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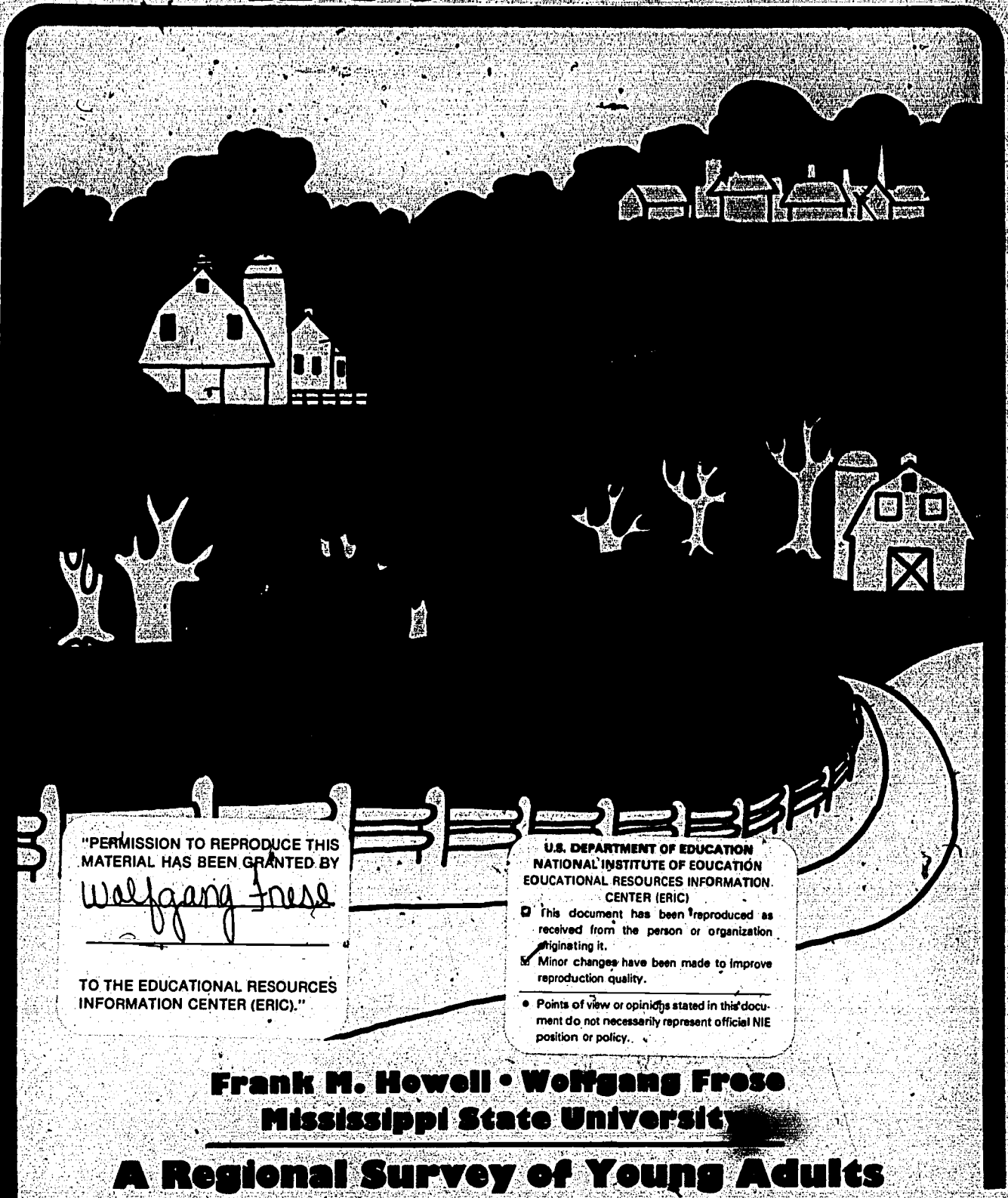
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ABSTRACT

