#### ABSTRACT

This report presents 72 institutions' responses to the National University Continuing Education Association Independent Study Division's survey of program practices during academic year 1987-88. The six sections provide tables on total program scope, college programs, high school programs, noncredit programs, marketing methods and costs, and research. The survey instrument and supplemental institutional information are appended. Some of the results of the survey were as follows: (1) of 305,355 independent study enrollments reported by the 72 institutions, 54 percent are in college courses, (5 percent fewer than the previous year), 33 percent are in high school (4 percent more than the previous year), and 13 percent are in noncredit programs; (2) for semester-length college courses, students paid an average of \$51.43 per semester hour, and faculty were paid an average of \$3.46 per lesson or \$24.43 per semester hour for grading, as well as an average of \$1,263 per course or \$347.25 per semester hour for new development; (3) the average high school course fee was \$56.16, the grading stipend was \$2.45 per lesson or \$20 per enrollment, and the average development stipend was \$662.59; (4) the average noncredit course fee was \$81.92; and (5) for grading, faculty were paid \$3.17 per lesson, and the course development stipend was \$572.73. #### EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This final report includes 72 institutions' final responses to the National University Continuing Education Association (NUCEA) Independent Study Division's annual survey of program practices during academic year 1987-88. Tables are included to provide information on course enrollments, course fees, staff size, course developments, and faculty stipends.

During July 1988 a seven page written survey was sent to 118 institutions, which had responded to previous I.S. annual surveys, were new members of NUCEA, or had a professional member of the I.S. Division. The survey was prepared by members of the I.S. Division's Research and Evaluation Comm ttee.

On August 30 a follow-up letter was sent to all nonresponding institutions at that time, explaining that responses received after September 12 could not be included in a preliminary report, but would appear in this final report published in March 1989. All respondents received a preliminary report and we're given six weeks to notify the committee of needed changes.

Of the 305,355 independent study enrollments reported by 72 NUCEA institutions, for fiscal year 1987-88, 54% are in college courses (a decrease of 5% from last year), 33% are in high school courses (an increase of 4% over last year), and 13% in noncredit courses. When a comparison is made of only those institutions that responded to both last year's and this year's surveys, this year's total enrollments are seven percent greater. During 1987-88 for semester-length college courses, students paid a me n average of \$51.43 per semester hour (\$55.39 in 1988-89); faculty were paid an average of \$3.46 per lesson (\$3.48 in 1988-89) or \$24.43 per semester hour (\$26.34 in 1988-89) or \$54.72 per enrollment (\$56.93 for 1988-89) for grading, as well as an average of \$1263 (\$1263 in 1988-89) per course or \$347.25 (\$349.25 in 1988-89) per semester hour for new development.

During 1987-88 for quarter-length college courses, students paid a mean average of \$38.46 (\$40.42 in 1988-89) per quarter hour; faculty were paid a mean average of \$3.29 (\$3.38 in 1988-89) per lesson or \$17.33 (\$17 in 1988-89) per quarter hour for grading; as well as a mean average of \$707.50 (\$745 in 1988-89) per course or \$156.25 (\$168.75 in 1988-89)  $_{\rm per}$  semester hour for new development.

During 1987-88 for high school courses, the mean average enrollment fee for students was \$56.16 (\$59.16 in 1988-89) per course. For faculty members who grade such courses, the mean average stipend was \$2.45 (\$2.51 in 1988-89) per lesson or \$20 (\$20.50 in 1988-89) per enrollment, while the course development mean average stipend is \$662.59 (\$683.70 in 1988-89) per course.

Within the noncredit courses the mean average course fee was \$81.92 (\$84.73 in 1988-89). For grading, faculty were paid \$3.17 (\$3.23 in 1988-89) per lesson, while the course development stipend was \$572.73 (\$581.82 in 1988-89).

#### TOTAL PROGRAM SCOPE

The narrative of this report is very similar to that which has appeared in prior annual program profiles of the Independent Study Division of the National University Continuing Education Association (which are available in the ERIC system as ED 294 045, ED 281 014, ED 270 609, ED 246 754, ED 253 660, ED 227 801).

