ABSTRACT

Data and narrative information are presented on college enrollments, based on a survey of institutions in the United States, Puerto Rico, and U.S. Territories. The total four-year college enrollment for fall 1981 was 7,530,013, of which 5,306,832 were full-time and 2,223,181 were part-time. The total two-year college enrollment for fall 1981 was 4,251,655 with 1,620,699 full-time and 2,630,956 part-time. Findings include the following: grand total enrollments increased by .7 percent; full-time enrollments grew less than .1 percent; unitary systems registered a 1.2 percent decline in full-time enrollments; public complex universities' full-time enrollments declined by .2 percent; private complex universities increased full-time students by 1 percent; multipurpose institutions' full-time enrollments increased by .4 percent; arts and sciences colleges grew slightly; music, fine arts, and applied arts schools declined, as did full-time enrollments in independent law, medicine, and allied health; independent technological, business, and related schools increased by 6.6 percent; part-time enrollments grew by 2.4 percent; and full-time entering freshmen enrollment declined by 9.4 percent. Information is also presented on religious schools, enrollments of women and veterans, graduate schools, and professional schools. (SW)

COLLEGIATE ENROLLMENTS IN THE U.S. 1981-82

J. Ernest Mickler.

The sixty-second annual report on collegiate enrollments in four year institutions in the United States was based on data received from 1,844 colleges in the U.S., Puerto Rico, and U.S. Territories. The grand total enrollment for fall 1981 was 7,530,013, of which 5,306,832 were full-time and 2,223,181 were part-time. Women students comprised 50.1% of the population.

The tenth annual report on student enrollments in the American two-year institutions was based on data supplied by 1,096 schools and colleges. A grand total enrollment for these institutions for fall 1981 was 4,251,655 with 1,620,699 full-time and 2,630,956 part-time enrollees. Women students comprised 53.4% of the population in the two-year schools.

The collegiate enrollment studies were begun in 1919 and were continued for forty years by the late Dr. Raymond Walters, longtime president of the University of Cincinnati. In 1960, Dr. Garland G. Parker of Cincinnati assumed the authorship and continued the studies through fall 1978. The report on American two-year institutions was initiated by Parker in 1972. In 1979, because of Dr. Parker's approaching retirement, the responsibility for the studies was assumed by J. Ernest Mickler, Assistant Vice President for Planning and Operations at The University of Alabama.

Initially published in *Science* at the invitation of J. McKeen Cattell, the studies were later published in *School and Society* and in *Intellect*. Since 1975, the American College Testing Program has published the studies as ACT Special Reports. The joint effort of the author, The University of Alabama, and the American College Testing Program is made in the interest of providing useful information for American Higher Education.

The provision of data for the annual studies is purely on a voluntary basis. Yet, over 90% of the institutions reported in 1981. Unique to the study series is the procedure for calculating percentages of change. All percentages of change are based on comparable data; that is, an institution must have filed enrollment reports for both fall 1981 and fall 1980 to have been included in the calculation of percentages of change. All reports received for any given year are tabulated, but the changes are calculated as noted above. This procedure is used to provide more accurate information and takes into account the fact that universal reporting does not occur. The procedure also excludes changes that could occur due to the opening or closing of institutions.

Considerable effort has been given to avoid error in calculations and presentation of data; however, the author assumes no responsibility for the data that may have been reported incorrectly. The American College Testing Program and The University of Alabama assume no responsibility for the data, interpretations, and conclusions in the studies. As indicated previously, the studies are made as a public service.

Prior to 1980, the enrollment studies were published in separate volumes. That year, however, it was decided to print one volume that contained both studies. The four-year study and tables are presented first, and an overall summary and conclusions will be presented following the two-year narrative and tables.

Enrollments in Four-Year Institutions

Grand total enrollments increase by .7%. For the third consecutive year, enrollments in the four-year colleges and universities in the United States have increased. Until 1976, enrollment decline had not occurred in 25 years. Collegiate enrollments have grown consistently over the years. The increases of the past three years (.5 in 1979, 3.6 in 1980, and .7 in 1981) occurred after the peak year of high school graduates. That is to say, despite the decline in the potential numbers of students, growth occurred in the four-year colleges and schools.

The .7% increase was calculated on the basis of reports from 1,720 institutions that reported enrollments in fall 1980, and again in fall 1981. Total enrollments and percentage changes by category as defined on page were as follows: 218 unitary systems, 1,898,024, +.7%; 156 public/complex universities, 1,989,672, +.1%; 81 private/complex universities, 787,199, +.2%; 299 multipurpose colleges and universities, 1,532,136, +.2%; 696 arts and science colleges, 947,160, +1.9%; 45 music, fine arts and applied arts institutions, 28,509, +3.9%; 73 independent law, medicine, and applied health schools, 65,518, +2.2%; 90 technological, business, and related schools, 220,636, +7.2%; 64 Bible colleges, 23,098, -3.1% and 122 theological schools, 38,061, +5.4%.

As indicated above, enrollment increases occurred in nine of ten categories in the fall of 1981—the exception being Bible schools with a 3.1% decline. The first four categories showed very limited enrollment; however, these institutions enrolled 82% of the students in the four-year institutions. Thus, the 3.9%, 5.4%, and 7.2% reported by categories six, ten, and eight had very little impact upon the total growth pattern of the four-year colleges and schools.

Full-time enrollments grew less than .1%. Declines in full-time enrollments were reported by five of the institutional categories in the fall of 1981. Though most of the declines were slight, they represented a substantial decrease in the number of full-time students enrolled in these institutions. Category eight, independent technological, business, and related schools, showed a 6.6% increase for fall 1981. This percentage increase had only a slight impact on the overall enrollment picture because category eight schools enroll about 3% of the four-year population. For the first time in many years, full-time students may have comprised less than 71% of the population of the four-year colleges and universities. Though the decline was only to 70.5%, this shift represents a loss of approximately 37,650 students as full-time enrollees. Listings of enrollments by institutions within categories are presented in Tables 1-4 through 10-4.

Unitary systems register a 1.2% decline in full-time enrollments. In 1980, the unitary systems experienced the greatest increase in full-time students, but in 1981, with the

exception of the decrease experienced by Bible schools, the unitary systems experienced the greatest decline in full-time enrollments. The 1.2% decrease represents approximately 23,000 full-time enrollments. There were 1,287,570 full-time students enrolled on the 218 campuses of the unitary systems. By definition, these systems include all higher education campuses that are controlled by statewide boards and administered by an executive officer with statewide system responsibilities. The unitary systems enrolled approximately 25% of the students in four-year colleges and universities, and typically the mode of student registration is full-time. Enrollments in the unitary systems are reported in Table 1-4.

Public complex universities full-time enrollments decline — down .2%. In 156 public universities the total full-time enrollment for fall 1981 was 1,444,301 students or about 73% of the student population at these institutions. Parker (1979) suggested several factors impinging upon the public complex universities that would likely cause fluctuations in enrollment. They included the impact of the economy, inflation, legislative mandates, increased competition for students, student preferences, and others. Whether Parker's prognosis was accurate in its entirety, these institutions have experienced fairly substantial variations in enrollment over the past few years. For example, in 1980 the public complex universities experienced a 2.4% gain in full-time enrollment, but as reported for 1981, a decline of .2% occurred. Wide variations occurred even in the part-time enrollments at the public complex universities in 1981. Table 2-4 presents enrollments in public complex universities.

