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ABSTRACT

Since 1978, annual studies have been conducted of the flow of transfer students from the California community colleges to the University of California (UC) and the California State University (CSU) systems. The studies have focused on trends in the numbers of transfers and the ethnicity, majors, and age of transfer students. Findings from the study of fall 1986 transfers, contrasted with findings from previous years, indicated that: (1) fewer students transferred from the community colleges to the UC and CSU systems in fall 1986 than in fall 1985, with a 1.5% decrease in UC transfers and a 6.5% decrease in CSU transfers; (2) despite the overall downward trend, community colleges and districts varied greatly with respect to their transfer gains and losses; (3) the percentages of Asian and Filipino transfer students to both UC and CSU systems continued to increase, as did the percentage of Hispanics transferring to the CSU colleges; and (4) the percentage of Hispanic students entering the UC system as transfer students decreased in fall 1986, after an increase each year since 1981, while the percentage of Black transfer students increased for the first time since 1981. A primary explanation for the downturn in transfer rates was the large decrease in the number of high school graduates and first-time freshmen in the community colleges in recent years. The community college going rate for recent high school graduates had fallen from 42.8 in fall 1982 to 33.0 in fall 1985, thus further reducing the pool of potential transfer students. Though special efforts are being made by some community colleges to improve transfer opportunities, the success of the new programs and services may not be measurable for several years.

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Summary

This is the tenth in the Commission's series of annual staff reports on the number and ethnicity of California Community College students who transfer to the University of California and the California State University.

The report indicates that fewer Community College students transferred to both universities in Fall 1986 than in Fall 1985. The 4,858 that transferred to the University of California were the fewest number since 1981, while the 27,761 that transferred to the California State University were the fewest since 1968. These 1986 decreases were predictable, following decreases two and three years earlier in both the number of California's high school graduates and the rate at which these graduates attended Community Colleges.

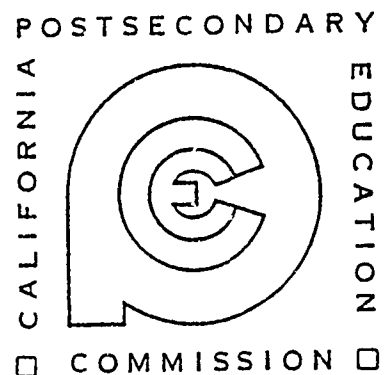

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Highlights of the Findings

Trends in numbers

Fewer students transferred from the Community Colleges to the University of California and the California State University in Fall 1986 than in Fall 1985. The decrease in transfers to the University was 1.5 percent or 73 students, to a total of 4,858 -- the smallest number since 1981. For the State University, the decrease was 6.5 percent or 1,921 students, to 27,761 -- the smallest number since 1968. Between 1984 and 1985, the decrease in transfers to the University had been 6.2 percent, while the decrease to the State University was 1.5 percent.

Full-year transfer statistics are not yet available for 1986-87, but the State University had approximately the same number in 1984-85 and 1985-86 -- 45,469 in the latter year, or 15,789 more than in the Fall term alone. The University enrolled 1,643 new transfer students in the Winter and Spring terms in 1985-86 -- the first year for which such data are available.

Differences among university campuses

University of California: Within the statewide decrease in Community College transfers to the University of California, three campuses experienced a significant change of more than 10 percent. The Davis and Riverside campuses both had decreases, while the Irvine campus had an increase. Los Angeles remained the campus enrolling the largest number of new transfers (915 in Fall 1985), while Riverside remained the smallest, with 226.

The California State University: The statewide decrease for the State University between Fall 1985 and Fall 1986 was largely attributable to six campuses with decreases greater than 10 percent -- Chico, Hayward, Humboldt, Sacramento, San Diego, and San Luis Obispo. At the same time, five campuses -- Fresno, Fullerton, San Bernardino, Sonoma, and Stanislaus -- experienced increases in transfer enrollments, but together they enrolled only 207

more new transfer students than in Fall 1985. The remaining eight also enrolled fewer new transfer students, but only Long Beach had a loss greater than 5 percent.

