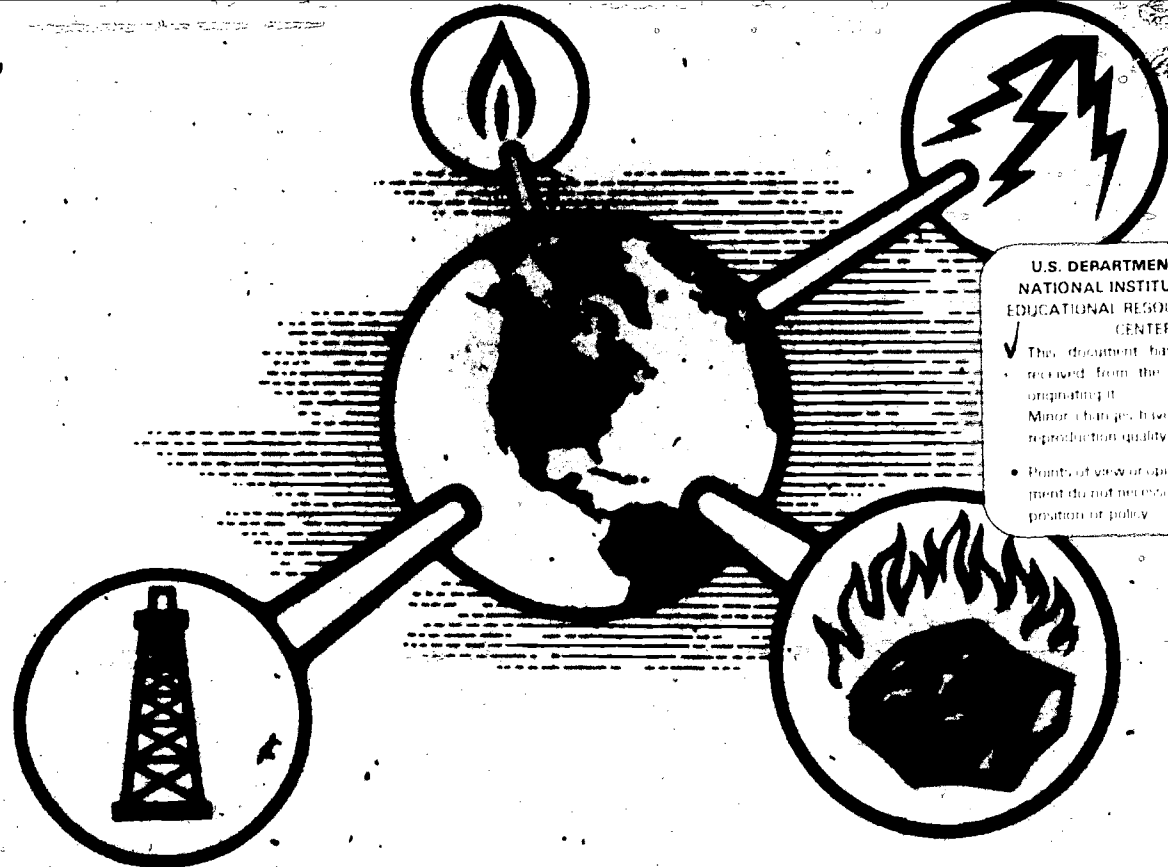


Dear Consumer:

HOW TO USE THE GUIDE

How it's Organized

SECTION I highlights many of the agencies and private organizations that can provide you with valuable information on energy-related topics. It also includes energy-saving tips that can help you save energy and money.

SECTION II lists state and local consumer protection offices. The functions of these offices vary greatly from state to state, as do the services and information they provide. While this *Guide* does not attempt to spell out what each office does, it should be a helpful reference on where to turn with problems or questions.

This *Section* also lists state energy offices. These offices generally carry out the federal government's energy conservation and assistance programs. In addition, they provide consumers with helpful energy conservation information, publications, and other services.

SECTION I

ENERGY CONSERVATION

Saving energy means saving money. It also means preserving our energy resources for future generations.

U.S. consumers are learning a very basic fact of life—the days of unlimited energy at low costs are over. This does not mean that we have to go back to the horse and buggy days or even give up all our energy-operated appliances. What it does mean is that we have to learn more about energy conservation. The agencies and organizations listed in this Guide can provide you with valuable information on saving energy and money.

The Department of Energy says that in most homes residential energy dollars are broken down this way: 70 percent is used for heating and cooling your home, 20 percent is used for heating water, and the remaining goes for lighting, cooking, and operating small appliances.