Private complex universities increase full-time students — up 1%. For a sixth consecutive year, the private complex universities have shown increases in full-time student enrollments. There were 551,137 full-time students enrolled in the 81 reporting institutions in the fall of 1981. Though down from the 2.6% increase in 1980, the growth pattern of private universities continues to be relatively stable and probably reflects something of the prestige of the institutions, their dedication to active recruitment, and the influence of loyal alumni. Over 70% of the students at the private complex universities are enrolled full-time. Enrollment tabulations for private complex universities are presented in Table 3-4.

Multipurpose institutions full-time enrollments increase slightly — up .4%. The 4% growth rate reported by these institutions in 1980 declined substantially in 1981; however, in 1978 and 1979 this category of institution had experienced declines. There were 1,025,897 full-time students enrolled on 299 campuses of this category. Approximately two-thirds of the population are full-time students in the multipurpose category. Had it not been for the trend of declining men student enrollments, the multipurpose institutions would have shown a reasonable gain in 1981.

The multipurpose institutions, by definition, are those colleges and universities that offer graduate work but have only one or two doctoral programs. Typically, these were state colleges and teachers colleges that became regional universities during the 60s. Though the growth rate for 1981 was approximately one-half of 1% less than the rate of increase for all four-year colleges and universities, these institutions appear to compete effectively

for students. As the economy continues to decline, these regional institutions become more attractive because of their proximity to the homes of the students. Also, the size of the institutions makes it possible for them to give more individualized attention to student needs. Typically, faculty members at the multipurpose institutions are recognized for their abilities to teach, and less emphasis is placed upon research and service. Table 4-4 lists enrollments in the multipurpose institutions for fall 1981.

Arts and sciences colleges continue to grow but slightly — up .2%. Continuing a four year trend of growth, the arts and sciences colleges grew in 1981, despite the fact that the growth was very slight. The 696 reporting institutions enrolled 716,479 full-time students in 1981. This number comprised approximately 75.5% of the population. In the two previous years, the full-time enrollments in this category of institutions had amounted to 77% of the population. This shift suggests substantial increases in part-time students in the arts and sciences colleges that will be reflected in a later portion of the report.

The liberal arts colleges have a long history of successful competition for students. Their admissions professionals have formulated effective recruitment plans and have implemented them well. Thus, these institutions experienced growth at a rate higher than the average of all of higher education and substantially higher than some of the categories in institutions in the study. The liberal arts colleges have retained their prominence in higher education, despite the national emphasis on science and technology in the trend of career training. The recent core curriculum movement attests to the viability of the liberal arts tradition. Furthermore, the ability to learn and the ability to interact intelligently with people may be of more value in an era of rapidly changing technologies than the acquisition of prescribed techniques or processes that will become obsolete quite rapidly. The listing of enrollments in the arts and sciences colleges can be found in Table 5-4.

Music, fine arts, and applied arts schools report declines — down .8%. The pattern of growth in full-time enrollments in the music, fine arts, and applied arts colleges that has extended over several years was reversed in 1981. In the 45 institutions reporting for 1981, there were 21,755 full-time students enrolled. Over 76% of the students on these campuses were enrolled full-time; however, this is a substantial shift (down 5%) from the trend which has been established over many years. A shift of this magnitude would have to indicate substantial increases in part-time enrollments. Previously it had been speculated that the demands of the instructional programs offered by the music, fine arts, and applied arts schools explained the preponderance of full-time enrollments. Perhaps the shift at this time has been brought about by the economic conditions, and the traditional pattern of full-time enrollment will return under less stressful circumstances. Table 6-4 lists the enrollments in the music, fine arts, and applied arts institutions.

Independent law, medicine, and allied health full-time enrollments were down .4%. In 1980, this category of institutions experienced the first decline in full-time enrollments in recent times. The continuation of decline in 1981 represents a marked change in the enrollment pattern in a category of institutions that averaged 10% gain for a number of

years in the 70s. As noted previously, there was an overall gain in enrollments in the institutions; however, that growth was produced by the substantial increase of almost 15% in part-time students. The 73 reporting institutions indicated 53,907 full-time enrollments for fall 1981 and represented 82% of the population in these institutions. Women students continue to move into this category of institutions. Substantial growth in women enrollments both part-time and full-time have occurred in recent years. Apparently the deliberate attempts to recruit women students into the programs offered by the law, medicine and allied health schools has been successful. Conversely, as reported last year, the demands for professionals trained by the institutions in this category have leveled off or perhaps have begun to decline. There is every indication that there will be a surplus of physicians within the next decade and the surplus of attorneys is already a reality. Fiscal constraints, not excluding the problem of inflation, have resulted in the imposition of enrollment quotas and the curtailment of capital expenditures in some instances. Consequently, declines in enrollment in this category are not only anticipated, they are expected. Enrollments by institutions are presented in Table 7-4. A comprehensive survey of medical enrollments is presented in a later section of this report.

Independent technological, business, and related schools report increases — up 6.6%. Though the increase for 1981 was not the largest in the past six years, it is significant when compared with the other categories of institutions. There were 90 institutions that reported a combined total of 162,665 full-time students enrolled for fall 1981, or about 74% of the population on those campuses. Seven of every ten students on the campuses of the independent technological and business schools are men. Despite the ratio between men and women students, the enrollment patterns in this category are not consistent. Over the years there have been wide variations. This is probably due to the fact that a number of variables come to bear on enrollments; however, there must be a direct relationship with the economy that is more pronounced in these schools than some of the others. Table 8-4 lists institutions with enrollments for 1981.

Bible colleges report a decline in enrollments of full-time students — down 3.8%. Bible colleges' full-time enrollments have fluctuated drastically within the past few years. Following several years of decline, there was fairly substantial growth in these institutions in 1979 and 1980. Whether or not the decline will continue remains to be seen. In 1981, there were 64 Bible colleges reporting 19,206 full-time students. Full-time enrollments are the mode in the Bible schools with almost 83% of the population full-time. The ratio of men to women students in the Bible schools is about 3 to 2 and has remained at that level for several years. Typically the Bible colleges are small with an average enrollment of about 400 students. A number of the institutions are fundamentalist in origin, but the general nature of the curriculum is liberal arts with considerable emphasis on biblical studies. Enrollment data by institutions are presented in Table 9-4.

Theological schools increase in 1981 with full-time enrollments up by 1.4%. The 122 schools that reported in 1981 enrolled 23,915 students full-time or about 63% of the population. Enrollment of women students continues to grow in the theological schools. Growth was almost 11% on a base of about 9,000 students for the year. Interesting to

note is the fact that the enrollment patterns in the Bible colleges and the theological schools have exactly reversed over the past three years.

By definition, the theological schools are public or private institutions whose primary purpose is to give theological training in post-baccalaureate, professional, or graduate programs for religious professionals and lay workers. Whether or not growth for the year heralds the acceptance of the theological profession remains to be seen. The electronic ministry and its outgrowth, the moral majority, may have a degree of credibility to the extent that enrollments in these institutions will now increase over a period of time. Institutional listings for the theological schools are given in Table 10-4.

