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ABSTRACT

A profile is provided of Illinois community college business centers and the activities they conducted under the fiscal year 1986 \$3.5 million economic development grant allocation. First, highlights of the year's accomplishments are presented, including: (1) community colleges provided training for 852 companies through 1,400 courses, serving 29,000 employees which contributed to the creation and retention of 6,500 jobs; (2) over 34,500 potential and existing business people were served through entrepreneurship training and services which helped create and retain nearly 3,900 jobs; and (3) nearly 2,900 businesses were provided assistance in seeking federal contracts, yielding \$39 million in funding. Next, background information is presented with respect to the Illinois community colleges' involvement in economic development. Subsequent sections are devoted to economic development grant use by activity; jobs created and retained with the assistance of community college economic development activities; economic development grant use by budget categories; and other funds budgeted for business center/economic development activities. Finally, the primary economic development grant activities conducted by the community colleges are discussed and results are summarized in terms of the retention and creation of jobs. The activities considered are industrial attraction, retention, and expansion; customized job training; entrepreneurship training for business owners and operators; contract procurement assistance; small business incubators; and employment, training and job search services for unemployed or underemployed persons. Tables providing statistical data related to the economic development grant activities are appended. (LAL)

## FISCAL YEAR 1986 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT GRANT REPORT

### Highlights

This report provides a profile of community college business centers and their activities conducted under the Fiscal Year 1986 \$3.5 million economic development grant allocation. These funds were distributed to the 38 recipient community college districts to enable them to operate business centers and economic development offices to provide training and services to businesses and to assist with local economic development efforts. The economic development grant has indeed had a significant impact on the economy of Illinois and has been a very good investment for the state, as can be seen from the following summary of the results:

- . Community colleges provided training for 852 companies through 1,400 courses, serving 29,000 employees which contributed to the creation and retention of 6,500 jobs.
- . Over 34,500 potential and existing business people were served through entrepreneurship training and services which helped create and retain nearly 3,900 jobs.
- . Nearly 2,900 businesses were provided assistance in seeking federal contracts, yielding \$39 million in contracts which contributed to the creation and retention of over 2,200 jobs.
- . Nearly 13,000 persons were provided employment training services to improve their job skills and assist them in seeking employment.
- . Seventeen community colleges were involved in helping to establish or operate small business incubators which provided services to 19 businesses and were in part responsible for the creation of over 100 jobs.
- . Nearly all the community college districts were involved in industrial retention, expansion, and attraction efforts which contributed to the retention of 68 firms, saving 2,000 existing jobs, and the start-up or expansion of 172 firms, creating nearly 3,000 new jobs.

FISCAL YEAR 1986 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT GRANT REPORT

REPORT: The purpose of this report is to provide a profile of community college business centers and their activities conducted under economic development grants during fiscal year 1986. The report also includes data on State Community College, which, although it does not receive a separate economic development grant, receives funding through its regular allocation for use in economic development activities.

Information contained in this report was obtained from reports submitted by each district. It is important to note that the data reflect only a portion of all job training and economic development activities conducted by Illinois public community colleges for two reasons. First, statistics were not available on all economic development grant activities at each district. Second, economic development activities funded by other sources were only minimally reflected in this report.

The cornerstone of Illinois community colleges' involvement in economic development is a network of business centers/economic development offices operated by all of Illinois' 39 districts. The primary purpose of the centers is to coordinate customized job training programs for new and existing business and industry, tailor-made to meet the businesses' specific needs. Another key activity is to provide entrepreneurship assistance to businesses through workshops, seminars, and in some cases direct consultation related to operating a business. Many community colleges regularly cooperate with other area economic development entities, such as local chambers of commerce, economic development commissions, local governments and the Department of Commerce and Community Affairs, to assist with the attraction and retention of commerce and industry.

In fiscal year 1986, the ICCB provided \$3.5 million in economic development grants to the 38 recipient community college districts to enable them to operate these business centers/economic development offices to provide these business training and services and to conduct other economic development activities to help create and retain jobs. Fiscal year 1986 was the third year of economic development grant funding. While the first two years of economic development grant funding were typically start-up or expansion years for most business centers, in this past year the community college business centers proved themselves as established partners in local economic development efforts. During this year, community college economic development activities assisted in the creation and retention of 17,725 jobs, indicating that the economic development grant has indeed had a significant impact on the economy of Illinois and has been a very good investment for the state.

