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ABSTRACT

This document contains the State plan designed to enable the State Department of Education to implement an adult education program in Oklahoma that will meet the critical educational needs of the adult population. Sections of the plan include purpose; state definitions; legal authority; audits, goal statement, administrative provisions; organization; fiscal control; organization of the participatory planning task force; cooperation with other organizations and agencies; program information (publicity); use of resources; advisory committee; program planning, budgeting, and evaluation; program priorities; allocation of resources; programs of instruction; applicant assurances; annual program plan format; specific program priorities and objectives; activities and procedures; evaluations of applications for funds; applicants for adult education funds; 310 special experimental demonstration projects and teacher training; 310 applications; criteria for evaluating 310 projects; submission of applications; application review panel; reports; and dissemination. Appendixes, amounting to over one-half of the document, include organizational charts, materials relating to task force involvement, outreach results FY 1980-82, section 306 and 310 project application procedures, and 306 and 310 project evaluation instruments. 

302 Purpose of the Program Plan

The purpose of the State Plan is designed to enable the State Department of Education to implement an adult education program in Oklahoma that will meet the critical educational needs of the adult population.

The plan covers a three-year period to be periodically evaluated and amended following the procedures outlined in the Educational Amendments of 1978. The periodical evaluation will determine the need for updating priorities and directing special emphasis to the areas of greatest need. The involvement of the total segment of the adult population is assured by the creation of the Task Force comprising representatives of business and industry, labor unions, public and private educational agencies and institutions, churches, fraternal and voluntary organizations, community organizations, state and local manpower and training agencies, and representatives of special adult populations, including residents of rural areas, residents of urban areas with high rates of unemployment, adults with limited English language skills, and institutionalized adults, and any other entities concerned with adult education.

The evaluation of each project and periodical needs assessments will give direction to where special emphasis is placed in the expansion of delivery services.

The design of the plan will enable the State Department of Education to implement and carry out a three-year adult education program consistent with the provisions of the Adult Education Act of 1966 (Title III of P. L. 89-750, 80 Stat. 1191, 20 U. S. C. 1201-1213, as amended).



303 Definitions - As used in this plan:

"Act" means the Adult Education Act of 1966 (Title III of P. L. 89-750, 80 Stat. 1191, 20 U. S. C. 1201-1213.

"Advisory Board" means a diversified group of people appointed by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and approved by the State Board of Education to serve in an advisory capacity in implementing Adult Basic Education Programs.

"Adult" means any individual who has attained the age of eighteen (18) and under certain conditions, sixteen (16) and who is not currently enrolled in elementary or secondary school.

"Adult Basic Education" means education for adults whose inability to speak, read, or write the English language constitutes a substantial impairment of their ability to get or retain employment commensurate with their real ability, which is designed to help eliminate such inability and raise the level of education of such individuals with a view to making them less likely to become dependent on others, to improving their ability to benefit from occupational training and otherwise increasing their opportunities for more productive and profitable employment, and to making them better able to meet their adult responsibilities.

"Adult Education" means services or instruction below the college level (as determined by the Secretary), for adults who:

- do not have a certificate of graduation from a school providing secondary education and who have not achieved an equivalent level of education, and
- (2) are not currently enrolled in schools.



"Secretary" means the U. S. Secretary of Education, Department of Education.

"Community Education" stresses the expended use of educational facilities, improved community school relationships, interagency coordination and cooperation and increased citizenship involvement in the educational process. (Adult Basic Education is an integal part of Community Education.)

"Department" means the Department of Education.

"Fiscal year" means the period beginning on July 1 and ending on the following June 30.

"Local educational agency" means a board of education having administrative control and direction of a public elementary or elementary and secondary school district in the state.

"Private nonprofit agency" means an agency, organization, or institution no part of whose net earnings may legally inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual.

"Public agency" means an entity established by a state or a political subdivision thereof supported in whole or in part by public funds, and administered and controlled by publicly elected or appointed officials.

"Rural" means communities with less than 50,000 population.

"Urban" means cities with 50,000 or more population.

"State" means the state of Oklahoma.

"State education agency" means the State Board of Education which is the governing board of the State Department of Education in the public school system of the state.

The term 'Participatory Planning Task Force' means the committee comprising representatives of all segments of the adult population including but not limited to business and industry, labor unions, public and private educational agencies and institutions, churches, fraternal and voluntary organizations, community organizations, state and local manpower and training agencies, and representatives of special adult populations, including residents of rural areas, residents of urban areas with high rates of unemployment, adults with limited English speaking skills and institutionalized adults, and other entities in the state involved in developing the plan and that will be involved in carrying out the plan, herein after referred to as the Task Force.

"Outreach" means activities designed to (1) inform adult populations who are least educated and most in need of assistance of the availability and benefits of the adult education program and (2) assist these adult populations to participate in the program by providing reasonable and convenient access. Thus, the State and local recipients must not only support activities designed to publicize of eligible persons once they become aware of the program.



- I. The State's legal authority to administer the Adult Education State
 - Plan is vested in the following authority:
 - A. Legal authority of the Oklahoma State Department of Education to administer the Adult Education Act.
 - 1. Citations.

State Department of Education Authority.

Authority of State Board of Education in determining the policies and directing the administration and supervision of the Public School System of the State. (70 O. S. 1971 I 3-104).

Authority of State Board of Education to accept, in its discretion, the provisions of any Act of Congress appropriating or apportioning funds provided for use in connection with any phase of the system of Public Education in Oklahoma. (70 O. S. 1971 I 3-104).

Authority of the State Board of Education to establish and prescribe the duties of an executive officer who shall be the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. (70 O. S. 1971 I 3-104).

Authority of the State Department of Education through its executive office to require the coordination of all divisions and delegate general supervision of all employees. (70 0. S. 1971 I 3-104).

Authority of the State Board of Education to prescribe policies and rules and regulations which include audit procedures of local school districts as outlined in the State Plan. (70 O. S. 1971 I 3-104).

II. School district authority.

Authority of school districts to offer educational courses for adult classes. (70 O. S. 1971 X 5-131).

A. State laws relating to the hiring of personnel and the purchase of and accounting for supplies, materials, and equipment.

70 O. S. 1971 I 3-104, Paragraph 5; State Board of Education shall appoint, prescribe the duties, and fix the compensation of all personnel necessary for the proper performance of the function of the State Board of Education.

- 62 O. S. 1971 X 41.26 authorizes payment of state claims and requires all officials authorized to approve claims to be bonded.
- 74 O. S. 1971 I 86.1 prescribes the method of payment of vendor invoices.
- 74 O. S. 1971 I 110.1 and 110.2 provides for inventory records of all supplies, books, furniture, equipment and machinery.
- 62 O. S. 1971 I 41.8 Federal funds received by any agency of the state shall be deposited in the State Treasury and disbursed upon warrants issued by the State Auditor and shall be subject to the other fiscal controls imposed by this act, except where federal laws and/or regulations of the Federal Agency which makes such funds available to the state requires Federal funds to be granted, deposited, allocated, or expended through channels other than those required by the provisions of this Act.

III. State audit of state accounts.

74 O. S. 1971 I 212 The State Examiner and Inspector shall examine the books and accounts of the state officers whose duty it is to collect, disburse, or manage funds of the state at least once a year.

IV. Goal Statement of the State Department of Education.

The goal of the State Department of Education is to provide more effective opportunities for adults, whose needs are not otherwise met, which will:

- A. enable all adults to acquire basic skills necessary to function in society.
- B. enable adults who so desire to continue their education to at least the level of completion of secondary school, and
- C. make available to adults the means to secure training that will enable them to become more employable, productive, and responsible citizens.

V. Administrative Provisions.

A. General provisions of the State Board of Education accepting the responsibility of implementing this program and will adhere to the



statement of Congress contained in Section 422 of Subpart 2 of Title IV, General Provisions Concerning Education in P.L. 93-380 which is stated as follows:

"Nothing contained in this Title shall be construed to authorize any department, agency, officer, or employee of the United States to exercise any direction, supervision, or control over the curriculum, program of instruction, administration, or personnel of any educational institution, school or school system, or over the selection of library resources, textbooks, or other printed or published instructional materials by any education institution or school system, or to require the assignment of transportation of students or teachers in order to overcome recial imbalance."