Setting Up an Energy Budget

To get the most from your energy dollars, the Council of Better Business Bureaus suggests that you set up an energy budget similar to your household budget, and that you learn to make energy trade-offs in your home. For example, air conditioners can play havoc with your summer energy budget, but you may not want to go without it during those hot humid summer days. Look around for other energy-eaters in your home (such as your refrigerator, clothes washer and dryer, and dishwasher), and cut back to make up for the big bite your air conditioner is taking out of your energy budget. This Guide can help you find ways to stretch your energy dollars.

Claiming Energy Tax Credits

Contact your local Internal Revenue Service (IRS) to find out if you are eligible for energy conservation tax credits on your federal income tax. You can claim a one-time 15 percent tax credit on any amount up to \$2,000 (maximum credit is \$300), of the money you spend to install in your home energy conserving products such as insulation, storm windows and doors, caulking and weatherstripping, and automatic setback thermostats. You cannot get credits for energy conserving products installed on homes completed after April 20, 1977. Also, the items must be expected to remain in operation for at least three years. Ask your IRS about other energy-saving equipment that may also be considered for tax credit.

Getting a Home Energy Audit

Many utility companies offer their customers a comprehensive Home Energy Audit. The audit covers insulation, weatherstripping and caulking, storm windows and doors, temperature setback devices, and water heater insulation. The Audit will show you where effective improvements can be made, how much money these improvements can save you, as well as how long it will take you to recover your investment. For more information on getting your Home Energy Audit, contact your local utility company or your State Energy Office (see Section II).

Adjusting Your Hot Water Heater

As much as 20 percent of the energy used in your home is for heating water. This is one of the first places you should look for ways to conserve. Most water heaters are set for 140°F. or higher, but you may not need water that hot unless you have a dishwasher. A setting of 120°F. can provide adequate hot water for most families.

By lowering the thermostat on your water heater to 120°F., you can save over 18 percent of the energy used at the higher setting. To determine the water temperature in your heater, draw water from the heater through the bottom faucet and test it with a thermometer.

If your hot water heater is warm to the touch, wrap the heater and pipes in insulation to decrease heat loss. The Department of Energy estimates this will save you from \$8 to \$20 a year, and much more if the heater is located in an unheated area of the house.

Energy Tip: You are probably spending a lot more money than you think on baths and showers. Substantial savings can be achieved without much trouble. There are two ways to do it. The first is to take shorter showers and baths at the lowest acceptable temperature. The second is to install flow restrictors in the showerheads. The restrictors reduce the water flow from 6 to 8 gallons to 2 to 3 gallons per minute. The best ones reduce the flow without sacrificing the hard spray that many people like.

Lowering Your Thermostat

The Department of Energy suggests that you should lower the thermostat on your furnace to 65°F. during the day and 55°F. at night. You can save on your fuel costs for every degree you reduce the average temperature in your home. This can be done manually or with an automatic setback device which costs about \$75.00.

Special Energy Tip for the Elderly: Some elderly persons may require higher, indoor temperature—about 65°F.—at all times to avoid accidental hypothermia. (For more information on hypothermia see Section on "Health Related Issues.")

Adding Insulation

Insulating your home may reduce your heating and cooling bills by as much as 20 to 30 percent. Your needs will depend on the climate in which you live and the amount of insulation, if any, you already have. Find out about R-values before you buy insulation materials. Then buy the thickness of insulation that will give you the R-value you should have. R-values are insulation efficiency ratings. The "R" stands for resistance to winter heat loss or summer heat gain. The higher the R-number, the more effective the insulating capacity.

Energy Tip: When insulating, make sure you include the attic. It is common to find large openings where pipes, ducts, or exhaust fans are cut through the attic floor. All the obvious holes and gaps can be plugged with the exception of the gaps around recessed light fixtures and vents in the attic. Do not cover light fixtures directly with insulation as this may cause a fire.

Caulking, Weatherstripping, and Adding Storm Windows

Air leakage may account for one-third to one-half of your winter heating and summer cooling. At a time when fuel prices are rising this loss represents an unnecessary expense and a waste of energy resources. Caulking and weatherstripping your windows and doors can save up to 10 percent on your fuel bills. Also pulling your drapes at night will cut down on drafts.

Energy Tip: To find additional air leaks, on a cold windy day make a simple "draft detector" by clipping a piece of tissue paper or lightweight plastic to a coat hanger. Hold the coat hanger in front of a suspected leak, any movement of paper will show you where the cold air is coming into your home. Be sure to check around electrical wall outlets, holes cut in walls for plumbing pipes and electrical wiring, mail chutes, attic doors, exhaust fans, and dryer vents. Electrical outlets can be sealed with inexpensive gaskets that can be purchased at hardware stores.

