ABSTRACT

IDENTIFIERS

The report reviews the status of black students in the Austin (Texas) Independent School District for the year 1982. It provides information on student enrollment, demographic distribution, achievement, graduation rates, achievement on college admission tests, retention and promotion, programs for low achievers, dropouts, discipline, vocational program enrollment, and special education enrollment. Data are also provided on the teaching and administrative staff; changes in professional staff; staff recruitment, selection, and attrition; and parent and community involvement. The report notes that while student achievement among blacks has improved over the the previous two years, the average in Austin is still below the national level. A high retention rate is reported to Black students, who are found to be less likely to drop out of school than their White or Hispanic counterparts. Outstanding black students are named, as are two black finalists in the 1982 Teacher of the Year Award. The report comments on the positive attitudes of black teachers toward their work, and the high number of black teachers recruited and selected is noted. Finally, it is claimed that black parents and community members have contributed significantly to the education of Austin students, and are now involved in planning efforts for the future of the school district. 



residence continue to be in East Austin.







Achievement....

Over the last two years, the achievement of Black students in the Austin Independent School District has improved.


























Although the gap is narrowing, the average achievement of Black students is still lower than the national norm for all students. This is exemplified by the picture of reading scores of Black students in Grades 1 to 8.

Improving achievement, therefore, remains a top district goal.

Austin Independent School District recognizes and is proud of the many successful Black students in our schools. For example:



The Villager. AISD is looking for ways to recognize such outstanding students in a systematic way.




Graduation Rates....

In 1981-82, 17.3% of the Black students in AISD high schools graduated. This 17.3% rate for Blacks is their highest rate since 1971-72. Graduation rate is calculated by dividing the number of graduates by the total enrollment for that group in grades 9-12 as of October 1; the graduation rate for all students in 1981-82 was 20.0% matching last year's mark as the highest on record.

One of the important figures we can use to determine how many of our students are aspiring to attend college is their participation rates on the major test for college entrance, the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT). In 1980-81, 106 Black students took the SAT, the highest rate for the seven years that records by ethnicity have been available in comparable form:

Retention and Promotion....

Retention rates are closely tied to overall achievement rates. Therefore, retention rates for Black students tend to be somewhat high. It is hoped that this additional time in instruction and special programs such as the 1982 summer school and Project PASS will provide these students with the good learning base necessary for better progress in school.



Dropouts....

The percentage of students of all ethnicities who are dropouts from high school, that is those who appear to leave school permanently either during the summer or during the school year, is estimated to be about 11.7%. Black high school students are less likely to drop out of school than their Hispanic and Anglo classmates of the same sex, grade point average, and grade placement. Black student dropout rate is estimated to be about 11.5%.








Acceptance Rate for AISD Position Offers

Recruitment activities in 1981-82 included:

- Setting campus and Central Office goal commitments.
- Recruiting visits to cities out of state.
- Including more Black staff members on recruiting trips.
- Active advertising efforts.
- Intensive recruiting on campuses of Texas Black colleges with 62 interviews conducted through April of 1982.
- Initiating supportive activities to encourage Black participation in the high school organization of Future Teachers of America.
- Special attention to Black student teachers to identify and encourage future appointments to teaching positions.

Parent and Community Involvement

Black parents and community members make a significant contribution to the education of Austin ISD students. They serve as volunteers in classrooms and as resource persons. They also contribute to the governance of Austin schools through participation on many district advisory committees. For example, in 1981-82 there were three Black members on the Lay Citizens Textbook Committee, two on the Special Education Advisory Committee, one on the Technical-Vocational Education Advisory Committee, and 25 members active in the ESEA Title I District Advisory Committee.

Black members are also making a significant contribution to the various school and district committees involved in the District's major planning effort, Forming the Future.
