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
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ABSTRACT

This report, based on a mailed survey of member institutions of the National University Continuing Education Association during 1986-87, includes data from 73 responding institutions of higher education. The report is organized in five parts. The first part outlines total program scope, including enrollment and staff growth, special fees, and course development. Part Two is divided into major program categories—college, high school, and noncredit. Information is provided within each category detailing grading and development compensation, enrollments, and course fees. Part Three provides information on the use of technology to enhance instruction; the fourth part lists current research. Part Five is an appendix that includes the survey instrument and supplemental information provided by individual institutions. (KC)





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

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


INDEPENDENT STUDY 1986-87 OVERVIEW

Independent study is growing, renewing itself, taking new forms and involving new institutions. The growth and change are not dramatic, but the cumulative effect will shape independent study programs of the future and, to a lesser extent, will modify the established role of such programs within the university.

In 1986-87 there were 307,677 reported enrollments at 74 institutions that were members or affiliate members of the National University Continuing Education Association. The year before, there were 275,566 enrollments reported at 66 institutions. When adjusted for institutions that were not reported in one year or the other, the annual rate of growth was 6.9%. A half-dozen small NUCEA institutions failed to report enrollment statistics for 1986-87; one elected not to make them public. The maximum error from such under-reporting is estimated at 1% or less of the total; all major institutions are included in this annual Of the approximately 33,000 more enrollments reported in 1986-87, nearly 19,000 represented growth at existing NUCEA independent study programs and the remainder consisted of students in new programs or established programs within new institutional members of NUCEA.

Enrollment Change


Had there been a wholly representative program in 1986-87, it would have enrolled about 59% of its students in college courses, 29% in high school courses, and 12% in noncredit courses (Figure 1). This would have represented a decline in the proportion of college enrollments, a slight increase in high school, and an appreciable increase (growth by 50%) in the noncredit program.

Nationally, the mean enrollment involved 4158 combined (college, high school, noncredit) registrations in 1986-87. The range of enrollments this year was from Adams State College's 133 to the University of Missouri's 17,611 (Figure 2).

Of the 70 institutions that reported college enrollments, the mean was 2607. Only 35 institutions reported high school enrollments; the mean was approximately the same as the college programs at 2534. The forty institutions reporting noncredit enrollments averaged 913 registrations. Though noncredit offerings are seemingly small as a percentage of the national effort, much of the 1986-87 enrollment growth was in this area, which accounted for 13,000 of the 33,000 additional registrations. The status of each area is analyzed later in this report.

This year, as in each of the past several years, we note growth on a national scale. Within any given institution, however, it is rare that national patterns of growth will be reflected year after year. Indeed, of all the NUCEA institutions that have been shown in our annual statistical reports, only nine have reported growth in each of the past five years: the Universities of Missouri, Florida, Maryland, Colorado, and Nevada, as well as Indiana, Mississippi State, Western Illinois, and Western Michigan Universities.

Staffing

There is such diversity in the staffing patterns of independent study programs that it is difficult to draw many conclusions from the data reported in Table I. It is clear that the total number of professionals employed in independent study is growing and that the number of clerical staff employed tends to reflect enrollment in the programs.

A few institutions have assigned faculty, and these balloon the professional staff reported. Some institutions combine independent study with other programs, and these organizational patterns can result in reports of very modest staffing. One program reports that professional staffing amounts to only .05 full time equivalent, or about two hours per week, while another program of approximately the same size reports 17 full-time professionals. Inconsistencies in annual data reporting imply that some institutions do not follow consistent patterns in defining their professional positions or in clearly distinguishing between assigned staff and those assigned elsewhere who work with the program in an overload status.

Program Characteristics

Table II presents comparative information about the characteristics of programs and their students. Only 35 institutions report having data on the percentage of their university enrollments that are by students currently studying on the university campus; that more than two-thirds of these reports are rounded to 5 or 10% indicates that many reports are estimates. Only six institutions indicate that the majority of their enrollments are by on campus students. The dominant pattern in independent study is to attract students who are not otherwise enrolled at the institution whose courses they are taking.

Twenty institutions report offering extended degree programs, although some of these place severe restrictions on the number of credit hours through independent study that will be accepted toward a degree. Only two NUCEA institutions, St. Joseph's College and Thomas A. Edison State College, report that students can meet all degree requirements through independent study.