To save even more, install storm windows and insulated draperies. There are several new types of insulated draperies on the market that you might want to check out before making your final purchasing decisions.

Energy Tip: If storm windows are too expensive for your energy budget, an inexpensive storm window can be made by stapling polyethylene plastic sheeting that is at least six millimeters thick over the windows.

Choosing a Reputable Contractor

Several energy-saving measures around the house such as adding more insulation and installing storm windows and doors may require the skill of a professional. Be leery of a contractor who comes to your door or calls you on the phone offering a special deal because rarely do established home improvement contractors solicit work by randomly knocking on doors or making telephone calls.

When choosing a contractor, you should:

- Deal only with a reputable, responsible contractor. Ask for references from people who have used the company. Inspect some installation if possible. Shop around, get estimates from several companies.
- Check with your state and local consumer protection offices and Better Business Bureau to see if any complaints have been filed against the contractor.
- Watch the advertising claims for saving energy. Make sure the installation will pay for itself.
- Do not sign a contract you do not understand. Never sign a blank contract.
- Get all guarantees and warranties in writing.
- Do not pay in cash. Use a check or money order. Do not pay in advance. Hold final payment until you are satisfied with the work.
- Contracts signed in your home or any place other than the seller's normal place of business are subject to a "Three Day Cooling Off" period. This means you have the right to cancel your contract any time before midnight of the third business day after the contract has been signed. The contractor must provide you with two copies of the cancellation form.
- The contractor should provide you with a "Certificate of Insurance." This covers workmen's compensation, property damage, and personal liability.
- Secure lien waivers. In most states, anyone who does work on your house and is not paid can place a lien on your home. Even if you paid the contractor, the subcontractors can place a lien against you if the contractor has failed to pay them.*

Buying New Appliances

Your energy budget can get a big boost from energy efficient appliances. When it is time to replace your old appliances with new ones, shop carefully. Compare labels. Many manufacturers now put "Energy-Guide" labels on their appliances enabling you to compare long-term energy costs with the purchase cost. The difference in yearly energy costs can be enormous. Appliances that have EnergyGuide labels are room air conditioners, clothes washers, dishwashers, freezers, refrigerators and refrigerator-freezers, furnaces, and water heaters.

Energy Tip: If you need to purchase a gas oven or range, look for one with an automatic (electronic) ignition system instead of pilot lights. You will save up to one-third of your gas bill.

When buying a dishwasher, look for a model with air-power or overnight dry settings. These features automatically turn off the dishwasher after the rinse cycle. This can save you up to 10 percent of your total dishwashing energy costs.

If you are buying a refrigerator, it is energy economical to buy one with a power-saver switch. Most refrigerators have heating elements in their walls or doors to prevent "sweating" on the outside. In most climates, the heating element does not need to be working all the time. By using a power-saver switch, you can save 16 percent in your refrigerator energy costs. Also consider buying refrigerators and freezers that have to be defrosted manually.

Maintaining and Driving the Family Car

In nearly every household the family car is a necessity and even though it can be a major drain on the energy budget, few families can or want to get along without their convenient, and some times only, source of transportation. But there are many ways to improve your car's efficiency and reduce its maintenance and repair costs.

*This list of do's and don'ts on choosing a contractor was prepared by the Morris County Office of Consumer Affairs, Morristown, New Jersey.

The U.S. Department of Transportation offers the following tips to improve your car's performance:

- Follow the recommendations in your Owner's Manual for major and minor service and tune-ups.
- Shop for a good mechanic. Check with your friends and neighbors to see if they know one who is a specialist on your car.
- Check out the mechanic's reliability with your state and local consumer protection offices (see Section II) and your local Better Business Bureau.
- If you have your car serviced at a large agency, get acquainted with the service manager, and see if you can have the same mechanic service your car every time.
- Keep a record on all repairs.

To get better gas mileage, the Department of Transportation recommends that you:

- Check your tire pressure and treadwear patterns monthly. Tire pressure that is too low increases rolling resistance, causes increased treadwear, and reduces gasoline mileage.
- Avoid excessive high speed or jerky driving.
- Turn off your engine if you stop more than a minute. Restarting uses less gasoline than a minute's idling.
- Warm-ups should not exceed one minute. The gas consumed in long warm-ups is not offset by any great improvement in engine performance.
- Jumpy starts and fast getaways can burn over 50 percent more gasoline than normal acceleration.
- Limit the use of auto air conditioners and other fuel consuming accessories.
- Short trips drastically reduce gas mileage. If a car gets 20 miles per gallon in general, it may get only 4 miles per gallon on a short trip of five miles or less. According to the Department of Energy, trips of five miles or less make up 15 percent of all miles driven each year, but they burn 30 percent of the gas.
- Use mass transit, car pools, or bicycles when feasible. (For more information on car pools, see section on "Ridesharing.")
- Make fuel economy a consideration in any new car purchase. You can get a free copy of the *Gas Mileage Guide for New Car Buyers* from any new car or light truck dealer, or by writing to:

