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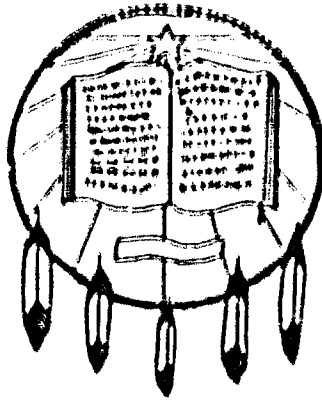
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ABSTRACT

Written for students and their parents, this guide focuses on health careers for American Indians and Alaska Natives while providing general information about financial support for college education. Material is presented in nine chapters that cover background information on health careers, information and scholarships for medical schools and related health professions, Master of Public Health (MPH) Program for American Indians and Alaska Natives, Bureau of Indian Affairs Higher Education Grant Program, Title IV grants from the United States Department of Education, tribal scholarships and loans, financial aid from schools, nationwide foundation and organizational support, and alternatives to scholarships. Numerous directories and resource lists are provided including 17 scholarships and 10 loans for minority group students pursuing health careers, 30 medical schools with programs for American Indian students, sources of tribal scholarships and loans, and 24 schools of public health in the United States and Canada. The financial aid from schools section gives addresses, contact persons, and types of help available from over 300 colleges and universities with separate Native American studies centers. The appendix includes a sample letter requesting scholarship information, a sample resume, a worksheet for determining college costs, an application checklist, and general words of advice and encouragement. 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FORWARD

The Master of Public Health Degree Program for American Indians and Alaska Natives in the School of Public Health, at the University of California, Berkeley, has been in existence for fifteen years. During that period 104 students enrolled in this program, with 20% of them advocated for and/or supported at eleven other Schools of Public Health around the country. The program has had thousands of inquiries since its inception in 1971 not only about graduate training in public health, but about health careers in other fields. Many of the inquiries have been for financial assistance information, at all the collegiate level. It is obvious that before there can be a large pool of graduate applicants, there must be first the interest of Indian youth in higher education. Secondly, it must be possible for them to achieve it. A major barrier is lack of adequate financial support. To meet the need for information concerning financial aid, this booklet was compiled for students and their parents to assist them in investigating sources of financial support for a college education.

If a student desires a college education, and has adequate preparation in high school, he/she should be able to achieve this goal, for there are many traditional sources of financial aid for Indian students; however, it does take time to research these sources and to locate the applicable sources for the particular needs of the student. New sources also become available. The purpose of this revision of our Financial Aid Booklet has been to update these resources for reliable and current information.

While the emphasis of the MPH Program for American Indians and Alaska Natives is primarily in training for public health careers, the information here on financial assistance is applicable to the securing of financial aid for many other types of training and education. INTRODUCTION

WHAT IS FINANCIAL AID?

Financial aid is a term used to describe sources of money which make it possible for you to pay for your college expenses. It is money provided through federal and state government programs, private sources, and from colleges/ university resources. Financial aid comes in various forms, a grant, a scholarship, a loan, or a part-time job. All are considered financial aid. Colleges often combine these forms of aid and offer the student a "financial aid package". Some of the steps in the financial aid application process are tedious and confusing particularly when it comes to filling out lengthy application forms, **BUT DO NOT GET DISCOURAGED**. It is very important to start early and plan ahead. Most Indian students attending college require some form of financial assistance in order to be able to attend the college or university of their choice. There are many people who are interested in helping you. You just need to ask. The financial aid office of the school you plan to attend is the best source of information.

THE PROCESS OF APPLYING FOR FINANCIAL AID:

Step 1: Determination of financial need - Obtain and complete a form. Submit for Financial Need Analysis (FNA). This is often done for colleges and universities by a centralized service. If this is the case, then the form for the analysis states where to send it. This information requires much financial information including income tax information to be submitted for analysis. Once the information is compiled, it is sent back to you for verification and correction, if needed. Do this promptly.

Step 2: Application to various sources of financial aid (separate from financial need analysis). Obtain and complete forms. Apply to all sources:

- (a) University
- (b) State

(c) Federal - including DSA

(d) Private Foundations

Step 2: Award of financial aid by the school or agency. Awards may be from several sources.

Step 4: Acceptance of the financial award. Acceptance forms must be completed and returned to the school indicating your acceptance.

These steps (1-4) occur over a period of months. It is important to start this process early in the fall prior to the start of your educational program.

BRIEF DESCRIPTIONS OF FINANCIAL AID:

Scholarships or Grants - Most scholarships do not meet the student's full financial need. Often additional funds from other sources are required to supplement a scholarship. A scholarship may be received both on the basis of financial need and academic achievement. A grant is on the basis of financial need alone.

Loans - You take out the loan in your own name and generally can borrow as much as \$5,000 per year. You do not pay interest while in college under a federally supported program and repayment starts shortly after you leave college and extends over a number of years.

College Work/Study - A federal program which provides part-time jobs for students with a demonstrated financial need. Jobs are available on-campus or off-campus with a public or private non-profit agency. The money earned during the school year and the summer can provide from \$600 to \$1,000 or more per year toward your education expenses.

