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ABSTRACT

There are two conditions that result in the academic suspension of students from Miami-Dade Community College (MDCC), In the first case, students are suspended if they have attempted more than 30 credits and earned less than a 1.5 cumulative grade point average (GPA). In the second case, students who have registered for more than 45 credits, but earned credit in less than half are also suspended. Previous research reports indicate that 50% of suspended students return to college within 2 years, and 10% of these students eventually graduate. A study was conducted at MDCC to examine statistics on students suspended since 1978-79, and to determine subsequent re-enrollment and graduation rates for students from each academic year. Collegewide findings included the following: (1) since 1978-79, a total of 14,056 students had been suspended; (2) of that number, 7,778 or 55.3% had returned; (3) 10% of the returning students (N=779) completed an associate degree or certificate; and (4) Hispanics tended to have the highest return rates, while White non-Hispanics accounted for the highest graduation rates among returning students. Analysis of Academic Suspension 1978 Through 1984

According the Standards of Academic Progress (S.O.A.P), there are two conditions which will result in Academic Suspension from Miami-Dade. In the first case, students are suspended if they have attempted more than 30 credits with less than a 1.5 cumulative grade point average. In the second case, students with more than 45 credits registered for but earned credit in less than half are also suspended from the College. The Suspension Policy requires students to discontinue enrollment in Miami-Dade through the next major term. Students who discontinue their enrollment because of suspension may reenter the College and continue for each sub-sequent term of enrollment, provided they maintain a 2.0 term grade point average and earn credits in at least half of the credit for which they register. Academic Dismissal is a more severe category of S.O.A.P. which represents a separation of students from the College for at least 12 months and occurs after students fail to meet the minimum requirements during probation after suspension.

In previous research reports concerned with the re-enrollment patterns and graduation rates for suspended students (Wright, 1983; Wright, 1984), the author presented data which reflected the number of students suspended during each academic year since 1978, and t's number of those students who returned to the College and completed the requirements for a certificate or degree. It was found that within approximately two years following the suspension, about 50% of the students returned to the College; beyond the two-year period, the return rate dropped dramatically and reflected an increase of just several percentage points. It was also reported that within about five years, approximately 10% of those students who returned to the College completed the requirements for their respective awards. However, since no comparative data from other institu-tions have been presented concomitantly, it has not been determined whether the Miami-Dade return rate and subsequent completion rate are different (either higher or lower) than those observed elsewhere.



In order to address whether the Miami-Dade findings were common, a computerized search of the literature was conducted through the Dialogue database. After examining references from both the Educational Resources Information Center (ERIC) document collection as well as publications cited in the Current Index to Journals in Education, it was concluded that only a handful of studies has been published regarding the performance of students who are reinstated after academic disqualification. In fact, none of the studies identified was even a recent contribution to the research literature.

Almost 20 years ago, Bissiri (1966) examined a large group of students who were readmitted to the institution from which they had been suspended. Interestingly, it was found that the chances of success as measured by subsequent grade point average were better for the readmitted group (52%) than for the regular freshman students (45%). It was further reported that more students who completed over 21 units before suspension succeeded that did those who completed less than 21 units. This in an interesting finding in itself since the greater number of credits earned would require even higher achievement to raise the students' grade point average. Bissiri also cited the evident lack of value from the practice of requiring students to stay out of school for a semester before reenrollment. According to his results, students who stayed out one semester were 38% successful compared with a 54% success rate for those allowed to continue without interruption.

The hypotheses that academic suspension differentially affects subsequent return rate and academic achievement were also investigated by Basonic (1975) and Aubert (1979). In Basonic's study, two groups of students were examined. One group was suspended while the other group should have been suspended but was not. Virtually no difference was found in the percent of students who returned to the institution within each group. The author reported that while approximately 80% of both groups did not return to the institution, the group that was suspended outperformed the comparison group in terms of grade point average, regardless of time spent out of the institution. During the period of spring 1969-70 through the fall 1974-75, the institution under study suspended 1,302 students. Of this number, 259



(19.8%) returned and 21 ultimately graduated. This represents 8.1% of the returning students.

