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ABSTRACT

Various theories and approaches to conflict resolution and peace education are presented in the 31 resources listed in this annotated bibliography. It is divided into two sections. Section 1 contains materials designed to help adults become more effective role models for the peaceful resolution of conflict. Topics include parent/child conflicts, negotiation, control, mediation, power, interpersonal relationships, and peace strategies. Section 2 describes resources useful in establishing a positive environment and teaching conflict resolution skills. Included are a variety of books, curriculum guides, and materials to help establish a school-based mediation program and to teach conflict resolution and peace education. (SM)

Crum, Thomas F. PARENTING: GIFTS IN DISGUISE - RESOLVING PARENT/CHILD CON/LICT. Englawood, Colorado: Personal Learning Institute, 1988. Fisher, Roger and Ury, William. GETTING TO YES: NEGOTIATING AGREEMENT WITHOUT GIVING IN. You York: Penguin Books, 1986. (161 pages) Written in a very readable style, this was is a wonderful conflict resolution tool. It gives practical guidelines and examples for planning and conducting negotiations. The principles can be applied within the family, at work, in classrooms, and internationally. Widely available, \$8.95.

Glasser, William. CONTROL THEORY: A NEW EXPLANATION OF HOW WE CONTROL OUR LIVES. New York: Harper and Row, 1984. (240 pages) Dr. Glasser presents a practical approach to well-being, based on his "control theory". He explains that everything we do, think and feel comes from inside us and is not just a response to things and reople around us. He explains and illustrates control theory in a way that allows us to learn how to better control all our actions. By making positive choices we can take effective control of our lives. Gordon, Thomas. PARENT EFFECTIVENESS TRAINING: THE TESTED NEW WAY TO RAISE RESPONSIBLE CHILDREN. New York: Wyden, Inc., 1970. (338 pages) This excellent book should be in everyone's library! Presents an alternative to the authoritarian approach (the children lose) and permissiveness (the parents lose). Enables parents and teachers to show children how to solve their own problems with no rancor, accusation, guilt, or shame involved. Features active listening, sending of "I" messages, and the "no-lose" method for resolving conflicts. (Dr. Gordon has also authored TEACHER EFFECTIVENESS TRAINING, Wyden, 1974, and LEADER EFFECTIVENESS TRAINING, Wyden, 1977, with the same interpersonal-relations messages adapted for different audiences.) Widely available in paperback, \$7.95.

Le Shan, Lawrence. HOW TO MEDITATE: THE ACCLAIMED GUIDE TO SELF-DISCOVERY. New York: Bantam Books, 1986. (161 pages) For those who are considering the process of meditation, this is a simple, realistic, beginner's guide.



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Discusses the psychological and physiological effects, the basic types of meditation and gives instructions for a number of meditations. Paperback, \$3.95, widely available.

Macy, Joanna Rogers. DESPAIR AND PERSONAL POWER IN THE NUCLEAR AGE. Philadelphia: New Society Publishers, 1983. (178 pages) Examines our psychological responses to nuclear perils and lays the theoretical foundations for an empowering, personally-centered approach to social change. Included are sections on awakening in the nuclear age, relating to children and young people, guided meditations, empowerment rituals, affirmations of commitment, and a special section on "Spiritual Exercises for a Time of Apocalypse!" Paul, Jordan and Paul, Margaret. DO I HAVE TO GIVE UP ME TO BE LOVED BY YOU? Minneapolis: CompCare Publications, 1983. (313 pages) The authors, marriage counselors, present their theory about why couples behave as they do, how relationships get into trouble, and how conflict can be handled so that two people may always return to loving feelings. They claim that there are powerful hidden motives which keep people fixed in non-productive behaviors, and the only effective way to resolve conflicts and change behaviors is to understand these "blocks" to change. The book presents a process through which partners can help each other remove these obstacles. Paperback, \$9.95, widely available.

Robert, Marc. MANAGING CONFLICT: FROM THE INSIDE OUT. Austin, Texas: Learning Concepts, 1982. (149 pages) The author's premise is that interpersonal conflict is best handled by those who have a clear sense of themselves and of their uniqueness. Thus, skill in conflict management requires enough realistic self-study to make appropriate behavioral choices, even under intense pressure. The book contains questionnaires (and refers to other resources) which help the individual asses his/her conflict management style. The author guides the reader through types of situations that cause conflicts and through the necessary methods of handling conflicts. This is an invaluable resource for a dedicated student of interpersonal conflict management!