Course Preparation and Revision

Comparative information on courses and the staff assigned to assuring course quality is in Table III.

Like enrollments, the number of courses offered within each program varies immensely. The University of Wisconsin reports the largest number, 497, and four other institutions report offering more than 400. The institutions with the largest number of courses tend to have one or more editors or course designers assigned, though a few



report extensive curriculum work without any persons assigned expressly for this purpose. In many cases this underscores the earlier comment on staffing; individuals who prepare courses or who work on courses prepared by faculty members may be formally assigned broad duties elsewhere in continuing education or in the university. Surprisingly, the number of editors or course designers reported to be assigned does not appear to be closely related to the production of new courses or revisions.

The Standards of the Division of Independent Study suggest that courses be revised on a five-year cycle. That cycle formerly was attuned to publishers' revisions of textbooks, but many publishers now have adopted a three-year cycle of revisions. Thus, a ratio of one to four or less in courses offered versus courses revised or newly opened would suggest a vigorous program of course maintenance. A ratio of one to seven or more is probably indicative of staffing or financing problems that hinder appropriate course maintenance.

Independent Study Faculty

Broad staffing patterns and the participation of the university faculty in independent study instruction are presented in Table IV. The information in this table should be taken in the context of the enrollments and courses reported earlier.

Some institutions have assigned faculty, rather than employing "overload" faculty. Others utilize faculty assigned to academic departments but whose departmental duties involve independent study instruction. The dominant pattern, however, remains one of employing many faculty members to teach for additional payment and employing a smaller number to develop courses for additional payment. Many institutions combine these modes of faculty assignment.

Special Fees

It is customary for institutions to offset operating costs and the costs of services that are unique to independent study by assessing special fees. The most common of these are a charge for study guides, a charge to transfer between independent study courses or to extend enrollment in a course, a supplemental charge to those who are residents of another state, and a charge to offset the cost of mailing books or lessons or both.

As shown in Table V, virtually all institutions levy one or more of these charges. Only four institutions did not report any special fees - Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, Michigan State University, Roosevelt University, and Western Illinois University. The nonresident charge is the least common, and it appears to be a declining usage.

The data in the tables in this report permit the administrators and staff of independent study institutions to compare and contrast their activities, their staffing, and their programming and growth



patterns with those of other institutions. Further, they facilitate research on and analysis of an increasingly significant educational activity. In many ways, this annual statistical report is analogous to weather observations made across the continent: the data will reveal a national picture to the individual who studies it, but in any particular case it is only the most simplified representation of a complex reality.


COLLEGE PROGRAMS

Enrollments

Total college program enrollment for 1986-87 was 182,492 students which represents 59.3 percent cf the total Independent Study enrollments (Table I). This is an increase of 13,618 over 1985-86. It should be pointed out, however, that the 1985-86 figures represent 63 institutions with college programs while the 1986-87 figures represent 70 institutions with college programs.

During 1986-87 the average (mean) enrollment for the 70 college programs was 2,607. The median was 1,764.

Sixteen institutions indicated over ten percent growth and at least fifty new_enrollments in their college programs between 1985-86 and 1986-87.





Sixty institutions reporting in both 1985-86 and 1986-87 showed wide differences in the ranges of increase and decrease in enrollments. Thirty-four institutions reported increases ranging from 9 to 1,181 enrollments with an average increase of 320 students.

Twenty-six reported decreases ranging from 9 to 4,307 enrollments with an average decrease of 360. The 4,037 decrease at St. Joseph's College is very high and can be misleading in relation to the other institutions reporting decreases. If the 4,037 figure is not included in the calculation, the average decrease for the other 25 institutions is 213 enrollments.

Twenty-nine institutions reported that from 1 to 80 percent of their college enrollments were by on-campus students. The average was 42.8%.

Twenty institutions indicated they have extended degree programs. (Table II)

Course Fees

Of the seventy institutions reporting, forty-eight said they based their course fees on the semester hour; fourteen on the quarter hour; eight by other means; and five did not report this information.

Semester hour fees for 1986-87 ranged from \$30.00 %0 \$182.00 per hour with an average of \$51.71. The projected fees for 1987-88 ranged from \$30.00 to \$192.00 per semester hour with an average of \$54.11. This is a 4.7% increase over the previous year.