The primary activities conducted under economic development grants during fiscal year 1986, as shown in Table 1, were entrepreneurship training and services for small businesses comprising an average of 30.7 percent of a district's time; customized job training programs for commerce and industry accounting for an average of 27.6 percent of a district's time; and industrial retention, expansion, and attraction activities comprising 17.2 percent of a district's time. The remaining 24.5 percent of time was divided among providing contract procurement assistance to businesses, providing training and job search services to unemployed persons, assisting with small business incubators, and miscellaneous economic development activities. These data are not significantly different from the previous year. In conducting these activities, the community colleges cooperated with key economic development groups on a regular basis.

Table 2 provides information on the impact of each economic development activity in contributing to the creation and retention of jobs in the local community. This table shows that activities carried out as a result of the ICCB economic development grant funds assisted in the creation or retention of 17,725 jobs. This is a significant increase from fiscal year 1985, when community colleges assisted in the creation and retention of 9,800 jobs.

During fiscal year 1986, community college districts used an average of 72 percent of their economic development grant for personnel and the remainder on expenses related to operating a business center and conducting economic development activities. Table 3 provides information on the planned use of economic development grants by budget categories.

Table 4 provides information on other funds budgeted for economic development activities. The data in Table 4 show that the \$3.5 million economic development grant allocation was supplemented by nearly \$24 million from the community colleges in the form of revenues from training and services, state grants, donations from private business, and allocations from the regular community college budget.

The results summarized in these four tables show that the grants meet their intent of enabling community colleges to operate business centers/economic development offices to provide services to business and to conduct economic development activities. Further, the results show that such efforts contribute to the creation and retention of a significant number of jobs.



The primary economic development grant activities conducted by community colleges and the resulting retention and creation of jobs are discussed in more detail below.

Industrial Attraction, Retention, and Expansion. The availability of training and skilled workers is one of the primary reasons a company stays in a community or relocates. This is particularly true for companies that are incorporating new technologies. Recognizing this, community colleges are increasingly more involved in helping companies locate, remain, or expand in their district and work regularly with their local chambers of commerce, economic development commissions, local governments, and the Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs (DCCA) in this regard.

Illinois community colleges are in a unique position to participate in or lead industrial retention, expansion, and attraction efforts because they serve as the providers of job training as well as training and services to business owners and managers. Community colleges are experienced in working with both the public and private sectors, can serve as a neutral coordinating entity to bring all the parties of economic development together, and have the professional staff capacity to assist with extensive industrial development efforts at the local level.

In addition to working directly with individual industrial firms on a case-by-case basis, most Illinois community colleges cooperate in organized regional industrial retention projects, in conjunction with chambers of commerce, local development organizations, local banks, DCCA, and the local governments, to maintain and strengthen the existing industrial base.

In fiscal year 1986, community college industrial retention, expansion, and attraction activities were conducted by 38 of the 39 districts, assisting in the start-up or expansion of 172 companies and the retention of 68 companies, creating 2,946 jobs and retaining 1,999 jobs.

Customized Job Training. Thirty-eight community college districts were involved in providing customized job training for area business and industry. Customized training programs provide the business with exactly the kind of training the firm needs; whatever the subject matter, the college can design or broker a training program to fit the bill. The schedule and duration of the training are totally up to the business. Most of the customized training is conducted on-site at the company's facilities, but training also can be conducted on campus or at any off-campus site. The instructors are specially chosen depending on the company's training needs. Most frequently, instructors are expert practitioners from the field who can provide training based on actual experience.

Such training is provided under contract to train new employees and keep existing employees up-to-date and/or upgrade their skills in order to maintain or increase profitability. In many cases, training is provided in order to assist with a plant location or expansion in Illinois. Community colleges regularly assist businesses seeking funding for training through various state programs as well as through JTPA, but the vast majority of the training is paid for by the company itself.

In fiscal year 1986, community colleges provided customized training through 1,374 courses for 852 companies, serving 29,328 employees. These efforts contributed to the start-up or expansion of 149 companies, creating 1,868 jobs, and the retention of 59 companies, retaining 4,633 jobs.

**Entrepreneurship Training for Business Owners and Operators.** In addition to providing training for company employees, Illinois community colleges also provide extensive training for business owners and operators. Workshops and seminars are held on a variety of topics of interest to small business, such as starting and operating a small business, business applications of computers, government financing programs, etc. These seminars and workshops frequently are cosponsored with the Small Business Administration, DCCA, or a local chamber of commerce.

Community colleges also provide entrepreneurship instruction to thousands of businesses through regular course offerings. For example, courses in small business administration, business law, business finance, accounting, personnel administration, and many others are available during evening hours at most community colleges. A number of community colleges also offer entrepreneurship certificate and degree programs.

