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ABSTRACT

Historical and current U.S. data are presented on women and minorities both working in health fields and preparing for these fields as students. The 96 statistical tables with accompanying text concern trends in the education and employment of minorities (Part I) and men and women (Part II) for the following health occupations: physicians, dentists, optometrists, pharmacists, podiatrists, veterinarians, nurses, public health personnel, and selected allied health personnel. Tables include the following: enrollments in the various health education programs, graduation rates, comparison of minority women first-year enrollment and total enrollments by discipline, graduates by individual school and racial/ethnic category, salaried faculty for each discipline by racial/ethnic category and sex, applications to health professions schools by sex, enrollment and graduation rates by sex, and number of active federal and civilian practitioners in each discipline by sex. 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Preface

For a number of years there has been sustained, significant interest in increasing the access of minorities and women to careers in the health fields. As an expression of the social changes which led to this interest, a variety of legislatively mandated Federal programs dating back nearly 20 years have provided financial and other incentives aimed at bringing more minorities and women into the health fields. Many of these programs were incorporated into the Health Professions Educational Assistance Act (PL 94-484, as amended), with most programs administered by the Bureau of Health Professions (BHPr) or the Office of Health Resources Opportunity (OHRO) of the Health Resources Administration (HRA) or by components of the Health Services Administration (HSA). Both HSA and HRA are themselves components of the Public Health Service, Department of Health and Human Services.

The major function of HRA's Bureau of Health Professions is to support development of an adequate supply, mixture, and distribution of health personnel to meet the Nation's health care needs. In addition, the Bureau—and the Office of Health Resources Opportunity, also within HRA—have the objective of promoting the increase of minority and female access to and representation in health careers. In 1974, the Bureau issued a report, DHEW Publication No. (HRA) 75-22, entitled Minorities and Women in the Health Fields. That report presented a collection of statistical tables containing much of the then available data on the representation of minorities and women in the health professions and in health professions education programs. The report proved useful to many persons and organizations, and was twice updated and expanded under the same title; in 1975 as DHEW Publication No. (HRA) 76-22 and in 1978 as DHEW Publication No. (HRA) 79-22. The present report updates and expands on the data included in the earlier reports.

Many of the data in this report deal with minority and women enrollments in and graduates from schools providing preparation for work in the health occupations. In only a few instances, however, are recent data available concerning minorities and women actually practicing in these fields. The data presented also do not cover all aspects of the minority and women situation, nor do they present all available data. Nevertheless, it is believed that the report can be helpful in understanding the status of minorities and women in the health fields and in assessing the progress being made toward a more balanced racial/ethnic and male/female distribution in the health fields.

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Introduction

This report presents selected information on minorities and women working in the health fields and preparing for these fields as students in health professions schools. The report is divided into two sections. The first section consists of a series of tables presenting available educational and employment data for racial and ethnic minorities in the health fields. The second section of the report contains substantially the same information, cross classified by sex rather than by race or ethnicity.

Minority Definitions

In using the first section of this report, it should be recognized that no universally accepted definitions of racial/ethnic categories currently exist.

Data presented in this report are generally classified according to one of the two sets of definitions originating in the Federal government's Office of Management and Budget (OMB) or the Bureau of the Census, both of which have been widely used by data collectors.

The Census Bureau system of minority classifications--which is also used by the Bureau of Labo Statistics and a number of other agencies--is actually comprised of two independent sets of definitions. The Census Bureau treats race and ethnicity as different categories; a person can be classified either by his anthropological characteristics (race), or by the country from which he or his ancestors emigrated (ethnicity). The Census Bureau thus presents separate tables by race and by ethnic background for many subjects. The aspect of this system most likely to cause confusion in this report is the fact that the Census Bureau does not consider "Hispanic" and "Black" to be mutually exclusive minority categories, although many other organizations have collected data on this basis. An Hispanic person can be of any race: White, Black, American Indian, Asian, or other. Consequently, in Census Bureau data presented here, a person whose race is Black and whose ethnic background is Hispanic, is included in both categories for any statistics under consideration. - Multi-occupation employment data presented in this report were obtained from either the Bureau of Labor Statistics or the Census Bureau and thus use this Census Bureau system of minority classifications.

