ABSTRACT

This circular provides information about travel agencies, travel information centers, and transportation services based on descriptive literature provided by companies and organizations that offer services to handicapped travelers; access guides to specific cities and tourist sites are not included. The first section lists books on travel for the blind and physically handicapped, including 17 print books issued in 1982 or later and recorded and braille items. Recorded and braille titles may be borrowed by eligible residents of the United States from National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped network member libraries. Bibliographic information is provided for each entry, and brief annotations are included for print books. In addition, the names, addresses, telephone numbers, and brief descriptions of activities are provided for six information centers in the second section and for nine travel agencies in the third section. Finally, the fourth section includes descriptions of transportation services available in the United States for travel by air, automobile, bus, ship, and train (AMTRAK). Ordering information for this circular and a listing of 16 other National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped reference circulars are also provided. (KM)

INTRODUCTION

Information about travel agencies, travel information centers, and transportation services contained in this reference circular is based on descriptive literature provided by companies and organizations offering services to handicapped travelers. As new information becomes available it will be included in future editions of this circular.

Access guides to specific cities and tourist sites are not included in this circular as they are too numerous to mention. Such guides are typically published by local chambers of commerce, service organizations, state tourist offices, and Easter Seal Society branches, and may be found in public libraries or requested directly from the issuing organization. In addition, access guides covering specific foreign countries may be obtained from tourist offices that many foreign countries operate in Washington, D.C. or New York City.

Print books listed in Section I are limited to publications issued in 1982 or later. Recorded and braille travel books listed in Section I may be borrowed by eligible residents of the United States from a network of libraries serving visually and physically handicapped readers. Profiles of over 1,800 museums, theatres, arenas, stadia, racetracks, zoos, gardens, and historic houses throughout the U.S. Provides details on tours, programming, fees, meeting spaces available for rent, and accessibility features. It is organized alphabetically by state.

Barish, Frances. Frommer's guide for the disabled traveler: The United States, Canada, and Europe. New York: Simon and Schuster, 1984. 362p. \$10.95.

This guide for the inexperienced disabled traveler is written from the perspective of a wheelchair-using author who has traveled extensively. Accessibility features of specific hotels, restaurants, theatres, and transportation terminals are given for fifteen major cities in the United States, Canada, and Europe. Includes a map for each city listed showing major public tourist sites.

Darnbrough, Ann, and Derek Kinrade, comps. Directory for disabled people: a handbook of information and opportunities for disabled and handicapped people. 4th ed. Dover, NH: Woodhead Faulkner Ltd., 1985. 385p. \$12.50.

A handbook of organizations and services for handicapped persons in Great Britain. Three chapters deal with travel within England and abroad.

Durgin, Rod W., ed. A guide to recreation, leisure, and travel for the handicapped. Volume II: Travel and transportation. Toledo, OH: Resources Directories, 1985. 258p. \$59.95. (3103 Executive Pkwy. 43606).

A comprehensive listing of associations and organizations that provide services to handicapped individuals. The book is organized under the broad topics: transportation,



cruises, travel agencies, lodging, international access guides, camps, and state tourist offices. Half of the volume is comprised of state-by-state travel information.

The Handicapped driver's mobility guide. Falls Church, VA: American Automobile Association, 1984. 94p. Free. (Traffic Safety Department, 811 Gatehouse Road 22047).

A guide to equipment and services for handicapped drivers. Provides information on adaptive equipment, driver training, and related services in the United States and Canada.

Hamilton, Lou. Travel tips. <u>In</u> Hamilton, Lou, Why didn't somebody tell me about these things? Pleasant Hill, MO: The author, 1984. p. 109-114.

Practical advice and guidance on traveling by van. Written by a physically handicapped person who presents her personal experiences and includes suggestions on general health care.

Personal travel experiences by readers of the magazine. Includes detailed book reviews of new titles on travel with emphasis on their relevance to handicapped persons.

This manual for travel agents suggests practical procedures for counseling disabled travelers and acquaints travel personnel with rules, regulations, and policies on travel, particularly in Canada. The author presents her experiences in traveling around the world in a wheelchair. She shows how "backpacking" is possible for the adventurous. A guide for foreign handicapped visitors traveling in the United States. Information on U.S. customs, passport requirements, and transportation policies. Phone numbers are given for the major airlines, car rental agencies, and hotel chains. Provides guidance on legal rights, health needs, and financial information. Includes a list of



organizations specializing in the needs of disabled people.

Walzer, Mary M. A travel guide for the disabled: western Europe. New York: Van Nostrand Reinhold, 1982. 284p.

Tourist sites accessible to physically handicapped persons in Europe are described. Arrangement is by country, region, and city. Includes a pronunciation list of health-related words for each country.

Weiss, Louise. Access to the world: a travel guide for the handicapped. Rev. ed. New York: Henry Holt, 1986. 240p. \$9.95.

Detailed information on the policies of major airlines, buses, trains, car rental agencies, and ships regarding the transportation of disabled people. Suggests vacation places throughout the world that are accessible; lists travel agencies, consumer organizations, and international tourist offices. Practical tips on health, food, and money are included.

IV. TRANSPORTATION SERVICES IN THE UNITED STATES

A. AIR

Travelers in need of special arrangements should contact airlines at least twenty-four hours in advance of departure for wheelchairs, portable oxygen, travel with a guide dog, etc. Guide dogs travel and sit with their owners free of charge. Airlines recommend that passengers check in at the terminal well in advance of scheduled boarding time. For detailed information on a particular airport see Access travel: airports in Section IA.

B. AUTOMOBILE

Three national companies rent cars with hand controls (for left- or right-handed use). Cars are available at most major U.S. cities with pick-up and drop-off locations varying from agency to agency. Advance notice (varying from twenty-four hours to fourteen days) is required. Car rental companies may be contacted through toll-free numbers or local offices, found in local telephone directories.

C. BUS

The two major bus lines, Greyhound and Trailways, are willing to provide necessary assistance for those who react it in boarding and handling baggage. Advance arrangements can be made by calling the departure terminal for special assistance. Bus lines request check-in at the terminal well in advance of scheduled departure time. Terminal accessibility varies from city to city. Both companies require a written statement from a physician verifying the need for an attendant to travel with a handicapped person. The attendant and the disabled person may travel on a single



adult-fare ticket. Wheelchairs or other equipment are allowed, but must be folded and stored out of the way while the bus is in motion. There is no additional charge for a wheelchair or other special equipment. Phone numbers for both companies can be found in the local phone directory. Greyhound has a special TDD phone number for the hearing impaired: 800-345-3109. Traveler's guide for the handicapped, and Reach for Greyhound's helping hand are available free from: Greyhound Lines, Inc., Section S, Greyhound Tower, Phoenix, AZ 85077.

D. SHIP

Prospective travelers should contact the passenger line or t'eir travel agent about any requirements for medical cartification, accessibility of shipboard facilities, or wheelchair regulations in various ports. E. TRAIN (AMTRAK)

Passengers who need assistance should notify Amtrak in advance of planned departure. Special discount fares for elderly or handicapped individuals are granted when the individual presents an identification card issued by an organization for disabled persons or a governmental agency, or when the traveler presents a letter from a physician. No discounts are available for an attendant or companion accompanying a disabled passenger. Equipment and accessibility of facilities (restrooms and bedrooms) vary. Passenger should check with an Amtrak reservation agent to learn what is available for a particular trip. Standard size wheelchairs (battery-operated) may be transported in passenger cars. Fuel-powered and oversized wheelchairs are not allowed on passenger cars. Guide dogs for blind or deaf



passengers are permitted in passenger cars free of charge.
