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# Introduction

Materials are listed by intended audience level. Asterisks appear by items that have more than one audience level. A brief description of each item and applicable charges, if any, are given. Materials should be ordered directly from the publisher. Except where noted, multiple copies of all publications are available.

Federal Reserve Banks also offer other educational services, such as tours and workshops. To assist you in determining the Federal Reserve Bank servicing your region, a map outlining each Reserve District and a list of mailing addresses and telephone numbers have been included.

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# Teaching Packages

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## **Life of a Dollar Bill**

Depicts how currency and coin get into circulation and the role they play in generating gross national product (GNP) using a poster-comic learning unit. Supplemented by 25 copies of a four-page illustrated booklet. *New York*

## **The Road to Roota**

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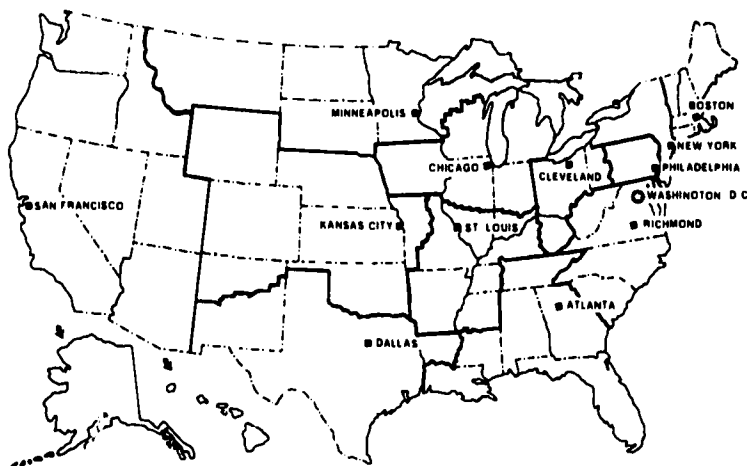
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# Federal Reserve System
