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ABSTRACT

In spring 1984, a follow-up survey was conducted to gather data about the activities and perceptions of Lane Community College (LCC) students after leaving the institution. The survey focused on graduates, "no formal award completers" and "early leavers" of the 50 vocational programs offered at LCC. Overall, 623 former students responded to the survey for a response rate of 57.5%. Study findings include the following: (1) among "early leavers" (i.e., those enrolled during fall 1983, but not during fall 1984), 51.7% were 28 years old or younger, 12.2% were ethnic group members, and 30.8% were disadvantaged or handicapped; (2) "no formal award completers" (i.e., students who had achieved 70 or more credits and did not return to LCC in fall 1984) had the highest percentage (37.6%) of respondents currently attending school; (3) the majority of those currently in school indicated that their studies related to their training at LCC; (4) 79.6% of the graduates were employed; (5) 24.0% of the graduates, 11.0% of the "no formal award completers" and 10.9% of the "early leavers" were earning \$1,500 or more per month; (6) 85% of graduates rated technical knowledge and skills training at LCC as either good or very good; (7) the primary reasons "early leavers" left LCC were lack of money and dissatisfaction with their academic performance; and (8) the primary reasons "no formal award completers" left LCC were to transfer and lack of money. 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## SURVEY HIGHLIGHTS

- Overall, 623 former students responded to the 1983-84 student follow-up survey for a response rate of 57.5%.
- Overall, 50.8% of the respondents were female and 49.2% male.
- The early leavers were slightly younger with 51.7% of the students 28 years or younger compared to 44.8% for the graduate students.
- Of the early leavers, 30.8% were disadvantaged or handicapped.
- Early leavers had the highest total percentage of ethnic group representation (12.2%) (excluding the "other" category).
- No formal award students had the highest percentage of respondents currently attending school (both part- and full-time) at 37.6%.
- Over 50% of all former students who were currently in school indicated that their studies were related to their training at LCC.
- Of the graduate students, 79.6% were employed either part- or full-time.
- Of those graduates who were employed, 80.9% were employed in a job that related to their studies at LCC.
- Of the graduates, 24.0% were earning \$1,500 or more per month. No formal award students had 11.0% and early leavers had 10.9% earning \$1,500 or more.
- A majority of former students who were employed were working in Lane County.
- For all groups, the largest number of students who left Lane County did so to find employment in their field.
- Of the graduates, over 85% rated their technical knowledge and technical skills training either good or very good.
- Student Records, Admissions, Registration, Bookstore, and Library were the services most used by graduates and no formal award students.
- Early leavers used all LCC services listed on the survey significantly less than did the graduates and no formal award completers.
- Of the graduates, more than 70% indicated the services provided by Financial Aid, Health Services, and the Veteran's Office were very satisfactory.
- The primary reason for no formal award completers attending Lane Community College was to complete lower division classes for transfer to a four-year college.
- Two of the primary reasons early leavers left LCC before receiving a degree or certificate were: 1) lack of money; and, 2) dissatisfaction with their academic performance.
- Two of the primary reasons no formal award completers left LCC before receiving a degree or certificate were: 1) transferred to another college; and 2) lack of money.

## INTRODUCTION

Since 1974, Lane Community College has participated in the annual statewide follow-up study of former community college students. Funds for this effort are provided by the Oregon Department of Education through the allocation of federal vocational education monies. It should be noted here that 1983-84 is the last year funds will be provided in this manner.

This report summarizes the findings of the 1983-84 Lane Community College follow-up study. The year 1983-84 refers to the year from which the population of graduates, no formal awards completers, and early leavers was selected. This survey was conducted in the spring of 1984.

### The 1983-84 Follow-up Questionnaire

The goal of the annual follow-up study is to gather data about the activities and perceptions of community college students after leaving the institution. While each college was responsible for selecting or designing its own instrument, a basic list of questionnaire items was provided by the ODE in order to ensure compliance with federal mandates (i.e., Vocational Educational Act of 1976) and state requirements.

The 1983-84 follow-up instrument used by Lane was the most comprehensive to date.

Specifically, the LCC services section was expanded and clarified as well as the primary reasons for attending LCC and the reasons for leaving LCC without receiving a formal degree or certificate. A copy of the survey may be found in Appendices B, C, and D.

In addition to the specific areas of concern, students were encouraged to provide any comments or suggestions which would be of assistance to the College. The additional comments given by the respondents may be found in Appendix B.

### Population

The 1983-84 Student Follow-up Survey focused on students who had been involved with one of the 50 vocational programs at Lane. All LCC graduates, "no formal awards completers" and "early leavers" were surveyed. No formal award completers were defined as students who had achieved 70 or more credits, had accumulated at least 15 credit hours during the 1983-84 academic year, and who did not return to the College in the fall of 1984. Early leavers were defined as those students who were enrolled as full-time students (i.e., 12 credit hours or more) during fall term 1983, and who did not return to the College in the fall of 1984. Using these guidelines, 643 vocational graduates, 274 no formal award students, and 323 early leavers were identified as the target population for the survey.

The questionnaire was mailed to the students with a request to the U.S. Postal Service to return to the College all surveys which were not deliverable. A second mailing was conducted to those students who did receive the first mailing but failed to respond. In lieu of a third mailing of the questionnaire, a phone follow-up of nonrespondents was conducted. The above process resulted in a response rate of 70.8% from the graduates, 46.2% from the no formal award completers, and 36.5% from the early leavers.

## RESPONDENT INFORMATION

In February 1985, follow-up questionnaires were sent to 643 vocational graduates (47 were undeliverable), 274 vocational no formal award completers (38 were undeliverable), and 323 vocational early leavers (71 were undeliverable). Of this group, 422 graduates, 109 no formal award completers, and 92 early leavers responded yielding response rates of 70.8%, 46.2%, and 36.5%, respectively. Post Office drops (those surveys that were deemed undeliverable) were deducted from the overall responses before calculating response rates.

Overall, 623 responded to the 1983-84 student follow-up survey, resulting in a response rate of 57.5%.