Part-time student enrollments grow — up 2.4%. Though not as dramatic as the 3.5% in 1980, part-time enrollments grew substantially in the four-year institutions. The 1,844 reporting institutions enrolled 2,223,181 students part-time, which comprised approximately 29.5% of the four-year college population reported. In 1980, a wide variation of the growth rate occurred between enrollments of part-time men and part-time women students; part-time men increased by 1.1% while part-time women increased by 5.5%. But in 1981 part-time men enrollments increased by 2.5%, and part-time women enrollments increased by 2.3%. It appears that the loss in full-time men students may have been partially compensated for by the enrollment of men as part-time students. In reality, however, the gains in part-time enrollments are calculated on a base much smaller than the full-time figures. Consequently, a percentage increase must be approximately two and one-half times as large in the part-time category to compensate for a loss in full-time enrollments. The total part-time enrollments and percentages of change within the ten categories of the institutions are as follows: 218 unitary state systems, 610,454, +4.9%; 156 public-complex universities, 545,371, +.6%; 81 private-complex universities, 236,062, -1.6%; 299 multipurpose institutions, 506,239, -.2%; 696 arts and sciences colleges, 230,681, +7.4%; 45 music, fine arts, and applied arts schools, 6,754, +23.3%; 73 independent law, medicine, and allied health schools, 11,611, +14.8%; 90 independent technological, business, and related schools 57,971, +9.1%; 64 Bible colleges 3,892, +.3%; and 122 theological schools 14,146, +12.4%.

Full-time entering freshman enrollment declined — down by 9.4%. Beginning in 1979 comparative enrollments of freshmen were based upon entering full-time freshmen rather than upon the category classified freshmen that had been used by Parker previously. The term classified freshman was defined loosely as any student who had not earned as many as 30 semester hours or 45 quarter hours. Upon examining data forms for previous years, the present author discovered wide discrepancies in the interpretation of classified freshmen and consequently moved to the first time entering freshmen category. Despite the expectation of receiving better data there has remained each year some reporting discrepancies in the section on freshman enrollments within these limitations, and with the acknowledgment that there may be some question about the validity of the data, they are presented by categories of institutions in Table 11-4.

Enrollments of women students continue pattern of growth up 1.2%. Again women students moved in ever increasing numbers onto colleges and university campuses in fall

1981. The 3,772,504 women students enrolled in the 1,844 reporting institutions comprised 50.1% of the student population in those schools. For several years, more than half of the students enrolled in two-year institutions were women, but now, in 1981, more than half of all college students in the United States are women. The growth rate of women students on four-year campuses has been steady for a number of years. In 1975-76 women students comprised 45.4% of the population, in 1976-77, 46.3%, 1977-78, 47.5%; 1978-79, 48.7%; 1979-80, 49.3%; 1980-81, 49.94%. Enrollment of men students increased in fall 1981 by only .2% in comparable institutions based on a grand total of 3,757,509 enrollees.

Full-time women student enrollments increased only .7% in fall 1981, which was a substantial decline from the 4.3% in fall 1980. There were 2,555,676 full-time women and 2,751,156 full-time men in the four-year institutions. Instead of an increase in men students in 1981, there was a .6% decrease. Obviously the trend toward an equal distribution of full-time students between the sexes has continued in 1981. This year, the percentage of women in the full-time population was 48.2; in 1980 it was 47.9; in 1979, 47.5; in 1978 the proportion was 46.8; and in 1977 it was 45.9. Presuming that the rate of growth increases as it has over the past five years, in 1984 there will be an equal number of full-time men and full-time women students enrolled in the four-year colleges and universities in the United States. It was indicated earlier in the report that the grand total population of students now had more women than men. Obviously, greater numbers of women enroll part-time than do men. Full-time enrollments by sex are reported in Tables 1-4 through 10-4. Percentages of change in full-time enrollments of men and women students respectively by categories of institutions were as follows: unitary, -2.1 and -.2; public complex, -.4 and +.1; private complex, -.1 and +2.6; multipurpose, -.2 and +.9; arts and sciences, -.6 and +.9; music, fine arts, and applied arts, -2.9 and +1.5; law, medicine and allied health, -3.6 and +5.0; technological, business, and related, +5.5 and +9.8; Bible, -3.0 and -4.8 and theological, -.1 and +7.4.

The enrollment of part-time women students grew in fall 1981 by 2.3%. In comparison with 1980, this was a substantial reduction from the growth rate of 5.5% that year. Well over 2 million students enrolled part-time in the four-year institutions. There were 1,006,353 men and 1,216,828 women part-time students. The growth of part-time men students in 1981 was unusual and helped to compensate for the loss in full-time students. In 1979, there was a 5% loss of part-time students but a growth in 1980 of 1.1%. The enrollments of part-time women students have exceeded those of part-time men for several years, but the growth in part-time men in fall 1981 was of sufficient magnitude to change that trend. The enrollment of part-time women students in 1980-81 was 55%; in 1981-82 it was only 54.7%.

Enrollments by geographic regions vary substantially. Table 13-4 presents a geographic distribution of all students enrolled in comparably reporting institutions in fall 1981. The grand total enrollment in the 1,720 comparably reporting institutions was 7,014,619; in the previous year, the same 1,720 enrolled 6,965,168 students. As reported earlier in the study, the rate of growth for the year was .7%. Enrollments by regions with

percentages of change were as follows: New England, 452,944, -.01; Middle Atlantic, 1,352,853, +.37; East North-Central, 1,315,606, +.07; West North-Central, 626,986, +1.16; South Atlantic, 968,014, +1.25; East South-Central, 440,650, -2.60; West South-Central, 669,280, +2.29; Mountain, 384,243, +2.59; Pacific, 716,047, +1.80; and Commonwealth and territories, 87,966, -1.17. Fall 1981 produced substantial changes in the growth pattern from those reported in 1980. That year there was growth in every region. In the year 1981, wide variation occurred between the overall growth rate and those found in the ten geographic divisions.

The state of New York continues to have by far the largest number of students enrolled in four-year colleges and universities. California is a distant second, followed by Pennsylvania, Ohio, Texas, Illinois, Michigan, Massachusetts, and Indiana. All of these states enroll more than 200,000 students in the four-year colleges and universities, and these nine states enroll over 48% of the four-year students in the country.

Collegiate enrollments of veterans and related student groups continue to decline — down 12.9%. As expected with elapsed time, there were fewer veterans and others receiving veterans benefits enrolled in colleges and universities in the fall of 1981. Major decreases in enrollments have occurred over the past several years, with a 33.3% decline in 1976-77, a 19.1% decline in 1977-78, 18.5% in 1978-79, and 17.1% in 1979-80. The trend continued in 1981 but decelerated rather substantially. The headcount decline in 1979-80 was approximately 136,000, but in 1980-81 there were less than 75,000 fewer persons who received benefits through the educational programs of the Veterans Administration.

The detailed information that follows was provided on behalf of the Veterans Administration by Michael L. Facine, Chief of Statistical Review and Analysis Division in the Veterans Administrations Office of Reports and Statistics, and Amar J. Singh, Director, Statistical Policy and Research Service of the Veteran's Administration.

Under Chapter 31, U.S. Code (former Public Law 894, Korean Vocational Rehabilitation, and Public Law 87-815, Peacetime Vocational Rehabilitation), 13,256 veterans were in college as of November 30, 1981. Chapter 34 benefits, which provide college level readjustment training under Public Laws 89-358 and 90-77, covered 375,715 veterans and 16,703 service personnel—a total of 392,418 in training—or a decrease of 12.9% since the end of November 1980. The downward trend in veteran enrollments over the last several years has been caused largely by the loss of GI bill eligibility by large numbers of post-Korean veterans who had attained their ten-year delimiting date. Under the Chapter 32 — Post-Vietnam Era Veterans' Educational Assistance — Program (VEAP), 5,351 veterans were using their benefits in college. Orphans, spouses, and widow(er)s of service personnel or veterans receiving educational benefits for college-level training under Chapter 35 number 55,206, a decrease of 1.1%. The total college level enrollment of all veterans and service personnel was 411,025, a decrease of 11.5%. The count of all veterans, service personnel, spouses, widow(er)s, and sons and daughters at the college level was 466,231, a decrease of 10.3%. Veterans enrolled in on-the-farm, on-the-job, and flight training programs, and in other noncollegiate degree programs, totaled 113,229.

