


ABSTRACT

This resource guide is designed to provide a starting place for planning and implementing programs in arts education. A short introductory section outlines the publication's purpose and describes sponsoring organizations. A section entitled "Program Planning for Arts Education" is divided into four subsections which provide a rationale for arts education, a detailed guide for planning an arts program, arts advocacy information, and a description of the Indiana Alliance for Arts Education. The bulk of the document is the section on resources. Separate subdivisions contain annotated listings for Indiana art museums, galleries, and associations; arts service organizations; dance; historical organizations; literature and media, local arts agencies; multi-arts; music; theater; and national organizations. A 27-item annotated bibliography concludes the document. (LP)







Purpose of the Guide

The first Indiana Arts Resource Guide was published in 1976 by the Art Education Association of Indiana. As a result of extensive use of the guide, the need for a second publication was recognized.

This guide is published by Young Audiences of Indiana in cooperation with the Indiana Arts Commission and the Indiana Department of Education. These organizations collaborate on a variety of programs in arts education to strengthen the cooperative network in planning and implementation of quality arts programs in the state.

The Indiana Arts Resource Guide will provide a starting place for planning and implementing programs in arts education. A major purpose is to increase the network of arts organizations and resources

and programs using arts education approaches.

The initial step in updating the guide was the mailing of a survey to organizations throughout Indiana. Mailings included current listings with the Indiana Arts Commission and listings taken from the first Indiana Arts Resource Guide. In addition, press releases were sent to media representatives statewide to increase exposure to those who might not have received the information survey by mail. Not included are school and church affiliated arts organizations and those organizations whose services are not designed to assist in developing arts education programs. Incomplete surveys or surveys that were submitted late may not have been included.

We have listed various types of resources in the sections that follow. Even though the listings include all regions of the state, this is certainly just a beginning to help locate the multitude of resources available. We encourage you to explore resources in your area-through school and community organizations, libraries, media, and known

arts resources to name just a few.

This guide was designed to be used in conjunction with initial or continued planning of long range, comprehensive arts education programs. It provides both arts rationale and resources and a basic format for program planning. The guide is divided into sections which may be used as separate entities; however, awareness of the extent of a total program is advised. Use of this guide alone or the mere establishment of a program by no means is the end. A comprehensive arts education program is an ongoing process that requires careful planning prior to actual implementation and continuing use of resources and planning.



Overview of Sponsoring Organizations


Based in Indianapolis, Young Audiences of Indiana, Inc., was founded in 1961, and is one of thirty-eight chapters in a nation-wide, non-profit network. Young Audiences exists to promote the cultural education of young people by presenting auditorium programs, workshops, and residencies appropriate to the age group and curriculum of the students. Such activities instill in students a desire for participation as performers or listeners and thus build a future audience for the performing arts. It is funded by several organizations including the Indiana Arts Commission and the Music Performance Trust Fund. Indiana Arts Commission

The Indiana Arts Commission is a state agency that provides financial and technical assistance to arts and cultural organizations, individual artists, community arts councils, and groups. The Commission was established in 1969 by the Indiana General Assembly and is funded by the General Assembly and the National Endowment for the Arts.

The purpose of the Indiana Arts Commission is to be the dynamic public leader on behalf of the arts in Indiana and to serve as a catalyst for the development of quality arts throughout the state. Arts education is a priority of the Commission as evidenced by the following major goal: To encourage and promote the growth and appreciation of high quality arts through education of individuals of all ages and artistic abilities.

The Indiana Arts Commission awards matching cash grants annually to arts and cultural organizations, artists, and other not-for-profit organizations that sponsor arts projects.





Artists in Education is a major educational program of the Commission. The program is funded by the Indiana Arts Commission and the National Endowment for the Arts, with matching contributions from local schools, community, private businesses, and foundations. The program places artists in educational programs throughout the state and strives to make the arts an integral part of the learning experience. Several educational outreach projects have been developed through the Artists in Education program. Other education grants are available through the Visiting Artist Program and the Arts Project Support division.