The system of racial/ethnic classifications issued by the Office of Management and Budget in 1975 melds racial and ethnic distinctions and assumes that all persons can be placed in one of five mutually exclusive racial/ethnic categories. These are: 1) White (not of Hispanic origin); 2) American Indian or Alaskan Native; 3) Asian or Pacific Islander; 4) Black (not of Hispanic origin); and 5) Hispanic. These designations are customarily shortened to White, American Indian, Asian, Black, and Hispanic, respectively, which is also done in this report. The latter four are "minority" categories. It is this minority definition system which is used for all educational data and all single-occupation employment data presented in this report. The major deviations from this rule are in medical education data, which subdivide Hispanic into Mexican-American, Puerto Rican, and Other Hispanic, and in data collected by a few health professional organizations which continue to employ

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an "Other Minority" category. Thus, it is important that readers examine very carefully the definitions of the data presented in this report.

Choice of Data

In assessing the status of women and minorities in the health fields, problems of interpretation often arise due to difficulties in obtaining comparable data in different health occupations, and in obtaining trend data when data collection efforts have altered methodologies and priorities from year to year. Consequently, identification and presentation of data elements which would be most appropriate for assessing women and minority status provides only a starting point for choosing the most significant data elements for understanding the current situation.

As indicated, this report presents data from two separate standpoints -education and employment. Employment data in the two sections of the report,
"Racial/Ethnic" and "Male/Female", reflect the most recent data available in
each occupation, disaggregated geographically by region and State and, when
applicable, also by specialty. Since professional education is the
prerequisite for entry into the health occupations, data pertaining to
education yields insights—into the entry of women and minorities—into the
health occupations. The most important educational information relates to
first-year enrollments and graduates, which represent the beginning and
completion of the educational process and, when examined over time, reveal the
movement of women and minorities toward greater participation in health
occupations. Data on applicants, faculties, and individual schools, which
supplement the appraisal of student and graduate data, are also presented
where possible.

Availability of Data

The above section has described which types of data would best portray the current status of women and minorities in the health fields and the progress they have made over time. However, many of these ideal data items are not available; this report has thus attempted to identify and present the best available data that can illuminate the situation under examination.

For employment in the health occupations, the only sources of recent data disaggregated by State or region are generally those provided or collected by health professional associations. These organizations obtain data from membership records, frequently supplemented by sample surveys. While health professional associations customarily maintain a sex-identifying code in each member's record, they do not customarily include a code designating race or ethnicity. Consequently, this report presents—geographically disaggmegated employment data for many occupations in the "Male/Female" section, but not in the "Racial/Ethnic" section.

The other major source of health occupation employment data is the Bureau of the Census. However, detailed occupational employment data from the 1980 Census of Population will not be available until late 1982. Other employment data collected by the Census Bureau's Current Population Survey (CPS); for the Bureau of Labor Statistics are included in this report where other data are unavailable. Where such Census data are presented, however, it should be remembered that such Census data on health occupations, both from the decennial Census or the CPS, are subject to many caveats and cautions. This reflects such problems as small sample sizes, lack of familiarity on the part of interviewers with health occupational definitions, and self- and family-member reporting of occupations. The most serious and frequent problem is the misclassification of auxiliaries as professionals, e.g. the classification of a dental hygienist as a dentist. Below are other examples of problems encountered in Census data.

- A follow-up sample survey was conducted of the 841,000 persons classified as registered nurses in the labor force in the 1970 Decennial Census. Of these, 186,000 were found not to have been licensed to practice as registered nurses at the time of the Census. Over 90 percent of the group were found to be graduates of other health occupational programs, such as practical nursing, or of non-health related occupational programs.
- Comparison of Census and other data on female dentists reveal an additional instance of Census overcounting. Table 7 of this report quotes the Bureau of Labor Statistics as indicating that there are 6,000 practicing female dentists in the U.S. However, Table 64 of this report indicates that in the nine year period from 1972 through 1980, fewer than 3,000 women graduated from the Nation's schools of dentistry. From other sources not presented in this report, it is also known that the annual average number of female dental graduates from the late 1940's through 1971 was less than 30. This clearly indicates that the number of female dentists reported by the Bureaus of the Census and of Labor Statistics for 1980 is an overestimate.