B. The Oklahoma State Board of Education agrees that this Annual Program Plan which serves as an agreement between the State and Federal Government under the Adult Education act, will be administered in accordance with the provision of the Act.

VI. Annual Program plan requirements.

The state will submit a three-year program plan and amendments as necessary to carry out the provisions of the Adult Education Act (P. L. 91-230, as amended) including the provisions of its amendments through November 1, 1978.

VII. Organization.

- A. State Administrative Agency is the State Department of Education.
 - 1. State Map (see Appendix).
 - 2. Organization Chart of the Oklahoma State Department of Education. (see Appendix).
- B. The duties of the Director of Adult Education who shall have the responsibilities of administering this plan shall include:
 - (1) preparation of rules and regulations and other essential procedures for recommendation to the State Board of Education for implementation of the program at the state and local agency levels:



- (2) preparation and dissemination of information about the program to local education agencies and other interested organizations and associations:
- (3) direction of the preparation of project application and other types of forms essential to participation in the Plan;
- (4) recommendation on the approval of project applications;
- (5) coordination of activities of Advisory Committee;
- (6) cooperation with auditors in the accounting of funds expended by local educational agencies;
- (7) reporting to State Board of Education, the U. S. Office of Education, and the public;
- (8) evaluation of the Plan and projection of needs for the future; and
- (9) immediate administration of the Division of Adult Education, and the supervision of staff members.

Other professional personnel may be employed by the State
Department of Education as needed to help administer and
supervise the state-wide program. All professional personnel
employed shall hold a valid Oklahoma Teacher's Certificate;
shall have a master's degree; shall have experience in classroom teaching, school administration and supervision; and shall
have experience or other preparation in working with adult education programs.

VIII. Fiscal Control and Accounting Procedures.

- A. 'Fiscal year' means the period beginning on July 1 and ending on the following June 30.
- B. The obligation basis of accounting is used.
- C. Expenditures will be supported by copies of paid claims and invoices or encumberance orders.



- D. Records will be kept in the Federal Programs Division of the State Department of Education.
- E. Expenditures will be audited following accepted auditing procedures.
- F. Reports will be made to the State Board of Education and the U. S. Department of Education for approval and records will be kept according to federal regulations. The State Department of Education shall make such reports regarding the Adult Education Program to the Secretary of Education at such time and in such form as he deems necessary.



306 (b) (8) Organization of the Participatory Planning Task Force.

To initiate the participatory planning process, the state advisory council was of consensus opinion that a temporary steering committee comprising the nine member advisory council, the professional staff of the adult education section, the director of federal programs, and the assistant state superintendent of state and federal programs of the State Department of Education be responsible for determining the criteria for selection of members of the participatory planning committee.

On November 15, 1978, the temporary steering committee met and established the following criteria for the formation of a task force.

Eligible members of the task force were persons from all segments of the adult population in Oklahoma interested in or involved in the educational process for adults in Oklahoma. Involvement includes active participation of representatives of business, industry, labor unions, churches, fraternal organizations, community organizations, private educational institutions and agencies, state and local manpower and training agencies, residents of rural areas, residents of urban areas with high rates of unemployment, institutionalized adults, adults with limited English speaking abilities, voluntary organizations, public educational agencies and institutions and any other entity concerned with adult education. On January 2, 1979, a list of agencies, organizations, and individuals representative of different segments of the adult population was compiled and sent to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction for review and recommendation to insure that all segments of the adult population were represented as mandated by the Adult Education Act. After including additional recommendations of the State Superintendent, a planning session of the task force was held on January 31,



1979, in Oklahoma City for the purpose of discussing the provisions of the Adult Education Act and selecting a steering committee to determine the priorities and objectives for the adult education program.

The task force voted to select a steering committee consisting of no more than twenty-five members representing all segments of the adult population with each of the four regions of the state being represented on the committee as well as the central region which might be comprised of some representatives of state agencies involved in services provided state wide. This criteria was followed for selection, and membership of the committee was determined by drawing of names of task force members by regions and the segments of the adult population represented.

A simular process was followed for the preparation of the 1983-85 Plan. Six regional task force meetings were held in different areas of the state to make attendance by the public more convenient. (see Appendix) A very good cross section of the population attended the meetings and the input was very helpful. There was an aggregate attendance of one hundred twenty seven (127) at the meetings.

Each participant rated the priorities of the program as he/she felt would best serve the needs of the local community along with written comments.

The steering committee, using the annual evaluation reports from the state directors for 1981-82, needs assessments from each director, latest available census figures from the State Employment Securities Commission, and priorities and comments from the six regional task force meetings, the committee established priorities for the 1983-85 Plan. The priorities as established by the committee were as follows:



- 1. Adults with less than fifth-grade achievement level.
- 2. Adults with an achievement level above the fifth-grade but less than the ninth grade.
- 3. Special emphasis areas (in order of rank).
 - (a) Skills related ABE classes
 - (b) Low level instruction
 - (c) Adults with limited English speaking ability
 - (d) Handicapped adults
 - (e) Institutionalized adults
 - (f) G. E. D. preparation
 - (g) Child care and transportation
- 4. The Participatory Task Force made one recommendation that was rejected. G.E.D. preparation was given a number one priority. The Steering Committee rejected the high priority since the needs of those least educated and most in need had not been met across the state.



306 (b) (3) Cooperation with Other Organizations and Agencies.

....

The State Board of Education and local school districts participating in programs under this plan shall enter into cooperative arrangements, when feasible and appropriate, with community action programs, special projects, teacher training, or research grants in order to carry out the general purpose of such act.

- A. Work Experience Programs---The State Board of Education and participating school systems shall, when feasible and appropriate, enter into cooperative arrangements with work experience programs as provided in Title V, P.L. 88-452 in order to carry out the general purpose of such act.
- B. Work-Training Programs——The State Board of Education and participating school systems shall when feasible and appropriate, enter into cooperative arrangements with work-training programs as provided in Title I (B) of P.L. 88-452 in order to carry out the general purpose of such act.
- C. Work-Study Programs—The State Board of Education and participating school districts shall, when feasible and appropriate, utilize students in work-study programs at institutions of higher learning established under the provisions of Title I of P.L. 88-452 as amended.
- D. Other Agencies, Organizations, and Institutions---The State Board of Education and local school districts participating in the state plan may cooperate with other agencies such as employment offices and welfare agencies which assist in achieving objectives of P.L. 91-230 as amended.
- E. <u>Bureau of Indian Affairs</u>——The State Board of Education will work in conjunction with the Bureau of Indian Affairs in matters relating to the Indian population in Oklahoma.
- F. Other States——The State Board of Education may enter into cooperative arrangements with the state educational agencies of other adjacent states for the establishment and administration of local adult basic education programs, or permit local school district to do so when it is apparent that an interstate facility would more nearly meet the needs of individuals in a particular locale.



- G. Community Education---The State Board of Education may enter into cooperative arrangements with the local educational agencies by providing promotion, supervision, and Adult Basic Education classes in developing Community Education Programs.
- H. State Health---Because of mutual interest in Adult Basic Education with the State Department of Education, the State Health Department will make available to Adult Education teachers basic health information and services that are given to Adult Basic Education students.
- I. <u>C.E.T.A.</u>—The State Board of Education will enter into agreement with the Governor's Planning Commission to provide services necessary to enhance the employment of participants in the C.E.T.A. Program where these services are needed, and it has been determined that these services will not be a duplication of programs.
- J. <u>Churches-</u>--The State Board of Education will encourage local educational agencies to solicit services and/or facilities from local churches and church organizations to provide for expansion of services mandated in the act.
- K. <u>Business and Industry</u>—-Local educational agencies will cooperate with local businesses and industries in establishing classes for employees who are in need of and desire the services available as prescribed in the state plan.
- L. Organizations for the Aging---Special emphasis will be given to the programs of instruction for the older Americans. Thirty five percent of the eligible participants fall in this category. Learning center directors are encouraged to contact local organizations and individuals to help in recruiting and providing other needed services to enable the older Americans to participate in the program.
- M. <u>Vocational-Technical Department---</u>Close cooperation with the Vo-Tech Department will be encouraged in order to insure implementation of the skills related to the A.B. E. program.