SOURCES OF FINANCIAL AID:

Federal Financial Aid Programs - There are five major sources of assistance for college undergraduates financed by the federal government. These are the Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG), the National Direct Student Loan (NDSL), Federally Insured (or Guaranteed) Student Loan (FISL),

the Basic Educational Opportunity Grant (BEOG), and the College Work/Study Program.

State Financial Aid Programs - sources of information may be your high school or college counselor, your State Scholarship Commission, or the financial aid officer at a nearby college. Though states provide assistance indirectly through the financial aid programs at state-supported colleges, many often provide other scholarships and loans. Search these out as well by writing to your State Department of Education.

Private Scholarship Programs - These are generally competitive and often require special academic ability. There are some that are based on race, religion or parents' occupations, or limited to a specific state, region or city. These are some earmarked for Indian students and you should not hesitate to apply to as many as possible.

TYPES OF FINANCIAL AID AT THE GRADUATE LEVEL:

The range of financial assistance on the graduate level is very broad. Each type should be weighed in relation to its advantages and disadvantages in light of potential career choices. As an Indian student, you should be aware of and seek out the many types of assistance that are specifically for you as well as the programs available for all students.

The following generalized descriptions are types of financial assistance provided:

Fellowships - Awards ranging in value from a few hundred to perhaps several thousand dollars and requires no service to the institution in return. Fellowships are usually awarded on the basis of merit and are highly competitive.

Teaching Assistantships - Usually provide you with full or partial tuition remission and sometimes a stipend for expenses. Requires the recipient to provide the institution with a specific amount of undergraduate teaching. Teaching assistantships are generally reserved for advanced graduate students who are assigned to discussion sections or fundamental and elementary courses in the discipline. (Some T.A.'s

do no more than grade papers, compile bibliographies, or monitor laboratories.)

Research Assistantships - Similar to teaching assistantships in the manner in which financial assistance is provided. The difference is that the student is given basic research assignments in his/her discipline rather than teaching responsibilities in return for his/her grant. May be closely related to course work and in some instance, may be used to meet, in part, requirements of degree programs.

Administrative Internships - Financial assistance similar to teaching and research assistantships with regard to the disposition of funds, but the student is given an assignment to work on a part-time basis, usually as a special assistant to one of the university's administrative officers such as the president, vice-president, the provost, the dean of the graduate school, an associate dean, or the director of admissions. These assistantships are popular assignments for minority students, who may be asked to undertake special minority-related studies for an administrative officer of an university.

Dormitory and Counseling Assistantships - Frequently assigned to graduate students in psychology, counseling, and social work to provide valuable work experience. Dormitory assistantships sometimes include room and board, in addition to tuition and stipends.

Loans - Available from local banks, governmental agencies, and university sources for graduate study.

Employment - Still another way that some students use to finance their graduate studies. Full-time graduate students, however, are the first to admit that it is extremely difficult to hold a job and meet the expectations of professors as well as an employer. You should, therefore, be extremely cautious before taking on both a job and full-time graduate study simultaneously. There are limitations on the amount of time you can work.

SECTION 3

HEALTH CAREERS

THERE ARE A GREAT VARIETY OF HEALTH CAREERS. THEY DIFFER GREATLY IN THE EDUCATIONAL REQUIREMENTS AND SKILLS NECESSARY TO FUNCTION IN THAT CAREER. A PROBLEM THAT MANY STUDENTS HAVE IS HOW TO CHOOSE WHICH PARTICULAR HEALTH CAREER TO PURSUE. YOU SHOULD BEGIN TO THINK ABOUT THIS CHOICE OF WHICH HEALTH CAREER EARLY.

ONE WAY TO HELP YOU DECIDE WHICH HEALTH CAREER TO PURSUE IS TO COMPARE YOUR PARTICULAR INTERESTS, SKILLS, AND STRENGTHS TO THE QUALIFICATION AND SKILLS NEEDED FOR THE HEALTH CAREER YOU MIGHT BE INTERESTED IN. FIRST COMPARE A LIST OF YOUR IDEAS AND DESIRES, SCHOOL SUBJECTS YOU ENJOY AND/OR DO WELL IN, HOBBIES AND SPECIAL INTERESTS.

NEAR COMPLETE INFORMATION ABOUT THE HEALTH CAREER(S) YOU ARE INTERESTED IN, THIS INFORMATION SHOULD INCLUDE INFORMATION ABOUT WHAT EACH CAREER DOES, WHERE THEY ARE, AS WELL AS EDUCATIONAL PREPARATION REQUIRED. THE INFORMATION ABOUT SPECIFIC HEALTH CAREERS CAN BE OBTAINED IN SEVERAL WAYS:

- 1) USE YOUR SCHOOL OR COMMUNITY LIBRARIES.
- 2) TALK WITH YOUR SCHOOL GUIDANCE COUNSELOR.
- 3) TALK WITH SOMEONE WHO IS IN THE FIELD YOU ARE INTERESTED IN SUCH AS: A DENTIST, NURSE OR DOCTOR. (MOST PEOPLE ARE HAPPY TO TELL YOU ABOUT THEIR WORK, AND IT'S ADVANTAGES AND DISADVANTAGES.)
- 4) ATTEND HEALTH CAREER FAIRS.
- 5) VOLUNTEER AT A HEALTH AGENCY OR HOSPITAL.
- 6) WRITE NATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS TO FIND OUT ABOUT EDUCATIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR VARIOUS HEALTH CAREERS.

