#### ABSTRACT

IDENTIFIERS

This databook provides tables, charts, and graphs illustrating trends in enrollments, credit instruction and degrees awarded, continuing education, faculty, and finances at Howard Community College (HCC) in Maryland. Part 1 examines changes in enrollments and student characteristics over the past 5 to 10 years. Enrollment data are broken down by full-/part-time status, day/evening registration, minority group status, gender, age, average credit hour load, and residence. In addition, survey findings are presented concerning students' goals and reasons for selecting HCC. Part 2 focuses on credit instruction and degree programs, including data on enrollment by program type, cooperative education, programs projected for fall 1990 to fall 1994, and degrees and other formal awards granted in 1988. Survey findings are presented on students' perceptions of the quality of HCC, graduates' goal achievement, and employers' ratings of HCC graduates. After part 3 presents information on continuing education sites and enrollments, part 4 offers faculty data, including trends in ratios of full- to part-time faculty and student credit hours taken to faculty credit hours taught, and 1989 salary ranges. Finally, part 5 looks at the community's use of HCC facilities and part 6 provides data on the college's proposed operating budget for 1990, scurces of revenue, projected changes in revenue sources, unmet needs for student financial aid, and tuition. 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

## UNDUPLICATED HEADCOUNT ENROLLMENT CREDIT AND CREDIT-FREE BY FISCAL YEAR



FISCAL YEAR 1980 TO FISCAL YEAR 1989




### TOTAL FTE ENROLLMENTS AND PROJECTIONS FISCAL YEAR 1983 TO FISCAL YEAR 1993










### CHART 10 ENROLLMENT BY AGE GROUP



ALL STUDENTS PART-TIME FULL-TIME STUDENTS STUDENTS .....






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### ENROLLMENT\* BY RESIDENCE




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### REASONS FOR SELECTING HCC RATING BY FY87 RESPONDENTS TO FOLLOW-UP SURVEY












# QUALITY OF INSTRUCTION RATING BY RESPONDENTS TO FOLLOW-UP SURVEY







# PART THREE CONTINUING EDUCATION



#### OFFICE OF CONTINUING EDUCATION

#### HOWARD COMMUNITY COLLEGE

The next three tables refer to continuing education which includes the following four areas:

#### I. LIFELONG LEARNING

Offers lifelong learning opportunities through courses designed to address the personal and professional needs of Howard County adults. Courses are held at HCC, in various public schools and in learning centers throughout Howard County. Content ranges from career alternatives and vocational/technical development through historical/cultural explorations and languages to personal development. New options include International Education and a Weekend College featuring credit and credit-free courses.

#### II. BASIC SKILLS/FOREIGN-BORN PROGRAMMING

Offers free or low-cost classes to Howard County adults (16 years or older) which emphasize reading, mathematics, social and communication skills. Special classes (English as a Second Language) are available for foreign-born individuals who wish to improve vernacular English.

#### III. CAREER PROGRAMS AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT


This continuing education area includes credit-free courses for real estate, police, nurses, allied health and food service personnel, seniors, professional updates, initial licensure and certification, plus health concerns of the general public. Continuing Education Units (CEU's) are provided or those who need them to maintain a license or employment. Cosponsorship and course development with institutions, organizations and agencies are expanding areas of growth.

#### IV. BUSINESS AND INDUSTRY

The Office of Business and Industry designs and offers courses -- both credit and credit-free for the businesses in Howard County. Courses for specific businesses are scheduled at sites and times convenient to their employees, and instructors tailor content to fit corporate needs. In addition, the office co-sponsors the Small Business Training Center with the Chamber of Commerce, offers one-day sessions, and also conducts a series of high technology short courses. A "Schedule of Courses for Business and Industry," distributed to all businesses in the county twice a year, describes these as well as the current business topics also taught through this office.









# SOURCES OF REVENUE FISCAL YEARS 1985-1989 OPERATING BUDGET



## SOURCES OF REVENUE FISCAL YEARS 1985-1989 CONTINUING EDUCATION BUDGET



OPERATING AND CONTINUING EDUCATION BUDGET



## PROJECTED CHANGES IN REVENUE SOURCES BASED ON CURRENT TRENDS - OPERATING BUDGET ONLY