### Sex of Respondents

Table 1 shows the number of graduates, no formal award students, and early leavers responding to the 1983-84 survey. For the graduates, there were more female respondents (54.0%) than male. However, the no formal award students and early leavers had higher percentages of males responding at 54.1% and 58.2%, respectively. Overall, 50.8% of the females and 49.2% of the males responded. (Table 1) [NOTE: There are actually 422 graduates but most tables will only reflect 421 because there is one of unknown gender.]

### Age of Respondents

No formal award students are not displayed in Table 2 because of a data error. The male/female classification is not available because of programming problems.

The most frequently reported age range for graduates was "29-33." The second highest was "22-25." The early leavers' age range of "22-25" was the most frequently reported with the second highest being "34-39." The early leavers displayed a slightly younger population with 51.7% of the students 28 years or younger compared to 44.8% for the graduate students. (Table 2)

Disadvantaged/Handicapped Status of Respondents

The following definitions of disadvantaged, handicapped, and limited English proficiency students were used in 1983-84:

HANDICAPPED: One who is a client of the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation or who had identified self as handicapped on Student Information forms or who has received a handicapped parking sticker.

DISADVANTAGED: A student who received a BEOG (PELL) Grant or work study or a student who has enrolled in any course with a reimbursement code 3005.

LIMITED ENGLISH SPEAKING: A student who has enrolled in any course with a reimbursement code 3001. [NOTE: Limited English speaking students were aggregated with handicapped and disadvantaged students.]

Early leavers had the most disadvantaged/handicapped students at 30.8%. The number of female graduates (26.8%) and no formal award completers (40.0%) was significantly higher than their male counterparts at 17.1% and 18.6%, respectively. The male and female percentages refer to the percent of the same sex. For example, 40% of all female no formal award students were disadvantaged/handicapped. (Table 3)

Ethnic Group of Respondents

The largest ethnic group for all three categories was white (85.5% of the graduates, 86.2% of the no formal award completers, 75.8% of the early leavers). The females had noticeably fewer respondents in minority groups. It is interesting to note that the early leavers had the highest total percentage (excluding the "other" category) of ethnic groups (12.2%). The largest ethnic representations were Black and Indian for graduates, Black for no formal award students, and Black and Hispanic for early leavers. (Table 4).

## GENERAL SURVEY RESULTS

Because of their length, the rest of the tables appear after the completed narrative section of the General Survey Results. (The tables begin on page 13).

### Current Education Status

No formal award students had the highest percentage of respondents currently attending school (both part- and full-time) (37.6%). The male students (40.7%) were considerably higher than the females (26.0%). Of the early leavers, 89% were not attending school. The graduates also had a large percentage of their population (85.3%) not attending school. Since these are vocational graduates, that would seem logical. More male graduates (17.1%) are attending school (full- and part-time) than females (12.7%). For both graduates and no formal award completers, more students are attending school full-time than part-time. (Table 5, page 13)

### Relationship of Current Educational Studies to LCC Studies

It is encouraging to note that a majority of all former students who responded that they were currently in school indicated that their studies were related to their training at LCC. Early leavers had the lowest percentage (60.0%) while the no formal award students had the highest (87.8%). Female graduates (82.8%) and female no formal award students (100.0%) rank higher than their male counterparts. (Table 6, page 13)

### Current Employment Status

A majority of all the students were employed (part- and full-time) but there was considerable disparity between the three groups. The graduate respondents were highest with 79.6% of their population employed while the early leavers were low with 52.7% employed. In the category of "unemployed but seeking work," the early leavers were high with 14.3% unemployed. Both the no formal award completers (18.3%) and early leavers (16.5%) had a relatively high percentage of students who were not in the labor force (not seeking work).

In both the graduates and no formal award completers there were more female students employed than male students. It is also interesting to note that the percentage of males (in both graduates and no formal award students) not in the labor market was higher than females. (Table 7, page 14)

### Part- and Full-Time Work Status

All three groups had more students working full-time than part-time. The no formal award completers had the narrowest margin with 50.7% working full-time. Of the four gender categories only the no formal award female students had a higher percentage working part-time than full-time. (Table 8, page 15)

### Relationship of Present Job to Former Studies

Of those graduates who were employed, 80.9% were employed in a job that related to their studies at LCC. More female (85.9%) than male (74.8%) graduates were employed in jobs related to their former studies. No formal award

students had 58.9% of their population employed in related fields. There is no significant difference in the female and male percentages. The early leavers were trailing with 45.8% of the students employed in jobs related to their LCC studies. (Table 9, page 15)

A complete package of information containing employment information by vocational program was sent to the deans and appropriate department heads in October 1985. This information is also available in the Productivity Center.

#### Salaries

More graduates were employed in higher paying jobs with 24.0% of those students earning \$1,500 or more per month. No formal award completers had 11.0% and early leavers 10.9% earning \$1,500 or more. Both the graduates and no formal award students had a significantly higher percentage of males employed at the higher salary ranges: 32.9% male graduates compared to 16.8% females and 18.9% male no formal award completers compared to 2.8% females. The next highest category for graduates was "under \$499." This category was the largest for no formal awards and early leavers. For both graduates and no formal award completers, there were more females than males earning less than \$499.

A majority of the graduates (54.8%) were earning \$1,000 or more per month (i.e., 43.1% of the females and 69.2% of the males). The no formal award students follow with 28.7% earning \$1,000 or more (i.e., 22.2% of the females and 35.1% of the males). The early leavers trail, but not significantly, with 26.0% earning \$1,000 or more per month. (Table 10, page 15)

#### Hours Worked

All three of the groups had the largest number of respondents working 36-40 hours per week. However, no formal award students had 48.6% of their respondents working 35 or less hours compared to graduates (34.8%) and early leavers (37.5%). This was to be expected due to the large percentage of these students who were continuing their education. (Table 11, page 17)

#### Where Former Students are Working

Of those working, the majority of former students were working in Lane County (73.0% of the graduates, 64.9% of the no formal award completers, and 77.8% of the early leavers). On the other hand, 27.0% of the graduates, 35.2% of the no formal award completers, and 22.2% of the early leavers were working outside of Lane County. For both graduates and no formal award students, significantly more males were employed outside of Lane County. (Table 12, page 17)

#### Why Former Students Left Lane County

Of those who left Lane County, the largest number of students left Lane County to find employment in their field. An interesting second reason for graduates and no formal award completers was personal choice. A much higher percentage of females than males moved because of personal choice. The second reason for early leavers to leave Lane County was to find any employment. No formal award completers had a significant number of students leave Lane County to attend school. These students were primarily female (30.0%) compared to males (13.3%). (Table 13, page 18)

### How Former Students Rated Their Training at LCC

Of the graduates responding, over 85.0% rated their technical knowledge and technical skills training either good or very good. Life planning and management skills was rated the lowest with 59.0% rating those skills good and very good. Female graduates were more likely to rate their training very good as compared to their male counterparts. This was true in all areas except math skills where 38.2% of the males rated their training as very good compared to 32.0% of the females.