REMEMBER, THAT EVEN IF YOU DECIDE THAT THE PARTICULAR HEALTH CAREER IS NOT FOR YOU, YOU CAN ALWAYS CHANGE YOUR MIND. THE IMPORTANT THING IS THAT YOU HAVE INFORMATION AND A GENERAL DIRECTION TO FOLLOW.

REQUIREMENT OF A HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA

Colleges are providing careers in health. There is great need for health people trained in the health field. There are many career possibilities in health, some requiring a college degree and others requiring a training program (which a college degree is needed). Some examples of these career possibilities are listed below.

THE INDIAN HEALTH CARE IMPROVEMENT ACT - P.L. 94-437

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS

In the Indian Health Care Improvement Act, Public Law 94-437, the Congress and President of the United States established a national goal "...to provide the quantity and quality of health services which will permit the health status of Indians to be raised to the highest possible level...".

In order to accomplish this goal, the Act and subsequent amendments of 1980 authorize the Indian Health Service (IHS) to conduct three interrelated scholarship programs to train the health professional personnel necessary to staff IHS health programs and other health programs serving the Indian people. These scholarship programs are the:

- 1) Health Professions Preparatory Scholarship Program (Section 103);
- 2) Health Professions Pregraduate Scholarship Program (referred to as Section 103); and
- 3) Health Professions Scholarship Program (Section 104).

(1) Health Professions Preparatory Scholarship Program
Section 103 provides financial assistance for Indian students only to enroll in courses that will prepare them for acceptance into health professions schools, i.e., medicine, nursing, pharmacy, etc. Courses may be either compensatory (required to improve science, mathematics, or other basic skills and knowledge) or preprofessional (required in order to qualify for admission into a health professions program).

(2) Health Professions Pregraduate Scholarship Program
Section 103P provides financial support for Indian student only to enroll in courses leading to a baccalaureate degree in specific preprofessional areas such as premedicine or preosteopathy, and predentistry.

An applicant for Section 103P must: 1) be an American Indian or Alaska Native; 2) be a high school graduate or

equivalent; 3) have capacity to complete a health professions course of study; and 4) be enrolled, or accepted for enrollment in a baccalaureate degree program for premedicine or its equivalent; 5) have a cum GPA of 3.0 or above on a 4.0 scale; and 6) intend to serve Indian people upon completion of professional health care education and training as a health care provider in the discipline/speciality for which the applicant is enrolled at the pregraduate level and for which the application is submitted.

(3) Health Professions Scholarship Program

Section 104 provides financial assistance to students enrolled in health professions and allied health professions programs. For the Section 104 program, there are service obligation and payback requirements that the recipient incurs upon acceptance of the scholarship funding.

Priority Health Career Categories for Section 104:

Dentistry--Applicant must be enrolled in an accredited school of dentistry.

Engineering--Applicant must be enrolled in a baccalaureate or master's degree program for civil engineering, environmental engineering, and mechanical engineering only.

Health Records--Applicant must be in an accredited registered records administrator level program leading to a baccalaureate degree only.

Medicine--Applicant must be enrolled in an accredited program for MD or DO degree.

Nursing, ADN, BSN, MS Degrees--Program for which applicant is accepted or enrolled must be approved by the National League for Nursing (NLN). Contact your IHS Area Scholarship Coordinator listed on page 10 to confirm NLN approval of the school and nursing program.

Accounting--Applicant must be enrolled in the Junior or Senior level.

Pharmacy--Applicant must be enrolled in the Junior or Senior level of a school of pharmacy.

Public Health, MPH--Applicant must be enrolled in a school of public health and must have a degree in a health discipline and a minimum of two (2) years of health delivery experience.

Dietitian/Nutritionist--Applicant must be enrolled in the Junior or Senior level.

Sanitarian--Applicant must be enrolled for environmental health, environmental science, and occupational safety and health in the Junior or Senior level.

Medical Technologist, B.S. Degree--Applicant must be enrolled in the Junior or Senior level.

Health Care Administration, MS or MA Degree--Applicant must be enrolled in the Junior or Senior level.

Statistician, BS or MA Degree--Applicant must be enrolled in the Junior or Senior level.

Dental Hygiene--Applicant must be enrolled in the Junior or Senior level.

Externships for Section 104 Recipients (Section 105)

Individuals receiving Section 104 scholarships are entitled to employment by the IHS for up to 120 days per calendar year during any non-academic period in accordance with the provisions of Section 105 of the Act. Salary is based on the number of years of academic training which the individual has had. Details of the externship will be provided in a student handbook sent to each student upon his/her acceptance into the Section 104 program.

