ABSTRACT

As part of the strategic planning efforts of the San Francisco Community College District (SFCCD), the student population of the City College of San Francisco (CCSF) and day and evening students attending the District's Community College Centers (CCC) were surveyed. The survey solicited information on students' major, sex, age, race, citizenship, veteran status, transportation, residence, highest degree obtained, college choice, educational goal, course load, previous CCSF attendance, educational plans, employment status, intended use of student services, rating of instruction, and family income. Of the 59,293 students enrolled in the SFCCD in fall 1988, 25,657 were enrolled in credit programs at CCSF and 33,636 were enrolled in non-credit courses and programs at CCC. Study findings about these students included the following: (1) for every 100 male students in the SFCCD, there were about 135 female students; (2) 4.8% of the students identified themselves as gay or lesbian; (3) the typical district student was 30 years old, with 57% between the ages of 21 and 44; (4) 73% of the students were members of an ethnic minority, including 30.7% Chinese, 16.5% Hispanic, and 8.2% Black; (5) 12.2% of the students already had a baccalaureate degree or higher, and an additional 7.1% had a community college degree; (6) 21.1% listed transferring to a four-year school as an educational goal, while 17.7 wanted to learn or improve their English language skills and 20.2% attended out of personal interest; (7) 36% worked full-time; (8) the median household income was \$13,300, and 25% of all district students had household incomes of less than \$5,000; and (9) program planning, job placement, and career counseling were the most desired student services, though one in three CCC students did not feel that they needed any special student services. The survey instrument is included. (WJT)

Introduction

In Fall 1988 the San Francisco Community College District enrolled almost 60,000 students. At City College of San Francisco 25,657 students were enrolled in credit programs, and at the Community College Centers 33,636 were enrolled in non-credit courses and programs. In order to meet the needs of these students, as well as potential students in the San Francisco population, we must know who they are, their backgrounds and their aspirations. As part of our effort in strategic planning for the District, the Student Information Questionnaire, or S.I.Q., has been the primary tool used for information about our students since 1972.

This document summarizes the District's ninth biennial S.I.Q. study which incorporates data about our student body demonstrating their great diversity. It presents the changes over the years and thus emphasizes the need for flexibility in our program and service offerings. The College and Centers each follow a program review cycle in which all programs are reviewed for program quality and their effectiveness in meeting needs of current and potential students. The faculty and staff must remain responsive to changing student demographics and even to anticipate changes. We trust the reader will find this S.I.Q. summary report useful both in understanding the present student body and in planning to meet their needs. In our search for understanding, we move closer to our goal of excellence.

By 1972 the importance of knowing about our students, their backgrounds and their goals was recognized, both to better meet their educational and related service needs and to plan for changes in numbers and characteristics of our student body. At the same time, we were inundated with requests from the legislature and other public bodies for more information about our institution. More hard facts were needed than were available. Because students in the non-credit programs enrolled in each class and only individual manual records were maintained, summary information about our non-credit student population could not be readily obtained. We, therefore, initiated the S.I.Q. (Student Information Questionnaire) in Fall 1972 at the Adult/Occupational Division, the forerunner of the Community College Centers Division.

Although the student enrollment process at City College provided more student data in computer files, only some of it could readily be drawn off in a useful form for analytic purposes and other desired elements were not at all available. Therefore, in 1976 the S.I.Q. was undertaken at City College and it has been conducted biennially in each division since then. The reader should be aware that the Community College Centers administers all the non-credit courses and all the credit programs are offered in City College.

The process used in 1988 was an updated version of the one initiated in 1972. Although we now have a more timely and complex student enrollment module in our computer system, the S.I.Q. process is still needed. The automated enrollment system, for the most part, does not include the S.I.Q. questions; as S.I.Q. responses are anonymous, we can ask for information which might not be appropriate in a student-identified file. We are pleased with the S.I.Q. process, time consuming that it is, although we recognize that a significant drawback with anonymous questionnaires is the inability to do any student follow-up, for example, how a particular student's education objectives have changed or how they have been met. The 1988 Questionnaire for City College recognizes additional needs identified during the matriculation process. To accommodate those changes, City College gave up the programmatic information incorporated in the 1986 S.I.Q. process. The Community College Centers Division continues with programmatic data, making it even more useful for program review activities.

Different questionnaires and survey processes were used at the Community College Centers Division and at City College. Where possible, the questions were the same on both the College and Centers questionnaire forms, in particular the basic demographic questions, although the sequence has changed. But, other questions either were reworded to be division-specific or designed to fit a specific divisional need. Insofar as possible, questions were kept constant from year to year to provide the capability for trend analysis; but when deemed important, a new one was added and, perhaps, an old one dropped.