No formal award students perceived their training in technical knowledge, technical skills, math skills, and communication skills to be about equal as approximately 80% rated the training in these areas to be good and very good. The lowest rating was for life planning and management. A notably higher percentage of females than males felt the training for technical knowledge, technical skills and math skills was average. The reverse was true for reading skills, writing skills, communication skills, interpersonal skills, and life planning and management skills.

Of responding early leavers, 68%-77% rated all of their training as either good or very good. The highest was interpersonal skills at 76.9% and the lowest was writing skills at 68.8%. The largest number of "average" responses was for writing skills. Math skills were rated the lowest with 10.9% falling into the poor category. (Table 14, pages 19-21)

### Ratings of Additional LCC Areas

Graduates rated instructor advising the highest with 72.3% indicating the advising was either good or very good. Job placement was rated lowest with 37.1% indicating it was good or very good. Vocational counseling was rated in the middle. The largest number of average responses were assigned to vocational counseling. Of the graduates, 34.6% felt LCC job placement was poor to very poor. Overall, females were slightly more generous than males with their responses. Even though there were significantly low ratings for the different services, the "overall" ratings were more positive.

Instructor advising was ranked highest by the no formal award students with 73.8% responding to either good or very good. Vocational counseling and job placement were next with 44.9% and 41.6% rating these services good or very good. Of the no formal award respondents, 29.2% rated job placement as poor or very poor. Vocational counseling was rated as poor or very poor by 25.6% of the students. Female and male responses for vocational counseling were fairly even. There were substantially more female responses to good and very good for job placement. Overall, 74.3% of the no formal award respondents indicated that these general services were either good or very good.

Early leavers followed the same trend as graduates and no formal awards completers. They rated instructor advising the highest with 71.4% indicating the service was good or very good. Job placement was rated the lowest with 32.3% rating it as poor or very poor. Overall, 76.5% of the early leavers indicated that these general services were good or very good. (Table 15, pages 22-23)

### Services Former Students Used

Of the graduates, more than 80% indicated that they used Student Records, Admissions, Registration, Bookstore, and the Learning Resource Center. The Bookstore and Registration had the highest use. The least used services (less than 11% indicating they used the service) were student activities (government, athletics), Women's Center, peer assistance (student service associates) and Disabled Student Services. In the case of Disabled Student Services, the population who would use this service is considerably smaller than the general population. In the area of academic advising, the most used services are the LCC catalog and orientation. Also within the academic advising area there are some strong female and male differences in use patterns. For example, 49.6% of the females used information sheets while only 4.4% of the males used them; 62.2% of the males used the LCC catalog while only 25.5% is true for the females; the Testing and Assessment Center was used by 39.5% of the females and 2.6% of the males.

The no formal award completers had the highest responses (84% or more) to the same five services the graduates did: Student Records, Admissions, Registration, Bookstore, and the Learning Resource Center, with Registration and the Bookstore tying for the highest use. The least used services were the Women's Center (11.9%), peer assistance (student service associate) (7.3%) and Disabled Student Services (2.8%). The most used services in academic advising were counselors at 67.0% and the LCC catalog at 62.4%. Significantly more females than males used Health Services, the counter person in the counseling center, information sheets, and individual counseling.

Early leavers used all listed LCC services significantly less than the graduates and no formal award students. This could be one reason why these students are in fact "early leavers." Those services that were used by 66% or more of the population were Admissions, Registration, Bookstore, and the Learning Resource Center. The three least used services were student activities (government, athletics) (6.5%), Women's Center (5.2%), and Disabled Student Services (2.6%). (Table 16, pages 24-26)

### Ratings of Services Used While Attending LCC

For purposes of this section, "very satisfactory" will include ranges 4 and 5, and "less than satisfactory" will reflect ranges 1 and 2. It should also be remembered that the percentages represent only those who responded to that particular question. (Table 17, pages 27-32).

Of the graduates, 70.0% or more felt the service provided by Financial Aid, Health Services, and the Veteran's Office were very satisfactory. Of the students, 15%-24% felt the services provided by Student Activities (government, athletics), counselors (academic advising), advisors (academic advising), long-range program planning (academic advising) and individual counseling were less than satisfactory. Of the females, 68.0% felt academic advising by advisor was very satisfactory. That was true for only 42.2% of the males. In general, the females felt most of the services provided by academic advising were better than did the males.

No formal award students indicated Financial Aid, Cooperative Work Experience, peer assistance (student service associate), and Disabled Student Services are

services which they found the most satisfactory. Please note the small number of responses for both peer assistance and Disabled Student Services. At least 25% of the students responding found the Women's Center, academic advising by counselors and advisors, and individual counseling to be less than satisfactory. Once again females and males differ considerably in their perceptions. For example, 62.5% of the males found registration to be very satisfactory compared to 41.3% for the females.

Of the early leavers, 60.0% or more felt the services provided by Health Services, Student Activities (government, athletics), the Learning Resource Center, and the LCC catalog were very satisfactory. Of the respondents, 30% or more found academic advising by advisors, peer assistance (student service associates), individual counseling and Disabled Student Services to be less than satisfactory. In general, early leavers were not as satisfied with LCC services as were graduates and no formal award completers.

#### Former Students Primary Reason for Attending Lane Community College

As might be expected all three groups had different primary reasons for attending LCC. Of the graduates, 50.1% sought to earn a one- or two-year certificate/degree. The second highest reason for graduates was to prepare for a new career. More females (57.9%) than males (40.9%) wanted to earn a degree/certificate. However, more males (32.1%) than females (24.6%) planned on preparing for a new career.

