 and +8.7; junior colleges, +6.7 and +9.0; technical/vocational, +7.7 and +8.9; multipurpose units, +3.9 and +6.9; and branch college campuses, +1.0 and +1.9. There is no obvious explanation for the limited growth in the branch-campus category.

**Enrollments by regions and states.** There were enrollment increases in 44 states and declines in only 6. Some of the declines were quite slight and were offset in the geographic regions defined by Dr. Parker. Gains by region ranged from a high of 11.6% in the East South Central region to a low of 1.5% for the Mountain region. Enrollments in 823 comparably reporting 2-year institutions and percentage changes by region were: New England 67,404, +6.0; Middle Atlantic 307,550, +6.3; East North Central, 558,614, +7.3; West North Central 161,770, +7.7; South Atlantic 480,307, +4.6; East South Central 252,056, +11.6; West South Central 235,547, +8.6; Mountain 145,999, +1.5; Pacific 847,102, +10.3; and Commonwealth and Territories 12,910, +7.7. There were nine states with enrollments of over 100,000 2-year students each. The percent of increase of the nine states was 8.5%. California had by far the largest number with 653,234 and showed a substantial gain for the year of 10.1% or almost 60,000 students. Illinois followed with 212,930 enrolled and an increase of 11.7%. Alabama had the third largest population of 2-year enrollments with 160,657 and a percentage increase of 11.5.

Alabama's total includes enrollments for the Community College of the Air Force, headquartered at Maxwell AFB, Washington, though next to the smallest of the nine states, experienced a 13.3% increase in fall 1980 or a headcount gain of slightly over 15,000 students. Finally, these nine states accounted for almost 70% of the gain for the year.

It should be recalled that the totals in the geographic table are comparable totals. That is, they reflect only the enrollments of institutions that have reported for two consecutive years. In all other portions of the study, the totals include data from every useable report. Table 6-4 portrays the entire geographic distribution.

**Full-time equivalent enrollment (FTE) increases by 7.3%.** It has been a practice in the study series to estimate FTE by adding one-third of the headcount of part-time enrollments to the headcount of full-time students. The procedure gives a reasonable approximation of instructional effort that is correlated in most instances to the allocation of funds, particularly in the public institutions. In the 1,083 2-year institutions, the FTE grand total for fall 1980 was 2,412,616 or a gain of 7.3% at comparably reporting institutions. The percentage increase was based on a comparable headcount gain of 73,349 full-time students and 146,623 part-time students. By control category, the FTE and percentages of change for the fall term were: public, 2,229,955 and +7.3; church affiliated, 31,075 and +3.6; independent, 92,719 and +6.5; and proprietary, 58,867 and 7.5. Public institutions continue to account for over 90% of the FTE in the 2-year schools and colleges. Even though the 2-year schools are typically viewed as part time oriented, by far, the greatest portion of FTE is actually generated by full-time students. Again by category the percentages of FTE accounted for by full-time students were: public, 64.1, church affiliated, 91.8; independent, 81.4; and proprietary, 92.1.

An overview of collegiate enrollments in 1980. Registrars, directors of institutional research, and other reporting officers in 2,901 colleges and universities in the U.S. reported a grand total enrollment of 11,316,916 students. Of these, 4,554,534 were part-time and 6,762,382 were full-time enrollees. Although all institutions in the country did not report, over 90% filed reports and provided useable information for inclusion in the studies. The officers who provide this voluntary service are to be commended for their efforts in support of the study series.

There were 5,795,642 women enrolled in higher education in fall 1980 and 5,521,274 men enrolled. Women students have outnumbered men in the 2-year institutions for several years, and in the fall of 1980, they came within one-tenth of one percent of surpassing men in the 4-year institutions.

The growth rate of enrollments for all higher education in fall 1980 was 4.9%, based on data reported by 2,422 comparably reporting institutions. As stated earlier, comparably reporting means that the institution submitted enrollment reports in 1979 and 1980. There is a small amount of duplication in the count of 2-year institutions — those which are administered by 4-year institutions are counted in both studies. But, there are very few of these.

