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ABSTRACT

National salary data for instructional faculty for 1985-1986 are presented, along with a narrative overview, based on 2,952 responses to the Higher Education General Information Survey of Salaries, Tenure, and Fringe Benefits of Full-Time Instructional Faculty. Academic year 1985-1986 was the fifth consecutive year that salary increases for full-time faculty outpaced inflation, and the largest real income gain for faculty for the five-year period beginning in 1981-1982. The average salary of teaching faculty nationwide, combining all institutions and academic ranks, was \$32,400 in 1985-1986. Instructional faculty received 13.7% higher average salaries at four-year than at two-year institutions. Salaries grew slower in the private sector at both four-year and two-year institutions. Average salaries (all ranks combined) were 24.4% higher for men than women in 1985-1986. Examined by academic rank, however, the salary gap between the sexes was considerably less; the largest difference was among lecturers. Schools in the Far West region of the United States had the highest average salary for instructional faculty (all ranks combined) and institutions in the Southeast region, the lowest. (SW)

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## Instructional Faculty Salaries for Academic Year 1985-86

Academic year 1985-86 marked the fifth consecutive year that salary increases for full-time faculty outpaced inflation, and the largest real income gain for faculty for the five-year period beginning in 1981-82 (table A). These salary gains follow several years of losses in real income, starting in the 1970's, due principally to salaries not keeping pace with high inflation rates.

The data were provided by institutions of higher education that responded to the Center for Education Statistics' Higher Education General Information Survey (HEGIS) of Salaries, Tenure, and Fringe Benefits of Full-Time Instructional Faculty. Of the 3,388 institutions surveyed, 2,952 responded for academic year 1985-86. This is a response rate of 87.1 percent. (See the survey methodology at the end of this bulletin.)

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National Overview

The average salary of instructional faculty nationwide, combining all institutions and academic ranks, was \$32,400 in 1985-86 (table 1.0).<sup>1</sup> Salaries ranged from \$42,300 for professors to \$20,900 for instructors. Instructors received the largest salary increase over the previous year--6.9 percent<sup>2</sup> more than their 1984-85 salary of \$19,600. The smallest salary increase (5.6 percent) occurred among "no academic rank" faculty, who earned \$27,500 and \$29,100 in 1984-85 and 1985-86, respectively.

Differences in salary, by level and control of institution

Instructional faculty received 13.7 percent higher average salaries at 4-year than at 2-year institutions (\$33,300 versus \$29,300) (table B). At 4-year colleges and universities, salaries ranged from \$42,800 for professors to \$20,400 for instructors. At 2-year colleges, salaries ranged from \$36,100 for professors to \$22,400 for instructors. Only instructors and "no academic rank" faculty earned more at 2-year institutions. The salary gap across levels was greatest for professors, who earned an average of \$6,700 more at 4-year than at 2-year schools. Assistant professors had the smallest earning differential, averaging only \$500 more at 4-year schools.

Salaries grew slower in the private sector at both 4-year and 2-year institutions, reversing a trend in recent years of private institutions steadily narrowing the gap with public institutions (table C). At the 4-year level, average salaries of instructional faculty increased 7.1 percent at public institutions compared to 4.9 percent at private schools. Only lecturers and "no academic rank" faculty had greater salary increases at private institutions. At 2-year institutions, the one-year gain in salaries for all ranks was 6.2 percent at public and 5.0 percent at private schools.

Salaries of instructional faculty showed greater variation in the public and private sectors at 2-year than at 4-year institutions (table D). For all ranks combined, the average salary was \$29,600 at 2-year public institutions compared to \$19,400 at 2-year private schools--a difference of 52.2 percent. "No academic rank" faculty showed the widest disparity in salary at the 2-year level, earning 58.2 percent more in the public than in the private sector (\$29,700 versus \$18,800). Although assistant professors' salaries showed the least variation, the difference in earning power was nevertheless considerable: they earned \$26,200 at 2-year public institutions and \$19,300 at 2-year private institutions. This is a difference of 35.6 percent.