Cooperation with these organizations and agencies has been very effective in the Outreach program and greater results are expected in FY 83-85. (See Appendix).

I. Program Information

Local television, radio, newspapers, telephone, newsletters, volunteer groups and individuals, business leaders, clergymen and adult education teachers will be used to inform the least educated and most in need of services available in the adult education program.

II. Use of Resources

Local program directors have written commitments from individuals, local church groups, voluntary organizations, Department of Public Welfare, Bureau of Indian Affairs, and others that they will provide child care and transportation services for those participants who need these services at no cost to the participant. When these services are not available, but needed, the applicant shall include an amount great enough to defray expenses needed to provide for these services.

Both daytime and evening classes are conducted where the need exists and located in local churches, community centers, businesses, industries, government agencies, civic centers, vo-tech schools, and any other place adequate for conducting classes and yet be more convenient for the participant.

312 Advisory Committee

- A. Upon the recommendation of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction the State Board of Education has appointed a State Advisory Committee. This Committee is composed of representatives of public school administrators, teachers of adult basic education, institutions of higher learning, and other agencies working with or interested in adult education programs.
- B. Committee expenses will come from non-Federal funds.

 The purpose of this committee shall include advising the State

 Department of Education on the administration and implementation

 of this plan, using data compiled by the task force to determine

 the most acute areas and target populations of the state for

 participation in adult programs, considering most appropriate

 program content, improving reporting of administration of state

 and local programs and assuring the State Plan Programs are meeting the needs of the community. The Advisory Committee shall

 advise in determining the priority of 310 Special Projects and

 Teacher Training Projects submitted by agencies, institutions,

 and individuals.
- C. The Adult Education Division in the State Department of Education shall urge the appointment of local advisory committees to advise in performing the above activities at the local community level.

 Community leaders will be urged to take an active part in the promotion of local projects and such activities shall be coordinated with other organizations of the community interested in



the education and welfare of its citizens. The local advisory committee relationship to the adult basic education students is for the allowance of continued adult learning opportunities after the adult basic education classes end.



306 (b) (13) Program Planning, Budgeting, and Evaluation.

A. Overview of the Planning Process

The intent of the "Act" as amended is clearly spelled out. The amendments are to ascertain that special emphasis be applied to the basic priorities spelled out in the act that have not been recognized at this time and a continual <u>evaluation</u> of the program to assure that the state is complying with provisions of the act to meet the current needs, locally, state and nationally (including special demonstration and teacher training projects).

Emphasis is to be put on expansion of delivery services to special needs and coordination of efforts by the State Department of Education with cooperating agencies and organizations and interagency cooperation to prevent duplication of programs.

B. Adult Learning Needs Survey

I. All the needs will be addressed as determined and prioritized by the task force. The task force will be inclusive of all segments of the adult population as mandated by the act.

The needs assessment is an on-going process using available, reliable data that is already documented. Current assessment of needs at the local, county, and state levels by the task force will determine the priorities to which emphasis of the program will be stressed. To update the needs assessment for Adult Education in measurable terms under the supervision of the State Staff of Adult Education, the Adult Education Staff will work with the task force in finding densely populated areas of uneducated people for verification of the feasibility of establishing one or



Surveys. One of the best surveys of needs for basic adult education is the findings by the forty-one (41) learning centers scattered throughout the state. These centers are aided by each local education agency. (IFA). (See attachment). The directors of the adult learning centers contacted local residents in their respective areas representing all segments of the adult population and each representative conducted a needs assessment and submitted the results to the State Department of Education. (See needs assessment instrument). Appendix B.

Census Data from the latest estimated census for the state was used to determine areas populations. This information was documented by the research department of the Oklahoma Employment Security Commission dated January 1981. This same source will be used to update the needs assessment annually. Information gathered is a joint effort of the Bureau of Census Federal-State cooperative program for local population estimates prepared annually.

For adults 19 years of age and older there are 21,874 males and females in the state of Oklahoma that have no formal education. This information was obtained from the Oklahoma Employment Security Commission's publication "Oklahoma Population Estimates" released January 1981. These estimates are based on the Census Bureau's component method II.



There are 78,378 adults over nineteen (19) with only eighth grade education. There is an overall total of 529,026 adults over nineteen (19) with less than a minth grade achievement level.

Department of Human Services. The Department of Human Services, through the social workers have recruited numerous ABE classes from their welfare rolls. There is a definite need of expansion in this phase of recruitment for the purpose of upgrading these people to become employable.

Oklahoma Human Services - a monthly bulletin published by the Department of Institutions, Social and Rehabilitative Services was used in gathering data for this plan and will continue to be used in updating the needs assessment for recipients of public assistance.

Vocational-Technical School. The Vocational-Technical Training Schools are finding need for adult basic education in preparing adults with a low level achievement before they advance to skill or vocation training. Adult Needs Assessment in Oklahoma - a study conducted by the Department of Research, Dissemination, and Evaluation, School of Occupational and Adult Education, Oklahoma State University, December 1980, was used to find the kinds of training individuals needed and wanted.

<u>Nursing Homes</u> - The Licensure and Certification Division of the State Health Department publishes a directory of licensed rest homes, nursing homes, intermediate care facilities, and



specialized homes. The information contained in this directory helped to establish the need for institutionalized adults.

Employment Security Commission - A monthly publication

'Labor Force Data' was used and will continue to be used to pimpoint areas of high rates of unemployment. Even though

Oklahoma has an over-all unemployment rate of 3.9%, which is considered to be fully employed, there are areas in the state that have a much higher percentage rate. Concentration will be directed to those areas.

Department of Corrections - The Department of Corrections works directly with the State Department of Education in establishing adult education programs in the institutions.

The 1981 edition of "Facility Description and Program Guide" was used in determining the number of eligible participants in each of the correctional institutions.

Bilingual and English as a Second Language - Statistics compiled by the State Department of Education were used to locate families of children who qualify for bilingual education funds. Also, the 1980 annual report "Immigration and Naturalization Service" published by the U.S. Department of Justice was used to establish the number and nationality of all other immigrants in Oklahoma. Approximately 1,000 new immigrants move into Oklahoma each year as permanent residents.

Task Force - Keeping in mind that others could probably establish needs and priorities for the particular segment of the adult population they represent, better than the State

Department or other educational entities, the only practical method of determining priorities is to have these segments conduct a survey of needs in the area of interest and have a committee assimilate data collected and establish priorities. Participatory Planning Task Force - At the time of presentation of this plan, 127 members submitted a needs assessment instrument completed for the adult education segment of their area or interest. The function of this committee will be keeping the needs assessment current and be involved in helping carrying out the provisions of the state plan.

C. Inventory or Resources

The State Department of Education keeps an updated inventory of resources available to project recipients, including but not limited to:

- I. <u>Personnel</u> all certified administrators, teachers, and counselors and also the para-professionals and volunteers who are adult education oriented.
- II. <u>Facilities</u> The adult learning center directors inventory the area served by the center and compile a list of all available facilities that could be used for adult education programs. The facilities are identified as to the number of persons each can accommodate, the geographical location of the facility, cost, if any, for use of the facility, and time the facility is available for program use.
- III. <u>Instructional materials</u> The curriculum specialist for the State Department of Education compiles a list of current educational materials that have been proven effective and are available for program use.

IV. Community resources - In cooperation with the State Department of Education, the learning center directors conduct periodic community resource inventories to determine what is available in the community that would make the program most effective.

D. Determining Program Priorities

Not less than eighty (80) percent of the grant-award will be used to meet the educational needs of those adults performing below the ninth grade level with special emphasis being directed to those who are in most need and can benefit more from these services. Not more than twenty (20) percent of the grant-award will be expended for persons achieving above the eighth grade level with less than completion of the requirements for a high school diploma or its equivalent. Not more than twenty (20) percent of the grant-award will be expended for a program of institutionalized adults.

- I. Program priorities, as specified in the act, is determined by a comprehensive needs assessment conducted by the State Department of Education and the steering committee, a representative body of the total segment of the adult population. (See appendix for membership). Data compiled will be used to determine state and local priorities that are related to the national priorities to comply with provisions of the Act.
- II. Basis of Priorities A needs assessment was conducted by the task force to determine existing needs for the adult population.

