ABSTRACT

The results of a national survey concerning the enrollment of limited-English-proficient (LEP) students in elementary, secondary, adult basic, and adult secondary education are presented and summarized. Data are drawn from information provided by chief state school officers, federal agencies, and individual respondents to the survey. The study is divided into two main parts. The first section provides a narrative summary of the survey and includes tables with select comparisons and estimates of students who are not reported as limited English proficient. The second section consists of two tabular summaries of the data base assembled: Reported Enrollments 1985-88; and State Profiles. The Reported Enrollments show K-12 enrollments of LEP students; K-12 estimates of limited-English-functioning students (language minority students who have some proficiency but not enough to benefit from English-only instruction); adult enrollments; and reported school enrollments (total and subcategories of LEP). The State Profiles show programs and funding, identification criteria, and primary languages identified by "speakers of languages other than English." (MSE)

Dear Educator,

This is a summary of the LEP Student Enrollment Survey results received in response to my November 28, 1988 request for information and the January 31, 1989 request for verification of data recorded. The data in this report have been updated and are current as of May 1, 1989

This report is being mailed to each Chief State School Officer and to each respondent who contributed to the survey. In addition, the report is being provided to the ERIC Clearinghouse on Languages and Linguistics. Please also note that permission is given to duplicate and distribute this report.

The purpose of this report is to share the data collected and to stimulate discussion, not to highlight many specific enrollment statistics or comparisons. Generalizations from these data are difficult because identification criteria and reporting procedures are not uniform throughout the nation and they may have changed within a certain State from one year to the next. For example, many States report more adult students who are limited English proficient (LEP) than are reported in their K-12 schools. California reported 866,916 LEP adults 1985-86 and 567,564 K-12 LEP students. But changes in reporting procedures makes the subsequent data non-equivalent, so comparisons must be cautious.

This report is in two main parts. The first section is largely a narrative summary including tables with select comparisons and estimates of students who are not reported as identified limited English proficient.

The second section consists of two tabular summaries of the data base assembled: Reported Enrollments 1985-88 (Table Five) and State Profiles (Table Six). The Reported Enrollments show year by year each State's K-12 and adult education enrollments as well as the reported enrollments of identified limited English proficient students. These data constitute the core of the hard data collected. The State Profiles show additional survey information collected: program types, funding sources, identification criteria used, and primary languages identified by "speakers of languages other than English (SLOTE)." Some of these data are not summarized in Tables One through Five because they are qualitative or because there are not equivalent statistics among all the States.

I want to thank everyone who contributed so graciously and, in so many cases, so completely to this survey.

I am reminded of a saying we sometimes hear in California, that "We treasure what we measure." It is obvious that education and our special populations are highly valued throughout America!

## Report of the Limited English (LEP) Student Enrollment Survey

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This is a summary of the LEP Student Enrollment Survey results received in response to a November 1988 request for information and a January 1989 request for verification of data recorded. These data are updated as of May 1, 1989

National enrollments of limited English proficient (LEP) students have not been organized and reported since 1987 when enrollments for school year 1985-86 were reported by the General Accounting Office (GAO) in April and by the Office of Bilingual Education and Minority Languages Affairs (OBLEMA) in Summer 1987. This survey was undertaken to obtain more recent enrollment data.

This report contains national enrollments for school years 1985-86 and 1986-87 and contains many enrollments for school year 1987-88. This report also contains comparisons and estimates of students who may need specialized instruction but who are not reported as identified limited English proficient.

**Data Collection.** The Survey was mailed to each Chief State School Officer in November 1988. In addition, information was obtained from several alternate sources including the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES), the Division of Adult Education, OBLEMA, and individuals in various States known to the surveyor. 94 Surveys were mailed. Surveys were returned for 40 States.

**Data Verification.** An interim report was mailed in January to each respondent and to each Chief State School Officer with the request that the data recorded be inspected for accuracy and completeness. Triangulation was supplemented by telephone and specific written requests December through March. Additional data and revisions were received through March 15, 1989.