In 1987-88 there were 305,355 reported enrollments at 72 institutions that were members or affiliate members of the National University Continuing Education Association. The year before, there were 307,677 enrollments at 73 reporting institutions. When adjusted for institutions that were not reported in one year or the other, the annual rate of growth was roughly 7%, about the same growth rate a last year. Of the seven institutions that responded to last year's survey but did not do so this year, three were in the top half in total enrollment: St. Joseph College with 10,413 students, the International Correspondence Institute with 5,900 students, and the University of Pittsburgh with 3,806 students. When added to the four nonresponding institutions of smaller enrollments eight percent of last year's total population is not represented. Of the approximately 20,000 more enrollments reported in 1987-88, over 11,000 represented growth at existing NUCEA high school programs.

#### Enrollment Changes

The average program in 1987-88 enrolled about 54% of its students in college courses, 33% in high school courses, and 13% in noncredit courses (see Figure 1). In comparison to last year's typical program, this represents a five percent decline in the proportion of college enrollments, a four percent increase in high school, and a one percent increase in the noncredit enrollments.


Nationally, the mean total enrollment consisted of 4,241 combined (college, high school, and noncredit) registrations in 1987-88. The range of enrollments this year was from East Tennessee State University's 10 to the Pennsylvania State University's 21,971 (see Figure 2).

As shown in Table I, of the 69 institutions that reported college enrollments, the mean was 2,394, smaller than last year because several larger college programs in last year's survey did not participate this year. Only 36 institutions reported high school enrollments; the mean of 2779 was over 16% greater than that of the college programs. The 41 institutions reporting noncredit enrollments had a mean of 978, but a median size of 150 enrollments. The status of each type of course is analyzed later in this report.

This year, as in each of the past several years, we note growth on a national scale. Within any given institution, however, it is rare that national patterns of growth will be reflected year after year. Indeed, of all the NUCEA institutions that have been shown in our annual statistical reports, only seven have reported overall growth in each of the past six years: the Universities of Missouri, Florida, Maryland, and Colorado, as well as Indiana, Mississippi State, and Western Michigan Universities.

#### <u>Credit Hours</u> and CEUs

Also in Table 1 can be found two measures of activity that have not been collected previously in the I.S. Division's annual survey of program practices: credit hours and CEUs (Continuing Education Units, each one of which is equivalent to ten hours of standardized effort that a student expands within a course to complete a course at a satisfactory level). Credit hours were gathered because some institutions (such as the University of Maryland) serve I.S. students through courses that have large average credit hour values (six or nine semester hours, with work per course equal to two or three times the average 3 semester hour course at most other institutions).

Another reason to collect credit hours is to have some method by which to compare I.S. programs on a semester calendar with those on a quarter calendar. One difficulty in making any comparison is the tendency of many institutions to estimate the number of credit hours in which students were enrolled. Of the 35 semester schools that reported both enrollments and credit hours, 42% provided estimates (their average course credit value is 3.0). All semester schools reported a mean average of 3.4 semester credits per course.

Within the smaller group of 8 quarter calendar schools that reported both enrollments and credit hours, 38% reported estimates. The mean average for all quarter schools was 4.2 credit hours per course. An interesting side issue is the variation between institutions that report an exact average value of 5.0 versus those that report an exact average value of 4.0. One wonders if the total number of credit hours for a degree at each of those institutions is equal or adjusted proportionally. It is not surprising to see the 1986 edition of Peterson's The Independent Study Catalog state that 3 semester hours equals 4.5 quarter hours. In that same reference, the range of average credit hours per quarter hour course goes from 3.21 at the Oregon State System of Higher Education to 5.0 at Savannah State College in Georgia. Clearly credit hours can only be a rough guide to be used in addition to enrollments to reflect effort.

The number of CEUs which 13 institutions reported offering within their noncredit courses isn't very useful in its present form without knowing how many of each institution's noncredit courses do not lead toward CEUs. One may assume that the institutions which award a much greater number of CEUs per enrollment offer CEUs for almost all their courses, while those institutions with very small average CEUs per enrollment have only a few courses that award CEUs.

#### Program Characteristics

Table II presents comparative information about the characteristics of programs and their students. Only 45 institutions report having data on the percentage of their college enrollments that are by students currently studying on the university campus; since more than two-thirds of these reports are rounded to 5 or 10% it appears that many reports are estimates. Only nine institutions indicate that the majority of their enrollments are by on campus students. The dominant pattern in independent study is to attract students who are not otherwise enrolled at the institution whose campus courses they are taking.