 Data collected reflects the greatest number of adults who have not achieved the level of high school completion are those who have achieved below the ninth grade level. 692,998 adults

nineteen years of age or older have not achieved the level of high school completion. 529,026 of these adults have an educational achievement below the ninth grade level. This represents 76.3% of the adult target population. 94,497 of these adults have an educational achievement below the fifth grade. This represents 14.8% of the total target population. 1.2% of the adult population has limited English speaking ability which indicates a need for English as a second language or bilingual classes. 58 class sites have indicated a need for child care services and 61 class sites have need for transportation services. 286 non-institutionalized handicapped adults have been identified that are in need of adult education classes. 21 counties have an unemployment rate 4% or greater. Including institutionalized adults, 28% of the target population are categorized as elderly (ages 55 years and older). Including immigrants, 17.2% of the target population are considered minorities. Special emphasis (outreach) will be placed on meeting the needs of the target population by the allocation of funds in accordance with the percentage of adults in each category. State and local priorities are in correlation with national priorities.

- III. Policies, procedures, criteria, and priorities are available for distribution to any eligible applicant for subpart C (annual program plan provisions) and subpart D (special experimental demonstration projects and teacher training) of the regulations.
 - IV. The most critical educational needs will be addressed with special emphasis, as long as there is no conflict with the provisions of the Act.



E. Allocation of Resources

- I. The amount of federal funds expended for administration shall not exceed the amount specified by the secretary in the grant-award.
- II. Only the reasonable necessary eligible expense for administration in carrying out the provisions of the program plan will be incurred.

F. Programs of Instruction

The State Department of Education will explore the possibilities of validating a Competency Based High School Diploma using similar criteria accepted in other states where the program has been proven successful.

I. Adult Basic Education

Adult basic education, particularily levels 1-5 will continue to be the first priority until it can be shown this need no longer exists. Grades 6-8 will be the second priority. Ungraded bilingual and English as a second language classes will be given special emphasis to insure that adults in need of these services will be given the opportunity to participate and achieve the English proficiency required to function in an American society.

II. Adult Secondary Education

Funds not to exceed twenty (20) percent of the grant-award may be expended for adult secondary education programs including adult secondary programs for institutionalized adults.

The needs assessment indicates that the needs of those who perform below the ninth grade achievement level have not been met, consequently, the Act prohibits that use of any grant award funds for this purpose until it can be shown that those



needs have been met. When an area can show that the basic needs have been met, and the need for secondary education is evident, that area may expend funds for instruction that would lead to completion of the secondary level.

III. Programs of Institutionalized Persons

Criteria used for determining the educational needs of institutionalized adults are the same as those for non-institutionalized adults.

IV. Bilingual Adult Education Programs.

Bilingual adult education programs will be established in areas where high concentrations of non-English speaking or limited-English speaking adults exist. The program of instruction will be designed so as to teach the adult both English language skills and to the extent necessary in the native language as determined by the needs assessment.

V. Applicant Assurances

Before an application is approved for funding it must include the assurance that participants in the project will not be charged tuition, fees, or any other charges, or be required to purchase any books or any other materils that are needed for participation in the program.

A cooperative agreement between the Bilingual Section of the State Department of Education and the Adult Education Section will assure coordination of activities of the Title VII program and the Adult Education program.

Joint workshops between the elementary and secondary bilingual



programs and the adult bilingual population are scheduled to enable parents of bilingual children to assist their children in adapting to the customs of this society. Adults will be informed of methods, techniques, and procedures they might use to encourage better and more productive results from their children in the public schools. They will also be informed of what is expected of them as a productive member of their community.

Cooperative agreements between the Oklahoma State Department of Vocational and Technical Education and the State Department of Education exist to ensure coordination of programs for bilingual students in vocational and technical schools and students in adult education classes wishing to pursue vocational skills and training.

- A. B. E. skills related courses are provided for those bilingual students in adult education classes wishing to pursue a particular skill. Proper guidance and counseling techniques are employed to ensure greater success for the individual who wishes to pursue vocational training.
- VI. The State Agency will not review an annual application from a public or private non-profit agency, organization, or institution unless this entity provides documentation to the State Agency that advice and guidance on the development of the project has been obtained from the Applicable Local Educational Agency, and provides the agency an opportunity to comment on the application prior to submission to the State Agency.

"Applicable Local Educational Agency" refers to the legally constituted public board of education or administrative agency which is located in the same city, county, township, school district, or other political subdivision of the state to be served by the application.



306 (b) (4) Annual Program Plan Format.

The program plan is constructed to insure a comprehensive adult education program that will eventually eliminate societal differentiation created by educational deficiencies of its members.

- A. The goals of the State Department of Education are in concurrence with the purposes of the act.
 - I. Funds shall be allocated to applicants on the basis of an application, and shall be paid on the number of students enrolled in adult classes, except that a minimum and maximum classroom unit cost shall be established. A budget shall be approved accordingly, which includes funds allowed in Federal and State Regulations. Funds will be matched on a 90-10 ratio. The minimum and maximum classroom unit cost for bilingual and E.S.L. classes may be in excess of those amounts allowed for regular classes under the Plan since additional personnel, such as aides and interpreters may be employed with allotted funds in conducting such classes. Funds will be allocated in advance, but subsequent to the approval of the application for the class. Of the funds allotted to the State under the Adult Education Act, not less than 75 percent shall be used for programs of instruction to achieve the objectives.

The procedure for establishing, expanding, and implementing adult education programs will follow the procedures outlined in the Annual Program Plan.

II. The State Advisory Committee will advise the State Department



- of Education on policies and procedures, and on approval of projects.
- III. Applicants dissatisfied with the disposition of an application shall have a right to a hearing before the State Board of Education according to an orderly procedure established by the Board, if it is apparent that disagreement cannot be resolved by Adult Education officials.
 - IV. An eligible applicant shall serve as the administrative unit of a learning center encompassing large areas or populations of the state designed to serve the greatest number of people with the most acute needs.
 - V. Cooperation with other agencies and organizations having common interests or goals in this area will be vigorously encouraged.
 - VI. A comprehensive list of procedures for project participation can be found in the State Board of Education's <u>Information</u>

 and <u>Regulations Relating to Adult Education</u>. A copy of this bulletin is furnished to prospective applicants.

The state plan is designed to cover the three fiscal years FY-83 through FY-85. The projection of needs will not be accurate for the succeeding years, but updated needs assessments will be used to make the changes when it is apparent that changes are needed. The goal for FY-83 is to conduct classes for 15,000 adults with special emphasis being directed to rural and urban areas with high rates of unemployment, bilingual and English as a second language classes for those of limited English speaking ability, institutionalized

adults, handicapped adults, elderly adults, adults of minority groups, and immigrants. The goal for FY-84 is to conduct classes for 15,500 adults and for FY-85 the goal is to meet the basic educational needs for 16,000 adults using the priorities as determined by current needs assessments.

VII. The educational needs of the adult population as reflected by needs assessment instruments (see Appendix) completed by 127 members of the task force representing all segments of the adult population indicate that the greatest need is for those adults with an achievement below the ninth grade level. Needs also exist for bilingual and English as a second language for immigrants and Native Americans, institutionalized adults, skills related ABE classes and classes for preparation to complete a level of high school equivalency.

It is evident that a need for child care services and transportation exists in many communities which is addressed earlier in the plan. Competent personnel and adequate facilities are available to permit flexible class scheduling and location of convenient class sites. Cooperative agreements with agencies, organizations, churches and volunteer individuals will assure a comprehensive adult education program.

- B. Specific program priorities and objectives:

 Program priorities were determined by an on going needs assessment by the local directors and the task force steering committee.

 The rank and order of priorities are as follows:
 - 1. Adults with less than a fifth-grade level.