**Results.** The primary data collected are compiled and reported in Tables Five and Six. Reported Enrollments 1985 to 1988 (Table Five) includes percentage increase or decrease by state for school years 1985-86 to 1987-88 for K-12, Adult, and K-12 plus Adult LEP student enrollments (Page four of Table Five). The State Profiles (Table Six) show enrollments as well as additional information collected for

each State: program types, funding sources, identification criteria used, and primary languages identified by "speakers of languages other than English (SLOTE)."

Complete survey information was not obtained for every State. Very few states provided any data for 1988-9. Many states provided total LEP student enrollments but not K-8 and 9-12 LEP student enrollments. Most states reported *types* of criteria used to identify LEP students or *methods* used to collect statistics (such as survey, statewide census, special projects reports) rather than specific performance standards. The listing of "speakers of languages other than English (SLOTE)" reflects in many cases only the fifteen most numerous primary languages in a given state. Moreover, many states are continuing to revise their data, so their survey data differ from published Education Department summaries.

Department of Education data were received January 1989 and those totals are recorded in Table Five. In cases where State survey data differ from the Department of Education data, the State's data were used and are identified with an "R."

**Examination of Results and Discussion.** The data were examined and are discussed in the following sequence of topics:

- Adult Enrollments
- Reported Enrollments
- State Profiles

  - Identification Criteria
  - Primary Languages
- Conclusions

**K-12 Enrollments.** According to survey responses, total reported enrollment of identified LEP students in the nation's public schools, K-12, increased from 1,460,042 in school year 1985-6 to 1,533,520 in 1986-87. This is a 5% increase and compares with a 5.6% increase according to data previously reported to OBLEMA. Impacted states such as California report 14.5 percent of total enrollment 1987-8 as identified LEP, or more than 1 in 7 of students overall. This means that on average a

class of 35 will contain at least five LEP learners.

The total reported LEP student enrollment understates the actual number of students identified as LEP in the nation's schools. There are several reasons for this. First, not all States reported. Second, two report that they do not maintain LEP student enrollment statistics. Third, many States do not conduct an annual statewide census of language minority students so their data are based on other methods of collecting statistics such as survey responses from cooperating districts. Not all surveyed districts respond and not all responding districts respond fully. Also, some States only report as LEP those students enrolled in certain designated programs so their statistics understate actual populations in need of specialized instruction. South Carolina for example only reports students served by the Transition Program for Refugee Children. Florida relies on computerized attendance records keyed to certain designated course codes and thus omits LEP students in pull-out or other programs not keyed into the ADA accounting system. In addition, some students who are limited English proficient may not have been identified.

30 states reported public school LEP student enrollments for school year 1987-8. These 30 states show an increase of 7.1% in LEP student enrollment since 1985-6 (Table One) while their total K-12 enrollments declined by 1/4 % over the same period. (National enrollment declined 1.3% according to Education Department figures updated as of 9/2/88.) Expressed as a percentage of total enrollment, LEP student enrollment increased from 4.4% of total public school enrollment during 1985-6 to 4.7% during 1987-8, or more than one student of every 21 nationwide. However, these states account for only 53% of total national and 63% of LEP enrollments during 85-6.

Explanations for this growth could be investigated and might include: inter-state migration, immigration, increased numbers of LEP children becoming of school age and entering rather than are exiting schooling, or changed identification criteria and procedures. The data in this survey do not indicate ethnicity or how many of these learners are immigrants,

refugee children, or how many may have been born in the USA.

**K-12 Estimates.** Estimates of limited English *functioning* (LEF) learners are reported in Table Two, comprising a *de facto* suggestion that some definitions of limited English *proficient* may be too restrictive; that is, language minority or non-English speaking persons may not be the only ones whose functioning in English is so limited as to prevent them from benefiting from traditional English-only instruction. Five States provided estimates of LEF students in addition to their reported identified LEP student enrollments. Table Two shows these states' reported identified LEP student enrollment for 1985-6 with their estimated LEF student population in 87-8: 3.68% LEP in 85-6 and 22.5% LEF in 87-8.

The concept of limited English *functioning* may be important for other reasons, too. First, several States define LEP to include only students who are profoundly or severely limited. One State for example defines LEP as the old "Lau Categories A and B," excluding "Lau Category C" students from specialized instruction for LEP students. Second, many States use a percentile cutoff on a standardized test to determine eligibility for specialized services. It is perplexing that a 22nd or a 39th percentile performance standard can be considered unacceptable for non-native speakers but not for native English speakers. The concept limited English *functioning* is not tied to these definitional limitations.