The grand total of veterans only for all laws and levels was 488,944. This figure represents a decrease of 13.5% from the 1980 total of 565,331.

It is not correct to assume that all of the students formerly covered by GI bill benefits failed to enroll only because of the expiration of their coverage during the past several school years. Some students completed their academic training, and others chose to terminate or interrupt their training prior to having arrived at their 10-year delimiting date. The Veterans Administration reported, however, that the educational community should be aware of the decline in student assistance provided by the VA because of the phasing out of the current GI bill education program. On November 23, 1977, a new Public Law 95-202 was enacted. It raised educational benefits for veterans by 6.6% and provided other benefits for the veterans and their enrolling institutions. The 65% participation rate of veterans noted in 1978 under the present GI bill is far higher than the 43% rate under the Korean conflict GI bill and the 50% rate under the World War II GI bill. Although veteran enrollments will continue to decline, the improved benefits provided by Public Law 95-202 has slowed the decline somewhat.

Full-time equivalent (FTE) grew by only 3% in 1981. The calculation of full-time equivalent enrollments has been estimated in the study series by adding one-third of the head count of part-time students to the full-time student head count. This procedure gives a reasonable approximation of the measure of instructional effort that is tied in most instances to the process of funding. In the 1,844 four-year institutions reporting in 1981, the FTE of grand total enrollments was 6,047,092. Of the ten institutional categories, the FTE comparable totals and percentages were unitary, 1,490,851, -.4; public-complex, 1,625,910, -.1; private-complex, 629,746, +.7; multipurpose, 1,194,475, +.3; arts and sciences, 793,296, +.9; music, fine arts, and applied arts, 24,004, +1.0; law, medicine, and allied health, 57,773, +.6; technological, business, and related, 181,909, +6.8; Bible, 20,502, -3.5; and theological, 28,626, +3.2.

As was the case in 1980, the part-time student enrollments in 1981 served to increase the FTE. Had it not been for the increases in part-time enrollments, the gain for the four-year institutions in fall 1981 would have been less than .1%. Unless substantial changes occur in the pattern of enrollments, part-time students will not fill the void created by declines in the numbers of traditional college age students. Extended education and the concept of life-long learning must be pursued more diligently by colleges and universities if they hope to maintain enrollments through the next twenty years.

Graduate school enrollments increased slightly by .7%. Graduate enrollments include students pursuing advanced study in numerous academic disciplines; however, professional enrollments are not included but are reported in separate categories under law, medicine, and theology. There were 919 institutions that reported graduate enrollments comparably in 1981 and as well as in 1980 with a total of 1,053,595 students in 1981. The 1981 gain was down considerably from the 2.5% increase noted in 1980 that was also slightly less than the 1979 rate of growth. There have been wide fluctuations in graduate enrollment in previous years. For example, in 1976-77 there was a decline of 5.4%; in 1977-78 an increase of 3.6% was registered; in 1978-79 a decline of

3.1% occurred. There were 531,220 men students and 522,375 women students for gains of .9% and .5% respectively. In 1981, women accounted for 49.6% of the graduate population. This was a slight change from the trend shown over the years from 1976. That year, women students comprised 45% of the graduate population; in 1977, 46.6%; in 1978, 47.2%; and in 1979, 48.7%. Both full-time men and women registered gains in 1981 of 3.3% and 5.1% respectively. For several prior years, full-time men in graduate enrollments declined; however, the growth of full-time women has been consistent. Part-time enrollments in graduate schools in 1981 showed losses of .8% for men and 1.7% for women. Women students continued to dominate the part-time enrollment category in the graduate enrollments with 53.9% of the population. Until this year, the proportion has increased over the past several years as follows: 1976, 49.2%; 1977, 50.9%; 1978, 51.9%; 1979, 53%; and 1980, 54.2%.

The actual head count increase in the comparably reporting schools amounted to approximately 7,000 students for fall 1981. It is anticipated that graduate enrollments will continue to increase. It is likely also that certain fields will decline according to the law of supply and demand; but, in general, graduate schools can expect to grow because of the demands of more sophisticated personnel to staff modern business, industry, and human services programs. Declines in specific graduate enrollments have occurred for various reasons. For example, in engineering graduate enrollments are limited because those who graduate with a bachelors degree can often begin their careers at salaries larger than can be expected for them upon completion of graduate degrees and the acceptance of teaching positions in colleges and universities. Also, graduate education has begun to decline because of the surplus of teachers, particularly in certain categories. That condition has already begun to change and likely will continue to change as the end of the century approaches.

Law school enrollments continue to increase, up slightly by .8%. Although the 1981 percentage of growth was somewhat less than the 1.6% growth in 1980, there continues a trend that has occurred over a number of years. The pattern is this, slight overall increases in enrollment with declines in the number of men students and fairly sizable increases in the number of women students. Obviously, with the decline of men students and the increase of women students, the ratio of men to women shifted again in the law schools.

The rapid increase in law school enrollments registered in the early 1970s likely will not occur again in the 20th century. Legal education, as is the case with other professional schools, is expensive and funding will become more and more a problem. Consequently, it can be expected that law school enrollments will be held because of the cost of providing that training. Enrollments in law schools began to increase at a slower rate in 1976 with an annual increase of only one-tenth of 1%, however, in 1977 there was a slight gain of .8% and for the next three years the growth rate was about one and one-half percent with a 1.6% increase in 1980. Such growth is minimal in comparison with that which occurred in the years 1971 through 1975.

There were 165 law schools and colleges that reported comparable enrollments for fall 1981. The total of enrollments was 104,880 students, with 35.4% women. There was a decline in men students of 1.9%, which was exactly the same decline of last year, and an increase of 6.1% in women students, which was down somewhat from fall 1980. Actually, for the past three years, 1981, 1980, and 1979, there has been a 1.9% decrease in men students enrolled in the law schools of the country. In 1978, the decline was 1.3%; 2.1% decline in 1977; 3.5% decline in 1976; and .9% in 1975. Conversely, the 37,090 women students enrolled in fall 1981 produced the 6.1% increase as noted above; in 1980 the increase was 9.2%; in 1979 it was 7.3%. Previously and for several years, women enrollments averaged a gain of almost 10% per year with a substantial increase in 1975-76 of 22.1%. Without question, women have moved with vigor into a profession that was once largely confined to men.

Medical school enrollments declined by .5%. There were 120 comparably reporting medical schools, with a total enrollment of 64,407 students of whom 17,073 or about 26.5% were women. The enrollment of men in medical schools declined by 1.9%, which was coincidental with the decline in law enrollments as reported in the previous section. The enrollment of women, however, increased by 3.9% in 1981 which is the lowest increase over the past four years and is quite different from the almost 11% which occurred in 1977. Again the trend of women to move in a profession which was dominated by men in the past is very evident.

The same uncertainties, suggested previously (Mickler 1980): of financial support, legislation requiring medical services, changes in the medical services delivery system, medical research, technology, and others, make predictions about continued growth in medical education tentative, to say the least. The demand for physicians continues to be high in certain parts of the country but in others there are reported surpluses. The need for medical services will surely grow with population growth and yet the the conservative fiscal mood in the country is bound to limit the growth of medical education to some extent. Also, the unparalleled cost in providing medical services may well force radical changes in the health care delivery systems in the country.