A summary of the 1966-1979 Southern Youth Study (SYS), a 4-wave longitudinal research project intended to produce information on career development and decision-making processes and influences of rural southern youth from economically-disadvantaged counties, presents data collection procedures, an overview of instruments and variables, descriptions of the raw data file and software, suggestions for users, the codebook, and appendices containing instruments and questionnaires. Procedures used to select data sources are described. Data collection procedures for the four waves are differentiated. A listing of the variables used in at least one SYS survey is given. Tables present senior class enrollment distribution for SYS states (Alabama, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, South Carolina, and Texas) and the samples (categorized by year into black and white, male and female) for the four SYS waves. The raw data file and accompanying data management software are briefly described. A sample codebook entry with explanations precedes the full codebook, which presents the original questions, response categories, labels, response codes, and frequency counts for each response code. Appendices include the instruments from the third and fourth waves, United State Census occupational and industrial classifications, and questionnaires used in the various states for the first three waves. 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THE SOUTHERN YOUTH STUDY: 1966 - 1979

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I. Overview of Southern Youth Study

The Southern Youth Study data originated from a series of research projects that began in 1958. The first project was a regional research study entitled, "Factors in the Adjustment of Individuals and Families in Low-Income Farm Areas of the South." Although this study generated descriptive information concerning family conditions in low-income rural areas, it failed to produce information regarding career development and decision-making processes of southern youth. Consequently, a second regional project was proposed in 1966 to specifically examine such processes and identify career-achievement influences. The 1966 study was entitled, "Human Resource Development and Mobility in the Rural South", and incorporated as much as possible the study design of the earlier 1958 research. More specifically, the objectives of the 1966 research were: (1) to analyze changes in selected areas of development--occupation, level of living, family functions and resources, social participation and attitudes; and (2) to analyze the relationships of occupational and social aspirations to decision-making, mobility, and development of youth (Jacobs, 1973).

Funding this study was provided for by the Cooperative State Research Service in the United States Department of Agriculture and the individual State Agricultural Experiment Stations. A total of six southern states participated in the longitudinal research survey.

The states participating in both the 1966 and 1968 waves were Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina, and Texas; Mississippi took part in 1966 only, while Louisiana joined in 1968. A follow-up to this project in which all six states participated was conducted in 1972. This second project was entitled, "Development of Human Resource Potentials of Rural Youth

in the South and Their Patterns of Mobility" (White, 1974). Another follow-up of this panel of youth, now well into adulthood, in which all six states were involved took place during late 1979 and early 1980. This effort is part of the three-phase regional project entitled, "Defining and Achieving Life Goals: A Process of Human Resource Development." The Southern Youth Study (SYS) refers to the total four-wave longitudinal research project.

Source of Data

A major concern of the original 1966 study was the selection of a sample of youth residing in counties which were rural and economically disadvantaged (Thomas, 1979). Each of the participating states generated sampling procedures to insure such representatives among its respondents.

Counties in Alabama and Georgia were selected because of their location near Appalachia, which traditionally has been regarded as a high poverty area. In Mississippi, all counties were ranked on the basis of the following three factors: (1) a weighted index of education, income, and occupation; (2) percent change in population from 1960 to 1963; and (3) percent change in wages paid under the Mississippi Employment Security Commission. One high and one low ranking county were randomly selected. In Texas, counties were chosen because they had a high poverty index and were over 30 percent Black (White, 1974).

A nonprobability, or purposive sampling procedure, was characteristic for most of the SYS states, except in the cases of South Carolina and Louisiana. In South Carolina, a stratified random sample based on size of the school and racial predominance criteria was obtained from all high schools. This sample resulted in 24 counties being selected. When Louisiana

entered the SYS in 1968, another sampling procedure was introduced. The state was divided into four geographical areas, with each area being socio-economically homogeneous. Schools were randomly selected from rural parishes to obtain a racially proportionate sample.