**Adult Enrollments.** The number of LEP adult learners is 879,749 for school year 1986-7, or *nearly one in every three adults* taking classes in adult basic education or ABE, at grades levels 8 and lower, or adult secondary education or ASE, at grade levels 9-12. Excluding California, which changed its reporting procedure in 1986-7, adult LEP enrollment increased 11.9% (Table Three).

9 States reported 87-88 adult enrollments (Table 4A). Adult LEP students account for 53% total reported ABE and ASE enrollment. These states account for 41% total national ABE plus ASE enrollment during 1985-86.

Many adults receive education services outside the funding - and reporting - parameters of the

U.S. Department of Education. For example, up to 1.7 million legalization applicants ("amnesty" students) under Section 245 of the Immigration Reform and Control Act (IRCA) of 1986 may receive Phase Two services funded through the Department of Health and Human Services. These plus an additional one million who applied under Section 210 are becoming through the legalization process legally eligible for public education services. 70% of these 2.7 million IRCA applicants are reported to speak "little or no English" (Olsen, 88). California reports 350,000 students in classes March 1989 and 1.7 million total if classes were offered (Education Week, 89). Texas reports 75,000 IRCA enrolled students in need of English as a second language instruction and an additional 425,000 waiting for classes. Table Four - B summarizes the possible impact beyond Phase Two on adult education nationwide. Note the percentage LEP of all increases by combining K-12 with Adult, from 3.69% or one in 27.1 to 5.53% or one in 18.1 and nearly triples after including possible IRCA legalized adult students, increasing to 9.28% or *almost one student in every ten nationwide*.

**Reported Enrollments.** Table Five contains reported enrollments for each state for school years 1985-86, 1986-87 and 1987-88: K-8, 9-12, and total K-12 public school enrollment; ABE, ASE and total adult education enrollment; K-8, 9-12 and total public school limited English proficient student enrollment; limited English proficient adult enrollment; and total K-12 plus adult LEP student enrollment.

Several states have revised their enrollment data so their Survey results differ from published federal summary reports. For example, total K-12 enrollment according to survey data is 40.2 million for 85-86 but 39.5 million according to published Education Department summaries. This is partly because federal procedures discourage revision after a two year period and partly because some statistics are treated differently by some states. For example, a March 1987 statistic may appear as part of that state's 1986-87 survey data but as 87-88 data in federal publications. Also, some populations may have been included for 1985-86 but excluded subsequently, such as adult citizenship and handicapped enrollment. A fourth possible reason is that this private survey may not have received the same attention as an

Official Document. In cases where State survey data differ from the Department of Education data, the State's data were used and are identified with an "R."

**State Profiles.** The State Profiles (Table Six) show enrollment data obtained for four school years, beginning with 1985-86 for each State. Thus it is possible to examine and compare specific enrollment statistics for up to four years.

Some statistics are identified as estimates and are in italics.

LEP Student Percent and LEP to All Student (1 in X) ratios are shown for each year in each State. These ratios are given separately for K-12, adult, and K-12 plus adult.

**Programs / Funding.** Programs and Funding are described in the State Profiles (Table Six). LEP students served through various funding sources such as Title VII, Transition Program for Refugee Children, etc., are shown as reported by the States. These data are incomplete and duplicated enrollments may be reported, so comparisons between states have not been computed.

Many States provided year-by-year enrollments according to type of program, such as "transitional bilingual education," "developmental bilingual education," "English as a Second language (ESL)," and "Sheltered English."

**Identification Criteria.** Identification criteria for 36 States are described in the State Profiles. Some descriptions are taken from the Title VII State Summaries Report for school year 1985-86 and are so identified. These are qualitative data and therefore are not extensively analyzed with statistical procedures.

Most states reported *types* of criteria or *methods* used to gather statistics rather than specific performance standards.

16 states report using more than one method. 7 States report not having any uniform statewide criteria or procedures. And 7 States provided their definitions of LEP students.

7 States cite specific performance standards such as "below the 40th percentile" on a

specified assessment instrument. 2 States report "identification is a local option." One State reports that "44% of the districts reporting in 1988 reported no means of identifying LEP students."

