ABSTRACT

Graduation rates and numbers of graduates for spring 1981 through 1985 are presented in seven figures and five tables along with related enrollment information. Data were provided by the Center for Education Statistics' Common Core of Data Surveys derived from administrative records in each state. The graduation rates reflect the number of public school graduates as a percentage of the corresponding ninth-grade enrollment and are adjusted for interstate migration and unclassified students. The national graduation rate for the 5 years included in the tabulations has remained quite stable, varying from a low of 69.5 ercent in 1981 to a high of 70.8 percent in 1984. (MLF)

Public School Graduates, 1981-1985

Graduation rates and numbers of graduates for spring, 1981 through 1985, are presented in tables 1 through 5 along with related enrollment information. Some highlights from the tables and figures are:

- The national graduation rate for the 5 years included in the tabulations has remained quite stable, varying from a low of 69.5 in 1981 to a high of 70.8 in 1984.
- Nine States and the District of Columbia had increasing or stable graduation rates from 1983 to 1984 and again from 1984 to 1985.
- Both ninth- and twelfth-grade enrollments have decreased every year for the 5 years included in the tabulations.

METHODOLOGY

Data on numbers of graduates, other completers, and enrollment were provided through the Common Core of Data (CCD) Survey, Part V (State Nonfiscal Report). The CCD surveys are an annual collection of basic information on the universe of public schools. The State Nonfiscal Report includes information on enrollment, staffing, and graduates. The CCD surveys are conducted by the Center for Education Statistics with the assistance of the State education agencies (SEAs) in the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and the outlying areas under U.S. jurisdiction. Data from outlying areas are not included here, but are available upon request. The data were derived from the administrative records in each State.

In compiling these data from administrative record systems, each SEA obtains fall enrollment reports from the local education agencies (IEAs) that operate public schools. Since each SEA uses various collection

methodologies to obtain these data, the "as of dates" for enrollment counts may vary from State 1. State. Each SEA may edit or examine the individual IEA reports before computing State totals. Upon receipt of the data from each State, CES edits the reports using a machine edit procedure to check for internal and longitudinal consistency. Questionable entries are returned to the SEA for verification or correction before publication.

Graduation rates for 1983-84 and 1984-85 are those published in the State Education Statistics Supplement (also known as "The Wall Chart"), prepared by the Department's Office of Planning, Budget and Evaluation. The graduation rates presented there are derived from the CCD data on enrollment and number of graduates. The rates are adjusted for secondary school students who are not classified by grade and for interstate migration. In the adjusted figures, the number of ninth-grade students used as the base includes the prorated share of unclassified secondary school students for each State. The percentage that ninth-grade enrollment comprises of the ninth- to twelfth-grade enrollment is applied to the unclassified secondary counts and then this figure is added to the ninth-grade count. To adjust for interstate migration, the number of ninth-grade students is multiplied by a migration factor. The migration factor is calculated for each State as a ratio, whose elements are: the 14- to 16-year-olds in 1983 as the numerator; and the 11- to 13-year-olds in 1980 as the denominator. (The numerator is based on the Current Population Survey; the denominator is based on the 1980 Census.)

Graduation rates for 1980-81, 1981-82 and 1982-83 were calculated by CES based on the CCD data using the methodology described above.

DEFINITIONS

Enrollment data are the unduplicated headcounts of students whose names were entered on the roll of the school or IEA as of October 1 of the school year. The regular day-school graduates are the number of students receiving a high school diploma from the regular day-school program in the given school year. Other completers are those students receiving a high school diploma or its equivalent from other programs (e.g. GEDs, and adult evening schools).

RESPONSE RATES

Although several States did not report the number of "other completers," survey responses were obtained from all States and the District of Columbia for all years presented.

LIMITATIONS

The graduation rates presented here reflect the number of public school graduates as a percentage of the corresponding ninth-grade enrollment and are adjusted for interstate migration and unclassified students. There is no adjustment for other factors such as transfers to and from private schools, students who do not advance from grade to grade at the normal rate, and the like. The graduation rate should not be used as a proxy for dropout rates.




Figure 2.--Public school: Ninth-grade enrollment, 1980-81; twelfth-grade enrollment, 1983-84; and number of high school graduates, 1983-84; U.S. total




Figure 3.--Public school: Ninth-grade enrollment, 1979-80; twelfth-grade enrollment, 1982-83; and number of high school graduates, 1982-83,




Figure 4.--Public school: Ninth-grade enrollment, 1978-79; twelfth-grade enrollment, 1981-82; and number of high school graduates, 1981-82,




Figure 5.--Public school: Ninth-grade enrollment, 1977-78; twelfth-grade enrollment, 1980-81; and number of high school graduates, 1980-81, U.S. total






Figure 6.--U.S. graduation rates, academic years 1980-81 to 1984-85, calculated as a percentage of ninth-grade enrollment 3 years earlier, adjusted for interstate migration and secondary students who are not assigned to a standard grade




Figure 7.—Changes in graduation rate by State, 1983 to 1985.


