#### **ABSTRACT**

A survey of 1985 Piedmont Virginia Community College (PVCC) graduates was conducted in June, 1985, to determine the effects of a PVCC education on the work lives and future educational prospects of these graduates. Surveys were distributed to students who attended graduation rehearsal and by mail. Study findings, based on responses from 67.3% of the 248 graduates of 1985, included the following: (1) the typical degree graduate was a female, full-time, day student, while the typical diploma or certificate graduate was a male, part-time, evening student; (2) 45.5% of the respondents were part-time students, compared to 24% in 1983; (3) the percentage of part-time associate in applied science graduates rose from 18% in 1983 to 46.2% in 1985; (4) over half of the 1985 graduates were working full-time in career fields related to their studies at PVCC; (5) only 21% of the associate in arts/associate in sciences graduates were employed full-time in career-related fields; (6) 13.2% were unemployed; (7) 30.5% indicated they would continue their college education; and (8) 48.3% of those planning to continue their education had already been accepted by institutions of higher education. 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## RESULTS OF THE SURVEY OF THE PVCC GRADUATES OF THE CLASS OF 1985

#### INTRODUCTION

Each year the graduating class of Piedmont Virginia Community College is surveyed to identify present activities and future plans.

The purpose of the study is to determine what effect a PVCC education has on the work lives and future educational prospects of these graduates. More specifically, the following questions are addressed:

- What general characteristics are typical of PVCC graduates?
- What work characteristics are typical of PVCC graduates? How many graduates are working in job fields related to their study at PVCC, and how many are working in unrelated job fields? What is the unemployment rate of PVCC graduates?
- 3. How many PVCC graduates intend to pursue further educational study at four-year colleges or universities?
- 4. How many PVCC graduates intend to re-enter community colleges either as full-time or part-time students?
- 5. How does the current graduating class at PVCC differ in work characteristics and educational plans from previous classes?

#### METHODOLOGY

This year's survey is essentially a replication of last year's study. The same questionnaire was used, and it was completed by students who attended graduation rehearsal on June 14, 1985. Those



students not attending graduation rehearsal were mailed copies of the questionnaire. The first mailing occurred during the last week of September, and the second occurred during the second week of November. These mailings were conducted later than usual because of changes in the Office of Institutional Research and Planning.

The questionnaire itself is similar to that used for PVCC's graduation surveys since the late 1970's. A copy is included in this report as Figure 1. Copies of the transmittal letters sent to non-respondents are also included in this report as Figures 2 and 3.

Responses to the questionnaire were tabulated counting an individual who received more than one degree, or one degree and a certificate or diploma, in the following order of priority: Associate of Arts, Associate of Science, Associate of Applied Science, certificate, and diploma. Information is contained in six tables which follow the same format as those in previous studies. Note, however, that a new table has been added showing work characteristics and educational plans by PVCC curriculum (Table 5), and longitudinal data have been expanded and presented in a new format (Table 6). Charts displaying important information have also been included in this report as Figures 4 through 7.

#### RESULTS

Of the 248 graduates of the Class of 1985, 167 responded to this survey. This yielded a 67.3 percent response rate, well below the 75 percent response rate which has been typical of graduate surveys since the late 1970's, but higher than last year's 65.6 percent



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rate. Perhaps the response rate would have been higher if the questionnaires had been mailed during the summer rather than during the fall, but this seems somewhat unlikely given the declining trend since 1982 (see Table 6).

The typical degree graduate from PVCC in 1985 was a full-time, female, day student, while the typical diploma or certificate graduate was a part-time, male, evening student (see Table 1). In most respects, these characteristics are similar to those of previous classes.

An increase in the number of part-time graduates, however, has occurred over the last few years. In 1983 only 24% of the graduates was part-time; by 1984 the percentage had increased to 34%; this year, 45.5% of the graduates was part-time. This increase is largely the result of more part-time A.A.S. graduates. While the percentage of part-time A.A./A.S. and diploma/certificate graduates has fluctuated, the percentage of part-time A.A.S. graduates has steadily risen. In 1983 only 18% of the A.A.S. graduates was part-time; in 1984 the percentage was 27%; and in 1985 it was 46.2%.

As can be seen in Table 2, over half of the 1985 graduates are working full-time in career fields related to their studies at PVCC. This is especially true of the diploma/certificate and A.A.S. graduates. Only 21% of the A.A./A.S. graduates, though, are employed full-time in career-related fields. This might be accounted for by the fact that half of the A.A./A.S. graduates plans to continue immediately after graduation education full-time at a four-year college or university.

Only 22 of the 167 respondents indicated they were unemployed.



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This unemployment rate of 13.2% is nearly half of what it was in 1984 and is the lowest rate of any graduating class since 1979 (see Table 6). This fact, coupled with the large number of graduates working full-time in job-related fields, reinforces the already prevalent notion that the job market is better than it has been in a number of years. Figure 4 graphically depicts employment characteristics of 1985 PVCC graduates.

There has been a modest decrease in the number and percentage of PVCC graduates going on to four-year colleges or universities (see Table 3). Fifty-one graduates, or 30.5% of all respondents, indicated they would continue their college education, and the vast majority of these (70.6%) intended to continue as full-time students. In 1984, fifty-eight graduates, or 34.9% of all respondents, planned to go on to four-year colleges or universities.

As might be expected, most of those going on to four-year colleges or universities were college transfer students who were awarded the A.A. or A.S. degrees. Of these, nearly half (48.3% or 28 students) had already been accepted to institutions of higher education, and exactly half (29 students) indicated that the institution selected was their first choice. Given these responses, it would seem that Piedmont is performing an excellent job in preparing students to continue their education.

Some students plan to continue their education not at a four-year college or university but at a community college. Thirty-seven of the 1985 graduates, or 22.2% of the respondents, indicated this, and all of these plan to study part-time (see Table 4). Twenty-seven percent of these received the A.A./A.S. degree at PVCC; 56.8%



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received the A.A.S. degree; and 16.2% received certificates or diplomas. Most planned to begin their studies immediately (either in the summer or fall following graduation). Figure 5 shows the educational plans of the 1985 PVCC graduates.








FIGURE 7





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

Table 5 summarizes the work characteristics and educational plans of the 1985 graduates with the information tabulated by curriculum, as well as by degree. Table 6 summarizes these characteristics over a seven-year period of time. This longitudinal data is also depicted graphically in Figures 6 and 7. As has already been noted, more graduates are working in full-time, career-related jobs, and less students are unemployed, than at any time since 1979. Evidently, PVCC continues to graduate individuals who are successful in either finding employment or continuing their education.



## Employment of 1985 PVCC Graduates



# PVCC Graduate Employment Trends -- 1979-1985