Quarter hour fees for 1986-87 ranged from \$24.00 to \$130.00 per hour with an average of \$41.75. The projected fees for 1987-88 remained at \$24.00 to \$130.00 per hour, but the average fee increased to \$43.32.

Grading Compensation

Institutions reported a number of different bases on which grading compensation is determined - per lesson, semester hour, quarter hour, enrollment, course, module, and exam.

The most common method of calculating the grading stipend is on a per lesson basis. The twenty-nine institutions using this method reported a stipend range of \$3.48 to \$4.05 for 1986-87. They projected an average range of \$3.45 to \$4.37 per lesson for 1987-88.



The thirteen institutions calculating the grading stipend on a semester hour basis reported an average fee of \$21.63 for 1986-87 and projected an average fee of \$23.63 for 1987-88.

Seven institutions using the quarter hour basis for calculating the grading fee reported an average range of \$16.54 to \$16.86 for 1986-87 and projected an average range of \$17.54 to \$17.86 for 1987-88.

Seven institutions said they determined the grading stipend on a per enrollment basis and reported an average of \$50.36 in 1986-87 and projected an average of \$51.57 for 1987-88.

Fourteen institutions indicated that they paid a bonus for prompt lesson return.

Eleven institutions said they use computer grading which is the same number reporting computer usage for this purpose in 1985-86.

Development Compensation

Course development compensation is largely determined on a per course basis. However, seventeen institutions indicated they used a semester hour basis, and eight used a quarter basis.

The thirty-five institutions calculating the development stipend on a per course basis reported an average rate of \$76.20 to \$1103.00 for 1986-87. The projected average for 1987-88 ranged from \$811.06 to \$1156.06.

The semester hour average rate for 1986-87 was \$325.15 and the average projected rate for 1987-88 was \$363.44. The quarter hour average stipend for 1986-87 was \$288.13 and the projected average was \$317.50 for 1987-88. Five institutions indicated that compensation varied with the rank of the course developer.

HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAMS

Thirty-five Independent Study Programs reported high school enrollments in 1986-87, which accounted for 47 percent of the 75 responding overall programs. Enrollments varied from a low of one to University of Missouri's high of 12,565. The mean average enrollment was 2,534 (see Table VII). High school enrollments accounted for 28.3 percent of total correspondence study enrollments.

High school correspondence programs are most often a component of the larger programs, with nine of the ven institutions showing largest total enrollments including high school courses. None of the seventeen smallest programs report high school enrollments.

The twelve most successful high school programs (in terms of the percentage of growth in 1986-87) are shown in the graph below.

During 1986-87, the mean average course fee for programs reporting a standard rate was \$52.69 per 1/2 unit. The mean average grading stipend was \$2.17 per lesson or exam. The mean average development compensation of those programs reporting a flat rate was \$64.22 per course.

Three programs used computer grading in 1986-87 for high school courses, less than the level of activity during 1985-86.





NON-CREDIT PROGRAMS

Last year's report referred to the lack of growth in noncredit programs over the prior six years. It would appear this trend was reversed in 1986-87. Forty institutions report non-credit programs, accounting for a total of 36,504 annollments, or 11.9% of total independent study enrollments for the year. This represents an increase of 55% in noncredit enrollments and an increase of 3.3% in terms of total enrollment from 1985-86. The graph below shows growth in the ten most successful programs.



Brigham Young University--Grading stipend varies according to promptness: for 1986-87, \$3.0 per lesson returned within 48 hours; \$2.10 returned within 7 days; and \$1.50 beyond 7 days. The stipend is further influenced by the course workload: for most courses, not all lessons are to be submitted, but faculty are paid as though they were. For example, if 1/3 the lessons are to be submitted, the faculty is paid triple-rate for each lesson actually graded. Thus, given the promptness and workload factors, the mean actual stipend this year has been \$4.19 per lesson.

For computer graded courses, a royalty is paid on each enrollment.

Colorado State University--Approximately 40% of tuition.

Kansas State University -- No grading compensation paid - 50% of enrollment fees are put into development account.

Oregon State--Less than 4 gradings per course \$5.00 per grading; 5 or more \$2.75 per grading, credit by exam test \$10.00.