Last year twenty institutions reported offering extended degree programs, although some of these place severe restrictions on the number of credit hours through independent study that will be accepted toward a degree. Although only two NUCEA institutions, St. Joseph's College and Thomas A. Edison State College, reported last year that students can meet all degree requirements through independent study, five additional institutions indicated that practice this year.

For the first time this year's survey collected information on the initial enrollment period (10 months median average), length of first extension (6 months median average) and second extension (4 months median average of the 30 practicing institutions).

#### Course Preparation and Revision

Comparative information on courses offered, revised or developed, as well as editor/course designer staff available is shown in Table IIIA for college programs, in Table IIIB for high school, and IIIC for noncredit.

As is true for course enrollments, the number of courses offered within each total program varies immensely. Brigham Young University reports the largest number of courses, 481, and three other institutions report offering more than 400. The institutions with the largest number of courses tend to have one or more editors or course designers assigned, although a few report extensive curriculum work without any persons assigned expressly for this purpose. In many cases this pattern complements a subsequent comment on staffing: individuals who prepare courses or who work on courses prepared by faculty members may be formally assigned broad duties elsewhere in continuing education or in the university. Surprisingly, the number of editors or course designers reported to be assigned does not appear to be closely related to the production of new courses or revisions.

#### Independent Study Faculty

Overall staffing patterns and the manner of participation by university faculty in independent study instruction are presented in Table IV. The information in this table should be taken in the context of the enrollments and courses reported earlier.

Some institutions have directly assigned I.S. faculty, rather than employing "overload" faculty. Others utilize faculty assigned to academic departments but whose departmental duties include independent study instruction. The dominant pattern, however, remains one of employing many campus faculty members to teach for additional payment and employing a smaller number to develop courses for additional payment. Some institutions utilize several of these modes of faculty assignment.

Viewed from another perspective it can be noted that the proportion of I.S. programs with faculty members who teach I.S. courses as part of their regular workload has decreased from 31% last year to 18% this year, while the proportion of programs with faculty who develop courses inload dropped from 26% to 13%.

#### Staffing

Because of the variation in stafting patterns of independent study programs it is difficult to draw many conclusions from the data reported in Table IV. It is clear that the total number of professionals employed in independent study is considerable and that the number of clerical staff employed tends to reflect enrollment in the programs.

A few of the institutions with almost entirely full-time assigned faculty also report much larger than normal professional staffs. Many institutions appear to combine independent study with other programs, which can result in reports of very small I.S. staffing. Inconsistencies in annual data reporting imply that some institutions do not follow consistent patterns between directly assigned staff versus those assigned elsewhere who work with the program in an overload status.

#### Special Fees

It is customar for institutions to offset operating costs and the costs of services that are unique to independent study by assessing special fees. The most common of these are a charge for study guides, a charge to transfer between independent study courses or to extend enrollment in a course, a supplemental charge to those who are residents of another state, and a charge to offset the cost of mailing books or lessons or both.

As shown in Table V, virtually all in itutions levy one or more of these charges. Only five institutions and not report any special fees: Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, Michigan State University, Northern Michigan University, Roosevelt University, and Western Illinois University. The nonresident charge is the least common.

The data in the tables in this report enable the administrators and staff of independent study programs to compare and contrast their activities, their staffing, their programming, and enrollment growth patterns with those of other institutions. Further, such annual data facilitate research on an increasingly significant educational activity, distance education.

#### COLLEGE PROGRAMS 1987-88

Sixty-nine institutions reported 1987-88 enrol`ment information for college level correspondence courses. The total enrollment of 165,174 in these courses was 54% of all correspondence course enrollments during the survey year.

Although the total enrollment figure would seem to indicate a 5% decrease from the previous year in college enrollments, a comparison of programs reporting for both years shows a 7% increase. Most NUCEA institutions participate in the survey consistently but aquition or subtraction of even one or two can skew the information. Any interpretation of survey results must keep this in mind.

Enrollments ranged from a low of 10 students to a high of 10,890, with an average of 2,394 and a median of 1,536 (see Table VI). Figure 3 shows those 16 institutions that had gained at least 50 enrollments and 10% more enrollments than they had last year.

The number of college courses offered by the reporting programs ranged from 9 to 359, with an average of 109 (see Table IIIA). An average of 5 new courses were developed during 1987-88.

#### Fees

Fifty of the 69 reporting institutions assess fees on the basis of semester hours and 13 use a quarter hour basis. A per-course system is used by two programs and four use some other method (see Table VI).