Differences among Community Colleges

Transfers to the University of California: Despite the overall downward trend, Community Colleges and districts varied greatly with respect to their gains and losses. In the Los Angeles Community College District, 12 percent or 38 fewer students transferred to the University of California in Fall 1986 than in Fall 1985, with the largest decrease occurring at Los Angeles Pierce College. Numbers of transfers from Santa Monica College and El Camino College also decreased, while Glendale College and Pasadena City College showed small gains. Among the three Los Rios District colleges in Sacramento, the one-year decrease in numbers of students transferring to the University was 22 percent or 71 students. In the San Francisco Bay area, the Peralta District colleges experienced little change between Fall 1985 and Fall 1986 in numbers of transfers to the University, while Diablo Valley College, De Anza College, San Francisco City College, Chabot College, and College of Marin all had increases in University transfers.

Transfers to the State University: Similar patterns of gains and losses occurred among State University campuses. The Los Angeles District colleges had 9 percent fewer transfers, with the largest decreases at Pierce, Valley, and City Colleges. Among other Community Colleges with large decreases in State University transfers were El Camino, Golden West, Diablo Valley, San Francisco City, and Sacramento City. With the exception of San Diego City College, most Community Colleges in the San Diego area also had fewer students transfer to the State University, with the decrease reflected primarily at San Diego State University.

Ethnic differences

Changes between Fall 1985 and Fall 1986 in the percentage distributions of students from ethnic minority groups who transferred to the University and the State University are small but appear to continue some earlier trends. The percentages of Asian and Filipino transfer students in both segments continued to increase, as did the percentage for Hispanic students in the State University. However, the percentage of Hispanic students entering the University as transfer students decreased for Fall 1986, after an increase each year since 1981, while the percentage of Black transfer students increased for the first time since 1983. In the State University, the percentage for Black transfer students continued its three-year decline, but numbers are small.

Concluding comments

Changes have been occurring in the number and ethnicity of high school graduates, segmental college-going rates for recent graduates, undergraduate enrollments generally, and the flow of Community College transfer students. At the same time, a broad spectrum of new programs and services are being offered to increase preparation for and participation in college; provide better information about opportunities for high school graduates and Community College transfer students; improve articulation between high school, college, and university; and evaluate the impact of each of these efforts on student flow and performance. Changes from year to year in freshman and transfer enrollments do not now appear to be clearly related to special programs, but more time may be needed for there to be such impact.

Trends in Numbers of Transfers

SINCE 1978, the Commission has published annual reports of the number and ethnicity of Community College students who transfer to the University of California and the California State University (1978, 1979, 1981, 1982a, 1982b, 1983, 1984, 1985, and 1986). In 1982, it published these transfer student statistics separately and in advance of its college-going rates report for the first time. Information about transfer to independent California colleges and universities continues to be included in other Commission reports because it is not available in time for publication with University and State University data.

The decreases for Fall 1986 were predictable, following decreases two and three years earlier in both the number of high school graduates and the Community College-going rate for recent graduates. Changes in University and State University enrollment of new freshmen have not cancelled out the decreases in numbers of Community College freshmen in recent years.

Overall transfer trends

Numbers of Community College students who transferred to the University and the State University between 1965 and 1986 are shown in Display 1 on page 3, together with numbers of first-time freshmen enrolling in these two segments and the Community Colleges for some of these same years. Numbers of transfer students from each Community College are shown in Appendix A for Fall 1977, 1979, 1981, 1982, 1983, 1984, 1985, and 1986 by district. Appendix B contains the ethnic distribution of transfer students from each Community College to the University and the State University in Fall 1986. Unlike earlier reports, this 1986 update shows no information about new Community College freshmen because of poor data for recent years.

In Fall 1985, the 4,858 Community College students who transferred to the University constituted the smallest group since 1981, when 4,778 transferred. The decline between Fall 1985 and 1986 was 1.5 per-

cent -- considerably less than the 6.2 percent decrease found for the previous year -- or a net decrease of 73 students. The 27,761 students who transferred to the State University in Fall 1986 was the smallest number since 1976 and represented a decline of 6.5 percent or 1,921 students between Fall 1985 and Fall 1986. This compares with a decrease of 1.5 percent between Fall 1984 and 1985. While full-year enrollment statistics are not yet available for 1986-87, the number who transferred to the State University in 1985-86 was approximately the same as in 1984-85 -- 45,469 for the most recent year.

