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ABSTRACT _{(*}

The comparative higher education course offered at the State University of New York at Buffalo is briefly described, and a course schedule is presented, including required and recommended readings for each topic. The course is intended to provide a broad cross-cultural perspective and considers the growth and development of universities in Europe, the United States, and the Third World, the key constitutent elements of the academic system, and important current issues facing higher education. In addition to the course requirements and the main texts, required and recommended readings are indicated for the following topics: perspectives on comparative higher education; historical perspectives; tradition and change in the western European university; higher education in eastern Europe; institutional transfer and current developments in the Third World; Third World case studies: China and India; from Third to First World: Japan and Southeast Asia; autonomy and accountability: the comparative politics of higher education; the management of decline; international perspectives on reform; case studies in reform; the academic profession; students and politics in comparative perspective; and student politics case studies. Comparative Higher Education is intended to provide a broad cross-cultural perspective on important issues related to higher education. The course will consider the growth and development of universities in Europe, the United States and the Third World, the key constituent elements of the academic system—faculty, students, and administration—and important current issues facing higher education. Among these issues are university reform, university—state relations, the fiscal "crisis," student activism, etc. Examples from various national systems will be considered.

This course requires active participation in class discussions. In addition, the student will be responsible for a short term paper on a topic to be selected by the student with the approval of the instructor. This paper will be a maximum of 20 double-spaced typed pages in length and will be related to one of the topics covered in the course and focusing on one or two countries (excluding the United States). There will be a take-home fire a examination. Evaluation for the course will be based 40% on the term paper, 40% on the final examination and 20% on participation in course discussions.

The following books will be used as the main readings for the course. They are available at Talking Leave Bookstore, 3102 Main Street, Buffalo (approximately four blocks from the Main Street Campus in the direction of downtown Buffalo).
