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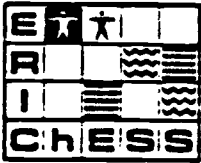
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ABSTRACT

Women in the United States, past and present, is the focus of this annotated bibliography. The following kinds and amounts of materials are cited: (1) 13 citations from "Resources in Education" (RIE); (2) 7 citations from "Current Index to Journals in Education" (CIJE); (3) 28 commercially available "Student and Teacher Materials" (10 textbooks and supplementary print materials, 6 multimedia materials, 3 games and simulations, and 9 teacher resources); (4) 5 related professional organizations that may prove helpful in this area; and (5) 2 journals and newsletters. 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ED 206 549. SEX EQUITY IDEABOOK FOR THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA PUBLIC SCHOOLS, by Walteen Grady and others. 1980. 149 pp. EDRS price: MF01/PC06, plus postage.

This publication contains lesson plans and classroom activities to assist K-12 teachers develop sex equity themes. Section 1 contains awareness activities for use with colleagues, parents, and community members. Section 2, which focuses on social studies/history, contains brief biographies of famous American women and games to play with the information. Sections 3 and 4 focus on mathematics and science. The fifth section contains teacher-developed lesson plans in a broad range of subjects for grades K-9, and section 6 presents a play written by a junior high school student to dispel outmoded myths about girls and boys.

ED 200 674. THEY CHOSE GREATNESS: WOMEN WHO SHAPED AMERICA AND THE WORLD, by Doak Bloss. 1980. 127 pp. EDRS price: MF01/PC06, plus postage.

This manual is a resource for elementary school teachers who wish to supplement their curriculum with material highlighting the contributions of women. The guide presents 180 vignettes about women who achieved greatness in a wide variety of fields. A question has been

added at the end of each vignette to encourage class discussion. Each section also provides a related activity or game.

ED 199 169-172. IN SEARCH OF OUR PAST: UNITS IN WOMEN'S HISTORY, edited by Suzanne Hurwitz and others. 1980. 182 to 372 pp. EDRS price: MF01 plus postage (for each document); PC not available from EDRS. Available from Education Development Center, 55 Chapel Street, Newton, Massachusetts 02160; contact EDC for price information.

This series of four documents includes two teacher's guides and two student manuals. One guide and manual focus on women in U.S. history, the others on women in world history. The three units for U.S. history courses focus on Native American women in pre-Colombian America, Southern women from 1820 to 1860, and women and immigrants and workers from 1820 to 1940. The three units for use in world history courses examine the role of women under feudalism in Western Europe and China, the role of women during the Industrial Revolution, and 20th-century women in transition, with emphasis on Third World women.

ED 193 720. WOMEN AND MASS MEDIA COURSE OUTLINE, by Janellen Hill. 1980. 22 pp. EDRS price: MF01/PC01, plus postage.

This paper presents a complete upper division or graduate course outline for examining the media's effects on sex role stereotyping of women in society. Included are course objectives, a course schedule, discussions of course evaluation policies, project assignments, and a bibliography of resources.

ED 191 789. WEECN RESOURCE ROUNDUP: DESIGNING A WOMEN'S STUDIES PROGRAM. 1980. 7 pp. EDRS price: MF01/PC01, plus postage.

This annotated bibliography was prepared by the Women's Educational Equity Communications Network as a guide for faculty and administrators considering initiating or expanding a women's studies program or for anyone interested in women's studies at the elementary, secondary, or postsecondary levels. The eighty-three entries are categorized into five parts: general resources, elementary/secondary educational resources, higher educational resources, organizations and programs, and regional contact sources.

ED 186 573. THE BLACK FEMALE EXPERIENCE IN AMERICA: A LEARNING/TEACHER GUIDE, by Joanna Allman and others. 1979. 146 pp. EDRS price: MF01/PC06 plus postage. PC also available from Educational Development Center, 39 Chapel Street, Newton, Massachusetts 02160 (\$3.25).

This book provides a guide for teaching and learning about the experiences of black females in America, particularly about psychological issues in black female development. The guide is divided into topic units that focus on black women in history; black feminism; relationships, roles, and family life; and physical and psychological health issues.

ED 186 340-343. WOMEN IN AMERICAN HISTORY: A SERIES, by Beverly Sanders. 1979. 58-95 pp. MF01 plus postage (each document); PC not available from EDRS. Available from Education Development Center, 55 Chapel Street, Newton, Massachusetts 02160 (\$1.25 to \$2.00).

