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ABSTRACT

This manual presents Florida curriculum frameworks for selected language arts courses for grades six through eight. Frameworks for up to three levels of each of the following courses are provided in the manual: language arts, journalism, English for non-native speakers, communications, reading, writing, speech and debate, creative writing, expository writing, and intensive English. Each framework contains a header and two sections: "Major Concepts/Content" and "Intended Outcomes." Included in the curriculum framework header are descriptive elements including the major subject area of which the course is a part, the course number, the full course title, and recommended certifications. The "Major Concepts/Content" section provides a summary of the course; the "Intended Outcomes" section contains broad statements reflecting essential elements which students should demonstrate after successfully completing the course. IMPLEMENTING GUIDELINES

Authorization

The 1984 Legislature provided funds to the Department of Education to develop curriculum frameworks for all mathematics, science, language arts, and social studies courses offered in grades six through eight by passage of Section 230.2319, Florida Statutes. In 1985, the Legislature expanded the development to cover all courses offered in these grades. State Board of Education Rule 6A-1.09413 is the implementing legislation for this document.

Development

The frameworks for grades six through eight, also known as middle grades frameworks, were developed by statewide writing teams. These teams were staffed by Department of Education consultants, local school district staff, and university personnel. The frameworks were reviewed by all 67 school districts and their recommendations were incorporated. The frameworks for language arts, mathematics, science and social studies became effective at the beginning of the 1986-87 school year. The other sections will become effective at the beginning of the 1987-88 school year.

Content and Course Length

Each middle grades framework contains a header and two sections: "Major Concepts/Content and Intended Outcomes." Some frameworks also include a "Special Note" section. Included in the curriculum framework header are descriptive elements including the major subject area of which the course is a part, the seven-digit course number, the full course title, and recommended certifications. Section I, "Major Concepts/Content", provides a summary of the course, Section II, "Intended Outcomes", contains broad statements reflecting essential elements which students should demonstrate after successfully completing the course.

Topics and areas of study listed in each framework are vital components of the course. Districts are encouraged to expand courses as desired to meet local needs. The language arts, mathematics, science and social studies courses were designed to be offered year-long. In other areas, some courses are appropriate for year-long and others are one-semester. All courses may be assumed to be appropriate for a year in length unless otherwise noted. Even though a length is recommended, districts may offer courses for any desired length of time.

Exploratory and Self-ontained Courses

The exploratory wheel courses are designed to accommodate any desired combination of courses from the course code directory. Districts may determine the length of each wheel.

There is no specific framework for the graded, self-contained course, Sixth Grade (#2400000). In providing instruction under this course number, districts should select courses from existing middle grades frameworks.
