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ABSTRACT

A directory of 87 scholarships and financial assistance programs available to migrant high school students provides general information about the programs and gives contacts for applications. An introduction discusses types of financial assistance, how to apply for financial aid, college costs, and examples of scholarships awarded to migrant students in Arizona. The directory lists assistance programs by subject of award or recipient--migrant, ethnic, disadvantaged, minorities in specific fields of study--and by source--federal, federal assistance in health-related fields, and private college/universities. It also provides addresses of United States Department of Education regional offices and state educational agencies. Entries describing assistance programs typically include address, purpose, eligibility, financial data, deadlines, and duration. A discussion of financial assistance at private colleges/universities gives reasons why migrant students might consider these institutions, lists 14 private universities and the 8 Ivy League schools, and provides a form outlining a sample financial aid award from Yale University. ## INTRODUCTION

### TO THE STUDENT:

Migrant students are among the most desirable candidates for university and college scholarships today, because:

- 1) Most migrant students have real economic need,
- 2) Migrant students are underrepresented in higher education.

Don't decide against going to college because of the cost. Remember, financial assistance is available!

It will be helpful if you remember to be:

- 1) persistent
- 2) self-confident
- 3) attentive to detail

Your counselor can help support your academic and financial aid applications with a letter of recommendation submitted with those of your teachers. Counselors can make the difference.

\*\*\*\*\*

### TO THE COUNSELOR:

The education of migrant children has improved dramatically since the inception of the Migrant Education Program in 1966. Still, migrant students have the highest dropout rate (at all levels of education) of any identified group in the public school system.

In addition to the attention migrant programs already focus on education assistance at the elementary and secondary levels of education; increased attention must be given to preparing students for successful post-secondary experiences.

High student goals and aspirations have been shown to have a highly positive effect on student success. Educators of migrant students must encourage them to aim for high goals and to pursue them persistently.

A letter of recommendation from you explaining the student's financial and academic status is important to an admissions committee. You can make the difference.

## TYPES OF FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

There is financial aid money to help you pay for your education. Your counselor can help you apply.

### GRANTS

A grant is a gift of money that does not have to be repaid.

There are private student grants and grants awarded by the federal government to guarantee low-income students financial assistance with college costs. See: "Federal" in this directory.

### SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships are gifts of money awarded to students on the basis of academic excellence and promise of future achievement.

The financial aid office of each college should be contacted regarding available scholarships.

### WORK STUDY

The Work Study Program enables you to earn money through part-time employment on campus.

You may work up to 15 hours per week during school and full-time during vacations. Your earnings will vary depending upon the hours you have available and your financial need. Apply directly to the college of your choice and complete the financial aid items on the application. Also see: "Federal" in this directory.

### LOANS

A loan is money which must be repaid. Long term student loans allow you to repay at low interest after you graduate or complete your education.

Loans should only be considered as a last resort to financing your education. If you need to apply for a loan, discuss this with the financial aid officer at your college of choice to determine the best loan package that is available. See: "Federal" in this directory.

\*\*\*\*\*

The financial aid office of the college often prepares a financial "package" for a student which will combine more than one source of financial assistance available to that student; colleges sometimes add funds of their own or campus employment to this "package". Apply for all of the financial assistance that is available to you!

## HOW TO APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID

1. PLAN EARLY.
2. Study financial aid references and college catalogs, as well as family contacts through companies or social organizations.
3. When you select and apply to a college for admission, also request a Financial Aid Application. These are two different processes.
4. Obtain a copy of "Meeting College Costs" from the scholarship office of your high school (also available free of charge from College Board Publication Orders, Box 2813, Princeton, New Jersey, 08540).
5. Some colleges will require a copy of the parents' income tax form (Form 1040 and any attached schedules) to verify income.
6. FILE YOUR FINANCIAL AID APPLICATIONS EARLY!!! Late applicants may find that available funds have been committed to others.

## GETTING FINANCIAL AID

Students who are applying for financial aid will usually have to fill out a Financial Aid Form (FAF) from the College Scholarship Service or a Student Aid Application (i.e., Student Aid Application for California "SAAC"). These applications are used to estimate the amount you or your family can pay toward your costs for college.

If you are applying ONLY for federal student financial aid under the Pell Grant, Guaranteed Student Loan, Supplemental Education Opportunity Grant, College Work Study, and National Direct Student Loan Programs, you may use the free "Application for Federal Student Aid."