Energy Tip: Cars get better fuel economy in temperatures of 70°F. and above. A car that gets 20 miles per gallon can lose about one and one half of those miles in winter weather. Wind has an even greater effect on a car's performance. An 8 mile per hour tail-wind will add about 12 percent to gas economy, while an 18 mile per hour headwind results in a 10 percent loss. Rain, snow, and wet roads can also decrease gas mileage. So when planning trips, be aware of how weather conditions will affect fuel economy.

An increasing number of energy-saving devices and additives are on the market. While some of these are innovative products, unfortunately, many do not live up to their claims. Do not buy on impulse. If you are considering buying one of these products, research its effectiveness. Also check out the reliability of the company with your state or local consumer protection office (see Section II), and your local Better Business Bureau.

Mail Orders

Shopping by mail is a convenient way for you to save energy, money and time. Most mail order firms are honest and stand behind their products. However, there are a few "rotten apples" that give the industry a bad name. The Chief Postal Inspector of the U.S. Postal Service urges you to carefully check out the product's advertising claims. He says, "If it seems too good to be true, it usually is."

HEALTH RELATED ISSUES

Not only can extremely hot or cold weather cause a drain on your energy budget, it can also cause serious health problems. Two major health problems associated with extreme weather conditions are hypothermia (low internal body temperature) and hyperthermia (high internal body temperature).

Hypothermia

Hypothermia is a condition marked by abnormally low internal body temperature—typically 95°F. (35°C.) or lower. It can affect anyone who is exposed to severe cold without enough protection, but it can also be brought on during exposure to relatively mild cold.

Contrary to popular belief, the elderly population is not the only group vulnerable to hypothermia. It can attack infants, low-or marginal-income citizens who find it difficult to pay high heating bills, and persons living in homes without adequate insulation.

To avoid hypothermia, the Center for Environmental Physiology recommends:

- Insulate your home properly. Caulking is a particularly low cost and effective technique.
- Wear layers of clothing. Wear several layers of loose clothing instead of tight clothing. Wear a hat and scarf to insulate your head and neck.
- Eat nutritious foods and exercise moderately.
- **A Special Tip for the Elderly**—Drugs can interfere with the body's response to cold stress in a variety of ways. Check with your doctor or pharmacist for more information on drugs that can contribute to accidental hypothermia.

Some people die of hypothermia because they or those around them do not recognize the symptoms. A victim may have one or more of the following:

- Puffy face.
- Uncontrollable shivering.
- Mental confusion and forgetfulness.
- Sleepiness and difficulty in waking.
- Slow breathing.
- Slow heart rate.
- Stomach that is cold to the touch.

If you believe someone may be a victim of hypothermia, call an ambulance or rescue squad immediately. Hypothermia should be treated at a hospital. Before help arrives, here are a few tips:

- Be gentle and limit movement.
- Insulate the victim with available covering such as blankets, towels, pillows, scarves, or newspapers.
- Do NOT give the victim a hot shower or bath. This may cause sudden shock or death.

Hyperthermia

The term hyperthermia means above normal temperature and can be used to refer to any body temperature above 98.6° F. However, it is most frequently used to describe heat stroke, a serious medical emergency, generally characterized by a temperature above 106° F.

Hyperthermia or heat stroke is one of many heat related medical problems known to cause injury or death. Because the burden of heat stress falls primarily on the heart and blood vessels, heat related heart failure and strokes of the brain are also very serious problems during periods of hot weather.

Humidity also plays an important role in determining the severity of heat stress because it interferes with the evaporation of sweat, which is the body's main defense against the heat.

Older adults are particularly vulnerable to heat stress, but it can also affect infants and individuals with weak hearts or blood vessels.

Some of the warning signs for heat stress are:

- Nausea
- Dizziness
- Pounding heart
- Throbbing pressure in the head or headache
- Fainting

The National Institute of Aging recommends that during hot humid weather you remain indoors in an air conditioned room. If your home is not air conditioned, you might go to a cool public place (like a library, movie theater, or store) during the hottest hours of the day.

Other good ways to cool off include:

- Taking baths or showers, placing wet towels on the body and using electric fans (be careful to avoid getting an electrical shock).
- Wearing lightweight, light-colored, loose fitting clothing that permit sweat to evaporate.
- Drinking plenty of liquids such as water and fruit juices.