During this fiscal year, the 39 community college districts conducted 1,304 entrepreneurship workshops and seminars attended by 27,880 existing and potential small business owners and operators. These efforts resulted in the start-up or expansion of 196 companies, creating 981 jobs, and the retention of 143 companies, retaining 532 jobs. Thirty-eight districts provided individualized small business counseling and management assistance to 6,634 persons. Such personalized services helped in the start-up or expansion of 242 companies, creating 1,241 jobs, and the retention of 185 companies, retaining 1,142 jobs. Entrepreneurship training and services therefore aided a total of 766 companies and contributed to the creation and retention of 3,896 jobs.

**Contract Procurement Assistance.** Recognizing that government purchases represent a lucrative market for businesses, DCCA operates the Illinois Procurement Outreach Program to enlist the aid of community colleges statewide in providing procurement assistance to businesses. Rising levels of federal spending, especially for defense purposes, generate new opportunities for the creation and retention of jobs. This year alone the federal government will spend approximately \$150 billion for goods and services. Providing assistance to businesses seeking federal contracts can help firms secure more federal contracts and can, therefore, have a significant impact on the state's economy.

Currently, 25 community college districts provide assistance to area business and industry in seeking state and federal contracts. Some have incorporated introductory contract procurement assistance into their other services, and yet others have implemented full-fledged programs. In fiscal year 1986, community college districts served 2,852 firms through services such as workshops, bidder list applications, bid preparations, and counseling. These

services helped obtain \$39,128,572 in contracts for Illinois businesses, resulting in the start-up or expansion of 14 companies and the retention of 25 companies, creating 115 jobs and retaining 2,142 jobs.

Small Business Incubators. A relatively new area for community colleges is small business incubators -- facilities that help new businesses get on their feet, generally by providing low rent; shared business services such as secretarial, telephone, copying, and accounting services; employee training; and management assistance. The role of the community college can range anywhere from providing the employee training and management assistance to helping organize and even operate the incubator.

During this fiscal year, 8 community college districts researched the feasibility of starting an incubator, 6 were involved in helping establish an incubator, 3 provided services to an existing incubator, and 3 operated an incubator on campus. Such efforts assisted in the retention of 2 companies, retaining 15 jobs, and the start-up or expansion of 17 companies, creating 111 jobs.

Employment, Training, and Job Search Services for Unemployed or Underemployed Persons. In addition to being involved in economic development through services to businesses, Illinois community colleges regularly provide training and job search services for persons seeking employment. A portion of such activities is funded with economic development grant funds. Thirty-three community college districts used economic development grant funds in this manner, conducting 84 workshops attended by 1,186 persons, conducting 242 courses attended by 3,217 persons, and providing counseling and placement assistance to 8,233 persons.

Illinois community colleges also are heavily involved in job training under the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA). Through the various JTPA programs, community colleges are able to conduct a wide variety of training for economically disadvantaged individuals and dislocated workers to assist them in obtaining skills for employment and to assist business and industry in obtaining skilled employees to allow them to expand or locate in Illinois. Illinois community colleges are involved in the JTPA administrative system as well. Community college representatives serve on private industry councils and the state Job Training Coordinating Council, and 5 of the 26 SDAs and 15 of the 19 dislocated worker centers in the state are administered by community colleges.

Conclusion. The economic development grant has indeed had a significant impact on the economy of Illinois and has been a very good investment for the state, as can be seen from the following summary of how community colleges helped create and retain 17,725 jobs:

- . Community colleges provided training for 852 companies through 1,400 courses, serving 29,000 employees which contributed to the creation and retention of 6,500 jobs.

- . Over 34,500 potential and existing business people were served through entrepreneurship training and services which helped create and retain nearly 3,900 jobs.
- . Nearly 2,900 businesses were provided assistance in seeking federal contracts, yielding \$39 million in contracts which contributed to the creation and retention of over 2,200 jobs.
- . Nearly 13,000 persons were provided employment training services to improve their job skills and assist them in seeking employment.
- . Seventeen community colleges were involved in helping to establish or operate small business incubators which provided services to 19 businesses and were in part responsible for the creation of over 100 jobs.
- . Nearly all the community college districts were involved in industrial retention, expansion, and attraction efforts which contributed to the retention of 68 firms, saving 2,000 existing jobs, and the start-up or expansion of 172 firms, creating nearly 3,000 new jobs.