During 1987-88 students in courses offered on a semester basis paid an average of \$51.43 per credit. An increase of 8% is anticipated for 1988-89. Institutions offering courses on a quarter basis charged students an average fee of \$38.46 per credit, and project an increase of 5% for 1988-89.

Most programs charge students some type of additional fees, most often for extra services such as enrollment extension or transfer to another course. An average of \$13.14 is assessed for extensions by the 58 programs reporting such a charge. A transfer fee is charged by 52 programs, averaging \$10.09. The least common additional fee is that charged for non-resident students. Only five programs differentiate among students in this way, with four programs reporting an additional fee of \$5.00 to \$20.00 and the fifth charging non-resident students \$405.00.



#### Lesson Grading

The most common method of paying instructors for grading appears to be a per lesson system, with 34 institutions (49%) compensating instructors in this way at an average \$3.46 per lesson. Thirteen programs pay instructors for grading on a per enrollment basis, the average being \$54.72. Semester hours are used by 15 institutions as the basis for payment at an average of \$24.43 per semester hour. Four programs base payments on quarter hours at an average rate of \$16.75 per hour.

Projected average increases in grading stipends for 1988-89 are 1.7% for programs using a per lesson system, 4.5% for payments based on enrollment, 4.8% for those computed per semester hour and 2.3% for quarter hour based payments.

Computer grading is utilized by 12 institutions in varying degrees ranging from 1% to 100% of total grading activity. Average use of computerized grading among these 12 programs is 24.15%.

#### Course Development

The average compensation paid faculty for course development in  $1987\mbox{-}88$  was \$1,262.00 per course. This basis for payment was used by 30 programs, making it the most common system. Payments based on semester hours averaged \$347.25 per hour. No significant increase was anticipated for 1988-89 in either category.

Faculty develop course materials as part of their regular work loads at nine institutions, although only one reports 100% of their faculty working under such a system.



PART THREE

HIGH SCHOOL REPORTS



#### HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAMS 1987-88

Thirty-six independent study programs reported high school enrollments in 1987-88, or fifty percent of the seventy-two programs reporting. Enrollments varied from a low of 2 to a high of 12,779. The mean average enrollment was 2779, while the median was 1341 (see Table VII). High school courses accounted for thirty-two and eight tenths percent of all enrollments, up four percent from last year.

Ten schools lost enrollments. However, the other twenty-five schools (that responded in the last two surveys) increased. Six schools increased their enrollment by more than one thousand new students. Mississippi State University, the University of Kentucky, Brigham Young University, The University of Texas (Austin), Texas Tech University, and the University of Nebraska. Figure 4 shows 13 institutions which increased their enrollments by at least 14% over last year.

From 1987-88 to 1988-89 fourteen schools (forty-one percent) increased tuition rates. Three schools went up only two or two and a half dollars; however, two went up by fifteen, one by twelve and a half dollars, and one by ten dollars. The largest group (six) were in the middle range of four and a half or five dollars.

The mean average course fee during 1987-88 was \$56.16, while it was projected to be \$59.16 in 1988-89. The mean average grading stipend was \$2.45 per lesson in 1987-88 and \$2.51 in 1988-89. The mean average development stipend was \$662.59 per course in 1987-88 and \$683.70 in 1988-89.

Of the thirty-six schools, only four are increasing high school course development pay. The minimum increase is fifty dollars and the maximum is two hundred seventy. Pay for grading lessons is being increased by six schools; most of the increases are fifty cents or less.



#### NONCREDIT PROGRAMS 1987-88

#### Enrollments

Forty-two of the 72 reporting institutions (58%) indicated that they have noncredit programs (see Table VIII). Total noncredit enrollments in these institutions in 1987-88 was 40,127. This was an increase of 3,623 or 9.9 percent over 1986-87.

Although noncredit courses have the smallest percentage of overall Independent Study enrollments (13.1%), this area has continued to grow significantly (70.8%) in the last two years.

The six largest noncredit programs in the last three years have continued to be Penn State, California State University-Sacramento, University of Wisconsin-Extension, Purdue, University of Florida, and University of California-Extension. Figure 5 shows those 13 institutions which had encollments last year and experienced increases this year.

During 1987-88 five institutions had increases of 50 or more enrollments than in the previous year:

Penn State not only had 34.8 percent of all noncredit enrollments in 1987-88 but also showed the greatest increase. This resulted from the addition of over 130 agricultural noncredit courses to the Independent Study curriculum as well as a significant increase in the on-going automatic sprinkler training course.

