#### ABSTRACT

Database documentation is provided for a data file containing survey statistics on students graduating during the 1983-84 academic year from colleges and universities in the continental United States, with particular emphasis on students who were newly qualified to teach. The 39-item questionnaire focused on respondents' educational and occupational backgrounds. The sample of schools was chosen from the 1981-82 Higher Education General Information Survey (HEGIS) tape, and includes 404 collages and universities. From these schools, 18,000 students were selected. Variables include: language abilities; marital status; grade-level taught; and student financial aid arrangements. A field-by-field description of the data, samples of the record layout, and descriptions of the data elements are provided. The 1985 Survey of 1983-84 College Graduates Questionnaire; a list of major fields and subspecialty codes; a numerical index of major groups, industry groups, and industry codes; an outline of the occupational classification scheme; an occupation recode list; major field recodes; and frequency counts of selected data variables are included. ### User Notes

ne following notes describe some items or codes not covered in Part IV f this document:

- 1. The code "0" was coded to mean "not applicable" or "legitimate skip" for all items on pages 3 thru 42 of part IV. If a field is 2 positions them a "00" was coded. If a field was an amount field (ex. \$\$\$) a "0" was coded and right justified. The term "not applicable" or "legitimate skip" apply to respondents who do not have to answer certain questions. For example a respondent who answered "2" not employed to question 13 does not answer questions 14 thru 23 and thus will have zeros coded.
- 2. For all questions of the type "circle or check all that apply" a "0" or "00" is coded to mean "NO". For example question 8c data field name q8c1 on page 7, a "0" would mean "no, not a home language". Question 24c, 25, 31, 35a, 35d, and 38 are of the same type.
- 3. On pages 43 thru 49 are the imputation flag variables. A "1" is coded to mean record was imputed for this item and a "blank" means this item was not imputed.
- 4. On page 49 data element ptft85 = "@" means "not working".
- 5. To get the salary of a record use the computed salary found on page 50 and "do not use" question 17 items q17pr and q17dd to compute salary.
