ABSTRACT This document is a guide to the basic sources in the California State University, Fullerton, library that may be utilized in tracing federal laws, regulations, and court decisions. The bibliographic citation, library call number and/or location, and description of contents and/or use are provided for each reference source. Several sample entries are also included. Reference sources are listed in the following sections: (1) Public Bills/Resolutions; (2) Indices to Public Bills and Resolutions; (3) Committees/Committee Hearings/Committee Prints; (4) Reports and Documents/Serial Set; (5) Proceedings and Debates; (6) Presidential Action; (7) Public Laws/Statutes/Codes; (8) Court Cases/Case Law; (9) Legal Citations; (10) Parallel Citations; (11) Administrative Rules and Regulations; (12) Constitution; (13) Law Dictionaries; (14) Periodical/Newspaper Indices; (15) Legal Encyclopedias; (16) Other Legal Resource Tools; (17) Directories; and (18) Legal Research Guides. Also included are a listing of commonly used abbreviations in federal law; schematic diagrams of how a bill becomes a law, the federal judicial system, and the government of the United States; sources for major legislative, presidential, and judicial activities by types of activity; and dates of sessions of the Congress. A title index is also provided. (KM)

I. PUBLIC BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

Issued in microfiche, bills and resolutions are separated into eight distinct groups:

S -- Senate Bills
S.Res. -- Senate Resolutions
S.J.Res. -- Senate Joint Resolutions
S.Con.Res. -- Senate Concurrent Resolutions
H.R. -- House of Representatives Bills
H.Res. -- House Resolutions
H.J.Res. -- House Joint Resolutions
H.Con.Res. -- House Concurrent Resolutions

Bills are drafts of proposed laws. They may be either a new law or the amendment or repeal of an old law. Bills may originate in either the House or Senate, except revenue bills which, according to the Constitution, must originate in the House. Appropriation bills, by tradition, also originate in the House. Ideas for bills come from varied sources including constituents, members of the President's staff, and members of Congress. Bills introduced in the House are prefixed with H.R. and S. in the Senate. Bills are numbered consecutively as they are introduced from the beginning of each two year Congressional session. The designated bill number does not change as the bill progresses from one house to another. To find a bill it is important to know both its session date and bill number.

Printed bills always include bill number, Congressional session, date of introduction, name of Congressman submitting the bill, a brief header summary, the bill's formal name, the name of the Committee the bill was referred to, and the full text of the bill:

Resolutions go through the same procedures as bills but differ in that they deal with limited matters. There are three types of resolutions:

"Simple" Resolutions (S.Res., H.Res.) govern the actions of only one house, and have no legislative effect outside the house in which they originate. The creation and appointment of committees are results of resolutions. They do not require the approval of the other house or the signature of the President.

Joint Resolutions (S.J.Res., H.J.Res.) are generally used for "incidental or inferior" legislation, such as establishing the date for the convening of Congress, or unusual legislation, such as the Gulf of Tonkin Resolution. At one time, joint resolutions were used for purposes of general legislation, but their function was gradually usurped by that of bills. Like a bill, a joint resolution requires the approval of both houses and the signature of the President, except when it is used to propose a constitutional amendment.

Concurrent resolutions (S.Con.Res., H.Con.Res.) are used for matters affecting the business of both houses, and merely express facts, principles, opinions, and purposes of the two houses. They do not have the effect of law, and do not require the signature of the President.

Printed resolutions always include resolution number, Congressional session, date of introduction, name of Congressman submitting the resolution, a brief header summary, the committee the resolution was referred to, and the full text of the resolution:

Bills and resolutions are issued in microfiche by the Government Printing Office (GPO). They are filed in separate microfiche cabinets and arranged chronologically by session date, then in numerical order by microfiche sheet number. Bills and resolutions are not introduced in consecutive order on the floors of both houses and, as a result, are on the microfiche in random order. To assist researchers in finding which sheet of microfiche contains a particular bill or resolution, the GPO issues a Finding Aid:

An asterisk (*) or plus sign (+) indicates the bill or resolution is lengthy and/or extends over more than one sheet of microfiche. The Finding Aid is continually updated during each legislative session as bills are introduced. Occasionally, a House or Senate report (see Section IV) or the final version of a bill ("Act") will also be issued in microfiche.

Paper copies of current pending bills and resolutions are available free to the public from the Clerk of the House or Senate: Office of the Clerk, Room H-105, The Capitol, Washington, D.C. 20515.

II. INDICES TO PUBLIC BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

Indices to bills and resolutions are published both by the federal government (Digest of Public General Bills and Resolutions, Calendars of the United States House of Representatives and History of Legislation, Major Legislation of the Congress), and commercial publishing firms (Congressional Index, Week in Congress, Congressional Quarterly Weekly Reports). These publications provide the most current information on the status of pending measures. Government published indices are shelved in the Documents Reference Area; commercially published indices are shelved in the Reference book stacks.

The Digest summarizes briefly the essential features of public bills and resolutions with their changes during the legislative process. Published during each session of Congress, the Digest cumulates in five or more issues, with bi-weekly supplements as needed and a final edition at the conclusion of each session. The Library keeps only the final edition, discarding all superseded issues. The Digests are arranged by bill or resolution number of each house. A two-part status table provides abstracts and legislative histories first for measures that have been enacted into law (arranged by public law number) and then for all other measures upon which action has been taken (arranged by bill and resolution number). At the close of each session, it provides a complete history of every bill or resolution introduced during a session:

S. 607 Sen. Goldwater, et al.; 2/28/83

Public Broadcasting Amendments Act of 1984 - Amends the Communications Act of 1934 to authorize appropriations for FY 1985 through 1987 to be used by the Secretary of Commerce to assist in the planning and construction of public telecommunications facilities. Repeals a provision that requires 75 percent of the funds appropriated for such purposes in a fiscal year to be available to extend delivery of public telecommunications services to areas not receiving such services. Authorizes appropriations, to match up to a specified amount of non-Federal contributions to public broadcasting entities, for the Public Broadcasting Fund for FY 1987 through 1989. Repeals a provision that requires that a specified portion of the amount made available to the Corporation for Public Broadcasting from the Fund be earmarked for expenses of research, training, technical assistance, engineering, instructional support, and the payment of interest on obligations.

Repeals provisions requiring a public telecommunications entity to refund to the Corporation for Public Broadcasting an amount of Federal funds equal to the amount of any unrelated business income tax paid by such entity.