Transfers to the University of California

Numbers of Community College students who transferred to the eight general campuses of the University between Fall 1979 and Fall 1986 are shown in Display 2 at the bottom of page 3. Four of the eight campuses reported fewer new Community College transfer students in 1986 than in 1985; but only the Davis and Riverside campuses had decreases of 10 percent or greater. Three reported virtually no change, and the Irvine campus had an increase of almost 10 percent. The Los Angeles and Riverside campuses continued to enroll the largest and the smallest number of transfer students -- 915 and 226, respectively.

Thus, after a 3 percent gain between 1982 and 1983, and stability between 1983 and 1984, the number of Community College transfer students to the University has decreased statewide during the last two years. The Davis campus, still enrolling the fourth largest number of transfer students, experienced a decline of 26 percent between Fall 1984 and Fall 1986.

With this exception, the relative stability of the number transferring during the past two years is encouraging in view of the significant decrease in numbers of young, first-time freshmen enrolling in Community Colleges three years ago.

Information on the numbers of students who trans-

ferred to the University in the winter and spring terms became available for the first time for inclusion in this report. The total for 1985-86 is 1,643, with 648 new Community College transfer students enrolling in the winter term on the seven campuses on the quarter system and 995 to the eight campuses in the spring term. This brings the total for the 1985-86 year to 6,574. The Berkeley campus enrolled the largest number -- 372, followed by Santa Barbara with 289 in the winter and spring quarters, Los Angeles with 279, San Diego with 227, Santa Cruz with 171, Irvine with 134, Davis with 123, and Riverside with 48. Approximately equal numbers transferred in the winter and spring quarters systemwide, but the campuses varied widely with respect to the term when they enrolled the larger number of new transfer students. No information is given concerning the Community Colleges from which these students transferred because the Berkeley campus was unable to provide this information.

Campus-level changes from year to year may be due both to changes in numbers of qualified applicants and to the need for redirection from impacted campuses and programs. Data are not available to analyze factors contributing to such changes at the campus level, but campus policies to restrict transfer admission to applicants who would enter with full junior standing -- in effect for the first time for Fall 1985 -- may have produced some decreases or simply a delay in transferring.

University transfers from particular Community Colleges

While the total number of Community College students who transferred to the University decreased between 1985 and 1986 by about 73, the gains and losses from particular Community Colleges are of interest. As in earlier years, 52 of the 106 Community Colleges transferred fewer than 25 students each to the University. One-half of these colleges are in multi-campus districts, usually where one or more other colleges have significantly larger numbers of University transfer students, but others are very small institutions that are a considerable distance from a University campus.

At the other end of the continuum, 14 Community Colleges sent more than 100 transfer students each to the University in Fall 1986, accounting for 46 percent of the total number. The four with the largest

number of transfer students in Fall 1986 were Diablo Valley, Santa Barbara, Santa Monica, and Orange Coast.

Although the statewide decrease in University transfers between 1985 and 1986 was 1.5 percent, the Los Angeles Community College District had a decrease of 12 percent. Mission, Southwest, and West Los Angeles Colleges each had an increase, but their combined total was only 12 students more than in Fall 1985.

The Los Rios Community College District in the Sacramento area had a decrease of 22.5 percent in the number of students transferring to the University in Fall 1986, primarily to the Davis campus with which it has developed good articulation programs. Sacramento City College, with a large ethnic minority enrollment, decreased its number of transfers to the University by 38 percent, to 93. After having experienced significant gains between 1983 and 1985, decreases were also found for American River and Cosumnes River Colleges, but they were much smaller than the decrease for Sacramento City College.

Other Community Colleges with a significant decrease in transfers to the University between Fall 1985 and 1986 include but are not limited to the College of San Mateo, Palomar College, Riverside Community College, San Diego City College, and Sierra College.

Other notable decreases from previous years include Fresno City College, with 18 transfers to the University last fall, compared to 34 in 1980, and Merced College with 9, compared with a high of 25 in 1978. Among those with significant increases are Orange Coast College, Diablo Valley College, De Anza College, San Diego Mesa College, City College of San Francisco, and Pasadena City College.

Transfers to the California State University

Display 3 on page 6 shows numbers of Community College students who transferred to each of the 19 State University campuses from Fall 1979 to Fall 1986. While the total number decreased for the last three years shown, the experience of these campuses varied widely.

