ABSTRACT

A committee comprised of children's book specialists from school and public libraries and a bookseller examined books published from November 1984 through November 1985, and compiled this annotated bibliography of picture books, fiction, and nonfiction. The bibliography is arranged by age group and categories, among which are picture stories for the youngest (up to age 7); stories, easy-to-reads, and verse (up to age 7); stories (from age 7 to 12); poems, legends, and the arts (from age 7 to 12); history, science, and nature (from age 7 to 12); fiction, fantasy, and science fiction (from age 12 to 14); biography, social science, and poetry (from age 12 to 14); and new editions of old favorites. Full bibliographic information and the International Standard Book Number (ISBN) are given for each book. (SRT)

WELCOME

to *Books for Children*, no. 2.

For this list, a committee comprising children's book specialists from school and public libraries and a bookseller have examined books published from November 1984 to November 1985, seeking to gather a selection of picture books, fiction, and nonfiction that will appeal to children, stimulate their imaginations, and meet their needs for information. Vital to satisfying fiction and picture-story books are such elements as plot, theme, style, pace, characterization, and setting. Essential to the picture-story book is the art—its harmony with the text, the line, shape, and design. Critical to nonfiction are accuracy, organization, timeliness, clarity of presentation, style, and quality of writing and illustration.

This year we have found an increase in quality of picture-story books and of board books geared to the youngest readers. Themes treated include going to day care or nursery school, the arrival of a new baby, realistic family situations, and concepts such as the alphabet and numbers. Best of all, we have found well-rounded stories, good for reading aloud, for family sharing.

The books are loosely arranged first by age group and then according to whether they are fiction or nonfiction, and they are listed within categories alphabetically by title. Each entry is provided full bibliographic information and each includes the International Standard Book Number (ISBN), useful for identifying a book and ordering it from a bookstore or directly from a publisher. Book prices listed here are, however, subject to change.

Other sources to consult include the following annual lists: the New York Public Library's *Children's Books*, the American Library Association's *Notable Children's Books*, and *Children's Reviewers' Choice* (published by the American Library Association); review journals, such as *Horn Book Magazine*, *School Library Journal*, *Bulletin from the Center for Children's Books*, and *Booklist*; and catalogs, such as the frequently revised H. W. Wilson's *Children's Catalog* and the Brant Foundation's *Elementary School Collection*. These may all be found in your local library.

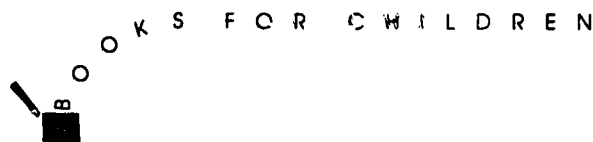