The primary reason the no formal award completers (38.0%) came to LCC was to complete lower division classes for transfer to a four-year college. The second most frequent reason was to earn a one- or two-year certificate/degree (24.1%). That was followed very closely by preparing for a new career (23.1%). No formal award students also had the highest (of all 3 groups) percentage response to "general self-improvement" (10.2%).

Of the early leavers, 42.2% indicated their primary reason for attending LCC was to prepare for a new career. The second reason (20.0%) was to earn a one- or two-year certificate/degree. (Table 18, page 33) (Additional comments can be found in Appendices B, C, and D)

#### Reasons Students Left LCC Before Receiving a Degree or Certificate

[NOTE: Graduates would not respond to this question.]

The first three reasons that no formal award students gave for leaving LCC before receiving a degree or certificate were: 1) transferred to another college; 2) didn't have enough money; and 3) other (these responses can be found in Appendix C). Females indicated their top two responses were that they didn't have enough money and that they accepted a job. On the other hand, males chose transferring to another college and accomplishing what they wanted to.

Early leavers gave as their primary three reasons: 1) didn't have enough money; 2) dissatisfied with my academic performance; and 3) other (these responses can be found in Appendix D).



## CONCLUSIONS

The annual student follow-up survey provides valuable information concerning our former students. While data are not always specific enough to prompt immediate change, the perceptions of the students should prove to be useful in the college planning process.

Specifically, the 1983-84 study has added credibility to the identification of those students who have not received a formal degree or certificate, but who have satisfied their intent at Lane Community College. This group is the "No Formal Award Completers." There is some evidence in this study to support the contention that a significant proportion of the community college population enrolls to meet specific needs rather than to obtain a formal degree or certificate. Yet the evidence is not conclusive and it is recommended that further studies be conducted on the no formal award students.

Additionally, it is recommended that the student follow-up process be expanded to include a sample of the College noncredit student population.

- \* The counselor tried to channel me into the classes she wanted to go so I only took the classes I wanted and did not ask her assistance again in the two years that I attended LCC.
- \* I was very disappointed in applying for jobs out at LCC. You would think that they would give a person a break--especially when that person received their skills at LCC. Since a person can't get experience unless someone hires them.
- \* I found that most of my instructors have been very helpful. There have only been a few times in which I felt like the class was a complete waste due to the instructor. Basically, the atmosphere at the school is excellent. The people are enjoyable and kind as well as most of the instructors. The relaxed atmosphere is nice because it makes you feel more comfortable.
- \* I thought all the instructors were very interested in my progress. They went all out to help me when I needed assistance. LCC, I found has a commitment to preparing you for the real world, not just the classroom theory and narrow mindedness I found at the U of O. It is sad that LCC puts little to no effort into helping graduates find jobs. Afterall, students at LCC are usually struggling for something better and LCC should take responsibility to help the student at the end of that struggle!
  - \* Data processing, computer programming departments have excellent instructors. Some need training in interactive skills to students; can communicate behind podium but within their office walls. Tom Birkenhead should teach more statistics classes--he is the first instructor I've had in 15 years of college work who could explain the subject lucidly and make it "come to life." ----- is openly sexist and exhibits acute antagonism to women--men openly receive preference in his classes.
  - \* Need to offer required classes at more varied times.
  - \* Even with a degree and high GPA (3.8) it was impossible for me to find a computer-related job. Thus I settled for an entry level bookkeeping position.--Catch 22--can't get experience without the training--once you have the training, employers demand experience.
  - \* Overall a very good program and very useful in helping me get started in my work.
  - \* Difficult to summarize--LCC is an excellent facility. It fills needs not addressed by a liberal arts institution like the U of O. Both are necessary to a complete society. I went to LCC to get technical training for the job market. I also got counseling and excellent teaching. I'm a great fan of LCC!
  - \* After working in and around the Data Processing Department for three years, I feel I learned very little about what is presently on the market. My microcomputer training was totally inadequate, the classes were very outdated, and some of the teachers literally did not know their material. Unfortunately, the teachers in particular are the "heavy weights" and not much can be done. I feel the teaching of D. Marotta was a fresh shot in the arm of knowledge, but unfortunately he

was silenced rather quickly. I think Gordon Wehner (Business Department) was the biggest help to me in my career as a student because he gave enthusiasm about his teachings which enabled me to develop my study habits. He was also very helpful in being able to speak with him and gave me an excellent start in interpersonal relationships. I give Mr. Wehner a five star rating.

- \* When I was studying at Lane I kept wondering why it was so easy get an "A" at all my computer classes. And now I know, I didn't learn anything. Although I am down on the computer department, I feel the access I had to other departments and services of LCC were very beneficial. I also very much appreciated the 429 art (fountains, sculptures, stained glass, and the museum in the Art Department). And truly appreciated the wonderful landscaping and landscaping services.
- \* Even though I am attending a four-year college under a computer science (programmer) program, I thought that the two-year computer programming program at LCC is more advantageous. One thing that LCC should improve is that the Student Health Center, I think it would be more beneficial if we don't have to wait up to almost 45 minutes to an hour in order to see the doctor or even the nurses. But all of the staffs in the Student Health Service are wonderful.
- \* The registration procedure is fantastic! Also your catalogs and info sheets help me plan my classes each term. Overall, LCC is a wonderful college!
- \* Math requirements for the Data Processing degrees are minimal compared to what is required at four year colleges.
- \* I have a very positive feeling about my two years at LCC. Of course, I have been fortunate enough to find employment in my new profession. The training I received in data processing needs to be updated to bring it more in line with where employment opportunities are. More emphasis should be placed on microcomputer, rather than mainframe programming.
- \* My experiences at LCC were very positive. Teaching staff is excellent. Instructors and fellow students alike very supportive.
- \* I am not satisfied with the job placement programs. I loved my job through CWE but they couldn't hire me and I needed full time work so I had to quit. But I haven't received any other help than that. I'm sure I have been signed up with LCC's employment center. I still need help finding a job pertaining to my degree. If there is anything LCC can do to help please notify me. Thanks.
- \* I understand that, because of underfunding, LCC has had difficulty keeping current with the latest technologies re/large frame computer developments. However, I encountered difficulty landing a computer-related job locally (seven months from graduation) because I had no training with MS/DOS and UNIX operating systems. I encourage the DP Department, which I rate very good overall, to teach classes utilizing these contemporary systems, as well as the "C" programming language. I especially benefitted from Dave Marotta's classes (CS 131, 133, and CPI), and I think Bob Boettcher is an excellent new addition to the staff.