The health education data presented here also may frequently differ from the theoretical ideal of what such data should be. In some occupations, either first-year enrollment data, graduate data, or both were unavailable. The most important substitute data in each case was in total enrollment, which are shown. Tables presenting trend data also vary to the degree to which they extend into the past, although few tables present data from any year earlier than the late sixties. While some health professional organizations have kept records of Black enrollment in traditionally Black schools, no data sets detailing total enrollments of Blacks or other minority groups appear to exist prior to the late 1960's. Similarly, data on females in health occupations educational programs prior to 1968 are available only for a limited period, and principally in medicine.

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On balance, therefore, data presented here have not been deemed to be the most significant, meaningful, and definitive data on minorities and women. Rather, they are the most current, useful data available by which to identify the status, progress, and problems of minorities and women in the health fields. It is hoped that the reader will read, review, and understand these data in that context.

Part I. Racial/Ethnic Section

This section provides selected highlights of the racial/ethnic characteristics of health personnel and students. In each subsection of this part, the corresponding table numbers are listed at the end of the text.

According to the 1980 Census of Population, 16.8 percent of the resident population of the United States is comprised of racial minorities. This racial minority population is made up of Blacks (11.7 percent), American Indians, Eskimos, and Aleuts (0.6 percent), Asians and Pacific Islanders (1.5 percent), and Other (3.0 percent). Hispanics of all races (including White, Black, and other) represent 6.4 percent of the resident population.

In the early 1980's, the racial/ethnic minority representation in first-year classes of health occupations schools range from a low of 5.1 percent for veterinary medicine to 13.2 percent for allopathic medicine and to a high of 22.7 percent for schools of public health. Blacks and Asians were the most numerous minority groups in all health occupations schools except veterinary medicine, which enrolled more Hispanics than Asians (in 1980).

Estimated employment figures (Current Population Survey, U.S. Bureau of the Census) for 1980 show Blacks and other racial minorities filling nearly 11 percent of all white collar health jobs, while Hispanics hold 2 percent of such jobs. Blacks and other racial minorities are heavily represented in health service jobs, holding 24.2 percent of such positions. Less than 4 percent of health service workers are of Hispanic origin. (See tables 1 through 7.)

The remaining test in this part presents highlights of the racial/ethnic characteristics of nealth personnel and students by individual occupation.

Medicine

- * After many years of increases, the number of all applicants to U.S. medical schools has declined in each of the past several years and thus the overall rate of acceptances increased. However, the numbers of minority applicants has remained relatively stable, leading to minority acceptance rates that are lower than total acceptance rates.
- * First-year minority enrollment in U.S. medical schools has increased significantly since 1968-69 from 4.2 percent to 13.2 percent. Black representation in entering classes has changed little since 1970-71, but all other minority groups have gradually increased their proportions of the first-year enrollment since that time.
- * Following the pattern noted for first-year enrollments, Blacks have comprised around 5 percent of the Nation's graduating medical classes in every year since 1974-75. Other minority groups, however, are increasing their proportions of graduating classes, particularly Asians and Mexican-Americans.



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- * Nearly one-quarter of all Black medical graduates in 1979-80 graduated from the two predominantly Black schools of medicine, Howard and Meharry, which account for 1.5 percent of total graduates
- * There was virtually no change in the racial/ethnic or male/female composition of medical school faculties between 1975 and 1978. Minorities comprised 10.8 percent of medical faculties in each year with individual minority groups also retaining representations in 1978 identical to those in 1975. (See tables 8 through 15.)

Osteopathic Medicine

- * Racial/ethnic minority groups have more than doubled their proportion of new enrollments in U.S. osteopathic medical schools during the seventies, rising from 3 temperally 7 percent. Blacks continue to be the largest group.
- * In 1979-80, Michigan State University College of Osteopathic Medicine contained the highest proportion of minorities of any U.S. school of osteopathic medicine. More than one third of U.S. minority osteopathic students and a majority of all Black osteopathic medical students, were in attendance at that school. (See tables 16 through 18.)