The 6.5 percent statewide decrease of 1,921 students between Fall 1985 and Fall 1986 is attributable primarily to a 15.5 percent drop of 547 students at San

Diego State University, which had consistently enrolled the largest number of Community College transfer students until Fall 1986 and which had a decrease of 12 percent between 1984 and 1985. Other State University campuses that enroll the largest numbers of Community College transfer students and that also had decreases between 1985 and 1986 were San Luis Obispo (15 percent), Chico (13 percent), Sacramento (11 percent), and Long Beach (9 percent). San Luis Obispo had a 9 percent decrease between 1984 and 1985, for a 23 percent decrease over the two-year period.

Five campuses -- Fresno, Fullerton, San Bernardino, Sonoma, and Stanislaus -- showed gains between 1985 and 1986, but their total increase was only 207 students, to 5,859. Three other campuses with virtually no change between 1985 and 1986 were Bakersfield, Dominguez Hills, and Pomona.

Community College students tend to transfer to the nearest State University campus, and some State University campuses depend on their nearby Com-

munity Colleges for virtually all of their transfer enrollment. For example, 89 percent of the Fresno City College students who transferred to the State University in Fall 1986 were enrolled at its Fresno campus. Similarly, 83 percent of the transfer students from Butte College enroll at California State University, Chico; and 66 percent of the Community College transfer students from Bakersfield College go to California State University, Bakersfield.

While a majority of Community College transfer students continue their baccalaureate programs at nearby State University campuses, a minority of them transfer from small Community Colleges in single-college districts to several State University campuses. Such colleges with fewer than 100 transfer students each to the State University in Fall 1986 were Barstow, Compton, Lake Tahoe, Lassen, Mendocino, Mira Costa, Mt. San Jacinto, Palo Verde, Siskiyou, Victor Valley, West Hills, and Taft. Together, these 12 Community Colleges transferred 626 students to the State University in Fall 1986, or 2 percent of the total. These same 12 colleges trans-

ferred 84 students to the University in Fall 1986, or 2 percent of the total. Sixteen other Community Colleges in multi-campus districts also had fewer than 100 State University transfers in Fall 1986, including four colleges in the Los Angeles District.

State University transfers from particular Community Colleges

While the total number of students who transferred from Community Colleges to the State University decreased 6.5 percent between Fall 1985 and Fall 1986, larger gains and losses were experienced by particular colleges and districts. For example, the Los Angeles District had an overall decrease in State University transfers of 10 percent, but with

some campuses experiencing even larger decreases.

Ten other Community Colleges with more than 300 transfer students enrolling in the State University in Fall 1986 showed decreases greater than 10 percent. They were Butte, Golden West, El Camino, Grossmont, Long Beach, Sacramento City, Palomar, San Diego Mesa, San Francisco, and Sierra. Their combined loss was 13 percent.

While San Diego Mesa College had a decrease greater than 10 percent between 1985 and 1986, San Diego City College had an increase greater than 10 percent in spite of the large decrease in the number of students transferring to San Diego State University. The other increases were found for the most part at Community Colleges with fewer than 300 State University transfer students.

Ethnicity of Transfer Students

ETHNIC distributions for students who transferred from Community Colleges to the University and the State University in Fall 1980 through Fall 1986 are shown in Display 4 below. Numbers for individual Community Colleges and systemwide totals for Fall 1986 are given in Appendix B.

Hispanic transfer students

University of California: The proportion of Hispanic students in the ethnic distribution of transfer students to the University increased steadily from 1980, when it was 7.4, to 1985, when it was 10.8; but it decreased in 1986 to 10.0. Since the total number

of transfer students also decreased between 1985 and 1986, the decrease in number of Hispanic students is larger than indicated by this drop in percentage alone. In Fall 1986, the Los Angeles campus enrolled the largest number of new Hispanic transfer students -- 122, or 28 percent of the University's total of 431. Berkeley and Santa Barbara each enrolled the next largest number, with 14 percent of the total. University-wide, male Hispanic students comprised 53 percent of the total but only 47 percent of the Los Angeles campus.