- \* I enjoy every class I take at LCC and especially like the "professor accessibility." I also appreciate the relatively small classes and I like the architecture. To sum up--it's friendly people, good classes and pleasing environment that makes LCC great.
- \* The main thing to stressed to new students is Lane is a good place to start but with the exception of the few programs like nursing and the dental assisting program you can't find a job in the area of schooling without a four year degree. I have a AS in computer science from Lane, and have been putting in applications for over a year and have not even been called in for an interview. I have come to realize the only way to get a job in computer is to have a four year degree. This is what you want to tell new students at Lane.
- \* Your Data Processing program is very good, but should shift its direction toward modern techniques, like highly interactive online prog-aming rather than batch processing.
- \* DP was great--very demanding and rewarding. I feel that certain lab assistants were wonderful people and made my struggles easier. However, a gloomy attitude hangs over LCC--not too many happy people in administrative positions. Secretarial staff--DP. I had some excellent instructors who help me excel. I feel I got a great education even if it was a little depressing, living in Eugene!
- \* I felt that LCC is a great college. The education I received will be used the rest of my life. The teachers were always there during office hours and always helped. I can't give enough credit to CWE. Joe Freeman is a super CWE coordinator and I wouldn't be where I am today without Joe, CWE and my LCC education. LCC is so valuable to me and I thank the school and the teachers for the education.
- \* The overall atmosphere at LCC is very good (better than U of O). Most of the teachers are friendly and understanding. Need to lower the book prices and raise the price of book returns.
- \* Instructors willing to give individual help but some seem somewhat unwilling to put much research into lectures. Also, I feel LCC employs some instructors who should not be allowed to teach anywhere due to their "methods."
- \* I would like to see more work done in the area of job placement of graduating students.
- \* Ditto!
- \* I think it would be more helpful to require every person of every major to work in the field they have chosen.
- \* Keep up the good work! Especially CWE. I know several DP students from the university enroll at LCC so they can get practical experience.

- \* I enjoyed my time at LCC. I found it a very rewarding experience. I wish there had been more or better advisory people, I had somewhat of a hard time finding out about different courses of training and what was entailed to pursue that course.
- \* I enjoyed my two plus years at LCC very much and I was generally quite impressed by the high quality of instruction. I studied hard and learned a lot. LCC's environment is very conducive to academic and personal growth. The grounds are beautiful, and the professional staff, i.e.; instructors, counselors, administrators, etc., are mostly dedicated, enthusiastic and caring individuals. My only real complaint is a huge one--the skills I acquired at LCC are not marketable in this geographical area. The fact is that the jobs aren't there.
- \* I thought the teachers were very easy to locate if I needed extra help.
- \* I think the instructors in technical areas, like data processing should learn more about teaching and how people learn. I don't feel there is always the willingness on the part of the instructors to really transfer knowledge to the students.
- \* I enrolled in and completed the Computer Programming AA degree. What I needed more than counseling and instruction was some type of job placement program, even if it meant re-locating to another area. I am still unemployed, except for programming work I contract for under the table. There is a dire need for a job placement program!!
- \* The DP program is overall very good although there are a few instructors who are not. I think LCC's top DP grads can easily compete (and do) with U of O's four year grads. CWE was excellent training and helpful in finding a job as well. I owe my present success to the training I got at LCC.
- \* Computer programming--accounting is as important as programming--stress interpersonal skills. Some classes are not in-depth enough.
- \* Enjoyed Lane and plan to come back for night courses.
- \* Computer program needs to get into industrial applications, not just business.
- \* Job placement very poor. Computer programming--not up to date--has found he hasn't learned enough to get a job.--More people are trained than needed for area.
- \* Lane okay.
- \* Lane needs to get in touch with more employers and offer classes that are more in touch with what employers want.
- \* LCC--great overall. Prefers LCC to U of O. Questionnaire could be a little shorter.

- \* CWE: I had a job already and used this program to earn credits for electives. I learned more at work than I would have taking other electives. The assignments for the class were not very beneficial however. In my opinion they were a waste of time. Teaching: instructors in general were very good at explaining the material and giving thought provoking assignments. However, the exams were not very difficult. Most were multiple choice and it was a matter of elimination rather than actually applying knowledge.
- \* Classes that are required at a four-year college that can be taken at LCC should be emphasized more explicitly. More emphasis should be directed to putting information in the catalog regarding classes that can be taken at LCC if wishing to transfer. Counselors should be more up to date on classes, requirements, transfer for credits, etc., needed to transfer to other colleges. More emphasis on correct notetaking skills that are vital at a four-year college.
- \* I've had a couple temporary jobs, since graduation, that went well. However, I was not expected to be highly skilled. My CWE and the one job that I took intending it to be permanent, did not go well and I was told that my skills were somewhat lacking and my experience level was too low. I was a straight A student in the two year degree program in business management and I took all the accounting courses too, but my hands on experience is sadly lacking, apparently. I can't find permanent work that I have enough experience for and I can't get the experience w/o having a job. I've had no help in job location from LCC.
- \* LCC is a friendly campus. The teachers were helpful but I wish I received more help in job placement.
- \* There should be better communication between LCC and the U of O on the particular programs offered at both schools. I entered the College of Business at the U after attending LCC for two years and found I still needed many hours of undergraduate classes.
- \* I think that you should look more heavily at the student evaluations of teachers like \_\_\_\_\_ who shouldn't be a teacher at all.
- \* I felt that the education provided at LCC was of a high quality and the variety of subjects suitable. The overall facilities and faculty were very good. I feel that tighter control of student counseling should be implemented, especially for students who wish to complete a four year program. This would help eliminate lost time and disillusion for the students.
- \* I enjoyed my attendance at LCC. I would, however, like to suggest that every new student be required to attend the orientation program before they register for classes. When I began attending LCC, I was not required to attend the orientation and I didn't get a good start. I feel that my inadequate start had a lot to do with this.
- \* The student body is very diverse but I feel you should try to unite them a little more.