Dentistry |

- * Since 1971-72, the minority proportion of first-year enrollments in dental schools has risen by more than four percentage points to 13 percent: Asians are now the Pargest individual minerity group among dental school first-year enrollments.
- * Ten percent of the 1979-80 graduates of dental schools were members of racial/ethnic minority groups. Hispanics have been the minority dental graduates showing the greatest proportional increase over the past decade.
- * Nearly 40 percent of all Blacks who graduated from U.S. dental schools in 1980 were from Howard University and Meharry Medical College, the Nation's two predominantly Black dental schools.
- * Minority representation on dental school faculties increased from 6 percent in 1975-76 to nearly 8 percent in 1980-81. (See tables 19 through 23.)

Optometry

* The minority proportion of total enrollment in schools of optometry remained between 6 and 8 percent throughout the seventies.

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In 1979-80, the West Coast optometry schools - Southern California, California at Berkeley, and Pacific University (in Oregon) -- enrolled more than half of all U.S. minority optometry students. In these schools as well as in the Nation as a whole, Asians comprise the majority of minority optometry students. (See Tables 24 and 25.)

Pharmacy

- * The proportion of third-last-year minority students (i.e., students in the first year of professional pharmacy education) in schools of pharmacy increased by more than 4/percentage points between 1973-74 and 1979-80, reaching 12.3 percent. /Blacks increased from 3.3 to 4.9 percent and Asians from 3.0 to 4.6/percent during this period. The other groups remained relatively stable.
- * Representation of minorities in pharmacy graduating classes has remained very close to 8.5 percent throughout the seventies.
- * Florida Agricultural and Mechanical, Howard, Xavier of Louisiana, and Texas Southern, the four predominantly Black pharmacy schools, awarded nearly half of all first pharmacy degrees earned by Black pharmacy graduates in 1979-80. (See tables 26 through 29.)

<u>Podiatry</u>

- * Minority representation in first-year podiatry classes in the U.S. dropped slightly in 1980-81 from the previous year. However, at 10.4 percent, it was nearly three times what it was in 1971-72.
- * Nearly one-half of all Black podiatry students in 1980-81 attended the Ohio College of Podiatric Medicine. In the same year, one-half of all Asian podiatry students attended the California College of Podiatric Medicine. (See tables 30 through 32.)

Veterinary Medicine

- * Between 1971-72 and 1980-81, minority enrollment in U.S. schools of veterinary medicine rose from 2.6 percent to nearly 5 percent.
- * Approximately three-fourths of all Black students of Veterinary medicine in 1980-81 were enrolled at the Nation's one predominantly Black veterinary school, Tuskegee Institute. (See tables 33 and 34.)

Nursing

- * After several years of increases, between 1974-75 and 1977-78 (the two most recent years for which data are available), minority admissions in all types of nursing programs, including both those preparing registered nurses and those preparing practical nurses, have declined. The largest
 - decline took place in the baccalaureate degree programs, which fell from 16.7 to 12.3 percent. The bulk of this decrease resulted from oecreases in admissions of Blacks.
- * Minority representation in graduating classes of all types of nursing programs have also declined between 1974-75 and 1977-78. Among all graduates of registered nursing programs reporting in 1977-78, Blacks constituted less than 5 percent.
- An estimated 4.2 percent of employed Registered Nurses in November 1980 were Black. Hispanics, American Indians, and Asians comprised 1.4 percent, 0.2 percent, and 2.3 percent, respectively, of employed R.N.'s. The proportion of employed Black R.N.'s was significantly higher than the national average in the South, while Hispanic and Asian R.N.'s were represented more fully in the West than nationall. (See tables 35 through 37.)

Public Health

- * Throughout the mid to late seventies, first-year minority enrollment in schools of public health varied between 20 and 25 percent.
- * Graduating classes of schools of public health had a minority component of approximately 15 percent during the 1974-75 to 1978-79 period. (See tables 38 through 40.)