It should be noted that four institutions had noncredit enrollments for the first time:



Fluctuations in enrollments are not too surprising when you consider that many of these courses reflect societal, business and health service needs related to professional development, licensing, certification, and recertification. Unlike credit courses which are tied to academic disciplines, noncredit courses may be requested and sponsored by an organization, such as a professional association, or a specific occupational group. For example, University of Wisconsin-Extension has custom made courses for the National Association of Purchasing Management and the National Association of Service Managers who have financially supported the development, production, and promotion of their courses.

Enrollmerts in these courses tend to be high at first. However, if there is not a sustaining membership or client group, once the organizational and/or market needs have been met, enrollments taper off.

#### Course Fees

Enrollment fees for noncredit courses are summarized in Table VIII. The fees have a wide range which undoubtedly reflect their diverse nature. Of the 42 institutions offering noncredit courses, 26 said that the fees they charge are on a per course basis, ranging from \$25-\$302.50 per course. The average course fee for 1988-89 was \$84.73. This was an increase of \$2.81 over 1987-88. Only five institutions raised their course fees from the previour year with the increase ranging from \$2 to \$25 per course.

Eleven of the reporting institutions indicated they had variable fees, and five reported that they based their fees on CEU's with the average course fee at \$32.45 per CEU in 1988-89.

# Course Instructor (Grader) Pay

The most common way for course instructors to be paid is on a per lesson basis. Twenty-six institutions reported determining fees in this way with the average in 1988-89 being \$3.23 per lesson. This was an increase of \$.06 per lesson from 1987-88.



The range in instructor payment is relatively large, varying from \$1.00 to \$5.87 per lesson 1988-89. It was similar in the previous year varying from \$1.00-\$5.50 per lesson.

Three institutions indicated they paid instructors on a per enroll-ment basis which averaged \$23.67 in both 1988-89 and 1987-88.

Individual institutions reported paying a variable per course fee, paying by the CEU and also paying by the hour.

### Course Development Pay

The stipends paid writers (developers) of noncredit courses vary in much the same way as student fees. (See Table VIII.) Twenty-two institutions reported paying course developers on a per course basis which ranged from \$250 to \$1500 per course for 1988-89. The average per course rate was \$581.82. This is an increase of \$9.09 over the previous year which was largely influenced by the University of Florida increase of \$200 per course.

Four institutions indicated that they paid course developers on a CEU basis. The average rate for 1988-89 was \$268.75 which is an increase of \$12.50 per CEU over 1987-88.



PART FIVE

MARKETING METHODS AND COSTS



#### MARKETING/ADVERTISING SURVEY SUMMARY

Independent Study marketing/advertising efforts by the reporting institutions do not summarize easily. Furthe more, there appears to be no past data with which to compare for trends.

Table IX contains a summary of the responses to the survey of marketing/advertising usage, preparation of ads, costs, and sources of funding while the notes following the table provide additional details. Possibly because this survey was new and the information may not have been readily available, several schools with considerable marketing efforts failed to complete this section of the survey form. Therefore, their activities are missing from this summary. Also, many institutions mentioned the use of flyers for marketing, which was not a question on the survey.

Zeros (0) have been placed in Table IX when institutions reported zeros as contrasted with others leaving a similar response blank. Zeros printed in the table affect three summary items (minimum, average, and median), each of which would have been calculated differently if blank instead.

Three-fourths of the schools reporting some promotional efforts in one or more of the following media: newspaper, magazine, radio and TV. As might have been expected print media ads were reported used substantially more often than radio and TV spots. Some items of interest are summarized below.

Local newspaper ads surpassed all other ad forms in usage with over one-third of the schools reporting local newspaper ads compared to one-eighth reporting campus newspaper ads. Only one school used a national newspaper ad while two others used regional newspaper ads. These figures may be somewhat misleading because the Washington Post was reported by one school as a local newspaper. Some church related schools reported using existing and convenient church publications for promotion of their courses/programs.

The number of newspaper ads placed by schools varied notably in both size and quantity and included 1/2 page, 1/3 page, 1/8 page and various dimensions and column inches. One school placed 80 1/3 page student newspaper ads. Two other schools placed 80 two-column ads in local newspapers while another four schools placed over 25 somewhat similar small ads. The reported data indicate that with limited funds available schools were more inclined to spend advertising/marketing funds on less costly and possibly more effective student newspaper ads than on the more costly local or regional newspaper ads.