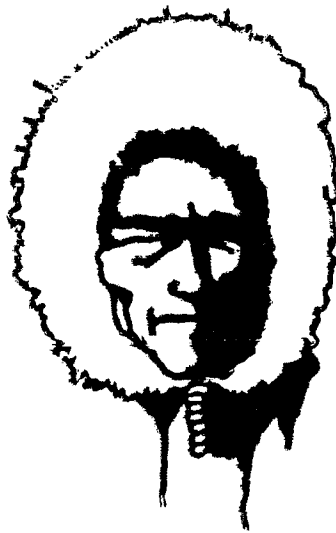

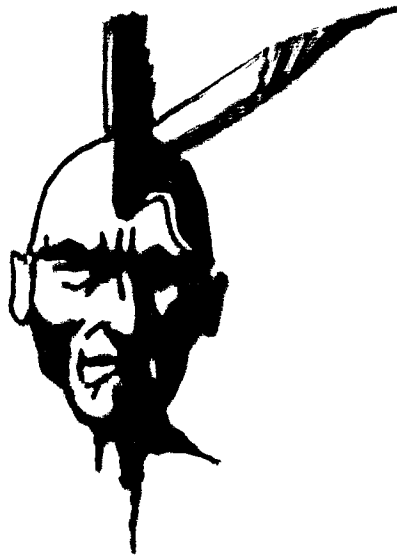

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PUBLIC HEALTH - WHAT IS IT?

Public Health as a field is devoted to the promotion of health and the prevention of disease through the identification of the factors affecting the health population groups and the determination of how best to bring about change necessary to assure the maximum well-being of all people. Accomplishing this mission requires the joint efforts of professionals from many disciplines directing their attention toward understanding the biologic, environmental, and social factors involved in the causation of diseases, as well as toward health policy and the structure of the health care system in public health. Identification of populations with special health needs and methods for addressing those needs are of special concern.

THE MASTER OF PUBLIC HEALTH DEGREE - WHAT IS AN MPH DEGREE?

A Master of Public Health degree is a graduate degree that is awarded to someone completing the academic requirements established at any of the 24 Schools of Public Health across the country. Students enrolled in Schools of Public Health can choose specializations such as clinic administration, health planning, health education, or any one of a field of fifteen or more different specialties. People interested in the field of public health are generally concerned with developing skills to work on problems affecting the health of the public or a community at large. Their approach is largely focused towards prevention.

Health Policy and Administration

Health Education

Biomedical Sciences

Biostatistics

Environmental Health

Epidemiology

Behavioral Science

Maternal and Child Health

Public Health Nutrition

Health Services Management
(combines MPH/MPA degrees)
Forensic Studies

WHY A SPECIAL MPH PROGRAM FOR AMERICAN INDIANS?

There are relatively few American Indians who have a Master of Public Health degree; however, more and more legislation such as the Indian Self-Determination Act, and the Indian Health Care Improvement Act calls for trained Indian people in administrative and policy making positions. Individuals who hold MPH degrees work in a variety of settings. They can plan and administer health programs at tribal, county, state or federal levels. They can administer hospitals or work in clinics developing health programs. They can work at policy making levels, or in developing and implementing new legislation that can affect Indian health for years to come.

Students enrolled in the MPH Program in the School of Public Health at the University of California at Berkeley, work toward the same MPH degree as any other student, are in the same classes and take the same examinations. Programs range from twelve to twenty one months depending upon the area of specialization chosen. Students also participate in 3-6 months off campus internships, at which time students can put into practice the theories learned at school.

The mission of a school of public health is to develop and teach the application of the social, administrative, biomedical and environmental sciences to the solution of community health problems. As an Indian student considering a health field, entering a school of public health could be the best direction in creating a better future for the Native people and yourself.

There are twenty four Schools of Public Health in major universities around the country. General application requirements for most Schools of Public Health are a bachelor's

degree with relevant undergraduate course work and usually the Graduate Record Examination (GRE).

BACKGROUND OF THE MPH PROGRAM AT THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, BERKELEY

In 1971 the program started at the School of Public Health, University of California, Berkeley, for Indian students entering graduate school in the field of public health. A recruiting and support mechanism was established and in the fall, three months after the award of the grant, there were ten entering students. The program is presently going into its fifteenth year of operation.

184 STUDENTS TO DATE

Currently there are 184 students who have graduated or who have been enrolled in MPH Programs through the Berkeley program. Seven of the graduates have gone on to medical school and sixteen to further graduate study.

Ninety percent of those now employed hold positions with tribes, Indian Health Service, or in other programs directly concerned with Indian needs. Students have come from 68 tribes and 35 different states which is a clear demonstration of the national scope of the program.

ABOUT THE SCHOOL OF PUBLIC HEALTH AT BERKELEY

Since its establishment in 1948, the School of Public Health has provided trained personnel who have assumed leadership positions around the state, nation and the world. The School concentrates on the development and dissemination of new knowledge regarding the promotion of health, prevention of disease, and organization and operation of health care systems. Major areas of research emphases are the study of disease causation, environmental effects on health and disease, research methodology, health behavior determinants, organizational dynamics, operational analysis, planning strategies, consumer participation and program evaluation.