The California State University: In the State University, seven campuses -- Fresno, Fullerton, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Northridge, San Diego, and San Jose -- each enrolled more than 200 new Hispanic

transfer students in Fall 1986 for a total of 1,641 or 61 percent of those in the State University. San Diego State University enrolled the largest number and proportion -- 265 or 10 percent of the total, but Hispanic transfers to the Fresno and Los Angeles campuses comprised a larger proportion of the total transfers to those campuses -- 14 and 19 percent, respectively. While the proportion of Hispanic students among all students who transferred to the University decreased between 1985 and 1986, their proportion in the State University ethnic distribution increased from 10.0 to 10.6 and, because of the difference in the total numbers who transfer to the two systems, resulted in a net gain in Hispanic transfers in 1986.

There were 1,001 more women than men among the new Hispanic transfer students in the State University in Fall 1986 -- 52 percent women and 48 percent men. The largest proportions of women enrolled on the Los Angeles, Northridge, San Bernardino, and San Diego campuses, and the smallest at Pomona and San Luis Obispo.

California Community Colleges: East Los Angeles College ranked first among California's Community Colleges in the number of Hispanic students who transferred in Fall 1986 -- 16 to the University and 132 to the State University. The next largest number transferred from Fresno City College -- only four to the University, but 101 to the State University; Rio Hondo -- 11 to the University and 95 to the State University; and Cerritos -- 10 to the University and 92 to the State University. Ventura, El Camino, and Pasadena transferred larger numbers of Hispanic students to the University -- 21, 19, and 17, respectively, but comparatively few to the State University -- 58, 36, and 59, respectively. Other Community Colleges with a high proportion of their Hispanic transfer students enrolled in the University included Santa Barbara City, Diablo Valley, and Santa Monica College.

Black transfer students

University of California: The University experienced an increase between Fall 1985 and Fall 1986 in the proportion of Black students among its new transfer students -- from 3.3 or 3.9, to 168 students. The Los Angeles campus enrolled 34 percent of the total, followed by Berkeley and Davis, with 15 and

14 percent, respectively.

Four more Black women than Black men transferred to the University in Fall 1986. However, the proportions vary across campuses, with more Black men than women at Los Angeles and fewer at Berkeley and Irvine.

The California State University: The proportion of Black students in the ethnic distribution of students who transferred to the State University decreased between Fall 1985 and Fall 1986 from 5.8 to 5.5 or 1,403 students. The largest number (201) transferred to the Dominguez Hills campus while other campuses that enrolled at least 100 new Black transfer students from Community Colleges were Long Beach, Los Angeles, Northridge, Sacramento, and San Francisco. The total for these six campuses was 851, or 61 percent of the systemwide total.

Seventy-nine more Black women than Black men transferred to the State University in Fall 1986, and women comprised 53 percent of the total. However, the proportion of women was much higher on the Dominguez Hills and Los Angeles campuses than systemwide and about equal to men on the Northridge and San Francisco campuses.

Comparing the two systems, the State University enrolled 89 percent of the Fall 1986 Black transfer students total and the University only 11 percent. The comparable proportion of Hispanic students was 86 and 14, and for all Community College transfers, 85 and 15.

California Community Colleges. Only El Camino College had 100 Black students transfer in the Fall 1986 term -- six to the University and 94 to the State University. Santa Monica College ranked second, with 14 students transferring to the University but only 62 to the State University. The College of Alameda had the second largest number of Black students transfer to the University (12) but only 35 transferred to the State University, which made it rank below Los Angeles City, Southwest, and San Francisco City Colleges, each of which enrolled more Black State University transfers.

Asian transfer students

University of California. The proportion of Asian students in the ethnic distribution of new transfers

to the University rose from 12.6 to 13.7 between Fall 1985 and Fall 1986, thus continuing a multi-year increase. The total in Fall 1986 was 591 -- 47 percent of whom transferred to the Berkeley and Los Angeles campuses. The Davis and Irvine campuses ranked next in the number of new Asian transfer students and accounted for 28 percent of the total.

There were 79 more men than women among the new Asian transfer students in Fall 1986, with men comprising 57 percent of the total. However, the number of Asian women was equal to or greater than Asian men on the Irvine, Santa Barbara, and Santa Cruz campuses.