- \* I think the thing I most missed while attending LCC was individual counseling which I know now, I was mostly to blame. I think with a little more direction, I could have picked up a few needed skills that would have helped me get into the work force while deciding if I wanted to attend a four-year school. I realize the two year business management degree is just a forerunner to a four year degree, but presently I feel a loss at what I am qualified to do...what my schooling helped to prepare me for. I should have sought out someone to follow my schooling progress. Perhaps during orientation if you could stress the importance of keeping communication lines open between the student and counselor through the time spent at LCC because the options for the student are everchanging with every class taken.
  
- \* I enjoyed my seven terms at LCC a great deal. The ability to see my instructors personally whenever a real problem was a big factor. I don't feel I was aided by my degree in business management very much at this time but I believe I will feel differently once I do obtain a management position. The degree did not get me the better paying job yet but the knowledge I acquired, both in the classroom and in the lunch room, has broadened my world and made me a more understanding person. There are three people I would like most to praise. They are all three excellent teachers as well as being just plain decent people. Connie Mesquita is such a lovely person. A lady who knows how to get people believing in themselves. Phil Foster is available to his students any time, any where, as is Tom Birkenhead. They both go out of their way for any student who merely asks. I worked with Connie all last year. I had Tom for quite a few classes and I both bowled on the LCC bowling team as well as rode to school with Phil last year.

- \* I found the instructors in the refrigeration/appliance course very knowledgeable and helpful--Ray Nott did a very good job and deserves a big pat on the back from his superiors--as stated above LCC is the only school offering the classes needed to give basic background to this field--however this should be stressed to students by counselors and instructors that it is only a basic knowledge background, and classes should be accompanied by part-time job in field with local employer--
- \* The staff and teachers of LCC helped me overcome my fears of going back to school. Wish I would have had instructors like that when I was in high school. Thanks for time and help.
- \* Generally speaking I found the academic portion of the school to be acceptable. However, you have a severe drug problem at the school. I became involved in excessive drug abuse. Although I do not blame the college for my problems, it seems to me that you need to be more aware that these things go on and students pay the price in the long run.
- \* The "teachers" are not teaching, they are letting the students learn.
- \* I feel like the bookstore was trying to make money knowing we had to buy their books. Also, the last four of the social security numbers used to tell when you register was not fair to me, I was never on the first day of registration and usually the last. In general I learned a lot and had a great time that I will never forget.
- \* I think in general public colleges and universities require too much time to be spent on courses which do not relate directly to the field or career a student is seeking. Since time and money is important to most students, it seems a real waste of both to require classes which serve no useful purpose toward the type of job a student is working for, at the expense of classes which do more directly relate.

- \* The one thing that displeased me the most about LCC was the amount of interdepartmental politics that got in the way of department improvement and student learning. I did like the personal attention given by teacher aids which seem to have more time to spend with me. Thank you for asking my opinion.
  - \* LCC is the best school I've ever been to. I recommend it to everybody.
  - \* Community colleges should be supported by the county they educate. The variety of classes offered make going to college a goal anyone can achieve. The TV classes, outreach classes, and non-credit as well as credit classes, make community college a step ahead of state universities.
  - \* I was very disappointed with my counselor. He seemed to have no interest in my progress. I tried to use a CWE program, but was told to find a job myself and then give them (employer) his card to call. It took my counselor two months to look up my LCC transcript to fill out my "contract" for graduation. Every week I'd visit him and he'd tell me he didn't have time. Some counselor! I was very disappointed in him. I "counseled" myself through the drafting program.

17. We would like to have your comments, both positive and negative, about our programs, services, teaching, CWE, or any other area of importance to you.
- \* Lane CC was as pleasant learning experience as well as the X-country and track programs under Al Tarpinning.
  - \* Excellent Flight Technology--administration and staff. Prepared me well for my career. Thanks.
  - \* As with my educational process, you reap what you sow. For a student who is motivated toward specific job related training goals, the quality of that training is a function of how much that student puts into it. Even mediocre class syllabi or instructors can be overcome if the student presses to take advantage of the resources available to him at LCC. Nevertheless, my experience was that the instructors were competent in their fields and quick to assist any student who was giving his best. While I found some classes frustratingly limited and introductory in nature, I was given more than adequate access and direction to pursue them to the limits of my own time and interest.
  - \* Basically my experience at LCC was very positive. Having attended the U of O also (1982 graduate), I found that many times the quality of instruction at Lane was superior to that of the university's. The career counseling and especially the registration process is much better at Lane. One thing I didn't like was the library service--if you could get someone to help you they were real snots. A good library otherwise though.
  - \* The Flight Technology Department's ground schools, flight training, and aviation-related classes are, by and large, excellent. It is unfortunate that the degree curriculum also includes several irrelevant business courses such as selling, business law, etc. Much more valuable to the professional pilots starting out would be educational psychology, computer classes, stress management, and aircraft construction. Is the Business Department not self-supporting or what? I would also suggest some class work on 135 operations.
  - \* Flight Tech--led to believe pay would be higher.
  - \* Enjoyed Lane but Flight Tech program didn't get a job making enough for a married person with kids. Need to be single to make enough to live on.

\* Nursing program needs to allow senior student nurses to have more realistic assignments (i.e., more team leading) and not rely on SFE's. Many students can't afford the time for SFE's to get this valuable experience. Thank you Glenna Clemmons and Pat Fish. \$!

\* It worked out fine for me. Jobs are hard to find in Lane County.

\* I started the program financially dependent on family as a single parent--now I have a great job, and am independent because of the ADN program. Thank you!

\* I think the clinical experience was the major influence of the RN program. Also the instructor. Most were helpful and few were a hindrance.

\* Found SFE a very good vehicle to allow facilities in the area to become familiar with me and my skills.

\* I found the ADN program to be a very stressful and negative experience. There was much too little clinical experience, very little support/encouragement from instructors, and much disorganization. I would strongly discourage anyone from attending this program. I feel very ill-prepared for the type of nursing I am doing.