The School of Public Health is organized into two departments for the implementation of its academic programs: The Department of Biomedical and Environmental Health Sciences (BEHS) and the Department of Social and Administrative Health Sciences (SAHS). Each department is subdivided into smaller curricular groups which provide various emphases. In BEHS, the major curricular groups are Biomedical Sciences, Biostatistics, Environmental Health Sciences, Epidemiology, and Forensic Science. In SAHS, the curricular groups are Behavioral Sciences, Maternal and Child Health, Health Policy and Administration, Public Health Education, and Public Health Nutrition.

Although the two departments are divided into programs, they have the overall responsibility of presenting a curriculum that reflects the educational objectives suggested by the departmental name. Emphasis, however, is placed on providing all students with an understanding of epidemiology, biostatistics, environmental health, health behavior, health policy, and health care delivery.

A GRANT IS AVAILABLE TO A PERSON WHO IS RECOGNIZED BY THE SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR AS A MEMBER OF AN INDIAN TRIBE WHO HAS AT LEAST ONE-FOURTH BLOOD INDIAN BLOOD, WHO HAS BEEN ADMITTED FOR ENROLLMENT IN AN ACCREDITED INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND HAS FINANCIAL NEED.

UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS MUST CONTACT THEIR HOME AGENCY, TRIBE, OR AREA OFFICE THAT ADMINISTERS THE HIGHER EDUCATION GRANT PROGRAM FOR THEIR TRIBE FOR AN APPLICATION AND OTHER FINANCIAL AID INFORMATION. ALL APPLICANTS MUST APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID THROUGH THE COLLEGE FINANCIAL AID OFFICE BEFORE THEIR DEADLINE TO RECEIVE A COMPLETE FINANCIAL AID PACKAGE.

BUREAU OF INDIAN AFFAIRS' HIGHER EDUCATION GRANT PROGRAM

The information contained in this section covers both Bureau of Indian Affairs Higher Education Grant and Thirdly Contracted Higher Education programs.

Objectives of the Grant Program

The objective of the Bureau of Indian Affairs' Higher Education Grant Program is provide financial aid to eligible Indian students to enable them to attend accredited institutions of higher education.

GRANTS

The Bureau has two grants which are available to eligible applicants: undergraduate grants and fellowship grants.

Educational grants are administered by the Bureau's Area/ Agency offices and, in some cases, Third Contractors, under the provisions of 25 CFR Part 22.

Fellowship grants are available from programs contracted with American Indian Scholarships, Inc, and the American Indian Law School Program.

Loans

Educational loans are administered under the provisions of 25 CFR, Part 21 - loans to Indians from the Revolving Loan Fund. Application for these loans must be made through either the Tribal Credit Association or the Bureau's Agency Offices.

Selection of a University or College

A student must attend an institution of higher education that has been accredited by a nationally recognized accrediting agency or association, and which provides an education program culminating in a bachelor's degree or an acceptable two-year program leading to a bachelor's degree.

Eligibility Requirements

A grant is available to a person who is recognized by the Secretary of the Interior as a member of an Indian tribe who has at least one fourth degree Indian blood, who has been admitted for enrollment in an accredited institution of higher education and has financial need.

Application Procedure

A student must:

- 1) Obtain grant application from the Area Office or Tribal Office that has service responsibility for his/her Tribal group.
- 2) Contact his/her BIA/Tribal Contact Office to obtain a Certificate of Degree of Indian Blood (CDIB) and Tribal enrollment. (Attach CDIB to grant application).
- 3) Write to the admissions office of the school he/she is interested in attending for an application. Request a housing form if campus residency is required.
- 4) Request a financial aid packet from the school's financial aid officer, who will prepare a financial aid package based on the applicant's need.
- 5) Mail documents, (BIA grant application form, Certificate of Degree of Indian Blood, grades/transcripts, college/university form, financial aid packet, school admission application), to the appropriate BIA or Tribal Office well in advance of the deadline.

Deadlines for BIA/Tribal Application

March 15 for Fall term and next academic year; October for the second semester; second & third quarters, second & third quarters, second & third trimesters. April 15th for summer school.

Deadlines for Colleges/Universities

beginning in January and usually before March 15th

Tips for Students

It is your responsibility to take care of these expenses:

fees = admissions application fee, a housing deposit,

transportation costs, and any other fees which may be necessary

before registration. Pay by money order or check and keep

receipts.

NOTE: Any BIA grant awarded to a student cannot be made available until that student arrives on campus to register.

DON'T WORRY ABOUT APPLYING TO MORE THAN ONE SCHOOL. MANY SCHOOLS ALSO WAIVE APPLICATION FEES (YOU DON'T PAY) FOR MINORITY STUDENTS. HOWEVER, THIS WAIVER MUST BE REQUESTED.

THERE ARE ALSO QUITE A FEW SCHOOLS WHICH OFFER SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS SPECIFICALLY FOR AMERICAN INDIANS. ON THE FOLLOWING PAGES ARE A LISTING OF SOME OF THESE SCHOOLS, AND THEIR FIELDS OF INTEREST. IF YOU FIND ONE THAT INTERESTS YOU, DON'T HESITATE TO APPLY.