The California State University: The proportion of Asian students in the ethnic distribution of State University transfer students also rose from Fall 1985 to Fall 1986 -- from 9.9 to 10.4, for a total of 2,651. The largest number enrolled at San Francisco State University (397), followed by San Jose State (312), and Long Beach (290). These three campuses, together with Fullerton, Los Angeles, and Sacramento, enrolled 64 percent of the new Asian transfer students. Of the 3,242 Asian students transferring from Community Colleges that term, 82 percent enrolled in the State University and 18 percent in the University.

In the State University Asian transfer group, 57 percent are men and 43 percent women. Among the campuses enrolling the largest numbers of Asian students, only San Francisco State had a smaller proportion of men than women.

California Community Colleges: The City College of San Francisco, with 380 Asian transfer students or 14 percent of the total, ranked first among Community Colleges in the number of such transfers. It had 235 more Asian transfer students enrolled in the State University than second-ranked Pasadena City College and only one less University transfer student than De Anza College, which had 36 such transfers. However, De Anza, Foothill, San Diego Mesa, and Santa Monica Colleges all transferred comparatively few Asian students to the State University but ranked high in the number who transferred to the University. Like the City College of San Francisco, El Camino, Orange Coast, and Sacramento City Colleges all transferred large numbers of Asian students to both the University and the State University.

Filipino transfer students

University of California: The University of California enrolled 86 new Filipino transfer students in the Fall 1986 term -- an increase of from 1.7 to 2.0 percent -- thus continuing a trend of greater representation but smaller numbers as the transfer student group decreases overall. The Berkeley campus enrolled the largest number in the University system (20 students or 2.5 percent of the total number of new transfers to Berkeley)

The ratio of men to women among the new Filipino transfer students was 45 to 55 but with considerable differences among the campuses.

The California State University: The State University enrolled 546 new Filipino transfer students in Fall 1986 -- an increase from 1.9 to 2.1 percent. The San Francisco, San Diego, and San Jose campuses enrolled the largest numbers in the State University system, with 77, 65, and 64 new Filipino transfer students respectively

The ratio of men to women among the Filipino transfer students at the State University was 51 to 49. Numbers of men and women were about equal at San Jose, but the number of men at San Diego was almost double that of women, while San Francisco enrolled about 40 percent men and 60 percent women.

California Community Colleges: The three Community Colleges from which the largest number of Filipino students transferred in Fall 1986 are City College of San Francisco (44 students), Southwestern College (37 students), and Chabot College (31 students). The latter institution had the largest number transfer to the University -- nine, with no other college transferring more than five.

American Indian transfer students

University of California: The University of California enrolled 40 new American Indian transfer students in the Fall 1986 term. Proportions have been relatively stable from year to year -- less than 1 percent. The number of American Indian students who transferred to the University ranged from two to the Davis campus to seven to the Irvine and River-

side campuses, with no apparent concentration on any campus

Twenty-three of the University's 40 American Indian transfers were men and 17 women -- a ratio of 57.5 to 42.5. Differences among campuses do not appear to warrant analysis because of the small numbers on the various campuses.

The California State University: The State University enrolled 332 American Indian transfer students in Fall 1986 -- 1.3 percent of all new transfer students -- but the validity of year-to-year comparisons for the State University system is reduced by coding errors a few years ago that inflated the proportion of American Indian students in the ethnic distribution. The Fullerton and Sacramento campuses of the State University enrolled the largest numbers in Fall 1986 -- 33 and 31, respectively -- but Humbolt and Stanislaus had the largest proportion of American Indian transfer students in their ethnic distribution -- 31 and 15 percent, respectively, compared with the systemwide 1.3 percent.

The State University enrolled 28 more American Indian women than men -- 180, compared to 152 -- a ratio of 54 to 46. As at the University, differences among campuses do not appear to warrant analysis

because of the small numbers involved.

California Community Colleges: The largest number of American Indian students transferred from Orange Coast and American River Colleges in Fall 1986. The University enrolled two from each campus, while the State University enrolled 17 and 15, respectively.

Non-resident aliens

Non-resident aliens whose ethnicity is unknown comprised 4.5 percent of the new Community College transfer students enrolling in the University in the Fall 1986 term. Of the 221 such students, 69 percent were on the Berkeley, Irvine, and Los Angeles campuses. The small numbers reported by other campuses make it appear that there are inconsistencies among the campuses in reporting procedures.

