Teenage Parents Program, an alternative school for pregnant girls, which offers parenting courses and infant day care. Students are also taught communication techniques, decision-making skills, child development, child health, nutrition, and concepts of discipline.

An interdisciplinary intervention program for adolescent parents and expectant mothers combined educational and counseling efforts within a regular school setting.

The New York City school district reduced the dropout rate for pregnant students through an in-school program called "Changing Roles" which offers students information on prenatal medical care, fetus development, infant care, etc. (Includes program design and curriculum.)

Suggests that the way to help unwed mothers complete school is through alternative schools such as those in Austin, Texas, which provide needed additional services and significantly reduce the dropout rate.

The teenage Pregnancy and Parenting Project (TAPP) is a city-wide interagency service system. In its third year, the majority of TAPP clients were 15-17 and 67% lived with parents. Significantly more female clients who were not enrolled in school at entry to TAPP attended school during pregnancy than remained dropouts.