\* LCC is a great asset to the community! I feel LCC was a good experience, good education. My problem is trying to get a job in the Eugene area. Also I could have used more information or coaching on how to go about this. It's very discouraging. I've been employed three weeks now and graduated in June 84.

\* The ADN program is a very high-pressure and intense course of study--but so is nursing. I feel LCC did an excellent job of preparing me. There were rough spots along the way, but I came out with an overall positive impression. Some of the non-nursing courses I took weren't enough of a challenge and seem like unnecessary busy work added to a hectic schedule. Maybe I couldn't have handled more at the time, though.

\* I graduated from the ADN program and left LCC in Oregon with a truly fine nursing education. I found some classes to be a waste of time and money--e.g.--nursing trends and issues, but in general I got a lot out of all my classes. Now that I'm living in another state, and work with people of different educational backgrounds, I realize how very good LCC's ADN program is. I was very privileged to have been in the program.

## Graduate - Associates Degree Nursing (Cont.)

- \* CWE is an excellent program. I participated in it and because of it I was able to land a job I would otherwise have not been eligible to take immediately after graduation.
- \* I feel that LCC as a whole is an excellent school providing a wide variety of classes and support services. I attended LCC full time for one year prior to entering the ADN program to receive RN license. My only criticism is of the nursing program itself. I feel the nursing instructors (not everyone) as a whole have too much subjective power over the students--lending themselves towards favoritism and unnecessarily increasing the stress level of students. I sincerely wish LCC as a governing body had more control over the nursing program, setting by-laws and guidelines for instructor/student relationship. I felt, along with many other students, that we were treated in a dehumanizing and demoralizing manner.
- \* The ADN program through health occupations was very intense and should be spread over a longer period of time. Instruction was of high quality but nursing lab experience was poor because of outdated equipment and limited access to equipment needed to perfect skills. Also course work in the field of gerontology as it relates to nursing needs to be incorporated! (aging population --> need for nursing skills)
- \* I was enrolled in nursing program and struggled through an overwhelming two years of very demanding and intense study--I have discovered that I'm very well prepared to practice nursing--I have discovered that many other new grads from other schools/programs come up lacking in terms of experience and technical skills, knowledge--nursing instructors were supportive and understanding--program was very stressful for most of us--I didn't know if I'd have kept going at one point without their support--
- \* Overall I found the associate's degree nursing program very satisfactory in quality of education, programs, and support. However, I felt there was some undue stress and pressure put on specific students. Generally, my lengthy experience (several years of taking general ed classes) before nursing program at LCC was a pleasant learning experience!
- \* I was very happy with my education at LCC. Except for a few instructors ( - \_\_\_\_\_ ) whom I felt practiced some unethical activities on the nursing clinical floor, I was pleased for the most part, with the dedication and quality of teaching exhibited by my instructors.
- \* Most areas I had contact with were good, continue as you are. Your people in the library and financial aid deserve special commendations.
- \* Nursing program is too oriented to immediate competence. This causes undue stress. Instructors should be helpers and problem solvers rather than graders. (SFE) CWE was the only way to get a job after school. NSG program was OK, the calibre of instruction was erratic, ranging from \*less than acceptable to superior.

\*Less than acceptable obviously has to be accepted. Thank you.

Graduate - Associates Degree Nursing (Cont.)

- \* Long-range program planning is inadequate and people should know what to expect from the job after school--physically, very draining.
- \* Never sent certificate--called about it several times.
- \* Library--reserve materials, the fine for not returning on time is only \$1 and should be higher so people would be more inclined to bring it back on time--for the next person.
- \* Nursing program--make students more aware of support groups and make support groups more accessible.
- \* Liked Lane however the majority of nursing instructors were defensive and unhelpful. Left you pretty much on your own.
- \* Teachers--very helpful, supportive. Nursing program--very effective.
- \* Feel students need to cope with intimidation from teachers.

- \* LCC is a great community college, but the Dental Hygiene program and counselors affiliated with the department and instructors are very poor and inadequate in preparing the student for a career as a dental hygienist.
  - \* Most of LCC's services and programs are satisfactory. Two negative experiences-- 1) Veterans Office getting info for my husband--they're perpetually rude as well as 2) one of the regulars in the bookstore. Health care center always very caring and concerned. Overall I was happy with the Dental Hygiene program. Has set me up for most office situations. CWE was great, both Beth Webb is a real professional and handles the program very well; works very hard at it. It's a long haul, feels very good to be done. No major complaints about LCC, in fact most of my experiences were positive throughout the years.
  - \* I was very pleased with the way the instructors at LCC presented concepts in a neat, organized manner that made it easier and more enjoyable for me to learn. All staff members were always very friendly and helpful to me. The only few negative comments I had dealt with some aspects of the dental hygiene program and I expressed that on a separate questionnaire sheet I wrote to them.
  - \* I found the instructors in my program unable to work closely together. There was a lot of student confusion because of the instructors' inability to communicate with each other and work as a team. Their technical skills were excellent, but the program could be greatly improved if the instructors became a team with some uniformity, interdepartmental communication, and consideration for each other.
  - \* Dental Hygiene program needs help!!!!!!
  - \* The Dental Hygiene program was inadequate in many ways. Some of the instructors felt belittling you was an important teaching aid. They did not answer questions concerning assigned reading. Tests were not pertinent to reading or class discussion. Some instructors were very disorganized. Speakers did not show because of instructors' incompetence. Sitting in some of the classes was a total waste of time because they would ramble on about something besides the information we needed and then expect us to know it anyways. We taught ourselves. The oral biology teacher was fantastic. Above comments do not pertain to him in any way.
  - \* The Dental Hygiene program has a lot to offer but poorly organized and ran without input being allowed. The CWE for dental hygiene was poor. It is not a hands-on proposition just observing (boring).

\* I feel the DH program at LCC had influenced my career greatly. During the program, I felt it was very unorganized and inconsistent. The pressure was very high stressed and I feel, unnecessary. \* I highly recommend the Medical Office Assistant program. One can find a very rewarding career in this field. Please keep it on the curriculum and expansion of this program would be profitable. My compliments to Mrs. Stevens who did a great job in 1983-84! I hope this counts. I moved so I wasn't able to get this in time to mail in by April 1.