Allied Health

* Minorities comprised three to four and one-half percent of dental hygiene graduates throughout the seventies. Dental assisting graduating classes increased their minority representation through the seventies, to 14 percent in 1980. Minorities in dental laboratory technology graduating classes ranged between 15 and 26 percent between 1973 and 1980. (See tables 41 through 43.)



Student data are scarce for the allied health occupations. For many of the occupations, 1975 is the latest year for which data are available. Although comprehensive data will not be available until later in 1982, preliminary results (1979-80 data) from a new survey of collegiate allied health programs indicate that 9 percent of total enrollments in the 55 fields included in the survey are Black, 3 percent Hispanic, and 3 percent other (Asian, American Indian, etc.). These data also indicate that a large majority (75 percent) of the total enrollments in these 55 occupations are women. In only a few of those programs are there more men than women. (Additional information from this survey will be available later in 1982 from the American Society of Allied Health Professions, One Dupont Circle, Suite 300, D.C. 20036.)

- This portion of the population has sometimes been designated as "black and other races," a term which was actually used to cover all races other than white.
- 3/ The sharp increase from 1979 to 1980 in the number of persons designated as "black and other racial minorities" can be attributed to three principal factors in the 1980 Census of the Population: 1) change in 1980 of race classification of large numbers of persons of Hispanic origin from "white" to "other" (Hispanics may actually be white, black, or members of other races); 2) greatly increased immigration of Asians and of persons of Hispanic origin; and 3) change in classification of Asian Indians, who were classified as "white" in the 1970 Census and as "Asian" in 1980.

Part II. Male/Female Section

7

This section provides highlights of the male/female characteristics of health personnel and students.

The most recent entering classes to the Nation's major health professions schools continue to show increasing proportions of women in almost every instance at their historical peak. More than 40 percent of first-year classes in pharmacy and veterinary medical schools were female. Allopathic medicine and optometry admitted new classes containing more than 20 percent women. Females comprised between 10 and 20 percent of new enrollees at osteopathic medicine, dentistry, and podiatry schools.

Over the past 30 years, pharmacy has increased its percentage of female degree recipients more than any other traditionally male-dominated health profession. Women now earn more than two-fifths of all pharmacy degrees. The next highest proportion of women graduates -- one-third -- were from veterinary medical schools., Women earned slightly more than one-fifth of allopathic medicine degrees and less than one-fifth of osteopathic medicine, dentistry, optometry, and podi ry degrees. (See tables 44 through 47.)

<u>Medicine</u>

- In academic year 1978-79 the proportion of female applicants accepted to U.S. medical schools dropped below that of males for the first time in ten years. This can largely be attributed to the steady decline since 1974-75 in total male applicants coupled with the relatively stable size of the female applicant pool during the same period.
- * The female proportion of first-year enrollments, which only doubled in the forty years prior to 1969-70 (to 9.1 percent), more than tripled in the decade of the seventies. In 1980-81, nearly 29 percent of new enrollees at U.S. medical schools were women.
- Prior to 1960, graduating classes from medical schools rarely contained more than one in 20 women graduates. In 1980, approximately one out of every four medical graduates was female.
- * The proportion of women graduates from U.S. medical schools in 1979-80 varied from 6.7 percent at the University of Arizona to 55.6 percent at the formerly all-woman school, Medical College of Pennsylvania.
- * Women comprised 10.1 percent of all active physicians in 1979.
 Reflecting the recent large increase in women graduates, women were even better represented among residents and full-time hospital physician staff. This situation has changed since 1963 when medical research showed the highest proportion of female physicians. For each year for

which data were available, office-based practice has been the professional activity with the lowest proportion of women.

While 10 percent of all practitioners in 1979 were female, more than 20 percent of practitioners in pediatrics, physical medicine/rehabilitation, and public health were female. (See tables 48 through 58.)

Osteopathy

- First-year enrollments of females in schools of osteopathic medicine increased from 4 percent in 1968-69 to over 16 percent in 1976-77.

 / After remaining at that level for three years, the female proportion of first-year osteopathy classes rose to nearly 19 percent in 1979-80.
- * Female graduates of schools of osteopathic medicine made up more than 16 percent of all graduates in 1978-79. Ten years earlier fewer than 2 percent of such graduates were women) (See Tables 59 through 61.)

