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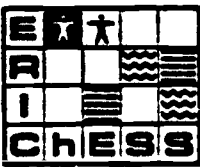
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ABSTRACT

Teaching about countries and regions of Asia is the topic of this annotated bibliography. 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ED 219 978. AROUND THE WORLD: JAPAN. AN EXPLORATORY UNIT FOR MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS, by Vicki Galloway and others. 1980. 57 pp. EDRS price: MF01/PC03 plus postage.

This unit aims to develop student awareness of Japanese culture through experiential language and cultural activities. Among the aids included in the unit are a list of general and special-interest books and films, suggestions for creating room displays on Japanese signs and symbols, a detailed activity sheet on writing Japanese, traditional and popular games in Japan, and activities related to Japanese crafts, Japanese music, and Japanese history and culture.

ED 218 205. TEACHING ABOUT ASIA IN ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOLS: IMPLICATIONS FOR TEACHER EDUCATION, by Donald O. Schneider. 1982 (rev. ed.). 26 pp. EDRS price: MF01/PC02 plus postage.

Asian studies at the elementary and secondary levels and the needs for teacher education are the focus of this paper. Trends of the past few decades that may have negatively affected the place of Asia in the school curriculum are examined, as are the positive effects of the current global perspective/global education movement. The final third of the paper examines approaches to teaching about Asia and the need for Asian specialists to work with educators to

maintain the current position of Asia in the curriculum and to improve teaching about Asia. The importance of the middle grades in learning about other cultures is stressed.

ED 214 845. VALUES AND MUSIC: SOME COMPARISONS BETWEEN THE U.S. AND CHINA AND JAPAN. AN EXPERIMENTAL UNIT, by Gary R. Smith. 1978. 40 pp. EDRS price: MF01 plus postage; PC available only from Center for Teaching International Relations, University of Denver, Denver, CO 80208 (\$6.95 plus \$2.00 postage and handling).

Designed to help secondary students recognize that a country's music both reflects and reinforces cultural values, this unit involves students in comparing the music of the United States, China, and Japan. The unit will take about 12 class periods to complete. Themes of the unit are political socialization, attitudes toward work, and the phenomenon of change.

ED 213 641. PLANNING A TEACHERS' WORKSHOP ON JAPAN, by Elgin Heinz. 63 pp. 1980. EDRS price: MF01/PC03 plus postage.

This publication is a "cookbook" for social studies educators who want to plan and organize a workshop dealing with another culture for elementary and secondary teachers. Japan has been chosen as the model, but most of the suggestions can be used to present workshops on other cultures as well. The publication's six major sections cover reasons for teaching from a global perspective and for using Japan as a model; selecting the intended audience, level, and topics to be emphasized in a workshop; sources of ideas and materials for the workshop; planning the program and arrangements, with different formats for presenting various themes and topics suggested; and follow-up activities. The appendices contain such resources as a list of materials for teaching about Japan.

ED 213 634. JAPAN THROUGH CHILDREN'S LITERATURE: A CRITICAL BIBLIOGRAPHY, by Yasuko Makino. 60 pp. 1978. EDRS price: MF01/PC03.

This critical annotated bibliography cites literature intended to help American children acquire an accurate image and understanding of Japan and Japanese culture. The author selected both bad and good items for inclusion to give teachers an idea of what to look for in choosing and evaluating books about Japan. The bibliog-

raphy is divided into sections on art, music, fiction, folklore and legend, poetry, and social studies. Grade levels are indicated.

ED 211 404. SOWING AND REAPING A REVOLUTION: ECONOMIC CHANGE AND GROWTH IN THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA, 1949-1981, by Jeffrey R. Taylor. 33 pp. 1981. EDRS price: MF01/PC02 plus postage.

This unit, intended for use with secondary students, presents background information on the Chinese economy. The unit contains a six-part narrative which students are to read. Also suggested are use of visiting speakers, audiovisual displays, and student presentations to supplement the reading. Related units in the ERIC system are MISTY MOUNTAINS AND MOUNTAIN MOVERS: USING ART AND LITERATURE IN TEACHING ABOUT OLD AND NEW CHINA (ED 211 399; MF01/PC02), CHINESE FESTIVALS AND CUSTOMS (ED 211 400; MF01/PC02), ORACLE BONES AND MANDARIN TONES: DEMYSTIFYING THE CHINESE LANGUAGE (ED 211 401; MF01/PC02), CHINESE COOKING (ED 211 402; MF01/PC02), and AN INTRODUCTION TO CHINESE LITERATURE (ED 211 403; MF01/PC03).