- 2. Adults with an achievement level above the fifth grade and less than the minth grade.
- 3. Special emphasis areas (in order of rank)
 - a. Skills related ABE classes.
 - b. Adults with limited English speaking ability.
 - c. Institutionalized adults.
 - d. Handicapped adults.
 - e. Flexible class scheduling.
 - f. G.E.D. preparation.
 - g. Child care and transportation services.
- I. Program objectives (according to priorities). The overall objective is to satisfy the educational needs in accordance with the established priorities for fifteen thousand (15,000) adults in FY-83, fifteen thousand five hundred (15,500) in FY-84, and sixteen thousand (16,000) in FY-85. The categorical distribution is as follows:

FY-83

- 1. 7200 adults with less than fifth-grade level.
- 2. 7800 adults with an achievement level above the fifth grade but less than the ninth grade.
- 3. 5,000 of the above will be in special emphasis categories as follows:

a.	ABE skills related	850
b.	Limited English speaking	1100
c.	Institutionalized adults	2300
d.	Handicapped adults	250
e.	G. E. D. preparation	500

FY=84

- 1. 7400 adults with less than fifth-grade level.
- 8100 adults with more than fifth-grade level but less than ninth grade.



- 5200 of the above in special emphasis categories.
 FY-85
- 1. 7400 adults with less than fifth-grade level.
- 2. 8100 adults with more than fifth-grade level but less than ninth grade.
- 5500 of the above will be in special emphasis categories.

These projections are based on the assumption that funding will be at or above present levels. It is projected that sixty percent of the above adults will be able to assume the responsibilities required of a member of our society on completion of one of the adult programs.

Not less than seventy five percent of the grant award will be expended for instructional programs. Funds will be allocated proportionately according to anticipated needs in each program. Present needs assessments indicate the budget should be allocated as follows:

- 1. 28% for classes for grade levels one to five.
- 2. 36% for classes for grade levels six to eight.
- 3. 8% for skils related ABE classes.
- 4. 7% limited English speaking.
- 5. .2% for flexible class scheduling.
- 6. 20% for institutionalized adults.
- 7. .5% for G.E.D. preparation classes.
- 8. .2% for child care services.
- 9. .1% for transportation services.



Due to the question of funding for the ensuing years, no dollar amounts are estimated.

C. Activities and Procedures:

- I. For FY83 the State Department of Education Personnel and
 Learning Center Directors with the help of task force members
 recruit students (with achievement levels of grades one
 through five) for 325 classes. Emphasis will be for those
 who need and want the services the most. Any eligible applicant will not be denied the opportunity to participate.
- II. 430 classes will be established for adults with an achievement level of at least fifth grade, but less than the ninth grade. These classes will include the most appropriate and acceptable methods of teaching adults, including but not limited to the traditional classroom techniques, Competency Based Adult Education and A.P.L. methods.
- III. A survey will be made and needed classes organized at the times and locations more convenient for those adults in need of skills-related ABE classes. Area vo-tech schools, private institutions, businesses and industries will be surveyed and classes established where the need exists and eligible participants desire to attend.
- IV. Classes for persons with limited English speaking ability will be established for persons in Lawton, Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Altus and at various sites in Jefferson, Jackson, Pittsburg, LeFlore, Cherokee, Pottawatomie and Cleveland Counties. Other classes will be established at different locations where the need arises.



- V. The Adult Learning Center directors will establish classes for adults in established institutions including but not limited to penal institutions, nursing homes, rest homes, institutions for the mentally retarded, and adult handicapped. Classes to accommodate 2,400 institutionalized adults will participate in ABE and skills-related ABE classes.
- VI. 28 classes will be conducted for adults in G.E.D. preparation. The class sites are Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Pryor, Muskogee, Chickasha, Anadarko, Tonkawa, and Tahlequah. Five hundred adults will participate in the 28 classes. These classes will be open-entry, open-exit for purposes of attendance.
- VII. Special emphasis will be directed to adults who can benefit more and are in greatest need of the adult education classes. Flexible class scheduling, child care services and transportation will facilitate class attendance and participation of these adults. To assure that these provisions are met, agreements will be worked out with agencies already offering these services and by contacting volunteer organizations, churches, and individuals at the local level who are willing to provide these services at no expense to the program.

Funds will be expended from the grant-award to meet the expense of these services when it has been determined that the services are needed and no other sources of meeting these needs are available.

VIII. The State Department of Education will put special emphasis

on the expansion of delivery services for at least educated adults by contracting with any public or private non-profit organization, agency or institution to provide these services where needed and are not otherwise being provided. All cooperating agencies, institutions and organizations will be utilized in helping recruit the least educated adults in each community. Funding will be provided by the same formula as used for local educational agency programs.

At the time this plan was submitted to the U.S. Department of Education, statistics indicated that all urban areas are considered to be fully employed; but at the same time, 25 counties have an unemployment rate of above 4%. The target population includes the unemployed adults in the 21 counties. The State Department of Education will furnish a list of the national and state priorities and the criteria for evaluating a proposal to any eligible applicant wishing to submit a proposal for an adult education program.

- D. Applications for funds will be evaluated according to the following criteria. The stated goals and objectives and annual performance report will be the instruments for evaluation. State staff monitoring will assure program continuity.
 - I. Does the project application provide service to an area of the state having a high concentration of people to benefit from such service?
 - II. Has the application been prepared in cooperation with various organizations and agencies and/or an advisory council which



- has a mutual interest in the program?
- III. Is the proposal economically sound and comprehensive in nature according to the needs of the people to be served?
 - IV. Is it apparent that personnel and facilities are available to conduct effective operations?
 - V. Has adequate provision been made for dissemination of information about the program and for recruitment for students?
- VI. Is the project designed to meet the most acute needs of the people benefiting from the program?
- VII. Is it apparent that the program provides for effective administration and supervision by the local agency?
- VIII. Are effective instructional materials used and are effective methods of instruction applied?
 - IX. Is the program aimed primarily towards ABE activities?
 - X. Does the applicant specify means to be used in recruiting the least educated and most in need of the service?
 - XI. Has an adequate assessment been made to clearly reflect the needs of the local population and are these needs specifically addressed?
- XII. If the population is in need of such services as child care, change in location of classes, or flexible scheduling, can these needs be met?
- XIII. Has the applicant explored the available resources from other agencies to the fullest.
- XIV. Is funding request realistic in serving the needs indicated in the application?

E. Applicants for Adult Education Funds.

- I. Local agencies, organizations, and institutions will submit annual applications for programs under this act to the State Department of Education, Adult Education Section.
- II. Applications will be filed on forms supplied by the State Department of Education. Applications must address the needs of the population to be served as reflected by a needs assessment.
- III. Applicant must assure that there will be no charge to the student for instruction, books, materials or services.
- IV. Applicant must specify the means used to inform the least educated and most in need of the services available to them.
- V. Applicant must list local resources available that will support the proposed program, i. e. services such as child care, transportation, flexible schedules, available space, etc.
- VI. Each project applicant for adult education funds must have signed, written commitments from other agencies, organizations, and institutions, stating their willingness to help in the delivery of adult education services, submitted with the application.



- VII. Applications will be reviewed by a committee consisting of seven (7) persons chosen from the Steering Committee representing all facets of the population. This committee will evaluate proposals in terms of local, state and national priorities. The Director of Adult Education and the State Adult Education staff will assist by offering technical advice.
- VIII. The steering committee meets four times each year (quarterly) (see calendar of events) to evaluate the progress of each project's objectives as reflected by the needs assessment accompaning the application.

Weaknesses and strengths of the on-going programs are enumerated and compared to the objectives in the state plan.

The committee makes recommendations and suggestions on where more emphasis should be stressed and methods of expansion for the total ABE program.



310 Special Experimental Demonstration Projects and Teacher Training.

- I. Applicability. Statewide priorities and objectives are determined for teacher training and special demonstration projects by the local adult basic education teachers, Adult Learning Center directors, State Department of Education staff, representatives of cooperating agencies (Task Force) and the State Advisory Council.
- II. Allocation of Resources+ No less than 10 percent of the State's grant award will be expended for special experimental demonstration projects and teacher training.

A. Eligible Applicants

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Experimental and Demonstration Project. The State Department of Education personnel will assist any agency in determining priorities for special demonstration projects. Publication for bids on contracts for special demonstration projects will reflect the concern for nonduplication of effort on projects already conducted. The State Advisory Council will act in an advisory capacity on all special demonstration projects approved by the State Department of Education. Special demonstration projects with national significance will be given first consideration when awarding contracts.

- I. The priority for approving applications for special demonstration projects shall include but not be limited to the following type of program:
 - Projects designed to enhance the possibility of meeting critical educational needs of the target population.