The big thirty-five. A number of years ago Dr. Parker instituted a table that ranks the institutions in order of enrollment of highest down through thirty-five. The institutions that reported in 1981 enrollments of sufficient magnitude to place them in this category are listed in Table 12-4 with rankings based on total enrollments and on full-time enrollments. It should be understood clearly that the reporting documents were not verified and that all institutions did not report; also, branch campuses of some institutions did not file reports. Under the enumerated constraints, however, the rankings represent the relative positions of the largest four-year institutions in the United States in fall 1981.

DEFINITIONS USED IN THE 4-YEAR REPORT

Student and Teaching Staff Definitions

The **full-time student** devotes substantially all working or study time to the college curriculum. This is interpreted generally to mean 12 collegiate credit hours presumably 75% of a normal load or more, but may be less for graduate students. The **part-time student** normally takes collegiate credit courses in the late afternoons, on weekends, in the evening, frequently in the day, or by extension, and enrolls for fewer than 12 credits, or less than 75% of a normal load.

First-time freshmen (full-time) are presumed to be only those entering freshman full-time students who have not previously attended any college, inclusive of students enrolled in the fall term who attended college for the first time in the summer of 1978 as well as students who entered with college credits earned before graduation from high school.

Classified freshmen (full-time) are presumed to be full-time freshman students. This includes the first-time freshmen, as defined above, as well as any students who transferred from another institution at the first-year or freshman undergraduate level and any other first-year freshman undergraduate students.

Unless otherwise designated, it is presumed that **all collegiate credit-hour students at all levels** (undergraduate, graduate, and professional) are counted in the appropriate categories.

Two-year college students are those enrolled in collegiate-level credit-hour courses in 2-year (certificate or associate degree level) colleges administered by the institutions completing the reports.

Full-time equivalent enrollment. Full-time equivalent enrollments are not cited by institution, but totals are computed by categories of schools. This provides information broadly indicative of significant trends and developments in higher education above and beyond those revealed by headcount tabulations. The **adjusted headcount method**, whereby full-time equivalent enrollment is interpreted to equal the headcount of full-time students plus one-third the headcount of part-time students, is used.

The **full-time teaching staff** is composed only of those persons who hold the rank of instructor or its equivalent, and those of higher rank, in full-time employment, who give at least half their time to instruction. The **total teaching staff** includes both **full-time and part-time** teaching staff not on leave, including lecturers, fellows, teaching assistants, research assistants (if they teach), and others who teach. Cooperating teachers in public and private schools who supervise student teachers for colleges and universities are not included in this study.

Institutions surveyed in this report are universities, 4-year colleges, upper-division colleges, other baccalaureate degree-granting schools, graduate, professional, and theological schools; and junior or 2-year colleges administered by the above-defined schools that have regional association, professional organization, and/or state agency recognition, approval, or accreditation.

Institutional Classification Definitions

Unitary state college and university systems—multi-campus college or university systems administered centrally by a statewide board of directors or trustees and a statewide president or chancellor.

Public universities of complex organization—public institutions of complex organization that offer baccalaureate degrees in many disciplines and graduate programs through the doctoral level in three or more fields.

Private universities of complex organization—private institutions of complex organization that offer baccalaureate degrees in many disciplines and graduate programs through the doctoral level in three or more fields.

Multipurpose colleges and universities—public and private colleges and universities that have multipurpose educational functions but do not offer graduate work through the doctoral level in more than two fields.

Independent colleges of arts and sciences (liberal arts)—independent public and private colleges whose primary function is to offer baccalaureate programs in the arts and sciences.

Music, fine arts, and applied arts schools—public or private schools that offer baccalaureate and/or graduate training in music, fine arts, or applied arts as their primary educational function.

Independent law, medicine, and allied health schools—public or private institutions whose primary function is to offer specialized training at the baccalaureate and/or professional or graduate levels.

Independent technological, business administration, and related schools—public or private institutions whose primary function is to offer specialized training at the baccalaureate and/or graduate levels.

Religious schools and colleges—private institutions whose primary function is to offer baccalaureate programs in biblical studies.

Theological schools and schools for lay workers—public or private schools whose primary purpose is to give theological training in postbaccalaureate professional or graduate programs to religious professionals and lay workers.

Elsewhere in this report, these classifications may be abbreviated as follows: unitary systems; public-complex; private-complex; multipurpose; arts and sciences; music, fine arts, and applied arts; law, medicine, and allied health; technological and business; Bible; and theological schools. As circumstances change, shifts from one category to another may be necessary. Institutional representatives are invited to consult with the author when reclassification appears to be in order.

In the tables, "S.C." or "S.U.," i.e., "State College" or "State University," is an institutional name which indicates public status. Where the designation is not made clear by the name, a "pub" entry follows the name of the school. Other listed units are private schools. The "M" or "W" designation indicates either a men's or women's college; all others are coeducational. "Coord" institutions are ones that have separate colleges for men and women.

ENROLLMENTS IN TWO-YEAR INSTITUTIONS

Grand total enrollments increase — up by 4.3%. The growth in two-year college enrollments in 1981 was substantially less than that experienced by these institutions in 1980 when it was 7.7%. However, the 4.3% in comparison with the four-year institutions' growth rate of .7% was quite substantial. The 4.3% represents a head count increase of more than 175,000 students.

As in 1980, there was growth in 1981 in all reporting categories of students — full-time men, full-time women, part-time men, and part-time women, with the part-time women showing the greatest increase. Despite the decrease in magnitude of gain in 1981, the situation probably represents the pressure of the economic conditions as indicated in last year's study (Mickler 1981) where it was premised that the economy probably had a pronounced influence upon the growth and enrollments of the two-year colleges. It was further pointed out that the two-year institutions generally enjoy the advantages of proximity, low tuition, easy access, and general flexibility — all of which can serve to attract potential students in times of economic uncertainty. Likely as not, the reductions in eligibility for financial aid resulted in students who otherwise would have been enrolled in four-year institutions having enrolled in the two-year colleges.

Full-time enrollments gain over the previous year — up 2.2%. For three years, beginning in 1976, full-time enrollments declined in the two-year institutions. However, in 1979 there began a three year trend of increase in enrollments of full-time students. The 1,096 institutions reported 1,620,699 full-time students with a 2.2% increase in comparably reporting schools. Parker (1979) reported declines of 5.7% in 1978 and 3.5% in both 1976 and 1977. Beginning in 1978 and continuing through fall 1981, full-time students have accounted for only 38% of the population in the two-year colleges. For several years before, beginning in 1977, full-time students comprised a somewhat larger percentage of two-year enrollments. In 1977, the percentage was 41.6; in 1976 was 44.9; and in 1975 was 45.6. As in 1979 and 1980 there was growth in both full-time and part-time students in the two-year institutions, consequently, the ratio remained unchanged. In spite of the majority of the part-time students, the two-year colleges depend on full-time enrollments for their continued existence. Approximately two-thirds of the credit hours produced by these institutions are generated by full-time students.

Part-time enrollments increased by 5.6%. As in the fall of 1980, part-time enrollments grew substantially in 1981. The 1,096 institutions reported 2,630,956 part-time enrollees, which is next to the largest gain since 1975 and amounted to a head count increase of about 140,000 students.

In keeping with the precedence set by Parker, the series analyzes enrollment data provided by the institutions from several vantage points. The first treatment of data examines enrollments in certain defined categories that are based upon type of control. These are public institutions, church-affiliated institutions, independent, and proprietary institutions that offer two-year collegiate level instructional programs. The second group

of categories is based upon a programmatic index that includes the following: technical and/or vocational schools, junior colleges, community colleges, multipurpose units, and university branch college campuses or centers. Each of these categories, along with breakdown by sex, geographic location, and estimated full-time equivalency, will be examined in detail in the following sections.