SCHOOLS WILL IN MANY CASES ACCEPT STUDENTS WHO DON'T MEET THEIR SCHOLASTIC REQUIREMENTS BUT WHO THEY FEEL WILL DO A GOOD JOB. THEY SOMETIMES GIVE SOME FORM OF TUTORING AND ACADEMIC ASSISTANCE. SO DON'T BE AFRAID TO TRY. A LITTLE BIT OF EFFORT ON YOUR PART CAN MEAN A GREAT OPPORTUNITY FOR YOUR FUTURE. ALL IT TAKES IS A LITTLE BIT OF TIME.

THE MASTER'S AND DOCTORAL DEGREE

Many students have heard the term "graduate and professional schools." Many also may not be aware that while the terms are similar, they are not exactly the same. Graduate schools offer academic degrees, usually a master or doctorate, in academic disciplines. Professional schools are designed to prepare one to enter a specific profession such as the law, medicine, dentistry or the ministry.

There are three graduate degrees. The Master of Arts (M.A.) and Master of Science (M.S.), commonly called the master's degree, and the Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.), commonly called the doctorate, are the three that students most often attend graduate school to obtain. In certain disciplines, students are awarded masters or doctorates with names such as Master of Music (M.M.), Master of Science in forestry (M.S.F.), Master of Public Health (M.P.H.), Doctor of Fine Arts (D.F.A.), Doctor of Psychology (Psy.D.). Degrees such as these are generally regarded as the equivalent of the M.A., M.S., or Ph.D. Professional schools also award their own special degrees such as Bachelor of Divinity (B.D.), Doctor of Dental Science or Doctor of Dental Surgery (D.D.S.).

The Ph.D. or its equivalent has become symbolic as a standard representing academic excellence. In fact, the Ph.D., or its equivalent has been a virtual requirement for people who have aspired to careers in college or university teaching. A large proportion of the people who study for the Ph.D. and other doctorates plan to do research or teaching at a college or university. College teaching is frequently a career objective for the person who enjoys working with ideas and with young scholars and colleagues in exploring and evaluating concepts, hypotheses, and theories.

OTHER STUDENT SUPPORT SOURCES

Eligibility requirements are stated here. To send for an application: (1) you must have graduated from high school or be enrolled in the final year of high school study; (2) you must meet the admission requirements of an accredited community college, college or university; & (3) you must be able to demonstrate financial need as determined by standards to be established by Student Financial Aid, Department of Education.

ALASKA: Quite a few state scholarships are provided each year at the University of Alaska for Alaskan Aleute, Eskimo and Indian students. For further information, contact: Dean of Students, University of Alaska, Anchorage, Alaska 99706

ARIZONA: Scholarships covering tuition and fees are available to qualified Arizona Indians, contact: Board of Regents, Phoenix, Arizona, or Contact: State College of your choice.

CALIFORNIA: Maple Creek Willie Indian Scholarship Fund, State Education Building, 721 Capital Mall, OTP - Rm. 205, Sacramento, CA 95814. The funds will be available to eligible applicants in the form of a limited number of scholarship grants for the purpose of providing education opportunities for high school graduate California Indians. Scholarships shall be granted to eligible applicants on a yearly basis as long as there are funds available, not to exceed a total of four years for each recipient, for training at California. (1) Community Colleges, or (2) Colleges, or (3) Universities, or (4) Vocational schools, public or private approved by the Scholarship Selection Board as Suitable.

FLORIDA: Seminole and Miccosukee Indian Scholarship - Office of Student Financial Assistance Department of Education, Knott Bldg., Tallahassee, FL 32301. The Seminole/Miccosukee Indian Scholarship Program was created to award scholarships

to Florida Seminole and Miccosukee Indians. Funds for the support of the Seminole/Miccosukee Indian Scholarship Program are contingent upon the appropriation made available by the Florida Legislature. ILLINOIS: The American College of Hospital Administrators - 840 North Lake Shore Dr., Chicago, IL 60611. Offers a limited number of scholarship Loans to assist "worthy" students in continuing their professional education and training towards careers in hospital administration.

ILLINOIS: Institute of Food Technologists _ 221 North Lasalle Street, Suite 2120, Chicago, IL 60601. Offers fellowships and scholarships to students pursuing a program leading to a degree in the general field of Food Technology or Food Science.

ILLINOIS: American Society of Clinical Pathologists - Board of Registry of Medical Technologists, P.O. Box 12270, Chicago, IL 60612. These AMA Approved schools waive tuition and pay stipends to students.

MINNESOTA: State Indian Scholarship Program - Eligibility: (1) Must be one-fourth degree or more Indian ancestry; (2) Must be a resident of Minnesota and a member of a recognized Indian Tribe; (3) Must be a high school graduate or have an approved equivalent certificate; (4) Have ability to benefit from advanced education; (5) Must be accepted by an approved college, university or vocational school in Minnesota; and (6) Must be accepted and recommended by the Minnesota Indian Scholarship Committee. Applications may be obtained from: Indian Education Guidance Consultant, Minnesota Building, 410 Minnesota Avenue, Bemidji, Minnesota 56601.