- Projects which have replication or exportability characteristics relating to improved practices and products in the adult learning process.
- 3. Projects which include demonstrations with or innovations in the production of materials or the utilization of equipment and materials, or with methods and techniques for presenting information to the learner or student confidentially.
- 4. Projects which experiment with the involvement or integration of labor, employer and educational domains to foster a better learning climate.
- Projects which experiment with the integration of the cognitive, psychomotor, and affective domains in improving the adult learning process.
- 6. Projects to conduct literacy assessments.

B. Teacher Training

The State Department of Education will accept bids from eligible applicants to conduct teacher training projects with funds available for that purpose under Section 310(2) of the Act. Allowable costs that will be considered for successful bidders are as follows:

I. Administrative Costs (not to exceed 15 percent of the total Adult Basic Education project). No additional administrative cost will be allowed for instruction of adult Indochinese instruction since it will be funded by the State's grant award for Adult Basic Education.



- 1. Salaries
- 2. Benefits
- 3. Travel
- 4. Consultants
- 5. Rent (if needed)
- 6. Auditing, Bookkeeping, etc.
- 7. Indirect Costs
- 8. Communication (telephone, postage)
- Evaluation (An independent evaluation is required, utilizing evaluation instruments designed by the evaluator, that best determines the effectiveness of the projects.)

II. Program Costs

- Teacher salaries for personnel conducting seminars shall not exceed \$100.00 per day of instruction that the teacher performs.
- Fringe benefits are to include only the matching portion for withholding from the teacher's salary for retirement systems and social security.
- 3. Travel and per diem, where warranted.

III. Participant Cost

Participant Stipends and Travel Allowance. Each
participant shall be paid a stipend not to exceed
\$20.00 per day for each five-day seminar. A participant may be paid the state travel rate (\$.22 per mile) for one round-trip from his/her home to the seminar site.



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- 2. Instructional materials and supplies.
- 3. Equipment (small), may purchase.
- 4. Equipment (large), rental.

C. Eligible Applicants

Eligible applicants for funds under both types of projects shall include:

- 1. State Education Agencies and Local Education Agencies.
- Public and private agencies, institutions and organizations inside and outside this state.
- I. Ineligible applicants. No funds will be used for programs conducted by any school department of divinity, as defined in Section 312 of the Act.
- D. Applications for Special Demonstration Projects and
 Teacher Training
- I. Policies and procedures relating to special demonstration projects and teacher training. The State Department of Education will elicit and approve applications for funds to establish special demonstration projects and teacher training projects not to be less than 10% of the State allocation in a given year.
- II. Special projects. Funds will be awarded to successful bidders for special projects under criteria as set forth in this plan.
- III. Adult Education Staff Development
 - 1. Oklahoma State Department personnel will participate



in the joint effort of Staff Development for Region VI.

 Four workshops will be conducted in June, July, and August, 1982, for teachers of ABE and directors of Adult Learning Centers.

In-service workshops will be conducted at all the Learning Centers in cooperation with the State Department of Education. State Department of Education personnel will conduct annually for teachers of CBAE two teacher training workshops.

- Oklahoma State Department of Education personnel will conduct two teacher training sessions annually for teachers of persons of limited English speaking ability.
- E. Establishing of National Priorities in Adult Education
 - I. The State Department of Education will annually review and identify national priorities in the field of adult education and amend the State Plan to incorporate the current priorities with the priorities of the state and local educational agencies.
 - At the time of notification of the grant award, bids are solicited by publication in the newspaper of general circulation, i. e., The Daily Oklahoman. In monthly publication of the Superintendent's Newsletter and the Educator following the announcement of the grant award, the amount of the grant is published and the minimum of

the award (ten percent) is announced to be available to successful bidders for teacher training and special demonstration projects. This is repeated again in January.

F. <u>Criteria for Evaluating Special Demonstration Projects and</u>
Teacher-Training Applications.

The State Department of Education will give consideration to the following factors in assessing the strengths of the two types of applications:

- I. Are objectives defined, clearly stated, capable of being achieved, and measurable?
- II. Are proposed activities of the application relevant to the priority needs outlined in this plan?
- III. Is it apparent that the potential recipient has available qualified personnel and necessary facilities and other resources adequate to achieve project objectives?
 - IV. Are the size, scope, and duration of the project adequate to produce anticipated results and does it appear that proposed expenditures are measurable?
 - V. Does the project have promise for production of effective materials or the development of improved practices and techniques to improve Adult Education?
- VI. If appropriate, does the application provide for cooperation and coordination between business, labor, and education forces?
- VII. Is there coordination between this project and local



- Adult Education programs and other demonstration or teacher training projects?
- VIII. Are there possiblilities of replication or exportability of results to other projects, and has other provisions been made for dissemination of information about the project?
 - IX. Is there adequate provision for evaluation of the project's effectiveness in terms of State objectives?
 - X. Are Section 310 projects oriented toward serving those least educated and most in need? (Only those projects giving consideration to serving adults least educated and most in need will be funded.)



G. Submission of Applications

- I. Mass media will be used as well as State Department of Education publications to inform eligible applicants about the purpose and nature of this part of the Adult Education Program.
- II. Prospective applicants should first submit a brief abstract of the project proposal to the Adult Basic Education Section for consideration on the merits of the purpose, nature, and scope of the proposal before proceeding with the development of the proposal in its entirety.

H. Application Review Panel

A review panel of independent readers and the State Advisory Council will review and make recommendations on applications before the Adult Education Section finally recommends approval to the State Superintendent. 5.9(a) The criteria used for selection of membership is:

- 1. Know the critical areas of need in adult basic education,
- Currently working in or have had experience in adult education programs.
- 3. Representative of institution of higher education.
- 4. Representative of special education interest of an adult segment.
- 5. Member of local educational agency.
- 6. Member of the State education agency.
- Member of a cooperating agency, organization, or committee.

- 8. Individual with special adult education interests.
- I. Selection Criteria for Teacher Training Participants

 A teacher must be presently working in the area of Adult

 Basic Education or will be employed during the fiscal year
 in Adult Basic Education. Those that wish to attend that
 have not participated in more than three Adult Training

 Workshops. Those recommended by the Area Program Director.

 Those participating for college credit must meet college
 entrance requirements.
- J. Notification to Bidders on Approval or Rejection of Proposal

A review panel of independent readers and the State Advisory Committee will review and make recommendations on applications before the Adult Education Section finally recommends approval to the State Superintendent. Two weeks prior to the Advisory Council meeting, each member is mailed a copy of all proposals submitted for consideration. The Council discusses each proposal and determines which proposals meet the criteria outlined in the State Plan. The Council then determines which should have priority and advises the State Department of Education. The Adult Education Section staff and the Assistant State Superintendent determines which proposals warrant funding and present them to the State Board of Education for approval. The applicants are notified by mail that their proposals are approved or rejected. A critique of the proposal accompanies all rejected proposals. Funds will be



granted to successful applicants upon proper execution of forms supplied by the State Department of Education.

K. Hearings

Dissatisfied applicants will be given an opportunity to a hearing before the State Superintendent. The applicant shall file a formal request for a hearing stating the reasons why he is not satisfied with the decision. Within ten days from the date of the receipt of the request, the State Department of Education will notify the applicant stating the date, time, and place of the hearing.

L. Program Evaluation Procedures

- I. The State Department of Education will monitor each program funded from the grant-award. Using evaluation instruments designed to measure the effectiveness of the program or project, dissemination of the findings as a result of the evaluation will be accessible to the local, state, regional, and national agencies, organizations, and/or individuals requesting such findings.
- II. Independent third party evaluations of specific programs will be conducted for determining to what extent state-wide goals have been met in carrying out the purpose of the act. Copies of the evaluation will be sent to the U.S. D. E. and to the national and state clearinghouse for dissemination purposes.
- III. An ongoing evaluation by the State Adult Education staff and local Advisory Council will be conducted for Section



306 projects, also, an annual evaluation will be made by the State Advisory Council.

Section 310 projects will be monitored by the State staff on a continuing basis with an external evaluation at the completion of the project.

An annual evaluation of both Section 306 and 310 activities will be made by the Steering Committee at the end of each fiscal year.

Criteria for evaluation of Section 306 and 310 activities will be based on the objectives stated by the applicant in the original application for funds.