Public two-year institutions register substantial gains — up 4.2%. For the third consecutive year, the public two-year institutions have experienced enrollment gains; in 1979, 730 reporting institutions indicated a 3.7% increase; in 1980, 808 reporting institutions experienced a 7.8% increase. The 1981 increase of 4.2% was based on reports received from 829 institutions with a grand total enrollment of 3,994,434 students. Of these, 2,532,128 were enrolled part-time and 1,462,306 were enrolled full-time with 5.4% and 2.0% increases respectively. The public institutions continue to enroll approximately 95% of the two-year college students. Enrollments by institutions in the public category are presented in Table 1-2.

Church-affiliated colleges increase by 2.0%. For the fourth consecutive year, church-affiliated colleges report increases in enrollments. In 1978, the increase was 1.2% (Parker 1979); in 1979, 3.2%; and in 1980, 5.1% (Mickler 1980,1981). The 73 reporting institutions enrolled 27,524 full-time students and 8,437 part-time students for a grand total enrollment of 35,961. There was a substantial change in fall 1981 of the distribution of full-time to part-time students in the church-affiliated colleges. This was brought about by substantial increases in part-time enrollments and corresponding slight declines in full-time enrollments. Part-time enrollment of both men and women amounted to an increase of 14.7% — taken separately men part-time students increased at a rate of 21.5% in 1981, and women part-time students increased by 12.1%. In past years, the church-affiliated schools had enrolled 80% of their students as full-time students. Now, however, in 1981 only 75% were full-time enrollees. Despite the changes noted above, women students continue to comprise 60% of the population in the church-affiliated colleges.

In previous years, it had been postulated that the tendency toward full-time enrollments in the church-affiliated colleges reflected the curricular pattern found in those schools. Typically, their programs of study were of the liberal arts, and they are articulated as transfer institutions, with many being fundamentalist in doctrine. Consequently, they were expected to occupy a more conservative stance with regard to the requirement that students enroll full-time. This pattern had been established over such a long period of time that it seems reasonable to speculate that the shift in enrollment patterns in the church-affiliated schools may be also a function of the economic situation and would reverse itself to the typical pattern when economic conditions improve. The enrollments of church affiliated colleges and schools are listed in Table 2-2.

Independent-private two-year colleges increase by 6.4% in 1981. For the third consecutive year, the independent two-year colleges have registered increases in their student bodies. The 94 reporting institutions enrolled a grand total of 125,682 students, with 68,594 full-time and 57,088 part-time. Full-time enrollments grew by 2.6% and

part-time student enrollments grew by 11.2%. For a number of years, the independent colleges have experienced substantial growth. There was, however, an exception to this in 1978 when they experienced a decline of 2.1%. In 1981, men students in both full-time and part-time categories declined by about 1.5%, while women students increased by 5.5% in the full-time category and 22.2% in the part-time category. Further, it appears from the 1981 data that the pattern of declining enrollments for men students that had been observed over a period of time and was commented upon by Dr. Parker on numerous occasions has once again manifested itself as a problem for the independent-private two-year colleges.

As is the case with all private educational institutions, the independent two-year colleges must work more diligently to attract students in an era of declining population and great emphasis on career oriented educational programs. Yet many of these institutions are well-established, prestigious colleges with traditional roles in a permanent place in higher education. Enrollments for the independent schools and colleges are cited in Table 3-2.

Proprietary schools increase by 10%. The proprietary schools experienced the most substantial increase of all of the two-year collegiate institutions in the country in fall 1981. The 100 institutions that reported for the year represent only a small portion of the proprietary schools found across the nation. For a proprietary school to be eligible to be included in the enrollment study series, it must offer two-year collegiate-level certificate or associate degree programs. Also, regional or professional accreditation must have been obtained. These conditions limit considerably the number of institutions from the proprietary sector post-secondary education. The limitations, however, result in the collection of data from a group of institutions quite similar to those in the other categories in role, scope, and function. The 100 institutions reported 95,578 students enrolled in fall 1981 with 62,275 as full-time students and 33,303 as part-time students. The percentage changes in these categories were 9.8 and 11.1 respectively. Even with these substantial percentage changes in the total enrollment, the actual number of students involved in the proprietary colleges' gain amounted to only about 10,000 students. In reality, the proprietary schools represented in these reports enroll only about .2% of the total two-year population. Table 4-2 list the enrollments in the two-year proprietary schools and colleges.

Non-public institutions grow in enrollment by 6.5%. The combination of church affiliated, independent, and proprietary schools and colleges provides another perspective from which to view the enrollments in the American two-year institutions. The 267 non-public institutions enrolled, in 1981, a grand total of 257,221 or about 6% of the two-year population. There were 158,393 full-time and 98,828 part-time students, showing gains of 4.2% and 11.6% respectively. By way of contrast, the public two-year schools and colleges showed a grand total increase of 4.2%, full-time student growth of 2.0% and a part-time growth of 5.4%. There was substantial growth of women students in the non-public institutions in 1981. Full-time women students increased by 6.8%, and part-time women students increased by 20.4%. Again, by way of contrast, full-time women enrollments increased by 1.7% and part-time women student enrollments grew by 6.1% in the public two-year colleges and schools. Whether these increases reflect the

normal movement of women students into the two-year institutions remains a matter of speculation. It has been observed that women students comprise more than half of the part-time enrollments in the two-year colleges, and thus the growth for the year could represent the continued movement of women into post-secondary education. Others have speculated that women have moved into the two-year colleges because of the stress of the recession. It has been surmised more specifically that if there are two or more children in the family, the men students are those who have the opportunity to "go away" to school, while their sisters go to the junior or community college and live at home.

In making comparisons of these data and evaluating the percentage of change, it should be remembered that 1% in the public category represents about 40,000 students, and 1% in the non-public represents only about 2,500 students. Also, the percentages of change are based on matched sets of data — enrollment reports submitted by institutions for the current and the previous years.

As indicated before, the data from the two-year schools and colleges were to be analyzed from a programmatic vantage point following the analysis based on the type of control. The next several sections examine in some detail the enrollments in technical and/or vocational schools, junior colleges, community colleges, multipurpose units and branch college campuses, without regard to type of control. All junior colleges, for example, are grouped together, whether they are public, church-affiliated, independent, or proprietary. Likewise, community college enrollments are summarized without regard to the source of control. The branch college campus category somewhat contradicts the notion of lack of reference to control. Yet the branch college campuses cannot be placed in one of the other categories without contradicting the programmatic concept. Each year, the two-year institutions indicate in their enrollment reports the category that best describes their curricular orientation.

Technical and/or vocational schools and colleges continue to show gains — up 4.3%. In 1981, 230 technical schools and colleges reported a grand total enrollment of 350,343 students. There were 195,460 full-time and 154,883 part-time with gains of 4.4% and 4.2% respectively, based on comparable enrollments from 204 institutions. As has been the case for several years, substantial increases in the number of women students enrolling in the technical schools have produced the major gains in this category, even though there has been considerable growth in the enrollment of men students as well. These data and interpretations suggest greater credibility of the notion that more and more students are inclined to enroll in educational programs that will result in job placement rather than in general educational curricula. For this speculation to gain credibility, it would be necessary to examine two-year college enrollments in all categories of institutions and determine those students who are enrolled in transfer programs and those enrolled in terminal programs.