Department of Education

The Indiana Department of Education assists the General Assembly and the Indiana Board of Education by providing consultation and assistance on educational policies and recommends priorities, criteria, and action needed. It also insures that educational law is adhered to by the public schools. The Department of Education distributes financial and material resources, provides technical assistance, and acts as the chief state planning agency for the schools.


The Division of Curriculum of the Department of Education is responsible for assuring the most effective learning experiences for students in Indiana public school and pre-school programs. The Division of Curriculum provides leadership, guidance, and service to Indiana educato, parents, and the community. Consultants are in specialized areas and assist local schools in curriculum development and continued education. The Arts in Education Program, Building Bridges Between Schools and Communities is housed in the Division of Curriculum and coordinated by the state art and music consultants. The Arts in Education Program is an interagency effort with the Indiana Arts Commission. It is the result of ten years of cooperation and statewide planning to improve the status of all of the arts in Indiana schools. Building Bridges Between Schools and Communities is the state network of agencies and cooperating schools that serve as demonstration sites for Arts in Education. These school corporations help to expand the program concepts and strategies to schools throughout the state. They assist with the training of arts specialists and coordinators and provide technical assistance to state agency coordinators in the development of symposiums, workshops, and materials.

Arts in Education-Why?

The Indiana Department of Education, the Indiana Arts Commission and Young Audiences of Indiana are vitally interested in the improvement of the quality of education within the state of Indiana. It is the conviction of these agencies, shared by individuals and organizations throughout the state, that the arts can become useful tools for learning for all students and teachers as well as important fields of study in their own rights. The Arts in Education Program of the state of Indiana is concerned with quality general education and not only arts education.

The conceptual base for an arts in education program has been developed through several national programs. Credit for the concepts developed in the Indiana program must be given to the publications of the John D. Rockefeller 3rd Fund and its related projects.

Why are the arts valuable in education?

- The arts educate the total child by stimulating the child's natural curiosity and help students communicate more effectively.
- The arts motivate.
- The arts build self-esteem.
- The arts foster self-expression and facilitate creative problem solving by confronting the student with problems that require imagination as well as technical skills.
- The arts reinforce the student's ability to focus and expand attention span.
- The arts cross the boundaries of language, culture, and feelings, fostering understanding of different ethnic and economic backgrounds.
- The arts widen a student's perception of career opportunities.
- The arts prepare a student to use leisure time constructively.

Schools and communities that have participated in arts education programs have noted a better attitude from students toward school in general and a greater motivation toward learning. They have also noted that an arts education program does not interfere with the learning of basic skills such as math and reading; in fact, it may even help when the arts are used as teaching tools for these subjects.



The Arts in Education Program employs all of the arts: music, dance, drama, visual arts, filmmaking, photography, literature, crafts, architecture and environmental arts, and folk arts. All of the arts should be available to all of our citizens, not only the talented few. A quality general education program will include all of the arts for all of the children.

The Arts in Education Program is not a cultural enrichment program or another arts exposure project. It is a comprehensive, long-range school development project and instrument of effective educational change. It is based upon the belief that educational change through the arts is possible. The arts are absolutely essential to education. They are not "extras" or "frills"; they are integral to quality general education.

What are the goals of an arts in education program?

Three major goals of an arts education program are to:

Strengthen and improve instruction in all of the arts.

Students need the opportunity to participate in all of the arts.

They should receive exposure to and instruction in all of the


Integrate the arts within the curriculum.
The arts can become valuable tools for learning when they are used in the teaching of other subject areas. Take the general curriculum and introduce or integrate the arts within other subject

Our communities have a wealth of resources in terms of people, places, and programs. The artists and arts organizations in a community can offer much to the schools and community arts programs if they are involved directly in the curriculum and planning.




What are the characteristics of an arts in education program in a school?

