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#### **ABSTRACT**

Designed for staff working in community college career centers, this report provides a practical and concise set of references on California community college career centers. The information presented in the report was collected in spring and summer 1987 through a formal questionnaire survey, on-site visitations throughout the state, and a review of literature on careers. Following introductory material on the study, the report offers an item analysis of the survey indicating that: (1) 94% of the career services were under student services divisions; (2) the average number of full-time equivalent classified staff directly involved in the career centers was two; (3) the average expenditure for a career center by the colleges was \$49,109; (4) budget and staffing were listed as the main problems experienced by the program, followed by location; (5) 73% of the respondents used computers for providing information to students, including 21 who used Eureka, 8 who used Discovery, and 5 who used Sigi; and (6) 89% of the responding colleges said they offered classes in career life planning. Next, the report lists the campuses offering career life planning courses, career seminars and workshops, self-paced/individualized programs, career counseling, job placement, a career resource library, special programs, and computerized career programs, along with contact people for each course. Finally, conclusions and recommendations are provided. A list of respondents is attached. (EJV)

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#### **FORWARD**

The Foothill-De Anza Community College District Board of Education provides a unique opportunity for management starf to participate in a leave program. It is the intent of the Board to encourage staff to study, travel, write and learn and then to bring this knowledge back to the District. After 22 years in California public education and eleven years as an administrator in the Foothill-De Anza District, the author applied for and received a two-month leave during June and July 1987 to study career centers in California.

This short report is a result of a questionnaire sent out to all California community colleges, on-site visitations throughout the state, and a review of literature on careers.

The author of this study wishes to thank the Foothill-De Anza Community College District Board of Trustees for their leadership in providing staff with professional growth opportunities for study and learning.



#### PURPOSE OF THE STUDY

California community colleges, while energetic and student oriented, are often without sufficient resources and staff flexibility for program review and introspection. The purpose of this short guide is to provide those working in career centers with a practical and concise set of references on California community college career centers. The information will be presented in such a way that these professionals will know where to go with questions regarding various aspects of career services in the California community college.

The information presented in the booklet was collected through a formal questionnaire distributed during the Spring and Summer of 1987. All California community colleges were given the opportunity to provide input on their colleges career program. (See Appendix A). Visits were made statewide to back up and validate the information gained from the questionnaire. The raterial presented in this booklet is a result of both on-site visitations and ritten material sent from individual colleges.

#### SOME INITIAL COMMENTS

It is important to realize that studies often reflect more about the researcher than the projects studied. At Foothill, career resources are designed to help students direct their own course of action. This means accepting personal responsibility for their own career, planning their life style, and making choices. In order to establish realistic career goals, services are geared to assist students in learning more about themselves and the world of work. Brochures, salary ranges, and other current materials about job search skills are available to help them reach their objectives. Career/Life Planning is a multi-step process that will be of value throughout their lifetime. Started early and revised continually, it will help fulfill their hopes and potential in all aspects of their life. It is with this context and with this set of biases that models were selected and included in the study.



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# ITEM ANALYSIS OF THE QUESTIONNAIRE

The Career Services Questionnaire was sent out to 106 community colleges throughout California during the spring of 1987. 85 or 80 percent were returned. The author of this guide recognizes those colleges and appreciates the time spent helping to put this guide together. Of the responses, 7 indicated that they did not have a career services program. It was also apparent, during the many visitations made statewide, the hard work and extra effort put in by working professionals to make career services available to students and community. The author visited a variety of different college campuses and found staff ready, willing and able to answer questions, share material and provide whatever information was required.

The Career Services Questionnaire was a one page, 14 item, written survey. Items 1-2 were intended to build a California Community College Directory. These two items elicited the name of the person completing the questionnaire, his or her title and the name of the college. This directory is available in Appendix B. The following is a summary of the Career Services Questionnaire:

- ITEM 3 Of the 77 respondents to item 3, 72 or 94 percent of the career services are under Student Services.
- ITEM 4 Of the 74 respondents to item 4, the average FTE classified staff directly involved in the career center was 2. The range went from a low of 0 FTE to 9 full-time equivalent classified staff.
- Of the 74 respondents to this item, the average statewide certificated FTE involved in the career center is 1.6 FTE. The range went from 0 to 10 full-time equivalents.
- Of the 74 respondents to this item, the average expenditure by colleges for the career center is \$49,109. The lowest figure indicated for maintaining a center is \$2,000 while the highest is \$540,000.
- ITEM 7 Colleges were asked to indicate in item 7 if there had been an increase or a decrease in support for career services on campus. Of the 68 respondents to this item 41 or 60 percent indicated that support had increased.
- In item 8 the colleges were asked to indicate the main problems experienced by the program in providing services. Of the 127 separate responses, the highest were recorded in budget and staffing. 56 of the responses indicated that colleges experienced problems with budget while 51 pointed out problems with staffing. 15 of the responses indicated problems with location, while only 3 colleges had problems organizationally in this area.
- ITEM 9 67 colleges responded to item 9 on computerization. Of the respondents 49 or 73 percent used computerized programs for providing information to students. 21 of the respondents indicated that they use Eureka, 8 use Discovery, and 5 use Sigi.