In comparison to 2-year institutions, salaries of instructional faculty at 4-year institutions were subject to much less fluctuation by sector (table D). Public 4-year institutions paid an average salary of \$34,000 (all ranks combined), which is only 7.3 percent larger than the private sector's \$31,700. Examined by academic rank, assistant professors' salaries varied the most, with those in public 4-year institutions averaging \$27,100, or 8.5 percent more than the \$25,000 of their private school counterparts. The smallest difference in salaries within rank occurred among lecturers, who earned only 1.2 percent more at public than private institutions (\$23,900 versus \$23,600).

#### Differences in salary, by sex

Average salaries (all ranks combined) were 24.4 percent higher for men than women (\$34,300 versus \$27,600) in 1985-86 (table E). Examined by academic rank, however, the salary gap between the sexes was considerably less. The largest difference was among lecturers, with men earning 13.3 percent more than their female colleagues (\$25,200 versus \$22,300). The smallest difference was among associate professors, with men averaging only 6.5 percent more than women of similar rank (\$32,300 versus \$30,300, respectively). The relatively greater number of women occupying lower academic ranks contributed to the large discrepancy found between the sexes in average salary, when all academic ranks are combined.<sup>3</sup>

The change in men's salaries from 1984-85 to 1985-86 was slightly greater than women's--6.6 percent versus 6.3 percent over the 1984-85 figures of \$32,200 for men and \$25,900 for women (table 1.0). One-year gains for men ranged from a high of 7.1 percent for lecturers (from \$23,600 to \$25,200) to a low of 6.1 percent for "no academic rank" faculty (from \$28,500 to \$30,300). Salary gains for women were highest among professors and instructors, each receiving 6.8 percent increases: female professors' salaries rose from \$35,800 to \$38,300, and female instructors' from \$18,900 to \$20,200. "No academic rank" female faculty had the smallest salary increase of only 4.8 percent above the 1984-85 salary, increasing from \$25,900 to \$27,200.

When examined by institutional level, greater salary differences existed between men and women at 4-year than at 2-year institutions (table 2). Combining all academic ranks, men averaged 27.0 percent more than women at 4-year schools, compared to 11.7 percent more at 2-year schools. The differences narrowed considerably by academic rank: the greatest percent difference was among professors, where men earned 11.2 percent more than women at 4-year schools (\$43,300 versus \$38,900) but only 4.4 percent more at 2-year schools (\$36,500 versus \$34,900). Lecturers' average salaries varied least: men earned 13.2 percent more than women at 4-year schools (\$25,200 versus \$22,300), but only 14.4 percent more at 2-year institutions (\$25,100 versus \$21,900).

When men and women's salaries were analyzed by control within level, greater differences were apparent at 4-year private than 4-year public institutions (table F). Average salaries of men (\$33,900) exceeded women's (\$25,900) by 30.9 percent at private schools compared to 24.8 percent at public schools (\$35,800 versus \$28,700). The largest salary gap occurred in the 4-year private sector at the rank of professor: males earned 18.4 percent greater average salaries than women (\$43,000 versus \$36,300). The smallest salary gap (4.7 percent) between men and women was at 4-year public institutions among associate professors, where men averaged \$33,000 and women, \$31,500.

At the 2-year level, while greater differences in salaries by sex occurred at public than private institutions, the earning differentials between the sexes by control were less exaggerated than at the 4-year level. For all ranks combined, men's average salaries (\$30,800) exceeded women's (\$27,700) by 11.1 percent at public institutions, compared to 10.3 percent at private schools (\$20,400 versus \$18,500). The largest salary gap occurred in the 2-year public sector among lecturers: men earned 12.4 percent greater average salaries than women (\$25,200 versus \$22,400). The smallest gap (1.7 percent) in earning power between the sexes occurred among associate professors at 2-year private institutions, where men averaged \$22,400 and women, \$22,100.