Junior colleges report a gain of 3.5%. The junior college category primarily includes institutions of the liberal arts traditions, many of which are exclusively for men or for women. Most of the institutions are private, and generally they are articulated with

four-year institutions so their students can transfer readily into baccalaureate programs. The junior colleges represent about 25% of the institutions in the country and enroll approximately 12% of the two-year college students.

The 271 reporting junior colleges enrolled 512,926 students, 47% of which were full-time. For the third consecutive year, there have been gains in the junior college enrollments; however, the gain for 1981 was not as high as either of the previous years. Both full-time and part-time enrollments increased in 1981 by 3.5%. There were 241,812 students enrolled full-time and 271,114 enrolled part-time. In 1980, there was a striking similarity between the enrollment growth patterns in the four-year arts and sciences institutions and the two-year junior college institutions; however, that similarity disappeared in 1981 since there was little growth in the full-time category in the four-year colleges and reasonably substantial growth in the part-time students in the four-year institutions. It could be speculated that many of the students who would have enrolled otherwise in the arts and sciences colleges may well have enrolled in the junior colleges that were closer to home, less expensive, and more easily accessible.

Community colleges increase by 4.3%. The 547 community colleges reporting in 1981 enrolled 76.5% of the students reported in the two-year enrollment study. These general purpose institutions have dominated the curricular category in two-year collegiate education for some time. They were developed to meet local needs for vocational and technical educational experiences and to provide an adequate background in the arts and sciences for the acquisition of advanced knowledge. Almost all these institutions have transfer programs articulated with four-year institutions in addition to terminal programs in technical and para-professional fields. Their growth is somewhat parallel to the growth of American public schools, although occurring in a later era.

The grand total enrollment in the community colleges for fall 1981 was 3,250,590 students with 1,121,368 full-time and 2,129,222 part-time. The growth rate for full-time students was 1.6% and 5.7% for part-time students. Part-time students outnumber full-time students in the community colleges by two to one.

Multipurpose colleges and university branch colleges/campuses/centers register increases — up 11.2% and 3.1% respectively. Eleven multipurpose institutions filed useable reports in fall 1981. The grand total enrollment was 77,169 students with 26,500 full-time with a percentage increase of 2.6 and 50,669 part-time students with a gain of 16.4%. The multipurpose two-year colleges have grown for three consecutive years following a fairly substantial decline of 5.8% in 1978 (Parker 1979). There is a striking similarity between the ratio of part-time to full-time students with that in the community colleges. It is also likely that their instructional programs are similar in nature, since both categories of colleges have terminal programs in technical fields as well as transfer programs in the liberal arts.

There were 37 institutions administered as parts of four-year universities or colleges that reported 60,627 students enrolled in fall 1981. There were 35,559 of these students enrolled full-time and 25,068 part-time. The growth percentages are .7% for full-time and

6.7% for part-time. Typically, the branch college campuses enroll more full-time students than part-time, as is the case with their parent institutions; however, in 1981 there were substantial increases in part-time enrollments and virtually no increase in the full-time. In fact, there was a loss of .4% in men students with a gain of 1.7% in women students for the .7 overall full-time growth percentage. Again, the growth in part-time enrollments must surely reflect the economic times.

First time entering freshmen. As indicated previously in the section portraying the four-year study, there has been significant difficulty in defining the term freshman and in the intent to collect enrollment data on full-time freshmen only. Also, due to the approach of calculating percentage of change based on comparable data, problems that occur one year will be reflected in the following year. On the 1981 data forms, special effort was made to clarify the problem, but it did not result in the collection of good data on which the writer was willing to make calculations of percentages of change. There is evidence that the freshman class of 1981 declined on the two-year campuses, but the author is reluctant to expound on questionable information. Freshman enrollments as reported by the institutions, are indicated in Table 5-2.

Women students continued to enroll in the two-year colleges at a higher rate than men — 53.7% in fall, 1981. In 1977, women student enrollments in the American two-year institutions exceeded 50% of the population for the first time and was recorded by Parker (1978) at 51.5%. Since that time, the majority of women students in the two-year schools and colleges has increased regularly. The 5.6% increase in 1981 has moved the proportion of women students to an even higher level. It was reported in the section on the four-year institutions that the number of women students exceeded that of men in the four-year institutions in 1981 for the first time. There were 2,270,300 women students and 1,981,355 men students enrolled in the 1,096 two-year schools and colleges that reported in 1981.

In all control categories of the two-year colleges, women students outnumbered men. The percentages of women were as follows: public, 53.5; church-affiliated, 60.0; independent, 59.2; and proprietary, 50.8. The percentages of change of men and women students in the fall term of 1981 were public, +3.7 and +4.5; church-affiliated, +2.0 and +2.1; independent, -1.5 and +12.5; and proprietary, +5.3 and +14.8.

Women students outnumbered men in all but one of the programmatic categories — technical schools. There the percentage of women students was 48.1, which incidentally was up from the 1980 percentage of 47.7. Percentages of women students in other programmatic categories were as follows: community colleges, 53.7; junior colleges, 56.6; multipurpose, 54.7; and branch college campus, 56.1. The percentages of change by category for men and women students were: community colleges, +3.9 and +4.6; junior colleges, +2.3 and +4.4; technical/vocational, +1.8 and +7.1; multipurpose units, +7.9 and +14.2; and branch college campuses, +2.6 and +3.6.

Enrollments by Regions and States. In 1981, there were enrollment increases in 39 states and declines in only 11. Some of the declines were very slight, and consequently, there

were no declines by geographic region. Gains by region range from a high of 8.0% in the East North Central region to a .1% low in the New England region. Enrollments in 974 comparably reporting two-year institutions and percentage changes by region were New England, 111,398, +.1; Middle Atlantic, 430,304, +4.6; East North Central, 673,878, +8.0; West North Central, 195,492, +6.0; South Atlantic, 559,294, +4.5; East South Central, 268,884, +4.7; West South Central, 304,693, +4.2; Mountain, 157,826, +2.1; Pacific, 1,117,779, +2.6; and Commonwealth and Territories, 31,037, +4.5. As in 1980, there were nine states with enrollments of over one hundred thousand two-year students. The percentage of change in the nine states in 1981 was 6.1 which was somewhat less than the 8.5 gain in the same states in 1980. California had by far the largest number of two-year students with 936,465 enrolled for a 6.1% increase for the year. Illinois followed with 263,527 students enrolled and an increase of 5.2%. Texas had the third largest two-year population with 230,422 students, a 2.5% increase. Of the nine states, Michigan had the greatest percentage increase in enrollments in the junior colleges with a head count increase of more than 26,000 students and a 16.6% increase in enrollment. In the four-year institutions, Michigan showed a decline of 2.9% in 1981, with a head count loss of approximately 8,000 students. It is reasonable to assume that some of the growth that occurred in the two-year institutions in Michigan reflected the economic situation in that state. It is appropriate at this point to inject a note of caution about the use of these data and interpretations. First, the enrollment figures cited here are numbers reported comparably; that is, institutions filed reports both in fall, 1980 and 1981, and all institutions did not report. As noted previously, however, the return rate is in excess of 90% and represents valid approximation of the total picture. Table 6-4 portrays the geographic distribution by regions and states.