Over one-half of the total reported  $\underline{\text{magazine}}$  advertising funds (\$65,000 of \$103,240 total) was spent by one institution. While another university expended more per magazine ad than the institution noted above, only three institutions spent \$1,000 or more per magazine ad. Newspaper ads with few exceptions averaged \$500 or less.

Design of Print Ads was most often (16 schools) done totally within the Independent Study department, with an additional five schools doing at least 60% of their ad preparation. Of the ten schools reporting 75% or more ad preparation by "other university" sources, six of these used t is source exclusively. Only two schools reported print ad preparation ex susively by non-university sources, although another three schools used from 25% to 50% preparation of ads by non-university sources. Print ad effectiveness was noted moderately effective to very effective by over 75% of the schools.

Of the nine schools reporting <u>radio/TV spot</u> usage only two schools paid for ad time while the other seven schools reported free spots with all except one of these seven reporting 10 to 30 second spots. This exception used six 1.5 minute radio spots and a one minute TV spot, all at no cost.

The survey also asked institutions to indicate the <u>sources of advertising/marketing funds</u> as from university budget, generated revenue, or other. Responses from the 45 reporting schools indicated that marketing/advertising funds at eight schools were from university sources only while at 34 schools from generated revenue only, and at two schools from other sources only, but "minimal." Only three schools reported marketing/advertising funds from a combination of university budget and generated revenue and in each case 50% or more came from generated revenue.

- UNIVERSITY OF ARIZONA fees range from \$75.00 to \$125.00 per course beginning August, 1988.
- UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA fees range from \$200.00 to \$365.00 for 1987-88; \$220.00 to \$385.00 per course for 1988-89.
- UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA noncredit courses are handled by departments at the Georgia Center for continuing education other than the University System of Georgia Independent Study Off.ce.
- UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA fees range from \$45.00 to \$120.00 per course for 1987-88; \$50.00 to \$125.00 per course for 1988-89.

# % OF FACULTY PAID WITH OUTSIDE FUNDS

UNIVERSITY OF WYONING - 100% of their instructors are paid by funds originating outside the I.S. department, as their budget is state funded.

### **GRADING COMPENSATION**

- colorado state university faculty members receive 40% of tuition
  for grading and development.
- **HONE STUDY INTERNATIONAL** stipend varies from a minimum amount of \$1.00 to a maximum amount of \$1.70.
- INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY fees range from \$40.00 to \$50.00 per enrollment.
- **PURDUE UNIVERSITY** faculty grading is included in their regular workload.
- UNIVERSITY OF ARIZONA stipend varies from \$50.00 to \$60.00 per enrollment for 1988-89.



- UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA stipend varies from a minimum of \$3.80 to a maximum of \$35.00.
- UNIVERSITY OF NISSOURI stipend is \$2.80 per lesson if returned after 5 working days, or \$3.00 if returned before for 1987-88; \$2.80 per lesson if returned after 5 working days, and \$3.20 if returned before for 1988-89.
- UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA stipend varies from \$2.25 minimum to \$8.75 maximum per lesson for 1987-88, and from \$2.25 minimum to \$9.50 per lesson for 1988-89.
- UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON all high school and noncredit courses are in Math and are graded by instructor on salary.
- UNIVERSITY OF WYOMING the instructors are paid at the rate of \$2
   per lesson. For fast service, three days or less, they are paid
  \$4 per lesson.

## DEVELOPMENT COMPENSATION

- **COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY** faculty members receives 40% of tuition for grading and development.
- INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY stipend varies from \$100.00 to \$500.00
  (courses are seldom developed).
- UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO stipend varies from \$300.00 to \$400.00 per CEU.
- UNIVERSITY OF MISSOURI a stipend of \$300.00 is paid for instructor scored courses and \$450.00 per CEU for computer scored courses for 1987-88; \$350.00 is paid for instructor scored courses and \$525.00 per CEU for computer scored courses for 1988-89.
- UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA (RENO) stipend varies from \$150.00 to \$200.00
  per CEU.
- UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON course development is done by salaried
  instructors.
- UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN-EXTENSION stipend varies from \$600.00 to \$2100.00 per course.