S. 608 Sen. Percy (by req.); 2/28/83

Amends the Arms Control and Disarmament Act to authorize appropriations for FY 1984 and 1985.

Establishes a program for visiting arms control and disarmament scholars to give specialists in the physical sciences and other disciplines relevant to the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency's activities an opportunity to participate in the Agency's activities and to gain for the Agency the perspective and expertise such persons can offer. Earmarks a specified amount of the FY 1984 and 1985 authorized appropriations for such program.

Authorizes the Agency's Director to create up to eight new personnel positions for specialists in Soviet foreign and military policies, arms control, or strategic affairs who are also fluent in Russian.

Increases the number of Special Representatives for Arms Control and Disarmament Negotiations from one to two.

Directs the President to report to Congress on the record of Soviet compliance or noncompliance with existing arms control agreements to which the Soviet Union is a party.

The Calendars record the handling of business reported from committees. Published daily when the House is in session, each issue is cumulative, and in every Monday issue there is a subject index of all legislation, both House and Senate, which has been reported by the committees and acted upon by either or both of the chambers. Because the Calendars cumulate so frequently, they are the most current source for information on pending bills and resolutions. The Library retains the latest Calendar cumulations, discarding all superseded editions.

Sections in the Final Edition include:

- Bills in conference
- Bills through conference
- Titles of bills and resolutions which have become laws
- Numerical order of bills and resolutions which have passed either or both houses, and bills and resolutions pending on the Calendars
- Bills which failed to become laws
- Acts which were vetoed but became laws
- Acts which became laws without the approval of the President (while Congress was in session)
- Pocket vetoes
- Status of major bills
- Subject index

The most significant section is "Numerical Order of Bills and Resolutions Which have Passed Either or Both Houses, and Bills and Resolutions Pending on the Calendars." Arranged numerically (and easily accessible through the subject index) by House bills, joint resolutions, concurrent resolutions, and resolutions, followed by similar tables for the Senate, it gives the bill's history to date:

NUMERICAL ORDER OF BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS WHICH HAVE PASSED EITHER OR BOTH HOUSES, AND BILLS NOW PENDING ON THE CALENDARS

Complete history of all actions on each bill follows the number in chronological order. For subject of bill see index, using index key following bill number in this section.

Designed for the use of members of Congress, their staffs, and committee staffs, MLC is a monthly journal devoted to summarizing and analyzing major issues before Congress. Each issue is divided into broad subject categories (education, housing, immigration, foreign policy and assistance, social services, taxation, etc.), followed by an overview of the important issues for each subject area, and a listing of pending major legislation for that area. The journal is useful for researchers seeking information about current significant legislation which will have a major impact on society, the economy, or the government. Each issue includes (at the end of text) a Title Index and a Legislation Index to bills, resolutions, and public laws.

Issued in loose-leaf format for quick updating, the Index is designed to enable the user to follow the progress of legislation from introduction to final disposition. Public bills and resolutions are listed, summarized, and indexed, then tracked as they move through Congress. The Index is divided into eight categories: Subject Index; Author Index; Reorganization Plans--Treaties--Nominations; Enactments--Veto; Members; Committees--Hearings; Bills and Resolutions; and Voting Records. Also provided is information about members of Congress (addresses, political parties, committee assignments, biographical data, etc.), members of committees and subcommittees, nominations, treaties, and reorganization plans.

- A weekly journal summarizing Congressional activity on major pieces of legislation, including developments in committees as well as on the floor. When covering major pieces of legislation, voting records (taken from the Congressional Record) and excerpts of testimony in hearings are given. Full texts of Presidential press conferences, major statements, and speeches are reprinted. Each issue usually contains an article on special issues or major legislation pending in Congress. A status table of major legislation shows the more significant bills of the session and their current place in the process. At the end of a session, the Weekly Report presents a summary of major legislation passed or not passed, arranged by broad subject areas. The Weekly Report comes with its own index (usually issued on yellow paper) which is filed with the periodical.

III. COMMITTEES/COMMITTEE HEARINGS/COMMITTEE PRINTS

After a bill has been introduced, its title is published in the Congressional Record, then assigned to an appropriate committee for consideration. Each committee has jurisdiction over particular types of proposed legislation. These committees may opt to route a bill to a specialized subcommittee. Both houses of Congress have permanent or "standing" committees which consider legislation pertinent to their area:

COMMITTEE HEARINGS

A large number of bills or resolutions die in committee, and are never returned to the floor for consideration. If a bill is of sufficient importance, the committee will hold hearings. Hearings may be closed or open to the public. Announcements of public hearings are published in the "Daily Digest" portion of the Congressional Record.

The Library owns important federal hearings both in paper copy and microfilm dating from the 1900s to the present date. Paper hearings (several thousand volumes) are shelved in the Documents stack area (in the Y4 area). All hearings in paper or microfilm are listed in the Documents card catalog by name of committee (and subcommittee), title, and subject.

In addition to its collection of hearings in paper and microfilm, the Library owns a complete set of hearings on microfiche from the 88th Congress (1963/64) to the current date:

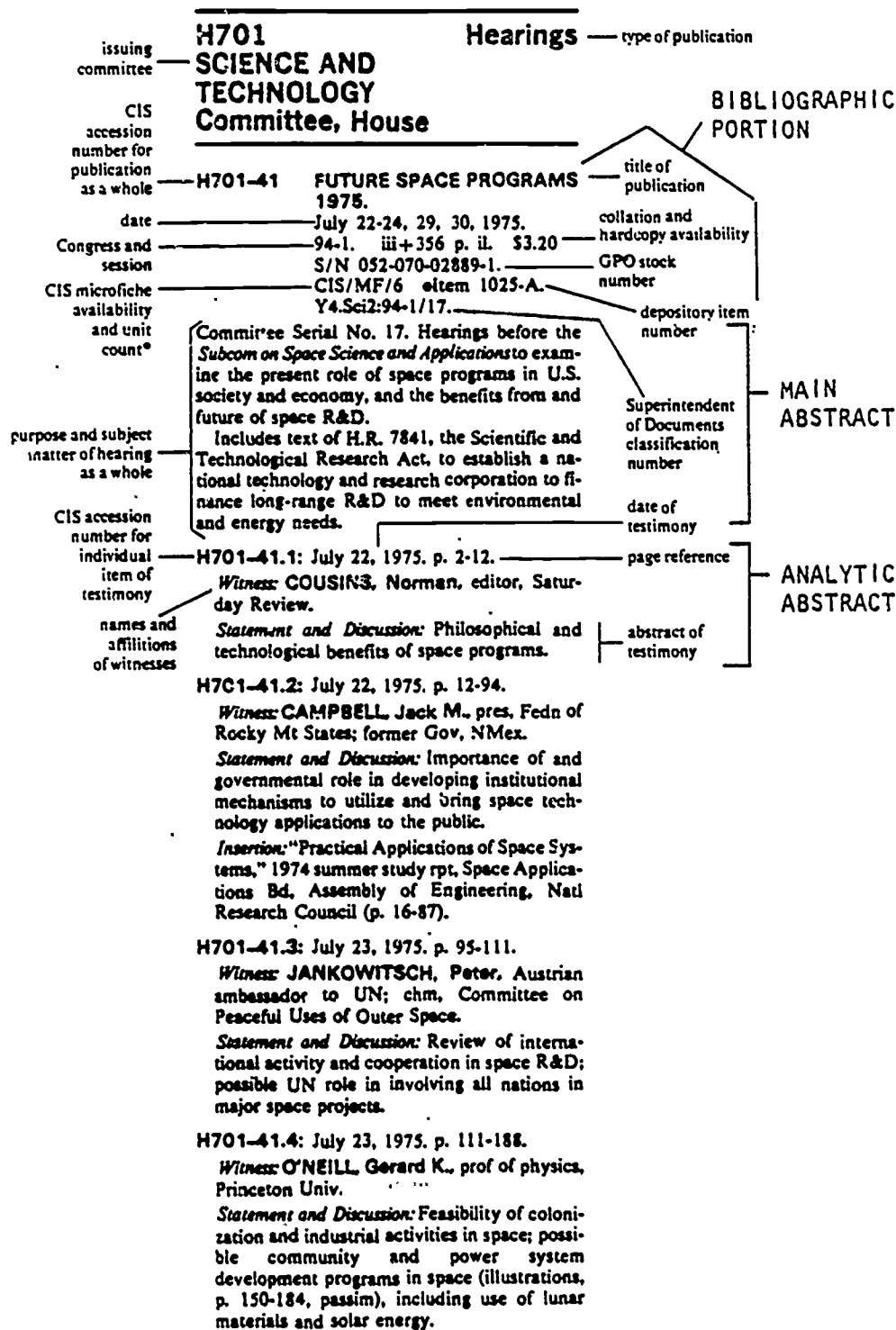

While there are other sources for hearings (Monthly Catalog of United States Government Publications, Congressional Quarterly Weekly Reports, etc.), CIS's extensive indices and lengthy abstracts make it the preferred source for information on Congressional hearings. The abstracts summarize the subject matters discussed and indicate the nature and page range locations of useful factual information included in a hearing:

The Library has all the hearings indexed in CIS (1970 to current date) on microfiche, and receives monthly microfiche shipments of current hearings.

COMMITTEE PRINTS

Committee prints are documents requested by committees which are compiled by their research staff, the Congressional Research Service, or outside consultants. They are authorized by a particular committee at the time of a hearing. Used for background information in consideration of a bill or resolution, committee prints are often of a technical or research nature. They often contain summaries of staff findings, histories of previous legislation and Congressional efforts, and the implications of a bill if it were to pass.

Because they are printed mainly for the use of committee members, distribution of committee prints is unpredictable. Often, they must be requested directly from the committee.

The Library owns important committee prints in paper copy. Shelved in the Document stacks (in the Y4 area), they are accessible through the Documents card catalog by titles, subjects, and committee (and subcommittee) names. A complete list of all prints owned in paper will be found under the heading "Committee print." In addition, the Library has a complete set of prints in microfiche from 1970 to the current date.

The Library owns on microfiche all committee prints listed in CIS from the 91st Congress (1970/81) to the present. The prints are filed in the Documents microfiche cabinets with federal hearings, and are arranged in order by session date, then by CIS abstract (or accession) number.

IV. REPORTS AND DOCUMENTS/SERIAL SET

Every legislative session, Congress publishes thousands of official publications on various topics. They are divided into the following categories:

Reports are summaries and analyses of pending bills and resolutions.

Documents are miscellaneous publications, including messages from the President, Senate and House Manuals, legislative handbooks and guides, and reports from executive departments and independent agencies and organizations.

Treaty documents provide the Senate's advice and consent to ratification of treaties. They are issued only by the Senate.

Executive documents and reports either deny or confirm presidential nominations of officials in the executive and judiciary. They are issued only by the Senate.

The majority of these publications are pamphlets, and usually range in length from twenty to forty pages. They are issued in paper copy, and shelved in the Documents stacks under the following call numbers:

After approximately three years, all reports and documents are cumulated and reissued into bound volumes called the Serial Set (Documents U.S. Y 1.1/2:), also shelved in the Document stacks. The Library discards all unbound reports and documents when their bound replacements arrive.

Of these documents, the House and Senate reports are the most useful to researchers tracing legislation. Because they provide an explanation of a bill's intent, reports are a major element in legislative tracing.

HOUSE AND SENATE REPORTS

After a bill has been assigned to the appropriate committee, individual members examine the bill. Amendments may be prepared in committee, and the bill may be extensively revised and rewritten. (The committee at this point may also decide to hold hearings.) If committee members favor passage of the bill, it will return the bill (revised or unrevised) to the floor with an accompanying "report" describing the purpose and scope of the bill. A report favors the passage of a bill; a committee does not report its recommendations when it disapproves a bill. The majority of bills introduced are never reported, and die in committee. Each report includes the text of the bill, describes its contents and purposes, and gives reasons for the committee's recommendations (sometimes including a minority view):

BACKGROUND

Each day around the world, 40,000 children die—1,500 per hour, 25 per minute, 15 million each year. The horror of pervasive child death by poverty and disease is real. But so too is the world's ability to diminish this continuing scourge. As many as half of these children could now be saved through the basic preemptive remedy of immunization against the six major diseases—measles, diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, tuberculosis, and polio.