\* The LCC MOA program was excellent in preparing me to do my current job. I constantly am using skills I learned in this program. Going to LCC was a very positive and worthwhile experience for me.

- \* I attended the LPN program at Lane. While I found some instructors competent, most were unprepared, confused, and just not teachers. The stress level because of this confusion was unbelievable and not necessary. I chose to move out of the Eugene area to continue my nursing studies, rather than continue at Lane.
- \* I had a good experience at LCC. The staff is exceptional. The base of knowledge I learned has helped me fit right in with the nurses in the working field. I'm presently attending LCC for my RN degree will graduate this term. I hope to get a job at Sacred Heart afterwards, but I haven't heard yet. The nursing program is exceptional at LCC and highly respected throughout the state. That is one reason I wanted to continue at LCC. Thanks!
- \* The lottery program for the nursing program is ridiculous and so are the nursing teachers who are so critical and unsupportive. The general education classes I took were, overall, very informative and educational and economical.
- \* I think the school of nursing should look at the community before stating that the job expectations are fair to good. POOR is a more acceptable term!
- \* I feel a post high school education is one of the greatest opportunities available in America today and that LCC is a fine example of this learning experience.
- \* Nsg health occupations led me to a two year delay to enter RN classes due to poor communications interdepartmental. I was attending LPN classes in 82-83 full time registered. Mailed my reentry form for RN classes two-four days late therefore I was told no entry. I felt since health occupation employees correlate with nursing students throughout the week, at least they could have asked me before dropping me from the list of promised entries in 84-85.
- \* I feel the nursing program is due for some new blood on the faculty. I felt that many of the instructors were biased toward students for reasons not related to the educational situation. I also think the lottery is a very poor way to admit nursing students--and a waste of dollars in the long run. As a student I had classmates who had never even been in a hospital--most of them didn't even know what being a nurse involved. As a nurse in a hospital situation working with nursing students I've seen some very inappropriate behavior--I feel an interviewing process would in the long run save valuable time and money!
- \* Good school.

  - \* I currently have approximately 150 credit hours from LCC. Not all of the class hours I've spent are directly related to my current field but cover a broad base of subjects. I have a high opinion of the quality of education available at LCC. In talking to recent grads from the local high schools I strongly urge them to look into the varied two-year programs at LCC and to complete undergraduate credit.

The staff at LCC was very friendly and easy to work with. I thank you for all you did for me.
  - \* I was in the Early Childhood Education program. I liked most of my instructors. I especially liked having the practical experience in the Child Development Center. One particular instructor I feel is too old, however. She had suffered a stroke and returned, but even before the stroke her classes were not very stimulating. She repeated herself quite often. I think the instructors should be evaluated and reviewed more often by their superiors. Also I would have liked to have seen more of the vocational credits have an optional transferable number if the student would like to do additional work. I attended LCC for three years. Two were spent in the ECE program and one on general ed. I've been teaching preschool for two years now since I've been out of school and have enjoyed it, but now I've decided to further my education. I will be going to U of O full time starting summer term. It was frustrating to find that very few of my credits from the two-year vocational program would transfer.
  - \* The E.C.E. program was great and the staff was both helpful and a pleasure to attend their classes.
  - \* I was in the Child Development program. Many of the instructors were very good and I feel they were well qualified. Linda Riepe did an excellent job. However, in general, I felt that the instruction at LCC was very subjective. The teachers express too much of their own viewpoint, thus making the "answer" to questions "right" or "wrong" based

- on their personal bias. The CWE program was excellent in giving on-the-job training and got me a job right after graduation up until the time we moved.

- \* Re CWE: found all three positions on my own--created them for LCC! I found my counselor \_\_\_\_\_ very nice on personality but not very helpful in reality. Re E.E.T./E.T. program: most of the teachers came from industry and knew the material but not how to teach both. I really felt that lacking. There was also an assumption to teach starting from some basic knowledge already known by the student. I.e. those of us with no knowledge had a very difficult time and often felt overwhelmed. Until I started working in the field I had no inclination of how or why--just a lot of formulas and numbers. There was a lot of ego problems and differences among the teachers that often overflowed onto the students. In short--I'd rather have an excellent teacher with average knowledge than an ego-oriented genius who can't translate his/her knowledge to the students.
- \* I graduated from the electronics technician program. I realize now that that field was a poor choice for the Eugene area; there are no jobs. I feel that the technical training I received was sporadic, unfocused, incomplete. I feel totally unprepared to work in the field, were I able to find a job. I think we should have been led through specific troubleshooting situations a step at a time, on specific pieces of equipment. Instead, we brought in any pieces of equipment we could scrounge, did our best to repair them on our own, then had the instructor do it for us when we reached a particular level of frustration. I wished I had been counseled to drop out of this program, or else I wished I had been helped with better training and effective job placement. I graduated with a 3.7 GPA so I do have the intellectual capacity. I feel like I wasted two years, and a lot of money getting a worthless degree.
- \* The CWE program at KLCC was very useful, helpful, and informative to me. The teachers were helpful on an individual level, going to a great deal of trouble to help me with problems and answer all of my questions. My technical skills were greatly improved by the courses I took. I enjoyed the atmosphere of the college very much and plan to attend classes later to obtain further skills and degrees.
- \* I am not really a good person to pole since I've worked for LCC for 8 years and am currently teaching in Electronics part time---

- \* Electronic repair tech. When searching for a career with my degree I realized I didn't have enough education to get a job in my field. Even with a "B" average, employers want someone with more experience in education. I only applied for jobs that I was supposedly qualified for, but was turned down many times! I feel the college needs more of a job placement program. Unfortunately I feel my degree was a waste, since I am not using it.

  - \* I am attending the largest university in Minnesota (12,000 students) and in many ways, LCC was a lot more eager to help the student and be generally friendly. I think LCC prepared me very well for the university level of study. Thank you.

Particularly in Business Math, in filing, and in business communications. I do feel that both the CWE and the "Job Finder" class were especially helpful. I know it isn't your fault, but Financial Aid is dismal, especially for single parents. I am saddled with big loans for payback, and I couldn't stay in school long enough to train for a job that pays enough to pay them back.