This 1988 S.I.Q. is being presented in several parts. This report is the overall introduction and presents summary data for the District and its two operating divisions, City College of San Francisco and the Community College Centers. The questionnaires for the Centers and City College are shown on pages 9-12. On page 13-19, the 1988 S.I.Q. results have been applied to 1988 Fall enrollment figures to present a complete summary of the demographics and characteristics of District students. This is followed on pages 20-34 by the data from 1972 through 1988 showing historical trends for the Centers Division and separately for Day and Evening Divisions of City College. The last table presents the 1988 survey results for each of the Centers in the Centers Division and are shown on pages 35-41.

Subsequent reports will be released by each of the divisions with more indepth analysis of the students in their respective divisions, for 1988 and historically. A separate volume of selected computer runs for each division is being produced for those who are interested in the individual questionnaire responses aggregated by various groups and subgroups. The complete set of all S.I.Q. computer runs are available separately for the Centers and each Center, as well as for the College day and evening divisions. Overview Profile of District Students

The official Fall 1988 enrollment figure for day students at City College was 16,555 and evening division enrollment was 9,102, resulting in a total enrollment at City College of 25,657. There were 33,636 students registered in the Centers Division, day and evening which resulted in a Districtwide student body of 59,293. During the year we serve many more persons because of the following factors:

1. New students enroll, not only at the start of each semester but all during the year, in short courses and in non-credit classes with open enrollment.
2. Students may drop out before Census week and are, therefore, not included in the Census week count.
3. Students in community service and contract education courses, for which state apportionment is not earned, are excluded from these enrollment total.

The enrollment count also is not indicative of WSCH (Weekly Student Contact Hours) or ADA (Average Daily Attendance) because it does not reflect full-time versus part-time enrollment or varied student loads. Nevertheless, the number of students we serve at a given time, Census week, is an indicator of the magnitude of our educational programs and services and useful for trend analyses. As point of reference, our 1988-89 ADA was 31,773. This section describes the characteristics of San Francisco Community College District students attending in Fall 1988.

In 1980, U.S. Census data pegged San Francisco's population at 678,974 persons. The California Department of Finance has now estimated San Francisco population to be increasing, now above the 1970 population of 714,000. On a statewide basis the population increase could be attributed to births entirely. Deaths offset the net in-migration. Although the new population estimate might result in a slightly different demographic mix than reported in 1980 Census release, such figures are not available. The next S.I.Q. planned for 1990 will show more clearly the relationship of SFCCD and the City of San Francisco.

We know about our students from our S.I.Q. (Student Information Questionnaire). For a District review, the S.I.Q. percentage distributions day and evening divisions at City College and all students at the Centers, were applied to the official enrollment counts given above and then totaled. That data is presented in the chart on pages 13-19.

In Fall 1988, for each one hundred male students in the District, there are about 135 female students. There is a higher ratio of women in both the Centers Division and City College in the evening. City College day students are more nearly equally distributed, yet women are predominant. This compares with a 50:50 split in the San Francisco population over 18 as recorded in the 1980 Census. An estimated 2,800 students declare themselves to be either gay men or lesbians, or almost 5% of the student population. They include 1,758 gay men and 1,041 lesbians. In the College evening program about 11% of all students identified themselves as gay men or lesbians.

The typical San Francisco Community College District student is 30 years old and 57% are in the prime career development years of 21-44. College students attending in the daytime are younger with a median age of 21; the median at the Centers is 37. About 45% of College day students are twenty or younger, emphasizing that the traditional college day student, the recent high school graduate 17 through 20 years old, although no longer the dominant cohort, remains a significant segment of City College. Almost one in four City College day students are 21 through 24 years old and another one in five are 25 through 34 years old with only 11% 35 or older. About 83% of the evening students at City College are in their prime career advancement years of 21 through 44 with about 6% younger and 11% older. Centers students are more evenly distributed among all age groups. Nevertheless, 54% are between 21 and 44. About one of five are between 45 and 64 and some 18% are 65 or older compared to 1% of College students.

Some 73% of our students are members of an ethnic minority, a significantly higher proportion than the approximately 50% in the San Francisco population. The ethnic composition of the student body varies significantly between City College and the Centers and then further among day and evening classes at the College.

SFCCD serves a larger proportion of Chinese students than one would expect from the San Francisco population mix particularly in the Centers and in the day division of City College. Blacks are about 8% of the student population in each division, compared to 12% of San Franciscans. Hispanics account for about 16% of District students, compared to about 12% of the San Francisco population. Language may explain these differences. The ethnic composition is shown in table following:

The primary language spoken at home is very closely related to ethnicity. Table following shows the distribution of ethnicity compared to their probable language spoken at home.

