ABSTRACT

The manual is intended to be a national directory of educational programs, services, personnel, and schedules for migrant secondary students. It includes profiles of over 200 migrant secondary programs and services offered by 18 states. Each profile includes the type, name, location, telephone number, contact person, program dates, and description of the program or service. The programs are classified by type and divided into three major sections corresponding to regular academic services (career development, extended day classes, in-school evening classes, in-school summer classes, preregistration/egrollment, tutorial, work experience for credit); alternative education services (alternative education programs, learning activity packages; secondary credit exchange programs); and supportive services not for credit (advocacy, alternative education, career development, counseling, enrichment, work experience). Within each section, profiles are organized alphabetically by type, by state within type, and by program within state. A final section organized alphabetically by state contains profiles indicating which types of programs and services each state offers. The manual is designed for easy updating and cross referencing. 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<u>I N T R O D U C T I O N</u>

I. Background

The need for increased communications among programs serving migrant secondary youth was indicated in the resolutions produced by a national policy workshop on education for migrant secondary students held in Seattle, Washington during August, 1981. Historically, educational facilities for migrant secondary students have been characterized as isolated and unique. In the absence of a central information source, states identifying migrant secondary needs have often addressed their needs by "starting from scratch." A program/problem classification and taxonomy have been virtually non-existent. In short, although the issue of secondary migrant education has been addressed enthusiastically and effectively in some areas, there has been no "single state of the art" to serve as a central information source. The IMSSP (Interstate Migrant Secondary Services Program) has recognized the problem and addressed it through the production of this manual.

II. Application

This manual should serve many purposes, potential and actual. It is intended to be a national directory of secondary programs, services, personnel, schedules, etc. The manual provides a prescriptive approach to program development, expansion and improvement. And further, it enhances the probability of complementary

growth of similar and related programs throughout the nation.

Wherever migrant secondary youth are identified, this manual should provide the first step in responding to their needs.

III. <u>Development</u>

The first edition of the manual reflects input from several sources. Its format permits periodic updating as additional or. revised information becomes available. The IMSSP staff has made field visits and phone calls to program locations. Several states have shared narratives from their programs. Resources of the Education Commission of the States, ERIC, regional conference workshops, and the offices of the various state directors of migrant education have been used in gathering the contents. Pages purposely are not numbered to allow sections to be replaced, expanded and updated. The intention clearly is to keep this a "current" state of the art.

IV. Design, Organization and Format

The manual is designed to be used in a variety of ways.

Without being presumptuous but seeking uniformity, various kinds of programs are defined according to commonalities, such as objectives, credit transfer, alternative education, etc. Types of secondary services are delineated in the third section permitting users to explore programs designed to fill specific needs. The fourth section covers specific services organized alphabetically by state enabling reciprocating states to compare their secondary

migrant facilities. States initiating or expanding migrant secondary services may examine programs in states with similar migrant patterns and needs. Finally, state profiles are tabulated to provide basic information about personnel, crops, population, seasons, etc. Cross referencing the major sections of the manual facilitates easy comparison and application of pertinent information to specific educational needs.

V. Acknowledgements

A compilation and summation of state and local programs by generic types inherently tends to reduce or eliminate specific identities. While the manual depends on the individual talent and commitment of dedicated educators throughout the nation, the purpose is to bring out uniformity, commonality and harmony in an educational climate currently lacking these characteristics. Further, there may be other exemplary and promising programs in isolated sections of the country of which the IMSSP staff is not yet aware. The probability of omissions is recognized. Periodic additions to the manual will reduce such oversights to a minimum.

The manual will grow in content and applicability through continuing contribution and positive criticism. This is a beginning. Comments and suggestions addressed to the IMSSP are welcome and vital.

II. DEFINITIONS

A. Regular Academic Services
Services available to full time

Services available to full-time students who attend school in the district in which they reside.

Al. Career Development: «

Preparation for the world of work. Career development courses can be required or electives. They are designed to make students aware of their interests, and make decisions about courses to take related to these interests.

A2. Extended Day/Evening Classes

Extra instruction given to students before or after the regular school day. Instruction is usually given on a small group basis for a one-hour time span. Students utilize this time to work on areas where they are having difficulty and as credit make-up/ catch-up.

A3. <u>In-School Evening Classes</u>

Classes offered during the evening of the regular school year. Students take basic academic courses in areas where they need to make-up credits.

A4. <u>In-School Summer Classes</u>

Classes offered during the summer in the daytime or evening hours. Remedial in nature, these courses emphasize basic academics. Students use this time to make-up credits or catch-up on high school credits.

A5. Pre-Registration/Enrollment

This process insures the continuity of each interstate migrant secondary student's individualized educational plan as developed by the homebase school.

The process provides schools with a class schedule recommended by the individual's homebase school prior to fall envolument. In return, as soon as the student withdraws, the homebase school receives the courses taken, grades received and days of attendance. In this way, the homebase school may award all the credit that is due and continue the course of study begun in September.

The information is transferred two ways to insure delivery: by direct mail from schools and through the Migrant Student Record Transfer System.

A6. Tutorial

Provides individual or small group instruction to students in any area of difficulty. Tutoring is conducted before or after the regular school hours; during the student's study hall; or during the student's class time. Tutors can be certified teachers at the local school district, teacher aides, volunteers from the community; college students or peers.

A7. Work Experience

A combination of part time work and part time study designed to prevent students from dropping out of school. Stipends are paid either by the program, by the employer, or by another state/federal agency. Students earn credit when they complete the required hours of supervised, certified work.

A8. Other

Includes general services available to migrant secondary students within the regular school program.

- B. Alternative Education Services For Credit
 Sérvices available to secondary students so that high
 school credits can be earned outside of the regular
 school district program.
- B1. Alternative Education Programs

 Based on the local school district philosophy and designed to meet the special individualized needs of migrant secondary students. Students earn high school credits by participating in non-traditional programs offered at times convenient to the student's work schedule.

B2. Learning Activity Packages

Packages specifically designed for students who will stay in one area only a brief time. These include many academic subjects. Students progress at their own rate and and receive credit as each instructional package is completed.

B3. Secondary Credit Exchange Program

Designed to help the migrant secondary student remain in school until he/she receives a high school diploma. By establishing communication with the student's sending and receiving schools, programs can correlate individual student's class schedules to insure that mandatory credits are being fulfilled.

Classes are offered in the late afternoon and the evening to accommodate the student's work schedule. An individualized program is developed for each student based on specific credits the student needs towards a high school diploma. This system encourages students to enroll in schools other than their homebase as they travel.

C. <u>Supportive</u> Services

Supplementary services available to help the secondary student both in school and out of school.

C1. Advocacy

Support given to students with academic problems (academic credit, receiving a high school diploma, school survival) and personal problems (legal, health, pregnancy).

C2. <u>Career Development</u>

Individual and small group interaction with career, counselors, the examination of personal values, and the exploration of different careers through field trips and career awareness sessions.


C3. Counseling

Individual and/or group advice and guidance. Individual counseling usually focuses on the student's personal problems. Vocational counseling guides the student through the process of learning her/his interests and abilities. Group counseling focuses on self-awareness, problem-solving and decision-making.

C4: Enrichment


Activties that enhance the regular school curriculum. These include field trips, cultural and social functions, and specially designed classes to stimulate learning.

C5. Work Experience Employment in the public or private sector, paid by the employer, the program, or another state/federal agency. Students involved in work placements may or may not be in school. C6. Other Other, services (primarily medical) offered by a program.