Other Programs and Assistance Available:

The Minnesota Indian Scholarship Committee meets monthly but has no private funds. Indian students with less than one-quarter degree Indian ancestry and special cases may be considered by this committee who makes recommendations for special scholarships.

ILLINOIS: State Nursing Grants in Aid - These are available from the State Board of Nursing, 717 Delaware, Minneapolis, MN 55414, after acceptance in an accredited practical or professional nursing school in Minnesota. Maximum grants \$300 for practical nursing and up to \$2000 for the registered nurse program. Apply through your school counselor, principal or directly to the nursing school you will attend.

MISSOURI: Financial Assistance for Missouri Students--Missouri Student Grant Program; Missouri Guaranteed Student Loan Program; Missouri Plus Loan Program. Missouri Grant to: U.S. Citizens, Missouri residents, full-time undergraduates, attending 77 specific schools in Missouri. Must demonstrate financial need

MONTANA: Fee Waiver - American Indians - Each unit of the Montana University System is authorized to grant Waivers of registration and incidental fees to any persons of one-quarter Indian blood or more, who have been bona fide residents of the State of Montana for at least one year prior to enrollment in the Montana University System, who have completed a four year course of an accredited high school or federal Indian school and who demonstrate financial need. Each unit shall make rules governing the selection of these Indian students.

NEBRASKA: In-state Tuition costs available for students attending any Nebraska State College. Certification of one-quarter or more degree Indian blood quantum must be provided at the time of application to the institution of your choice.

NEVADA: MAX C. Fleischmann Foundation - Chairman, Scholarship Committee, Nevada State Department of Education, 400 West King Street, Capitol Complex, Carson City, NV 89701

Fleischmann College Program - Scholarships are available to seniors graduating from Nevada high schools and are to be utilized for the freshman year of college study.

Fleischmann Nevada Community College Program - Scholarships are available to residents of the State of Nevada who are enrolled as full-time students in an occupational service area in a Nevada community college.

Fleischmann Dental Program - Scholarships are available to students who are residents of the State of Nevada and who have completed their pre-dental training and are entering their freshman year of dental school.

Fleischmann Medical Program - Scholarships are available to residents of the State of Nevada who have completed their pre-medical training and are entering their freshman year of medical school.

Fleischmann Indian Program - Scholarships are available to Indian students graduating from Nevada high schools and are to be utilized for the freshman year of college study.

Scholarships are for \$1000 and are for one year only, non-renewable. Eligibility: (1) Must be an American Indian and a resident of the State of Nevada or be a member of a Nevada Indian Tribe and, (a) be attending a Nevada high school with graduating senior status; or (b) have been graduated from a Nevada high school at mid-year during the current school year. (2) Must submit application, (a) letter of recommendation from school personnel or an individual who has known the applicant for at least ten years; (b) transcripts of grades for the junior and senior years as well as the scores received on the Scholastic Aptitude Test and/or the American College Test. (3) Must have documentation of at least one-quarter degree Indian blood quantum.

NEW YORK: Student aid for Native Americans at postsecondary institutions in the State of New York: In order to be eligible to receive Native American Student Aid, a student must meet the following criteria: (1) The student must be a resident of New York State and be on an official tribal roll of a New York State tribe or be the child of an enrolled member of a New York State Tribe. The student must have graduated from an accredited high school, attained a high school equivalency diploma or be enrolled in a special 24-credit-hour program at an approved institution. Eligible students must apply to the State Education Department to receive Native American Student Aid. NORTH DAKOTA: State Board for Indian Scholarships - North Dakota Indian Scholarship Program, North Dakota Indian Affairs Commission, State Capital, Bismarck, ND 58505. Eligibility of candidates: To be eligible for consideration, a candidate must: (1) Be of at least one fourth ($\frac{1}{4}$) degree Indian blood and a resident of North Dakota or be an enrolled member of a tribe now resident in North Dakota. (2) Be accepted by an institution of higher learning in North

(3) Be in good health and of good character. (4) Be in financial need (5) Indicate probable and continuing success as a student. Can be used to pursue any full-time course offered in a regular academic year by any institution of higher learning or state vocational education program in North Dakota. State vocational education program shall mean any vocational program funded by the State Board of Higher Education, the State Board of Vocational Education or from the funds provided by the State General Fund to the Junior colleges.

RHODE ISLAND: Rhode Island Higher Education Assistance

Authority: Rhode Island Higher Education Assistance Authority, 274 Weybosset Street, Providence, RI 02903. (401) 277-2050.

Scholarship and Grant Program for legal residents of Rhode Island and the guaranteeing agency for Federal Student and Parents Loans. Scholarship and Grants are ONLY for undergraduates.

GRANT PROGRAM: Must be United States Citizen/eligible non-citizen and Rhode Island Resident; must demonstrate financial need.

SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM: Same as grant program except must also show academic potential as measured by Scholastic Aptitude Test Scores in addition to demonstration of financial need.

TEXAS: Minson-Hazlewood Student Loan (MHSLS): This is a long-term, low-interest loan which must be repaid to the State of Texas beginning six months after the student ceases to be enrolled for at least six semester credit hours. Students should contact the Financial Assistance Office regarding specific information on this loan program and for the necessary application.

LOANS AND WORK-STUDY PROGRAMS ARE ALTERNATIVE SOURCES OF FINANCIAL AID FOR THE STUDENT. ELIGIBILITY FOR PART-TIME WORK OR FOR A LOAN WITH MINIMUM INTEREST IS USUALLY DETERMINED BY THE FINANCIAL AID OFFICER AT THE UNIVERSITY. SOME OF THE GENERAL INFORMATION REGARDING THE DIFFERENT PROGRAMS IS INCLUDED ON THE FOLLOWING PAGES.

ALTERNATIVES TO SCHOLARSHIPS

GRANTS

Basic Education Opportunity Grant (BEOG) - A direct grant from the government based on need, the Basic Grant is an entitlement. You are eligible if you have been accepted as a least half-time student at an eligible institution. A student can receive up to \$1,000 per year. Special BEOG applications can be obtained at high schools, community agencies, libraries, and colleges.

Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG) - A non-repayable grant by the school to assist undergraduate students who have an exceptionally high financial need and are carrying at least one-half of a normal academic load. A student can receive no less than \$200 and no more than \$1,500 per year. Apply at the Office of Financial Aid.

College Work/Study - A federal program which provides part-time jobs for students with a demonstrated financial need. Jobs are available on campus or off-campus with a public or private non-profit agency. A student can earn between \$600 and \$1,000 per year; the amount a student earns is dependent upon wage scale and the number of hours he is able to work. Apply at the financial aid office.

LOANS

Health Professions Student Loan Program - Grants Management Staff, Division of Physician & Health Professions Education, Bureau of Health Manpower Education, National Institutes of Health, 9000 Rockville Pike, Bethesda, MD 20014

National Direct Student Loan (NDSL) - A Federal program to provide needy students with a long-term low interest loan for educational purposes. To qualify for the NDSL a student must carry at least one-half of the normal course load as defined by the school. The School determines who is eligible and the amount of the loan. During the first two-years of undergraduate study a student may borrow up to \$2,500 in NDSL with not more than \$5,000 accumulated during the years of

undergraduate work. Repayment begins nine months after the student ceases at least half-time study. Apply at the financial aid office.

Nursing Student Loan Program - Division of Nursing, Bureau of Health Manpower Education, National Institutes of Health, 9000 Rockville, Bethesda, Maryland 20014. Students may borrow \$2,500 for an academic year, or the amount of your financial need, whichever is the lesser. The total amount of a student's loans for all years may not exceed \$10,000.

Guaranteed Student Loan Program - Bureau of Student Financial Assistance, U.S. Office of Education, 400 Maryland Ave., S.W., Washington, D.C. 20202. Enables students who are enrolled or accepted for enrollment at least half-time in an eligible school to borrow directly from banks, credit unions, savings and loan institutions, or other lenders who are willing to make educational loans. Students may borrow up to \$7500 for undergraduate study or \$10,000 for graduate and undergraduate study combined.

Pickett and Hatcher Educational Fund - P.O. Box 2128, Columbus, GA 31902. Offers loans to financially needy students enrolled in colleges and universities offering broad liberal education. The loans may include amounts for fees, tuition, room and board, up to \$1,200 per year, with the total borrowed not to exceed \$4,800.

United Student Aid Funds, Inc. - 2085 Knue Rd., Indianapolis, IN 45250. These programs enable lenders to provide guaranteed loans to students of up to \$2.50 yearly, up to a maximum of \$10,000 for graduate students, and \$7,500 for undergraduates.

GENERAL WORDS OF ADVICE

- * The process of applying for financial aid can be confusing and time-consuming. Just keep in mind that in order to get money for your college education, YOU MUST APPLY FOR IT. To apply early or on time increases your chances of getting a fair financial aid package.
- * With the increasing number of Indian students entering college, the demand for Bureau grants also increases. Apply early for BIA or tribal funds - early means in February or March of the year you are planning to attend college.
- * When applying for sources of outside aid, (other than your BIA agency or tribe), be sure to include at the start of your letter that you are American Indian or Alaska Native.
- * Show sincerity of purpose in seeking a higher education; take time when writing and think through what you want to achieve by going to school, and then put it on paper.
- * Remember, the application you submit will be all that the reviewers will have to tell them about you, your financial need, and goals and aspirations. Lack of complete and relevant information may cause delay and misunderstanding in the review of your application.
- * Discuss your goals with a career counselor or an older person who might have the same career goals as yourself, and is already working in the field of your choice. They will be great help in determining what kinds of obstacles to overcome more easily.
- * Don't get discouraged about your sources of aid to stay in school. Keep up with progress of your financial situation through your counselor and financial aid officer. If you are serious enough about getting the degree desired, funds from somewhere will be available to help.