The international community's collective ability to exterminate a disease through immunization was demonstrated in the successful worldwide campaign waged against smallpox in the 1960's and

Begun in 1789, the Serial Set represents an historical record of the activities and accomplishments of Congress. Beside Senate and House reports and documents, the Set contains:

- Congressional directories, manuals, and internal documents
- Presidential messages and reports
- Special investigative reports to be made to Congress by executive departments and agencies
- Executive publications
- Recurring reports to be made to Congress by departments and agencies
- Annual or special reports of nongovernmental bodies required to report to Congress (Daughters of the American Revolution, Boy Scouts of America, etc.)

The first volumes of the Serial Set (1789-1838) are popularly known as the American State Papers, and are available in microfilm (Documents United States Y 1.1/2: 1-14).

The Library has scattered volumes of the Serial Set in paper copy up till 1960, then a complete set from 1961 (87th Congress) to the current date. The volumes are consecutively numbered starting with volume 1 back in 1789. All volumes of the Serial Set are shelved in the Document stack area.

Published at the end of a session, the Journals are the official minutes of Congress. They record the activities of Congress, excluding debates. The Journals have a name/subject/title index, as well as a "History of Bills and Resolutions" section in which legislative actions are arranged by number, title, and action.

The Congressional Record is a nearly verbatim transcript of legislative debates and proceedings published each day that one or both houses are in session. The Record differs from the House and Senate Journals in that the Journals do not include the debates. The Record never contains hearings and only on rare occasions reports or bills. It is useful for finding roll call votes and Congressional action on vetoed bills.

The Record consists of four sections: the proceedings of the House and of the Senate; the Extension of Remarks; and the Daily Digest. Each section is paged continuously and separately during each session, and each page in each section is preceded by a letter prefix as follows: "S" for Senate; "H" for House; "E" for Extension Remarks; and "D" for Daily Digest. The final bound version of the Record consists of one continuous sequence which drops the separate H, S, E, and D designations from the daily edition. The Extension Remarks Section (issued formerly as the Appendix) traditionally contains extraneous or oddball matter, such as newspaper articles, telegrams, poetry, tributes to notable people, recipes, etc. Beginning with the 80th Congress, each issue contains a "Daily Digest" which summarizes the day's activities, including committee meetings and hearings, news of legislation introduced, reported on or passed, and actions taken within various committees.

The Congressional Record is not a literal transcription of the floor debates. Congressmen have a chance to edit it before it goes into print. Legislators can also print remarks not actually delivered on the floor. Since 1978, insertions in the Record have been identified by a "bullet" symbol (●). It is estimated that seventy percent of what is found in the Record is never actually uttered on the floor.

At the end of the session, the daily issues of the Record are cumulated into final bound volumes. There is a fortnightly index for the daily issues, and a final cumulative index (by subject, title, and member of Congress), a cumulation of the Daily Digest, and a complete status table for the session entitled "History of Bills and Resolutions." Bill and resolution number references are cumulative so that with the latest index one can trace the history of a bill in page references to its introduction, committee report, debate, amendments, and enactment or defeat of the measure.

The Library has the latest years of the Record in paper copy (shelved in the Document stacks). Earlier years are in microfilm.

VI. PRESIDENTIAL ACTION

When a bill or resolution passes both houses of Congress it becomes an "act" and is sent to the President. The President either signs the bill and it becomes public law or he may veto it. If the President disapproves of a bill, he returns his veto with his objections to the originating house. A two-thirds majority in each house is required to override the Presidential veto. The President has ten days (excepting Sunday) to act upon a measure; if he does not act within the ten days the bill becomes law without his signature, providing Congress is in session. If Congress adjourns before the ten day limit, the bill does not become law (known as a "pocket veto").

Besides veto messages, the President issues other documents:

Proclamations are used for matters of widespread interest, such as "proclaiming" Fire Prevention Week or National Ice Cream Day. Most do not have the effect of law.

Executive orders relate to the conduct of government business or to the organization of executive agencies. They are used to appoint officials, establish government commissions, boards, and departments, set tariff regulations, etc. Executive orders have the force of law.

Administrative orders include determinations, directives, memorandums, and reorganization plans, and are used for internal orders, the sale of military armaments, emergency foreign aid, assignments of officials, orders to diplomatic missions, etc. They have the force of law.

Early Presidential orders were just notes or memos, and were not officially organized or numbered until 1907 when the State Department began numbering executive orders it had on file. Presidential orders were published in a variety of sources, and it was not until 1936, and the publication of the Federal Register, that Presidential documents began to appear in one source.

Issued each Monday, the Weekly Compilation includes the texts of proclamations and executive orders, addresses and remarks, communications to Congress, letters, news conferences, messages, reorganization plans, telegrams, resignations, and retirements. Supplementary materials include acts approved by the President, nominations submitted to the Senate, and a list of all bills signed or vetoed. The Weekly Compilation is the most useful current collection of Presidential activities available.