ED 210 241 and ED 210 242. THE WHEEL OF LIFE: THROUGH INDIAN EYES and FORGING A NATION: THROUGH INDIAN EYES, by Donald J. Johnson and Jean E. Johnson. 154 and 130 pp., respectively. 1981. EDRS price: MF01 plus postage each/PC07 and PC06 plus postage, respectively.

These two books, which can be used in secondary and college courses, present an Indian view of India and the world. Almost all of the material in both volumes was written by Indians and has been taken from a variety of sources. Volume one focuses on personal aspects of Indian life: family relations, marriage, caste membership, and religious beliefs. The second volume deals with the topic of nation building, discussing such issues as Hindu-Muslim relations, the impact of British colonial rule, and the influence of Mahatma Gandhi on the independence movement. Related ERIC documents focus on China through Chinese eyes (ED 210 239; MF01/PC07 and ED 210 240; MF01/PC05) and Japan through Japanese eyes (ED 210 243; MF01/PC06 and ED 210 244; MF01/PC06).

ED 207 884. BASIC SKILLS IN ASIAN STUDIES, by James Hantula. 71 pp. 1981. EDRS price: MF01/PC03 plus postage.

This publication contains field-tested learning activities to help secondary students develop basic skills while learning about Asian history, culture, and geography. The publication is organized by the skills taught: reading, problem solving, interpreting maps and globes, and understanding time and chronology.

ED 201 565. THE VIETNAM ERA: A GUIDE TO TEACHING RESOURCES. 110 pp. 1978. EDRS price: MF01/PC05.

This annotated resource guide contains information and learning activities on the Vietnam War for use by high school history teachers. Annotations of primary source materials, resource materials, textbooks, general interest books, and film and slide shows from several points of view are included. Although many books on the war have been published since this document was prepared in 1978, the activities suggested are still germane and unique in the field. The document concludes with directories of organizations and publishers and suggestions for books for elementary school children.

ED 200 469. THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA: A BASIC HANDBOOK, compiled by James R. Townsend and Richard C. Bush. 123 pp. 1981. EDRS price: MF01 plus postage; PC available only from Learning Resources in International Studies, 60 E. 42nd Street, Suite 1231, New York, NY 10165.

This revised handbook is intended to assist representatives of the media, teachers, students, business persons, government officials, and interested others in increasing their understanding of China. The first chapter provides an annotated listing of material on China. The following seven chapters treat such topics as the geography of China, history of the Chinese Revolution, foreign relations, and economic development.

## JOURNAL ARTICLES

Annotations of articles from journals covered in the ERIC system follow. All annotations appear in the Current Index to Journals in Education (CIJE), which is published on a monthly basis and is available at libraries throughout the country. In those cases where the journal annotation is not sufficient and the reader wishes to read the original article in its entirety, the reader must locate the appropriate issue of the journal in a library or on the newsstand. EJ 270 338. "Japanese Commercials: Key to Unlocking the Japanese Mind," by Michael Lustig. SOCIAL SCIENCE RECORD, volume 19, number 2, pp. 8-12, August 1982. Reprint available from UMI.

By viewing approximately two dozen Japanese television commercials, secondary students in an area studies course were able to generate impressions reflecting many important experiences of the Japanese society that the course would later explore in detail.

EJ 267 643. "Japan as a Focus Culture for Global Education," by Mary A. McFarland. SOCIAL STUDIES, volume 73, number 4, pp. 164-167, July-August 1982. Reprint available from UMI.

This article discusses how the global approach can be used to teach about Japanese culture in elementary and secondary social studies classes.

EJ 267 641. "Bringing Chinese Culture Alive Through Language," by Diana Marson Wood. SOCIAL STUDIES, volume 73, number 4, pp. 155-159, July-August 1982. Reprint available from UMI.

The author describes a Chinese language unit for middle and high school social studies

students. The unit consists of nine modules covering aspects of both spoken and written Chinese.

EJ 262 501. "Building Bridges of Understanding in the Middle Grades: A Unit Approach to China," by Philip Heath and Thomas Weible. SOCIAL STUDIES, volume 73, number 2, pp. 91-94, March-April 1982. Reprint available from UMI.

The authors describe a unit of study for use with students in the middle grades. Students research such topics as Chinese transportation and sports, reproduce Chinese characters, construct a relief map of China, prepare Chinese food, and solve a Chinese puzzle.