Although different sampling procedures were used, collectively they resulted in the selection of high schools and counties that were socio-economically similar. Thomas (1970) and Lever (1969) have presented information derived from the 1960 census which showed that the SYS counties selected in the 1966 wave had a lower mean family income per year for the United States as a whole. White (1974) has also reported racial and rural similarities between parishes selected in Louisiana and the counties of the other states. A socioeconomic profile of the six SYS states and their counties participating in the study can be found in Cosby and Charner (1978), Picou, et al. (forthcoming), Thomas (1979), Howell (1977), among others.

Data Collection Procedures

Wave I

The series of interviews began in the Spring of 1966. At this point in time the respondents were sophomores in high school. After the schools had been selected from rural and socioeconomically "disadvantaged" counties, students were administering the research instrument involved either interviewing sophomores collectively at one time or interviewing them while they attended classes of a common course (White, 1974). Group interviews were conducted by project directors and graduate students. No attempts were made to contact students who were absent the day of the interview. Determining the number of sophomore students not contacted was hampered by poor, inaccurate school records (in some cases, no records were made

available) and by students with double-statuses (classified as junior but taking sophomore courses). In total, information was collected from 7,972 sophomore students. This total figure includes Mississippi's participation and non-whites other than blacks.

Wave II

In 1968, senior students were interviewed in the same selected high schools. The approximate size and number of senior classes are shown in Table 1 for the five states which participated in the second data collection. (Mississippi did not participate in Wave II.) Although no senior class had an enrollment above 200, South Carolina had the largest class size averaging 125 students per class in its 38 selected schools. These large classes inflated the average size for all the SYS schools. In spite of the total average of approximately 79 students, half of the school's senior enrollments were less than 49 students (Table 1).

Within each of the 96 schools of the SYS, students were again administered questionnaires similar to the 1966 schedule. After the group interviews were conducted, students were matched according to their participation in both waves of the study. The matching process sorted out both new students who had transferred in the interim and original students who failed to be interviewed. Student attrition between 1966 and 1968 was attributed to: (1) out-of-state migration; (2) transferal to a school system that was not part of the SYS sample; (3) school drop-outs; and (4) absenteeism the day of the interview.

Wave III

A second follow-up was conducted in the Summer, 1972 in an effort to interview respondents four years after they were expected to have graduated

from high school. A sample was drawn from the original pool of students. This sample procedure was necessitated by the anticipated wide dispersion of the respondents following high school graduation and by linked resources available to the participating states for locating and interviewing these students. Consequently, a decision was made by the SYS Technical Committee to select 250 respondents from the larger pool of students for each state. The panel was to be stratified 50:50 by race (Black:White) and 60:40 by sex (Male:Female). Thus, in each state, 75 Black and 75 White males and 50 Black and 50 White females were randomly selected from the pool of high school students who had participated in the first two waves of the study. Hypothetically, a panel of 1250 persons was possible with the collective effort (White, 1974). However, Louisiana and Mississippi were to select respondents from the wave in which they had participated. Although Louisiana had not taken part in 1966, social origin and school tracking information, which had been collected for the other SYS states in 1966, was sought in 1968. Mississippi had only 234 original participants in 1966. Consequently, when the state joined the 1972 follow-up effort, its total pool of students was needed to approximate the ideal SYS quota of 250. With the Mississippi sample, the total SYS panel potential was 1484.

After determining sample ratios and selecting panel members, an extensive locating procedure was initiated. Initially, verification of student addresses was made. Parents or relatives were contacted regarding the current address of particular panel members. Individuals who had remained in-state were personally interviewed.

The research instrument employed consisted of two major sections.