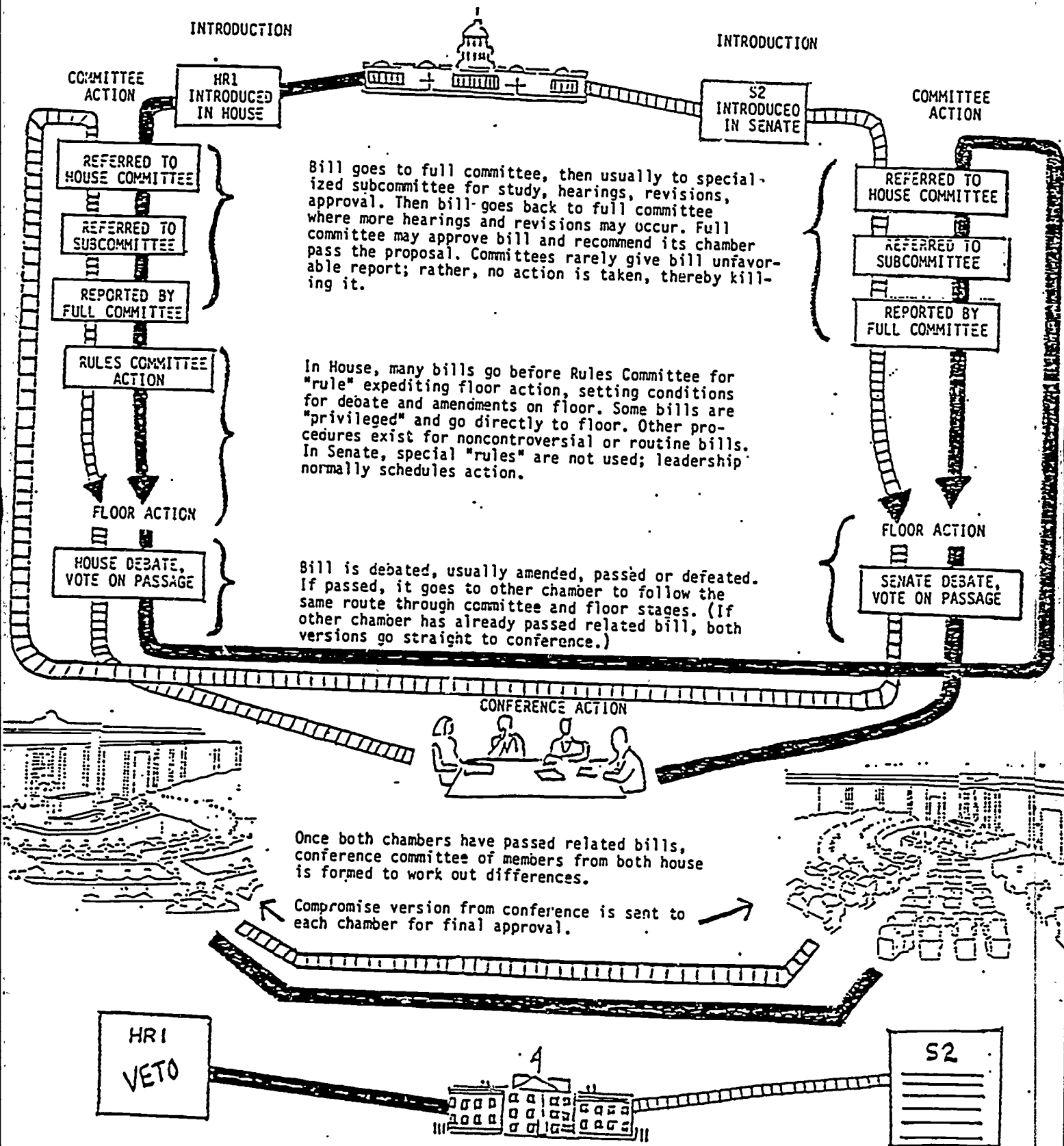

These are two handy reference works listing vetoes chronologically by Congressional session and Presidential administration. The vetoes are entered by bill number and include the citation to the Congressional Record or Weekly Compilation of Presidential Documents where the message is printed.

Veto messages always appear in the Congressional Record and in the Journal of the house in which the vetoed bill originated.

HOW A BILL BECOMES LAW

This graphic shows the most typical way in which proposed legislation is enacted into law. There are more complicated, as well as simpler, routes, and most bills fall by the wayside and never become law. The process is illustrated with two hypothetical bills, House bill No. 1 (HR1) and Senate bill No. 2 (S2). Each bill must be passed by both houses of Congress in identical form before it can become law. The path of HR 1 is traced by a solid line, that of S2 by a broken line. However, in practice most legislation begins as similar proposals in both houses.



Compromise version by both houses is sent to President who can either sign it into law or veto it and return it to Congress. Congress may override veto by a two-thirds majority vote in both houses; bill then becomes law without President's signature.

VII. PUBLIC LAWS/STATUTES/CODES

When a bill becomes law by either Presidential inaction, approval, or Congressional override, it becomes a "public law." Laws are numbered sequentially as they are passed with both Congress and law number designations. PL 97-1, for example, is the first public law approved and issued by the 97th Congress.

Public laws are published in their full final form (the full text of the law as it was finally passed) called statutes and in codified (and sometimes annotated) formats called codes.

STATUTES

Statutes are published both in "official" (United States Statutes at Large) and "unofficial" (United States Code Congressional and Administrative News) versions. The official and unofficial statutes provide basically the same information, but there are minor differences. Federal and state courts prefer to be cited to the official statutes rather than to the unofficial, so that legal documentation usually contains citations to the official publications. The unofficial statutes, however, are issued more speedily by the publisher, are better indexed, and include other documents besides public laws.

Issued at the close of each session, the Statutes at Large are the official complete final version of bills as passed by Congress, and approved by the President. Published since 1789, they contain every law passed by Congress. Laws are first issued in paperbound pamphlets ("slip laws"), then in the final hardbound Statutes volumes. The Statutes are arranged in numerical order by public law number with the final volume containing a subject index to all public laws issued during the session. Each statute is followed by a "Legislative History" of each bill or resolution that passed into public law.

The Library has Statutes at Large in paper copy from the 80th Congress (1947) to the current date; earlier Statutes (1865-1946) are in microfilm.

The unofficial statutes, this publication contains all public laws passed by each session of Congress, as well as proclamations, executive orders, reorganization plans, and committee and conference reports for important legislation. U.S.C.C.A.N. has seven separate indices which only partially duplicate and significantly supplement those found in the Statutes at Large. The indices cumulate during each session, making it convenient for users seeking the legislative history of bills. A "Popular Names Acts" table provides access to laws by their common name. Citations to the Statutes at Large are included.

CODES

The codes consolidate, subject arrange, and annotate all existing federal laws. Unlike the statutes, which contain the complete texts of laws as passed, the codes contain only important general and permanent laws currently in force. They exclude repealed or expired acts. The unofficial codes, U.S.C.A. presents the identical wording and language of the official edition and is arranged in the same manner by titles, chapters, and sections. In addition, West's Codes provide "annotations" or explanatory notes to the law. The annotations supply legislative background information, cross references to other appropriate code sections, and references to court cases, legal encyclopedias, journal articles, and law reports.

