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PREFACE

During the 1980 program year, Global Perspectives in Education, Inc. (GPE) received funding from the United States Department of Education, under NDEA Title VI, Section 603 (Civizer Education for Cultural Awareness), to develop and produce a directory of organizations and projects with global education activities. Margaret Little compiled and edited the first draft of the *Global Perspectives in Education Organization Resource Directory* which was circulated in the summer of 1980. The first directory identified 91 organizations and projects ranging from other "603" sponsored projects to major youth exchange organizations and professional membership associations. The response was overwhelmingly positive. So much so, that Global Perspectives in Education decided to expand and update the directory.

In the fall of 1980, GPE again received fiscal assistance from the U.S. Department of Education to support our directory update effort. The new directory — nearly double in size — was expanded to include foreign-language and area studies outreach centers which service the precollegiate community, and other organizations and agencies of interest to global educators which were brought to our attention since the first draft.

There are many approaches to strengthening the international components of the precollegiate curriculum. Some educators prefer a more traditional approach, centering around the study of specific foreign languages, cultures, and areas. Others prefer an issue-oriented approach, focusing on problems of global significance such as food/hunger, population, energy, and disarmament. Still others prefer incorporating global perspectives into existing curricula. GPE has pioneered this last approach, seeking to develop a context for examining the interdependence of all peoples with each other and with their environments.

The Global Yellow Pages tries to be as broad as possible in its listing of organizations and agencies that might be of assistance to educators interested in improving international/global education in the schools. In selecting the directory entries, priority was given to organizations and projects providing international/global education curriculum materials, teacher training, and consultation at the precollegiate level. The directory does not attempt to evaluate the projects listed.

No matter how exhaustive the efforts, projects of this nature can never hope to be all-inclusive. Our apologies in advance to any we have inadvertently excluded, and for any inaccuracies that might have passed our proof-readers' weary eyes.