Dentistry

- * The proportion of females in entering classes in schools of dentistry has risen steadily over the past decade, rising from 1 percent in 1968-69 to 20 percent in 1980-81.
- Female graduates have comprised a continually increasing proportion of dental graduating classes. The 715 women dental graduates of 1979-80 represented nearly 14 percent of the total in that year, as compared with 1 percent in 1971-72.
- Because the female proportion of each class of dental graduates did not begin to increase significantly until the early 1970's, women graduates have not yethad a significant impact on the current number of active dentists. In May 1980, only 2.2 percent of all active civilian dentists were women -- for below their percentage of recent graduating classes.
- Momen represent only 1 percent of active dental specialists. The most significant differences between male and female dental specialists are the relatively higher proportions of male specialists in oral surgery and the higher proportion of female specialists in pedodonitcs. (See tables 62 through 67.)

Optometry

The 1979-80 first-year class of U.S. schools of optometry was nearly one-fourth (22.9 percent) female, a proportion nine times greater than that of only a decade earlier.





While naturally lagging behind the percentage of women in first-year enrolment, the representation of women in graduating optometry classes has risen steadily, reaching 15.5 percent in 1979-80, as compared with 2.3 percent in 1970-71. (See tables 68 through 70.)

Pharmacy

- * The proportion of women in U.S. third-last-year pharmacy classes (i.e., first year of professional pharmacy education) rose steadily through the seventies; more than 48 percent of the 1980-81 class was female.
- * More than two-fifths of pharmacy degrees in 1979-80 were awarded to women. In 1969-70, the comparable proportion was one-fifth.
- * In 1979-80, 12 of the 71 pharmacy schools (for which data were available) awarded at least as many professional degrees to women as to men. (See tables 71 through 73.)

<u>Podiatry</u>

- * Women have comprised 11 to 12 percent of total enrollment at U.S. schools of podiatric medicine since 1977-78, after rising from less than 2 percent at the beginning of the 1970's.
- * The five podiatry schools varied little in their proportions of female enrollment in 1980-81, ranging only between 10 and 15 percent. (See tables 74 and 75.)

Veterinary Medicine

- * The female proportion of entering veterinary medical classes increased by nearly five times between 1968-69 and 1980-81, rising from 9.0 percent to 43.4 percent.
- One-third of all graduating veterinarians in 1980 were female, although percentages at individual schools varied from 15 to 45 percent.
- Nine and one-half percent of active veterinarians in the U.S. in 1980 were women. The Northeast and West regions were slightly above the national average in this respect. The state with the highest female proportion of veterinarians was Michigan at 16 percent. (See tables 76 through 79.)

Nursing

- Male admissions to, and graduations from, both registered and practical nursing programs rose during the 1960's but remained largely unchanged during the 1970's. First-year enrollments of men in RN programs have remained at 6 to 7 percent throughout the last decade.
- * Men comprised an estimated 3.0 percent of the Nation's employed registered nurses in November 1980. The comparable regional statistics ranged only from 2.5 percent in the North Central region to 3.8 percent in the West. (See tables 80 through 82.)

Public Health

- * The proportion of women submitting sapidations to, enrolling in, and graduating from U.S. schools of public health increased moderate / from approximately 45 percent in 1974-75 to more than 50 percent by 1978-79.
- * Faculties of schools of public health were approximately 27 percent female throughout the 1974-75 to 1972-79 period. (See tables 83 through 86.)

Allied Health

- * Dental hygiene and dental assisting graduating classes is ained overwhelmingly female during the 1970's. However, detail aboratory technology, a traditionally male dominated occupation new years 42 percent of its graduating classes be women.
- * From the late 1960's through 1977-78, movement toward a more even male-female distribution, as represented by degree conferred, appeared to be taking place in hospital administration, medical record librarianship, medical laboratory technology, and cadiologic technology.
- * Such movements toward a more even male-female distribution do not appear to be occurring as rapidly in occupational therapy, physical therapy, and speech pathology and audiology. (See tables, 87 through 96.)