The first section contained questions chosen from instruments and measures used in prior waves. These questions, which the respondent completed, related to aspirational and expectational attitudes toward a number of social status issues. The second part of the instrument contained new questions designed to measure current activities and attainments of respondents. Questions of this nature were presented by field interviewers who recorded the replies. In a few instances, questionnaires were mailed or telephone interviews were conducted for panel members who had migrated long distances. If an individual had left the state of origin, but remained within the SYS region, a cooperative effort was made between the research teams of the participating states to administer the personal interviews. The research instrument employed in both cases was identical to that used for interviewing the majority of the panel. However, for mail-out-situations, a detailed set of instructions accompanied the questionnaire.

The total number of respondents interviewed by Fall, 1972 was 1,228 for the six participating states. In Table 2 a breakdown of the SYS panel size is presented for each wave by state. When compared with the intended stratification ratios in 1972, the completed reinterviews were: by race---59.1 percent White and 40.9 percent Black; by sex---57.1 percent Male and 42.9 percent Female.

Wave IV

The focus of this 1979, fourth-wave study was to take repeated measurements on the core attitudinal and behavioral variables utilized in earlier SYS surveys. In addition, a greatly expanded array of attainment and occupational history information was requested. The major sections of

the interview schedule were as follows: (1) Work History Section; (2) Educational and Training Section; (3) Family Section; (4) Residence Section; and (5) General Information Section.

During 1979, relocation efforts were made in each of the six states through contacting last-known-addresses, high schools (where possible), probable acquaintances, and at times, an on-site visit to the original county using a "snow-ball" strategy.

By early 1980, around 75 percent of the 1972 third-wave panel of 1,228 had been relocated and had responded to a mail questionnaire (see Appendix B). Some telephone interviewing was done on a call-back basis to verify illogical responses or collect nonresponses to significant portions of the instrument. A total of 964, or 78.5 percent, of the earlier members of the SYS panel were retained. The completed re-interviews for 1979 were (see Table 2): by race---64.7 percent White and 35.3 percent Black; by sex---54.5 percent Male and 45.5 percent Female.

Overview of Instruments and Variables

A variety of questionnaire items were utilized throughout the SYS project. Listed below are those variables employed in at least one SYS survey. It should be noted that many variables were repeated in subsequent data collection efforts. A special emphasis of the SYS project was the measurement of attitude change and stability of rural youth regarding career-related orientations. A listing of the variables included in the SYS is provided below:

The full instrumentation for Waves III (1972) and IV (1979) is provided in Appendices A and B, respectively.

II. Organization of Data Tape and User Suggestions

This section briefly discusses the organization of the four-wave Southern Youth Study data tape (called SYS79). This includes descriptions of the raw data file and the accompanying data management software file, suggestions for users in generating the file, and a description of the codebook entries found in the following section. The SYS79 tape has a simple two-file structure residing on one unlabeled, EBCDIC, 9-track, 1600 bpi magnetic tape. File 1 is the raw data file while File 2 contains an SPSS control card deck, minus the local system job-control language (JCL), to generate a fully documented SPSS System File (see Nie et al., 1975 and updates). We recommend using these two files together to insure data integrity and compatibility with the supporting codebook documentation.

File 1: Raw Data File

The raw data are structured as five records per respondent: 4,820 records with a maximum of 130 characters per record. (For the exact record format, see codebook or SPSS dictionary format.) In terms of variables, the raw data contain 486 actual variables. All characters are numeric (the alphanumerics, 'X', 'Y', and 'Z', contained in the SYS72 file of 1,228 respondents were modified; see codebook portion). File 1 contains 4,820 blocks with LRECL = 130, BLKSIZE = 130, RECFM = F.

File 2: SPSS Software

This file contains a relatively complete SPSS control deck for use with the raw data file. The user should examine this program deck carefully so that the appropriate local system JCL can be added. These requirements particularly refer to user-controlled external file assignments, such

as to read the raw data and to output (if desired) a fully-processed SPSS System File (i.e., "SAVE FILE" requirements). Some other changes may be necessary as well (e.g., we assume TAPE input, 5,000 word TRANSPAGE and 5,000 WORKSPACE, etc.).