## RESIDENCY DOCUMENTATION

Students with incomplete documentation or documentation pending:

Most colleges and universities do not limit student attendance on the basis of citizenship. However, most state or federal assistance requires documentation of residency status. Many colleges and universities, especially those with large endowments (i.e., private and large public institutions) can and will provide assistance as needed to any student they accept. Students should not postpone plans for higher education because of incomplete documentation.



COLLEGE COSTS

What do college costs include?

1. Tuition and fees, which can vary from about \$300 to over \$10,000 per year in private institutions. California community colleges currently charge a tuition of \$50 per semester for 6 units or more.
2. Room and board. (This expense to the family should be considered even by students who plan to live at home.)
3. Books and supplies - approximately \$350 per year; more in some major areas of study.
4. Personal - clothing, laundry, recreation, medical, and dental services.
5. Transportation - car expenses if commuting, or cost of trips home if away at school.

### COLLEGE WORK-STUDY PROGRAM (CWS)

This program provides part-time employment to eligible postsecondary students to help meet educational expenses. Undergraduate, graduate, or professional students enrolled as regular students, are maintaining satisfactory progress in their education, have demonstrated financial need, and do not owe a refund on a Title IV Grant are eligible. The financial aid administrator sets the student's work schedule.

### Grants:

#### PELL GRANT PROGRAM

This program provides grants to eligible postsecondary students with demonstrated financial need to assist them in meeting educational expenses. To be eligible students must be undergraduates enrolled in eligible institutions of higher education on at least a half-time basis and be making satisfactory progress. U.S. citizenship or permanent residency is required. Grants are estimated to range from \$200 to \$1900. To apply for a Pell Grant students must complete the Federal form called "Application for Federal Student Aid" or one of several of several private or State need analysis applications which are used to determine eligibility for other sources of financial aid.

#### **SUPPLEMENTAL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY GRANTS (SEOG)**

This grant provides eligible postsecondary students with demonstrated financial need assistance to help them meet educational expenses. Eligible students must be undergraduate students enrolled in an accredited institution, who are maintaining satisfactory progress in their education, be U.S. citizens or permanent residents, and they must not owe on a Title IV Grant. Grants are for undergraduate students and range from \$200 to \$2,000.

#### **Loans:**

#### **GUARANTEED STUDENT LOAN PROGRAM**

This program authorizes low-interest deferred loans for educational expenses available from eligible lenders. The family income must be less than \$30,000. If over this amount, students must demonstrate financial need. The maximum loan may not exceed \$2,500. Graduate students are eligible to borrow larger sums.

#### **NATIONAL DIRECT STUDENT LOAN (NDSL)**

This program provides eligible post secondary students, with demonstrated financial need, loans to help them meet educational expenses. Applicants must be undergraduate, graduate, or professional students enrolled as regular students, maintaining satisfactory progress in their education, who have demonstrated financial need, and do not owe a refund on Title IV Grants, are eligible. The average loan to students is \$875. The cumulative maximum may not exceed \$12,000. Repayment of the loan begins six months after a borrower ceases to carry at least one half the normal academic work load. Full payment must be made within 10 years.

## FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE AT PRIVATE COLLEGES & UNIVERSITIES

Private colleges and universities throughout the United States can be excellent institutions of higher learning for minority and migrant students. These schools usually have smaller class sizes, more individualized attention, and can provide a chance to work on special projects and assignments.

High school students may overlook these schools because of the higher cost compared to public universities and the distance from home. However, it should be noted that many private colleges and universities have the means to offer more financial aid to students than larger public schools. Financial aid is given as a gift, scholarship, work study, and/or a loan. Money is allowed for room and board, since commuting to these schools is uncommon. Roundtrip travel expenses from a student's hometown to the school are also included in the financial aid award.

Many eastern schools also have a policy to recruit and accept minority students such as Hispanics, Blacks, and Asians, as well as those from regions underrepresented in their student body like those from the Midwest and West coast. The migrant student may be the person they're looking for to help create a well-rounded academic community.

Many factors other than academic performance are considered in the admissions process such as general promise, special talents, ethnic and regional variety, and community service.

The Ivy League have admission that is "aid-blind." This means that the financial aid application will be looked at separately from the academic application. Once a student has been accepted, the school is obligated to meet his/her financial need. These schools are:

\*Package A includes no outside scholarship. In package B it is assumed that the hypothetical student has won a \$1,000 National Merit Scholarship. Student B thus has a self-help level that is \$440 less than that of student A (\$300 plus 20 percent of \$700 — see Outside Scholarships above), and a University scholarship that is \$560 less. This illustrates how the Merit Scholarship affects the financial aid package.