This series of four books is designed to supplement U.S. history textbooks at the high school level. The series highlights both women who were famous and those who were not. Each book focuses on the roles, expectations, rights, and work of women in a particular era in U.S. history. Questions and suggested activities are found at the end of each chapter in the four books.

ED 186 306. BREAKING THE SILENCE: SEVEN COURSES IN WOMEN'S STUDIES. 1979. 169 pp. EDRS price: MF01 plus postage; PC not available from EDRS. Available from Education Development Center, 55 Chapel Street, Newton, Massachusetts 02160 (\$4.75).

This document describes women's studies courses suitable for traditional and nontraditional educational settings. It is intended for adolescent and adult women whose access to education and employment has been limited because of race, sex, or class discrimination. Titles of the seven courses described are "Black Women Writers," "Reading and Writing about Women," "Sex Roles and Socialization," "Women in Cross-Cultural Perspective," "Women in Prison," "Women and Their Working Lives," and "Introduction to Women's History."

ED 186 206. APPALACHIAN WOMEN: A LEARNING/TEACHING GUIDE, by Sharon B. Lord and Carolyn Patton-Crowder. 1979. 188 pp. EDRS price: MF01 plus postage; PC not available from EDRS. Available from Education Development Center, 55 Chapel Street, Newton, Massachusetts 02160 (\$4.00).

This learning/teaching guide is designed to provide the necessary information for developing and/or facilitating courses or independent study about the Appalachian female experience, sex-role socialization, and women's career development. Each lesson provides an introduction, learning objectives, directions for the learner, classroom and individual activities, a bibliography of related readings, and an appendix including original material developed specifically for this guide. More than 700 major writings by and/or about Appalachian women are listed in a supplementary bibliography.

ED 184 982. SOURCES OF STRENGTH: WOMEN AND CULTURE, by Lisa K. Hunter and others. 1979. 667 pp. EDRS price: MF02 plus postage; PC not available from EDRS. Available from Education Development Center, 55 Chapel Street, Newton, Massachusetts 02160 (\$13.00).

This teacher's guide presents teaching methods, content, and learning activities for units in multicultural women's studies. The major objective is to help secondary students answer the question, "How much control can a person exercise over his/her own life?" The guide opens with an introduction to the curriculum. The second chapter presents a unit on socialization and its impact on personal choice. The third chapter, the major part of the document, consists of four topics and an essay entitled "Women's Power." Topics cover the traditional, historical, personal, and changing roles of women in Nigeria, women in China, African-American women, and Chinese-American women in relation to societal influences and economic, political, and personal power.

ED 162 929. WOMEN'S STUDIES AND POPULAR MUSIC: USING AUDIO RESOURCES IN SOCIAL STUDIES INSTRUCTION, by B. Lee Cooper. 1978. 22 pp. EDRS price: MF01/PC01 plus postage.

Because the field of popular music has produced rich resources of social commentary on women, it offers ample instructional materials for the critical examination of women's lifestyles in a pluralistic society. The objectives of such an approach aim at defining the identity and self-image of females while enhancing the understanding of male students, emphasizing the need to promote change in both thought and action, and pursuing a realistically balanced view of the feminist position. Suggested thematic approaches, including both female and male images, and some examples of accompanying songs include: (1) negative self-image ("When Will I Be Loved," "Nowhere Man"), (2) positive self-image ("I Am Woman," "I Got a Name"), (3) independence and mutual respect ("Different Drum," "I've Got To Be Me"), (4) submissive individuals ("Honky Tonk Woman," "Bad, Bad Leroy Brown"), (5) dominant individuals ("Witchy Woman," "Born To Be Wild"). The document concludes with lists of 26 songbook resources for lyrics and 59 resources for teaching women's studies in general.

JOURNAL ARTICLES

Annotations of articles from journals covered in the ERIC system follow. EJ 244 463. "High School Women's Studies: New Materials, New Approaches," by Merle Froschl and Alexandra Weinbaum. CHILDREN TODAY, volume 10, number 2, pp. 12-16, March-April 1981. Reprint available from UMI.

The authors describe 12 books that cover aspects of women's lives in American society. The books are designed to counter the white male bias of the high school curriculum by exploring the history and culture of women. Field-testing activities are described.

EJ 235 173. "Women in Science: Biographies for Young Readers," by Ruth M. Noyce. SCIENCE AND CHILDREN, volume 18, number 3, pp. 24-26, November-December 1980. Reprint available from UMI.

Listed are bibliographies which include individual life stories of women in 13 scientific areas, plus 29 collective biographies for classroom use and personal reading. Criteria for inclusion were accuracy, interest, and realism.