## SOURCE OF BUDGET

- **AUBURN UNIVERSITY** marketing consists mainly of newsletter ads, bulletins, and directed mail. Very low key effort.
- **NORTH DAKO: INDEPENDENT STUDY** a minimum percentage is obtained from a State General Fund.
- UNIVERSITY OF ARIZONA will start advertising this fiscal 88/89.
- UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA independent study courses are not marketed outside the University System of Georgia. Within the University System, information is included in college/university catalogs.
- UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS the only marketing is via catalog and NUCEA Guides.
- UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS (AUSTIN) marketing consists of catalogs, brochures, and newsletters mostly direct mail.
- UNIV'RSITY OF WISCONSIN-EXTENSION at this point in time, Independent Study has not been advertising. Any work with the media would be in the form of free publicity through the daily and weekly papers in Wisconsin. If any advertising is done, it is initiated and paid for by the academic department.
- UNIVERSITY OF WYOMING there were no paid advertisements this year (87/88).
- UTAH STATE UNIVERSITY to date, advertising has been limited to brochures, catalogs, and posters. During the 1988-89 fiscal year we articipate an advertising campaign that will include radio, local tv, newspapers, posters, catalogs, and displays.
- **WESTERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY** if advertising was utilized, the funds would come from the university budget.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTH DAKOTA - advertisements are run in the Dakota Student.



# LOCAL NEWSPAPER(S)

UNIVERSITY OF NORTH DAKOTA - advertisements are run in the Grand Forks Herald.

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO - 1/2 page is the average size ad.

UNIVERSITY OF KANSAS - average ad sizes are 3x5, and 7x9.

UNIVERSITY OF UTAH - average size ad is 2 columns x 6 columns.

# MAGAZINE(S)

**EASTERN OREGON STATE COLLEGE** - courses are offered prior to each term in a course catalog that is specially designed by their division and sent to all students that have taken an independent study course within a year.

OHIO UNIVERSITY - average size ranges from 1/6 of a page for the Ohio Teacher to a full page for Pace Magazine.

UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA - 2½ x 3" for Writer's Digest.

## TRADE JOURNAL(S)

INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY - free ads are placed in two journals for non credit courses, one in the American Food Service Journal, the other is in a waste water treatment publication.

### PRINT ADS PREPARED BY

**EASTERN MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY** - the only advertisement(s) is the Continuing Education Bulletin/class schedules.

**NICHIGAN STATE UNIVERSITY** - direct mail brochures are utilized which are self-funded and self-generated.

# PRINT AD EFFECTIVENESS

TEXAS TECH UNIVERSITY - although the paid advertising mentioned in this survey has not been successful, a variety of other techniques are used which more effectively market their program. On the high school level, the Independent Study Unit mails a quarterly newsletter to counselors and guidance counselor supervisors. The upbeat tone of the newsletter gives counselors a feeling of warmth toward the program. Also, exhibit booths are sponsored at selected national and regional conferences to increase awareness of their programs and services.



# RADIO/TELEVISION

UNIVERSITY OF KANSAS - most of the radio/tv promotionals are PSA's.

## BROADCAST PREPARED BY

TEXAS TECH UNIVERSITY - articles which are included at no cost in professional and trade journal/magazines are distributed. Oncampus recruitment is maintained by posting flyers, on-campus catalog distribution, and displays set up for selected times. The Independent Study Unit also works closely with the Office of New Student Relations, whose staff carries Independent Study catalogs to virtually every high school in Texas.

# TOTAL COST OF ADS

- colorado state university the total annual cost for state/local newspaper ads is \$600.00. Most promotions are done through direct mail of consortium (Colorado Bulletin) and individual course brochures to targeted user groups annual budget is approximately \$18,000.
- **SAVANNAH STATE COLLEGE** is currently in the process of upgrading fees, revising some of the courses, and doing a major marketing effort.
- UNIVERSITY OF NORTH DAKOTA most advertising is done through direct
   mail to lists of names generated by the department, or general
   university.
- **WEBER STATE COLLEGE** the Independent Study Department pays 15% of state/local newspaper advertisements.

# AVERAGE COST OF ADS

- **EASTERN OREGON STATE COLLEGE** the average cost of magazine advertisement(s) is equal to \$562 per term.
- UNIVERSITY OF NORTH DAKOTA most advertising is done through direct mail to lists of names generated by the department, or general university.