U.S.C.A. has a complete eight volume "General Index" to the entire code set, and individual indices for each code title. A "Popular Name Table" for acts is included at the end of the index volumes. 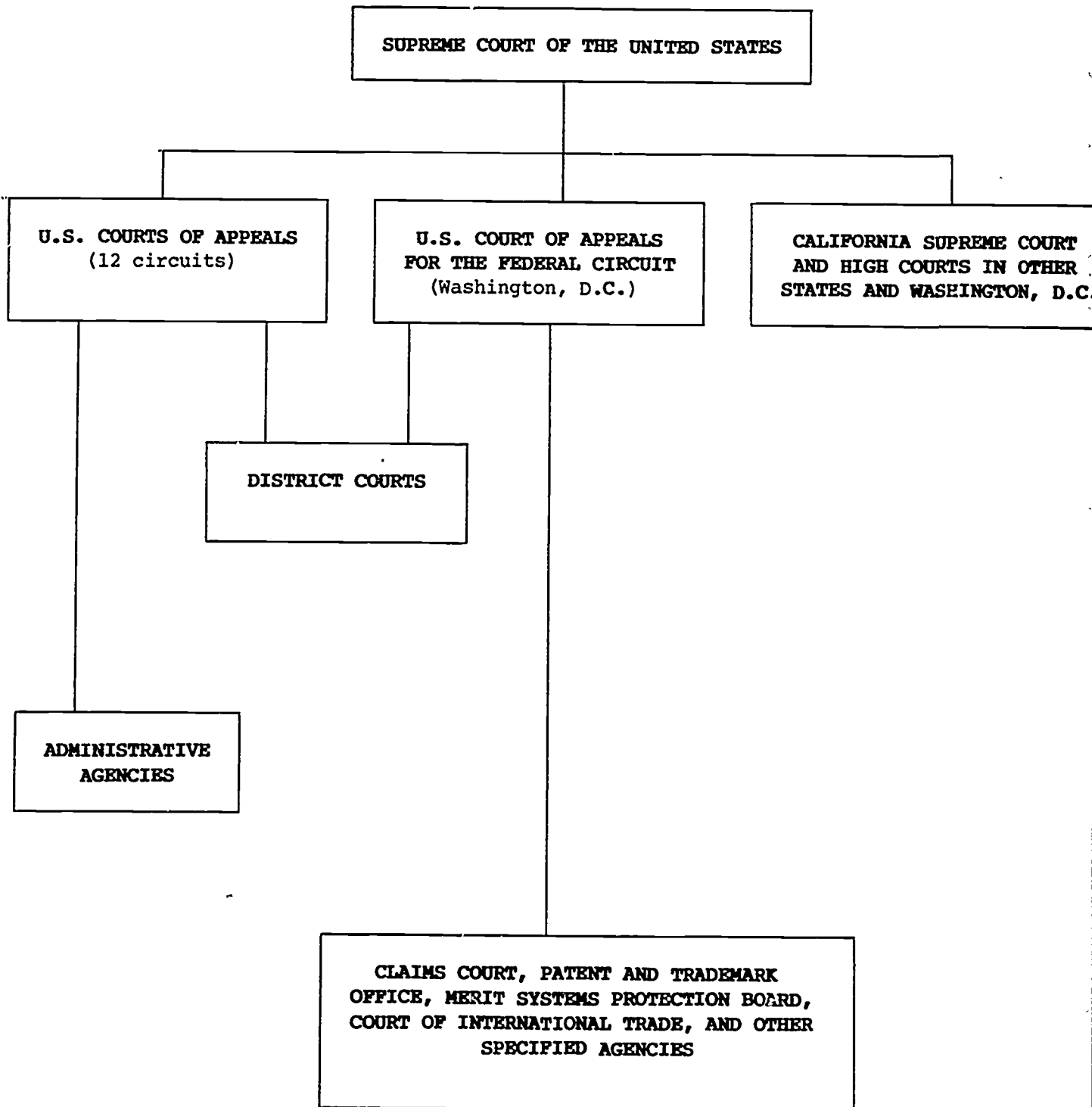
Many acts are commonly known by their "popular name" (Sunshine Law, Humphrey-Hawkins Act, Smuggling Alien Act, etc.) rather than by their formal name assigned by Congress. Shepard's Acts is an alphabetically arranged popular name listing of both federal and state laws. In the case of federal laws, citations are given to the United States Code and the Statutes at Large.

VIII. COURT CASES/CASE LAW

United States judicial power is vested in the Supreme Court and various lower (or "inferior") federal courts. Federal courts hear cases based on the United States Constitution, treaties, or federal law. Although the Supreme Court may hear cases for the first time, it is predominantly an "appellate" or appeals court. Certain cases must be heard, but in most situations it is up to the discretion of the Supreme Court to hear an appeal. Cases come to the Supreme Court from both lower courts and state courts, but there must be a federal question involved before the Supreme Court will agree to hear a case. Ordinarily, cases are appealed from the highest state appellate courts (i.e. the California Supreme Court) or from the United States Court of Appeals.

U.S. Courts of Appeals are primarily federal appellate courts. The United States is divided geographically into twelve circuits, each with its own Court of Appeals. (California is the Ninth Circuit, based in San Francisco.) District Courts are the basic trial courts for the federal system. In addition to the regular court system, there are several administrative agencies (U.S. Tax Court, National Labor Relations Board, etc.) with judicial or quasi-judicial powers. Appeals from these agencies go to the Court of Appeals.

FEDERAL JUDICIAL SYSTEM



Like the statutes and codes, reported decisions of courts ("cases") are issued in both "official" and "unofficial" formats. Official decisions are known as **reports** or **court reports** and are issued by the federal government. Unofficial decisions are known as **reporters** or **court reporters** and are commercially published. The text of an opinion remains the same, but there are minor differences. Federal and state courts prefer to be cited to the official reports rather than to the unofficial, so that legal documentation usually contains citations to the official publication. The court reports, however, are better indexed, contain research aids and supplementary material not in the official edition, including summaries of cases written by editors, and are more speedily published. Recent decisions appear biweekly in the "advance sheets" or paperbound supplements to the reporters.

Court reports are shelved in the Documents reference area; reporters are shelved in the Reference book stacks.

The official edition of the United States Supreme Court decisions. Published chronologically, decisions are first issued in paperbound pamphlets ("slip opinions"), then in the final hardbound report volumes.

Each volume of the reports includes a list of presiding judges, a subject index, and a Table of Cases. The Table of Cases is a listing of all cases contained in that particular volume. Cases are listed under both the name of the defendant and the name of the plaintiff. Jones v. Smith, for example, would be listed under both Smith and Jones.