EJ 215 848. "Instructional Practices: Instructional Materials for Teaching a Course in 'Women and Communication,'" by Cynthia L. Berryman. COMMUNICATIONS EDUCATION, volume 28, number 3, pp. 217-224, July 1979. Reprint available from UMI.

The author describes instructional objectives, resources, and student projects for four units of a course on women and communication. The topics are interpersonal communication, socialization, and self-concept; interpersonal relations between the sexes; females' communication in structured groups; and public communication and female orators.

EJ 228 928. "In Search of Our Past," by Lyn Reese. SOCIAL STUDIES REVIEW, volume 19, number 3, pp. 31-34, Spring 1980. Reprint available from UMI.

The author presents a sample lesson from a junior high multiethnic women's studies unit as well as sample activities from a high school women's studies course.

EJ 218 287. "Women in the American Wilderness," by Elizabeth Griffin and Irene Zahava. COMMUNICATOR, volume 10, number 2, pp. 28-30, 1979. Reprint available from UMI.

This annotated bibliography of 21 books dealing with the lives and experiences of women who have lived in wilderness America focuses on women living outside urban society who have depended upon their own and the environment's resources for survival. Includes a special section of books for young people.

EJ 217 188. "Introduction: The First Decade of Women's Studies," by Florence Howe. HARVARD EDUCATIONAL REVIEW, volume 49, number 4, pp. 413-421., November 1979. Reprint available from UMI.

This overview of the early history of women's studies acts as an introduction to a special issue on women and education. The author discusses how events in the past 10 years have affected education, the hiring of women in academia, and changes in curriculum and research.

EJ 191 427. "Filling in the Picture: Resources for Teaching About Women in Canada," by Alta Mae Stevens and Linda McDowell. HISTORY AND SOCIAL SCIENCE TEACHER, volume 14, number 1, pp. 7-14, Fall 1978. Reprint available from UMI.

Interviewing is used as a primary resource in studying women in Canadian society. The article suggests that students interview family members first and then branch out to women in the community. Resources on the role of women are listed.

The developers of this program believe that "knowledge of reality, even if harsh, is better than cheerful ignorance" and that "acquiring skills and practicing their applications are more worthwhile career development experiences than mere exposure to a series of concrete job options." They have therefore designed this curriculum to help rural high school students understand and cope with the problems that face adults in rural areas. The program focuses particularly on problems faced by women--stereotyping and discrimination, conflicts between home and work, etc. The program consists of four units which provide material for 9 to 12 weeks of work.

WE, THE AMERICAN WOMEN presents a chronological, historical account of the role of women in American history. Designed to be integrated

in a yearlong American history course, the text can aid both male and female students in understanding women's contributions to the course of American history. While pointing out the contributions of "famous" women, the text also emphasizes the role of the "average" American woman, who was both an agent of change and a stabilizing force. The book emphasizes the historical, political, social, and economic concerns of women and makes use of author narrative and primary source material.

The book is a collection of primary source readings, dating from colonial times to the present, recounting the story of women's participation in American life. Designed to be used as the primary text in women's studies courses, it is also suitable as a supplement to other social studies courses. The text explores the sex-role socialization of girls throughout history, examines traditional roles adult women have assumed as well as alternatives to those roles, and traces the history of working women in America. Firsthand accounts of the past and present, representing the viewpoints of women of many ethnic and racial groups, are illustrated with historical and contemporary photographs and drawings. Although there is no teacher's guide accompanying the book, each reading is preceded by an introduction creating the context for the reading and followed by questions and activities.

The purpose is designed to stimulate thought about sex roles and stereotyping and to develop skills in issue analysis, argumentation, assertiveness, and decision making.

The guide presents a women's studies curriculum for students from working-class backgrounds, particularly women students. Ten student-centered goals are listed, with the major goal of helping students to "recognize their strengths and build self-confidence and self esteem." The book consists of an introduction, a chapter on teaching and learning techniques, and nine units from the women's studies curriculum. The chapter on teaching techniques provides information on teaching reading, writing, and vocabulary skills

and discusses ways to use role plays, speakers, field trips, and interviews. The nine units are: "Messages from Society," "Early Socialization," "Growing Up Female," "Adult Sex Roles," "Sexuality," "Mean Streets," "Women and Work," "Women Organizing Themselves," and "Women's News." Each includes an overview; from one to seven subtopics, each with its own introduction and activities; and "Notes to the Teacher." For many of the participatory activities, a variety of assignment options are given, allowing for individualization. The units are flexible; all nine can be combined for a full-year course, one or two units can supplement other subject area courses, or several units can be combined to form quarter or semester courses.
