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**ABSTRACT**

Developed to form the basis for a state-wide public school student assessment program, this manual outlines course performance standards based upon intended outcomes in language arts courses which are part of the state-adopted curriculum frameworks, grades 9 through 12. The standards are for courses in English skills, English, and English honors at each grade level. Five to eight performance standards are listed for each of the 12 courses covered in the booklet. 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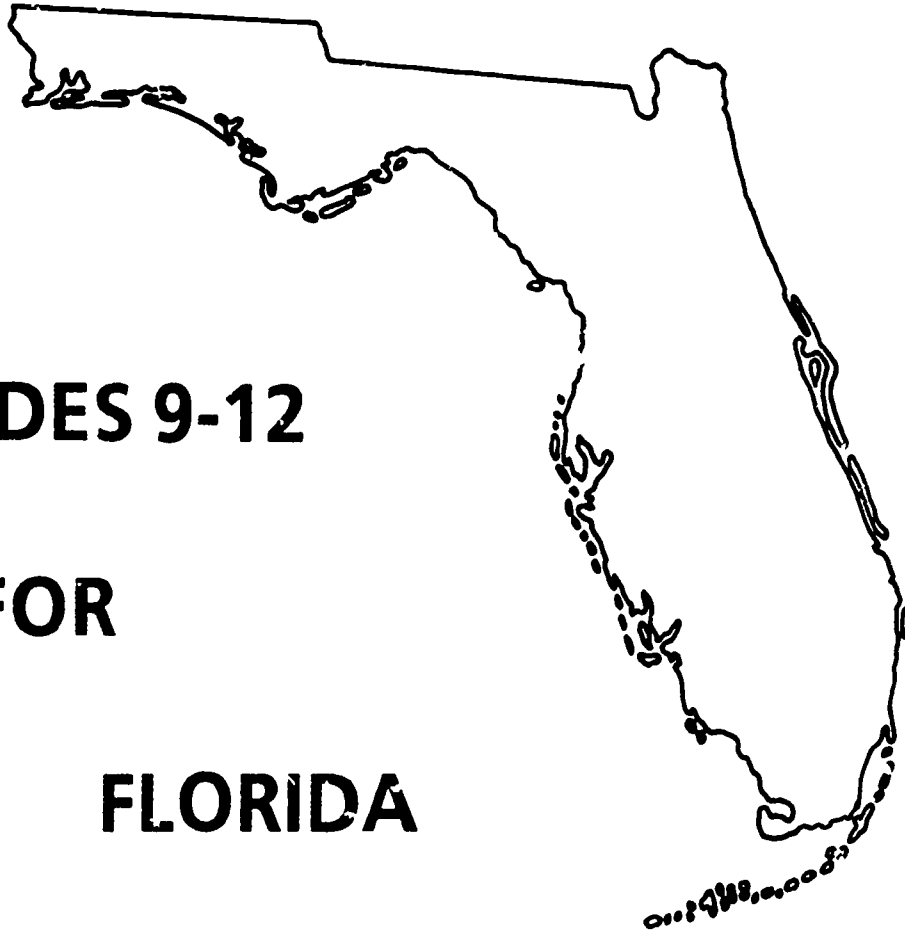

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## INTRODUCTION

Development of Uniform Statewide Course Performance Standards is a result of the Florida Accountability in Curriculum, Educational Materials, and Testing Act (FACET) of 1984, Section 232.2454, Florida Statutes. The State Board of Education adopted the initial course performance standards on July 1, 1986. The uniform statewide course performance standards will form the basis for assessment which will measure public-school-student performance in each identified major subject area.

The standards are based upon intended outcomes in selected courses which are part of the state adopted curriculum frameworks for grades 9-12. They represent a balance of content and difficulty level. Where appropriate, the state adopted minimum student performance standards and standards of excellence are included.

These uniform statewide course performance standards were developed using the specific course student performance standards adopted by districts. They, therefore, become a subset of those standards which were developed through the statewide committee process during 1984-85.

Each district has the responsibility of adopting student performance standards for each course taught in its schools in grades 9-12. However, it is the responsibility of the local school district to ensure that their adopted performance standards are conceptually consistent with those adopted by the State Board of Education.

The initial statewide assessment of course performance standards for selected courses is planned for the spring of the 1988-89 school year with results to be reported in the fall of the 1989-90 school year. The results of this assessment will provide information which permits numerical rankings and other analyses regarding student achievement.