In the State University, 2.1 percent of the new transfer students were reported as non-resident aliens in Fall 1986. Twenty percent of the new transfer students on the Los Angeles State campus were in this category in the "ethnic" distribution, and the Fresno, Long Beach, San Francisco, and San Jose campuses comprised an additional 40 percent of the total.

Concluding Comments

FALL 1986 brought still another downturn in the number of Community College students who transferred to the University and the State University -- a downturn larger for the State University than for the University in terms of both percentage and numerical decline.

The decrease could have been anticipated. A primary explanation for the downturn was the large decrease in the number of high school graduates and first-time freshmen in the Community Colleges in recent years, particularly recent high school graduates enrolling full time who are the major sources of transfer students. The Community College-going rate for recent high school graduates had fallen from 42.8 in Fall 1982 to 33.0 in Fall 1985, thus reducing the pool of potential transfer students below what the steady decrease in number of high school graduates would alone produce.

College-going rates for recent high school graduates increased for both the University and the State University between 1984 and 1985, but the increase in numbers who enroll is much less than the decrease in numbers who enroll in the Community Colleges. Recent changes in freshman admission requirements made by both the University and the State University may have a positive effect on Community College enrollments of students seeking a baccalaureate degree and eventually on the number of transfer students, if high school students who do not meet new freshman eligibility requirements enroll in Community College transfer programs. If they do so, they may need more than two years to prepare for transfer -- particularly those who did not meet the high school course requirements of the University of California -- and the long-term effect on transfer may not be felt for several years.

Special efforts are being made by some Community Colleges to improve transfer opportunities with federal, State, and private grants for this purpose. However, the success of new programs and services cannot be measured solely in terms of increased numbers of transfer students and may not be felt for several years. In any case, the finding that the decrease in transfer students going to the University in Fall 1986 was very small can be viewed in a positive light since the significant decreases in the enrollment of Community College freshmen a few years ago led to a smaller pool of potential transfers. The State University case is less encouraging, but problems of decreasing numbers of transfer students appear at this time to be limited to a few campuses.

The Commission is collecting current information about numbers of Community College students transferring to independent California colleges and universities. Findings will be published separately as soon as they are complete. However, data from previous years indicate that this segment is providing transfer opportunities for a large number of Community College students.

Additional analyses of factors contributing to the observed changes in freshman enrollments in the various segments and in transfers from the Community Colleges are needed, but data are not available now to make such analyses. Furthermore, evaluations of specially-funded programs are being done elsewhere that will not be available for some time. This report provides information that is needed for some evaluation of special programs and services to improve transfer, the results of which will be shared with the Commission as they become available.

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CALIFORNIA POSTSECONDARY EDUCATION COMMISSION

THE California Postsecondary Education Commission is a citizen board established in 1974 by the Legislature and Governor to coordinate the efforts of California's colleges and universities and to provide independent, non-partisan policy analysis and recommendations to the Governor and Legislature.

Members of the Commission

The Commission consists of 15 members. Nine represent the general public, with three each appointed for six-year terms by the Governor, the Senate Rules Committee, and the Speaker of the Assembly. The other six represent the major segments of postsecondary education in California.

Functions of the Commission

The Commission is charged by the Legislature and Governor to "assure the effective utilization of public postsecondary education resources, thereby eliminating waste and unnecessary duplication, and to promote diversity, innovation, and responsiveness to student and societal needs."

To this end, the Commission conducts independent reviews of matters affecting the 2,600 institutions of postsecondary education in California, including Community Colleges, four-year colleges, universities, and professional and occupational schools.

As an advisory planning and coordinating body, the Commission does not administer or govern any institutions, nor does it approve, authorize, or accredit any of them. Instead, it cooperates with other state agencies and non-governmental groups that perform these functions, while operating as an independent board with its own staff and its own specific duties of evaluation, coordination, and planning,

Operation of the Commission

The Commission holds regular meetings throughout the year at which it debates and takes action on staff studies and takes positions on proposed legislation affecting education beyond the high school in California. By law, the Commission's meetings are open to the public. Requests to address the Commission may be made by writing the Commission in advance or by submitting a request prior to the start of a meeting.

The Commission's day-to-day work is carried out by its staff in Sacramento, under the guidance of its executive director, William H. Pickens, who is appointed by the Commission.

The Commission issues some 30 to 40 reports each year on major issues confronting California postsecondary education. Recent reports are listed on the back cover.