M. Reports

Reporting procedures and requirements are itemized on each project application and become part of the contract with the State Department of Education, if the project is approved. Each agency participating in the Adult Education program is required to make the necessary reports to the State Department of Education at the time and to the extent specified in the contract. The recipient agency is also required to submit such reports that the State Department of Education deems necessary regardless of whether they are enumerated in the contract.

N. Requested Reports:

I. <u>Final Reports</u>: Within fifteen days after the approval of a project under Section 310 or 306(a)(4) the State Agency shall provide the Secretary with an abstract of each

proposal approved for funding. The State Agency shall submit to the Secretary, within 120 days after completion of the project, copies of final reports of programs or projects conducted by awardees under Sections 306 (a)(4) and 310 of the Act. The State Agency shall submit, within 60 days after the end of any fiscal period, a report on the use of Federal funds.

II. Special Reports:

<u>Financial Reports</u>: The State Agency shall submit financial reports annually, 90 days after the end of the contract period.

<u>Performance Reports</u>: The State Agency shall submit performance reports annually, 90 days after the end of the contract period.

<u>Evaluation Activities</u>: The State Agency shall submit to the Secretary, a summary of evaluation activities within 90 days after the close of each program year.

III. Independent Evaluations: The State Agency shall forward to the Secretary a copy of any independent evaluations of projects and programs (including projects under Section 310 and programs of instruction under Section 310 of the Act.)

0. Dissemination of Materials Produced by Projects

In accordance with guidelines provided by the U.S. Office of Education Clearinghouse on Adult Education, the State Agency shall provide a compilation of all projects for each fiscal period in which funds under Sections 306(a)(4) and 310 of





Results and projections of the cooperative effort with other organizations and agencies.

Through close cooperation with the work experience and work training programs we have been able to provide classes to furnish the basic academic background necessary for employment in various vocations. In some cases it required changes in scheduling to accommodate the persons involved. Opening the channels of communication will provide more participation in the next three years. By the same token we have used work-study participants as aides in some of our ABE classes. Due to reduced funding this participation will probably be reduced in the immediate future.

The cooperative effort with the Department of Human Services has been very productive. Through their referrals, we have been able to reach three hundred and forty (340) low-level persons whom we probably would have not reached without their cooperation. With the adoption of new regulations in the Department of Human Services, requiring all those physically able to seek employment, the number should dramatically increase the next three years.

Our cooperation with the Bureau of Indian Affairs has been very rewarding. Through the B.I.A. Offices in Anadarko and in Muskogee we have been able to reach approximately four hundred native Americans whom we probably would not have been able to recruit without their contacts. Funding cuts for the B.I.A. indicate even greater participation in the next few years.

Working with the Community Education Program has resulted in the establishment of A.B.E. classes at all schools that have a community education program. These classes have been an integral part of the overall program. With the varied programs offered we expect more people to be attracted in the



years ahead and hence improve attendance in the A.B.E. classes.

The State Health Department (SHD) has been invaluable in supplying information to A.B.E. participants. The SHD also provides basic medical care for those unable to pay for the services. The SHD encourages the participants to call on them and it is expected that the number of participants will continue to increase. Approximately one-hundred-sixty (160) A.B.E. participants have been served in FY 80-81.

Through the cooperative effort with the churches we have been able to provide physical facilities in areas where we were in dire need of classes. Not only have they furnished places to meet but in some cases provided child care. We project this Looperation to increase in the years to come.

Business and industry have been most helpful in making referrals to the A.B.E. program, as well as offering physical facilities for classes. The increased emphasis by both business and industry on academic achievement of their employees indicate a growth in their field in the immediate future.

In an effort to serve the older population, eleven classes have been established in rest homes in the last two years. Three classes are held in senior citizen centers and four in churches that serve the elderly. The ever increasing number of elderly indicate a further growth in the next three years.

Our very close relationship with the Vocational-Technical Department has been most successful. It is this relationship that has enabled us to explore one of our most requested priorities - skills related A.B.E. programs. A.B.E. classes are held in 85 percent of the areas Vo-Tech schools in the state. Approximately 1200 persons were served in these classes in FY 80-81. A special project is now being conducted in conjuction with the Oklahoma City Skills Center to develop academic materials for instruction in the area of machine shop operation for limited English speaking adults. The future of A.B.E. in

conjunction with Vo-Tech is extremely encouraging.



SUBJECT: General Application for Federal Funds for Assistance to LEAs

The extension of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, P.L. 95-561, which was enacted into law in 1978, contains a majority of Federal legislation related to elementary and secondary programs. In Title XII, Part C, Section 1231, Congress amended sections of the General Education Provisions Act concerning state and local administration of programs. The amendments included Section 436 of the General Education Provisions Act relating to a single local educational agency (LEA) application. Section 436 (a) states:

"Each local educational agency which participates in an applicable program under which Federal funds are made available to such agency through a State agency or board shall submit to such agency or board a general application containing the assurances set forth in subsection (b). That application shall cover the participation by that local education agency in all such programs."

The Oklahoma State Department of Education has not required LEAs to submit the assurances required in Section 436 (b), because Title V-A which provides for administering a single application was not funded. Recently, the U.S. Department of Education has notified the Oklahoma State Department of Education that we must require all LEAs participating in Federal programs to submit the assurances provided for under Section 436 (b) of the General Education Provisions Act.

Enclosed is an Oklahoma State Department of Education General Application for Federal Funds for Assistance to LEAs. Basically, this general application simply states the assurances provided for under Section 1/36 of the General Education Provisions Act. We are requesting that the superintendent or authorized official sign the application and return it to Mr. Jack Strahorn, Assistant State Superintendent, State-Federal Programs, 2500 North Lincoln Boulevard, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73105, at your earliest convenience.

- (B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by handicapped individuals; and
- (8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects.

This general application will remain in effect for the duration of the authorization period of the federally funded programs with subgrants from the Oklahoma State Department of Education or until your Board of Education changes the authorized official responsible for federal programs.

APPENDIX E

TASK FORCE INVOLVEMENT

The Appendix reflects the establishment of the participatory planning Task Force, involvement of the total Adult Segment, methods to assure that all segments of the adult population were given an opportunity to become involved in the planning and carrying out of the state plan.

A roster of the Task Force members, members of the Steering Committee and survey instruments are also included.

PARTICIPATORY PLANNING PROCESS

On October 2, 1978, the U.S. Office of Education conducted a regional workshop in Atlanta, Georgia, for the purpose of explaining the provisions of the educational amendment of 1978. The State Director and Deputy Director of Adult Education attended the conference and returned to Oklahoma to initiate a three-year state plan.

State Department personnel met and decided to call an advisory council meeting and select a temporary steering committee to start the participatory planning process and act until a permanent steering committee was selected by the task force. A list of organizations, institutions, agencies, individuals and representatives of other segments of the adult population was compiled and sent to the State Superintendent for his suggestions and recommendations.

With the State Superintendent's approval, a news release invited full participation in a meeting scheduled in Oklahoma City on January 31, 1979.

Letters of invitation were sent to persons representing the total adult population asking that they become members of the task force.

A needs assessment instrument was constructed and distributed statewide. The task force voted to select a permanent steering committee consisting of no more than 25 members to help in establishing priorities and carrying out the provisions of the state plan. One hundred nineteen needs assessments were returned. Data collected were the basis for setting state and local priorities.

The task force will meet quarterly each year at regular sessions and periodically, as the need arises, in special sessions. On April 10, 1979, the steering committee selected a chairperson, vice-chairperson and secretary of the organization. Priorities, objectives and activities were decided to fulfill the Adult Education needs in Oklahoma.

With each member of the Participatory Planning Task Force giving his/her full consideration to the priorities set forth in the Act, the State of Oklahoma should be blessed with the most comprehensive adult education program ever experienced.



OUTREACH RESULTS FY 80 - 82

RESULTS OF SPECIAL EMPHASIS ON OUTREACH Fiscal Years 1980-82

The first two years of the present three year plan have far exceeded our original projections. Many more have been recruited into the lower level classes and into the special emphasis categories than had been expected. More public awareness through increased media coverage and local support are the apparent reasons for the increase. The on going needs assessments by the local directors and the input of Adult Education Task Force Steering Committee have been a great help in locating areas of greatest need.