Each published court decision generally contains the following elements: the names of the parties involved (plaintiff and defendant), the case's legal citation, the date of the court decision, a detailed listing of the facts of the case, the legal issues involved, and the actual decision of the court:

The Military Selective Service Act (Act) authorizes the President to require the registration for possible military service of males but not females, the purpose of registration being to facilitate any eventual conscription under the Act. Registration for the draft was discontinued by Presidential Proclamation in 1975 (the Act was amended in 1973 to preclude conscription), but as the result of a crisis in Southwestern Asia, President Carter decided in 1980 that it was necessary to reactivate the registration process, and sought Congress' allocation of funds for that purpose. He also recommended that Congress amend the Act to permit the registration and conscription of women as well as men. Although agreeing that it was necessary to reactivate the registration process, Congress allocated only those funds necessary to register males and declined to amend the Act to permit the registration of women. Thereafter, the President ordered the registration of specified groups of young men. In a lawsuit brought by several men challenging the Act's constitutionality, a three-judge District Court ultimately held that the Act's gender-based discrimination violated the Due Process Clause Fifth Amendment and enjoined registration under the Act.

The Act's registration provisions do not violate the Fifth Amendment. Congress acted well within its constitutional authority to raise and regulate armies and navies when it authorized the registration of men and not women. Pp. 64-83.

(a) The customary deference accorded Congress' judgments is particularly appropriate when, as here, Congress specifically considered the question of the Act's constitutionality, and perhaps in no area has the Court accorded Congress greater deference than in the area of national defense and military affairs. While Congress is not free to disregard the Constitution when it acts in the area of military affairs, this Court must be particularly careful not to substitute its judgment of what is desirable for that of Congress, or its own evaluation of evidence for a reasonable evaluation by the Legislative Branch. Congress carefully considered whether to register only males for potential conscription or whether to register both sexes, and its broad constitutional authority

Each published court decision contains the following elements: the names of the involved parties (plaintiff and defendant), the case's legal citation, the date of the court decision, a detailed listing of the facts of the case, the legal issues involved, and the actual decision of the court. Each report volume includes the following features: a list of presiding judges, a Table of Cases Reported, a Table of Statutes Construed, and a Words and Phrases section, which defines the legal language used in cases. The Table of Cases Reported is a listing of all cases contained in that particular volume of the reporter and their page references. The Table of Statutes Construed lists United States Code sections which have been interpreted by the Supreme Court. Citations from the Supreme Court Reporter to the United States Reports are also provided.

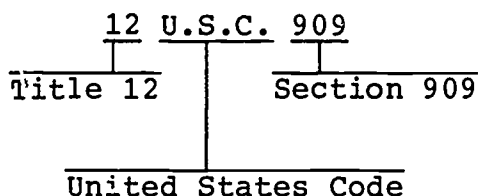

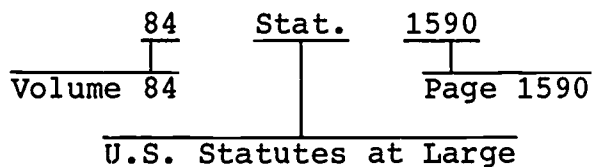

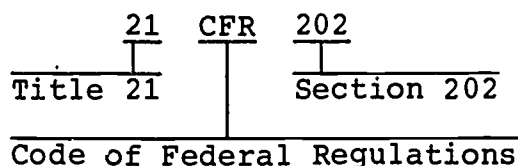
Citations to federal codes refer to the code title and section numbers:



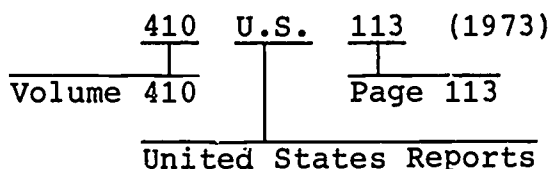
Citations to statutes refer to volume and page number:

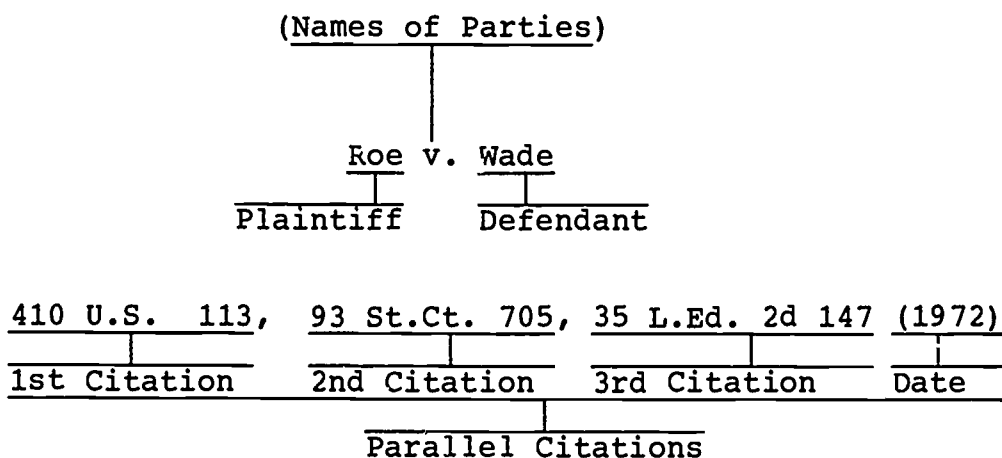

X. PARALLEL CITATIONS

Since there are several reporting systems publishing at the same time, the same decision often appears in both the official and unofficial reports, and occasionally in law reports and journals. Frequently, the legal researcher will have a citation to only one report and want to obtain the citations to others, either to examine the other reports or complete the citation. Several legal sources provide a listing of court cases and their citations in other reports. These citations (called "parallel citations") are usually strung together so the researcher can easily read all the citations of one case:

SUMMARY: The Secretary of Commerce (Secretary) announces the closure of the recreational salmon fishery in the fishery conservation zone (FCZ) for the subareas between Cape Falcon and Cape Blanco, Oregon, and between Cape Blanco and the Oregon-California border at midnight, September 2, 1985, because the coho salmon quota will be reached. The Director, Northwest Region, NMFS (Regional Director), has determined, in consultation with the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) and the California Department of Fish and Game (CDFG), that the recreational fishery quota of 170,000 coho salmon for the area south of Cape Falcon will be reached by midnight, September 2, 1985. Immediately following this closure, the recreational salmon fishery in the FCZ between Cape Blanco and the Oregon-California border will reopen for all salmon species except coho. The intended effect is to ensure conservation of coho salmon.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Closure of the FCZ between Cape Falcon, Oregon, and the Oregon-California border to recreational fishing for all salmon species is effective at 2400 hours Pacific Daylight Time (PDT), September 2, 1985. At 0001 hours PDT, September 3, 1985, the FCZ between Cape Blanco and the Oregon-California border is open to recreational fishing for all salmon species except coho.