EJ 262 389. "Vietnam Revised: Are Our Textbooks Changing?" by Dan B. Fleming and Ronald J. Nurse. SOCIAL EDUCATION, volume 46, number 5, pp. 338-343, May 1982. Reprint available from UMI.

This article presents a study which analyzed ten current and widely used secondary U.S. history textbooks for their coverage of the Vietnam War. Most of the textbooks studied were found to offer a too-sketchy account of the war. Certain topics were found to be frequently neglected in the texts.

EJ 257 193. "Teaching About Chinese Law: A Multitude of Approaches and Resources," by Linda S. Wotjan. INTERCOM, number 100, pp. 38-40, December 1981. Reprint available from UMI.

This is an annotated bibliography of books, films, simulations, and journal articles which can be used in secondary social studies to help students learn about the Chinese legal system.

EJ 255 667. "Teaching the Vietnam War," by Sandra C. Taylor. HISTORY TEACHER, volume 15, number 1, pp. 57-66, November 1981. Reprint available from UMI.

The author describes reading material that can be used to teach about the Vietnam War.



EJ 255 550. "Japan and the United States: What Our Textbooks Tell Us About Each Other," by Victor N. Kobayashi and others. TODAY'S EDUCATION: SOCIAL STUDIES EDITION, volume 70, number 4, pp. 45-57, November-December 1981. Reprint available from UMI.

This article summarizes the results of a cooperative international analysis of social studies texts. The project found books from each country tended to justify their own country's actions while consistently oversimplifying conditions in the other. Teaching strategies to counteract textbook biases are included.

EJ 251 818. "The Open Mind Policy: Current Issues in Teaching About China," by Mary Kay Hobbs. CURRICULUM REVIEW, volume 20, number 4, pp. 312-315, September 1981. Reprint available from UMI.

Intended for the K-12 teacher wishing to incorporate study of the People's Republic of China into the curriculum, this article cites new instructional resources, discusses changing perspectives in textbooks, and suggests guidelines for evaluating materials on China. It is one of several articles in this issue on China studies.

EJ 250 454. "Get Oriented: Study Japan," by Barbara M. Parramore. GEORGIA SOCIAL SCIENCE JOURNAL, volume 12, number 3, pp. 3-6, Summer 1981. Reprint available from UMI.

The author recommends that students in social studies classes be exposed to a study of Japan because of the wide array of contrasts possible between Japan and the United States. Information is presented on Japan's modernization, global status, language, decision-making processes, and ancient traditions. Several other articles on teaching about Japan appear in this issue of the journal.

EJ 250 113. "China: New Perspectives for Adolescent Readers," by Lynn Cozette Smith. TOP OF THE NEWS, volume 37, number 4, pp. 344-348, Summer 1981. Reprint available from UMI.

Smith reviews adolescent literature about China to find a newer, more positive, and less ideologically biased approach to the Chinese and their culture. The article includes a bibliography of 25 titles.

EJ 244 721. "Teaching About Japan Through Modern Literature," by Charles von Lowenfeldt and others. SOCIAL EDUCATION, volume 45, number 5, pp. 224-224, May 1981. Reprint available from UMI.

This article suggests ways in which a first-hand knowledge about Japan can be brought into American secondary school classrooms through the study of various forms of modern literature. Each example of Japanese literature (short stories, novels, poetry, comics, etc.) is followed by questions for student discussion. This article is one of five in a special feature on teaching about Japan.

EJ 231 135. "American Images of Asia: Myth and Reality," by James W. Boyd and Loren W. Crabtree. SOCIAL STUDIES, volume 71, number 4, pp. 184-190, July-August 1980. Reprint available from UMI.

The authors suggest a unit to help students confront their misinformed perceptions of Asia. Students examine seven misconceptions: unchanging Asia, the spiritual East, the indistinct Asia, the inscrutable art of Asia, the unscientific Asian, oriental despotism, and modernization as Westernization.

This packet provides background material to help the classroom teacher begin to understand life in the People's Republic of China. Included are such items as a newsletter focusing on Chinese youth and education policy; a series of one-page fact sheets on topics like energy resources, medical care, small industries, and women in China; a four-page chronology of Chinese history; a copy of the joint communique establishing diplomatic relations between the United States and the People's Republic; and an English-language edition of a Chinese newspaper. Many of the materials are written from a Chinese perspective, rather than a Western perspective.