The overall growth rate for 1980 was only .2% less than the 5.1% rate that was predicted by the author in an October 23, 1980, press release. The estimate was based on returns from 1,042 colleges and universities. By contrast, the Chronicle of Higher Education predicted a 3.8% overall increase over fall of 1979 (Magarrell, 1980). Also the NCES growth estimate for fall 1980 was reported by Magarrell as 3.2%.

Further comparisons of the projections with the final report show that the growth rate of the 4-year institutions was 3.6%; while the projected rate was 3.1%. Also the projected growth rate of 8.1% in 2-year colleges was not vastly different from the actual rate of 7.7%.

The largest enrollment increase in a single year since 1975 occurred, despite a decline in the number of 18-year-olds. As in 1975, however, it was a time of economic recession that generally results in increased enrollments in higher education. The availability of financial aid in 1980 probably contributed significantly to the unusual rate of increase. Increases of the magnitude of 1980 likely were viewed by some institutions as a windfall but by others as a problem compounded by retrenchment and escalating inflation.

In 1980, growth occurred in 13 of the 14 institutional categories defined in the series on enrollments in American higher education. A decline of 2.5% was registered by the theological schools in the fall of 1980, continues a trend begun the previous year.

Looking to the future. The demographic data indicate significant declines in college enrollments will occur during the next 15 to 20 years. Those declines will have to be dealt with when they become reality. Hard decisions will be required of faculty, administrators,

trustees, state and federal legislators and others. Their decisions likely would be easier if inflation were not at the double digit level and tax revegues were not declining and foundation monies dwindling. Yet, higher education has vast resources for solving problems, for dealing with imponderables, and for coping with reality. To be sure, the responses of higher education to the 80s will be vastly different from those of the 60s, but the excitement of rapid growth can be transformed into enthusiasm for effective teaching, quality learning, productive research, and beneficial service.

Unless a natural or man-made cataclysm destroys civilization, the need for higher education will continue to grow. Scientific and technological advances will require college educated individuals to function effectively in the coming years. In addition, the problems of society, of government, and of health care must be dealt with by an educated citizenry. The very future of our country may well hinge on the effectiveness of higher education in meeting the needs of an advancing society.

**DEFINITIONS USED IN THIS ACT SPECIAL REPORT**

**Institutions surveyed** are post-secondary 2-year junior and community colleges, other multipurpose colleges, technical and/or vocational schools or institutes, and 2-year units administered by 4-year colleges or universities (branch colleges/campuses/centers) that have regional association, professional organization, and/or state agency recognition, approval or accreditation, and offer 2-year, collegiate-level certificate and/or associate degree programs. Classification of schools by types reflects institutional preference, where available, and the author's judgment.

**Full-time students** devote substantially all working or study time to the college curriculum. Generally this is interpreted to mean that they are registered for 12 collegiate-level credit hours, presumably 75% of a normal load or more. The presumption is that these students are assessed full-time fees.

**Part-time students** normally take collegiate-level courses in the late afternoon, on weekends in the evening, frequently in the day, or by extension and enroll for fewer than 12 credits, or less than 75% of a normal load.

**First-time freshmen (full-time)** are presumed to be only those entering freshman full-time students who have not previously attended any college. The group is inclusive of students enrolled in the fall term who attended college for the first time in the summer of 1979 as well as students who entered with college credits earned before graduation from high school.

**Two-year college students** are those enrolled in collegiate-level credit-hour courses in 2-year certificate or associate degree programs in institutions covered in this survey. It is presumed that all eligible and enrolled 2-year collegiate-level credit-hour students are counted.

**Full-time equivalent enrollments** are not cited by institutions but FTEs are computed by categories of schools. The adjusted headcount method is used, whereby full-time-equivalent enrollment equals the headcount of full-time students, plus one-third of that of part-time students.

**Full-time teaching staff** is composed of those persons holding the rank of instructor or equivalent, and those of higher rank, in full-time employment for the academic year, who give at least half their time to instruction and are not on leave of absence.

**Total teaching staff** includes both full-time teaching staff and part-time individuals not on leave, including lecturers, fellows, teaching assistants, research assistants (if they teach), and others who teach.