- All of the arts are utilized.
- All of the children and teachers participate.
- The administration is supportive of the program.
- The arts are experienced as valuable subjects in their own right and strengthened.
- The arts are approached in an interdisciplinary method involving three basic components:
 - the process of correlation involving the arts in relationship with other arts and with other subject areas while preserving the equal status of each area.
 - a process of learning developed through the use of the arts and transferable to any other area of study.
 - a change in student attitude achieved through the arts selfawareness, creativity, and the positive self-image generated through the arts combining with other factors to produce in the student a motivation to learn.
 - The arts become an organizing force for interdisciplinary studies. Community resources, especially arts resources, are effectively utilized as part of the general education of the child and the general teaching of the instructor.
 - Multiple and broad-based sources of support combine to develop and implement the program with local control and support. This is a program which evolves from local needs and resources and is not imposed and controlled by outside forces.
 - The planning is characterized as being comprehensive in terms of general education of the child and the local control of the planning process.

Planning a Program

How does the planning begin?

Determine the amount of interest in arts education in your state or local school and community. Initiate acts activities and note participation of students, teachers, administrators, parents, and community persons. Remember that persons within the school or organization must exhibit an initial interest and lead any planning activities.

2. Establish a planning committee which represents education and

arts interests in the school and community.

The planning committee should determine the current status of 3. the arts program, identify local needs, and identify the local resources. It may then develop a comprehensive aits in education program for the local school corporation.

The Planning Committee


The planning committee should include the principal or an administrator, a classroom teacher or teachers, the art specialist or specialists, and parent and community representatives. The committee makeup and size will vary according to the program needs, but keep in mind representation from all areas involved in the program.

Planning sheets should be set up and copied for repeated and continued use as the program develops. They are crucial for assessing individual situations and establishing priorities and goals for immediate and long-range program development.

Planning Sheets

The questions that follow should be a part of the planning sheet set up with space for answers. The articulation of these elements as a part of the planning/assessment process will help to crystallize specific problems and provide creative and cooperative solutions as the various representatives on the planning committee respond from new perspectives and offer new insights.







What About Advocacy?

Advocacy is what the arts are about. If you are in any way actively involved, you are already an advocate. Advocacy is establishing support of all types in the community and schools, on the state and local levels. The more diverse the advocacy, the greater the expansion of the network. Advocacy is for expanded knowledge, support, and funding of the arts. Advocacy can happen through media, personal, and statewide contacts, schoolboard support, parent support, support from organizations with which you are currently involved.

An advocacy network already exists in the state through the Indiana Advocates for the Arts. The Indiana Advocates for the Arts is particularly concerned with current arts legislation and funding in the state. The following information comes from the Indiana Advocates for the Arts.

The arts work hard for Indiana. They generate economic growth, educate children and create a vital dimension to the quality of life.

- Each dollar spent on the arts in Indiana produces over \$3.00 in the local economy.
- Pupils in arts in education programs increased scores in basic skills tests by two to three grade levels.
- National businesses rank cultural resources second in importance when selecting a new plant or office location.

Indiana also works hard for the arts to unite corporations, arts groups, artists, and individuals to be actively involved in state legislative issues that impact the arts. In the past, the Advocates have helped increase state arts funding by 50 per cent. Recent state attention is on three major targets: increased funding for the arts through the Indiana Arts Commission, expansion of the Arts in Education program to all schools, and legislation to require a percentage for art in all state building budgets. Nationally the Advocates' concern is increased funding for the National Endowment for the Arts. State funded arts programs in Indiana today directly serve more than 4.5 million people.

The Indiana Alliance for Arts in Education

The Indiana Arts Commission and the Indiana Department of Education have formally agreed to cooperatively administer and coordinate the Indiana Alliance for Arts Education. An Alliance administered by the two state agencies with primary responsibility for the Indiana Arts in Education program will strengthen cooperative efforts, broaden support, and reflect the school/community collaboration that is the foundation of many Indiana arts programs.

The Alliance serves as an important network for maintaining communication among various organizations and agencies with an interest in upgrading the status of the arts in Indiana schools. The Indiana Alliance for Arts Education is part of a national network of state committees which advocate improved arts programs. The national network is administered by the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts through a grant from the U.S. Department of Education. Indiana is the first state to agree formally to a working relationship between the arts and education agencies within the state.