- ITEM 10 Item 10 asked colleges to indicate the number that offer career life planning classes. 75 colleges responded to this item. Of the respondents 67 or 89 percent offered classes in career life planning.
- ITEM 11 Item 11 asked if career services and counseling are located together. The responses were evenly distributed as 38 said that they had located the career services program with counseling while 35 said they were separate.
- ITEM 12 Item 12 asked the question regarding the adequacy of coverage. Of the 71 respondents 19 or 27 percent felt that staffing was adequate while 52 or 73 percent felt that current staffing in the career center was inadequate to meet the needs.
- ITEM 13 In item 13 colleges were asked to indicate if they had a job placement component. 43 or 58 percent of the 74 respondents said that they did not provide a job placement component.
- Item 14 asked that the colleges respond regarding the best aspect of the career services program at their college. Of the 69 individual responses to this item, 14 indicated that availability of software and resources was the best aspect of the program; 12 saw courses in career life planning, workshops, and library resources as the best aspect; 12 felt that the cooperation and involvement of counseling in their program was the best aspect; 9 felt that the integration of various college components such as counseling, job placement, classes, liasion with other departments/divisions, the Department of Development, co-op education, etc. was the best aspect; 7 felt that staff excellence was the best; while 6 felt that the location of career services was the best aspect.
- ITEM 15 Item 15 asked the participating college if they felt they could serve as a model. The following are model programs listed in specific areas. It is proposed that contact be made if there exists interest in these areas.

#### CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATION

The results of the Career Services Questionnaire indicate that career ,ervices in the California community college are provided under the administrative span of control of the student services segment. It is the perception of those professionals surveyed working in the career services area that support on-campus for this program has increased in the last five years. This perception was shared by 60 percent of the respondents. It is apparent from reviewing the survey results that there exists a tremendous range between the various colleges in terms of staff working in the program and budget available. Respondents indicated that from their point of view, staffing and budgeting were the main problems facing career services statewide. 73 percent of the respondents indicated that they used computerized programs for providing information to students. The offering of career life planning curriculum is generalized throughout the colleges. 89 percent of the respondents offered classes to students. The need to bring counselors and career services physically together does not follow a statewide pattern. Colleges are about even in the historical pattern in this area. The field expressed a strong perception that staffing of the career center was inadequate to meet student needs in the career services area. The questionnaire provides information that 77 colleges or 91% of the respondents provide career services. 8 colleges or 9 percent of the respondents indicated that no real effort was being made in this area. This leaves a void of information on 21 college or 20 percent of the 106 total as of the date of the survey.

The information obtained from the questionnaire provides some base-line data for the study of career services statewide. The intent was not to be comprehensive but rather to provide professionals with a directory and develop information on specific areas of interest. It is recommended that further research be initiated to answer questions raised in the study. Some relevant questions for future studies might include:

- "What specific problems are experienced by colleges as they attempt to provide services?" Of the responses, 85 percent were expressing problems in the budgeting and staffing area.
- 49 colleges indicated that they used computerized programs with students. Of that number, only 34 indicated that they used Eureka, Oiscovery or Sigi. Another relevant question in this area would be, "What other computerized programs are colleges using that could be made available?"
- Much statewide discussion exists regarding the importance of counseling and its relationship to career services. Item II was an attempt to find out if there was a pattern statewide for housing of the two programs. The results are inconclusive. A better set of questions might be: "What relationship exists between counseling and career services?" and "What benefits exist for students as a result of this relationship?"
- Since the study analyzed the perceptions of staff, and the results therefore were inherently subjective, a future questionnaire would be best serving the field by analyzing career space, staff FTE's, budget and college support in a more objective format.



It is the general perception of the author of this study that career services on California community college campuses are serving well the needs of students and community. It is recommended here that career service staff statewide better publicize that level of service, both on-campus and statewide. It is further recommended that Dean's of Students and other college administration address the need for adequate day and evening coverage, and the need for improved staffing and budgeting expressed by professional staff.