It can be deduced that although some of the Hispanics and Asians speak English at home, most speak another language. In San Francisco according to the 1980 Census, 198,000 or 35% of persons 18 years and over spoke a language other than English at home, and of these, 51,800 or 26% did not speak English well or at all. They are potential ESL students, a large group of whom we are now serving.

About 43% of District students use public transit, or about 25,450 students. These students may attend classes from one to five days a week. If one assumes that on average the typical student attends classes three days a week, then these 25,450 students contribute almost \$130,000 weekly to the operations of MUNI and BART. That the Centers Division offers classes in the neighborhoods where it is needed is evidenced by the fact that 25% of the students walk to class, with a Districtwide average of 16%.

Compared to trips to work made by all San Francisco residents, students are less likely to use a car or a car pool but rely more on walking and public transportation.

About one in eight District students already has a baccalaureate college degree or higher attained in the United States ranging from 5% of College day and 11% of Centers students to more than 30% of College evening students. This compares with 28% of San Franciscans 25 or older. An additional 7% of our students already have a community college degree. Those students who may have done college work as part of their foreign education are not included among those degree holders. Some 37% of City College students report having had a foreign education including 6% with a foreign degree.

Some 65,560 San Franciscans were enrolled in a college according to the 1980 Census. As San Francisco population has increased since 1980, that figure might have increased somewhat. Fall enrollment count for the District was 59,293 and thus we might be serving 85-90% of all San Francisco college attendees. This comparison is just an estimate as we do not know, for example, if Centers students considered the Centers Division as college attendance in response to

the Census question on college attendance. Also about 10% of those students with valid local ZIP codes live outside San Francisco, or about 5,800 students. Thus, the 85-90% may be high but certainly the San Francisco Community College District is the dominant factor in post-secondary education in San Francisco.

Almost two of every three day students at City College and one of four evening students stated that it was their immediate goal to transfer to a four-year college. If half the students were sophomores and half freshmen, then we might expect to transfer about 6,200 each year.

Some 18% of all District students have the immediate goal of learning English, ranging from 29% of Centers and 3% of College students. Once that goal is accomplished, they may continue on with other goals. For example, students may need to learn English before seeking a degree or getting specific job training which would result in educational goals in other categories being understated. More than one of five District students do have immediate career goals; occupational goals are higher at the Centers as the transfer goal is predominant at the College. Another one in five students is taking classes to broaden his or her background, primarily at the Centers and in the evening division at City College.

Almost one of four students was attending District classes for the first time, a fairly consistent proportion among all divisions. Some 56% were continuing students having attended either the prior spring or summer. The remaining one-fifth were stop-outs, divided between those who had attended a year ago and those who were away longer. The proportion of stop-outs (6.1%), was lowest for day students at City College.

The Centers student, on the average, attends classes eight hours a week. Some 17% take 18 or more hours per week, most of whom are ESL students; ESL is offered largely in ten hour blocks. More than 40% of the College day students are taking class loads of at least 13 units while 14% are taking 16 or more units; another 8% are taking three or fewer units, probably one course. In the evening division, 47% are taking three or fewer units but some 2.5% are taking full-time loads.

Some 36% of District students work full-time, ranging from 22% of the College day students to 74% of College evening students; 32% of Centers students work full-time. Concomitant with the high proportion of evening students working full-time, only 5% are seeking work at this time compared to 11% of Centers students and 9% of College day students. Some 7% of Centers students are full-time homemakers and about 16% are retired.

Correlating to the occupational pattern, is the pattern of household income. The median household income of all District students is about \$13,300 but only \$10,700 in Centers; for College evening students, the median income is about \$24,000. One-fourth of all District students are in households with less than \$5,000 income. Some 30% of College day students live in one or two person households, whereas 60% of College night students live in small households.

Despite the higher household income level of College evening students, some 30% give low fees as their primary reason for selecting CCSF; this compares to 26% of College day students. The second most significant reason for selecting CCSF was a special program reported by about one in five students in both day and evening. A new response option this year was the reputation of CCSF which was the third most mentioned reason. About 34% of City College students were the first in their family to attend any college.

At the Centers, almost one in two learned of the class from a friend, with 12% from inquiry at school, and 13% from either a teacher or counselor. Other forms of publicity, mostly print items, account for the remaining one in four students.

One in three of all Centers students felt they did not require any special student services. Of the student services desired, program planning, job placement and career counseling were predominant. Some 22% of Centers students have some form of physical disability, most likely to be vision, followed by medical. Nevertheless, one of every two students expect to have at least one problem in completing their education; at the Centers speaking skills was the most predominant problem followed by reading and writing skills, whereas at the College, work conflicts were most significant.

An evaluation question was included in the Centers questionnaire. Some 46% thought instructional quality was excellent and 37% rated it good. Only 4% rated it fair or poor.