Most all of the data codes have a VALUE LABEL attached to them. Some exceptions include the three-digit Census occupational and industrial variables from Wave IV (these are included in an Appendix), the Duncan SEI variables (see Appendix C), and variables in a logical metric, such as "years", and so forth. All of these unlabeled codes, however, are fully noted in the codebook entry with explanations.

Since the complete SPSS System File contains less than 500 variables, an Archive File structure is unnecessary. However, SYS79 users wishing to do extensive scale or index construction, factor or canonical variate scoring, etc., may find it desirable to create an SPSS Archive File structure to accommodate such data modification. Users wishing to utilize other statistical analysis packages (e.g., SAS, BMDP, OSIRIS) should investigate local system availability of the appropriate SPSS Interface software. There is nothing, of course, to prevent users from building their own alternate statistical package files from scratch if they desire except the maintenance of data integrity and documentation compatibility. Another suggestion, by way of decreasing computational costs, is to build smaller "working files" for each research project but we hesitate to project any substantial cost reduction being realized from this practice given the present size of the SYS79 file. Users nonetheless may want to investigate this aspect.

No SPSS Subfile structure has been imposed on the file in this release. However, it may be highly expedient for users to do so given the traditional

interest by SYS researchers to analyze separate subgroups. Thus, subfiles by sex, race and state may be readily generated (see Nie et al., 1975). A final note is that the SPSS software file contains a total of 888 images with 888 blocks at LRECL = 80, BLKSIZE = 80, RECFM = F.

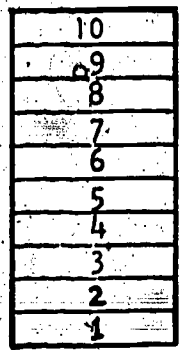

NOTE 1

The occupational variables in the SYS79 data file correspond to three scales or metrics. These coding schemes are not, however, common to all occupational variables. That is, every SYS79 occupational variable is not represented by three different codes. The only common scale among them is Duncan's Socio-Economic Index (SEI). The major shortcoming to this anomaly is the lack of flexibility accorded by using the U.S. Census Bureau Occupational and Industrial classifications which have now more or less become the "standard" occupational scheme in survey research. Nonetheless, since most SYS79 users will be largely interested in the socioeconomic status dimension of occupation this limitation may indeed be a small one.

The classification schemes available in the SYS79 include: (1) Duncan SEI (Waves I - IV, see Appendix C); (2) Modified Alba Edwards categories (see Note 2; Waves I - III); and (3) U.S. Census Bureau 1970 Detailed Occupational and Industrial categories (Wave IV only; see Appendixes C and D). The SEI scores for Waves I - III are in the 1960 version while those in Wave IV correspond to the 1970 reconciliation (see Hauser and Featherman, 1977: 59).

Wave IV occupations were coded through conventions outlined in Hauser and Featherman's standardized procedures (1977: 59-80) and the 1979 SEI scores are generated via SPSS data modification software from the Census three-digit occupational code.

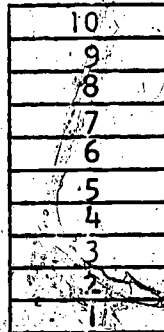

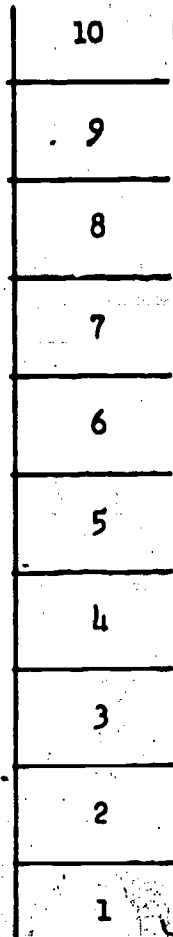