There is considerable diversity in the area of identification criteria. The definition of limited English proficient is not uniform in all the States so a student who is identified as LEP in one State might not meet another State's definition. Some States may define LEP to include only students who are profoundly or severely limited such as excluding "Lau Category C" students from specialized instruction for LEP students. Also, many States use a percentile cutoff on a standardized test. The percentile reference points are not all the same and some tests referenced are achievement tests while others are language proficiency assessments. As stated above, it is perplexing that a 22nd or a 39th percentile performance standard can be considered unacceptable for non-native speakers but not for native English speakers.

Diversity also describes the methods States use to collect statistics. Not all States conduct an annual "home language" census or survey of all students so other procedures are often used to collect LEP student enrollment statistics.

Some States rely on special projects records, such as those who only report certain categorical enrollments, while others report results from questionnaires that may not have been completed by all districts within the state. Two examples of states using special projects records are South Carolina and Florida. South Carolina only reports students served by the Transition Program for Refugee Children. Florida uses computerized attendance records keyed to certain designated course codes and thus does not count LEP students in pull-out or other programs not keyed into the ADA accounting system. An example of the questionnaire or survey method is Minnesota, whose data are based on districts completing the survey by a certain date. Also, some States do not have or do not report LEP student enrollment data. NC and WV report that they do not collect LEP student enrollment data, so the statistics collected in this survey and other surveys must understate the actual number of LEP students nationwide. AL, AR, and PA submitted no data at all.

The data obtained in this survey support the conclusion that uniform identification criteria or reporting procedures do not exist nationwide.

**Primary Languages.** States were asked to report the primary languages of their identified LEP students. These are recorded in the State Profiles but are not analyzed in detail because they are non-equivalent statistics among the states. Not all states listed their "speakers of languages other than English (SLOTE)." Several states only listed the most numerous primary languages. Some states included all multi-lingual children, not only those who are identified LEP. 57 languages or language groups are listed in the State Profiles but this does not include all languages reported.

**Conclusions.** Overall, these survey data support two conclusions. These conclusions are not necessarily new or novel but they are supported by the data collected.

The first conclusion is that there are a lot of students enrolled in the nation's schools who are reported to be limited English proficient (LEP) and there may be three to six times as many who are in need of specialized instruction as are reported to be identified LEP in the nation's K-12 schools.

Reported enrollment of identified LEP students is approximately 3.6% of total K-12 enrollment, or 1.5 million students. However, combined with adults enrolled in high school diploma completion and preparation programs (Adult Secondary Education or ASE at grade levels 9-12 and Adult Basic Education or ABE at grade levels 8 and lower), the overall ratio increases to 5.3%. This means that more than one of every nineteen persons nationwide who are in high school completion and preparation programs has been identified and reported as limited English proficient. Preliminary figures for Winter 1988-89 indicate that adult enrollments have increased so that more than nine percent of all students nationwide, K-12 plus adult, who are enrolled at the high school level or below may be limited English proficient (Table 4-B).

The estimates of K-12 limited English *functioning* students, described and reported in Table Two, suggest that 22.5%, or more than one student in every five, *may* be limited English functioning

in certain States. This ratio is six times larger than for reported LEP student enrollments K-12 nationwide.

The second conclusion is that there is considerable variation in identification criteria as well as in reporting procedures used by the States, so the term "limited English proficient" does not have uniform significance nationwide. The number of reported LEP students understates the number of students in the nation who are not fluent in English. In other words, 5.3% are known to be LEP but the remaining 94.7% are not all fully functioning in English.

In addition to these stated conclusions, this survey elicited additional important information.

First, I have learned that considerable data are collected by the States and by the Education Department but this information is not organized and reported widely. For example, the Title VII Summary of State Reports on the Limited English Proficient Student Population that is organized for the Office of Bilingual Education and Minority Languages Affairs (OBEMLA) contains much useful information particularly about the nature of programs serving identified LEP students in public schools and in many cases, information about the schooling success of LEP students served. This document has been produced for school years 1985-6 and 1986-7 and is in process for school year 1987-8. It would be useful to have this report disseminated more widely.

Second, I have learned that complete and accurate information is difficult to obtain from all the States in a short period of time.