In FY-81 the salaries for ABE teachers were increased from seven dollars per hour to nine dollars per hour and the allowance for books and supplies was increased from nine dollars per student to eleven dollars per student. With the same funding as FY-80, this meant a reduction in the number of classes. The local directors were able, through more efficient administration and larger class sizes, to serve even more students than in FY-80. Forty one centers with two hundred fifteen LEA's were served and consequently made the program accessible to persons in all areas of the state.

For FY-82 the State Legislature appropriated \$146,300 for the Adult Education Program. This will provide seventy seven classes which will restore some of those lost due to increased costs. If funding at the Federal level remains the same more students can be served than in FY-81. State funding is thought to be the result of public involvement in the adult program.

Needs assessments show that more ESL classes will be needed to satisfy the ever increasing numbers of limited English speaking adults migrating to Oklahoma. There is also evidence that the number of institutionalized adults will increase.

Child care and transportation services have not proven to be a problem. Excellent cooperation among community agencies, churches, and volunteer groups has been very effective in taking care of all the needs that have arisen.

Thirty two day classes in addition to those already offered have been established to give more flexibility to the scheduling process. This, along with the open entry open exit, and a wide variation in days and times in our evening classes permits attendance by a very large percentage of those wishing to attend.

APPLICATION PROCEDURES

SPECIAL PROJECTS AND TEACHER TRAINING 310 Funds

In FY-80 four teacher training projects were funded. The projects were located at Oklahoma University, Norman Oklahoma, Southeastern State University, Durant, Oklahoma, Northeastern State University, Tahlequah, Oklahoma, and Central State University, Edmond, Oklahoma. Two hundred ninety one (291) teachers attended these workshops. Emphasis was placed on retention and ESL teaching techniques in the FY_80 workshops. Teachers are required to attend at least one workshop every three years to remain eligible to teach in the Adult Education program.

In addition to the teacher training workshops four (4) one day ESL workshops were held at Oklahoma City, Tulsa, McAlester, and Elk City. One hundred fifteen teachers from all sections of the state attended these workshops.

In FY-80 five special demonstration projects were funded. These projects were located in Tulsa, Norman, Muskogee, Hugo, and Lawton. These projects involved two hundred and twenty seven persons.

In FY-81 three teacher training workshops were funded. They were held at Northeastern State University, Southeastern State University, and Central State University. Two hundred eighty four (284) teachers were in attendance at these workshops. Special emphasis was placed on individualized instruction at these workshops. Special projects were funded for Tulsa and Lawton.

SUBJECT: Public Notice of Non-Discrimination

During our recent Management Evaluation Review for Compliance (M.E.R.C.) performed by the U.S. Office of Education, it was pointed out that public notices should be posted in conspicuous places at facilities where adult education programs are conducted and other public places. I am enclosing a sample public notice that you may wish to use as a format.

It is also mandated in the federal regulations that a disclaimer clause must accompany all publications, advertisements, newsletters, etc., intended for public distribution. I am enclosing a sample disclaimer clause used by the State Department of Education that you may wish to adopt for your institution also.

In order to qualify for federal funds, your institution must be in compliance. If you have any questions on either of these, please feel free to call on us.

A tentative date and place for the spring Director's meeting has been set at Fountainhead Lodge on March 16, 17, & 18, 1980. More information on the meeting will come at a later date.



CRITERIA TO BE ADDRESSED IN APPLICATION

- 1. Name the agencies, organizations, and institutions involved in establishing the local priorities and developing the proposal.
- 2. Name the agencies, organizations, and institutions to be involved in carrying out the project (especially the private and public non-profit).
- 3. State the local priorities in order by rank.
- 4. Local priorities should relate to the state's priorities.
- 5. Explain how this project will be coordinated with others.
- 6. State what provisions are available for child care and transportation, if needed.
- 7. State how the program will ease participation of those adults seeking assistance.
- 8. Make a statement about provisions for handicapped adults wishing to participate.
- 9. Make provisions for institutionalized adults.
- 10. State where and what type of instruction will be provided for elderly persons.
- 11. State how the program will tie in with the vocational and/or technical training that is available for this adult segment.

The recipient is required to evaluate the program, the participants will provide an evaluation reflecting the effectiveness of the program as to their needs, and the State Department of Education staff will conduct an over-all evaluation.

Recipients of funds for Teacher Training projects will have an additional outside evaluation.

The State Department of Education will submit copies of all evaluations to the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Education.

The State Advisory Council at the end of each fiscal year will conduct an evaluation of all Adult Education programs and copies of the evaluation will be mailed to the National Adult Education Advisory Council.

CRITERIA FOR REVIEW OF PROJECT APPLICANTS

The State Education agency has established, in the annual program plan, the criteria to be used in reviewing project applications from local educational agencies, public and private organizations, or individuals.

Such criteria shall be applied in conjunction with the criteria developed under I I 166.12, 166.13 and Appendix B of the regulations contained in 45 CFR Part-166. The value to be assigned to each of the applicable criteria shall be the responsibility of the State.

- (a) <u>General criteria</u>. It is recommended that the following general criteria be utilized in evaluating both special projects and teacher training applications:
 - (1) Objectives are sharply defined, clearly stated, capable of being attained by the proposed procedures, and capable of being measured;
 - (2) Proposed plan of operation is sound;
 - (3) Proposed activity is relevant to the priority or needs addressed;
 - (4) Proposed activity is needed in the area to be served by the applicant;
 - (5) Designated project personnel possess qualifications and experience to adequately carry out project activities;
 - (6) Facilities and other resources are adequate to carry out the objectives of the project;
 - (7) Size, scope, and duration of the project would secure productive results, and the estimated cost is reasonable in relation to these results;
 - (8) Potential for replication and utilization of the results of the project in other adult education programs and the provisions for disseminating these results are judged to be adequate;

- (9) Provisions are included for an adequate evaluation of the project's effectiveness and for determining the extent to which its objectives are accomplished.
- (b) <u>Special projects</u>. In evaluating applications for special projects, the State educational agency will give consideration to such factors as whether and to what-extent the project:
 - (1) Involves the use of innovative methods, systems, materials or programs and which may have national significance and will serve residents of the State or be of special value in promoting effective programs under the Act:
 - (2) Is to be carried out in cooperation with other federally assisted, State, or local programs which have unusual promise in promoting a comprehensive or coordinated approach to the problems of persons with educational deficiencies;
 - (3) Is designed to address critical educational needs which have been identified as State or national priorities for adult education;
 - (4) Has unusual promise for the development of concepts, practices, and techniques which can be adapted or adopted elsewhere in establishing or improving adult education;
 - (5) Is related to and is carried out in cooperation with appropriate training activities whether or not assisted under the Act;
 - (6) Will result in the development of materials and methods which may be of value in increasing the effectiveness of adult education programs;
 - (7) Provides for cooperation and coordination with business and industry, labor and other agencies, institutions, and community education programs and other related programs, as identified in [166.13 of the regulations, in order to strengthen the project and prevent

duplication of effort;

- (8) Provides, where appropriate, for cooperation and continuation by the iocal educational agencies and other public and private agencies; and
- (9) Will strengthen the adult education delivery systems within the State.
- (c) <u>Teacher training</u>. In evaluating applications for training grants, the State educational agency will give consideration to such factors and whether as to what extent the project:
 - (1) Is consistent with the objectives set forth in the annual program
 plan for the development and training of adult education personnel;
 - (2) Will include training in the utilization and development of innovative methods, systems, materials, or programs;
 - (3) Will meet local needs for adult education personnel;
 - (4) Is designed to address critical training needs which have been identified as State or national priorities for adult education;
 - (5) Provides for periodic, systematic, and objective reviews and evaluations of the project;
 - (6) Is coordinated with appropriate special experimental demonstration projects which may be operating in the geographic area served by the applicant;
 - (7) Is coordinated with adult education programs being sponsored in the State in which the applicant is located or with a consortium of the States from which trainees are drawn or to which trainees may be expected to return;
 - (8) Is to be carried out in cooperation with other federally assisted, State, or local programs;
 - (9) Provides for cooperation and coordination with business and industry, labor and other agencies, as identified in 1 166.13 of the regulations, to strengthen the project and prevent duplication;

- (10) Provides for cooperation and continuation by the local educational agencies and other public and private agencies; and
- (11) Includes criteria for eligibility for participation in the project.