#### Region/State Overview

Institutions in the Far West region of the United States reported the highest average salary for instructional faculty (all ranks combined), at \$36,600, and institutions in the Southeast region the lowest, at \$28,900 (tables 3 and 4).<sup>4</sup>

Within regions, there was a wide gap in average salaries between 4-year and 2-year institutions. The largest difference occurred in the New England region, with instructional faculty (all ranks combined) employed at 4-year institutions earning average salaries 30.5 percent higher than 2-year faculty in that region (\$36,100 versus \$27,600). By contrast, instructional faculty at 4-year institutions in the Southwest region earned only 11.1 percent more than their 2-year regional counterparts (\$32,200 versus \$28,900).

New England was the only region where private institutions outpaced public institutions in average salaries paid to instructional faculty (all ranks combined): \$36,000 versus \$33,800, respectively. However, the higher average salary was true only for private 4-year institutions, which averaged \$36,500 compared to \$35,500 at public 4-year institutions.

At the State level, institutions in Alaska averaged the highest salary for instructional faculty nationwide, at \$42,700. The other top-ranking States were: California (\$39,000), Massachusetts (\$36,600), and Connecticut (\$36,500). Institutions in Mississippi reported the lowest average salary, at \$24,300. Joining Mississippi with low average salaries were South Dakota (\$25,200), West Virginia (\$26,200), and Kentucky (\$27,300). State comparisons should be made with caution, however, due to cost-of-living differences among the States, differing numbers and mixes of public and private 4- and 2-year institutions within each State, and fluctuation in institutional response each survey year.<sup>5</sup>

Alaska was the only State where 2-year institutions paid their instructional faculty higher average salaries than 4-year institutions (\$45,100 versus \$41,600). This was limited to the 2-year public sector in Alaska, since the State reported no 2-year private schools of higher education.

### Survey Methodology

This report highlights data from the 1985-86 survey of Salaries, Tenure, and Fringe Benefits of Full-Time Instructional Faculty, conducted as part of the 20th annual Higher Education General Information Survey (HEGIS). The universe of 3,388 institutions and branches of higher education located throughout the United States and its territories was determined by an update to the 1985-86 HEGIS survey of Institutional Characteristics. Of these institutions, 2,952 responded, creating a response rate of 87.1 percent.

Data were collected on instructional faculty employed (including those under contract but not in the payroll system) by postsecondary education institutions as of October 1, 1985. Only full-time instructional faculty on 9- and 12-month salary contracts are included in this survey. "Instructional faculty" are those members of the instruction/research staff who are employed full-time as defined by the institution and whose major regular assignment is instruction, including those with released time for research. Salary data has been deleted from the data tape and publications for any data cell reporting fewer than three persons to protect the confidentiality of individuals' salaries.

Data were edited for major reporting and keypunch errors and consistency with the previous survey year's response. Institutions were contacted when data problems could not be resolved by survey editors. Salary data omitted by respondents were not imputed. Also, no data of any kind were imputed for the 436 nonrespondents to the survey.

Technical note.--Men continued to hold the majority of full-time instructional faculty positions. Of the 338,500 faculty on 9-month contracts, 242,600, or 71.7 percent, were men. Examined by academic rank, men were in the majority at every rank except instructor, comprising a low 46.8 percent of all instructors and a high 87.7 percent of all professors. Over four-fifths of male faculty were found at the top three ranks, compared with slightly less than two-thirds of female faculty. The ranks of professor, associate professor, and assistant professor accounted for 82.9 percent of all male faculty, while only 66.5 percent of female faculty were found at these ranks. (These numbers represent faculty for whom salary outlays were reported. An additional 60 faculty were reported by institutions without corresponding salary outlays. This table is intended to be a complete enumeration of 9-month instructional faculty only for the 2,907 institutions in the 50 States and D.C. that responded to the survey.)