Full-time equivalent enrollment (FTE) increases by 3.4%. As has been the case for a number of years, FTE is estimated by adding one-third of the head count of part-time enrollments to the head count of full-time students. The procedure gives a reasonable approximation of instructional effort that is correlated in most instances with the allocation of funds, particularly in the public institutions. In the 1,096 two-year institutions, the FTE grand total for fall 1981 was 2,497,596 for a gain of 3.4% at comparably reporting institutions. The percentage increase was based on a comparable head count gain of 31,958 full-time students and 125,930 part-time students. Obviously, since the FTE grand total gain of 3.4% was less than the grand total head count gain of 4.3%, the major part of the growth in the two-year institutions in fall 1981 was in part-time students, a fact which was noted in earlier portions of the report. By control category, the FTE and percentages of change for the fall term were public, 2,306,264, +3.2; church-affiliated, 30,336, less than .1 loss; independent, 87,621, +4.4; and proprietary, 73,375, +9.9. The public institutions continue to account for more than 90% of the FTE in the two-year schools and colleges. Again, by category the percentages of FTE accounted for by full-time students were: public, 63.4; church-affiliated, 90.7; independent, 78.3; and proprietary, 84.9. Though these percentages changed slightly from fall 1980, there appears to be no significant difference in the numbers for the two years.

An Overview of Collegiate Enrollments in 1981. Enrollment reports were received from 2,962 colleges and universities in the United States in fall 1981. Several reports were

received too late to be included in the overall study; nine of these were from four-year institutions with total enrollments of 98,851, and 13 from two-year institutions with total enrollments of 124,275. The 1981 analyses were based on 1,844 four-year institutions with a grand total enrollment of 7,530,013 and 1,096 two-year institutions with a grand total enrollment of 4,251,655 students. The combination of the grand totals of the two categories resulted in an enrollment of 11,781,668 students in institutions included fully in the 1981 study. There were 6,927,531 full-time students and 4,854,137 part-time students. Over 90% of the institutions filed reports for the year, which is a remarkable rate of return for a survey; particularly one that requires the amount of effort to complete the form properly. The registrars, directors of institutional research, and other reporting officers are to be commended for their efforts in support of the study series.

There were 6,042,804 women enrolled in higher education in the fall of 1981 and 5,738,864 men enrolled. Previously and for several years, women students had outnumbered men in the two-year institutions, but fall 1981 was the year in which women outnumbered men in the four-year institutions, as well. In the four-year institutions, women students comprise 50.1% of the population, and in two-year institutions they comprise 53.4% of the population. In total, women students account for 51.3% of the population in the institutions that reported for the year.

The growth rate of enrollments in all institutions of higher education in the country for fall 1981 was +1.9%, based on data reported by 2,694 comparably reporting institutions. As stated previously, comparably reporting means that the institution submitted enrollment reports in 1980 and in 1981. It should be noted that there is a small amount of duplication in the count of two-year institutions—those that are administered by four-year institutions are counted in both studies; however, there are only a limited number of these.

In comparison with the growth rate predicted by the author in an October 27, 1981, press release, there was only a discrepancy of .3% between the prediction of 1.6% growth in enrollment and the 1.9% indicated by the completed study. The estimate was based on returns from 1,108 colleges and comprised approximately 28% of the college population. By contrast, on November 30, 1981, in an early release, the National Center for Education Statistics projected an overall growth rate of 1.9%, which corresponded exactly with findings of the author in the final analysis of collegiate enrollments for 1981. Also, in the October press release by the author, it was projected that there would be a 5% growth rate in the four-year institutions and a 3.2% growth in the two-year institutions. In the final analysis, the growth rate in the four-year institutions was +.7% and in the two-year institutions +4.3%.

Although there continued a pattern of enrollment increases in both two and four-year institutions in 1981, neither experienced the magnitude of gain that occurred in 1980. Further, there was a fairly substantial shift in the enrollment pattern. In 1980, the four-year institutions increased by 3.6% and enrollments in the two-year institutions increased by 7.7%. The substantial shift in the growth rate from four-year institutions

to two-year institutions suggests the further impact of the economic conditions in the country. It was postulated in last year's report that enrollments typically increased in times of recession despite the possible decline in the potential student pool. In a second year of decline of that pool, growth continued, though not so great as previously reported. Another obvious condition is that more women students have moved into higher education, and thus part of the projected decline has not occurred, due to that phenomenon.

In 1981, growth occurred in 13 of the 14 institutional categories defined in the series on enrollments in American higher education. Incidentally, this was the same pattern that occurred in 1980, with the exception that in 1980 the theological schools experienced a decline; however, in 1981 the Bible Schools experienced a decline of 3.1% while the theological schools experienced a fairly substantial gain of 5.4%.

Looking Into Future. For several years it has become almost "fashionable" to predict significant declines in collegiate enrollments over the next two decades. Birth rates have declined for a number of years, and the total number of 18 year olds that will be available during the next 20 years definitely has declined. Recently, in *Higher Education and National Affairs*, economist David Breneman predicted massive enrollment drops by the next decade—as much as 25% in some schools. He particularly disputes the widely-held notion that the decline in typical college age population will be offset by the entry of women, minorities, and older students into higher education. Parker (1979) presented a lengthy statement on the expectations for enrollment over the next 20 years that sets forth a soundly-based series of estimates. Whether the estimates come true or not will have to be borne out by experience. It is well-known at this time that higher education, as well as all education, faces difficult times in the immediate and extended future. Hard decisions will be required of faculty, administrators, trustees, state and federal legislators, and others who have responsibilities for higher education programs. Decisions will have to be made to eliminate programs and even colleges in the immediate future. There will have to be shifts in priorities and in program plans; however, adversity does not stand in the way of progress. Ralph Tyler subscribes to the thesis that the most significant advances in education have been made during times of adverse circumstances.

There is no question about the growing need for higher education. Scientific and technological advances will require college-educated individuals to function effectively in the coming years. The problems of society, government, and of health care must be dealt with by an educated citizenry. The very future of the country may hinge upon the effectiveness of higher education in meeting the needs of an advancing society.

DEFINITIONS USED IN THE 2-YEAR REPORT

Institutions surveyed are post-secondary 2-year junior and community colleges, other multipurpose colleges, technical and/or vocational schools or institutes, and 2-year units administered by 4-year colleges or universities (branch colleges/campuses/centers) that have regional association, professional organization and/or state agency recognition, approval or accreditation, and offer 2-year collegiate-level certificate and/or associate degree programs. Classification of schools by types reflects institutional preference, where available, and the author's judgment.

Full-time students devote substantially all working or study time to the college curriculum. Generally this is interpreted to mean that they are registered for 12 collegiate-level credit hours, presumably 75% of a normal load or more. The presumption is that these students are assessed full-time fees.

Part-time students normally take collegiate-level courses in the late afternoon, on weekends, in the evening, frequently in the day, or by extension and enroll for fewer than 12 credits, or less than 75% of a normal load.

First-time freshmen (full-time) are presumed to be only those entering-freshman full-time students who have not previously attended any college. The group is inclusive of students enrolled in the fall term who attended college for the first time in the summer of 1979 as well as students who entered with college credits earned before graduation from high school.

Two-year college students are those enrolled in collegiate-level credit-hour courses in 2-year certificate or associate degree programs in institutions covered in this survey. It is presumed that all eligible and enrolled 2-year collegiate-level credit-hour students are counted.

Full-time equivalent enrollments are not cited by institutions but FTEs are computed by categories of schools. The adjusted headcount method is used, whereby full-time-equivalent enrollments equals the headcount of full-time students, plus one-third of that of part-time students.

Full-time teaching staff is composed of those persons holding the rank of instructor of equivalent, and those of higher rank, in full-time employment for the academic year, who give at least half their time to instruction and are not on leave of absence.

Total teaching staff includes both full-time teaching staff and part-time individuals not on leave, including lecturers, fellows, teaching assistants, research assistants (if they teach), and others who teach.