In a similar study, Aubert (1979) examined the effects of a reinstatement process required of students who were suspended from Green River Community College. The data analysis revealed that only 38% of the students suspended and required to complete the reinstatement process returned to the institution, while 50% of those who should have been suspended but were not, returned to the institution on their own. differences in return rate were observed in this study, no significant differences were found in terms of several academic achievement variables including subsequent credits attempted, credits earned, and grade point The findings appear to support the position taken by Bissiri regarding to the evident lack of value in dismissing students from the institution. Of course, if academic suspension is intended to sever the relationship between the student and the institution, then the academic outcomes of returning students would probably have little effect on the practice of having students interrupt their studies for one or more semesters. In any event, the studies cited suggest that the return rate at Miami-Dade is fairly high, while the graduation rate is about the same as elsewhere.

The data presented in this report update previous statistics intended to show the number of students suspended from Miami-Dade since 1978-79 and the subsequent re-enrollment and graduation rates for students from each academic year. The data are presented by campus and College-wide, and are displayed by ethnic group as well as the type of completion award. Note that data presented for 1984-85 reflect those students who were suspended as of the end of the Fall Term, 1984-85. A number of students, however, are shown as returning from that suspension group. These are individuals who appealed the suspension and were permitted to enroll in the subsequent Winter Term. Also, the reader will note the dramatic decrease in the number of suspended students beginning with the academic year 1982-83. This decrease was clearly due to a change in the S.O.A.P. standards and not due to any remarkable change in student performance.

In Table 1, suspension data are presented for North Campus. statistics show that for all ethnic groups combined, 57.5% of the first suspension group (1978-79) and 54.8% of all suspended students have returned However, the ethnic category data reveal some interesting differences. The Hispanic group, for example, has the highest return rate with 68% for the first group suspended. In contrast, fewer than 50% of the white non-Hispanic students from the 1978-79 group have returned to the College. Yet, this group has the largest proportion of students completing their programs (15.2%). When examining the total number of suspended students in each ethnic group, the black non-Hispanic graduation rate is the lowest (6.8%) and the white non-Hispanic group total completion rate is clearly the highest (13.2%). These data continue to show that within approximately two years, just over 50% of all suspended students return to the institution.

The statistics presented for South Campus (Table 2) are fairly similar to those from North Campus. That is, the Hispanic group has maintained the highest return rate while the white non-Hispanic group has established the highest completion rate. The most impressive figure in this set of data is the high graduation rate (22.4%) among white non-Hispanics who were suspended during the 1978-79 period compared to just 15.2% (Table 1) for the same group at North Campus. The difference between white non-Hispanic students on North and South Campus is not as dramatic in terms of return rate with 52.5% of South Campus students returning compared to 49.7% from North Campus.

At the Wolfson Campus, the percent of returning students is lower than that observed on either North or South Campus as measured by the original suspension group (1978-79) and the total number of students suspended. Perhaps most surprising is the relatively small proportion of white non-Hispanic students who have returned (34.5% from the 1978-79 group and 43.0% overall). Even the Hispanic return rate is significantly lower at Wolfson compared to the two larger campuses. Interestingly, black non-Hispanic students have established not only a higher return rate, but even a higher graduation rate than that found among black non-Hispanics on either

North or South Campus. In fact, the graduation rate among black non-Hispanic students suspended during 1978-79 was higher than that found among Hispanics at the same campus (13.7% compared to 11.3%).

In Table 4, the data from the Medical Center Campus are displayed and, when compared to the other campuses, reflect some very impressive return and completion rates. The most remarkable finding is the high return rate among students suspended during the first several academic periods. For example, 76.3% of all students suspended in 1978-79 returned to this campus and 84.6% of the white non-Hispanics returned from the same suspension group. Over 30% of the Hispanics who returned from this group have completed their respective programs, a proportion higher than that found among any other returning group. To some extent, these impressive success rates are probably accounted for by the nature of the programs at this campus. In many cases, only about two years of academic work is required to become certified. Nevertheless, the relatively high rates of return and completion suggest that many students can recover from a deficit academic position.


Finally, Table 5 reflects the College-wide totals and serves as an overview of the effects of suspension at Miami-Dade. Since 1978-79, a total of 14,056 students have been suspended. Of that number, 7,778 or 55.3% had returned. When all students are combined, one observes that Hispanics in general tend to have the highest return rates, while white non-Hispanics account for the highest graduation rates among returning students. While it was found that very little comparative data are available, it is probably still safe to conclude that students suspended from Miami-Dade tend to return at a higher rate than elsewhere, and, with some exceptions, the subsequent completion rate is very similar to that found at other institutions.