ADDRESS: Information relevant to this notice has been compiled in aggregate form and is available for public review at the Northwest Region, NMFS, 7800 Sand Point Way NE, Building 1, Seattle, Washington, from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. weekdays.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: The regulations implementing the framework amendment to the ocean salmon management plan (49 FR 43678, October 31, 1984) specify at § 661.21(a)(1) that: "When a quota for the commercial or the recreational fishery, or both, for any salmon species during any period open to fishing in any portion of the fishery management area is projected by the Regional Director to be reached on or by a certain date, the Secretary will, by publishing a notice in the Federal Register, close the commercial or recreational fishery, or both, for all salmon species in the portion of the fishery management area to which the quota applies as of the date the quota is projected to be reached."

Under the provisions of the framework amendment, the 1985 management measures were published on May 2, 1985 (50 FR 19672). The 1985 recreational season in the FCZ between Cape Falcon, Oregon, and Cape Blanco, Oregon, was established as July 1 through the attainment of a quota of 170,000 coho salmon for the area south of Cape Falcon. The same recreational season was established in the FCZ between Cape Blanco, Oregon, and the Oregon-California border with an additional season to follow immediately for all salmon species except coho through October 31, 1985. Based on the most recent catch and effort information supplied by ODFW and CDFG, the recreational fishery catch in the area south of Cape Falcon is projected to reach the 170,000 coho salmon quota by midnight, September 2, 1985. The Secretary therefore issues this notice closing the recreational fishery in the FCZ between Cape Falcon, Oregon, and the Oregon-California border at midnight, September 2, 1985. The recreational fishery in the FCZ between Cape Blanco, Oregon, and the Oregon-California border reopens for all salmon species except coho effective 0001 hours, September 3, 1985.

The Regional Director consulted with the Director of ODFW regarding this closure. The Director of ODFW has confirmed that Oregon will close the recreational fishery in State waters adjacent to the area of the FCZ between Cape Falcon and the Oregon-California border effective midnight, September 2, 1985, and will reopen the recreational fishery in State waters adjacent to the area of the FCZ effective 0001 hours, September 3, 1985.

This notice does not apply to the regularly scheduled recreational fishery for all salmon species in the FCZ between the Oregon-California border and the U.S.-Mexico border because this area is not affected by the attainment of the coho salmon quota for the area south of Cape Falcon.

Other matters

This action is taken under the authority of 50 CFR Part 661 and complies with Executive Order 12291.

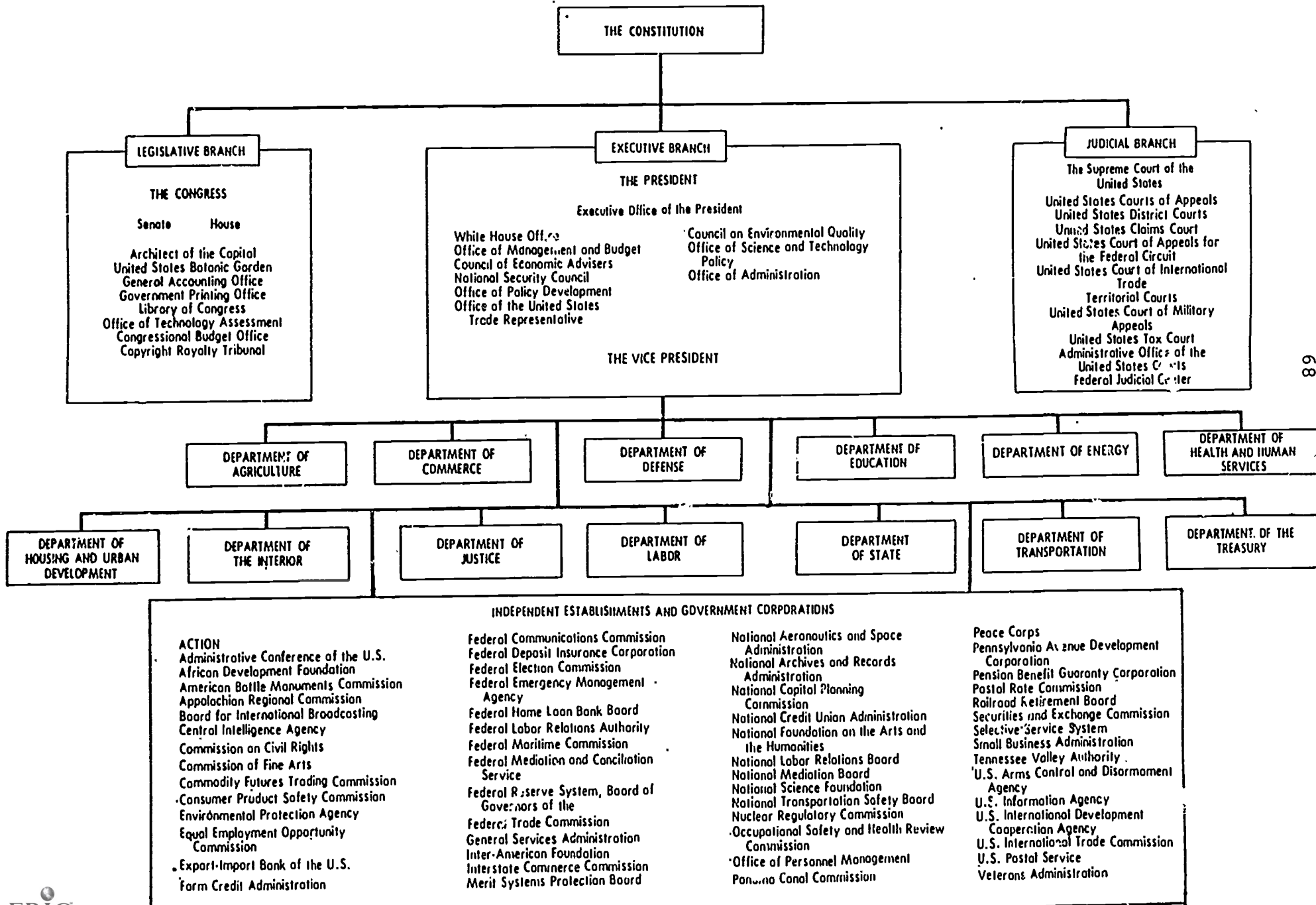
